Timothy O. Zeigler, 5year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Zeigler, Jr. was the victim of an accidental drowning Saturday evening at the family cabin cruiser at Grand Haven. The family was spending the weekend at the cruiser when the accident occurred.

Harold and his wife. Bonnie were out for the evening

when the babysitter discovered Timothy was missing

from his bed around 10 p.m. The Zeiglers returned to the boat at about 10:30 and the police were called. A police diver found the victim in about four feet of water off the stern of the boat, an estimated hour after he had gone into the water. Attempts to save the boy's life were made at the scene, enroute to, and at Butterworth Hospital, but the boy died about 3 p.m. Sunday.





Well, the Brown Family officially kicked off their 1980 camping season over this past weekend. The weekend started typically enough when we got to the Silver Lake State Park and the "Sorry Full" sign was out. Undaunted, we headed north, not sure whether to try the Traverse City area or go camp on the Manistee River near Grayling with some friends. After angling toward Traverse City for awhile, we finally decided on the Manistee

We pulled into camp with almost 300 miles on the odometer (it's about 150 miles from Lowell) and just enough daylight left to get the tent out of the car. But we've pitched the tent in the dark before, and it went up rather easily until we heard a sickening, "riilipppp". The fabric in the roof had pulled away from a seam and left a two or three foot, gaping hole. With some mosquito netting stuffed into the hole, and a black plastic tarp thrown over it, we had a tent that was functional, even if it didn't look like much.

The mosquito netting probably saved our lives. I've never seen mosquitoes as thick as they were by the river that first night. There was no breeze or cool air to send them to the brush for cover, so they were out in force. No amount of rub-on or aerosol repellant, flying insect spray or campfire smoke seemed to affect them much. The only salvations were perpetual swatting or shelter in a mosquito-proof tent. In the morning, we could see in the sunlight, at least a hundred of those hungry little devils flying around in the space between the mosquito netting and the black plastic, all trying to get into the hole in our tent. I was reminded of that box of mosquitoes in the "OFF" commercial that the lab technician sticks his arm into, only we were in the box and all the mosquitoes were trying to get in.

Where we camp on the Manistee River is not an official campground, but rather a space set aside for camping in a privately owned tree farm. There are no creature comforts that one might expect in a campground, such as electricity. water, showers, or even toilets. We cook and light with gas, carry our water in big jugs, and bathe in a nearby lake. The lack of toilets is the only problem. in that going to the bathroom means taking a shovel and toilet paper. trudging off to a secluded section of the woods and exposing sensitive portions of your body to millions of hungry mosquitoes. Great






