Three street vacation requests heard by council

Two of three requests for street vacations were granted by the Lowell City Council Monday evening following public hearings on each. There are numerous "paper streets" on the city maps which will never be developed into usable streets. The City Council takes requests from bordering property owners to vacate these right-of-ways on a case by case basis. If the city agrees to vacate a street, the precedent has been to split the right-of-way down the middle and deed each half to the property it adjoins.

The first request for a vacancy came from Dr. Harold Myers asking that Sibley Street east of North Center Street be vacated. Myers owns the property to the south of this right-of-way and indicated that he had plans to build a new office building on the site which currently has 137 feet of frontage on Center Street. City Manager Ray Quada read into the record letters from neighboring property owners, Everett Wittenbach, Gladys Clemenz and Carlton Fritts, Sr., all opposed to the vacation. There were no letters or persons present in favor of the vacation.

Reasoning that there appeared to already be sufficient land available to Myers for an office building, the council decided not to act upon the vacation request, and it died for lack of a motion.

The second request was for the vacation of West Street south of Bowes Road and Clarke Street west of West Street. This request was initiated by Rosie Fonger who owns property west of West Street and on both the north and south of Clarke Street. After some discussion in which several neighbors voiced both pro and con opinions, the council decided to go ahead with the vacation request. Many of the negative comments involved in this issue turned out to be simply because of mis-information or lack of knowledge about street vacations. Those who were opposed at the beginning of the public hearing seemed to agree with the council's decision.

The third request came from Newell Corporation for the vacation of Elm Street west of Amity. This portion of Elm Street borders the St. Mary's Catholic School property on the south, and representatives from the church and school were on hand to oppose the vacation. At some time in the past Smith Street which runs north and south from Chatham to Howard Streets was vacated from Chatham to Spring Streets and deeded over to Newell. Monsignor Moran was concerned that Newell might begin using Smith Street to Spring Street as a truck exit. This would route trucks, and other vehicles behind the school and

would not be an acceptable situation in the eyes of the church representatives. Russ Dunham speaking on behalf of Newell said that this would never happen, but the church representatives wanted some guarantee.

Councilman Robert Christensen suggested that Spring Street be vacated at a future meeting,

and deeded over to the church. This would render Smith Street useless as a traffic route for Newell, as it would then dead end into church property. Both Moran and Dunham found this to be an acceptable solution, and the council approved the initial request to vacate Elm Street. The

vacation of Spring Street will come at a future meeting after notices have been published and property owners have been notified.

In a complicated exchange of school and City properties in Recreation Park around the football field, the council gave Quada approval to prepare deeds

and necessary documents. The School Board has not yet approved the deal, but they did investigate the idea. The exchange basically serves to square up the

fence around the football field, and in Quada's opinion will make better use of the property for the city, school and 4-H.

Lowell man struck by auto dies

A Lowell man died early Saturday as the result of injuries he sustained from being struck by an automobile at the intersection of 28th Street and Lake Eastbrook Boulevard in Kentwood. Terry Heaven, 33, of 65 Franseca Ct. was attempting to cross the busy five lane 28th Street on foot with his wife Linda and their 7 year old daughter Terri, when the trio were struck by an oncoming vehicle. The accident occurred at about 7:00 P.M. on Friday, November 18.

Heaven underwent emergency surgery at Butterworth Hospital,

but doctors failed in their efforts to save his life. Linda is listed in "good" condition with a broken leg, and Terri suffered minor injuries. Linda underwent surgery on her broken leg Monday.

Witnesses said that the family tried to cross the roadway against the light, and Terry Heaven was thrown about twenty feet through the air landing in the middle of the road. The driver of the vehicle was Michael Kelly, 28, of Kentwood. The accident is still under investigation by Kentwood Police.

A graveside service has been arranged for 10:30 A.M. Friday, November 25 by the Pickens-Koops Funeral Home of Lake Odessa. Interment will be at the Clarksville Cemetery.

Heaven was a native of Clarksville, and worked at Lacks Industries, Inc. of Saranac until he was laid off some eight months ago.

He is survived by his wife and daughter and a son, Jeffery, 11, two brothers, Herbert of Clarksville and Ernest of Kentucky; two sisters, Doreen Heaven of Clarksville and Mrs.

Kerry Faggerman of Cedar Springs.

Friends and neighbors have opened an account # 6-00-232-9 at the First Security Bank for donations from anyone wishing to help the Heaven family in this time of need. The Ledger has been told that Heaven had little or no life insurance. Amway announces lay offs

Amway Corporation said lingering effects of the recession and the strong U.S. dollar slowed its sales during fiscal 1983. The international direct selling firm's worldwide corporate revenues for the year ended August 31 were \$1.13 billion, down from 1982 record of \$1.2 billion.

The company also noted it has lost numerous manufacturing jobs in Ada since Canadian tariff barriers required Amway to move several manufacturing activities to London, Ontario, the

only Amway manufacturing plant outside the United States.

As a result, Amway said it will lay off 230 of the 7,000 workers it employs worldwide. The reduction is divided among hourly office, hourly manufacturing and salaried personnel.

Historically, the direct sales industry is one of the last to feel a recession's impact, and one of the last to recover. Amid this industrywide conditions, Amway has been studying ways to

Capitol Column

The state is about to lower the boom on PCB-contaminated silos.

A bill approved by the Legislature and awaiting Governor Blanchard's signature authorizes the Department of Agriculture to purchase, demolish and dispose of silos lined with a sealant containing PCB. There are believed to be about 360 such storage facilities located across Michigan, 90 of which are still in use.

Agriculture officials estimate the cleanup effort will initially cost the state some \$2.7 million. While the bill is expected to become law before Thanksgiving, the acquisition and demolition process cannot begin until the dollars have been appropriated by the Legislature. That should happen by mid-December, according to commitments made by both House and Senate leaders.

The funding will come in stages. The first \$2.7 million will cover dismantling and disposing of silos currently used on active farms. It is expected additional funding will be provided next year to cover disposal costs and compensation to farmers whose silo structures are no longer in use.

PCB (poly-chlorinated biphenyl) was first detected in the state's food chain in the early 1970's. Laboratory tests conducted since then have linked the

chemical to reproductive failures, stomach disorders, skin lesions and tumors. Its use has been banned in Michigan.

Contamination of the silos occurred between 1948 and 1969 when they were built by the now-defunct Michigan Silo Company. To protect against destructive silage acids, the interior silo walls were painted with Cumar, an insulation made with PCB.

As the toxic coating has worn away, the level of PCB has increased in the livestock feed and ultimately in the dairy and beef products.

Last May, at the urging of the Agriculture Commission, the Governor signed an emergency rule forbidding farmers from placing additional feed or farm products in identified silos and banning their use altogether beginning September 1. But the order was only temporary and expired November 9.

The silo-purchase bill, which cleared the Senate 32-2, will get rid of the troubled silos and prevent further introduction of PCB into the threatened food chain. It will also allow farmers to be justly compensated for the loss of their property.

I am pleased to have supported this bill and only hope the Legislature will act quickly to appropriate funds in an effort to reduce PCB contamination in Michigan.

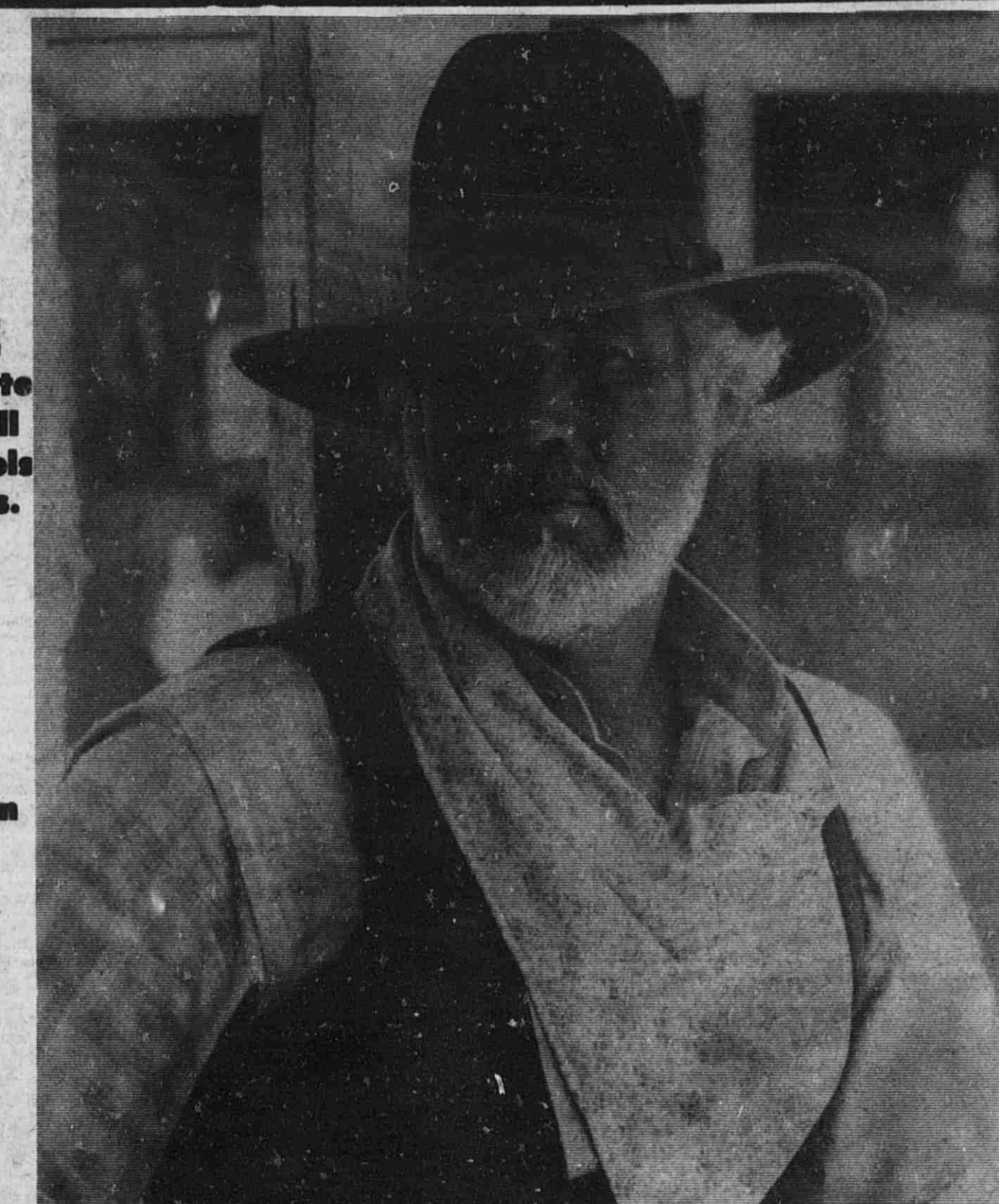

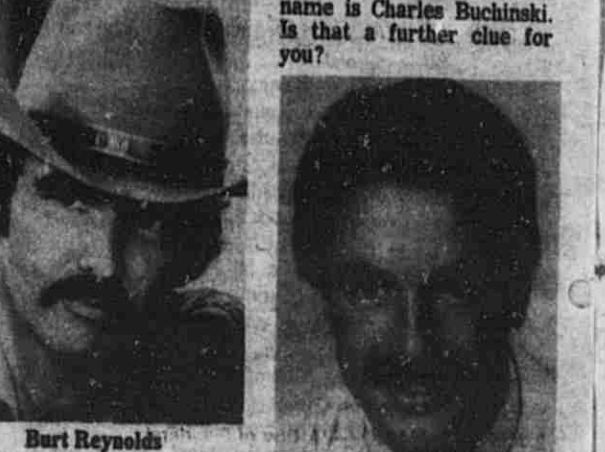

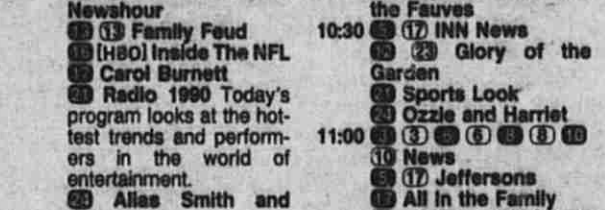

Celebrities cash in on exercise

How much help can show business personalities generate by the self-help exercise books, albums and videotapes they create? Apparently anywhere from zilch, if one is just skimming, to life-changing for the highly motivated. Of the latter, Richard Simmons can draw on a pile of testimonials of grateful "losers." Some of them are 100 pound losers, who get invited to guest on his television series and inspire others to follow sane advice on good nutrition and hearty exercise.

Dedicated to keeping fit, Simmons' later projects spun from his first exercise album.

(He now has a network of around 100, all with child care facilities for mothers with young'uns). Then came the best seller books, like "Never Say Diet."

Simmons, like Jane Fonda, who developed her fitness regimes at her pilot salon classes, then went onto the best-seller book list, then videotape, has developed a 90-minute "private class at home" videotape.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 78-3 ADOPTED FEBRUARY 13, 1978, KNOWN AS THE GRATTAN TOWNSHIP SANITARY SEWER ORDINANCE;

be adopted:

The Supervisor declared the ordinance adopted. The following is Ordinance No. 83-2 as adopted:

ORDINANCE NO. 83-2

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 78-3 ADOPTED FEBRUARY 13, 1978, KNOWN AS THE GRATTAN TOWNSHIP SANITARY SEWER ORDINANCE.

THE TOWNSHIP OF GRATTAN ORDAINS:

1. Section 4.02 of the Grattan Township Sanitary Sewer Ordinance be amended to read as follows:

Section 4.02 Seasonal Trailer Parks which operate only between the months of May 1 to October 1 and are non-conforming in the zone in which they are situated and are licensed for more than 20 sites which are to be connected to the system, shall pay the following charges:

- (a) Trunkage Fee per site \$850.00
- (b) Availability fee plus \$6.50 per foot or (front Foot

Equivalent) in excess of 75 feet \$900.00
(c) Service Stub charge \$450.00
(d) Sewage disposal service charges of per quarter per unit (\$15.00 per site) for two quarters per year only \$45.00

In the event any such Seasonal Trailer Park ceases to qualify as such as above described and becomes a year-round park, the balance of the fees unpaid and required under Section 3.01 and 5.02 of this ordinance shall be paid forthwith.

2. Section 5.02 of the Grattan Township Sanitary Sewer Ordinance be amended to read as follows:

Section 5.02 The User Charges for sewage disposal services to each premises within the Township connected to the sewage disposal system shall be \$45.00 per quarter per unit which user charge shall consist of \$2.50 per quarter for debt service, \$3.50 per quarter for administration of the system, and \$39.00 per quarter for the operation and maintenance of the system and the treatment of the wastes collected in the system. The User Charge may be changed from time to time by the Township Board, subject to any obligation or limitation set forth in the contract pertaining to the system between the Township and the Drainage Board of the County. No free service shall be furnished by the system to the Township or any person, firm or corporation, public or private, or to any public agency or instrumentality. Charges for services furnished by the system are payable in advance and shall be billed and collected quarterly, the first such charges for each premises to be due and payable on the first day of the established billing quarter following by at least one month the date such premises are connected to the system and successive charges to be due and payable on the first day of each succeeding quarter. Charges shall be billed at least one month before their due date.

3. In all other particulars, the Grattan Township Sanitary Sewer Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect as adopted.

4. This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency Ordinance which is immediately necessary for the preservation of public peace, health and safety and shall become effective immediately upon publication in full in a newspaper published or circulated in said Township.
