Gala "4th" set for Monday

Plans are set for Lowell's annual "Fourth of July Celebration" to be staged here Monday. The schedule of events is a mile long, but this article will attempt to run down all the day's events anyway. As you will soon read, there is something for everyone, so you may want to forego your annual Independence Day trip to the beach in favor of a really great day here in Lowell.

Festivities begin at 10:00 a.m. with the "Policeman's Auction", to be held on the 4H Fairgrounds. An endless list of confiscated or lost items will be offered for sale at auction. The items will be displayed on Saturday, July 2 at the fairgrounds, and those who can identify and prove ownership of a lost or stolen item can claim it from noon until 2:00 P.M. The items to be auctioned include a motorcycle, 16 bicycles, 2 16mm movie projectors, 27 assorted trophies, 2 TVs, a stereo 8 track tape player with two speakers and dozens and dozens of other items.

Also getting started at 10:00 A.M. will be the "Great West State Chili Cook Off". Up to forty entrants in this competition will be vying for first place honors which includes entry in the state chili cook off competition and lodging in Ann Arbor for the event. If you have a good chili

recipe, and want to give it a go, stop by or call Fred Rehus at Man's World Hairstyling, 897-8102. The chili competition will be held in the quanset building at the fairgrounds, and samples of the chili and beer will be available for sale there later on in the day.

At noon, the festivities will really get rolling with a gala parade down Main Street. The parade will form at the Riverside School and proceed down Monroe to Main, then west to Broadway and then south again to the fairgrounds. There will be a reviewing stand near the corner of Broadway and Main. The Lowell Area Arts Council will judge decorated bikes, trikes, big wheels and those in costume entered in the parade. The judging will take place near the King Memorial Pool immediately following the parade, and ribbons will be awarded to the winners in each of the various categories.

Also beginning at noon are "The Grand River Canoe Races, and the "Puff, Peddle, Paddle" events. Details and application forms for either event are available at Roth Rental and Storage, 897-5934. Applications are also available at the Misty Valley Canoe Livery. Entrants in either competition must be signed up by no later than 11:30 on Mon-

day. Immediately following the parade will be the ever popular "Outhouse Races". Those entering this competition are asked to join in the parade with their outhouses. Rules for the races will be about the same as before, four person teams with one person riding, etc. Further details can be obtained from Fred Rehus at Man's World Hairstyling 897-8102.

At 2:00 P.M. the men and women of the Lowell Volunteer Fire Department will compete against the men and women of the Alto Volunteer Fire Department in a waterball contest. The two fire departments will try to push a beer keg suspended from a cable into each other's territory by spraying it with their hoses. At 3:00 the two fire departments will compete in a bucket brigade contest.

Water Carnival events will begin at the King Memorial Pool at 1:00 This YMCA sponsored competition will include relays, watermelon game, biggest splash and best dive. Participants can register for 50¢ for one event or \$1.00 for two or more events. An open swim at the pool will begin at 3:00, and run until 7:00. Admission is \$1.00 or seasonal pass. There will also be video games for kids and a "Glue-in"

sponsored by the YMCA. The Knights of Columbus will sponsor a "Pop Ring Toss" throughout the afternoon.

Ongoing entertainment for adults includes V.F.W. sponsored bingo from 1:30 until 4:00 and a volley ball tournament beginning at 2:00 organized by Jim Hodges of the YMCA. Music will be provided from 1:30 until 4:00 by Hickory Creek.

At 4:00 there will be a giant "earth ball" game for children 8 to 14 years of age sponsored by the Lowell Volunteer Fire Department. Also at 4:00 there will be a tractor pull featuring "minimods" (1,550 to 1,750 lbs.) and antiques (3,500 to 5,500 lbs.). Admission for this event is \$2.00, children under 12 are free.

Beginning at 8:00, three drawings will be held. One will be a drawing with a first prize of a hot air balloon ride furnished by the Great Lakes Balloon Co. The \$1.00 tickets are available now at Lippert's. That "Special Place, Pfaller's Riverfront Clothing, and parade officials. Proceeds will help defray the cost of the parade. A 50/50 drawing will be held to finance the evening fireworks. The \$1.00

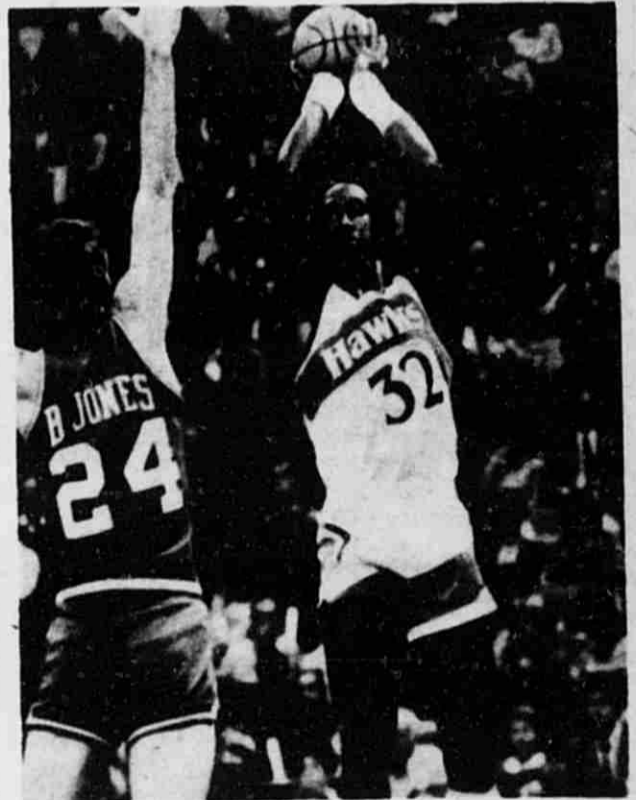

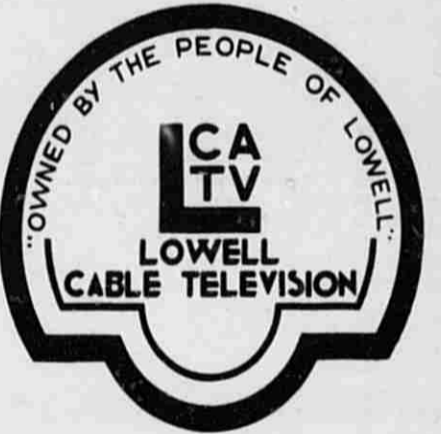

New power plants will help Michigan escape energy crisis

Within 10 years, Michigan and other Midwestern states may become an energy oasis in a nation desperately short of electricity, according to two experts. America's generating plants can fulfill America's thirst for electricity without difficulty for the next five or six years, they say. But beyond that, increased use of electricity could outgrow production capabilities in many parts of the country. The result would be regional power shortages, accompanied by large-scale unemployment.

economic output increases, consumption of electricity goes up. If there is not enough electricity to handle growth, a stagnant economy and high unemployment result. "We'll see a big shift of electricity through the industry," predicts Reinsch. "Many plants will pack up and move away from energy-short areas to other parts of the country. Even to foreign countries. That would mean unemployment. Lots of it." In the midst of that bleak forecast, Michigan and the rest of the Midwest hold out hope for the future. "The Midwest has more abundant power, and less expensive power, than most other regions," says Starr. "It is certainly better off than the Sun Belt. The Sun Belt relies chiefly on oil and natural gas for fuel. The Midwest gets its power principally from coal and nuclear energy, which costs much less than oil or natural gas."

Reinsch agrees. "Michigan fits right in the heart of it," he says. Several new power plants, including the Midland Nuclear Cogeneration Plant, will be completed within the next few years. "Once they are completed, Michigan will have an ample supply of dependable, inexpensive electric power and will be in a very good supply position compared to the rest of the country," he says. "The people of Michigan are really very fortunate," Reinsch says.

The power supply situation is a serious threat to America's economy, according to Starr. He notes that historically, the demand for electricity tracks economic activity. If the nation's
