Showboat rides were a big hit at last year's festivities, but insurance requirements dictated that the boat meet department of Natural Resources requirements before it could be operated this year. Bob Pfaller and his crew of volunteers have been working diligently to ready the boat for final approval, but still need

some help. D.N.R. is requiring stability tests to be conducted on Saturday, May 19 at 10:00 A.M. Bob needs about 200 adult volunteers for an hour or less to gather on the boat and assist in the stability test. D.N.R. inspector will supervise, and the whole operation should take less than one hour. Please be there if you can, and bring your friends.

The Attwood Corporation has donated 160 life preservers that

were required, and Pfaller has been able to scrounge other needed items such as firefighting equipment. Barry and Jay Vezino have completed certification tests to captain the boat, which was another requirement set down by D.N.R. Outboard motors are still needed for the two day event. The boat is propelled by four outboard motors that must have long shafts and be from 10 to 15 horse power. If

Runners due here Saturday

Runners from the Deputy Sheriff's Association of Michigan (DSAM) will pass through Lowell at about 8:45 A.M., Saturday, May 19 in a record-breaking, non-stop relay run covering more than 1,000 miles through Michigan.

Known as the "Journey for Sight", the event is an annual project of DSAM, which this year is being conducted in cooperation with the Lions Clubs of Michigan and the Leader Dogs for the Blind in Rochester, Michigan. The school trains over 300 Leader Dogs each year and provides sightless individuals with a Leader Dog and four weeks of training without charge. The Leader Dogs organization depends entirely on individual contributions and fund-raising activities undertaken annually by Lions Clubs to fund its operations.

The 1,000 Mile "Journey for Sight" Non-Stop Relay run is undertaken by The Deputy Sheriffs to help publicize the work being done by Leader Dogs for the Blind and to make known services the organization makes available for sightless individuals, as well as its continuing need for contributions from the general public and business organizations.

Three five-man teams will run continuously at a pace of one mile per nine minutes. The runners rotate by passing a white cane from one to another every five miles. A support crew of

M.S.U. Student Coordinator

Laura Yost of Rockford will serve as student coordinator for one of 45 volunteer programs offered through Michigan State University's Service Learning Center. The MSU Service Learning Center serves as a liaison between the students and the university community, and coordinates the largest college volunteer program in the nation.

Yost, the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. William G. Yost Jr. of 10440 Six Mile Road, N.E., will be a student coordinator in the Woldumar Nature Center program in Lansing. The center consists of 188 acres of field, forest and aquatic habitats.

Student coordinators are responsible for providing information, orientation, transportation and schedules for program volunteers. In addition, coordinators meet with volunteers once a term to solve problems and assess each volunteer's progress.

As coordinator, Yost will supervise students who work with a naturalist in presenting programs to children in plant identification, bird and mammal habitat and Indian and pioneer lore. Volunteers will also serve as day camp counselors and field trip guides for groups of school children. An English education junior, Yost is a 1980 graduate of Lowell Senior High School in Lowell.

The Arrows defeated a double dose of competition last week and piled up 82 points to easily win the girls competition in the tri-meet against Ionia (59) and Belding (21). The win ups Lowell's Tri-River Conference record to 5-1.

In the field events, Cathy Kazmier turned in a good performance placing first in the high jump with a 5'3 mark. Lynn Dowling ousted her competitors in the shotput with a 33'8 finish and also in the discus with an 88'4 finish for first.

Senior Dowling said she's striving to break Lowell's current shotput record of 39'10-1/2, which is held by 1981 graduate Kelly Dickerson, by at least a secure 40.

"My goal is the record, but this wasn't a good day for me,"

Dowling said, "I'm still working on my spin in the discus and practicing hard for regionals."

Lowell continued to control the scoring as it captured all of the relays. The two mile relay force of Trudy Watson, Kim Cridler, Vicki Harris and Liz Desser won their event in 11:22. Watson, Cridler and Desser then teamed with Paula Doyle to earn first in the mile relay. In the 880 relay, Terri Jones, Denise Southland, Amy Versluis and Cindy Dumas clocked a victory in 2:02. Dresden Daverman joined Southland, Versluis and Dumas to take first in the 440 relay with an impressive 56.7 finish.

The Arrows grabbed the spotlight in the sprints and distance events. Southland took the 100 yard dash time in 13.3, while Versluis produced a first in the 220 yard dash with a time of

29.8. Desser proved to be competition in the mile, she earned first in 5:57. Watson outkicked her opponents in the 440 yard dash finishing first in 69.7 and Doyle dominated the 330 hurdles clocking a 50.8 first.

Desser, Brown, Cridler and Watson received a fourth in the two mile relay, while the shuttle hurdle relay squad of Malone, Dumas, Stephanie Kidder and Ann Droog took fifth. In the 880 relay, Doyle, Southland, Versluis and Dumas finished fifth, while Jones teamed with Southland, Versluis and Dumas for a fourth in the 440 relay.

The Arrows travel to Coopersville, Tuesday, May 15 for their final conference meet and then to Regionals May 18 and 19.

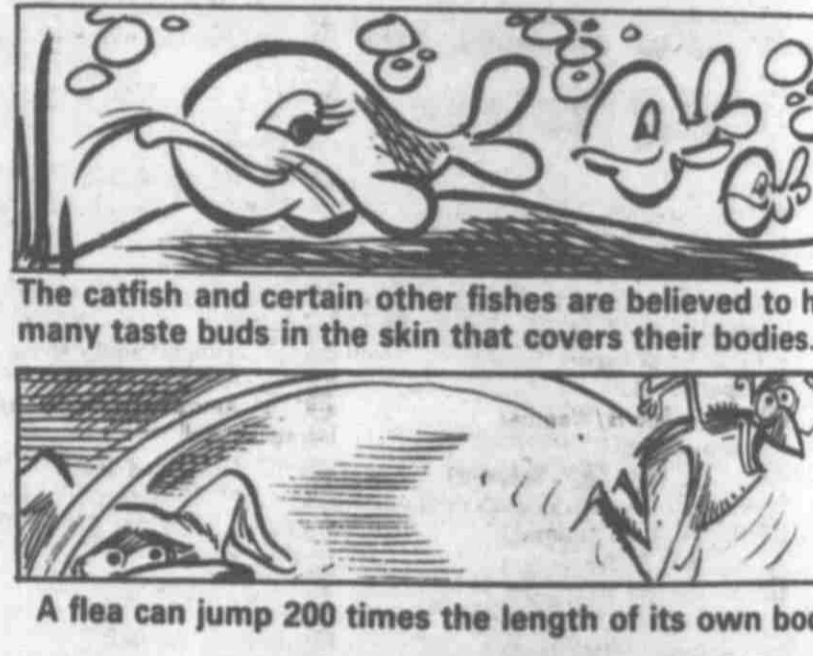

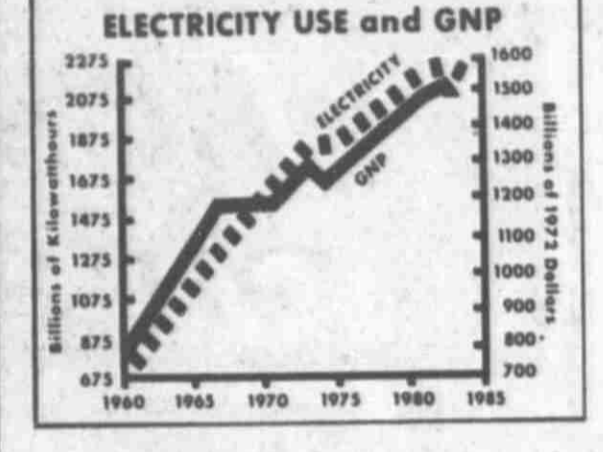

Moped safety list

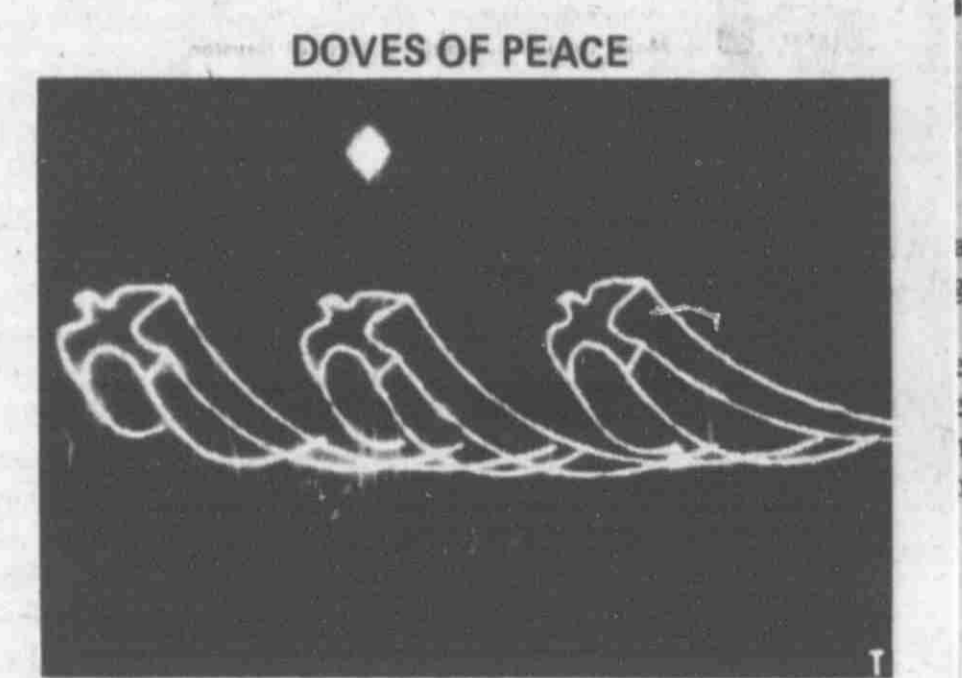
Spring-like weather brings about an increase in moped violations according to Edward Medendorp, Traffic Referee at the Kent county Juvenile Court. Many of the violations could be prevented if, according to Medendorp, juveniles who ride the mopeds and their parents were familiar with moped laws. Since Michigan law considers mopeds in the same class as small motorcycles, specific statutes were created with this in mind. The following are some of these laws:
1. No one under the age of 15 may operate a moped.
2. Anyone without a valid vehicle license must have a moped license.
3. Moped riders under the age of 19 must wear a helmet.
4. Only one person may ride a moped at a time.
5. All mopeds must be registered with the Secretary of State.
6. Riding a moped on the sidewalk is prohibited.
7. Moped riders must stay near the curb of traffic lanes and follow all the same traffic laws that apply to other vehicles.
8. Mopeds may not exceed 30 m.p.h.
Medendorp states that approximately 230 moped-related tickets were handled by Juvenile Court last year. Medendorp, who handles all the tickets at the Court, further states that he has a wide range of dispositions avail-

able to juveniles who are ticketed for moped violations. The juvenile who receives a ticket from an area police agency must come to the Court with his/her parents to meet with Medendorp. Generally, according to Medendorp, he warns a juvenile who has no prior traffic record and places the individual on an informal probation to the Traffic Court. Medendorp is surprised at how many parents are confused or even unaware of moped laws and adds: "The traffic hearing allows for clarification and interpretation of these laws for both juveniles and parents." Other dispositions could include suspension of a license for an indefinite period of time, points assessed against their driver record, placement into a Court Work Program, repeating driver's education, and/or attending a driver's safety school. Medendorp works closely with area police agencies and recommends that each moped owner engrave the moped with their license number and keep a record of the serial number. He also suggests that special insurance be purchased to cover the moped since most homeowners insurance will not. Medendorp is willing to answer questions regarding mopeds and suggests that individuals with questions call 774-3747 between 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M.

The entry fee will be \$5, per species desired, per person. Contest rules will be posted at the launch site on tournament days. It is anticipated that from twenty to forty teams will participate weekly, and this should provide some attractive prizes. Undoubtedly through the season some pro-fishermen will enter and this will add to the pleasure.

Capitol Column

Two state senators, one from each party, have introduced a new form of mandatory seat belt legislation. The one major difference between the new bill and an earlier House version, which failed to pass in that chamber, is that the Senate bill provides for voter approval at a later date.

If the legislation were to pass in 1984, and take effect in 1985, it would be placed on the ballot in November, 1988 to give the voters a chance to assess its effectiveness and decide whether they want to keep the law in place.

The bill essentially requires front seat passengers to buckle up or risk a \$10 fine. No points would be assessed, however. Supporters of the legislation

point to the following statistics: in foreign countries and Canadian provinces with seat belt laws, seat belt usage increased by 20 to 70 percent; seat belts could save 400 Michigan lives and 11,000 serious injuries a year; approximately \$200 million could be saved in Michigan annually from reduced medical and health care costs, governmental service, and insurance premiums.

In addition, backers point to general facts about seat belt usage, including the fact that a belted driver can better control the car in a collision; being thrown free of the car in an acci-

dent increases risk by 25 times; and police and medical attendants say they rarely unbuckle a dead person in an accident.

Opponents, however, believe that these statistics, though valid, do not vindicate a statutory seat belt rule. They believe the less government the better, and the state does not have the right to make personal decisions for individuals.

Detractors consider a mandatory seat belt law an invasion of privacy that is virtually unenforceable and superfluous.

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Collins that the Minutes of the April 7 meeting be approved as written, supported by Councilman Thompson.

Mayor Maatman then turned the meeting over to Councilman Thompson, Chairman of the Zoning Board of Appeals, who opened the Public Hearing on the request of Mr. Ned Swift for a variance from square footage requirements for living space in an R-1 Single Family Residential Zone, to allow the reduction from 1500 square feet to 1100 square feet, in order to build a new home on N. Washington Street.

Mr. Swift was present and stated that the additional 400 square feet would be an enclosed basement area which would be finished off as a family room at a later date.

There was a discussion by Council on the Planning Commission's decision to review all of the square footage requirements for each of the residentially zoned areas for possible recommendation for reduction, and Manager Quada stated that a similar request had been granted a year ago on the same piece of property by the request of a different property owner.

Chairman Thompson closed the Hearing at 8:09 P.M.

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Schneider that the square footage requirements in the R-1 Single Family Residential Zone located on N. Washington Street on a parcel of property owned by Mr. Ned Swift, be reduced from 1500 to 1100 square feet, supported by Councilman Fonger.

Carried.

Chairman Thompson then opened the Public Hearing on the request of Mr. and Mrs. Brian Burke for a variance from height requirements in an R-2 Residential Zone to build a two-story

garage at his residence at 420 N. Monroe Street. The upper story would house a hobby room. The present garage is a small building, and both family cars must be parked single-file in the driveway close to the street. He would remove the old structure and build the new one farther back from the street.

A discussion by Council followed on the hobby room being used as a commercial business. Mr. Burke replied that it would only be used as a hobby and storage for hobby crafts, that he did not plan any kind of commercial home business use.

Council concurred that commercial home businesses are regulated by City ordinances and so could be controlled if the property should change ownership, and no negative comments were received.

Chairman Thompson closed the Hearing at 8:15 P.M.

IT WAS THEN MOVED by Councilman Collins that the variance from height requirements in an R-2 Single Family Residential Zone as requested by Mr. Brian Burke be approved, to allow a two story garage at his property at 420 N. Monroe, supported by Councilman Schneider.

Carried.

Chairman Thompson then adjourned the Zoning Board of Appeals at 8:16 P.M. and turned the meeting back over to Mayor Maatman.

Manager Quada then announced that he had received a request from Mr. Don Fizer of Michigan Wire Processing Co. to withdraw the previous request for an election on May 22 on the ball diamond property. He explained that Mr. Fizer is looking into several other options for his company at the present time, but will continue to support the City's parks and recreation programs.

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Collins that the May 22, 1984 election to place the removal of the five-acre ball diamond parcel located at Recreation Park from the City Master Plan be cancelled, supported by Councilman Schneider.

Carried.

Manager Quada then distributed copies of the 1984-85 Proposed Budget to Council, stating that copies were available for public review at City Offices and the Lowell Library.

He stated that in past years Council has elected to hold two public hearings on the Budget, the first and third Mondays in May. Only one is required, but two hearings give all citizens the opportunity to review the facts and figures before adoption.

He explained that the millage rate for the City in 1983-84 was 11.83 mills per thousand dollars of assessed valuation, in 1984-85 it will be reduced to 11.23 mills, due to the County's raise in assessed valuation in the City of approximately 3%, and the State's Truth in Taxation Law, in which the City must roll back the tax levy so as not to collect more tax dollars than last year. He stated that City taxpayers would receive bills in approximate line with what they paid last year.

He then briefly explained the categories for the various revenues and expenditures expected by the City, citing not many changes. There will be no change in the water or sewer rates, but stated that the City will have to look at those figures soon in the future for expansion of the Sewage Treatment Plant operation costs.

There is one addition, that of a Parks category. With the City's decision to expand the parks program within the City, additional costs will need to be met. By the same token, the Landfill category has been reduced, the only activity being done now since its forced closing by the State, is the covering of material, and general maintenance of what is already there.

IT WAS THEN MOVED by Councilman Collins that the Meetings on May 7 and 21 be set as Public Hearings on the Proposed 1984-85 budget, supported by Councilman Fonger.

Carried.

IT WAS THEN MOVED by Councilman Thompson, supported by Councilman Collins that a Budget work-study session be held on Monday, May 14 at 7:30 P.M. in the Council room of City Hall, as requested by the City Manager.

Carried.

There were no remarks from the audience.

Under Council Comments, Councilman Schneider asked about the installation of the City's new phone system. Manager Quada replied that the system had been started on Wednesday, wire strung throughout the buildings, and phones were being hooked up and would be finished on Friday. He showed Council one of the desk units being installed and explained its operation.

Councilman Collins asked about the Helen Look-Daley Fund not being part of the City's budget process, how would it be handled. Manager Quada replied that it has all been entered on computer and Council will get a printed report on a monthly basis. It is controlled by the Look Committee and will be handled on a separate basis.

Councilman Thompson commented on the annual Spring Cleanup of the Michigan Wire property in time for the softball season being done, a vast improvement.

Mrs. Burke from the audience asked about tank trucks getting water from the City at the Monroe-Avery Street hydrant.

Manager Quada replied that it is an arrangement between the city and Aero Liquid Transit. When they moved their operation on Grand River Drive, they drilled four wells, planning to use the water supply for flushing out their tank trucks used to haul liquids. The water from those wells pitted and ruined the interior of the tanks, so they purchase the processed water from the City for that purpose. They pay a readiness to serve charge the same as the City residents, plus double the consumption rate of residents. There are several other haulers who also use the City water periodically, such as the Serne Brothers who fill swimming pools, etc.

There was no Manager's Report.

There were no appointments to the Cable Advisory Board, and Manager Quada asked Councilmembers to be thinking of names to submit for the appointment at the next meeting.

IT WAS THEN MOVED by Councilman Schneider to adjourn at 8:49 P.M.

1984 Summer Fun Guide to 371 Private Campgrounds

Michigan's state park and private campground operators expect a strong summer camping season this year, up as much as five percent over last year, reports the Automobile Club of Michigan.

"State parks are keeping campsite fees at last year's level and private campgrounds have raised their average price per campsite only 44 cents," stated James Drury, Auto Club Travel Operations manager.

"Michigan Department of Natural Resources officials report that confirmed state park reservations already are up 16 percent over a year ago," he added.

The average cost for a campsite with electricity at the 371 private parks listed on the Auto Club's 1984 Private Campground Guide is \$7.89, with prices ranging from \$17.50 to \$1.50.

State park campers will pay \$7 nightly for a site with electricity. Other state park fees -- \$4 for a rustic site, \$3 for an advanced reservation and the \$2 daily or \$10 annual park entry permit -- also are unchanged from last year.

Rustic site fees at Michigan's state forest campgrounds remain \$1 to \$4, with fees at the National Forest Campgrounds generally ranging from \$3 to \$5.

An Auto Club survey of private campground operators shows 58 percent said they had an increase in business last year, 18 percent had a decrease and 13 percent had the same business as the previous year.

State park officials said the 1983 camping season generally was equal to the 1982 season.

Campgrounds listed on the Auto Club guide range in size from 25 to 600 sites, and 72 percent offer swimming in a lake or a pool.

There are more than 63,000 campsites in Michigan, including 32,235 private, 13,971 state park, 3,100 state forest, 2,405 federal and 11,174 county, township and city sites.

Phone reservations can be made at most private parks. Campers wishing to reserve a state park site may mail a check and a form to the park at least seven days in advance or telephone reservations at least two days in advance. Reservation forms can be obtained by contacting the Department of Natural Resources Information Services, Mason Building, Box 30028, Lansing, Michigan 48909.

All but six state parks will take reservations by telephone. Parks not accepting telephone reservations are Hartwick Pines near Grayling, Ludington, Mears near Pentwater, Petoskey. South

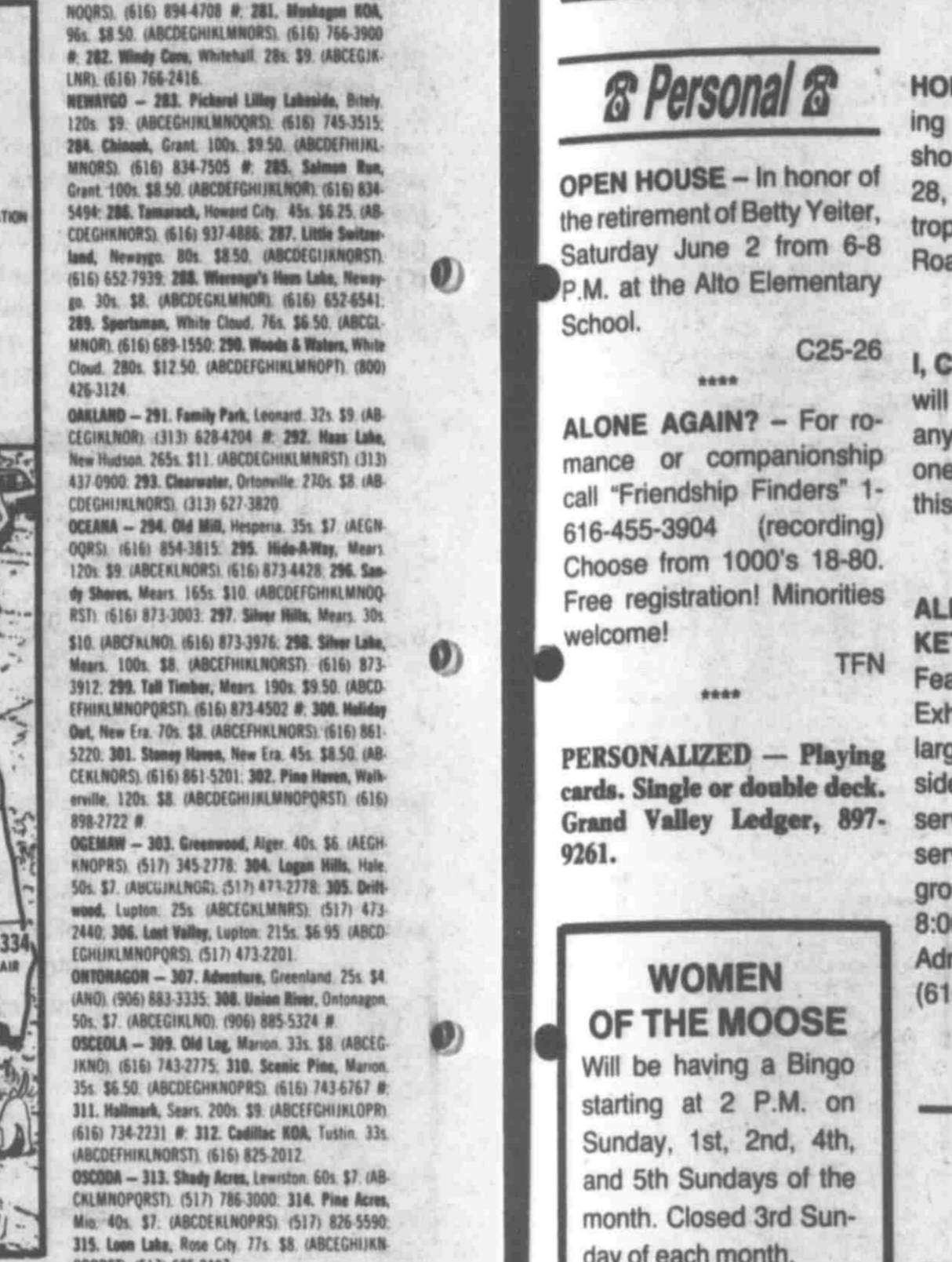
