OFF THE BLOTTER

Two Lowell residents were arrested by Lowell Police as they came out of the American Legion Building after they addegedly broke in. Timothy Vergil Stepek and Jerry Lee Adams Jr. Both 17 were lodged in the Kent County Jail, both were released on personal recognizance bonds at their arraignments the next day. On July 11, both subjects waived preliminary exams and are awaiting appearance in Circuit Court. The incident took place on June 29, 1983.

On July 2, Marian Jones reported her car windshield was damaged by unknown persons while her vehicle was parked at the Lowell Medical Care Center during the evening hours.

Mark Wallace Davis, 29, of Huntington Woods, MI was arrested by Lowell Police on Monday July 11 for operating his vehicle under the influence of liquor, third offense. Davis was also cited for driving while license suspended.

Arrested for operating a vehicle while under the influence of liquor was Charles Edward Marshall, 34, of Lowell. Marshall was also cited for transporting an open container of alcohol. The arrest took place June 30, 1983.

On July 7, 1983 a billfold containing money and a credit card was removed from an unoccupied vehicle near Broadway and Main. Two juveniles have been identified by police as being involved, and the credit card has been recovered. The matter will be turned over to Juvenile Court.

Lowell Police are continuing the investigation into a complaint of damage to a motor vehicle belonging to Bill Cooyer. Police have interviewed three juveniles who are responsible for the damage. Charges are pending on the trio. The incident occurred on July 8, 1983 while Cooyer's vehicle was parked at the Lowell Middle School.

The Lowell Police Department has investigated the theft of several bicycles over the past three weeks. A quick reminder for everyone to put bicycles away at night, or chain and padlock bikes when not in use to deter theft.

Gus says, "Macker may stay"

The "Yes We're Buildin An Empire Happy Birthday Gus Macker All-World Invitational Three-on-Three Outdoor Backyard Basketball Tournament" is now history. In all, over 400 teams, and who knows how many thousand spectators converged on Lowell's west side over this past weekend for the annual "Macker" tournament. It was the tenth anniversary of the event, which has grown from a just-for-fun tournament among neighbor kids, to a huge event that attracts national media attention.

Prior to this year's tournament, word was out that the Macker was going to move to the Calder Plaza in Grand Rapids for

next year's event. Radio station WZZR was co-sponsoring the move. The news of the move brought Macker supporters out of the woodwork in droves. Petitions to "keep Macker in Lowell" were circulated. "Keep Macker" yard signs went up, and meetings were held, all in support of the "Macker".

Following the outpouring of community support Scott McNeal, alias "Gus Macker" has rethought his plans for a move, and will renew his efforts to establish a sports park complex in the city with the "Macker" as the focal point. McNeal explains that the tournament has just plain "outgrown" his parent's garage, driveway and neighborhood

streets at 521 Elizabeth Street.

McNeal and other "Mackers" envision a park within the city of Lowell with paved streets in an "X" that could be used to erect their "Macker" complex on. The pavement could double as campsites or tennis courts during the remainder of the year. Other plans for the park include facilities for various sports, as well as a building to permanently house all the "Macker" material, and memorabilia. "Maybe then my parents could use their garage and basement for garage and basement type items, says McNeal.

The "Macker" group plans to pursue every avenue that might lead them to city, state, federal

or private support in funding such a park. Says McNeal, "if we can firm up plans and commitments for a park, we can continue the tournament for a couple more years on the streets or a parking lot while the park is being built". But, he adds, "we can't keep the teams coming back forever if we're just going to set up our courts on a parking lot somewhere".

A listing of the first place winners in the 24 divisions of the double elimination tournament will be published in next week's paper. "Gus" was too busy returning rented equipment to get the standings to us on Monday.

10 year old bicyclist killed

Frederick Joseph Oesch, Jr., 10, of 12875 84th Street, Alto died early last Saturday morning in Butterworth Hospital from massive head injuries and multiple fractures. At approximately 6:15 P.M. on Friday, July 8 the boy rode his bicycle out of the family driveway, and into the path of a westbound car driven by Tammy Sue Morris, 19, of Freeport. No charges are expected to be filed in the case, but the investigation continues, according to sheriff's deputies.

Oesch was active in the Lowell Chapter of the Kent County 4-H, and showed animals that he raised on his family's dairy farm.

on Monday, July 4, 1983. The statement issued by the prosecutor declared the shooting "justifiable homicide". The statement said that the shooting was a clear cut case of self defense, and would have been justifiable homicide even if Kamphuis had not been a police officer.

Further details made available since our report in last week's Ledger indicate that there were a total of nine witnesses, including Kamphuis, and most of them were "eye witnesses" to the incident.

The incident took place on Lowell's Main St. in front of Larkin's Saloon at about 3:40 A.M. on the 4th. The bar had been closed for over an hour. A call, allegedly made by Pfaff, to the Kent County Sheriff's Department Dispatcher reported

Pfaff as vandalising a sign on the front of Larkin's, and that the dispatcher should "send Cal" to make the arrest. When Kamphuis responded, he found Pfaff near Larkin's, and Pfaff moved toward him almost immediately. Pfaff told Kamphuis that he had a knife, and then drew it out of his pocket.

Witnesses said that Pfaff repeatedly taunted Kamphuis to shoot him while slashing at him with a knife. At one point Pfaff turned on one of the witnesses, and threatened him with the knife. At that time Kamphuis moved toward Pfaff to divert him from the bystanders. Pfaff ignored Kamphuis' repeated commands to drop the knife, and lie down. After being stabbed at least twice in the chest, but protected by a flak vest, and stabbed severely in the left arm, Kam-

phuis finally used his revolver, firing once, and striking Pfaff in the chest.

An autopsy was performed on Pfaff on July 4, and the alcohol level in his blood was found to be .07 well under the level for legal intoxication in Michigan of .10. No other drugs were found in the blood.

Pfaff, whose last known address was 332 Summit St., Saranac was involved in an incident several months ago in which he held a hostage at knifepoint. Lowell Police responded, and Pfaff reportedly stabbed himself in the chest, inflicting a wound which required hospital treatment. No charges were sought in the case. The Kent County Silent Observer program received a call on July 6 from a party who said they knew Pfaff, and suspected that he was "suicidal".

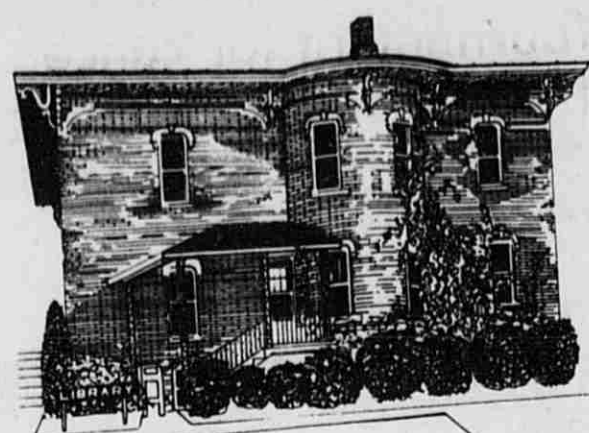

Tournament for cancer held at Deer Run Golf Course

The fourth annual Babe Zaharias Invitational Golf Tournament covering Kent County is slated to be held at Deer Run Golf Course in Lowell, Michigan, August 22. This special fund raising event is held each year on behalf of the American Cancer Society to raise extra dollars for research, education and services for cancer patients. The Babe Zaharias will be the second of the annual dual fund raising invitational tournaments -- the Walter Hagen for men and the Babe Zaharias for women. The first national tournament was held in 1973 at Hilton Head in South Carolina. Fourteen teams from even divisions participated, raising \$250,000 for the American Cancer Society. Since that time participation has spread so that in 1982, 52 local tournaments in 38 counties were held in Michigan alone, raising more than \$311,000 (nearly \$24,000 more than the previous year). Winners of the local tournaments participate in the State Finals tournament at Boyne Highlands in September. The winners of the State Finals go on to the National Championships held in Florida. The tournament was named the Babe Zaharias to honor the memory of that great woman golfer who died of cancer. Babe almost single handedly changed the face of women's golf with her courage and determination. In 1946-47 she had 15 consecutive victories, including the U.S. Amateur Championship. Struck with cancer in 1953, Babe returned to golf just three months after surgery, and won her third U.S. Open title in 1954. The 1983 Babe Zaharias Invitational at Deer Run will feature two upcoming LPGA pros. West Michigan native Sue Ertl from Ionia, Michigan currently in her second year on the LPGA tour, has been named Honorary Chairwoman of the event. She will be joined by another second year LPGA participant, Lori Huxhold of Fond Du Lac, Wisconsin.

Both pros will play the total 18 holes of the tournament, but with different foursomes on each 9. They will also each conduct golf clinics following play in the afternoon. Sponsors of the 1983 Babe Zaharias invitational are Mazda Distributors Great Lakes and First of Michigan Corporation. The Babe Zaharias is open to all women golfers, regardless of handicap. Entry fee is a \$50 donation, or \$250 donation to play with one of the visiting pros. Anyone wishing to participate may contact the American Cancer Society office, 458-1204, for an entry form. Some summer fina financial advice for young entrepreneurs

Enterprising youngsters often take advantage of the summer months to go into business for themselves. Soemtimes these jobs develop into year-round activities and the occasional youngster may earn hundreds or even thousands of dollars a year.

Whether you work on a modest scale—mowing lawns or washing cars—or operate on a more unusual level—programming computers or playing in a summer-time orchestra—be aware of the financial rules that make earning and keeping your money easier, says the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants.

No matter what you do, approach your job as you would a small business: base financial decisions on sound accounting principles. This means planning in advance what you might earn, keeping accurate records of expenses and customers and considering the tax requirements on your earnings, CPAs say.

For almost any enterprise you'll need "venture capital" to buy supplies or products to sell and spread the word you're open for business. Even a youngster operating a car washing service needs to make some capital outlays in the beginning to buy sponges and soap. While an adult will go to a bank for a loan, teenagers are more likely to empty their savings or, if they are fortunate, get a loan from their parents.

CPAs advise keeping careful records of your spending. Once you buy everything you need, determine "cost of sales" and from that, the price to charge to cover your costs, plus provide a profit. This principle also applies for setting a price for your labor. If you operate a gardening service, you'll have to calculate how to recover the costs of your gardening tools and other expenses, while at the same time keeping your rate competitive.

To plan expenses, you need to understand cash flow, CPAs say. If you have a contract for painting a house, you may not get paid until the work is complete, but you still have your transportation and meal expenses to worry about. AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 78-3 ADOPTED FEBRUARY 13, 1978, AS AMENDED, KNOWN AS THE GRATTAN TOWNSHIP SANITARY SEWER ORDINANCE.

THE TOWNSHIP OF GRATTAN ORDAINS:

Section 1.01. That Section 5.01 of Ordinance 78-3 is amended by adding the following:

Section 5.01 Notwithstanding the above, in the event a nonconforming use served by the sanitary system is destroyed or removed from the premises, the Township may reduce the number of units assigned to the premises based on permitted uses within the zoning district which it is located. No payments made prior to destruction or removal shall be refunded. New charges shall be calculated with credit given on a pro-rate basis for the percentage of the original charges paid. The new charges shall be paid in equal annual installments over the remaining years of the payment period with interest on the unpaid balance.

Section 1.02. This ordinance shall be effective 30 days after publication.

The foregoing ordinance was adopted by the Grattan Township Board at its meeting held on the 11 day of July 1983.

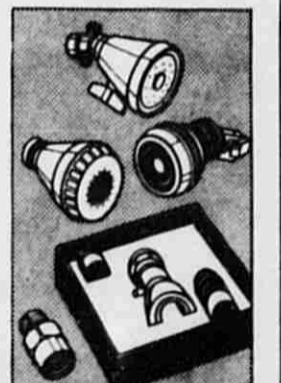

The Meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M. by Mayor Dean Collins. The Pledge of Allegiance was given and the Roll called.

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Fonger that the Minutes of the May 16 Meeting and the Minutes of the Special Meeting of May 26 be approved as written, supported by Councilman Maatman.

Carried.

IT WAS THEN MOVED by Councilman Maatman, supported by Councilman Christiansen that the Bills and Accounts Payable be allowed and warrants drawn.

Mayor Collins turned the meeting over to Councilman Maatman, Chairman of the Zoning Board of Appeals, for Public Hearings on two requests for sign variances for set back of less than 25 feet:

1. Fritts Bait Shop, 815 W. Main Street. To install a ground sign 6 feet by 8 feet, 3 to 4 feet inside the sidewalk.

2. Patton-J.R.B. Insurance Agency, 835 W. Main Street. To install a ground sign 2 feet by 8 feet, 4 feet inside the sidewalk.

Council discussed the two signs, and comparative size. Council felt that the size of the Fritts sign would be too large, and suggested that the City Manager view the area in which the

sign was to be placed and work out a suitable size sign, based on his opinion. The Patton-J.R.B. sign met all criteria on size.

IT WAS MOVED by Mayor Collins that the Fritts Bait Shop sign variance request be approved, contingent upon review of size and placement by the City Manager, supported by Councilman Fonger.

Carried.

IT WAS THEN MOVED by Councilman Christiansen that the Patton-J.R.B. sign variance request be approved contingent upon review of placement by the City Manager, supported by Mayor Collins.

Carried.

Chairman Maatman then turned the meeting back over to Mayor Collins.

Council next discussed the request for a Quit Claim Deed for the back waters of White's Bridge Dam. Manager Quada stated that on advice by the City Attorney, the City has no rights on the Dam anyway, and should not attempt to convey them now, to anyone else.

Council concurred not to take any action at this time.

Manager Quada then presented a request from Mr. Bob Ford to open a small concession stand at Recreation Park by the ball diamond. He explained that at present, only packaged foods would be sold with part of the proceeds going back into the softball league, and part to the City, with the hope of later being able to build a small stand with restrooms.

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Christiansen that the concession stand be allowed, supported by Councilman Maatman.

Carried.

Next was a request for an S.D.M. license for T.J.'s Party Store and Pizza Parlor, owned by Tom Hazel and S.J. Ayres. Manager Quada stated that they met all the required criteria.

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Christiansen that the request be approved, supported by Councilman Fonger.

Carried.

As an information item, Manager Quada stated that the City may get some funding from the State for construction. Official word has not been received, but we should know by next meeting. The State would handle the sale of bonds, and the City would be responsible for the project, and just pay the State back.

There was no Citizen Input.

Under Council Remarks, the following topics were discussed: playground equipment to be installed at Richards Park; repairs to the Main Street parking lot, and the lease renewal from King Milling Company coming up in 1984, then on a yearly basis only; reroofing of the Lowell Library; Community Block Grant Funds for private industry; and the Boys Scouts project to paint house numbers on street curbs for easy identification.

Under the Manager's Report, manager Quada asked consideration of a Resolution of Appreciation to WCUZ Radio Station and West Side Beer Distributing Company for their participation in the organizing of the Showboat Benefit Weekend baseball tournament. Because of its success, they may commit to the weekend annually.

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Maatman that Certificates of Appreciation be awarded to WCUZ Radio Station and West Side Beer Distributing Company for their Showboat Benefit Weekend baseball tournament, supported by Councilman Fonger.

Carried.

Manager Quada requested an executive session be held after the regular meeting.

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Maatman that Council meet in executive session at the close of the regular meeting, supported by Councilman Fonger.

Carried.

Manager Quada then announced that the Kent County D.P.W. had discussed the possibility of monies being available from defeasance of county contracts to be used for funding of other projects in out-county areas. Holdings over and above amounts of interest rates would be used as long as payment is assured by the Community funded. County auditors and attorneys must determine how much is available and how much can be used for such projects. Manager Quada recommended that the City begin the lengthy application procedure immediately, to be one of the first to be considered when funds become available. Council concurred to begin the application process.

Manager quada also reported receiving a request from the Michigan Women for Safe Drivers for a woman to serve on their committee beginning in the Fall. He has requested more information before recommending any one to Council to fill the committee seat.

IT WAS THEN MOVED by Councilman Christiansen to adjourn at 8:52 P.M.

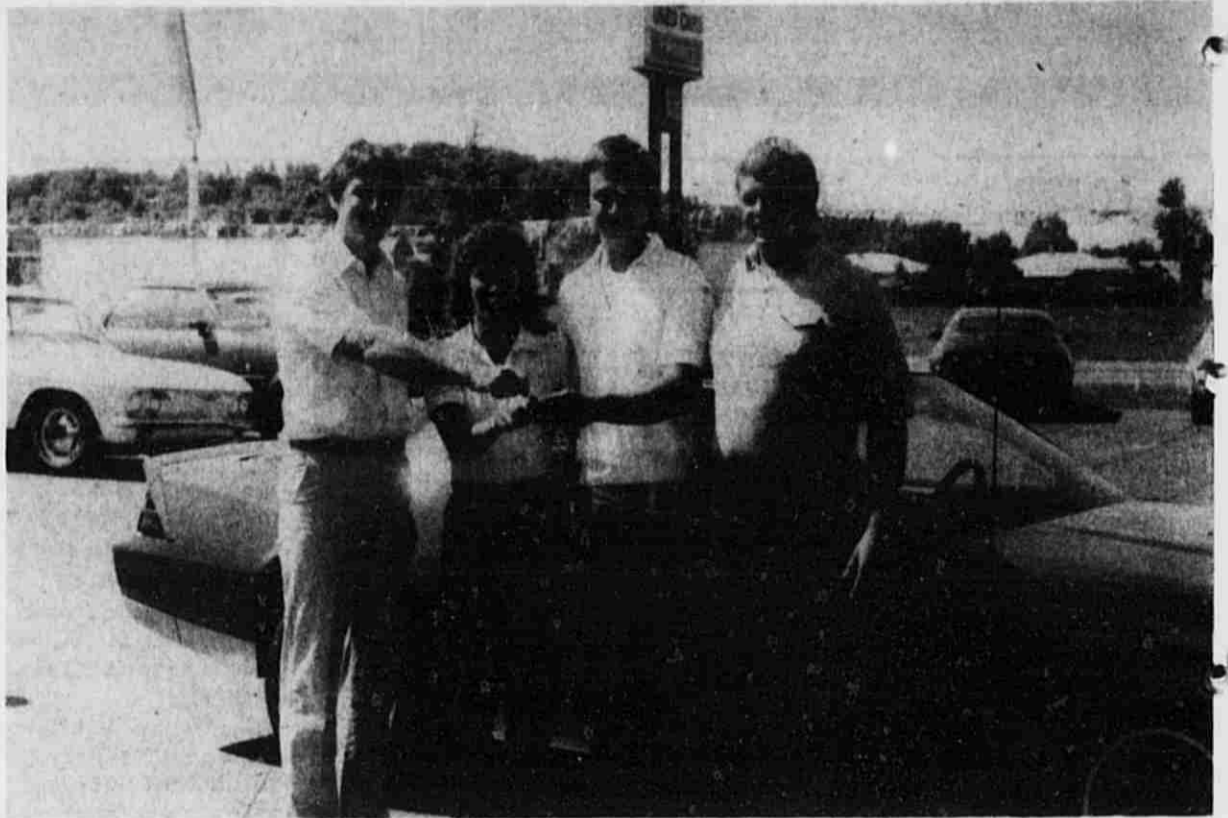
