## WCUZ/Budweiser Showboat Softball Classic is ready to kick off this holiday weekend!!!

The WCUZ/Budweiser Showboat Softball Classic is a big name for a weekend event, but then this weekend event is "big". The whole thing will get started at 8:00 Saturday morning when the softball tournament gets underway. As of Tuesday morning, Kevin Reynolds, public relations manager at WCUZ and promoter of this event, said that 22 teams were signed up, and many more are interested in playing. The tournament will be played on five fields around the city, Recreation Park (REC); Middle School East (MSE); Middle School West (MSW); the High School (H-S) and the new city diamond on Gee Drive (GEE). The initials in brackets indicate how the fields will be designated on the schedules.

The numerous other events scheduled for the weekend kick off with a grand parade down

Main Street at 11:00 A.M. on Saturday. The parade will form beginning at 10:00 on Hudson St. near Richards Park, anyone interested in getting in an entry should contact Bonnie Grooters at 897-7451. The last entries in the parade will be the outhouses that will compete in the outhouse race. The parade will turn north up Monroe Street and end in the Riverside School grounds. While Main Street is still blocked off to traffic, the outhouses will line up and race back through the business district. A reviewing stand will be located near the Showboat ticket office with WCUZ radio personality Andy Rent doing a live broadcast. WCUZ will have live remote units broadcasting the weekend activities.

The outhouse races are organized by Fred Reuhs at Man's World Hairstyling, and anyone

wishing to get in a late entry should call 897-8102.

Immediately following the parade will begin a large slate of activities near the old Showboat dock on Lafayette Street, and in the Showboat Amphitheatre. The Lowell Volunteer Fire Department in cooperation with Budweiser Beer will operate a beer booth in the amphitheatre, alongside a food booth manned by the Alto Lions Club. Free music by four bands can be heard in the amphitheatre all afternoon beginning at 1:00. The bands scheduled to appear are, Shades of Time from 1-2; Cross Country from 2-3; Bust-N-Loose from 3-4 and Northern Nights from 4-5.

Ten carnival game booths will be operated near the old Showboat Dock by members of the St. Mary's Church. The games will include, Tip the Cat; Ring Toss;

Dart Throw, and other favorites, along with some exciting new games. There will also be Budweiser Clydesdale Horseshoe Pitching competition at the vacant lot on the corner of Avery and Monroe Streets. For a small entry fee, contestants will get four chances at making a ringer and winning a prize.

Bruce Cornelius, the Michigan regional chili-cook-off champion will offer a demonstration of his talents beginning at about noon near the old showboat dock. Area chili cooks have been invited to bring along samples of their best efforts, and the public will be able to taste test the wares for a nominal fee, which of course will go to the Showboat cause.

The afternoon events will wind down around 5:00, but the amphitheatre will come alive

again when the doors open for the Bobby Bare Show scheduled to begin at 9:00 with the Fabulous Rockabillys starting things off. Tickets for the Bobby Bare Show are available at Lowell City Hall and all Believe In Music Locations for \$7.50.

Immediately following the Bobby Bare Show will be a fireworks display sponsored by the Lowell State Savings Bank and Lippert Pharmacy. The fireworks will be launched from the west bank of the Flat River opposite the amphitheatre and will be best viewed from the amphitheatre.

On Sunday the softball tournament will continue, with the winner expected to be presented the trophy by early evening. During the day on Sunday there will be a free polo game at the Kentree Polo Field, at which a hat will be

passed among the spectators with all proceeds going to Showboat.

Throughout the weekend, Lowell merchants will be sponsoring a coupon promotion. There will be several thousand copies of a flyer with 24 containing coupons that can be used to save money on everything from coca-cola to carpeting. The coupon flyers will be available at participating merchants and at the softball fields. The unique twist to this promotion is that each coupon provides for some type of kick back to the Lowell Showboat cause.

That's the way the weekend shapes up, and don't forget that this is a benefit for the Lowell Showboat, and all proceeds go to help save the Lowell Showboat. Let's see the community really get behind this promotion!

## Motorcyclist killed Saturday

A 24-year-old man was decapitated Saturday evening when he struck a cable while driving his motorcycle in the village of Saranac.

Killed instantly was Christopher Thomas Divine, 24, of 123 Vosper Street, Saranac. The accident happened at 8 P.M.

Sgt. Robert Schutt of Ionia County Sheriff's Department said Divine was southbound on the dirt track, leading to the village water tower, off the end of Pleasant Street. He struck the cable stretched between two posts, closing the track to traffic, and was killed instantly.

Schutt noted that witnesses said Divine was travelling "at a high rate of speed on his motorcycle" at the time of the accident and had been seen travelling at high speeds in the village prior to the accident. The cable was marked with an orange warning flag.

Divine's body was flung about 16 feet from the point at which he

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struck the cable. His motorcycle travelled about 100 feet south of the cable and came to rest on the east side of the dirt track.

Schutt said that softball games were in progress at fields just west of the accident scene and "he (Divine) may have been looking at them and not where he was going."

Dr. Darrel Opicka, Ionia County Medical Examiner, pro-

nounced Divine dead at the scene.

Employed by his father as the plant manager of Central States Precision Grinding Co. in Lowell, Divine graduated from high school in North Penn. Penn., and attended Montgomery County Community College, also in Pennsylvania.

## Environmental health note:

The Kent County Health Department cautions area residents against purchasing undeveloped land without first considering the need for proper sewage disposal. Many areas of Kent County are not served by public sewers and must depend on septic tank systems for sewage disposal. Unfortunately, much property is unsuitable for septic tanks due to impermeable soil conditions, high water table elevations, or both.

The Kent County Health Department offers a vacant land

evaluation service for persons who may have concerns about sewage disposal limitations on property they wish to purchase. Such evaluations are available for a nominal fee and will help protect persons from purchasing land which is not suitable for septic tank sewage disposal systems. Prospective land buyers are encouraged to take advantage of the evaluation service as an inexpensive means of assuring their investments. # Letters...

Dear Roger:  
With Memorial Day close at hand, I thought perhaps your readers might enjoy the following:

I recently received a letter from Mr. Ray L. Collins of Alexandria, VA asking if we had a Benjamin Morse buried in Lowell. Mr. Morse had been the recipient of the Medal of Honor, one of our Nation's highest, in 1891, for conduct in battle during the Civil War in 1864.

The following is a quote from Mr. Collins' return letter. The citation was given for the Capture of Colors of the 4th Georgia Battery, Confederate States of America, on May 12, 1864 at Spotsylvania, VA.

"The flag was captured during a charge on Confederate breastworks at 3:30 A.M. 12 May, 1864. Quite a number of the citations during the Civil War were limited to sentences as this one. However, historians will tell you that there was much more to it. A Color Sergeant or Color Bearer would not give up his flag very easily. Quite often many men would surrender or flee when their colors fell or were captured. Once you saw your Colors gone, you thought your unit had lost the battle so you would run for your life, etc. A good little hand-to-hand combat went on before you captured another's flag or colors, most of the time it was a battle to the death for the Color Sergeant or Color Bearer."

And an excerpt from "A Study in Valor", Michigan Medal of Honor Winners in the Civil War,

published by the Michigan Civil War Centennial Observance Commission, obtained from the Michigan State Archives.

"Benjamin Morse, farmer, born September 20, 1844, Livingston, N.Y. Enrolled as private for three years in Co. C, Third Michigan Infantry, at Grand Rapids, May 13, 1861. Mustered, Grand Rapids, June 10, 1861. Captured at White Oak, Va. June 30, 1862, paroled, August 5, 1862. Captured at battle of Chancellorville, May 3, 1863, paroled, October 1, 1863. Re-enlisted as veteran, December 24, 1863. Corporal, September 22, 1864. Mustered out, Jeffersonville, IN, July 5, 1865. Medal of Honor, February 24, 1891, for capture of flag of Fourth Georgia Battery at Spotsylvania, VA, May 12, 1864. After war lived at Lowell, Michigan."

Being a Civil War History buff, having read many accounts of battles, I'm sure that it was no easy feat, and I find it fascinating. I still do not have an account of the battle itself, but am contacting the National Archives for more information.

At this time of year when we honor all the veterans who have given their lives to keep our great nation free, over many, many years, it is especially interesting to know of a person who came from our own community, one hundred years before you were born, fought so valiantly for his belief in his country, never expecting to be given such a high honor, just doing his job as a soldier, then living out his life quietly as a farmer in our community, being buried in our small cemetery. He is not dead as long as we remember him.

## Governor Blanchard honors Girlstown

It was announced recently, that Governor James Blanchard has declared the Month of May to be "Girlstown Month" throughout the State of Michigan.

The Governor's declaration was the first in a series of events marking 1983 as Girlstown's 25th year of providing services to adolescent girls in Michigan.

Established by the Michigan State Federation of Women's Clubs in 1958, Girlstown is a child care and treatment facility for girls who have been removed from their homes by the courts.

The staff at Girlstown includes professionals who counsel, tutor, and work with the girls to bring their lives back to normalcy. In addition, the staff counsels family members in an attempt to bring about the understanding necessary to enable each girl to return to her own family environment under improved conditions.

By housing only twelve girls at one time, Girlstown provides a home-like setting in which each girl receives individualized attention and personal care.

As a licensed foster care facility, Girlstown must meet the rigorous standards of the State of Michigan and works constantly to upgrade the quality and breadth of services provided.

Locally, the Lowell Woman's Club has contributed to the support of Girlstown over its 25 years history.

As a member of the Michigan State Federation of Women's Clubs, the Lowell Woman's Club will participate in a state-wide fund raising project for Girlstown. The Girlstown Cookie Sale is the first coordinated state-wide effort that this organization has undertaken. Proceeds from this fund raising event will be utilized to ensure that Girlstown can continue to provide its special breed of caring to girls in Michigan.

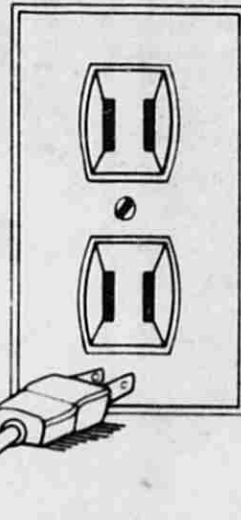

**It's dog-gone good**  
 Emergence of disc related activities, such as the annual "Kent County Cycle Ashley Whippet Invitational", has proven to be a boon to man's best friend by expanding the scope of interplay between the dog and his owner.  
 Traditional forms of obedience training were beneficial for the dog, but with frisbees, the opportunity for additional fun along with obedience training, is greatly enhanced. It helps to reinforce the spirit of companionship during the training activity.  
 Similarly, frisbee-catching dogs receive many other benefits, including improving their well-being through the physical aspects of limbering up, exercising and utilization of the action to help build cardio-vascular strength.  
 In all, most dog fanciers agree that frisbee catching and fetching help make a happier, healthier dog.  
 There's another area of benefit to the dog community which is not so apparent. It is well known that a large number of pets go unwanted. But, as a result of contests like these, many persons go to the dog pounds and animal shelters looking for a dog with potential frisbee-catching ability.  
 The best known example is Kona, once an unwanted four-month old mixed breed puppy in an animal shelter near Phoenix, Arizona, now the former Ashley Whippet Invitational Champion. Dink, his predecessor as a world champion, was also rescued from the pound by the Strickler family.

The Bass fishing prospects for the opener locally are outstanding for small mouth in the Flat River but only fair on local lakes for largemouth. The Smallmouth are now on the beds and large numbers of good fish are being taken below the dam, in Lowell, and also through the River system. For these smallmouth, Minnows, Helgramites, or leeches will be the top baits. However small plugs and spinner baits will account for some also.  
 Due to cold water conditions the largemouth have not started to spawn in local lakes. Few fish will be taken on surface type lures. By far the most productive bait will be minnows, fished along the drop offs in from 6 - 10 feet of water. Although not spawning the fish will be in relatively shallow water due to warming of the surface. The State record largemouth was taken from Big Pine Island Lake and this should be a good prospect. Morrison, Big and Little Wabasis, and a multitude of smaller lakes should all be good. Remember, the waters are cold for this time of year and the fish are going to the more lethargic than usual. Fish them accordingly, extra slow is the word. A few walleyes are being taken from the Grand. Mostly on crawlers with a spinner or harness. The water is high and very roily and the Grand River fishery remains only fair at best.  
 Last weeks northern Pike and Walleye opener was generally poor with a scattering of fish reported. Once again, the weather and water temperatures were the contributing factors. Medium sized pike, minnows or large bass minnow should be the top bait, some will be taken on lures but they are reluctant to move very fast or far when the water temperatures are low. We will be holding a largemouth and smallmouth contest each day, May 28, 29 and 30. Stop by The Shop and sign up. The Combination, 526 E. Main, Lowell 897-6111.

This millage will provide an estimated \$2210 per student. If the Lowell Schools reduced the millage rate to 25.9043 mills the per pupil state aid allowance would be reduced to \$1856.35 per student for a loss of \$353.65 per pupil. With an estimated 2781 pupil enrollment next year this 5.9957 reduction in millage would cost the school district \$983,500 in lost revenues.  
 The above projections are based upon the Governor's proposed state aid formula which is subject to legislative change.  
 The purpose of the hearing is to receive testimony and discuss the levy of an additional millage rate. Not less than seven (7) days following the public hearing, the Board of Education may approve all or any portion of the proposed additional millage rate.

I was amazed at the size of the park. My legs ached so much! After lunch provided by Mr. and Mrs. Harwood, we climbed the Dune Stair Climb. It had over 300 steps! I'm scared of heights so I didn't dare look down. Every step I went I grabbed the next step. But it was worth it when I reached the top. What a beautiful sight—the trees, the flowers, and the sand dunes in the background. I saw a big ship go by. It was an adventure!

The funnest part was climbing the sand dune. At the top you could see Lake Michigan and the other sand dunes. It was chilly up there.

When we got back it was 3:00, but we had fun. We want to thank you, Mr. and Mrs. Harwood for taking us.

To help obtain the financial resources necessary to achieve educational goals.

To keep the people of the district intelligently informed about the schools.

To be sensitive to the educational hopes and aspirations of the people of the district.

To appraise the activities of the school district in light of the goals and objectives previously established.

To discharge its responsibilities as a state agency by participating in statewide efforts to promote and improve public education.

In the next two issues, The Ledger will offer a profile and statement of position for the nine candidates to aid the electors in their decision for the new board members.

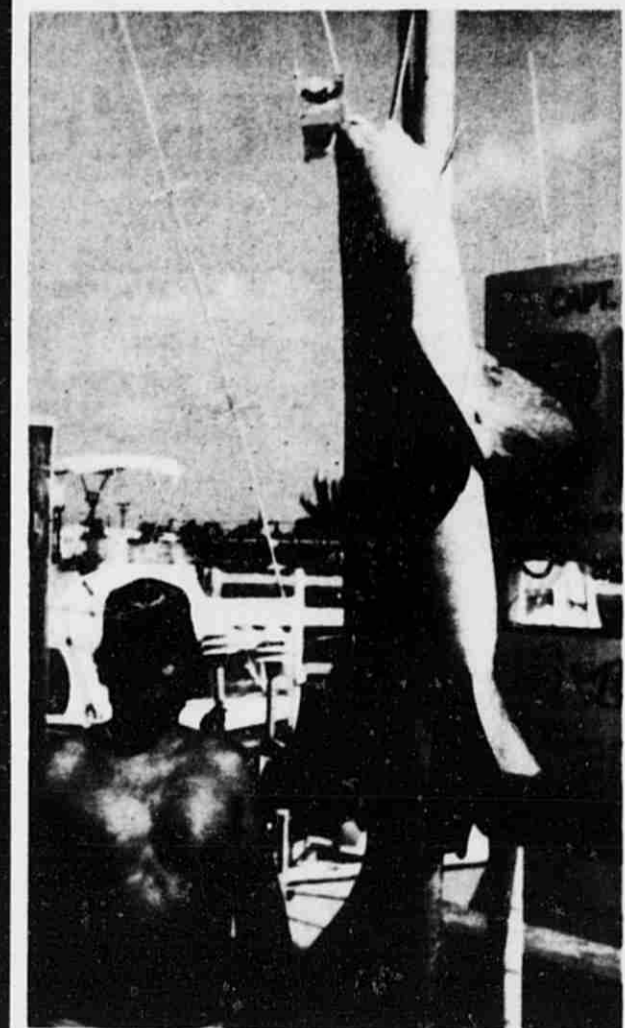
taken over by big business. And ELLEN, played by Kathy Doyle of Ionia, the young, eversearching woman, who is after happiness and love.

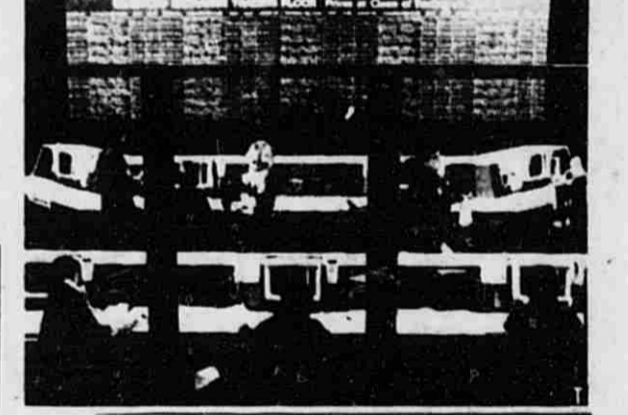

NEWS IN PHOTOS



A new computerized trading floor for the buying and selling of collector's plates was unveiled recently at the Bradford Exchange in Chicago, Ill.

The new trading floor, which looks like a modern section of the New York Stock Exchange, was designed to permit plate collectors to buy and sell plates with one phone call, the way many people now buy and sell stocks and bonds. By calling the exchange, collectors can also get up-to-the-second information on the latest plate prices and can change their bid and ask orders in response to price movements.

Although exchanges for stocks, bonds, grains and hogs have existed for centuries, Bradford's new trading floor is the first of its kind in the collectibles field. "There is no equivalent for stamps, coins, antiques, valuable artworks or other collectibles," said J. Roderick MacArthur, chairman of the board of governors of the exchange.

Collector's plates are decorative plates which are produced in limited edition for the purpose of being collected. More than 1,100 different plates are listed on the exchange. They are produced by 60 makers from 12 countries. The exchange estimates that more than seven million persons throughout the world are plate collectors. While many of these collectors are primarily interested in the artistic and decorative aspects, many others participate in the international phenomenon of buying and selling plates to increase the total value of their collections. In addition to the Niles trading floor, Bradford operates exchanges in Frankfurt, W. Germany; London, England; and in London, Ontario, Canada. 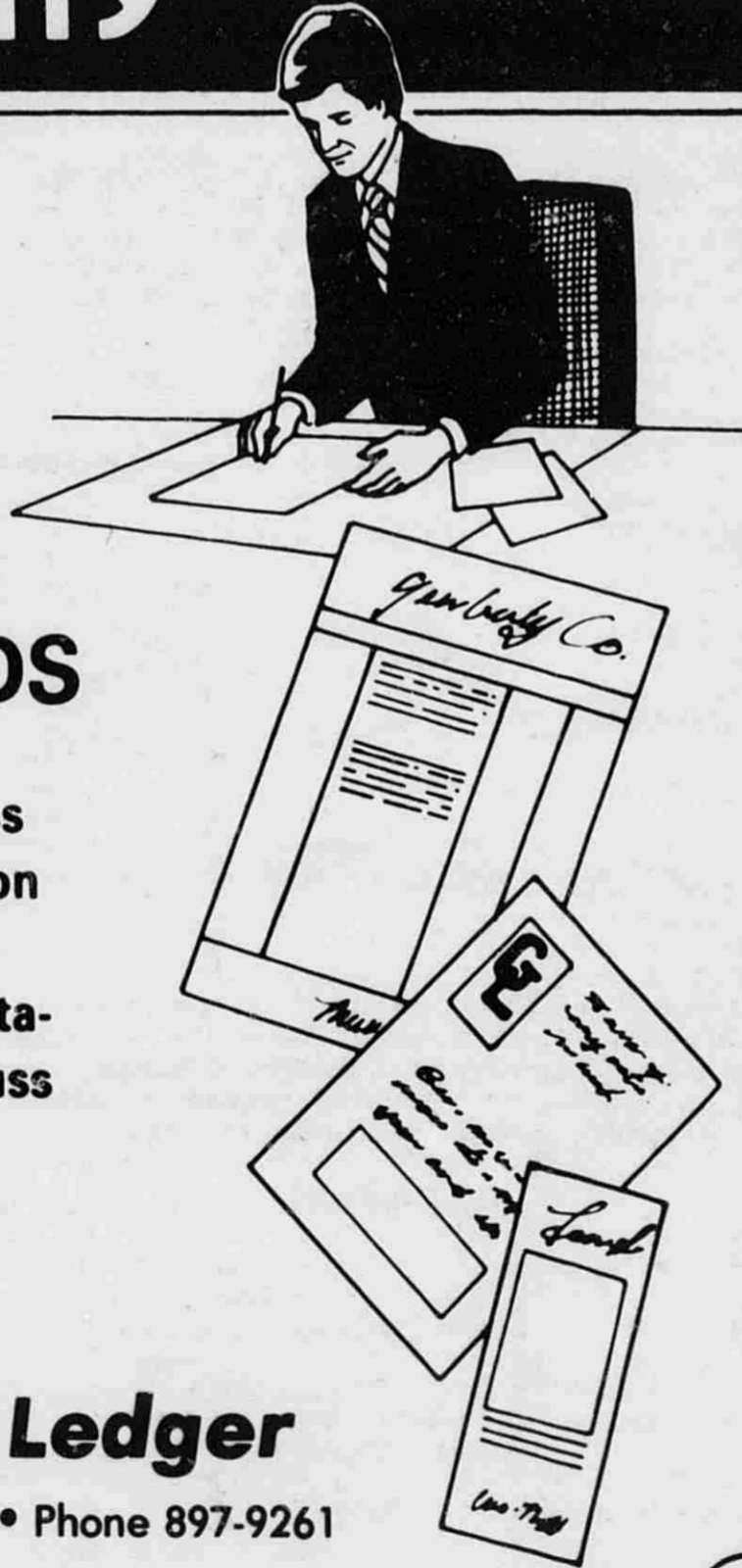
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## Moderation is key to fitness

Individuals who rush to become physically fit as soon as warm weather arrives usually get discouraged and quit exercising, reports the Automobile Club of Michigan.

"Persons who have been inactive during winter, weekend-only exercisers and individuals seeking overnight fitness often attempt to do too much too quickly and soon develop sore muscles and joints or even injuries," stated Walter Zeiler, Auto Club's Life manager.

"Adults starting an exercise program should work up gradually to at least 20 minutes of cardiovascular exercise three to five days per week to improve heart and lung capacity," Zeiler said.

Cardiovascular exercises such as bicycling, swimming, run-

ning and brisk walking are the best summer activities for improving the body's ability to transport and use oxygen. These aerobic exercises are rhythmic, continuous and involve the large muscles of the body, such as the legs.

"Cycling five miles in less than 20 minutes has the same conditioning value as swimming 600 yards in under 15 minutes or running one mile in less than eight minutes," Zeiler added.

The Auto Club's "Guide to Summer Fitness" lists moderate and vigorous activities for improving the cardiovascular system and burning calories.

For weight loss, the length of exercise is more important than the speed. For example, running one mile will burn nearly the

same number of calories whether it is run in six minutes or 12 minutes.

Moderate-paced exercises can be continued longer and performed with less fatigue, so more distance can be covered and more calories burned.

"People should choose exercises they enjoy and make time for that activity just like they arrange time for lunch," Zeiler said.

Before beginning any exercise program, individuals over age 35 or those with medical problems should seek the guidance of a physician or other health professional.

To know how hard to exercise, determine the minimum and maximum work the heart must do to improve fitness. Al-

though a stress test performed under a physician's care is the ideal guideline, individuals can subtract their age from 220 and multiply the resulting figure by .6 and .9 for the minimum and maximum training heart rate. For example, a 30-year-old person would multiply 190 by .6 for a 114 beats-per-minute minimum and by .9 for a 171 beats-per-minute maximum.

To determine your exercise heart rate, place two fingers at the wrist or neck within five seconds of stopping the exercise. Count the pulse beat for 10 seconds and multiply by six for the heart beat per minute.

Individuals who have been inactive should exercise at the minimum level and gradually work up to the middle of the heart rate training range.

The Auto Club advises warming up and cooling down with 10-minute stretching exercises that use large muscle groups to avoid cramping, injury, and to gradually increase the body temperature and heart rate to a level that will fit into the exercise activity without strain.

Always exercise in light, loose-fitting clothes at a level at which you can talk comfortably and stop at the first sign of pain.

Avoid dehydration and nausea by drinking plenty of fluids, especially water, before and during exercise and by not eating for several hours before the activity. Protect against heat stress with early morning or evening workouts when the sun's intensity is less and humidity is lower. Otherwise, reduce the exercise duration and rest frequently.

Although at press time the last frost was less than a week old and barely melted, the rush is on. Local woolly worms, seasoned gardeners, and weekend roto-tiller renters all seem in agreement that spring has finally arrived and this time it won't depart.

But just in case your garden is large enough that all your planting can't be done in one afternoon, it might be in your best interest to get a little insurance by planting seeds and heartier types of vegetables and flowers first.

This plan of attack also gives your sore muscles time to repair themselves for the next onslaught, the delicate little sets and starts which the rabbits love to munch. If the weather holds, the cow doesn't run dry and the yard varmints don't get too fat, you may just have the makings for a beautiful and nutritious summer and fall.
