## OFF THE BLOTTER

Lowell officers investigated 8 accident complaints in the month of June, 1 involving injuries. The Lowell Medical Unit responded to 11 medical dispatches during the month.

A vehicle driven by Lynn Homolka, 21, of Lowell was struck in the rear by a vehicle driven by Marie Mason 17, of Clarksville on Wednesday, June 22 on Main St., near Lafayette.

Arrested by Kent County Sheriff's Deputies, and assisted by Lowell Officers was Tom Spickler of Lowell on Monday June 26. Spickler was lodged until arraignment in 63rd District Court, on charges of fleeing and eluding Police Officers on a motorcycle.

Lowell Officers investigating recent bicycle thefts, are citing 2 juvenile subjects into probate court for bicycle theft, and 2 other juveniles for receiving and concealing stolen property.

Store employees apprehended an 11 year old Juvenile female for shoplifting at Lipperts Pharmacy on Thursday, July 14.

Two motocyclists collided near the intersection of Lincoln Lake and Main Wednesday afternoon, July 13. Both parties, Thomas Chickering, 40, of Saranac and Rex Hyzer, 17, of Lowell were injured. Hyzer apparently pulled into the path of Chickering who was west bound on Main St. at the time.

David Wride, 28, of Grand Rapids, lost control of his motorcycle and struck a parked vehicle owned by Kathy Marker of Saranac, Friday July 15, on Main near Center St. The cycle then slid under the east bound vehicle driven by Matthew Hedgecock, 25, of New Buffalo, MI. Wride was slightly injured in the mishap.

Cited to appear at a later date in 63rd District Court for violation of the City Ordinance (storage of old machinery and inoperable motor vehicles) was Cynthia Riggs, 36, of Lowell.

Involved in a property damage accident Friday July 15, on Foreman near Beech St. was James Fizer, 23, of Lowell. Fizer backed from his driveway into the path of an oncoming vehicle driven by Phyllis Eckman, 44, of Lowell.

Arrested for driving under the influence of Alcohol early Saturday morning July 16, by Lowell Officers was Carl Fritz, 26, of Grand Rapids. Fritz was lodged in the Kent County Jail.

A vehicle owned by Sara Brewer of Lowell was struck by a hit and run vehicle Saturday, evening July 16, on Pleasant St near Bowes Road. Lowell Officers are seeking the identity of the other vehicle.

Reported to Lowell Officers Tuesday July 5, was the breaking and entering of a storage building owned by The King Milling Company. Damage was reported to one of the parked semi-tractors in the building. The matter is under investigation by Lowell Officers.

Arrested and Jailed for driving under the influence of alcohol was Linda Woodhead, 22, of Ada. She posted bond and will appear at a later date in 63rd District Court.

## City gives initial approval to pursuing a "Gus Macker" park

The approximately 25 "Gus Macker" supporters gave the Lowell City council a round of applause following their agreement to commit to helping pursue a new city park with the "Macker" as the main theme. Jerry Kellogg, a spokesperson for the group, told the council that they had circulated petitions asking for support in keeping the "Macker" in Lowell, and developing a "Macker" park. To date, Kellogg said that the group had about 500 names of Lowell city residents, and 1,500 area residents. Kellogg urged the council to, "try as our elected officials to keep "Macker" in Lowell.


Another member of the group, and a realtor in the area, Dick Bryan reported to the council that he was working on a deal involving the possible donation of about 25 acres west of the water treatment plant on Bowes Road. Bryan said that the site needs fill, but he had been in touch with people looking for a place to dump fill dirt at no cost. Bryan said he needed written support from the city before he could proceed with his negotiations on the land.

Scott McNeal then made his presentation of at least an initial concept of what the "Macker" portion of the park would involve. McNeal said that the "Macker" area would require about ten acres, and would consist of an "X" of city-like streets, bermed along their length to provide elevated seating for spectators. McNeal explained that the streets could be designed to double as campsites, tennis courts, parking lots and playgrounds throughout the year. Besides the streets, the "Macker" plans call for some type of building in which to house their backboards when not in use and to serve as "Macker" headquarters during "Macker" week.

Additional plans for the park included restrooms, showers, baseball/softball fields, soccer fields, and other sport or recreation facilities.

Councilman Jim Maatman was the first to speak for the council, saying, "I'd like to see this pursued". The other council members echoed his sentiment, and agreed to put their support in the form of a letter, but stopped short of committing any city

funds at this point.

City manager Ray Quada explained some of his feelings toward the "Macker" park issue. Quada first explained the situation that exists regarding recreation in the city. According to Quada, Lowell is quite unique for a city its size in that we have a YMCA that virtually handles all of the recreation within the city, with the exception of school programs, and Little League. The YMCA is funded out of the King trust, and fund raising projects throughout the year, with the city contributing only \$3,500 annually to the operation of the pool. Quada pointed out that \$3,500 is very little, compared to what other cities Lowell's size spend on recreation. With this in mind, Quada suggested that the citizens might get behind the "Macker" park plan and support it with a millage increase, that would help build the park and provide for its maintenance in the future.

Quada said, "this job sometimes requires that I be a wet blanket", and went on to explain that simply drawing money from either the Lee Fund or Helen V.F.W. Post #8303 Meat Loaf Dinner - July 21, 1983 from 5 P.M. to 8 P.M. \$3.00 Per person Proceeds to go to V.F.W. Parking Lot.

Look Daley trust, without some income for maintenance provided would not be an acceptable means of funding the project.

Quada also suggested that the "Macker" group should work closely with not only the city, but the school, YMCA and other groups interested in recreation.

Quada and Maatman were appointed to represent the city on the "Macker" park planning committee.

In other council business, the council approved a rezoning request from the Lowell Nazarene Church on a parcel of property immediately east of their present location at 211 N. Washington St. The property was formerly residential, but the church has plans of building a 34' x 90' activity building on it, with a parking lot for approximately 50 cars. The building will be used for Sunday school classes, wedding receptions, etc. and will include a kitchen, rest rooms and a small office.

The council approved eight re-appointments to various city boards. The re-appointments were Dr. Orval McKay, Leonard Jackson and Ray Quada to the

Airport Board; Dr. Orval McKay to the Lowell Light and Power Board; John Troy, Jean Shores and Alfred "Duke" Thomet to the Planning Commission and Robert Hahn to the Board of Review.

The council approved expending \$3,100 for paving the alley behind Lowell Auto Body from Washington Street up to and including the width of the small park in that block. The area where the caboose sat in the park will also be paved, providing 3 or 4 new parking spaces.

The council also approved a \$2,350 contract with Highway Maintenance Specialists, Inc. for the repair of cracks in several miles of city streets.

## Exhibit exposes illegal animal trade

The African rhino faces extinction. If present trends continue, the green sea turtle will become extinct within a year. The population of African elephants has been halved in the last decade. If commercial sale of their pelts is not halted, the world's large cats will be gone by 1990. Some experts believe that no crocodilian except the protected American alligator may survive in the wild beyond the year 2000.

These disturbing statistics and the awesome implications they have for the balance of nature are the primary reasons why the Grand Rapids Public Museum decided to bring "Confiscated" to Michigan. "Confiscated" helps to dramatize the worldwide problem of illegal trafficking in endangered species. The exhibit will be on view in Grand Rapids through November 27, 1983.

Planned by the Cleveland Museum of Natural History in cooperation with the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, this exhibition marks the first time the federal government has allowed confiscated materials held in government warehouses to be exhibited by museums. For the past 3 years the exhibit has toured museums throughout the country. This is its only Michigan stop.

Among the nation's leading natural science museums that have already exhibited "Confiscated" are the Cincinnati Museum of Natural History in Cincinnati, Ohio; the Denver Museum of Natural History in Denver, Colorado; The American Museum of Natural History in New York City; the Dallas Museum of Natural History in Dallas, Texas; and the Academy of Natural Sciences of Philadelphia in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

**Tax tips for kids with summer jobs from the MACPA**

If you are among the 14 million young people with summer jobs, you may want to know about tax rules that can affect your paycheck, says the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants.

Are taxes withheld from your paycheck? Do you earn money from tips? Do you work for your parents? If you answered yes to any of these questions, read further.

Working only during the summer months may mean you won't be liable for any federal or state income taxes and you can increase your take-home pay by arranging for taxes not to be withheld. Exemption from federal income tax withholding is allowed if you expect no tax liability this year and had none last year.

You can elect not to have taxes withheld from your paychecks if your total income, including summer earnings, will be \$3,300 or less for the year and you're single. To claim this withholding exemption from income taxes, simply check off the appropriate box on the W-4 Form supplied by your employer when you start your job. This will stop federal

tax withholding, and in most cases, state and local withholding as well. Otherwise, taxes will be withheld and you'll have to file a federal income tax return next year to get a refund.

Working for your parents' business adds another benefit. You can claim exemption from withholding of Social Security tax. However, this rule applies only to those under 21 and the parents' business is unincorporated.

Your parents also get a tax break because what they pay you is deducted as a business expense from their own tax return.

If you work in a restaurant or resort where tips are part of your income, you should know about a new rule on reporting tip income that went into effect this year. This rule was designed to increase compliance with tip reporting requirements and must be enforced by any business normally employing more than 10 people who serve food or beverages.

While you have always been required to report all tips you receive, you now have to report an amount equal to at least eight percent of the total of all your

customer's food bills as your tip income—even though some customers will not leave a tip. Your employer makes a report to the IRS of the total of food and beverage sales. If the amount of tips reported by all employees is less than eight percent of that sales figure, your employer must allocate the difference among employees receiving tips.

Tip income must be declared to your employer at least once a month. Most employers provide you with a form to list the tips you make every week during the hours you work.

Your employer then reports

the amounts declared as tip income to the IRS. Your Social Security tax payment is based on the total amount earned from both wages and tips. Your paycheck stub should list the hours worked, wages paid, tips declared and Social Security tax withheld.

Tips must be declared whether they are received in cash or charged to a customer's credit card and passed on to you by your employer. When tips are pooled and split among several employees, naturally, you report only your share.

Although the stricter new re-

porting requirements apply to tips earned from serving food and beverages, you must still report all tip income you make in any job. For instance, if you work in a resort or hotel carrying luggage or do other services for customers, keep track of your income from tips.

By the same token, keep track of any work-related expenses you might have. An example, the cost to have a uniform cleaned is tax deductible. Of course, you can only deduct these expenses by itemizing your tax deductions.



## Auto Club offers up to \$10,000 for "chop shop" information

Anyone who knows about a chop shop operation in this state can qualify for up to a \$10,000 reward from the Automobile Club of Michigan through its ACTION (Arrest Car Thieves in Our Neighborhoods) Program. The first step to qualify for a reward is to let the police know about the chop shop. Then tell the Auto Club what you have done either via its toll free 24-hour ACTION Hotline or by mail. Tipsters can reach the hotline

from anywhere in Michigan by dialing 1-800-AAA-LOSS (222-5677). Persons who wish to communicate through a special post office box must address correspondence to: The Automobile Club of Michigan, ACTION Program, Post Office Box 6006, Dearborn, MI 48121. The Auto Club requests that informants provide a summary of the information given to the police, including the name of the police agency and the identity of the chop shop. Include the date

and the time of the report and the name of the officer taking it. Information given will be used to verify that a police report was made. Unless anonymity is needed, a tipster also is asked to give a name, address and a phone number. Otherwise, provide a code name or identification number. That information will be used to verify identity for the reward. "It is the sole responsibility of the tipster to apply for any re-

ward following either the arrest and prosecution or conviction of chop shop operators," said Thomas G. Bowman, Auto Club Insurance director. "An initial payment of \$1,000 will be made for any tip that results in the arrest and prosecution of chop shop operators," said Bowman. "A conviction must result from a tip before any payment beyond \$1,000 is made." To claim rewards, tipsters can contact the Auto Club by the Hotline or mail.

"We will give rewards to any person designated by an anonymous tipster, such as a cleric or attorney," said Bowman. The Auto Club will determine the reward amount, and a three-member blue ribbon citizen's panel will monitor all reward payments. In addition to the reward for the breakup of chop shops, the Auto Club has doubled its \$500 reward for information that leads to the arrest and prosecution of anyone who steals a member's car. Bowman said rewards up to \$1,000 are being offered for the first time to persons who provide police information that leads to the arrest and prosecution of anyone stealing from an Auto Club member's home or for boat theft.

IT WAS THEN MOVED BY Councilman Maatman that the Bills and Accounts Payable be allowed and warrants issued, supported by Councilman Fonger.

Council discussed the setting of a date for a Public Hearing before the Zoning Board of Appeals, on a request for a sideline variance in a R-1 Single Family Residential zone, by Mr. and Mrs. William H. Ingraham of 820 N. Jefferson St. to allow the removal of an existing car-port, and replace it with an attached garage.

IT WAS MOVED BY Councilman Fonger that a Public Hearing be set for the first meeting in August, (Aug. 1), supported by Councilman Maatman.

Carried.

Council then discussed the two proposals received for the Downtown Development Architectural Services.

Manager Quada explained that Council had authorized the Planning Commission to establish a Community Development Block Grant Program for the Central business District. Now plans must be drawn. C.B.D. merchants and store owners will be contacted to work with the architects on their ideas and needs as required by the grant process, with a final approval by the Planning Commission and City Council.

He also noted that in 1975, the City received \$75,000 in Community Development Block Grant Funds for residential improvements. To date, \$25,000 has been repaid to the City as a revolving fund, and those monies could be used in conjunction with this program if Council so desired.

The Architectural Services bids were tabulated as follows: W.B.D.C. A) \$1,060 per block - B) \$530 per store front - Both include 2 meetings, photos, drawings. Gove Associates A) \$1,500 Meeting with merchants Plng. Com. and Council evaluations, photos and drawings - B) \$1,500 Photos, discussion with store owner sketch of changes. - Both include a charge of \$15-\$45 per hour for any extras.

Manager Quada recommended W.B.D.C.'s proposal A. at \$1,060 per block as the best quote for the interest of the City, also because the firm has done similar work for the City in the past.

IT WAS MOVED BY Councilman Christiansen that the bid of \$1,060 per block, submitted by W.B.D.C. for architectural services for the Community Development Block Grant Program be accepted, and that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to execute all necessary documents on behalf of the City, supported by Councilman Schneider.

Carried.

Manager Quada reported that at the June meeting he had announced that an application had been submitted to the Kent County Community Development Block Grant Committee for an enclosed storm drain project from the West end of Sibley Street to Main Street, (M-21). The project would also tie in the proposed connector street. Total cost would be \$74,000. The project has now been approved by the County.

Manager Quada proposed that in conjunction with that project, that an eight-inch sanitary sewer, and an eight-inch water Main be installed also, both to be stubbed at main Street. He explained that the extra cost would be for the pipe only, as long as the trench will be open for the storm drain anyway, and would be the best time to do the additional work.

He asked for approval to get a quote for engineering costs from the City's engineering firm of Fishbeck, Thompson, Carr and Huber.

The following resolution was offered by Councilman Schneider for adoption, supported by Councilman Fonger, authorizing the County project.

WHEREAS, The City of Lowell applied for and has been awarded a grant under the provisions of the Federal Jobs Bill Grant Program; and

WHEREAS, said application provided for the construction of an enclosed storm drain located between West Fulton (M-21) and Sibley Street; and

WHEREAS, The Kent County Board of Commissioners did authorize payment for said project;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Lowell City Council does hereby authorize the City Manager to execute all appropriate documents, and to enter into the necessary agreements to complete construction of an enclosed storm drain located between West Fulton, (M-21) and Sibley Street.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Lowell City Council does hereby express its appreciation to the Kent County Community Development Block Grant Committee, the Kent County Building and Transportation Committee and the Kent County Board of Commissioners for their support of the proposed project.

Carried.

IT WAS THEN MOVED BY Councilman Maatman that the City Manager be authorized to get engineering cost quotes from Fishbeck, Thompson, Carr and Huber for the installation of an eight-inch sewer line and an eight-inch water main, both to be installed in conjunction with the installation of a storm drain form the EWst end of Sibley Street, South to Main Street, (M-21), supported by Councilman Christiansen.

Carried.

There was no Citizen Input or Suggestions.

Under the Manager's Report, Manager Quada requested that the Council meet in an Executive Session at the close of the Regular Meeting.

IT WAS MOVED BY Councilman Maatman that the Council meet in Executive Session after the Council Meeting, supported by Councilman Fonger.

Carried.

Under Council Remarks, Councilman Maatman headed a discussion on the 4th of July Fireworks display, stating that the display put on by the Fire Department was the best he had ever seen, and commended the people involved with it. He also expressed concern for the safety of spectators in the crowd with the careless use of small fireworks by some people. Bottle rockets and small explosive devices were released in crowded areas, and came down on people seated on blankets and lawn chairs who scrambled to get out of the way. Luckily, no injuries were reported this year. He asked if there is some way that small fireworks could be banned from the park for next year or items confiscated if found. Manager Quada stated that he will try to work something out for next year.

Councilman Maatman also headed a discussion on the condition of the Curtis Building located at the corner of Main and S. Broadway Streets, stating that in walking past it on their way to the park for the 4th festivities, his small son had almost fallen into an open window well. Large chunks of glass hang precariously from broken windows, and the building is in what appears to be extremely dangerous condition. Council discussed the possibility of the building being condemned and torn down. Council concurred to notify Mr. Curits that the building must either be renovated and put into useable shape, or have it torn down.

Mayor Collins stated that the old house on the corner of E. Main and Horatio Streets is in the same condition and should be torn down. It is open and a trap for kids.

Also discussion was a possible 50-50% grant program being offered by the DNR for boat ramps, etc. and the possibility of extending water service to the North end of Oakwood Cemetery.

IT WAS THEN MOVED BY Councilman Christiansen to adjourn at 8:59 P.M.



DRYERS

## LAW

### Getting To The Root Of The Weed Problem

Many hard-working homeowners diligently pull weeds up from their lawns, only to face the job again a few weeks later... and then, later in the year, pull them again. What's the reason? Generally, the pulling job didn't get the roots and the weed just kept right on growing. This is a situation where a sprayer can help. Sprayed-on weed killer is absorbed by the leaves, goes right down to the roots and destroys the entire weed, roots and all.



Spray to knock out weeds then you may be able to sit back and enjoy your lovely lawn.

There are three seasons for spraying against weeds - early in spring, prior to seed germination, early summer and fall. Annuals such as crabgrass, dandelion, foxtail and goosegrass are best sprayed early. Dandelions, plantain and sorrel should be sprayed as soon as they appear. These and other perennial broad-leaf weeds may get their final knock-out with a fall spraying.

If your lawn is quite large, consider using a small power sprayer with a ten gallon tank capacity. A compressed air sprayer with a one to four gallon tank will do the job for the average lawn very nicely. One important point - use one sprayer for weed control, suggest the experts at the National Sprayer and Duster Association. Mark it plainly and use it only for that purpose. Weed killers are difficult to clean out of sprayers and only a small residue could cause problems if the same sprayer is later used on vegetables, flowering plants or ornamentals.

I have had many inquiries as to state record fish and the DNR master Angler Program. Following is a listing of all current state records.

The Master Angler Program has been established by the DNR to recognize fishermen who take a fish which would qualify for a Master Angler Certificate. Arm Patches are awarded to all entrants meeting established minimum weights and Master Angler Certificates are awarded to individuals who catch State record fish or one of the Top Five Fish of each Species.
