Plans for proposed softball complex unveiled

Members of the Lowell Parks Commission unveiled their initial plan for a four diamond softball complex at the city's Gee Drive park, during the Lowell City Council meeting of Tuesday, February 20. The westernmost field which is currently under construction would be the primary field in the complex and would be the first to be lighted.

Some very rough, and purposely high estimates of cost were as follows; construction of fields - \$45,000, landscaping - \$17,500, rest rooms and concession building - \$77,000, playground \$10,000, parking lot - \$18,000 and lights \$30,000. As was quickly pointed out by City Manager Ray Quada, "these are all Cadillac prices for the purpose of

showing costs if we go top shelf all the way".

The Parks Commission's plan seemed to be pretty well received by representatives from the Lowell YMCA and Bob Ford who has been very active in adult softball here in recent years. Jim Hodges, Lowell YMCA director said that such a facility would be a great benefit to Lowell softball leagues, and threw out some figures to give the council an idea of how much softball is played here in the summer. Hodges said that he expects Lowell to have 114 softball and baseball teams this summer, including the Little League organized last year. That equates out to 12-14 games played each evening throughout the summer, plus much activity in weekend leagues.

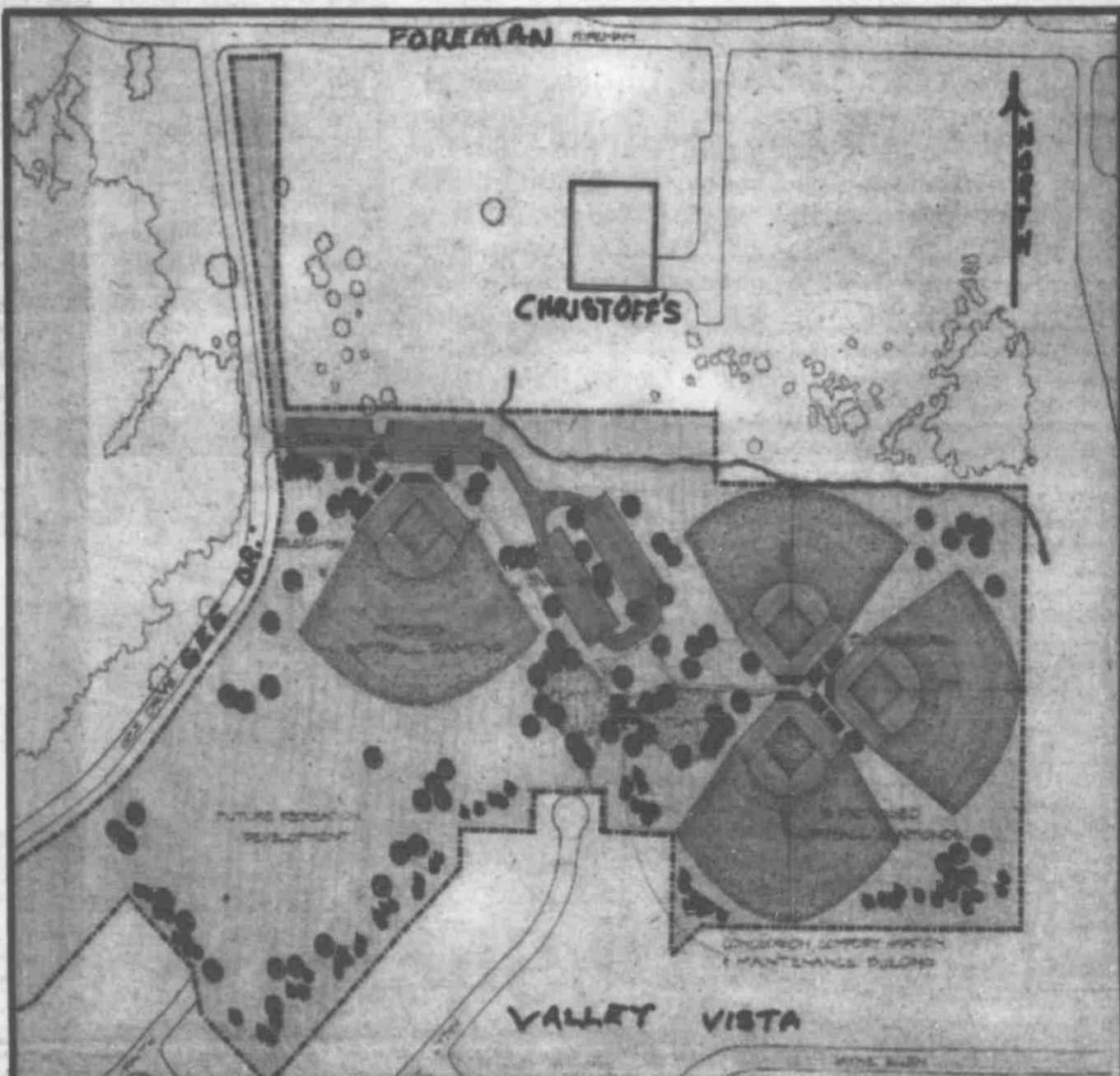
Michigan Wire Processing is currently in a growth dilemma and has offered the ideas of helping construct a new softball complex in exchange for the existing softball/baseball diamond in Recreation Park. Michigan Wire is land locked with the only possibilities being to expand onto the ball diamond or move. The City Council has vowed not to make any trade of City park property without the approval by a vote of the people. Much negotiation between the city and Michigan Wire Processing lies ahead before any proposal will appear on a ballot.

Downtown fix-up drawings are now complete

Members of the Lowell Planning Commission were shown the final renderings of suggested improvements to all the Main Street Buildings in Lowell's central business district Monday night. The City's engineers WBDC Architects and Engineers drew the buildings to show inexpensive yet effective methods of dressing up the downtown using color coordinated paint schemes, awnings and removal of deteriorated facades. The emphasis in most cases is on doing things that bring out the beauty in the original building, such as brick and cornice work.

The drawings are part of the plan that has about \$90,000 in federal funding behind it to be used in upgrading the downtown. The city has not decided how the money will be distributed. WBDC is putting together some cost estimates for following through with the drawings of a typical block, and will present them at a meeting of all the merchants in the central business district. Some businesses have indicated that they might be willing to forego their share of the funding and pay for their own restoration if it meant that their share could be used by another business owner who could not otherwise afford improvements.

The meeting will be scheduled sometime in March, and notice will be made in the Ledger.



Superior plans expansion

Superior Furniture Co., a landmark business here for about 80 years is planning a major expansion of their facility at 318 East Main Street. William J. Lee, an officer and shareholder in the company told members of the Lowell Planning Commission that he is planning construction of an 80' x 120' addition on the east side of the existing structure. The entrance and offices will be moved into the front of the new building, along with the addition of an employee lunch room, the rest of the building will be primarily warehouse with two truck loading docks at the south end.

Lee told the planners that he is working with the Dan Vos Construction Co. on the project. The front of the new addition will be designed to look like the existing building, complete with arched windows and a white painted brick facade.

Superior currently owns the entire block with the exception of the Lowell Granite Co. on the northwest corner, and the Vera Sherman residence near the southeast corner. Lee said that the firm is negotiating to purchase the Sherman property. One major snag in the proposal is that much of the property to be built on is zoned commercial rather than industrial. The first step in getting the plan approved is a zoning change. Lee will finalize his plans and bring his case before the Zoning Board of appeals at a future date.

When asked if the addition would provide any more jobs, Lee said that a warehouse person might be needed. The space gained in the existing plant when the offices are moved would provide space for more production and could mean 2 or 3 more jobs there. Lee said that the company

currently employs about 37 or 38 people, most of which have been with the Superior Co. for many years.

McDonalds site plan approved

Lowellites may be munching on "Big Macs" by Memorial Day if all goes well with McDonalds Corporation's plan to build one of their restaurants here. Bob Shippel, real estate manager for McDonalds in Michigan spoke to the Lowell Planning Commission at their meeting of Monday, February 27. If four minor zoning variances requested by the firm could be granted by the Zoning Board of Appeals at their scheduled meeting of March 19, construction could begin as early as late March, according to Shippel. Shippel said that normal

construction times is 75 to 80 days, and added that the new restaurant could be open by Memorial Day. The Planning Commission unanimously gave their approval to the plan pending the granting of the zoning variances.

McDonalds has an option to buy a lot located on West Main Street between Thomet Chevrolet and Buick and Heritage Meat Market. Their option is for the east 170' of frontage by 300' deep. The property runs all the way to Bowes Road, and the

City Council OK's phone system

The Lowell City Council voted to approve the expenditure of \$10,993 for a new telephone system for the city hall, police department, fire station and department of public works.

The system should provide a well organized communications design that will allow for orderly growth with state of the art equipment. Three companies bid on the system but neither Michigan Bell nor A.T.&T. were among them. The system was designed by and bid specifications were compiled by G.J. Orphan & Associates, consulting engineers. Orphan projects that the system will pay for itself compared to leasing from the phone company, in four to five years.

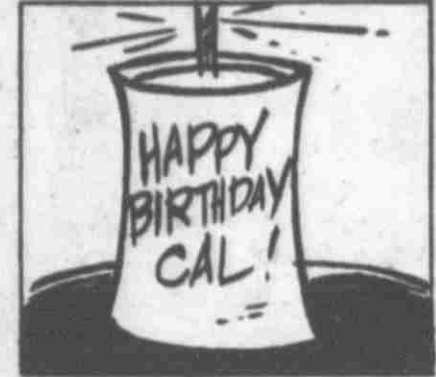

Immediately following the recalls of former State Senators Mastin and Serotkin, I was optimistic that Governor Blanchard and the remaining legislators in Lansing would get a message from the recalls. However, Governor Blanchard's policies demonstrate that he is committed to his political party, special interest groups and furthering his own political career.

Governor Blanchard recently stated that the importance of rebuilding Michigan for the future transcends anyone's political career. If he truly believes this statement, then why doesn't he begin working with the majority of citizens he has been elected to represent? As one whom his mother comforteth, so will I comfort you... (Isaiah 66:13).

Children are amusing. When they fall and bruise a knee or scratch an arm, how quickly they run to Mother! As soon as she has kissed the injured member, the pain vanishes and the tears stop falling. Then the child skips away to resume his play. What consolation, what medicinal value, what healing is found in a mother's kiss!

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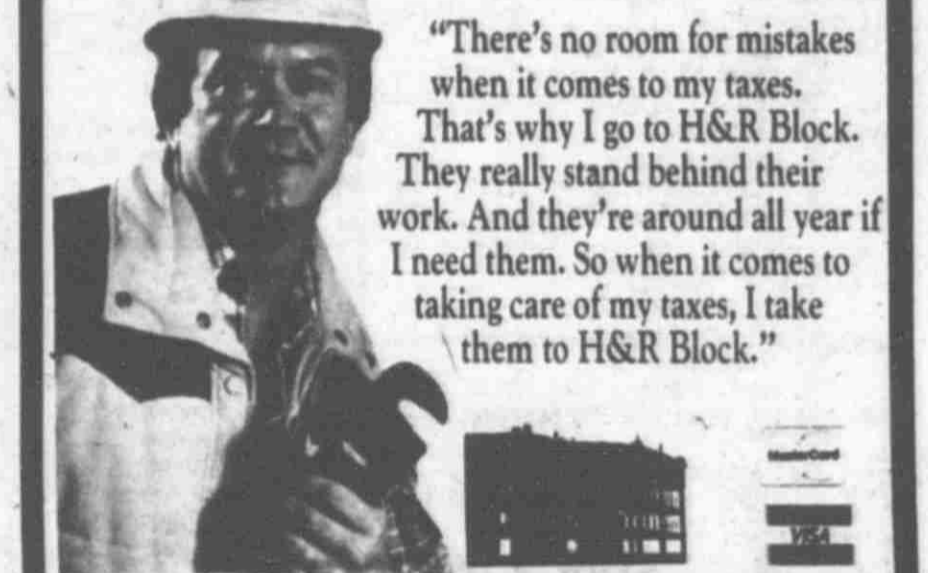

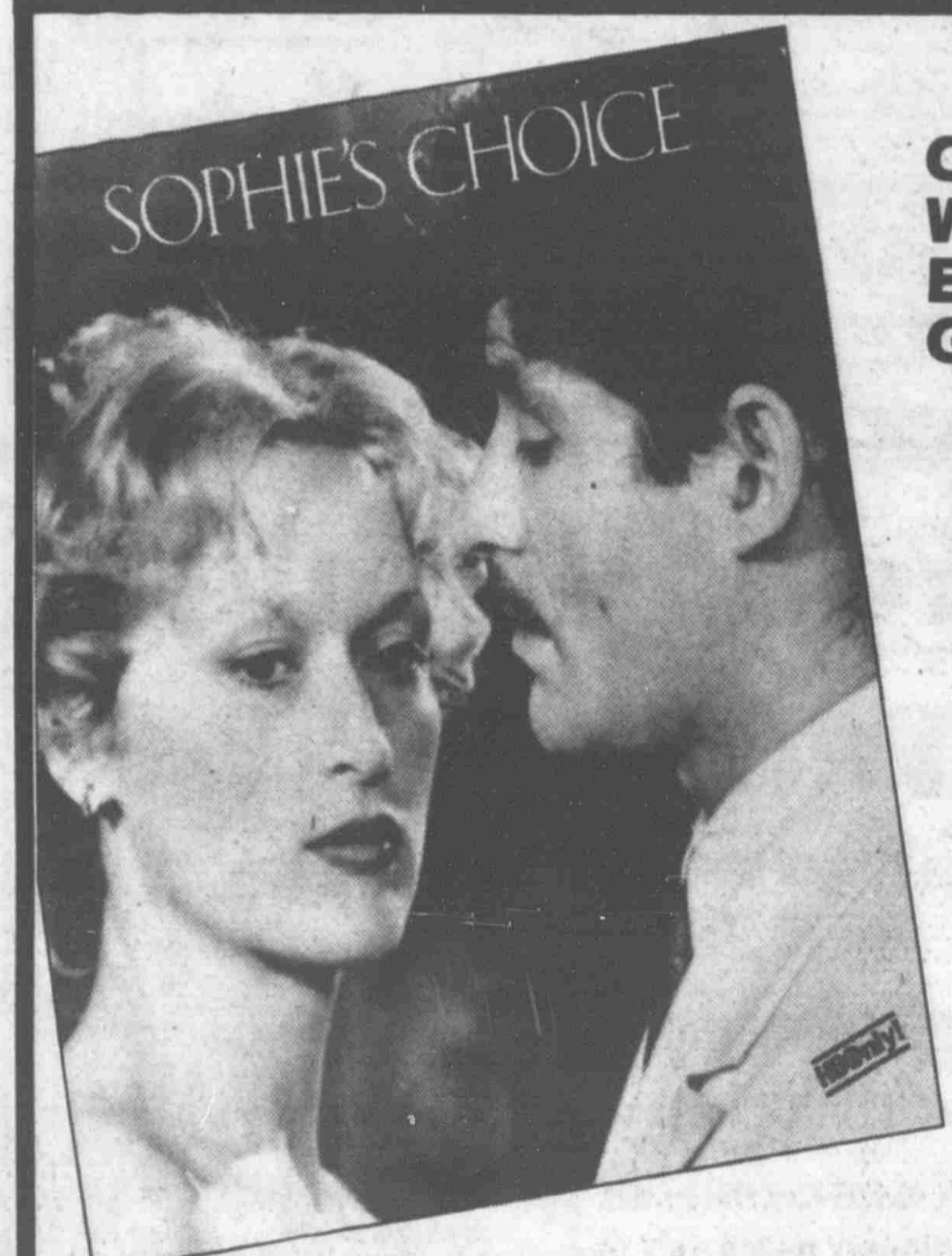

NOTICE STATEWIDE TROUT AND SALMON REGULATIONS

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on January 13, 1984, under the authority of Act 165, P.A. 1929, as amended, and Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, ordered that for the period beginning April 1, 1984, and ending March 31, 1987, no person shall possess, take or attempt to take, any species of trout or salmon from any of the waters of this state except by hook and line during the open seasons prescribed, and within the minimum size limits and maximum possession limits indicated below.

Statewide open seasons on all streams and designated trout lakes shall be from the last Saturday in April through September 30 (longer on waters designated by the Director for extended fishing under Act 165) on all trout and salmon. Statewide open seasons on all other inland lakes and the Great Lakes shall be any time for all trout and salmon except on Lake Huron and its tributary streams and on Lake Michigan and its tributary streams the season on lake trout is from May 1 through August 15.

Size limits shall be 8 inches in Lower Peninsula streams, 7 inches on Upper Peninsula streams, and 10 inches on all lakes except the daily possession limit for trout and salmon shall be 5 fish singly or in combination but no more than 2 lake trout or splake from Lake Michigan and its tributary streams or 3 lake trout or splake from Lake Superior and Lake Huron and their tributary streams, except that an additional 5 brook or brown trout may be taken from streams from the last Saturday in April through September 30 only.

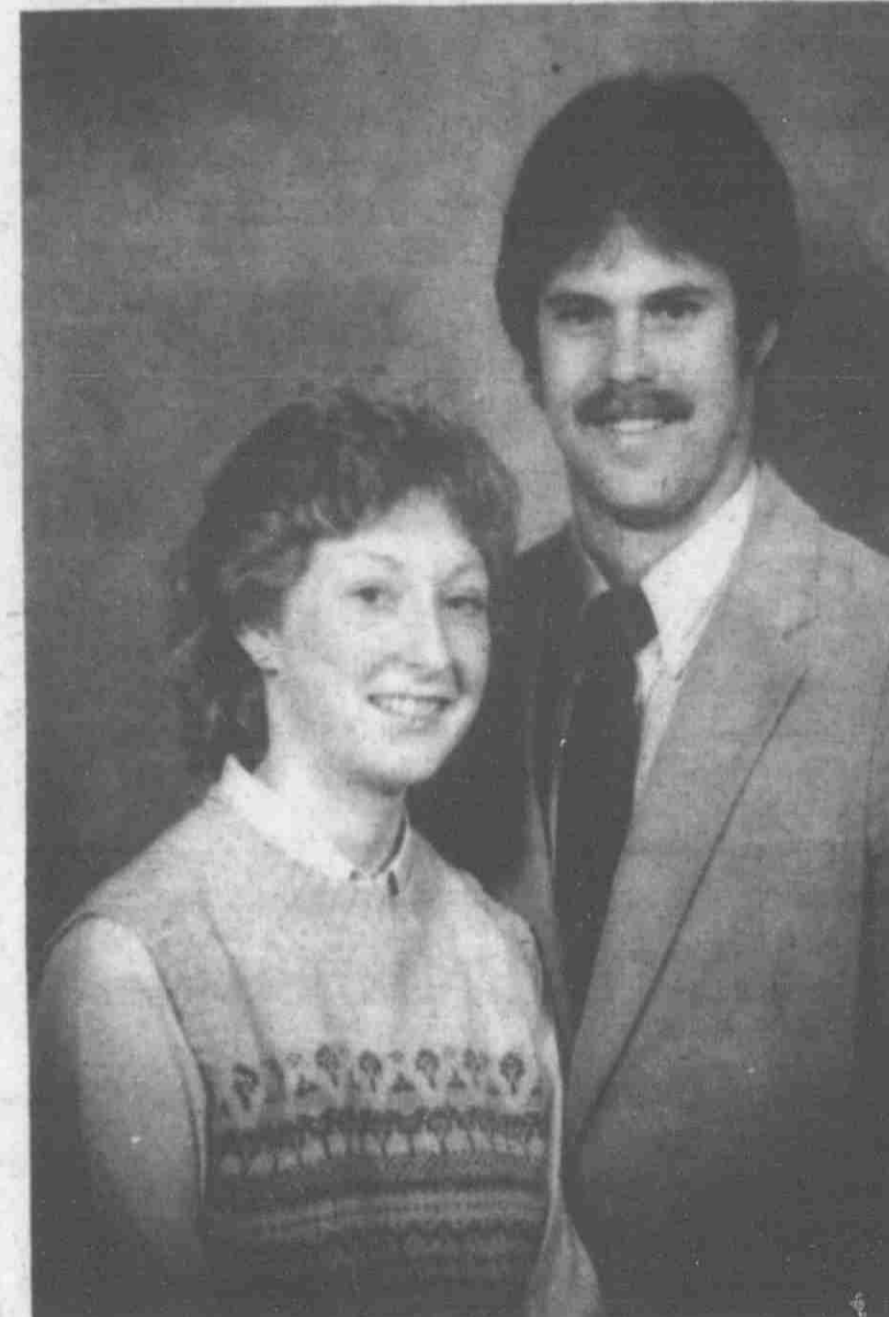

owner elected to keep a 30' easement along the east boundary to service the southern portion of the parcel from Main Street. Shippel said that McDonalds could have used the entire 200' of frontage, eliminating the need for at least two of the variances.

Since the lot is narrow, both the entrance sign to the west and the exit sign on the east must be

placed closer to the property lines than the City's side lot ordinance allows. As proposed, the west sign is 10' too close, and the east is 4' too near the property line. The other two variances concern the larger pylon sign. The standard sign used by McDonalds, and the one proposed here is 10.3 sq. ft. larger than the City ordinance allows

for. Because of the confined site plan, the pylon is placed only 13' back from the Main Street right of way, rather than the required 25' sq. in the set back ordinance. It was noted by city planner Dennis Larkin, that both Thomets and Heritage Meat Market's sign are set back about the same distance that McDonalds is proposing.

The proposed restaurant is pretty typical of the McDonalds restaurants that we are all accustomed to. The building is 34' x 87' with seating inside and a drive-thru window. Shippel said that a management team will probably be moved here from another restaurant, but other employees will be hired locally, adding that these restaurants typically employ from 60 to 70 persons.

The Ledger was told at an earlier date, and reported that the

Lowell McDonalds would likely be a company owned store. That is not now the case. Shippel stated at the Meeting Monday, that Al Symons of Grand Rapids will own this franchise. Shippel said that Symons owns several restaurants and has been involved with McDonalds for 21 years.

Lowell City Manager Ray Quada asked Shippel how McDonalds decided to build in Lowell, noting that the construction of a McDonalds in an area

often indicated that the area was destined to grow, Shippel said that McDonalds has a "very extensive" marketing department, and an area or community is thoroughly researched before a McDonalds is built there. Such things as population, income brackets, average ages, community loyalty and traffic past the site are all taken into consideration before a decision is made. Shippel said that Lowell must have scored well, or a restaurant would not be going in here.
