## WCUZ weekend a BIG success

The sun opened the door to fun and laughter Saturday and welcomed over 6500 friends, relatives and guests to the WCUZ/Budweiser Lowell Showboat weekend. Over \$12,000 - \$14,000 was raised for the Showboat fund.

Another round of applause should be given to West Side Beer and Budweiser for their cooperation and contribution in the weekend's festivities. The action kicked off Saturday morning with the first round of the WCUZ/Budweiser Softball Classic which was finally decided Sunday in a game between Wheels Unlimited and Poor Arthur. Wheels Unlimited won the championship game 6-0 thereby winning first place trophy and Poor Arthur 2nd and Bill's Gym Plus 3rd.

At eleven the Showboat Parade started down Main Street. Eight floats representing local organizations and businesses, clowns, fire engines, antique and new cars, horsemen, old time bicycles, the calliope and local bands all entertained young and old.

Following the parade, pylons were placed in a curving, obstacle course design down the parade route for the running of the outhouses. Pfaller's Riverside Clothing's four man team proved victorious in their caffeine powered one-holer. Jim Pfaller, Leo Pfaller, Mike Feldpausch, and Steve Feldpausch pushed and pulled their way to what was later described as a superior ability and age motivated victory. The team has already issued an open challenge to all comers for the Fourth of July competition. Rumor has it that the team is intending to add a secret paper shredder to their entry for the run.

The crowds then moved down to the amphitheater boardwalk where seven contestants involved in a heated chile cook-off were simmering. Bruce Cornelius, regional chile champ, Gordon Gould and Diana Fulkeron were on hand as official judges and samplers. After considerable munching, Fred Ricks, 289 Elm St. SE, of Clarksville was awarded the \$25 cook-off prize along with two tickets to Bobby Bare and a free entry to the Fourth of July cook-off to be

After a dinner break, Colonel Clair McCombs, in his modified Cessna 152 Aerobat entertained the amphitheater crowd with aerobatic loops and rolls over the river and under the wires.

The Rockabillies really woke the crowd, got their feet stompin', and their hands poundin' with rocked versions of old favorites and original material as they anticipated the arrival on-stage of Bobby Bare.

Around 9:15, the Budweiser inspired crowd was on it's feet with a Showboat welcome for Bobby Bare. Bobby plunged into his round of country favorites including "500 Miles", "The Goalpost of Life", and "The Winner". Midway through the show, Bare related his past, giving credit to WCUZ in Grand Rapids as being the radio station responsible for his early airplay and subsequent success with RCA.

Topping off the evening was a fireworks display sponsored by Lippert Pharmacies and State Savings Bank of Lowell.

Sunday the festivities wound down with a free polo match at the Kentree Polo Club and the final softball match.

## Area men aid robbery victim

Four local men rushed to the rescue of two women who were being robbed and beaten, captured the thief, and held him for the police.

Steven VanderZiel, 22 of Lowell; David Fuss, 22, of Alto; Carlton Blough, 26, of Lowell, and his brother Gary Blough 29, also of Lowell were finishing their pizza when 8 year old Robin Fodrey ran into the restaurant yelling for help.

Led by 21 year old Pizza Hut employee Chris Guis, the five men rushed outside where they found a man beating a 34-year old woman's head against the pavement. They subdued the man and sat on him until police arrived.

Lt. Donald Yerrick stated that a man in his early 20's entered the restaurant at 3550 28th St. S.E., after 10 P.M. and acted suspicious, first loitering, then ordering a pizza and leaving before it was served.

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Shortly after, Robin Fodrey ran in yelling.

According to Yerrick, the man had confronted a 39-year old woman and a 34 year old outside the restaurant. He took the older woman's purse and assaulted the younger one when she resisted the robbery.

The younger woman received cuts and bruises and was treated and released at Butterworth Hospital.

The five men have been recommended for citations for coming to the woman's aid.

In a fast paced game Lowell was defeated by Greenville, the Tri-River champs, in pre-district tournament action, 6-0. It was the third set back at the hands of the powerful Yellow Jackets this season. Lowell played well, end with intensity, except for the first inning.

In the first, 3 straight walks loaded the bases. Lowell Senior pitcher Kerry Cosgrove, then got clean-up hitter Kathy Commee to pop up, for out number one. Kim Zick then sent one foul down the right field line that was dropped for an error. She then lined one to right for a single driving in one run. Cosgrove struck out Sue Oberg for out number two and then Mary Rood hit a full count pitch to center for a single and two R. B. I.'s.

"It's two bad we dropped that pop-up. All four of those runs were unearned and it put us in a

hole," stated Coach Bob Rodenhouse. "By all rights the score of the game should have been 2-0. Our girls played hard. Greenville is a very good team, they have the pitching and they play good defense. Cosgrove did a great job, only allowing 5 hits, from a very powerful hitting team."

Greenville scored twice more, once in the third on 3 walks and a hit-batter, and once in the fifth on a walk, sacrifice and Mary Rood's second hit of the game.

## cozy corner

Whether it be on a T-shirt, bumper sticker or front license plate, every time I see the slogan, "I don't get mad, I get even," I immediately think of an experience I had while in the army. I went to Korea as an M.P. in 1971, but after six months there, our M.P. company was cut back to detachment strength, and I was out of a job. Rumor had it that most of us would be transferred to M.P. companies up north, near the de-militarized zone. Not relishing that idea, I scrambled around, and pulled a couple of strings through friends at headquarters company. I ended up getting a "cush" 8 to 5 job as a customs inspector at the hold baggage depot. It was here that I met Eric "Hutch" Hutchison, a fellow customs inspector, and probably the person for whom the "get even" slogan was coined.

Hutch and I became fast friends, and when I look back on the fun we had, I figure it should have been us paying the army, instead of the other way around.

Getting back to the "get even" incident. It all started when Hutch and I were walking back from the mess hall and had to pass by our 3-star general and his aide, a captain. We saluted, but after we had passed by, the captain hollered at us to stop, and we were dressed down, chewed out, and yelled at for a good five minutes about our long hair, long sideburns, sloppy dress and disrespectful salute, whatever that meant. All the while, the 3-star general stood a few feet away, waiting for the captain to be done with us.

All officers, could, and usually did have their belongings packed at their billets, rather than bring it all into our depot for packing and shipping. On these "packs", we customs inspectors rode with the Korean freight contractors, and watched to see what went into the cartons. We got royal treatment from the officer being packed, as they wanted us to do our best to see that their cameras, stereos, china, dress uniforms, etc. all made it back to the states swiftly and safely.

About two months after the chewing out incident, and only about two weeks prior to when Hutch was to get out of the army, guess who came up on our pack schedule? Hutch said, "he's mine".

We could usually breeze through one or two packs in a morning or afternoon. Hutch spent two complete days on the captain's pack. He made him tear the backs off all his stereo components, turn all the pockets inside out on all his neatly folded uniforms, he even made him take apart his ball point pens to check for contraband. Hutch ran all the paperwork and box labels through as usual, with a destination to some remote sounding missile site in Utah. When he was done, he handed me the paperwork, and said, "look at this". I couldn't find anything wrong with it, so he said, "Look at his orders". I looked over the orders, and finally noticed that the good captain wasn't going to Utah, he was going to the Pentagon. I would be very surprised if the captain ever got re-united with his baggage.

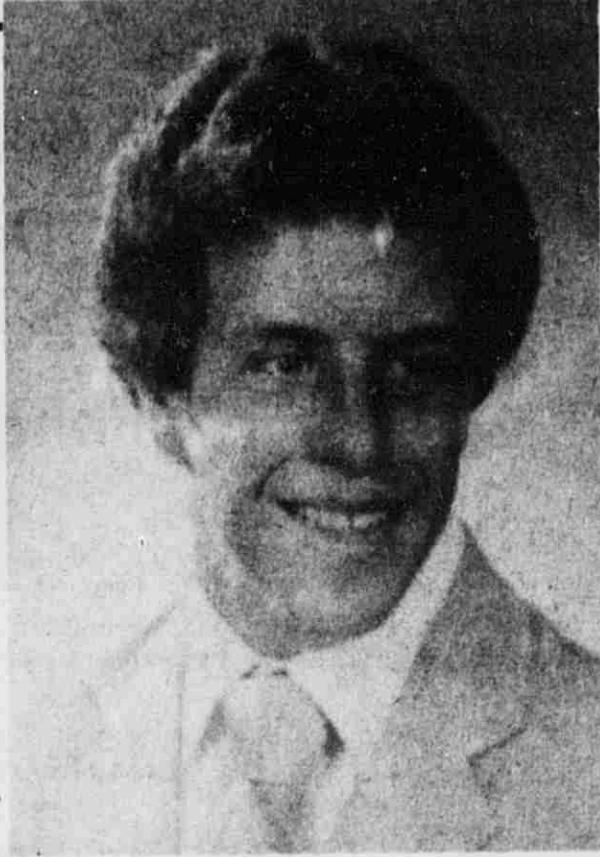


**John Kwant**

Tawnie won the D.A.R. award and was a Girl's State participant while remaining active in the Ada Community Reformed Church.



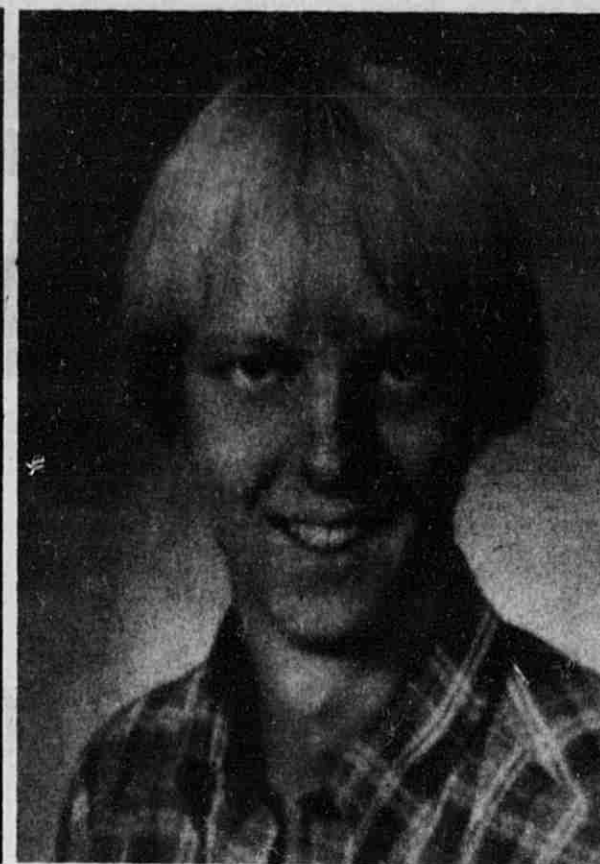
**Rhonda DeLong**

**Kevin Baker**

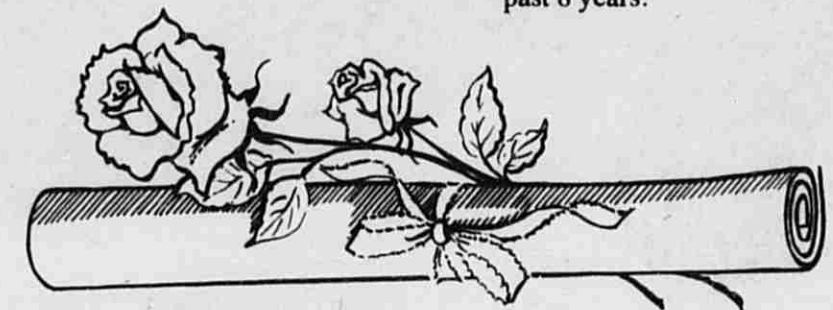

**Evan Ritzema**

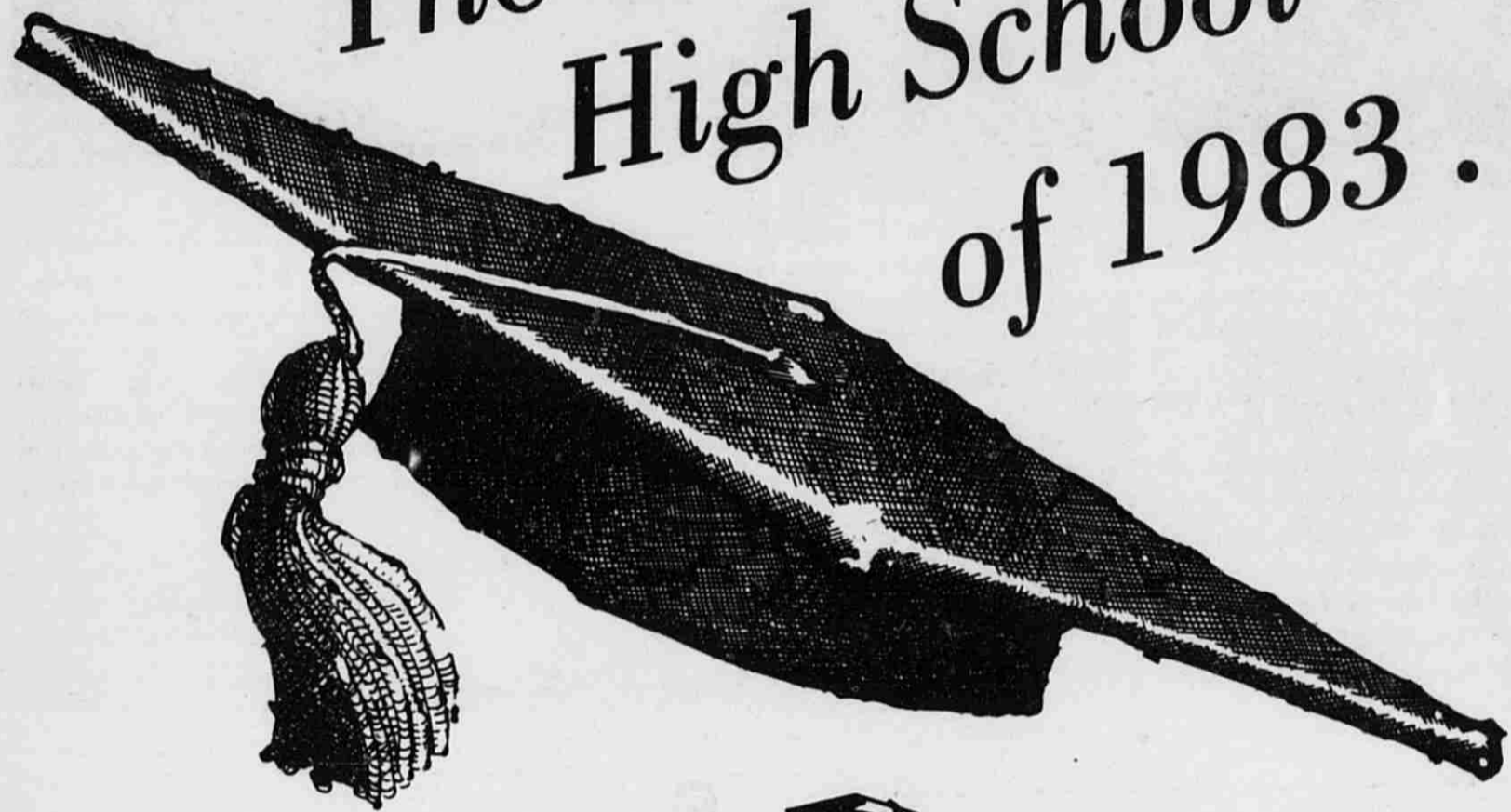

## Dioxin in Michigan rivers and streams

Scientists at Michigan State University sampled carp and sucker in the major streams and rivers of Michigan and preliminary results indicate dioxin contamination in fish from those streams and rivers running through Michigan's major industrial areas. Levels measured in the edible portions (skin-on filets) ranged from non-detectable to about 100 parts per trillion. (A part per trillion is about the same as one grain of sugar in an Olympic-size swimming pool.) The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recommends that fish containing over 50 parts per trillion not be eaten. Some fish in some localities would exceed this limit. The FDA recommendation is based on experiments on laboratory animals who were exposed to dioxin daily over a lifetime. Even if these studies are accepted, which not all scientists do, they suggest that occasional fish consumption would be unlikely to lead to adverse effects. Some concern might be justified for individuals who use fish as their only source of food. The only confirmed effect of dioxin in humans is chloracne, a skin inflammation similar to, but somewhat more serious than, the typical acne found in teenagers. Toxic effects which have been suggested from animal studies, such as liver damage, cancer, and genetic effects, have not been found in human populations nor have they been fully substantiated in animal research.

In summary, because of the possibility that effects found in laboratory animals could occur in humans, it is prudent to limit dioxin exposure. However, at the levels at which they have been found in Michigan fish, there is probably not much cause for alarm. Efforts should certainly be made to limit future contamination and to clean up that which has been found.
