Red Arrows head for Regional Tournament

The home stands went wild Saturday as the final buzzer sounded, making the hosting Red Arrows District tournament Champions for the first time since 1978. The Arrows defeated Ionia, Tuesday night 71-59, took conference rival Greenville 68-62 Thursday night, and ousted Portland 56-55 to win the finals Saturday night.

Jim Hostler, who was a big key in the whole tournament, and Jason Barber, were leading

scorers for the week with 45 points apiece. Other high scorers were Luka Ivanovic with 39 points, Craig Potter with 33, and Pat Brown who chipped in 25 points.


Hostler also led all rebounders with 24 rebounds for the week. Brown had 23 and Potter added 22.

Coach Ken Akers was very pleased with the Arrows' performance. "The kids just played super," he said.

The Arrows now advance to the first round of regional competition Thursday night. The game will be played against Delton-Kellogg at Ford Fieldhouse. The winner of this game will face the winner of the Okemos - East Grand Rapids game in the regional finals Saturday night, also at Ford Fieldhouse. This winner will go on to Michigan State University to play in the State quarterfinals. People who wish to attend these games are encouraged to get their tickets as soon as possible, as they are going fast. Tickets can be picked up at the High School.

When asked how he feels about the upcoming games, Akers replied, "We'd definitely like our chances at regionals. We think we've got a chance. Who knows, maybe we'll find ourselves at Michigan State."

state and federal sources. Included are the United Way of Kent County, County of Kent, City of Grand Rapids, Michigan Office of Substance Abuse, Department of Social Services and private contributions.

Project REHAB programs are licensed by the State of Michigan Department of Social Services

and Michigan Department of Public Health/Office of Substance Abuse Services. In addition, programs are accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals (JCAH), the American Corrections Association (ACA) and are certified by Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Michigan.

Lippert to head Project REHAB

Board Okays 3 contracts

Following Board actions on the scheduled Lowell Board of Education agenda items at Monday night's meeting, Superintendent Fritz Esch presented the Board with a recommendation to extend three of the district's labor contracts one additional year. The Board gave its unanimous approval to extend the current teacher, custodian and secretarial contracts to the summer of 1986. All three contracts were scheduled to expire in 1985.

Esch explained that union officials and administration had informally explored the possibilities of extending the current contracts in late February and had been able to reach a mutually agreeable point. "When we reached that point" said Esch, "the Board was informally advised. Tonight's action is formal approval of the conditions we had agreed to at the table about two weeks ago."

The extended agreements include improving the teacher's base salary 5.9 percent during the 1985-86 school year and calls for 181 student instruction days and 185 teacher days. The extended secretarial contract calls for an average increase of 5.5% for 1985-86 over the 1984-85 salary schedule. Secretaries will have the day after Thanksgiving

as a paid holiday in 1985-86. The district's custodians also received an average 5.5% increase and some minor adjustment in contract language in their extended contract.

Roger Kropf, Board President, expressed the feelings of the Board stating that they were pleased with the extensions and felt that the conditions were fair and equitable for both parties. "We have many new things beginning to happen for kids in our district and tonight's action al-

lows us to continue concentrating on improving our programs for them without having to be concerned about negotiations. The Board is pleased with these agreements."

LEA President, Gayle Lycos said there was overwhelming support among the district's teachers to the extensions of the current contract. She said the same support was also found among the district's secretaries and custodians.

Capitol Column

So often in the course of legislative debate we hear the argument that government spending cuts mean taking food from the mouths of the poor.

But those of us who insist that government expenditures can indeed be reduced point to the pockets of government waste that rob the poor more than any attempt at making big government less cumbersome.

Never have I seen so dramatic or poignant an example of such waste than the City of Detroit's careless spoilage of federal surplus food intended for the poor.

Over 150 tons of food, stored in city warehouses, has spoiled due to lack of adequate refrigeration and contamination by droppings from birds, rats and insects. City trucks then took the food to the dump after hours. The haul included 1,200 turkeys totalling 12 tons; 36.8 tons of butter; 1,200 cases or 18 tons of cheese; 35 tons of all-purpose flour; 35 tons of bread flour; and 13 tons of rice. A rough USDA estimate of the total loss is more than \$200,000. The tonnage and the dollar loss are likely to grow.

And finally, what will be the fate of the tons of food still in storage in Detroit? If there's more than the Detroit soup kitchens need, let's get it distributed statewide and put an end to both hunger and waste in Michigan. Then, let the Legislature get to work on stamping out government waste. It's time to develop a more efficient method of helping the poor - and the answer just may not be throwing more money at the problem.



Michigan State University lists 1,683 candidates for degrees awarded at winter term commencement exercises Saturday, March 10, in the MSU Auditorium.

The degree candidates include 1,109 bachelor's, 395 master's, 147 doctoral, 12 educational specialists, 2 doctors of osteopathic medicine and 18 medical doctors.

Dr. Linda Wagner, professor of English and editor of MSU's prestigious quarterly magazine, "The Centennial Review," delivered the commencement address at the morning ceremonies for 1,109 undergraduates.

Dean Lawrence Von Tersch of MSU's College of Engineering was the speaker at afternoon ceremonies for graduate students.

MSU's winter term ends March 16. Registration for spring term is March 26 and 27 with classes resuming on March 28.

A total of 1,187 persons are on the official list of those who received degrees from Western Michigan University at the end of the fall semester of the 1983-84 school year. 
A missionary to India since



Ken Cochrum seeks 5th District office

Grand Rapids businessman, Ken Cochrum, 49, declared his candidacy for the Republican Party's nomination to be U.S. Representative from the 5th Congressional District at a Press Conference this morning.

"Western Michigan needs aggressive, decisive, new leadership in the Congress," Cochrum said. "The Congress needs members who are not professional politicians. The Congress needs people with business experience to assure that our economic recovery continues through the '80's," he continued.

Cochrum, who is President of Remex Corporation, a Grand Rapids based high tech information processing sales and service business, said he will take his campaign directly to the people

opponent of tax increases and would oppose any attempts to end the 1981 tax cut before it is due to expire. He also voiced strong opposition to the recent increase in the Michigan Income Tax.

"I would have opposed the huge 38% Blanchard Income Tax increase, . . . using my influence to try to stop it from becoming law," Cochrum exclaimed.

He said the answer to federal budget deficit is to cut spending, not raise taxes.

The father of three also discussed foreign affairs and the threat of war. "We must have a realistic policy that will protect

American interest, and see to it that we are not dragged into war," Cochrum said.

"Western Michigan needs strong new leadership in the Congress, I will provide the people with that type of "take charge", aggressive and decisive leadership when I am elected, Cochrum concluded.

The 5th District consists of all of Kent County, and parts of Allegan, Barry, Ionia and Newaygo. The district is now represented by U.S. Congressman Hal Sawyer, who has not yet announced whether he will run for re-election in 1984.

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'OUTDOORS' with Jack Friesner

I have some bad news and some good news this week. The bad news is that we have lost another swan. The bird's remains were discovered by Mr. Gary McWhinney of Lowell, on the south shore of Grand River at the confluence of Railroad Creek, between the Hudson Street and C&O Railroad bridges. I picked up the remains and turned them over to the DNR for investigation. The big bird had been mostly eaten but was not badly decomposed. I would place its death at probably about two weeks ago. Gary and myself both agree that the bird did not appear to have been killed by predators since the feathers and remains were not widely scattered. I hate to believe that anyone would be so ignorant as to shoot the bird but this appears, once again, to be the most probable cause.

The good news is in the local fishing outlook for the coming seasons. The forecast is for excellent fishing though the area. We have several lakes, streams and rivers within this area which have been planted by the DNR with sizeable numbers of game fish over a period of several years and in every instance these continuing plants have been conducted for a long enough period to produce a fair quantity of trophy fish.

The Coldwater River system from Carlton Center Downstream to the Thornapple River will produce some Brown Trout in the seven to eight pound class with a fair number of fish in the five pound class. Likewise the Rogue River, above Rockford will produce some trophy Browns and Stream Rainbows.

Look for some trophy size Hy-Bred Muskies to come from Murray, Lincoln, and Big Pine Island Lakes. Lincoln also has a fair number of free spawning Northern Muskies. A new law this year prohibits spearing on these waters, plus Campau and Dean Lakes. Also the Northern Pike size limit in these lakes has been raised to 30". These new restrictions do not apply to Big Pine Island.

The outlook for the Grand River is also excellent. The Smallmouth Bass Fishery is always very good and the Walleye Population will soon rival any river in Southern Michigan. Many Small Walleyes will be taken, however a fair number of very good fish, up to six pounds can be anticipated.

The Grand, in this area holds several Mud Cats (Flathead, Shovelhead, yellow, etc.) well above the current state record of 38lbs. 2 oz. However it is doubtful that one will be caught. Several will be hooked but probably none will be landed. Very few fishermen use heavy enough tackle to handle one. A thirty pound Mud Cat is at least three times more powerful than a 30lb Chinook Salmon. Many Channel, (Silver) and Blue Cats are always taken. There are also good numbers of northern Pike in the River, although of a somewhat smaller size than lake fish.

The Flat River always provides a good Smallmouth Fishery and their flooding of the Burrows and Nine Mile Impoundments is sure to improve this fishery. Fair numbers of good Northerns are also available in the Flat.

Big Pine Island, Wabasis, and many other local lakes will provide excellent Largemouth Bass fishing and some fish in the Seven pound class are taken every season. In general the Pan fishing on nearly every local lake is from fair to excellent.

The fish are certainly here and you can always stop by THE COMBINATION, 526 E. Main, for the finest in live bait, tackle, and tales.

If I want to be critical of Governor Blanchard in this column, the Rockford Squire will print it, but if I even make reference to his title in my newsletter, much less criticize him, the Speaker of the House of Representatives will censor my newsletter. At least that's the way its been for the last four months in Lansing.

In my September 1983 newsletter I said this: "I'm beginning to wonder when I can start voting YES. I know when! When Governor Blanchard realizes that the cost of doing business in Michigan is still to high, and supports REPUBLICAN bills to revise the Single Business Tax, repeal and prevailing Wage Rate Law, reform Workers' Compensation and Unemployment Compensation Laws. Let's both 'Say YES to Michigan,' Governor! Speaking of the Governor, I think he's gone too far trying to control independent boards and commissions -- Agriculture, DNR, Workers' Compensation, PSC. Example: Forcing resignation of population and effective Agriculture Director Dean Pridgeon. Supporting bill to grant the Governor the authority to appoint DNR Director, and on and on . . ."

Speaker Gary Owen was so upset that he proposed new printing guidelines for members of the House of Representatives that were so stringent they even prohibited the use of the terms "Republican and Democrat." Some of us thought that this was censorship in its most dangerous form, and we took our case to the people through the media. We even threatened a federal lawsuit claiming an invasion of our rights of freedom of speech under the first amendment of the U.S. Constitution.

Speaker Owen contended that rules dealing with subject matter and political references can be established by the legislature, because taxpayers dollars are being used to pay printing and postage costs. Well, I contend that it is my responsibility to keep my constituents informed on what is taking place in Lansing, and if they think I'm too political, they'll let me know.

Last week the rules were relaxed. Democrats will no longer review and censor Republican newsletters and vice versa. the leaderships of both parties will use their discretion on what is proper to print in their respective newsletters. I think we won a battle, I'm not sure about the war. We'll see. I just sent the draft of my first KRAUSE AT THE HOUSE newsletter since September to the Republican Print Shop.
