Second rock concert of summer here Thursday

The Lowell Showboat Amphitheatre will come to life again this Thursday evening when

another rock concert staged by Blue Suede Shows comes to town. Gary Myrick a guitarist

noted for his work with synthesizer technology and Stevie Ray Vaughn a blues/rock guitarist will highlight this two group concert. Showtime is 8:00 p.m., and tickets are available at all Believe In Music record stores for \$10 and \$11.

Myrick last played in this area

at the Ford Fieldhouse to 3,300 fans in January of 1982. Since then, Myrick has disbanded his group called "Figures", and put together a new group with a sound described as heavily electronic, but still energetic rock 'n roll. Myrick's best known work was done with the Figures when

they recorded such tunes as, "Livin' in a Movie" and "She Talks in Stereo".

Vaughn has spent nearly a decade playing Texas clubs, building a reputation with his boisterous blues rock in the style of Freddie King, Johnny Winter and Jimmy Hendrix. Vaughn'

debut album "Texas Flood" is doing well on the charts, and is said to be a thrill a minute exercise in blues rock. Vaughn's live shows are termed "explosive" as he displays his skill and technical versatility matched by few guitarists.

Arraigned in 63rd District Court on Monday, August 1 on charges of criminal sexual conduct was Richard Thompson, 26, of Lowell. Thompson was arraigned in connection with an incident that occurred on Sunday, July 31. Thompson was released on a \$5,000 personal recognizance bond pending a court hearing.

Arrested and arraigned on charges of reckless driving and throwing objects into the path of a motor vehicle and/or hitting a motor vehicle, was Dawn Kelly, 18, of Lowell. Kelly was released on a \$2,000 personal recognizance bond following her arraignment Friday, August 5. Kelly plead "not guilty" to both charges.

Showboat pays off an old debt

The Lowell Showboat realized about one third of a goal that the board of directors set for itself last spring when it decided not to run a show this year. Finding themselves faced with a \$45,000 debt, and not wanting to risk going further in the hole the board decided it was time to get serious about paying off the long term debt. Most of the debt dates back to 1974 when the Lowell Showboat Amphitheatre was built. About \$14,000 of the debt is owed to the city for their purchase of the upper bleachers, a little over \$14,000 to O.E. Bieri & Sons Construction for their work on the amphitheatre project, and the remainder is held in notes at State Savings Bank secured by several past and present board members.

On Monday, August 8, Lowell Showboat President Ray Quada announced that the Showboat's account at State Savings Bank was a healthy \$25,236.25 following the issuance of a check from WCUZ in excess of \$12,000. Quada in turn wrote a check to O.E. Bieri & Sons for the full amount of their bill, plus interest to date. The Bieris have been holding the outstanding account for nearly ten years, being paid 8-1/2% annually, with only one payment of \$3,000 being paid on the principal in 1979 or 80.

Quada also wrote a check for interest on the notes at State Savings Bank in the amount of \$2,318.64, and all those notes were renewed secured only by Showboat's assets, with no individuals being required to sign them. Quada said, "I think the present Lowell Showboat Board of Directors has demonstrated to the bank that they are not going to run off on the Showboat's debt."

The Showboat still has in its account approximately \$8,500, the board will decide at a later date if that will all be applied to the debt or if some will be kept out for operating expenses. Most of the money raised toward paying the debt has come from the WCUZ Budweiser Softball Benefit and the Camaro Raffle staged by the Showboat. Oesch honored at 4-H Fair

A champion Holstein steer raised by Freddy Oesch became a tribute to the boy who was struck and killed by an automobile on July 9 as he was riding his bicycle in front of his home near Alto. Freddy, who was ten years old, had raised the Holstein steer since it was a calf for showing at the Kent County 4-H Youth Fair. For the past year Freddy had planned on selling the 1,200 pound steer at the fair's annual livestock auction.

Freddy's parents, Fred and Melva Oesch, almost decided not to show the steer because of the memories it brought back, but since it was Freddy's goal, the animal ultimately went to the fair. At the fair the steer was judged as "champion", but it was when it went on the auction block that "Mr. T" Freddy's name for the steer, became a tribute to the boy.

Prior to the auction, James Cook, Jr. a Vergennes Township farmer and Phillip Knisley, Freddy's 4-H club leader contacted eight farmers and business owners willing to pay \$400 each for the steer, and then donate it back to the auction. At the auction, Cook explained the agreement he had made over the previous weeks with the eight buyers, and then asked if anyone else would like to get in on the deal. Five more people raised their hands. On top of that, when the steer was finally sold to Otto Schlatter of Grandville, it went for an inflated price of \$2,000 per pound, about three to four times the going rate for dairy steers.

In all \$7,640 was raised by the steer that was sold fourteen times. Freddy had planned to donate his expected proceeds, \$700 to \$1,000, to the new 4-H Dairy Barn at the fairgrounds, so that is where the entire proceeds from the steer will go. The building

was erected about a year ago at a cost of \$30,000, and prior to the Oesch donation, about \$10,000 was still owed on it.

Memorials may be made to the 4-H Dairy Barn or to the Apostolic Christian Church Children's Home Fund.

Power outages slated

The Lowell Light and Power Company will be performing routine preventative maintenance procedures on some of their major circuits throughout next week. Breakers will be pulled in the Light & Power system, and areas serviced by a pulled breaker will, of course, be without electrical power until it is replaced. day, August 18 from 7:00 a.m. to 7:15 a.m.; 12:00 noon to 12:30 p.m. and from 5:00 p.m. to 5:15 p.m. and on Friday, August 19 from 7:00 a.m. to 7:15 p.m., 12:00 noon to 12:15 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. to 5:15 p.m.

CMU automatically awards \$400 scholarships to valedictorians and salutatorians of Michigan high schools and \$300 to entering students with high school grade point averages of 3.50 or better. The scholarships are renewable each year the student maintains a minimum grade point as a CMU undergraduate.

The valedictorian/salutatorian awards, and the academic honors scholarships are granted by the CMU Board of Trustees to students admitted to the university.

In all, CMU expects to enroll some 3,000 freshmen next fall.

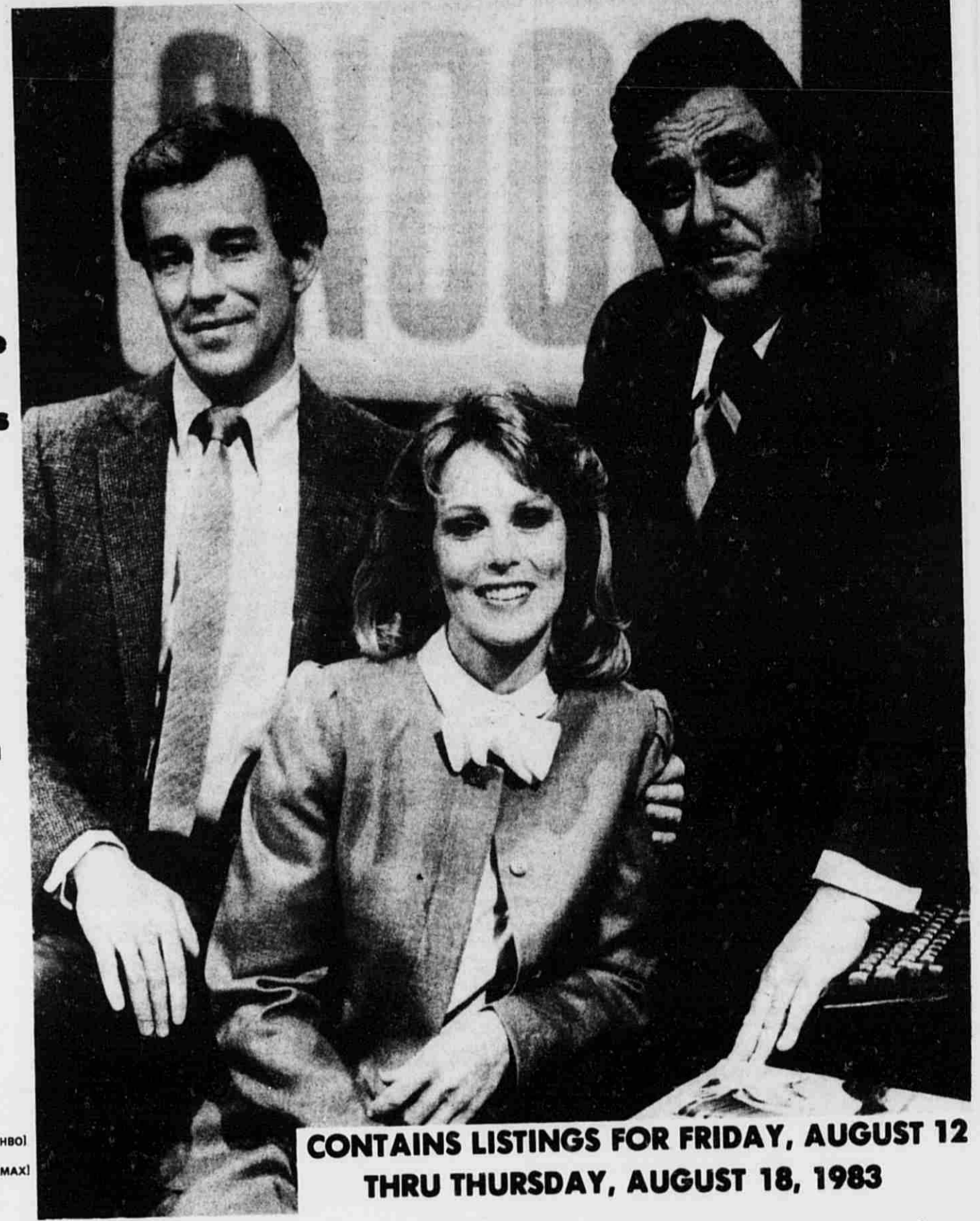

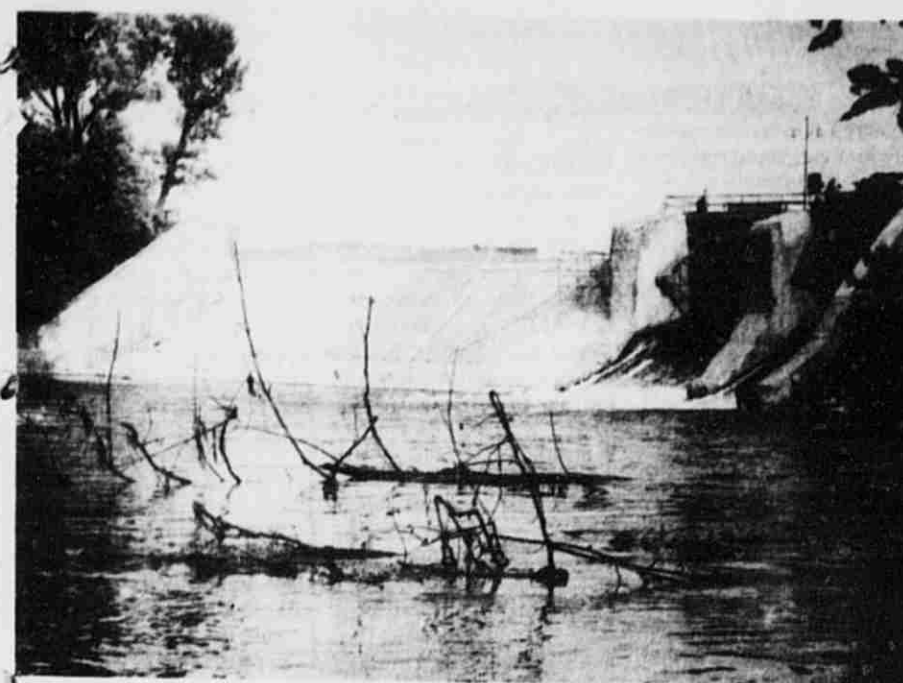

Dam gates closed . . . water rising in Fallasburg reservoir



Though the powerhouse is the most visible part of the hydroelectric facility, the renovation of the dam was extremely important to the overall project. The flooding of the dam's backwaters will create a 216 acre lake that will serve as both a source of power and recreation.



This view of the "Fallasburg Powerhouse" typifies the extensive renovation that has transformed both the powerhouse and dam into working facilities rather than white elephants or dinosaurs.

According to Tim Dahlstrand, and engineer with STS Consultants Ltd., the gates of the Fallasburg Dam were to close on Monday, August 8. The roughly 100 acres of shallow, murky water above the dam will begin transmuting in to a 216 acre lake, and "the water level should be very noticeably higher by week's end", said Dahlstrand.

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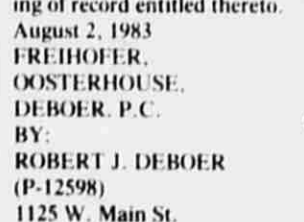

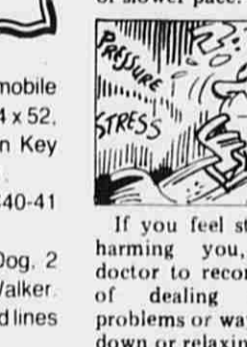

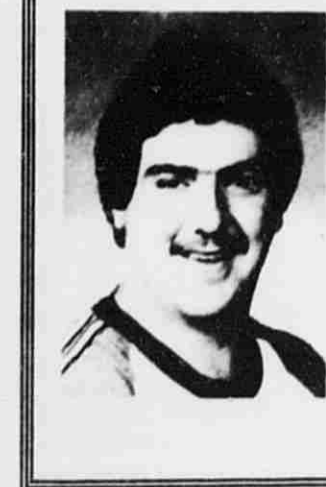

As costs for a college year climb steadily toward an average of \$10,000, many students find that traditional ways to stretch resources, grading exams or waiting tables, will not keep them in school. At many colleges, students undertake far more ambitious assignments, which include operating a car dealership, devising computer software, manufacturing cloth-

ing or even leasing out heavy construction equipment.

Projects on this larger scale demand managerial and marketing skills that rival requirements to start any business, according to the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants. If students yearn to set up their own companies to defray college expenses, there are some basic steps to be considered. Entrepreneurs prepare themselves by consulting with CPAs, and the questions they ask and advice they seek parallels what students have to find out for their own projects.

Starting a new business exposes you to greater risks than waiting on tables. CPAs point out if your college career is on the line, the level of risk must be studied with care. But there are steps an aspiring entrepreneur can take to lessen the hazards. Businesses fail, CPAs say, mostly because of poor management and inadequate sales. To succeed, a business must be assured its product or service is in demand, that it can be provided in sufficient volume and sold at a competitive price to assure balancing costs. These costs are made up of fixed costs for financing and maintaining a business location; direct costs for labor and materials; and indirect costs for sales and administration.

Other vital areas that need exploring are how much capital is required to start and continue the business; what price would cover costs; how should the product or service be marketed; and what moves lessen your tax liability.

At some colleges, entrepreneurial centers have been set up to advise students on forming their own businesses. Supported by CPA volunteers, the centers will help students devise market surveys to determine the need for particular businesses, and help prepare projections and forecasts essential when seeking venture capital.

At Baylor University in Waco, Texas a student started a used car lot. When the business faltered, the student had trouble arranging financing. Once the student auto dealer set up a working relationship with a local bank, the business flourished.

Usually, money made by a student entrepreneur does not jeopardize the financial aid already granted, CPAs note. The amount of aid is customarily determined by the college financial aid office at the beginning of the school year and is based on the income of the student and his family for the previous year.

A student business could affect college work-study benefits. In that case, the student must decide if the new business promises to pay more than a work-study job.
