"Macker" plans 10th anniversary tourney

Members of the Macker Advisory Council last week revealed to City Council members plans for the 10th, biggest, and last on-the-street Macker Bas-

ketball Tournament. Next year's tournament will not be played on the traditional Macker stomping grounds.

Main Macker Scott McNeal

said Wednesday that because holding the Macker tournament increasingly required more detailed organization, Macker members "decided to take it off the streets."

The tournament, which has been growing each year, last year was 1100 basketball players participating on three-man teams, and this year will be enlarged to 350 teams or approximately 1400 players.

McNeal said he thought the Mackers could easily drum up 2000-3000 hoopsters for the event, but other members of the Macker Advisory Council balked at the prospects of handling a crowd of that size.

McNeal, who thought the Mackers could cope with such a group, conceded that he was an optimist.

Tournament growth has put an increasing strain on the ability of Macker members to provide facilities for players and staffing for games. The present on-the-street tournament format makes efficient organization that much more difficult.

And besides the headaches created by success, time has taken its toll on aging Mackers -- some of whom are in their mid-twenties. McNeal said that though the Mackers enjoyed putting on the tournament, many members, because of the responsibilities of family and job, have less time to devote to an event that asks more and more of its sponsors.

The decision to take the Macker tournament off the streets did not come easily. McNeal expressed some concern that a transplanted tournament would lose some of its present flavor.

"Macker has a personality that players really get involved in," he said. "We have an atmosphere that's something special, something extra. You can't talk about it; you can't explain it logically."

And yet, though desiring to retain Macker flair, McNeal wants to be able to hand down a manageable Macker tournament for the younger members who will have to assume greater responsibility in coming years.

McNeal said that, considering the time already invested in Macker tournaments and the enjoyment the event brings to people in Lowell, "It would be worthless to me to say, 'no more tournaments'."

For these reasons the Mackers are considering relocating in an area under consideration for a park by the Lowell City Council. The proposed park area is south of Foreman Road and east of Gee Drive.

McNeal said that the Macker organization considered the park area the best relocation site yet suggested. It has the advantage of being closed to residential areas and yet not far from M-21 and Main Street restaurants and stores.

In addition, McNeal thought an area of the Park could be adapted to recreate the present tournament atmosphere. Macker members have indicated a willingness to invest Macker money in a portion of the park for the chance to hold the tournament there.

City plans for the park, however, are still in the incubation stage, and may never come to term. Whatever the City Council decides, the Macker Advisory Council plans to have chosen a definite site for next year's tournament before the '83 Macker rolls around, so that participants can be informed and make plans for next year.

But, since this is the last of the original-style Mackers and the 10th anniversary besides, McNeal promised that the tourney would "finish with a bang."

So far plans for the 10th Macker include a benefit game, the proceeds of which will go to local organizations; a Macker birthday party; and an all-star basketball game, which McNeal says will be "really big -- some-

thing Lowell has never seen before."

He declined to give names of players until their appearance can be confirmed.

And, as usual, the Macker Tournament, to be held July 8-10, will be preceded by the crowning of a new Miss Macker on July 7.

Hundreds of scouts and their leaders will converge on Lowell April 29-30 and May 1 to celebrate the Iokemo District's Scout Fest '83.

The district is part of the West Michigan Shore Council and is comprised of most of Ionia and Montcalm counties and portions of Kent County.

Dave Hess of Ionia, chairman of the event, reports that the exposition is geared to demonstrate to the public scouting's many varied activities in addition to providing the scouts and their leaders with a memorable scouting experience.

Most of the show's activities will take place near the Lowell Showboat Arena, a short distance north of the business district near the east bank of the Flat River.

The Lowell Red Arrows evened their 1983 record at 1-1 by beating G.R. Central 9-3. The Arrows have never lost to the Class A. School. Chris Ellison allowed one hit and struck out seven in picking up her first victory of the year.

It was a tough week for the Red Arrows' softball team as they defeated Belding 7-6, but lost to Saranac 9-8 and Kenowa Hills 5-3.

Kerry Cosgrove's single, Chris Ellison's triple and Phyllis Beachler's game winning RBI, in the top of the seventh, gave the Arrows a come from behind vic-

tory over the Belding Red Skins. The Arrows spotted the Skins 5 runs in the first inning on 3 errors but held the Skins scoreless the rest of the way. The Red Arrows picked up 2 runs in the second and one each in the fourth and fifth innings. "We hit the ball really well and never gave up. This is a good victory. We are a going team and this should help our confidence," bubbled Bob Rodenhouse. Chris Ellison threw a no hitter in jumping her record to 2-0. She walked and struck out 7 batters. Angi Hyzer and Ellison each collected two hits.

In the Saranac game the Arrows blew a 6-3 lead and came up the losers 9-8. All of the Saranac runs scored were results of Arrow errors. Saranac scored six runs in the fifth thanks to 6 Red Arrow errors. "Those errors cost us the ball game. Saranac took full advantage of the mistakes and if you do that it helps win ball games. We just can't commit errors and expect to win," stated a dejected Bob Rodenhouse. Kathleen Beachler started the Arrow scoring as she walked to start the first innings and came home when Phyllis banged out a double. In the second Lowell picked up three more runs on hits to Danette Brown, Doreen Rickert, and Chris Ellison, sandwiched between were walk to Sue Sarriak and Kathleen Beachler. Lowell scored 4 more times, twice in the third and fourth. Phyllis Beachler and Brown collected two hits apiece. Kerry Cosgrove suffered the loss. She walked 4 batters and struck out 2 in a good effort. "She really deserved better fate than she received" added Rodenhouse.

On Friday the Arrows traveled to Kenowa Hills and again threw the ball game away. Errors helped the host Knights score 2 runs in each the second and third innings. A past ball in the third was the winning run. The Knights picked up an insurance marker in the 5th on a sacrifice fly. Lowell scored one run a piece in the third, fourth and sixth innings. Kathleen Beachler led the hitting attack with a 3 for 3 performance, scoring 2 runs and knocking in one. Chris Ellison collected two hits and 1 RBI. Ellison suffered the pitching defeat which lowered her over-all record to 2-1. She struck out six and walked seven.

25-year milestone is tribute to commercial nuclear energy

The recent 25th birthday of America's commercial nuclear power program had special significance for one Michiganian. The milestone was a quiet tribute to Gil Keeley and his colleagues who have helped write nuclear history.

It began on Dec. 18, 1957, at Shippingport, Pa., only half an hour from downtown Pittsburgh. Quietly, in the early morning darkness, a new era dawned. For the first time, a power plant generated commercial electricity from nuclear power.

"Although the regulatory process has produced some benefits, it has become overly conservative," says Keeley. "It is slowing the construction of specific nuclear plants, and development of the industry in general. Take hearings, for example. If I averaged up all my time in the last seven years, I've probably spent over 50 percent of it in hearings."

But, Keeley is optimistic that will change. "Coal, oil and gas can't provide all of our future energy. Eventually, necessity will make the regulatory process efficient and reasonable—the same way engineers have made nuclear power itself reliable and efficient."

"It's the same old story," says Keeley. "It's a matter of economics and need. I just hope the changes happen in time."

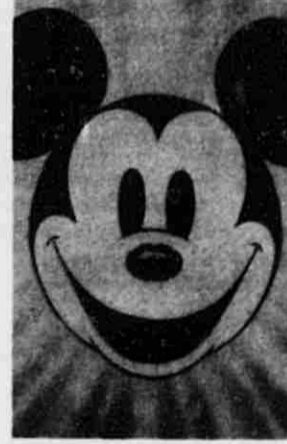

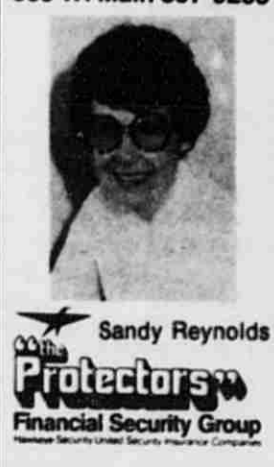

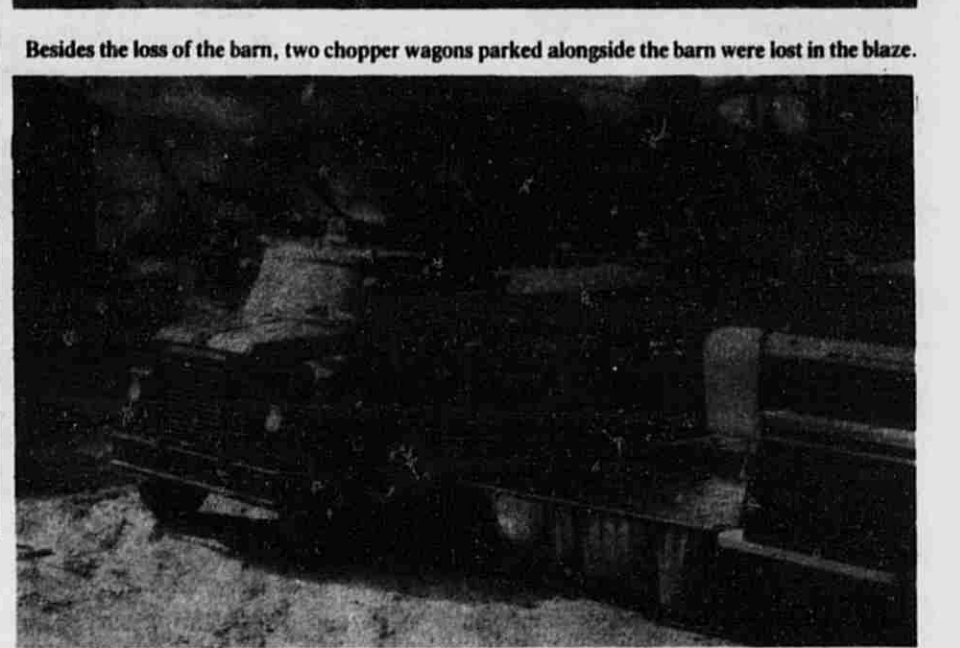

Aardema guest speaker for Young Authors

Students at the Runciman, Alto, and Bushnell Elementary Schools were treated Wednesday to the story-telling magic of Verna Aardema, author of 14 published children's books.

Mrs. Aardema led a gymnasium-full of K-5 youngsters through the motions of lapping up stew, tying up uncooperative animals, and forming rain clouds while at the same time spinning her imaginative tales.

was part of Young Author's Week, a time set aside especially to introduce young people to the joys of reading and creative writing.

The week closed with elementary students sharing with their peers stories which they had written and submitted as part of the Kent Intermediate School District Young Authors Competition.

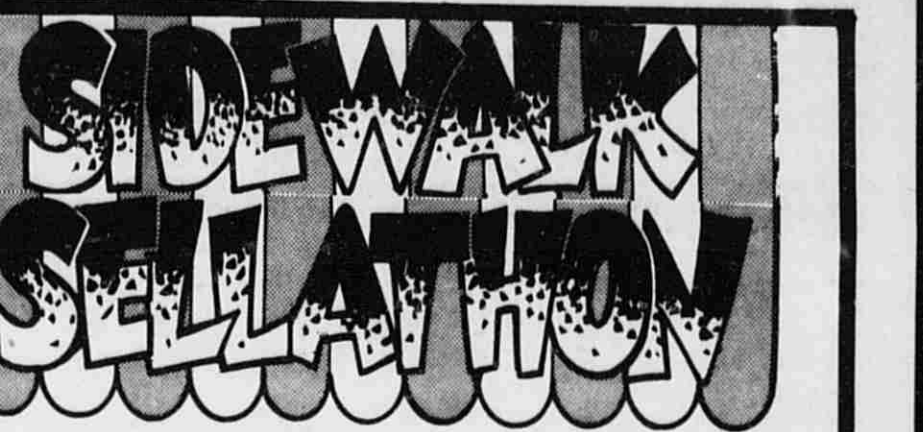

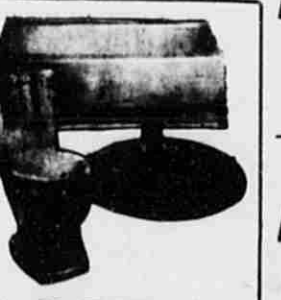

Pair of new businesses open in Lowell

Response to the presence of a new agency so far has been slow but "encouraging", according to Kyburz.

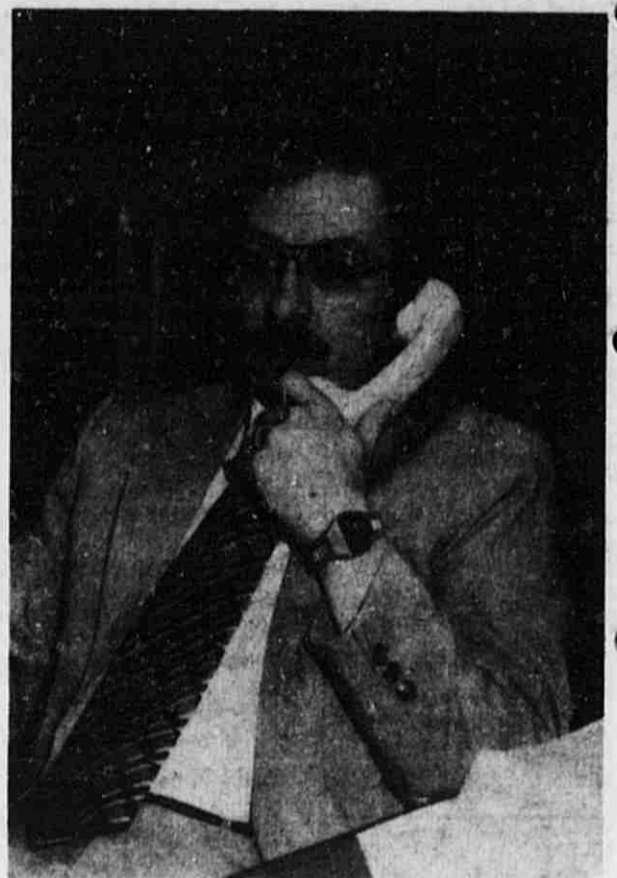
"Slowly people are becoming aware that there's a new office in town," he said.
