Maatman, Schneider & Thompson win council seats

Just over eighteen percent of Lowell's registered voters turned out in last Tuesday's city election. In all 312 voters each allowed 3 votes, cast a total of 891 of a possible 936 votes to return incumbents Jim Maatman and Phillip Schneider to the Lowell City Council, and elect newcomer Bill Thompson in favor of the third incumbent, Bob Christiansen.

Maatman received the most votes, 235, to earn one of the two

four year terms up for grabs. Schneider and Thompson tied at 171 votes each. The second four year term will be decided by a coin toss this Thursday at the Kent County Clerk's Office at 1:00 P.M. The winner of the toss will get the four year term and the loser will serve a two year term.

Thompson's wife Helen was also a candidate in the field of five, and finished fourth with a total of 164 votes. Christiansen,

who has served on the council for the past eight years received the least amount of votes with 150.

Thompson, Schneider and Maatman will be sworn into their new terms at the first council meeting in 1984. They will join Dean Collins and Jack Fonger who will be up for election in 1985 along with whoever gets the two year term from this election. A Mayor and Mayor Pro-tem will be elected at that meeting by the councilmen. Collins currently serves as Mayor and Maatman is Mayor Pro-tem.

The first portion of the Chemical People held some surprising statistics. Alcohol is the number one substance that is abused, and over 93% of America's senior class has tried alcohol and 6% are daily drinkers. There are 3 million problem drinkers in the

United States alone.

Marijuana was the second rated abused substance, and 60% of the kids will try it by the time they are seniors. Stimulants and downers are also abused by school age kids. Over 17% of the kids surveyed said they had used

Cocaine at one time or another.

Denial is the biggest problem facing prevention. Teenagers say that "it can't happen to me" and "I don't get drunk that much". These kids develop ways

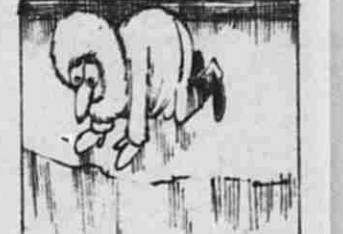

Today, Tuesday, November 15, as I sit here at my typewriter thousands and thousands of hunters across the state are crawling out of the sack, and getting ready to head out into the woods in hopes of bagging a big ol' buck. Capitol Column

Believing that agriculture and forestry must play a larger role in Michigan's economic recovery, Republican legislators have devised a plan to help those industries create jobs and reap greater financial harvest.

The eight-point legislative program is rooted in an overall GOP Economic Action Plan. It focuses on agriculture and forestry because of their tremendous economic base and potential for job growth, especially in food and wood processing. Both industries have weathered the recession well, generating \$22 billion a year for Michigan's economy.

Major components of the Republican Action Plan for Agriculture/Forestry call for:

--Exemption from the Single Business Tax for any agriculture or forestry industry processing facilities, whether they be existing, expanding or new. The exemption would then be phased out over a 10-year period. Like all businesses in Michigan, agriculture and forestry would benefit greatly by the revamping of the tax structure.

--Creation of a new Agriculture and Forestry Research and Development Fund. Republicans support a centralized exposition center for promotion of Michigan agriculture, related products, industries and animals. We endorse the newly developed "Say 'Yes' to the Best From Michigan Farms" product logo and encourage its use in newspaper ads, flyers, coupons and restaurant menus.

--Earmarking a portion of horse racing revenues for the purpose of promoting horse racing, increasing purse levels and improving race track facilities. Since 1970, attendance at horse races in Michigan has fallen off more than 52 percent. Track receipts have fallen off 24 percent which reflects negatively the amount of revenue to the state's General Fund.

--Creation of a legislative policy task force to develop an equitable statewide water-use policy. We strongly oppose water diversion from our Great Lakes and feel we must begin anticipating future demands and priorities for the entire Great Lakes water supply.

--Passage of pending legislation amending the Grain Dealers Act to assure that farmers who deliver grain to elevators receive payment for their product. There have been 11 elevator insolvencies or bankruptcies in Michigan since January, 1981. Many farmers have never been paid for their grain which they deposited in elevators on "price later agreements."

Adoption of these and other policies and incentives outlined in the proposal will mean new and permanent jobs for Michigan's unemployed men and women. It will also send an important message to the rest of the country that Michigan is serious about regulatory reform and reducing the high cost of doing business.

Since agriculture and forestry are businesses, what is good for business is good for agriculture and forestry. And, certainly those vital industries are good for Michigan.

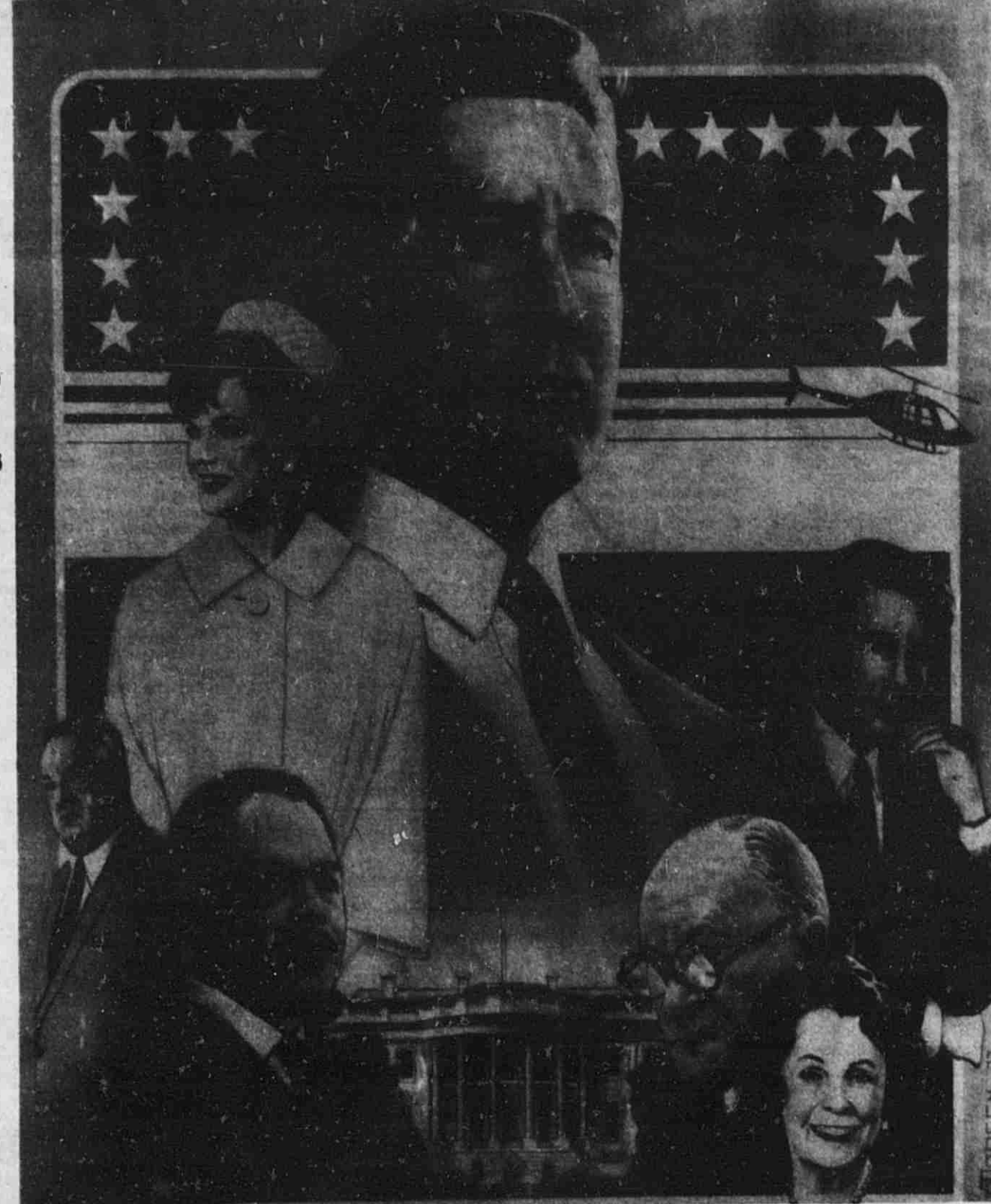

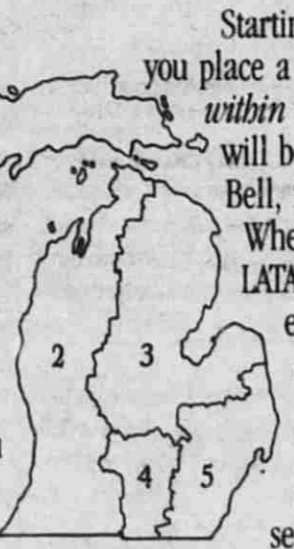

Viewers tuned to Cinemax will once again be able to laugh at the antics of the warped personalities found on the mythical TV station. Back from the land of network cancellations will rise the members of the shock-as-art brigade: station president Guy Caballero, station manager Edith Prickley, talk-show host Sammy Maudlin, obnoxious comic Bobby Bittman.

SCTV (for Second City Television), was rescued earlier this year by Cinemax, after NBC canceled the late-night comedy show, despite critical acclaim and some 15 Emmy nominations for 1982 and 1983.

The 45-minute Cinemax episodes are all-new, starting in December, two new editions of the series will be seen each month.

This was Nona's second deer in five or six years of hunting, while this was Kevin's first year, first shot and first deer. The deer were bagged between 10:00 and 10:30 opening morning.

Prepare a safe Holiday Turkey

Thanksgiving is fast approaching and many of you will be preparing turkeys. Some questions commonly asked of the Kent County Cooperative Extension Service are: What's the best buy; how do you stuff, thaw, and prepare a turkey; and what do you do with the leftovers?

What's the best buy? If you want to be economical, buy a turkey big enough for several meals. For turkeys under 12 pounds, allow three-fourths to one pound per serving. For larger birds, allow one-half to three-fourths pound per serving.

How do you prepare a turkey safely? Thawing the turkey:



1) In the refrigerator, in original wrap, on tray - 18 hours to 3 days. Unwrapped and covered lightly - 18 to 48 hours. Remove giblets as soon as possible, wrap loosely and store separately.

2) Immerse moisture tight package in cold water. Cover turkey and change water if it becomes warm. Small birds: 3-4 hours. Large birds: 6-7 hours. The slower defrosting, the juicier the turkey. Do not thaw at room temperature.

Roast turkey at a minimum temperature of 325 for safety. Baste the turkey during roasting. To prevent darkening of the skin, cover with foil the last half hour of cooking. If you are going to stuff the bird, stuff just before roasting. Otherwise, bacteria can grow during storage.

How do you store the leftovers? As soon as after serving as possible, remove dressing and refrigerate. Use within two to three days unless covered with gravy and frozen. Gravy can be frozen also. Reheat gravy rapidly to boiling before serving. Turkey can also be diced and frozen to use later in casseroles.

President's Consumer Adviser Commends Drug Information Book.

About Your Medicines, a book that provides consumers with essential information on hundreds of medications, has been commended by President Reagan's Consumer Adviser.

Mrs. Virginia Knauer, Special Assistant to the President, and Director of the United States Office of Consumer Affairs, said, "About Your Medicines is a good example of the kind of information sources consumers should consult in order to use medications safely and wisely. Many consumers are injured each year by the inappropriate and unwise use of over-the-counter and prescription drugs. Much of this injury is needless and can be prevented by reading medication labels and learning about drugs from such publications as About Your Medicines."

The book is a consumer reference for the most frequently used prescription and over-the-counter medicines. Written in plain language, it tells about uses, gives warnings and precautions, points out the side effects that are common or dangerous, interactions with other drugs and with foods, and the conditions under which a drug should be stored. Special precautions are listed as an aid to individuals with certain medical conditions such as diabetes and high blood pressure, or who are pregnant or breast-feeding.

About Your Medicines may be purchased in pharmacies and other health care facilities or by writing to USP. An extension of the About Your Medicines book appears in a bimonthly consumer newsletter published by USP, which reports significant new information on drugs mentioned in the book.
