



The American people have shown remarkable restraint in the face President's efforts to seek freedom for our people through diplomacy rather than military action. We must make clear to those olding the hostages, however, that our restraint is not to be

nterpreted as weakness or a lack of national will. I have asked residents of the Fifth District to take a moment to write a personal message to the government of Iran expressing our unity and requesting the immediate release of our embassy personnel. If you will take the time to write a letter and send it in care of my office. I will personally deliver it to the Iranian embassy

here in Washington. with only a few days remaining before Christmas, many of you have asked how you might send Christmas cards to the hostages. If you will also send them to me, I will be happy to deliver them for you to the Iranian embassy with instructions that they be forwarded to Tehran. I would hope, however, that if their captors have any compassion at all that our people would be home in time for

It is important to stress to the Iranian government that the American people are solidly united behind our citizens who are being held hostage in the U.S. embassy and that our nation's

resolve grows with each day that they are not released. I fully support President Carter's actions to step up the economic sanctions against the government of Iran. In addition, I was co-sponsor of a Congressional resolution which halted the training of Iranian military personnel in the U.S. and another which urges the President to announce that unless the U.S. hostages are released by a specified date the U.S. will initiate specified military operations against Iran. I have also called on the President to begin deportation proceedings against all Iranian students, allowing those who are fearful of returning to their homeland and those who support the United States in this crisis to apply for political asylum

and remain in this country. Thousands of Americans do not march every day outside the Embassy of Iran, but this does not mean we do not care. We do care. We are deeply distressed and disturbed by the mistreatment

and abuse of our fellow citizens behind held in Tehran.

Your letters to the Iranian government and Christmas cards to our people being held hostage will demonstrate our unity and resolve to see them released at the earliest possible date.

Will Find Trails

Unchanged This is the first winter no government funds are available o build snowmobile trails in Michigan, according to Automobile Club of Michigan. Despite the status quo trails. Auto Club expects Michi-

gan's 400,000 registered snow mobilers to enjoy uncrowded conditions everywhere. Budget cuts at the State Department of Natural Resources and the veto last winter of a bill to increase funding through state gasoline taxes are cited by some groups as major reason

Michigan's trails are unchanged Michigan has more snowmo bilers than any other state, and the number has changed little in the last two seasons. Snowmo oilers in Michigan will find 2,300 miles of marked state forest trails and 1,250 miles of trails and routes in four federally managed forests, enough to stretch from Detroit to Whitenorse in the Yukon Territory.

In addition, snowmobilers can ride 2.7 million acres of statemanaged forest land, over 105. 000 acres of state park and recreation area lands and along ights-of-way on thousands of miles of roads in 37 counties. that off-trail travel in the state's

four national forests is either prohibited or restricted. Operators should check with ranger offices for rules in each forest. All state land is off-limits to machines when snow depth is under four inches. Southern state game areas open to snowmobiling can be used Jan. through March 31. All snowmobiles must b

egistered to run on public lands. Children under 12 must be supervised by an adult to travel across public property oungsters aged 12 to 16 must pass an eight-hour, state-approved snowmobile safety course to drive without superv sion on public lands.

He also reported that the Open Space easement proposed for Vergennes Township, approved by the City Council in November has raised several issues of usage by neighboring residents and other Vergennes Township residents. He asked if Council wished to rescind their support. Council concurred to leave the decision as is, if Vergennes Township urged the Council to do something to bring the people back to



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
