School election in June

The Annual School District Election will be held on Monday, June 9, 1980, with two board vacancies on the ballot. Wayne M. Dowling and James A. Durr, both incumbents, have filed petitions with the school district for the four-year terms. Write-in votes are permissible at the election.

Registered electors in the Lowell Area School District have 3 precinct locations. Cascade Road is the dividing line for precincts one and two. Precinct 1 is located at Runciman School in Lowell and serves people who live

north of Cascade. Precinct 2 serving those on the south side of Cascade is located at the new Bowne Township Hall in Alto. Lowell School District registered voters living in Ada, Cannon, Grattan, Keene, and Vergennes Townships will vote at precinct 3 located in the Vergennes Township Hall on the corner of Bailey Drive and Parnell Ave.

Absent voter ballots are available at the board of education office located in the west wing of the Middle School. The office will be open, in addition to regular

hours, on Saturday, June 7, until 2 p.m. to accommodate absentee voting.

Zeigler boy drowns

Timothy O. Zeigler, 5-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Zeigler, Jr. was the victim of an accidental drowning Saturday evening at the family cabin cruiser at Grand Haven. The family was spending the weekend at the cruiser when the accident occurred.

Harold and his wife, Bonnie were out for the evening

when the babysitter discovered Timothy was missing from his bed around 10 p.m. The Zeiglers returned to the boat at about 10:30 and the police were called. A police diver found the victim in about four feet of water off the stern of the boat, an estimated hour after he had gone into the water. Attempts to save the boy's life were made at the scene, enroute to, and at Butterworth Hospital, but the boy died about 3 p.m. Sunday.

Harold Zeigler, Jr. is the owner of Harold Zeigler Ford, Inc. in Lowell and he and his family resided here from 1976 until last year when Zeigler bought another dealership in Kalamazoo and the family moved there.

That's the way with most of us, we haven't established any meaningful goals for our lives. 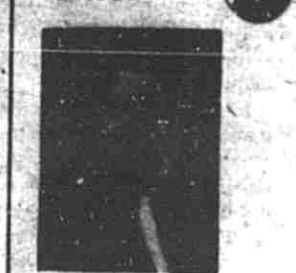

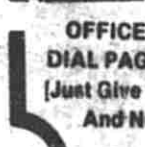
