Arrested by Lowell Officers for felonious assault Wednesday, October 19 was Lawrence Dietrich, 33, of Lowell in connection with an incident that occurred at a private residence in Lowell late in September.

Arrested by Lowell Officers on a warrant issued by 63rd District Court in Grand Rapids was Michael Harrison, 25, of Belding after bonding out on a charge driving under the influence of alcohol and not returning to court. Harrison was released on a \$500.00 bond after pleading guilty and awaits pre-sentence investigation.

## Mystery crash solved

Sometime between 1:15 and 1:45 A.M. last Saturday a vehicle crashed into the east entrance to the north end of the Lowell Senior High School. The vehicle backed out of the debris and fled the scene. Initial damage estimates ran from \$3,000 to \$8,000 and included replacement of the custom fabricated entrance and doors, a demolished classroom doorway inside the building, the masonry work around it and 8 to 10 lockers that were damaged beyond repair.

The Lowell Police department found several pieces of the vehicle left at the scene including a mirror, headlight trim and a side reflector. The pieces were taken to area body shops and auto dealers in an attempt to identify the make, model and year of the vehicle. The police Department immediately began an investigation working in cooperation with Lowell Senior High School Principal Richard Korb. The school had been prepared to offer a \$500 reward in this issue of the Ledger, but at about 1:00 P.M. Tuesday afternoon we were told to pull the reward notice. The pieces were apparently coming together.

At a little after 2:00 P.M. the Ledger was notified by Sergeant Al Eckman of the Lowell Police Department and told that an arrest had been made in the case. After following various leads and pretty well pinpointing the vehicle to a mid 1970's GMC or chevrolet Pickup with green paint, the police arrested Michael Alan Wright, 26, of 825 Hunt Street, Lowell. Wright's vehicle is a 1975 green Chevrolet 4 wheel drive pickup truck, a perfect match. Following the arrest, the police department secured a confession from Wright, and he was charged with reckless driving and leaving the scene of a personal injury accident. Wright suffered minor injuries, and was alone in the vehicle at the time of the accident.

Wright told authorities that he lost control of his vehicle and estimates that he hit the building at a speed of 40 to 50 miles per hour.

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# Capitol Column

Will the clear choice in '84 be the "Voter's Choice?" That's what organizers of the tax cutting and limiting proposal called Voter's Choice are hoping for. They have been circulating petitions since early April to acquire the necessary 304,000 signatures to place their constitutional amendment question before Michigan's electorate next fall. If passed, the proposition

thorough enough to keep local governing bodies and the State Legislature from circumventing it.

To prevent the likelihood of a tax being called a "fee," the amendment also mandates a four-fifths affirmative vote of the legislative body or voter approval to increase or add a new fee, license, user fee or permit. This requirement would also be effective as of December 31, 1981.

The Voter's Choice petition drive erupted last spring after the Democratic-controlled Legislature passed Governor Blanchard's requested 38 percent income tax boost. It would effectively return the rate to 4.6 percent as well as repeal increases in gasoline and cigarette taxes adopted over the past two years. Governments, however, would not have to refund taxes already collected.

Although backers have until July 9 to gather the required signatures, they already claim to be very close to that figure and say they will go for an additional 100,000 as a precautionary measure against any invalid signatures.

Given the impressive statewide support shown so far, there is little question that Voter's Choice will earn a spot on the '84 ballot. The debate will be heated. But whether it succeeds or not, the message should be clear: Taxpayers in this state are tired of losing more and more of their income to taxes. If government doesn't choose to make sacrifices and roll back its high cost of operating, the choice may no longer be its own.

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cozy corner

Do you remember that fairly hard frost we had a couple of weeks ago? Well, for some reason that I can't quite remember now, my car got left outside that night. The next morning Terese and I were running a bit late, and when I discovered the frost covered windows I really had to hustle around and get them scraped.

I grabbed the scraper and went to work like killing snakes. One of the hundreds of cliches my dad uses. I'm not quite sure I get the meaning, but it sounds good. Later on that morning I had to use the car again. By this time the sun had come out and the windows were nice and clear, except for where the scraper had scratched them. The scraper I used was one of those with a wooden handle, an aluminum frame at the business end that holds a plastic scraper blade on one side and a rubber squeegee blade on the other. Somehow the aluminum frame had gotten bent, probably from being stepped on, and instead of scraping the windows with the plastic blade, I scraped them with the aluminum frame. Cute, huh?

Though the windows (all of them) look to be scratched to the max, they were actually just coated in places with an aluminum residue. Kind of like soaping a window at Halloween with a bar of paraffine, the only difference is that paraffine comes off with a reasonable amount of elbow grease, this stuff seemed to be there for the duration.

The following weekend we found some time to clean the car, so Terese tackled the interior, and I went to work on the outside, starting with the windows. My first inclination was to try some steel wool, but couldn't find any. As I scouted through the cleaning supplies I finally settled upon some Ajax Cleanser and a plastic scouring pad.

I made a paste of the Ajax and started scouring away at some of the residue on the windshield. After considerable scrubbing, I rinsed the paste away and discovered that I had begun to make some progress, so I really got after it and finished the driver's side of the windshield. Next I worked on the driver's window, where the residue was worse than most places. I scrubbed and scrubbed and scrubbed some more. I rinsed the Ajax away, and discovered what I had done.

The sun was shining on that side window, and I could see tiny little scratches in the glass. I dried the window, and the scratches were even worse than they appeared when wet. The windows that I scrubbed almost appear to be frosted, like a shower stall glass. Driving at night is really fun as the scratches diffuse the light from oncoming cars turning it into a terrible glare. Of course I had to experiment on the driver's side of the windshield and the driver's side window.

I have talked to a guy at an auto glass store, and he says that he might be able to polish the scratches out using a buffing wheel and jeweler's rouge. If he can, then maybe I can get out of this fairly cheap, but if he can't I guess I'm looking at replacing the two windows. As for the rest of the windows, I finally found as S.O.S. pad, and it worked just fine, without scratching the glass. And the culprit scraper went out in the trash. But not before I smashed it to pieces.

# Red Arrows lose to Greenville 16-8

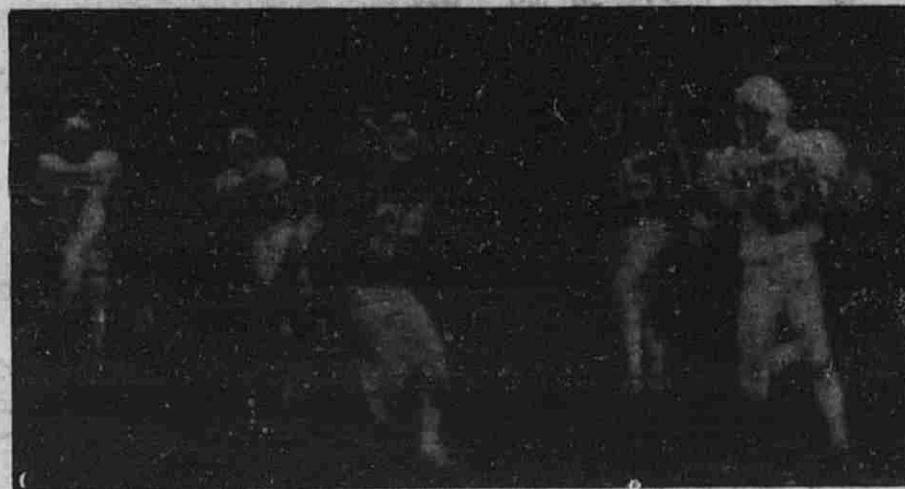
The Lowell Red Arrows recorded their first loss as they fell to the Greenville Yellowjackets last Friday 16-8.

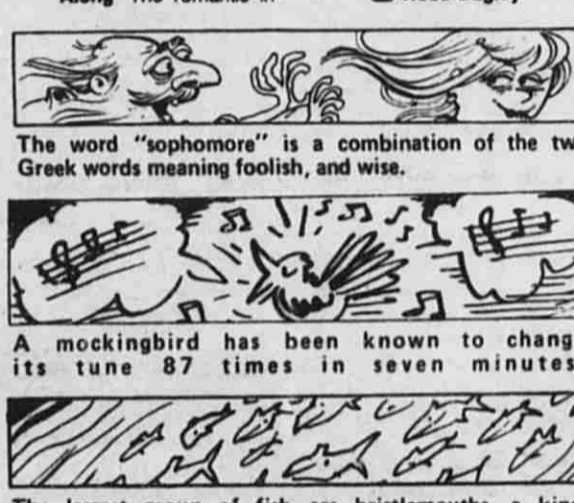

## Alto Lions back alcohol/drug abuse program

Jim Kyburz, President of the Alto Lions Club asked that we bring to the attention of our readers the following information about a two part television program dealing with the abuse of alcohol and drugs by American youth. The Lions Clubs International is helping fund and promote the programs, and according to Kyburz the Alto Chapter will probably be helping WGVC monetarily in getting the programs on the air.

The Chemical People, a landmark public television event coupling the power of television with people power at the community level, airs Wednesday, November 2 at 9 at 8 P.M. on Channel 35, WGVC-TV. Hosted by First Lady Nancy Reagan, this two-part program focuses national attention on a growing national tragedy -- the abuse of drugs and alcohol by America's youth. In the past several months, dozens of concerned individuals in West Michigan have been organizing town meetings at which other concerned citizens can view the first program on November 2. Across the country, at least 10,500 town meetings are being held, with 50 planned for the West Michigan area.

While thousands will view the Chemical People in their home, organizers hope that attendance

at town meetings will lead to the formation of task forces to combat drug and alcohol abuse at a local level. Part I of the program, "The Chemical Society," addresses the "wall of denial" that prevents parents and others from recognizing or admitting the existence of the problem. In a town meeting, group viewing of the first program should encourage people to talk with each other and begin the crucial process of admitting and beginning to address the problem. Part I, "Community Answers," which airs one week later, will offer constructive suggestions for organizing to combat the problem.

Following the broadcast of The Chemical People on Wednesday, November 2, at 9 P.M. the Michigan Corporation for Public Broadcasting will produce a half-hour follow-up from Lansing and Detroit, hosted by Dennis Wholey of WTVS-Detroit, and host of Latent America. This program will offer statewide resources for dealing with substance abuse.

At 9:30 P.M., Channel 35 will present a live, local follow-up, hosted by Rick Merpi. A panel of local experts on the subject of juvenile chemical abuse, including representatives from Project Rehab and the police department, will answer questions viewers telephone to the station.

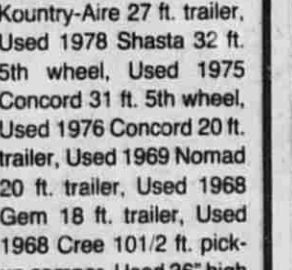

## Interlochen adds Sousaphone
