Lowell Police Officers cited Ricky Lee Gould, 21, of Clarksville on a charge of larceny under \$100. Gould reportedly failed to pay for gasoline at the Lowell Crystal Flash on Wednesday, February 1. Gould is to appear in 63rd District Court at a later date.

David Riggs, 39, of Lowell was cited for violation of the city's junk ordinance on Monday, February 13.

Phillip Oosterwal, 20, of Grand Rapids was issued two citations to appear in 63rd District Court. Oosterwal was cited for transporting an open container of alcohol and possession of marijuana on Friday, February 17.

David Swearingen, 18, of Lowell was issued a citation for transporting an open container of alcohol in a motor vehicle on Monday, February 13. Swearingen is to appear at a later date in 63rd District Court.

Tamara Lichte, 22, of Saranac was slightly injured early Sunday, February 19 in an accident that occurred on Lowell's East Main Street near Horatio. Lichte was a passenger in a vehicle driven by George Stone, 23, of Ionia. Stone reported to Lowell Officers that his car was struck from behind by a vehicle driven by Joseph Leson, 22, of Caledonia. Leson then allegedly led Lowell Police on a 2 mile chase south of the city. When Leson was finally stopped he was arrested for fleeing and eluding police officers, driving while under the influence of alcohol and driving while visually impaired (second offense). Leson was jailed at the Kent County Jail until his arraignment on Tuesday, February 21.

Firm of Skidmore, Owings & Merrill of Chicago was recognized by the American Institute of Architects as a small, but significant building design in 1983. The powerhouse was also covered in the January edition of "Architecture", a slick magazine published by the AIA. The powerhouse warranted two color photos along with a "before" black and white shot. The article covered two pages in the prestigious periodical.

The Fallsburg Powerhouse and dam were rebuilt, by STS Consultants, Ltd. in a cooperative venture between them and Kent County. STS had to repair, replace or reconstruct the ravages of neglect, vandalism and time since it was boarded up nearly 20 years ago.

To complete the project, the powerhouse walls were patched, re-stuccoed and painted to include delicate stenciling above the interior wainscoat. When the tar paper was removed prior to the application of a new slate roof, workers discovered that there had once been a cupola on the building. Using old documents, a new one was designed and built. Doors and windows were redesigned and rebuilt using scraps and fragments found in the building. Documents of the period were searched for the design of the sign on the power house. The extensive landscaping was designed to not only beautify the site, but to stop erosion of the steep bank near the powerhouse.

The dam and powerhouse were built in 1903 and were in continuous use as a hydroelectric plant until the 1960's. Besides the renovation of the powerhouse, area residents benefit from the flooding of the reservoir which serves as a fish and game haven for sportsmen as well as a scenic improvement to the Fallsburg area.

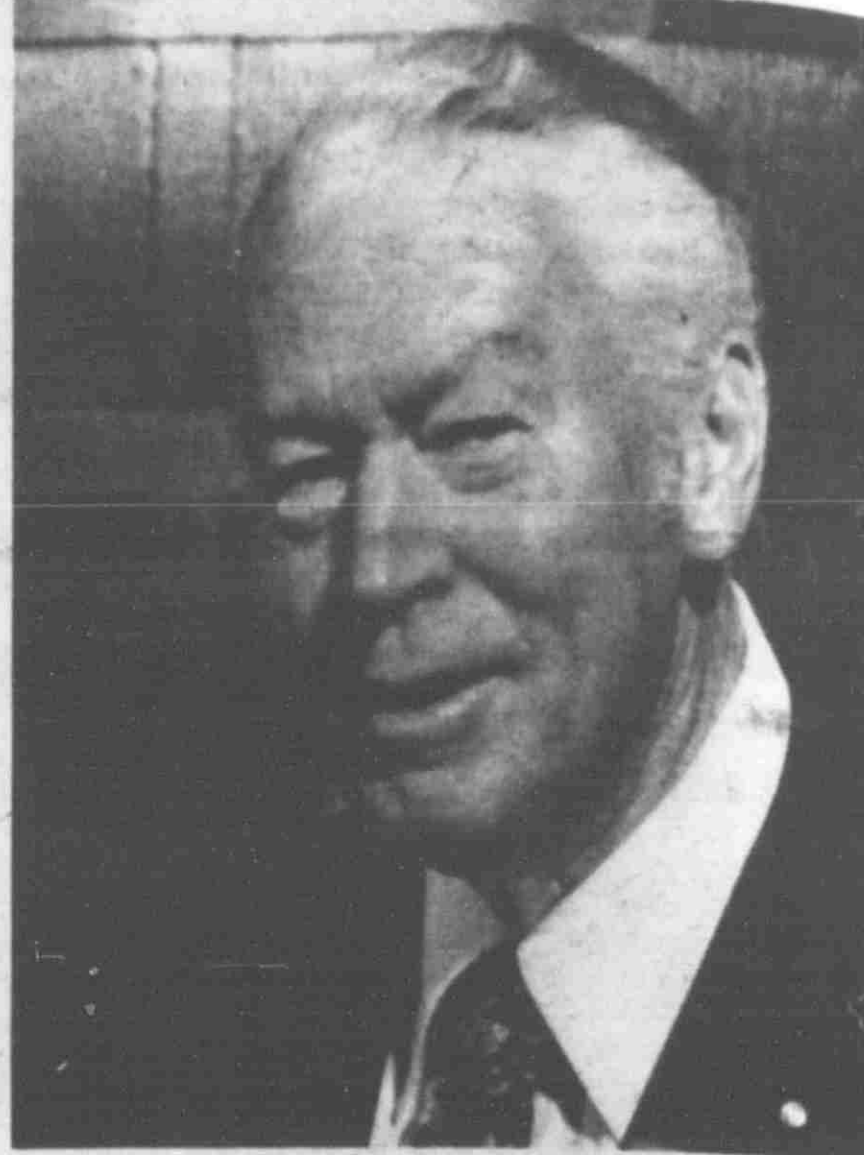

Freestyle Wrestling begins Feb. 28

The Lowell Freestyle Wrestling club will begin practice for the 1984 season on Tuesday Feb. 28, at 6:30 P.M. at the High School wrestling room. All boys ages 5-14 are welcome to participate in the program.

Practice will last one and one half hours every Tuesday and Thursday. Practice equipment will consist of T-shirt, gym shorts, socks and tennis shoes. All practices stress the fundamentals of Freestyle wrestling and will be under the supervision of the Lowell coaching staff.

A parent must accompany their boy Tuesday night to verify age, fill out insurance forms and pay their fees. No one will be allowed to practice until the above is completed. There will be a meeting for parents also, to go

over new rules, and new business and old.

If the boy intends to participate in any of the practices or tournaments, he must join the Michigan - United States Wrestling Federation. A membership card and insurance is \$8.00. Every tournament has an entry fee of \$3.00. It is suggested you join the Lowell wrestling Club (membership \$20.00).

This includes membership card for Michigan - USWF, Insurance coverage, 4 developmental tournaments, Districts, Regionals, and State Tournaments.

All boys will wrestle within a specific age group (5-8, 9-10, 11-12, 13-14) and weight classifications. At no time will a boy be "overmatched", as to his weight or age.

The first fundamental tournament will be held the weekend of March 9-10.

Lowell is holding that tournament. We will have our older boys (13-14) wrestle Friday night, and our younger boys (5-8, 9-10, 11-12) on Saturday.

Clubs from all over will come to compete with our boys! Such clubs as Cedar Springs, Greenville, Northveiw, Forest Hills, Lakewood.

Being the First tournament of the season there is a lot of excitement and anticipation for all the boys involved in this sport. We hope we will see you all there that weekend to cheer on all our young future Lowell wrestlers.

None of this seemed to bother the Red Arrows Friday as they played almost flawless ball to defeat the Yellow Jackets 77-63.

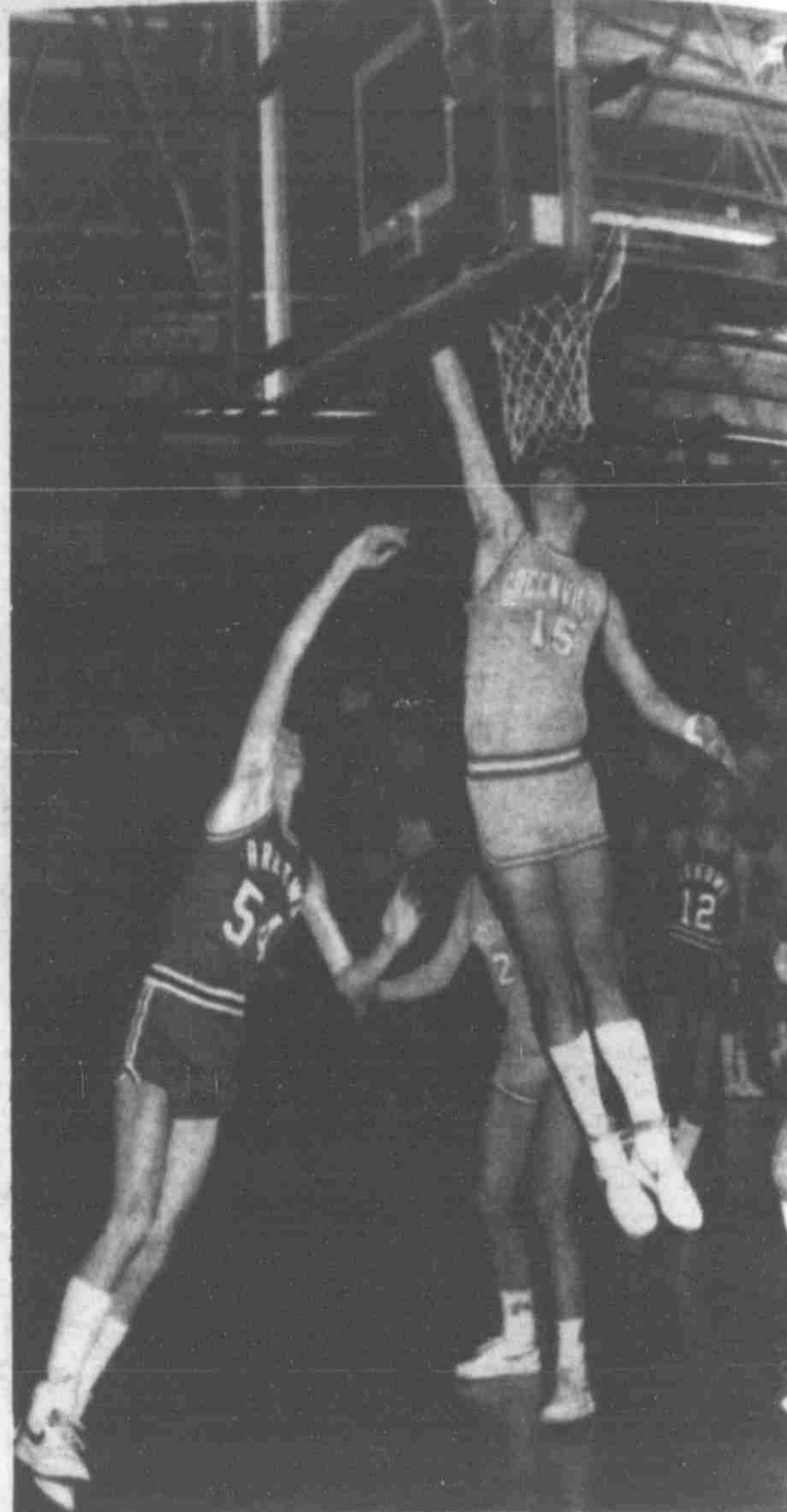

FIRST AID FOR POISONING

SWALLOWED POISONS . . . If the person is awake and able to swallow, give milk or water only. Then call the poison center or doctor. Caution: Antidote labels on products and antidote charts may be out of date and incorrect. DO NOT give salt, vinegar, or citrus fruit juice.

POISONS ON THE SKIN . . . Remove any affected clothing. Flood involved parts with water, wash with soap and water, and rinse. Then call the poison center or doctor.

POISONS IN THE EYE . . . Flood the eye with lukewarm (never hot) water, poured from a pitcher held 3-4 inches from the eye for 15 minutes. Then call the poison center or MD.

INHALED POISONS . . . Immediately, carry or drag the person to fresh air and give mouth-to-mouth resuscitation if necessary. Ventilate the area. Then call poison center or MD.

Always keep on hand syrup of Ipecac, which induces vomiting, and epsom salts, which acts as a laxative. Do not use either one unless instructed to do so by the poison center or your doctor, and follow their directions for use.

SOME COMMON SUBSTANCES & POSSIBLE SYMPTOMS OF OVERDOSE

The following list is designed to make you aware of some of the potentially toxic substances in the environment. Always call for assistance immediately after a poison exposure. NEVER wait until symptoms appear.

PERSONAL PRODUCTS
Nail polish remover—irritation and dryness inside mouth and esophagus.
Perfume, after-shaves, mouthwashes, rubbing alcohol—incordination, depression, coma, convulsions.

Ammonia, bleach, dishwasher soap, disinfectants, drain cleaners, toilet bowl cleaners—irritation or chemical burns in mouth and esophagus.
Furniture polish, bleach mixed with other cleansers—burning irritation, coughing.
Laundry detergents, soaps—vomiting and/or diarrhea.

GARAGE & GARDEN PRODUCTS
Acids, adhesives—chemical burns.
Antifreeze—coma, blindness, convulsions, drunkenness.
Fertilizers—vomiting and/or diarrhea.
Gasoline, kerosene, turpentine, paint thinners, solvents, thinners, degreasers, charcoal lighter fluid—coughing, coma, burning irritation.
Insecticides—headache, increased body secretions, vomiting, diarrhea, convulsions.
Strychnine—convulsions.

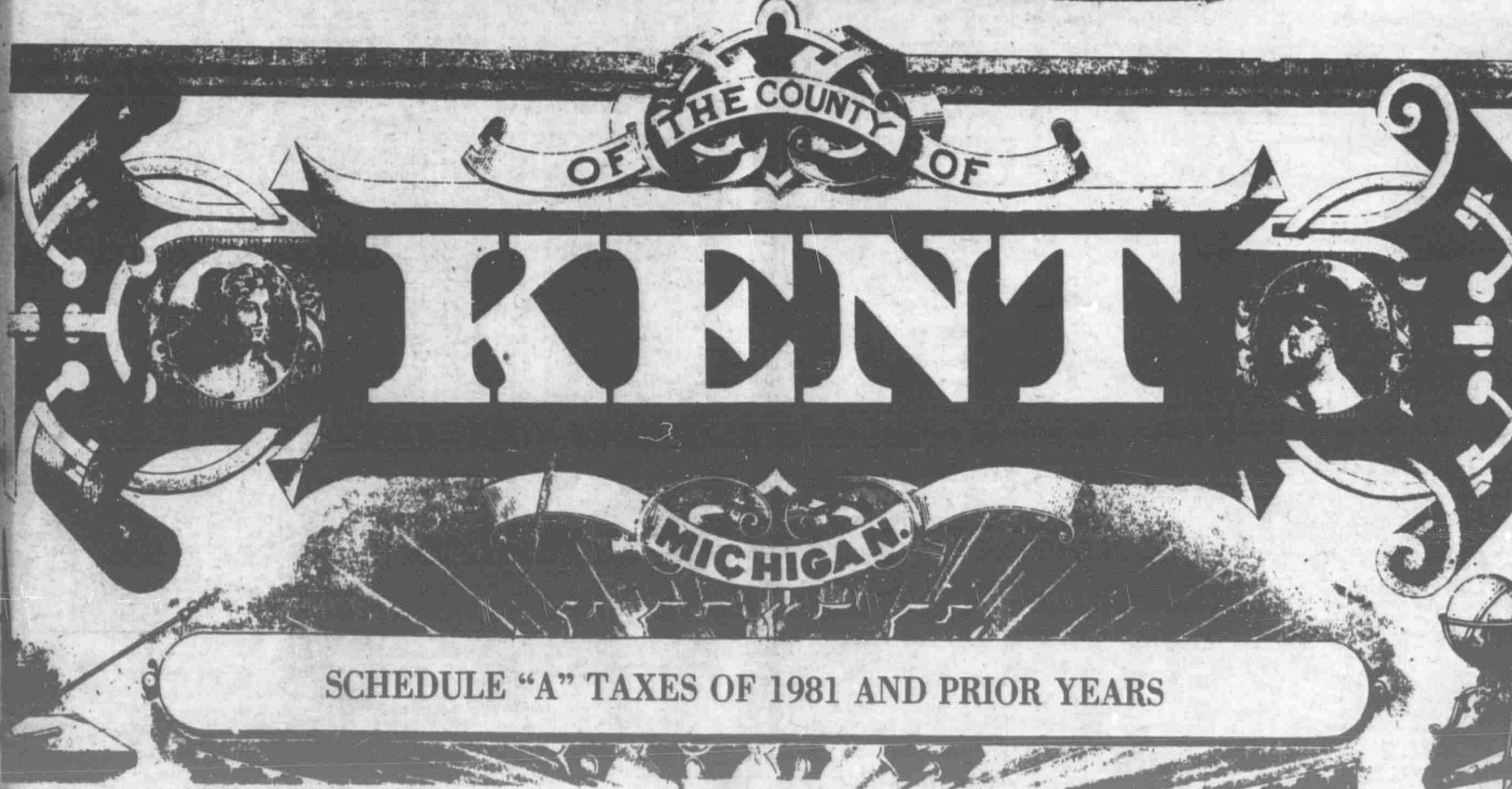
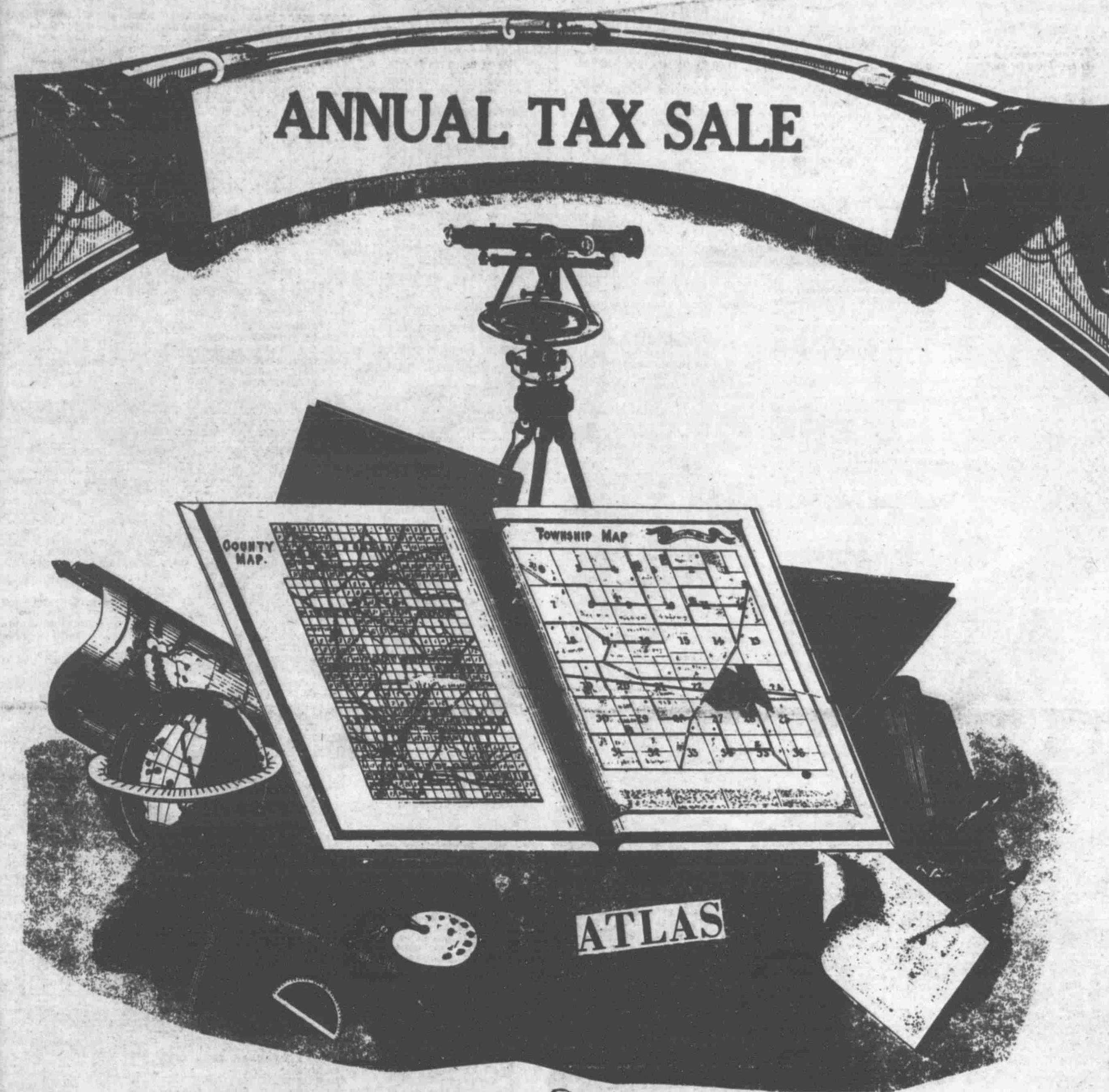
