This is the first time that a dollar figure has been mentioned in the issue that has developed into quite a debate in local coffee shops and the "letters to the editor" column in the Ledger. Michigan Wire Processing is a growing company that has found itself in desperate need of more space, with the only space available being the ball diamond. Fizer's carlier proposals never included specific figures, but he has said he would help develop a new softball complex on other city land in exchange for the old ball diamond.
