Red Arrows win five straight

It was a very good Christmas season for the Lowell Red Arrow Basketball team. Lowell defeated Forest Hills Northern 73-69 and Galesburg-Augusta 62-56.

Jason Barber scored 21 points and Craig Potter netted 20 to lead the Arrows over the Huskies from Northern. Forest Hills jumped off to a quick 17-7 lead in the early minutes but Lowell slowly pecked away at the lead to narrow the gap 21-15 at the end of the first quarter. The Arrows got a little closer 38-35 by half-time. However, it was the third quarter that proved to be the difference. Lowell outscored Forest Hills 18-8 in that stanza to take a

53-46 lead they never gave up. Pat Brown added 14 points for Lowell.

GALESBURG-AUGUSTA

The Lowell Red Arrows rolled to their fifth straight victory last Thursday defeating Galesburg-Augusta 62-56. Lowell jumped off to a quick 17-7 lead behind the hot hand of Jason Barber. Barber had 20 points on the night. However, the Red Arrow offense went cold in the third quarter and Lowell fell behind 43-38. Coach Ken Akers went to his bench and got great defensive play from Steve Ralys and Dale Fegel to get the Arrows rolling again. Ralys & Fegel caused numerous Galesburg tur-

Clear ice and snow for mailmen

Ice-covered sidewalks and steps were the cause of injury to literally thousands of Postal Service employees last year, according to Postmaster Charlie Doyle.

"More than 16,000 postal workers across the nation were hurt when they fell or lost their balance," Doyle said, "and ice and snow was the primary cause of those accidents."

"We do everything possible to deliver the mail regardless of how bad the weather becomes," he added, "but we want to remind customers again that snow and ice on steps and sidewalks has to be removed where carriers must walk."

Postmaster Doyle said he realizes it's not always easy to remove ice and snow, but carriers are not required to risk personal injury from unusual hazards to deliver the mail.

To allow a carrier to drive up to a curbside mailbox to deposit or collect mail without leaving his or her vehicle, rural or

curbside boxes should be kept clear of snow, vehicles or other obstructions.

Postmaster Doyle is also reminding rural customers that postal regulations regarding delivery of mail to rural or curbside boxes require customers to keep the approach to their mailboxes cleared of snow, vehicles, and other objects.

This will permit the carrier to drive up to each mailbox to deposit and collect mail without leaving the vehicle. The approach to and exit from the mailbox should be cleared sufficiently on both sides to allow the carrier to drive ahead and not be required to back up the vehicle after delivery.

The postmaster further stated that carriers are instructed to take all mail with them daily as no mail will be given out over the counter. On days of heavy snow, rural customers should meet their carrier if mailboxes have not been cleared.

Snow piling rules noted

Property owners piling snow high along roadways and shoulders or pushing it to the opposite side of the street without clearing debris can cause hazardous conditions for motorists, and Chief

Emmons of the Lowell Police Department warns that it is also against the law. Emmons said state law (P.A. 82 of 1978) prohibits businesses and citizens from dumping snow on roadways and shoulders or piling it so high at driveway entrances that it obstructs the vision of motorists.

The police department recommends residents keep the shoulder in front of their driveway clear and also clear snow for a short distance from the driveway in the direction of approaching traffic. That way the view of a motorist entering the roadway from a driveway is not obstructed.

When clearing your driveway push the snow away from the roadway and to the sides of the driveway for its full length and the problem of the high snow banks blocking a driver's view will be eliminated. Chief Emmons said large businesses should make special arrangements ahead of time to remove snow from the driveway entrances and driveways. In some cases it may be necessary to truck snow away from parking facilities.

Violators leave themselves open to fines and lawsuits for public liability and property damage. For a charge to be filed, a police officer must witness the violation, or a citizen must file a complaint. All property owners and persons hired to remove snow are responsible for maintaining safe traffic conditions and preventing careless snow removal techniques.

Road Commission still busy after Christmas weekend

Today, the Kent County Road Commission is still plowing and salting county roads after the Christmas weekend snow storm. Paul Johnson, Director of Maintenance for the road Commission said, "Crews were working 12-hour shifts through the Holiday weekend and some were working up to 14 hours". December 23rd through December 26th were holidays for the Road commission, but road crews worked every day through the Christmas weekend.

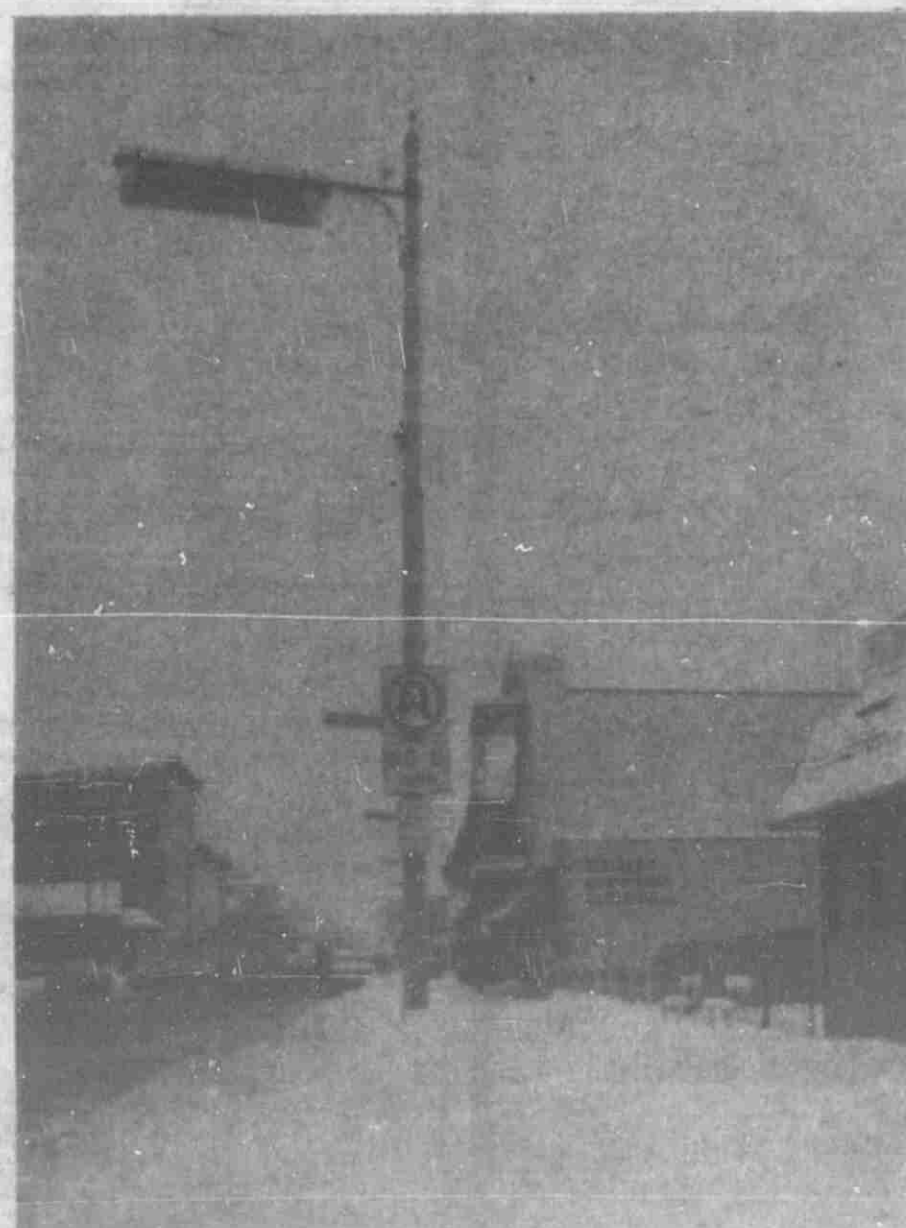
The Major obstacles for road clearing according to Johnson, were the "cold weather and it was constantly snowing. Salt loses its effectiveness below 20° Fahrenheit. As soon as roads were plowed and salted, more snow would come. Another obstacle was a breakdown in equipment and not being able to get the parts quickly enough for repairs."

"We're tremendously proud of the job our men have done", said Johnson. "Many of our men haven't spent very much time with their families over the Christmas weekend because of work schedules".

The Road commission maintains over 2,300 miles of roads in Kent County. To maintain this network of roads, a schedule of plowing priorities is implemented. The first priority goes to limited access highways and state trunklines such as U.S.

131, I-96, and M-37. The second priority goes to heavily traveled primary roads. Examples are 10 mile road, 84th street and Lincoln Lake Avenue. The Third priority is to local roads and platted streets. These are roads used for local traffic and streets in housing developments.

The priority schedule is designed for the largest number of drivers to gain access to the most heavily used roads. The priorities are based on traffic volumes and highway safety.

Capitol Column

It was a very interesting year. Many seasoned legislators and Lansing insiders say there has never been a year like this one in Lansing.

First, there was the 38% tax increase -- one of the most unpopular government decisions in the history of Michigan. Then came months where the Democratic-controlled Legislature passed almost no measures of substance.

Finally, the year ended on a positive note as a bi-partisan legislative apportionment plan passed the Legislature, followed by major tax relief for small businesses who pay the single business tax.

In between the 38% tax increase and the single business tax relief, we saw a temporary Youth Corps jobs program which was of some merit. However, I am extremely disappointed that our legislative agenda for Michigan, a state that needs special help to join in the country's economic recovery, went almost untouched by Democratic hands.

In spite of all the meritorious programs that died on the vine due to lack of enthusiasm and support on the part of the majority party, they did manage to devote an inordinate amount of time and money on the re-drawing of election district lines and other issues like it that were political rather than substantive.

The Strategic Fund, Governor Blanchard's economic incentive plan, is still in conference committee, tied up because the majority party wants to require that union-level wages be paid on all government projects created.

The mandatory seat belt legislation did not see final action, nor did the override of the Governor's veto on medicated-funded abortions, nor the ban on surrogate parenting and other controversial issues. We did not establish the amount of the Governor's budget surplus -- or just what we're going to do about it when the tally does come in.

Planetarium offers live program during January

"Winter Sky Through Eye and Glass" is the title of the sky show at the Chaffee Planetarium, January 5 through 29. Featured are some of the most brilliant stars and constellations of any season. The audience learns how to spot Orion the hunter, Taurus the bull, and other prominent winter constellations. In addition, a number of other planets and bright stars are identified, including the most brilliant star in the night sky, Sirius. Visitors are also given a preview of a significant eclipse of the sun that will occur next May, as well as other significant 1984 sky events.

After evening sky shows (weather permitting) the audience can accompany the Planetarium narrator out-of-doors, under the real skies of winter, for a brief look at the constellations described in the show. A view of the Moon (when visible) and Orion Nebula, through small telescope, is also possible.

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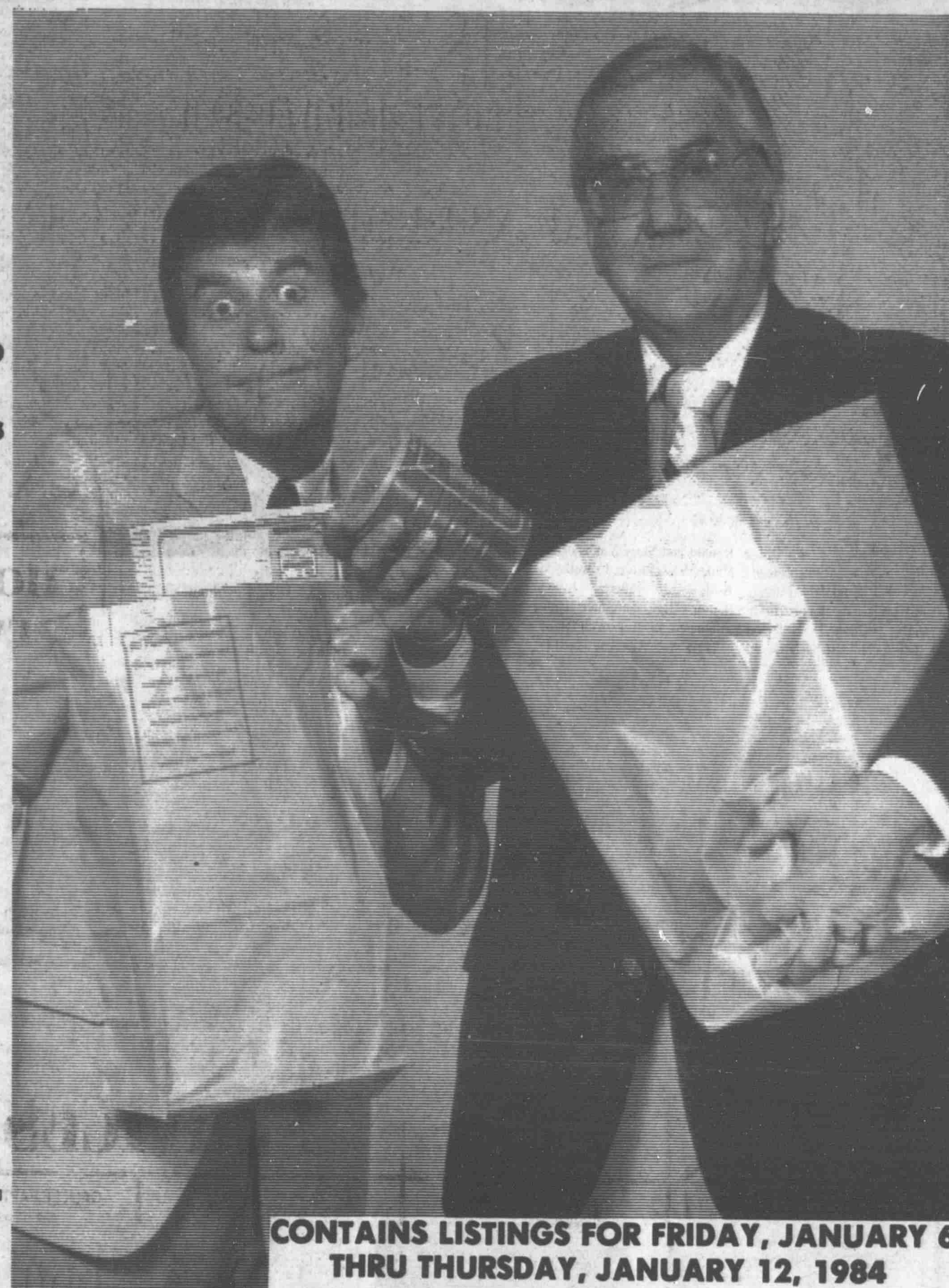

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MICHIGAN'S ECONOMIC FUTURE: IN NEED OF ENERGY

Dennis Ellis is concerned about the future of Michigan. It is not so much the next two or three years that he worries about, but it's the next 10-20 years that he sees as crucial.

"We've got to stop looking at only the short term," he explains emphatically. "Michigan has a very good future, but we've got to plan for the long term. Short term benefits aren't really benefits if they create bigger problems in the long term."

The father of four points out that this is where Michigan really has an advantage. The Sunbelt states have 75 percent of their electricity generated by natural gas and oil. Those plants will either have to be converted, or new ones built, Dr. Ellis notes, meaning higher energy costs.

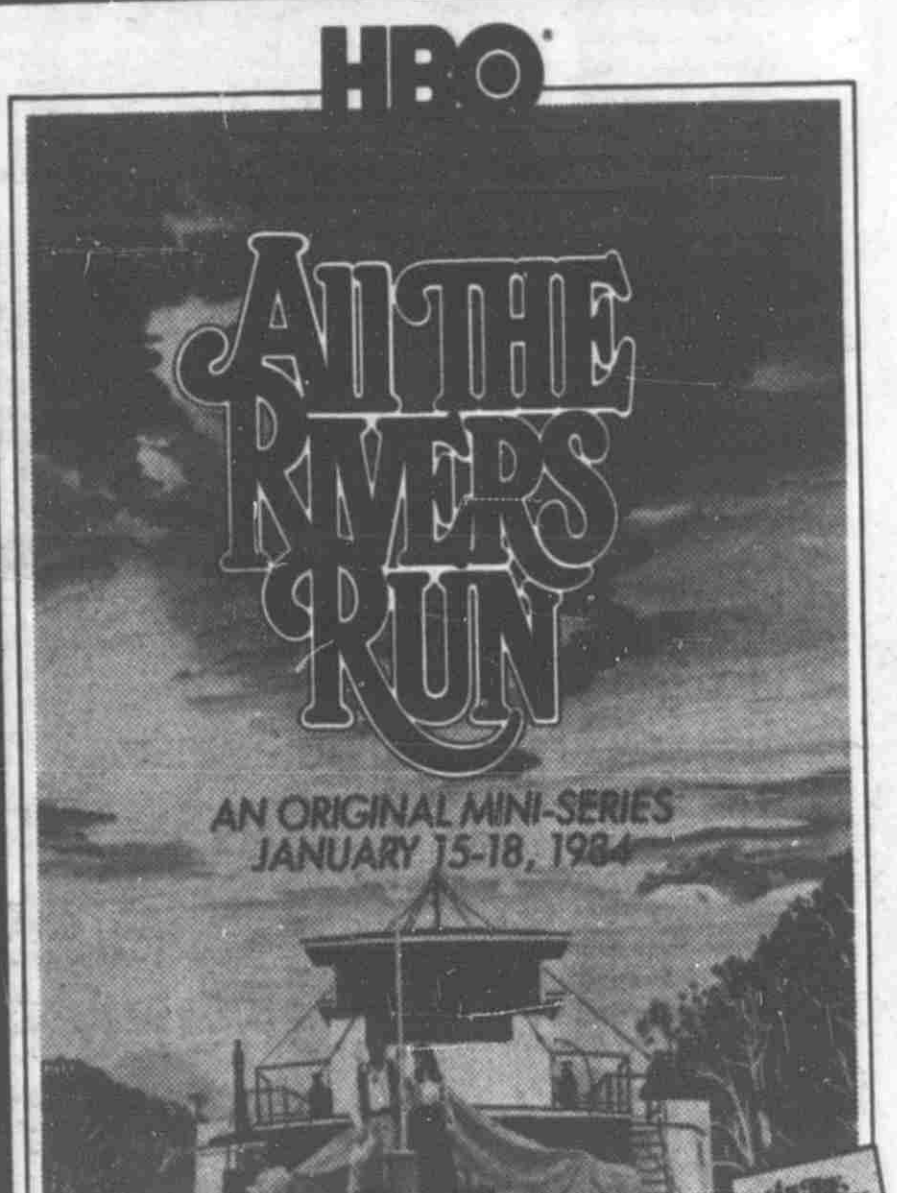
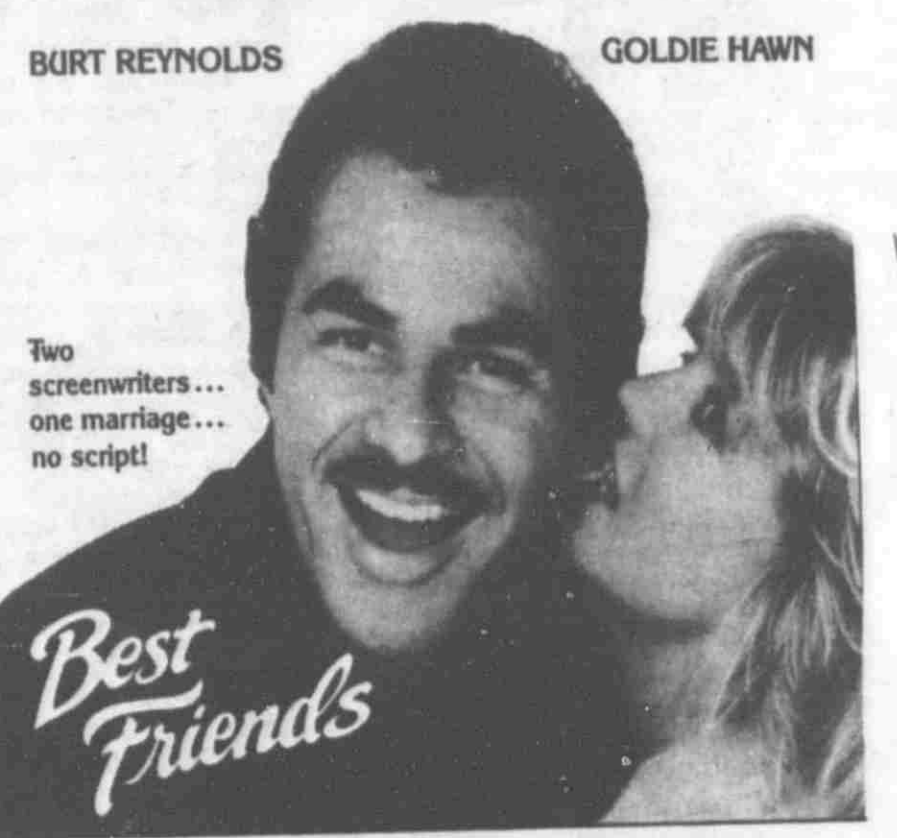

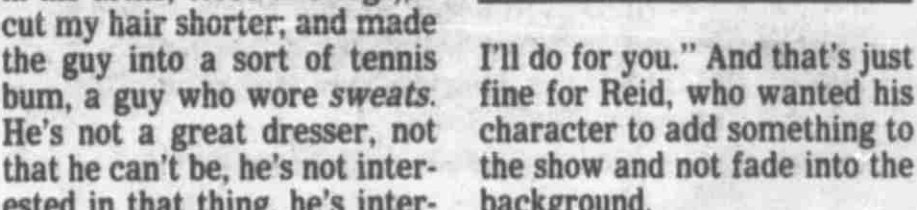

Tim Reid's new look on 'Simon and Simon'

In his new role as Downtown Brown on CBS' "Simon and Simon," Tim Reid has shed more than just the flashy threads of Venus Flytrap on "WKRP in Cincinnati." "With Venus I was more flamboyant, wiry, had an ear pierced, long hair and flashy clothes," says Reid, who spent four years playing the ultra-cool super hit radio deejay. "With the character of Downtown Brown, I wanted to be totally different, so I gained a little muscle weight, working out with weights (adding 20 pounds to his body weight and a total of 17 inches of muscle in his arms, torso and legs). I got my hair shorter, and made the guy into a sort of tennis bum, a guy who wore sweats. He's not a great dresser, not that he can't be, he's not interested in that thing, he's interested in police work and he knows that he's going to be down in the dirt with his job, so he dresses accordingly." In the series, Reid plays a no-nonsense, occasionally quick-tempered cop, who is a loner, a one-man task force who gets the job done even if it sometimes requires bending the law out of shape. "I thought of taking his character from some of the old police story episodes where you see a guy who's totally dedicated to his job," says Reid. "My character is that type of guy." Downtown Brown's arrangement with the detective team of A.J. (Jameson Parker) and Rick (Gerald McRaney) Simon is a supportive one: "You do for me, and I'll do for you." And that's just fine for Reid, who wanted his character to add something to the show and not fade into the background. "I didn't want the character to be a sidekick," says Reid. "That was one of the things that worried me, at first, when considering the show. I wanted to be the guy who is involved in the story, so that when Downtown Brown comes in, he's got something to add to help keep the action of the story going. "Downtown Brown plays on his own intuition," continues Reid. "Instinctively, he is a very good cop. We didn't want to make him a super cop. We didn't want to make him a guy who could make a bomb out of paper clips. We didn't want to make him a 'Mission Impossible' type. We wanted him to be a guy who had done a lot of things, a man of many traits but master of none."

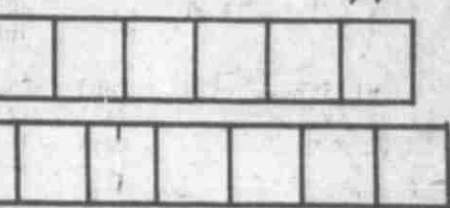

Tips for sled dog race spectators

Sled dog racing can be a great spectator sport, providing families with some unique and exciting entertainment. So to get the most enjoyment from the Kent County Sled Dog Races, being held free to spectators on January 7 and 8 at Johnson Park, take advantage of these tips:

1. Dress warmly so you can enjoy a full day's excitement. Wear a hat which covers the ears and a pair of well-lined gloves. Instead of one heavy coat, wear

several layers of clothing which will insulate your body and a lightweight coat which will break the wind. Pay extra attention to your footwear. Wear warmly-lined boots that will stay dry on the inside.

2. If your hands or feet begin to grow numb, seek shelter immediately. Go to one of the park's heated pavilions and drink something warm at the snack bar. Do not venture out again till your limbs feel thoroughly re-

juvenated.

3. Never bring your pets to the races. Drivers of teams cannot be responsible for the safety of your animals and races have been lost because of pets bolting onto the course.

4. Bring your camera and take all the pictures you want. However, if you are using an instamatic, remember that the chemicals used in the film are poisonous to dogs. Please dispose of the remains of your film properly.

Also, if you use flash bulbs, use them with discretion. Races have been lost because of photographers using bulbs too close to a starting or moving team.

5. Cooperate with race officials in staying clear of the trail. Stand well back as anyone too close may distract the dogs and cause them to bolt or balk. It's easier for everyone to have a clear view of the teams if the crowd is not jammed together.

6. Never offer a dog treats and

always ask before petting. Naturally, if a dog shows signs of nervousness, this is not the time to form an alliance with him. He has important business at hand and should not be distracted.

7. Keep toddlers in hand. We want everyone to have a good time. To insure there are no mishaps, make sure your children are well behaved. Keep small children at your side and explain how the race works to

older children and insist that they obey rules.

8. Pick a team to cheer for. Get acquainted with the drivers through the race program and observation in the holding area. Having a favorite to root for makes the race a lot more interesting, just as it does in other sports, and the drivers appreciate your support.

The first order of business was the continuation of the public hearing on the request of Mr. Richard Willard for a sideline variance in an R-2 Family Zone to allow the construction of an attached two-stall garage to within one foot of the south property line.

Manager Quada read again the letter from Mrs. Geraldine Romaine, the neighbor to the south, in opposition to the variance. Mrs. Romaine was again present. Mr. Quada stated that by instructions by the Council, he had looked at the property, and made some measurements. He stated that the distance between Mrs. Romaine's porch and Mr. Willard's house is only 14 feet, not 17 feet as stated in Mr. Willard's drawing.

Mrs. Romaine stated that she would not be adverse to the one-foot set back if the garage could be located back further on the lot, to his rear house line, or farther.

Councilman Fonger suggested that the out-building located at the rear house line be moved farther back on the property to allow for the garage.

Mayor Collins stated that he felt that the ordinances were there to protect people, and if someone said no, they definitely did not want something, they should abide by those wishes and uphold the ordinance.

Manager Quada stated that as long as Mrs. Romaine is not against granting the variance if the garage is located farther back on the property, the Council has the power to change the variance, and grant it under different specifications.

Mr. Willard was not present to agree or disagree with the

changing of the location of the garage, and Council concurred not to grant a variance at this time.

The hearing was closed at 8:12 P.M.

Manager Quada then stated that Mr. Biggs, City Auditor was ill, and not able to be here for the Audit Report. It will be postponed until the next meeting.

Council then discussed the possible sale of City-owned park property. Manager Quada stated that according to charter law, if the land is a part of the Master Plan, it can only be sold by a three-fifth's vote of the electorate. If it is not designated in the Master Plan, or is excess land not needed, it can then be placed up for bids.

Councilman Christiansen asked if this would be more in the way of an exchange of land, rather than a sale. If property were purchased by Michigan Wire, developed into ball diamonds, and then traded for the existing ball diamond property at Recreation Park.

Manager Quada replied that it would have to be determined how much both pieces of property were worth, and if one ball diamond plus cash, or two ball diamonds would equal the value of the existing diamond, etc.

Councilman Christiansen suggested that if and when any proposal is offered, that the Planning Commission and/or Parks Commission should be involved for study and input.

There were no citizen suggestions.

Under the Manager's report, Manager Quada presented the list of meeting dates for the Council and Planning Commission for 1984.

The following resolution was offered by Councilman Fonger, supported by Councilman Maatman for adoption.

Manager Quada reported that recently passed State legislation would now allow local taxpayers to address the local Board of Review by written statement, rather than having to appear in person, which can be time consuming and costly to those who must take time off from work. Each municipality must adopt a resolution to allow the procedure in their community.

The following resolution was offered by Councilman Christiansen for adoption, supported by Councilman Schneider.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the property owners and taxpayers of the City of Lowell are hereby allowed and authorized to address the Lowell City Board of Review with a petition of protest in writing, rather than in person, if necessary to do so.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution in no way takes away the right to appear in person, if the property owner and taxpayer wishes to do so. It is intended only as a convenience.

Carried.

Manager Quada also headed a discussion on the collection of school taxes in the Summer, along with the City's operating millage.

He explained that with City's approval to collect 50% of the local Lowell Area School District tax, it would approximately even out the amounts collected for Summer and Winter taxes. However, the Kent Intermediate School District also tacked on the collection of all of their operation millage to the Summer tax bill, making the Summer collection 58% of the total for the year, and the Winter tax collection 42%. He suggested that perhaps next year the City should vote not to collect the Kent Intermediate School District tax in the Summer.

He also questioned the "Subsidizing" of townships in their collection of school taxes. Lowell and Vergennes Townships charge the Schools approximately \$2.00 per parcel (based on the percentage of the tax amount collected) to collect school taxes, and with their now collecting twice a year, a bigger share is being paid to the townships of the monies collected, while the City always has waived a collection fee. City taxpayers should not have to foot the bill to subsidize township collection fees.

Under Remarks from Council, Mayor Collins announced the installation of the Helen Look-Daley Memorial Plaque in the lobby of City Hall. The plaque contains brass tags inscribed with the various projects funded by the Committee.

Manager Quada also acknowledged the gift to the City of the large Christmas Wreath in the Lobby by the Lowell Area Arts Council. The wreath was made by local floral artist, Mary Ann Kellogg for the 1983 Annual Fallasburg Fall Festival.

IT WAS THEN MOVED by Councilman Christiansen to adjourn at 8:34 P.M.

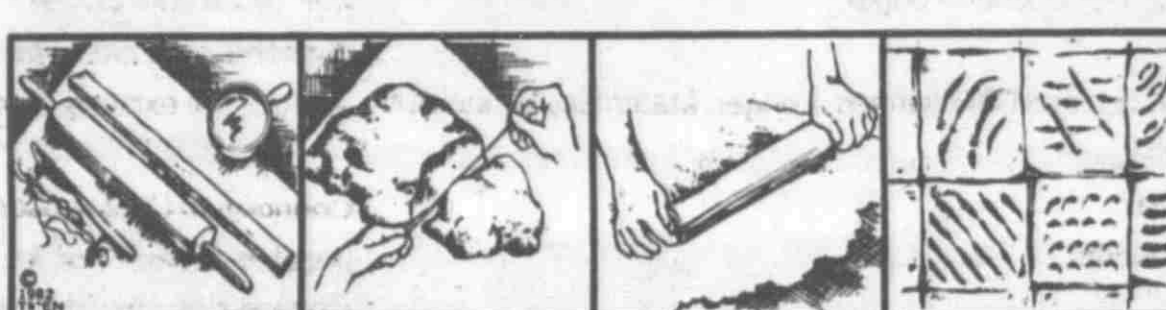

Doing MORE... With LESS!



MAKE YOUR OWN TILES

Refractory companies, brickyards, and building suppliers usually sell dry bonding clay, which is an inexpensive and excellent tile material. For your "learning the ropes" first try, prepare about five gallons of commercial mix (or the same amount of moistened field-dug clay) before tackling the following procedure.

The morning after your first clay mixing, pour off any water that's standing on the top of the bucket and spread a sheet of plastic or canvas on the ground in full sunlight. Now the fun starts! (If you're using backyard clay, you won't need to pour off anything.)

Reach down into the pail, scoop up the whole soft, gooey mess, and plop it onto the sheet. Smooth the material out with your hands and let it dry for several days. (A tip: Cleaning up is best done outdoors because clay clogs drains.)

While your "raw material" is lounging in the sunshine, you can prepare a place to work. Since this is a messy project, a table in the basement or garage would be best. You'll need a piece of plywood (at least 2' X 2'... preferably even larger) covered with burlap, canvas, or an old sheet. A rolling pin, a table knife, a one-inch-wide wood slat, and a piece of string—two or three feet long—are all the tools you'll need.

When the clay has dried to the point that it's no longer sticky, bring it to your work area. Cut off a chunk about the size of a cabbage head and set it on the cloth-covered board.

Now, the material must be wedged. This is a process similar to kneading bread, except that it's aimed at eliminating—rather than adding—air. (Any "pockets" will expand when the clay is fired and can cause a tile to explode... so wedging is very important.) First, sprinkle about one-fourth cup of sand on the board... the grit will add strength as it works into your tile material.

Next, lift the clay up over your head and slam it down hard several times. Knead it by pushing it back and forth. Continue this operation for about five minutes, then cut the clay in half with the string. If the surface of the cut is smooth—revealing no air holes or crevices—you're ready to fashion some tiles.

Whack the two pieces back together and slap the clay down on the board a few more times. Then beat the clay with your fists until it's about 1" thick.

Flip it over and—keeping the pressure even—use your rolling pin to further flatten the "mud pastry"... as if you were making a pie crust. Periodically, lift the sheet and turn it upside down so that it doesn't get stuck to the board. After it's been rolled to a thickness of approximately 3/8", lift the "dough" one last time, set it down gently, and smooth it out with the rolling pin. Use your wood slat and a sharp knife to trim off the ragged edges, leaving a nice, even rectangle.

Tiles can be made in any shape or size that you wish, but usually the small (about one inch) squares are strongest. Use your wood slat and knife to cut the rectangle into a grid of squares.

It's best not to move your mini-ceramics for at least 24 hours. After that time has elapsed, though, you can take the tiles off the board and set them, face down, on a level, newspaper-covered surface. (Reversing the tiles helps them dry flat, so after yet another day, turn them back over to their original position.)

At this point, you can carve designs into the clay, but no matter how lovely your creations may be, they won't be permanent until they're fired. You can "cure" your handiwork in a fireplace, in a woodstove, or in an outdoor open pit. Even though these different methods are all relatively simple, they require more instruction than we have room for here. However, the free reprint mentioned at the end of this column gives you complete details for firing your creations.

Your homemade tiles can be used in any application where store-bought "ceramics" would normally be called for. To fasten them to walls or floors, purchase some grout at your local hardware store and follow the directions on the can. For outdoor use, lay them in a bed of sand.

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GARDEN CORNER

The changing seasons don't halt the flow of lawn and garden questions. Extension specialists at Michigan State University answer timely queries on house plants, vegetable gardening, fruit growing, landscape plants and other topics:

Q. Several of my house plants are dropping leaves. Could they have contracted some kind of disease while they were outdoors for the summer?

A. That's possible. But if you don't see any other signs of disease, chances are that your plants are merely reacting to vastly reduced light levels, especially if you moved them indoors abruptly, with no chance to adjust gradually to the change.

January Skies. . .

January offers sky-watchers what may be the most interesting meteor shower of 1984 and a display of all nine planets, says University of Michigan astronomy Prof. Richard G. Teske.

"The Quadrantid meteors may be seen in the dark northeast sky after midnight until early dawn Jan. 4. They appear to come from an area between the handle of the Big Dipper and the key stone-shaped constellation of Hercules to the lower right of the handle," Teske says.

"Between one and three meteors per minute should be seen, especially if viewed from a dark location. Observation will be assisted by a nearly new moon that will not light up the sky to hamper visibility."

Although the Quadrantids usually provide a good show, Teske notes that Upper Midwesterners may not be able to see it because of the low temperatures and high incidence of cloudiness at this time of year.

He explains that a meteor shower "occurs when the Earth encounters a stream of dust and gravel debris shed from a comet. The tiny meteoritic pieces follow their own independent orbital track around the sun, like a swarm of miniature planets.

"Their orbit intersects our Earth's orbital path. When the

Earth reaches the intersection point, some of the debris plunges into the upper atmosphere at speeds of many miles a second. The result is a shower of meteorers."

During the last two weeks of January, all nine planets will be on view for early risers.

"Uranus, Neptune, and Pluto will be too faint to be seen without a telescope," Teske points out, "but the other five will sparkle brightly along a great arc from high in the southwest of the eastern horizon at dawn."

Mars is highest, located in the south-southwest. Eastward from it is fainter Saturn. A greater distance eastward from Saturn is brilliant Venus, drawing closer to the sun on its way to pass behind it and emerge later this year as our evening star.

"Venus moves downwards from day to day towards Jupiter, still close to the southeast horizon at dawn. The two will pass quite close to one another on Jan. 26.

"Mercury will become visible around the 13th of the month when it will be seen very near to Jupiter," Teske says. "The two planets will keep company for a week. Then Mercury will begin to sink back down towards the rising sun as it too swings behind the sun along its orbit."

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
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
