Lowell officer fatally shoots knife wielding assailant

After repeatedly slashing at Lowell police officer Calvin Kamphuis, and finally stabbing him in the arm with a knife, 27 year old James Michael Pfaff was killed with a single shot to the chest from Kamphuis' service revolver. The shooting occurred at 3:40 A.M. on Monday, July 4 on Lowell's Main St. in front of Larkin's Saloon. Kamphuis, an 8 year veteran of the force, had responded to a complaint of vandalism to a sign on the front of Larkin's Saloon which was closed at the time. Lowell Police Chief Barry Emmons said that the department had been called two or three times about the vandalism. Kam-

phuis, who was on duty alone, responded to the complaints, but did not find anyone on the scene until the third trip.

Kamphuis found Pfaff alone at the site of the vandalism, and was threatened with a knife when the officer approached him. Emmons said that Pfaff slashed at Kamphuis' chest, but did not break through the protective flak vest that the officer was wearing. Pfaff lunged at Kamphuis again and stabbed the officer in the arm, wounding him with a deep cut that chipped a bone. When Pfaff came at Kamphuis again, the officer fired his revolver once, striking the assailant in the chest. Pfaff was later pro-

nounced dead at the scene by a Kent County medical examiner. Kamphuis was treated and released at Butterworth Hospital.

Emmons, who arrived on the scene moments after the shoot-

ing, has turned the investigation over to Kent County Sheriff's detectives. The results of the investigation are due into the Kent County Prosecutor's office this week. Emmons noted that he

found Kamphuis over the victim administering first aid while also trying to stop the bleeding from his own wound.

Pfaff resided in the Lowell-Saranac area and had been em-

ployed at Central State Precision Grinding for 3-1/2 years. No motive for the attack has been released by officers investigating the incident.

Lowell's 'Fourth' is a huge success

One of the highlights of Lowell's day-long Fourth of July festivities was the Lowell Showboat drawing for a 1983 Chevrolet Camaro. At about 9:00 Lowell Mayor Dean Collins pulled the winning tickets from the 2,675 tickets in the hopper. The grand prize winner was Edward Straub of Struthers, Ohio. Straub purchased his winning ticket from raffle chairman Roger Brown back in March when the car was on display at a Corvette swap meet at the Kalamazoo county Fairgrounds. The second prize of \$1,000 went to Lowell Showboat Captain Barry Vezino on a ticket that he had purchased that day. The third prize \$500 was won by Gerald Garner of Grant, Michigan on a ticket he purchased from Dick Huver of Lowell. They are co-workers at Lear Siegler.

In all, \$26,750 in ticket sales were generated, and the budget on the drawing was kept at or near \$3,500, thanks in part to Showboat President Ray Quada not claiming the \$250 prize for selling the most tickets. Quada sold 504 tickets in all. Raffle Chairman Roger Brown also declined the \$100 prize that was offered to the person who had sold the winning ticket. With interest that ticket proceeds earned while in the bank, total proceeds from the project should approach \$14,000. The raffle proceeds will be used to pay Showboat debts.

The 50/50 drawing staged to help pay for the evenings fantastic fireworks display was won by Dick Huver of Lowell. The raffle to help cover parade expenses, with a hot air balloon ride as first prize was won by Betty Stevens of Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan. Betty is 68 years old, and her daughter, Mrs. Clare Harwood of Lowell isn't sure if she'll go up in the balloon or not. If not, Mrs. Harwood says she's going.

The Great West State Chili Cook-Off was won by Fred Ricks of Clarksville. Fred also won the chili competition on Memorial Day. Fred will be guaranteed a spot in the state competition, plus \$50.00 cash, and a night's lodging in Ann Arbor for the event. Second prize went to Mr. Bill's of Lowell, and third was claimed by Dan Behan of Grand Rapids.

Sheila Nugent was honored by MABC-Select Sires at the 28th annual Dairy Recognition Day on June 21 in Lansing. Sheila was one of seven Michigan gold award winners in the FFA dairy showmanship competition held earlier this spring. Over 80 youth and their advisors attended the day-long session which focused on the role of government in agriculture. The group heard explanations of the animal rights bill, milk price supports, and the legislative process. They were challenged to be the voice for the dairy industry in both their communities and at the state level.

Motor vehicle code change for moped owners and operators

Owners and operators of mopeds in Michigan are advised by the State Police that several changes in the state's motor vehicle code are in effect as of 1:20 P.M. Thursday, June 16. These changes are part of Act 91 which was recently passed by the Legislature. As outlined by State Police these changes are as follows:

- 1) The allowable horsepower for mopeds is increased from 1.5 to 2.
- 2) Maximum speed of operation of mopeds is increased from 25 miles an hour to 30.
- 3) The power drive system shall not require the operator to shift gears.
- 4) Eliminates the pedal requirement.
- 5) Requires the wearing of a helmet by the operator of the moped who is less than 19 years of age.
- 6) Requires the retail dealer to obtain the registration of the moped in the purchaser's name.

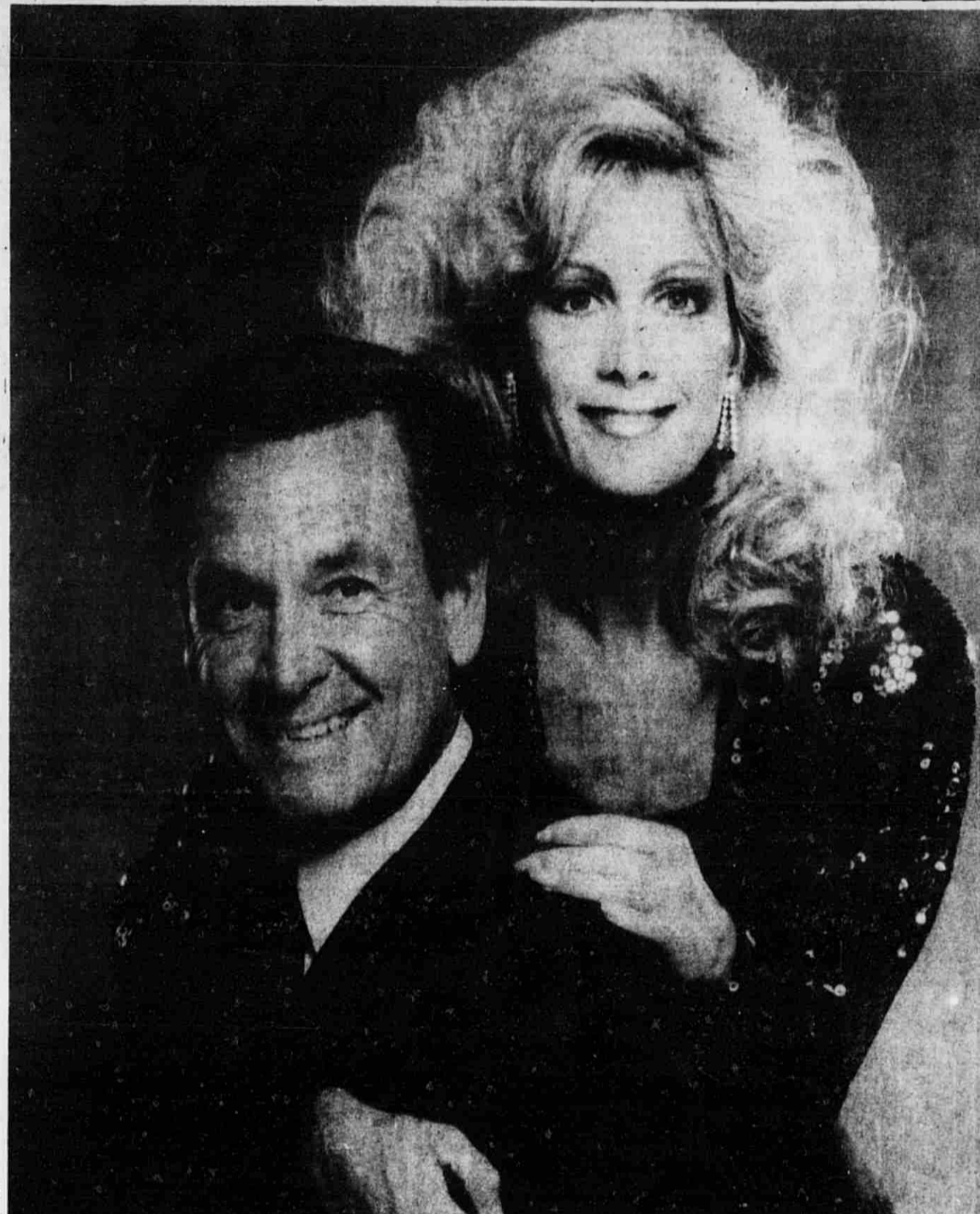

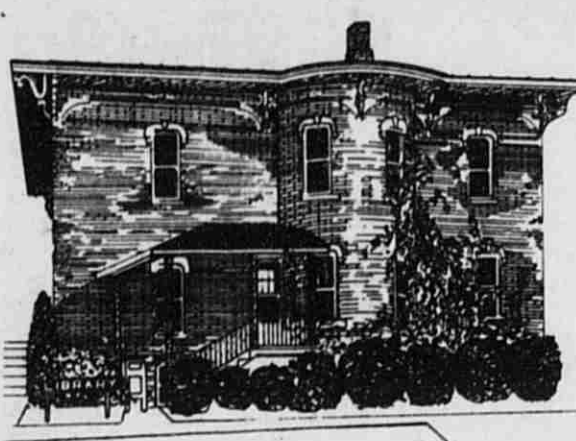
