Administrators shuffled following Jacob's resignation

The Lowell Board of Education held its regular meeting on September 12 at 7:30 P.M. in the Board room. Following the approval of the minutes for August 8, 1983, the Board discussed plans for representative attendance at the Michigan Association of School Boards/Michigan Association of School Administrators (MASB/MASA) meeting scheduled for October 10 through October 12 in Detroit. The joint MASB/MASA meeting is held every other year and provides Board members with updated issues and status reports in the field of Education. Linda Beers will represent the Lowell Board of Education at this meeting.

Following the payment of bills for the month of August, the Board turned its attention to several items related to personnel. Several recent administrative

changes were created with the resignation of Dr. George Jacob who resigned his position as Assistant Superintendent at the Au-

gust meeting. Superintendent Fritz Esch recommended the Board appoint Mr. Gary Kemp to the position of Assistant Superintendent effective August 22, 1983 and that his annual salary be set at \$41,500 pro-rated to his first day in his new position. The Board unanimously approved the recommendation.

Esch further explained to the Board that the position of High School Principal had been posted and interviews had been held with interested candidates. He recommended that the Board approve his recommendation to appoint Richard Korb, former High School Assistant Principal, to the position of Principal effective August 25. It was further recommended that Korb's annual salary be set at \$37,500 pro-rated to the date of August 25. The recommendation was approved by the Board. For the position of High School Assistant Principal, sev-

eral applications were received with initial screening for the position completed by Gary Kemp and Dick Korb. Two candidates were presented to the Superintendent for review. James De-

Weerd of Lakeview School District, Battle Creek, Michigan was recommended to the Board as the newly appointed High School Assistant Principal with an annual salary of \$32,000 pro-rated to his first day on the job. DeWeerd was awarded a one-year probationary contract as is customary procedure for new employees to the district.

In other personnel matters the Board approved probationary contracts for the employment of Raddie Maurer as the High School Arts and Crafts teacher; Jill Wilson, Middle School Special Education teacher; Cindy Middlebush, Middle School Special Education teacher; and Janice Whitley, High School Science teacher. Julia Colvin was approved by the Board as the girls tennis coach for the 1983-84 school year.

The board approved the re-call of teachers, Kim Lum to teach 2nd grade at Runciman; Carol Titcombe, vocal music at Runciman; Ron MacPherson, 6th grade; Cindy Gillette, vocal music at Bushnell; Laurie Kuna, High School English, and Mary Schramm, 3rd grade at Runciman.

In the last item related to personnel, the Board accepted the resignation of teacher Al Dood who was formerly re-called to the Science position at the high School and the resignation of Caron Stetler who was scheduled to teach Special Education at the Middle School.

In other business, Maintenance Supervisor, Clare McCaul, recommended that the Board approve the middle school roof be surveyed for possible repairs. The proposed method for making this survey is a process called Thermocore Infrared Detection provided by Tremco, a large state-wide roofing company. This process provides a virtual "x-ray" of the roof, locating all wet roof insulation and resulting in exact data necessary for precise roof management. The cost of the survey is \$4,520. The Board will consider the proposal at a Special Board of Education Meeting to be held on Monday, September 26, 1983.

The Board also approved the five year contract with the district's bus drivers after Board negotiators had reached a table

agreement with the group at the end of August. The new agreement calls for hourly wages ranging from \$4 per hour for at-

Bus drivers approve a 5 year contract

The Lowell School Board unanimously approved a five-year agreement with the Lowell Bus Driver Association during Monday evening's regularly scheduled school board meeting. Drivers had ratified the agreement a week earlier by an overwhelming margin.

Describing negotiations as cordial, Chief Board Negotiator, George Jacob said, "We are very pleased with the five-year pact, and grateful our drivers organization was receptive to the long-term commitment."

Terms of the agreement call for hourly wages ranging from \$4.00 per hour, for bus school attendance, to \$9.90 for regular run drivers during the 1983-84 school year, increasing at five per cent per year over the five-year life of the contract.

Other benefits extended to the drivers include board payment of required chauffeur's license fees and driver identification jackets, as well as improved insurance, sick day, and longevity payments.

Chaffee planetarium opens new sky show

On September 22, the Chaffee Planetarium will reopen with a new sky show called "FROM BLUE GIANTS TO BLACK HOLES: A VOYAGE THROUGH SPACE AND TIME."

Visible to viewers will be formations of stars within clouds of cosmic gas and dust, super giant stars, and a journey through a black hole.

This all-new sky show at Chaffee Planetarium pushes to the very limit of what astronomers can see with their largest telescopes. As you gaze at the faint galaxies and brilliant quasars in deep space, you will be looking far back in history, seeing a ghostly image of what the universe may have looked like at the very beginning of time.

"From Blue Giants to Black Holes: A Journey Through Space and Time" continues at the Grand Rapids Public Museum through November 27, 1983. Shows can be seen Thursday through Saturday at 8 P.M., 2:30 Friday, and Saturday and Sunday at 2:30 and 3:45. Admission is \$2 for adults, and \$1.50 for children 5-15 and senior citizens. In the past I have made several comments concerning the Michigan D.N.R. and the lack of field grade protection officers available for duty. Let's take an in depth look at the manning of this department.

Presently the total authorized strength of the department is for 240 officers statewide, in the grade of sergeant or below. We are now below the authorized number of officers with 220. It is reasonable to assume that 10%, or 22 of these are on vacation, hospitalized, or convalescing at any given time. This leaves 198. We must also realize that, since the duties require 24 hour per day, 7 days a week, 365 days per year coverage that only twenty five percent are ever available at any given moment. This leaves approximately 50 officers on duty. Of this number at least one third will be involved in non fish and game related enforcement matters; I.E. pollution control and other environmental protection problems. This removes an additional seventeen which leaves 33. Now let's say that ten are involved in court actions, paperwork burdens etc. This leaves 23 Statewide. It is quite reasonable to assume that out of those original fifty individuals at least five would have the day off due to sickness or personal problems. This would leave 18. We have seventeen district headquarters which are usually manned by a Sgt. This would leave only one, and I am certain that he would be on coffee break. He certainly deserves it. Who does this leave tending the flock?

I know that figure don't lie, and I fully realize that liars do figure. In fact after looking back on the previous mathematics I believe maybe I should run for political office.

The DNR has recently proposed a package of new legislation which conceivably, if passed, would generate \$123.8 million in additional revenues. They tell us that if this action fails, the first axe to fall will cut 40 field grade P.O.'s from the staff. In other words this one officer which we had on coffee break is now going to be cut by 10.

These minus nine officers are still responsible for patrolling the entire state of Michigan, including 3.9 million acres of State Forests and 2.5 million acres of National Forests alone. This also include 11,000 lakes 870,000 miles of rivers and streams, and some 200,000 miles of shoreline. Even if they don't lay off forty officers. This one that is left on duty is going to be required to travel awfully fast to cover the area and provide adequate fish and wildlife protection.

Why should the hunter, fisherman or trapper be worried about increased license fees? It would appear that since we have no enforcement body, we need not bother with licensing.

I am indeed surprised that Oklahoma hasn't rustled our deer herds, Ohio hasn't absconded with our state lands, or Wisconsin hasn't herded the Lake Michigan fish all over to the west side of the Lake. I personally believe that if the number of officers were doubled, we would still be understaffed.

Arrows get trophy back

The Lowell Red Arrows varsity football team reclaimed the traveling Veterans of Foreign Wars trophy in last Friday's contest with the Ionia Bulldogs. Steve Wernet, a 5 foot 8, 160 lb. senior had a standout evening rushing for 127 yards in the 13-0 win over the Bulldogs. Lowell hosted the non-conference rivalry that marks the first game of the season each year for the two teams. Lowell lost at Ionia last year, 27-6.

Lowell chalked up a total of 298 yards on offense, all but seven of it was generated on the ground. John Kloosterman, the Arrow fullback also had a good evening with 69 yards to his credit. Coach Phil Christensen was quoted as being, "very, very happy with the victory", especially when considering that Ionia is favored in some circles to finish first in their very tough conference.

The Arrows got off to a shaky start in the opener, and went into the halftime locker room with the score 0-0. The Arrows were plagued with penalties in the first half, and drove to the 2 yard line on their third possession, only to be turned away by a fifteen yard holding penalty. The Arrows came close on two other possessions, but always came up empty. Christensen laid the blame on, "first game jitters".

The Arrows roared back in the second half to drive 77 yards in 10 plays to score on their first possession. The drive was sparked at the beginning by a 30 yard run by Kloosterman and was culminated by a 4 yard run up the middle by Wernet for the score.

Lowell got on the scoreboard again four minutes into the fourth quarter. The Arrows powered their way to the one yard line where senior tailback Eric Potter went over right guard for the score.

The Arrow defense really sparked, not only by shutting out the Bulldogs, but by holding them to a mere 80 yards rushing and 50 yards passing.

The Red Arrows will meet Coopersville in their first league game, at Coopersville Friday at 7:30 P.M.

At the regular meeting of the Lowell Board of Education held last Monday, unanimous action was taken to appoint Mr. James DeWeerd the new Assistant High School Principal. Mr. DeWeerd and his wife, Roxanne, were in the audience and were formally introduced by the Superintendent.

Mr. DeWeerd comes to Lowell with 18 years of experience in education with the Lakeview Schools in Battle Creek, Michigan. Jim has received his Masters Degree in Educational Leadership from Western Michigan University and his bachelor's degree from the same institution. He is the former Athletic Director and Chairman of the English Department of the Lakeview High School. He has served on a number of curriculum council's for the school system including acceptance of the council chairmanship for a

number of years. He has also been Athletic coach and Chairman of the high school's North Central Evaluation Team. For the past two years he has served as an administrator for the Battle Creek Lakeview School System which has a student population of 3,600 students. During Jim's administrative tenure he served in the capacity of Director of Interscholastic Athletics and High School Assistant Principal in the absence of the district's regular Assistant Principals.

Jim and Roxanne have a four year old son and are excited about their move to the Lowell community. Roxanne is a Home Economics teacher at Wayland High School.

The Board offered Mr. DeWeerd the contract in the amount of \$32,000 pro-rated to his first day of work and welcomed Jim and his family to the Lowell Area Schools.

Festival slated for September 24 & 25

The 15th Annual Fallasburg Fall Festival, sponsored by the Lowell Area Arts Council, will be held in Fallasburg Park, four miles north of Lowell, Saturday and Sunday, September 24th and 25th.

This festival has grown in all aspects since the LAAC took over sponsorship in 1978 and offers something for the entire family to enjoy. Because of its popularity amongst west Michigan artists, the juried show continues to grow in number and quality. 70 artists and skilled craftsmen will offer their work for sale at this year's show, and the variety of art should make finding the perfect purchase a pleasure.

Eleven food booths offer everything from a hot meal to a snack for the kids. Complete meals featuring barbecued chicken, Polish dogs and beans, beef barbecues, and hamburgers will be available. Dessert and snack booths feature hot pretzels, ice-cream, popcorn, homemade pies, and donuts. Hot and cold beverages will be sold, also.

Children's activities, free of charge, will keep the youngsters busy while their parents shop or browse, and the whole family can enjoy the music from the outdoor stage as various performers entertain during the afternoons. A special feature of this turn-of-the-century celebration is the many demonstrations of skills our grandparents used in daily living, such as candle-dipping, butter churning, beekeeping, or rug-hooking. These demonstrations help bring out the theme of this festival, "Celebrating Yesterday Today". In keeping with the theme many visitors and participants will be garbed in costumes of eras long past. This theme was chosen because of the appropriateness to the setting of the festival. Fallasburg Park is the site of the old Fallasburg Village and the Fallasburg Covered Bridge, over one hundred years old and still open to traffic. A visit to this bridge and the nearby Old Schoolhouse Museum, operated by the West Central Michigan Historical Society, can help the visitor capture the mood of the past. Also on the grounds

will be a Civil War Encampment. On Sunday afternoon, the park will be visited by the Flat River Antique Auto Club. This year for the first time a Fallasburg Festival postmark has been designed and the U.S. Post Office will be at the festival to cancel mail with this collector's stamp. They will have a philatelic exhibit as well.

A highlight of each of the last five festivals has been the raffling of a special quilt designed and constructed by LAAC members. The quilt features the covered bridge in a center stitched design with a different pattern surrounding it. This year's pattern is a stained glass pattern. Raffle tickets will be sold at the festival. In addition to the quilt, other prizes can be won, including a dulcimer and yet-to-be-selected artwork from the exhibitors.

The Fall beauty of Fallasburg Park provides the background for this two day festival, its rustic

tendance at bus drivers school to \$9.90 an hour for part time drivers on regular bus runs during the 1983-84 school year. The agreement further calls for an increase of 5% per year over the 5 year life of the contract which terminates on August 30, 1988.

Community Education Direc-

tor, Linda Zaczek, presented a proposal to the Board which would include the General Education Development (GED) tests as a partial fulfillment for the district's adult high school graduation requirements. The Board reviewed the proposal with possible changes in Board policy and appointed its policy committee

to review the suggested revisions to accommodate the GED tests.

In the last item of business the Board considered a recommended settlement with Lloyd's of London for unemployment insurance claims issued against the policy holders between April 1, 1981 and April 1, 1982. It was during this time frame that most school districts were laying off teachers due to executive order cuts and loss of state aid. The insurance company was unable to meet its obligations for that fiscal year. Claims for Lowell Schools during the above years totaled \$74,176 of which the insurer had agreed to settle at 50% of that amount as payment. Esch reported that the administration had continued its negotiations with the company and the insurer was now willing to settle at 90% of the total claims which totals \$66,758. He recommended that the Board accept the amount as payment in full and stated that the remaining 10% of lost funds to the district would most likely be used in attorney fees and legal assistance if the Board chose to take formal action against the insurance company.

The next meeting of the Lowell Board of Education will be a special meeting to be held on September 26 at 7:30 in the Board room. Interested citizens are encouraged to attend.

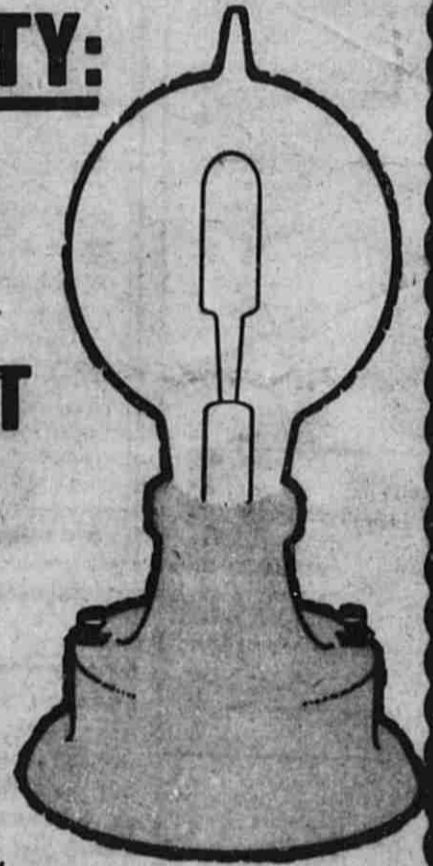
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
