Parks Committee unveils ambitious plans

If the City's Parks and Recreation Committee had to be described in one word, that word would have to be "ambitious". The five member committee has been meeting regularly for many months preparing a recommended plan for the city's parks.

The recommendations are just that, and it will be up to the city council to approve, disapprove, formulate costs and finance any park development.

Committee member Ray Zandstra started the presentation with recommendations for Richards Park. Zandstra said that Richard's Park has seen a lot of improvement in the past three years, but a few things still should be accomplished. Benches, a drinking fountain, wood chips in the playground area, a new walkway and a basketball court were items listed by Zandstra. Improved lighting for the skating rink and more trees and shrubs were also mentioned as needed improvements.

Another committee member George Watson began the discussion of the west end or Gee Dr. park. One softball field has been started at the site, and according to Watson it's coming along nicely. A chain link backstop has been erected, an infield constructed and the outfield has been seeded. Watson said the infield needs additional grading, and the outfield will require more seeding before the diamond is ready for play. The west side park will be the home of three more softball fields if the parks committee's plan is carried out. Watson read statistics that reflect the amount of softball played in the city, and indicated that the new softball fields should be a top priority. If grading and seeding were begun this year, Watson said that the four fields would be ready for play in 1985.

Randy Ossewaarde, also a member of the committee, expounded further about the need for more and improved softball facilities in the city. Ossewaarde outlined plans for parking for 150 cars at the west side park, rest rooms, concession stand, playground and picnic tables. Ossewaarde said that the fields should be the first priority, and all the secondary improvements could follow.

Margaret Hoats represented the committee for the presentation of their plans for the east side park. This park land is 15 acres located just east of the Flat River and north of the Grand River, and was farm land purchased from William Rogers last year. Hoats showed that the parks committee envisions three soccer fields on the site. Citing an ever increasing interest in soccer here, Hoats told of the need for adequate fields. YMCA youth soccer which involved 142 players this spring, is currently being played on two fields located on private property. The park is accessible from S. Monroe Street, and plans for a foot bridge from Recreation Park are in the committee's design. Parking for 100 cars is drawn into the plan.

Jerry Kellogg took over the presentation with unveiling of what is perhaps the most ambitious part of the overall parks plan. Recreation park will be vastly improved if these plans are seen

through. In the site plan a cross-hatch of paved streets are located approximately where the horse arena is now. These streets would serve as a paved midway at fair time, could be used for a new location for the Gus Macker Tournament and would be ideally suited for car shows and

swap meets. A 350 car parking lot is penciled in near the northwest corner of the park, and plans call for the renovation of the Foreman Building for use as an exhibition hall. The area along the river would be upgraded to include a boat ramp,

picnic tables, parking and a playground. Sites for camping would also be constructed.

The City Council and the parks and recreation committee scheduled a work study session for Thursday, May 31 at 7:00 to further review the plans.

Arrested Friday by Lowell Officers for driving while license suspended was William Warren, 19, of Grand Rapids.

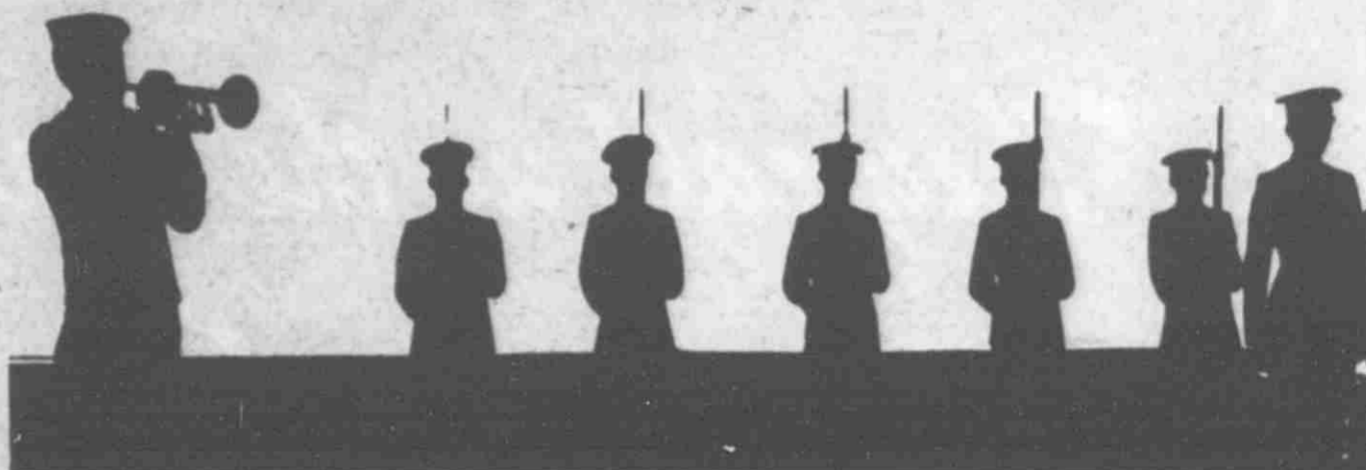

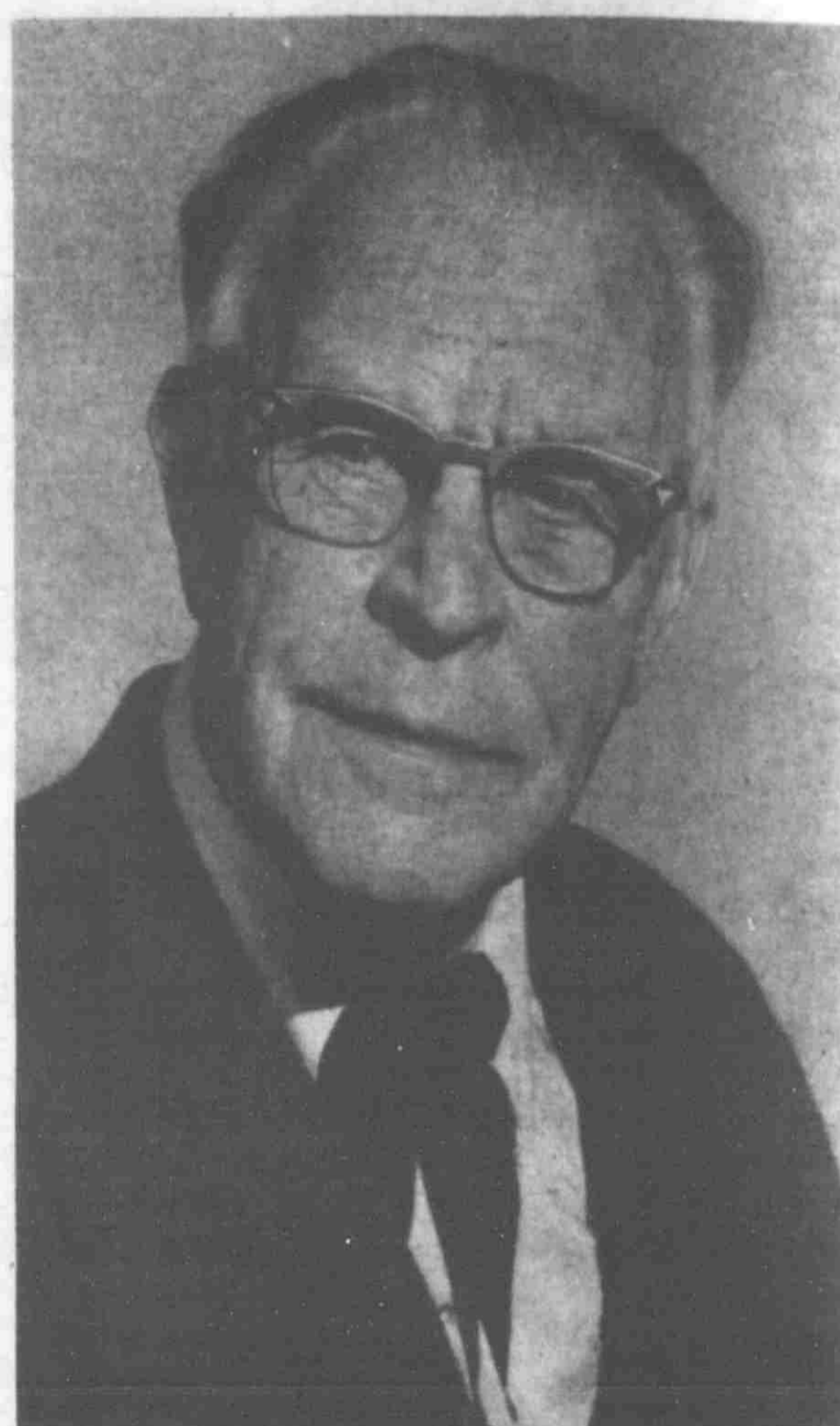

AVERY - Norton Avery, aged 90, formerly of Lowell, passed

Noted photographer Norton Avery passes

Few people put into, and get out of life what Norton Louis Avery did in his 90 years. Norton died at the Michigan Veterans Facility in Grand Rapids last Thursday. A professional photographer all his life, he was instrumental in the early development of color photography. He served with the Army Signal Corps in World War I photographing captured German airplanes for intelligence purposes. Several of his unique photographs received national attention, most notable was a photo of a wrinkled old transient in the Lansing area. Always burdened with his cameras and light meters, Avery was able to see and capture beauty in scenes that most of us take for granted.

He was born in Lowell in 1894 and graduated from Lowell High School in 1912. In 1917 he married Ruby Willette, also a Lowell native. She preceded him in death in 1979.

Following his service in WWI, Avery began working for an established professional photo studio in Lansing. After a few years he opened his own studio in North Lansing. By this time his two sons Keith and Hoyt had been born. In 1927 his studio and family were moved into a new home on Willow Road in the Lansing area. Norton was always active in camera clubs and for awhile operated a school of photography in his studio.

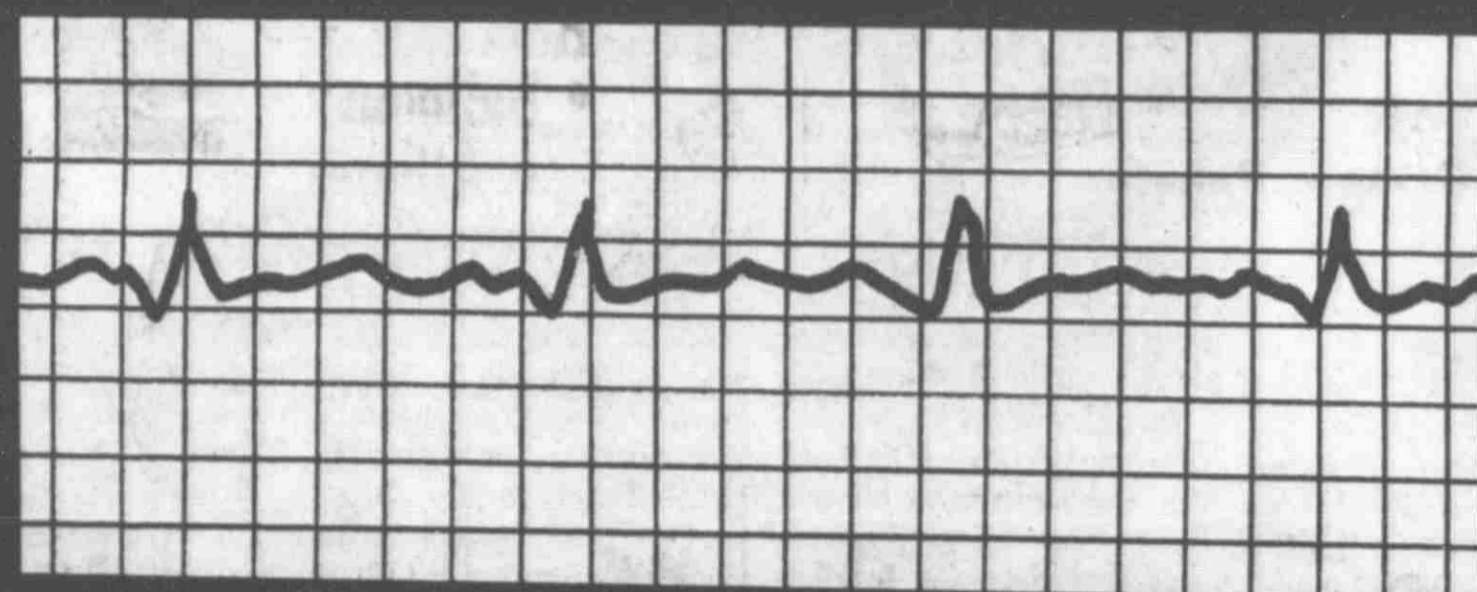
In 1943 the Averys went into semi-retirement, closing the Lansing studio, selling their home and moving back to Lowell. Norton continued to do portraiture work in a small studio that he operated upstairs at 203 East Main Street. During the winter months the Averys traveled extensively in the southwest, and Norton always had his camera close at hand photographing the beauty of the area.

Under Norton's direction, another generation of professional photographers developed in his sons. Keith mastered the craft and uses it to photograph people, animals and landscapes, then transforms these photos into his outstanding oil paintings. Keith and his son Cla are noted artists in the Roswell, New Mexico area. Hoyt learned the craft and opened Avery Color Studios in Saranac in 1956. The business thrived by reproducing Hoyt's and many of Norton's photographs on postcards, placemats and scenic stationery. The business was moved to Au-Train in 1969.

Norton was a member of The Clark-Ellis American Legion Post 152, The Lowell First United Methodist Church, the West Central Michigan Historical Society and was the only lifetime member of the Lowell Area Arts Council.

The exercise involved over 30,000 U.S. military people from the Navy, Marine Corps, Army, Air Force and Coast Guard.

The America is 1,048 feet long, has a crew of 2,800, plus another 2,150 assigned to a carrier air wing.

He participated in an active physical conditioning program and gained proficiency in a variety of military skills, including first aid, rifle marksmanship and close order drill. Teamwork and self-discipline were emphasized throughout the training cycle.

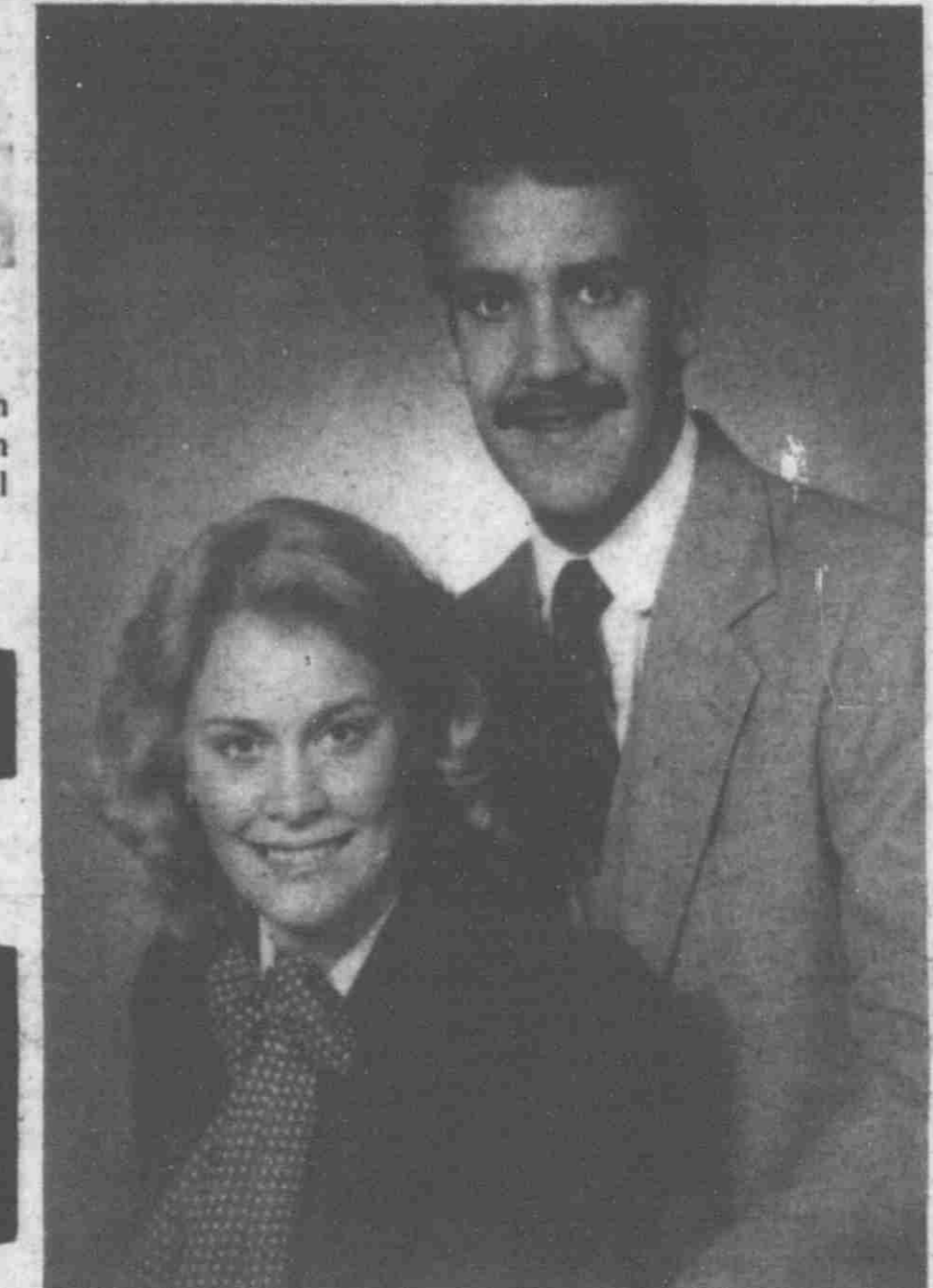

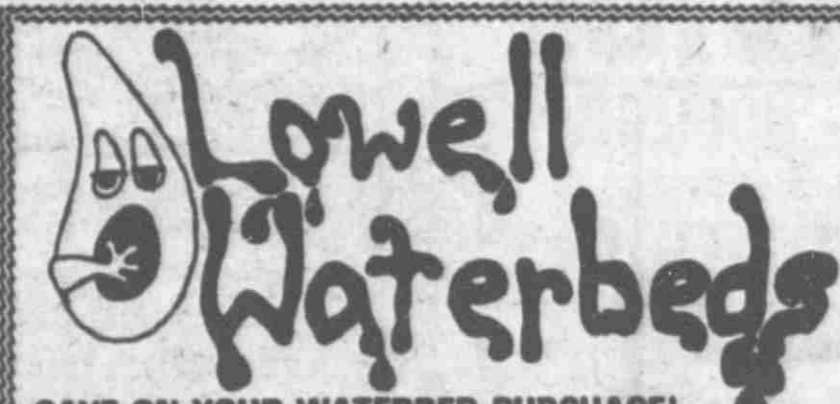

Chaffee planetarium offers evening double feature

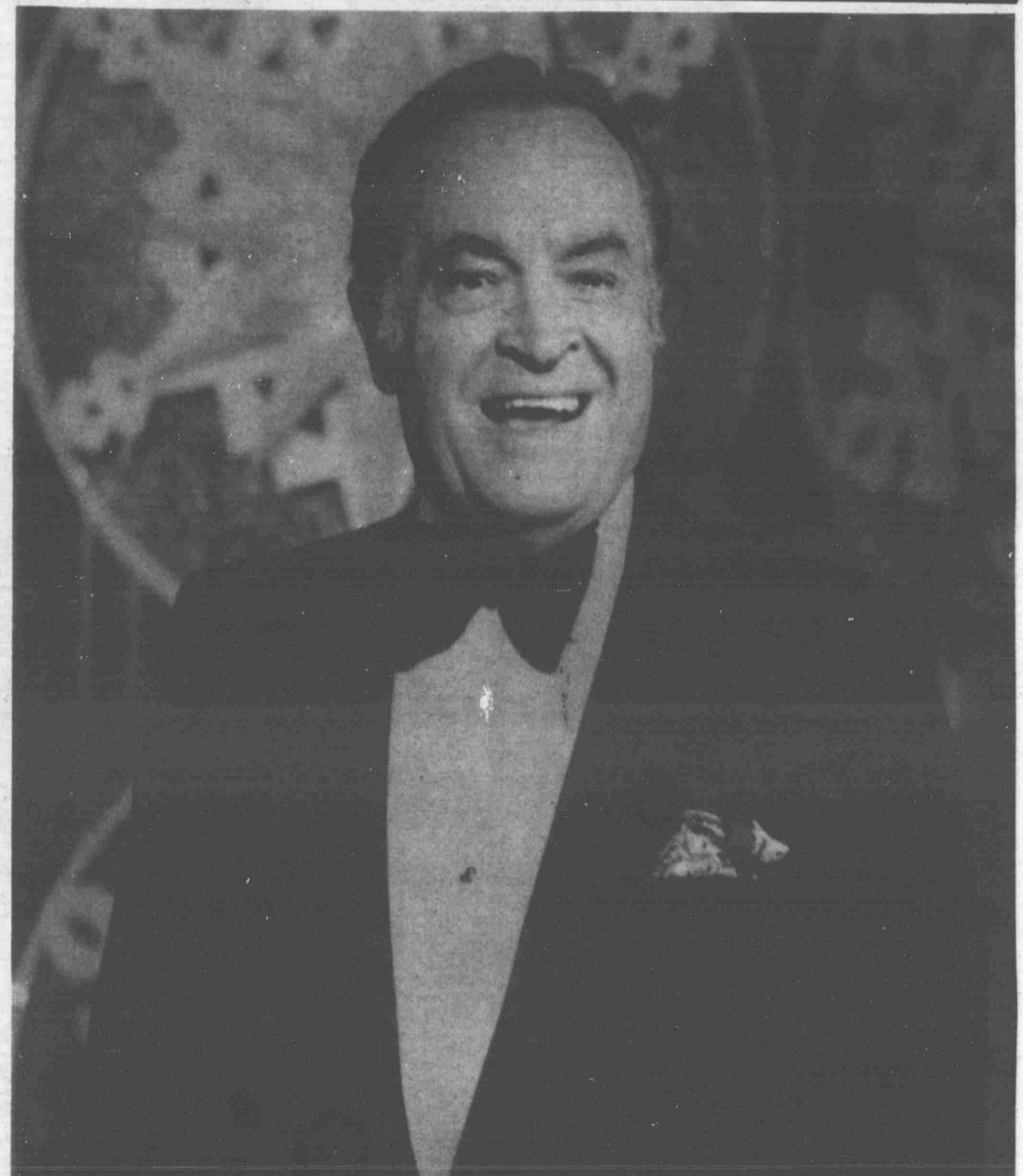

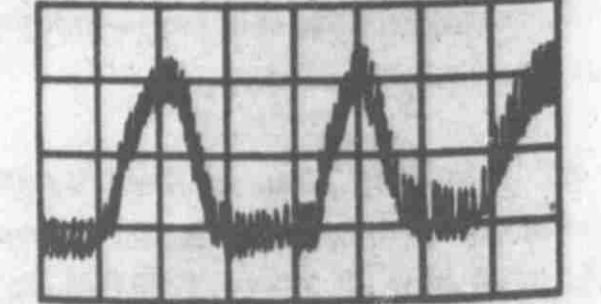
by two seconds for a state qualifying third place. Lakewood hosts the conference meet Thursday, May 24 starting at 2 P.M.

Did you see the piece on television a few weeks ago about a WWI survivor's club? Years ago 40 WWI veterans in the Philadelphia area formed a club that met every year to remember the war days, and as the years took their toll they would eulogize and otherwise honor their deceased comrades. This year when they met there were only two left. The group has a bottle of French cognac that they have kept all these years, and when there is only one of the forty left he is supposed to open the bottle and toast all he departed buddies. One of the two old guys joked that he would have to die before the other because he didn't drink. It was a really touching story to say the least.

About the same time I saw that story on TV the headline on The Times-Enterprise announced that they were folding. The Times-Enterprise was a weekly newspaper that was comprised of the Old Edmore Times and the Lakeview Enterprise. The two papers had been purchased by the Greenville Daily News, and had been combined in an effort to make them profitable. It didn't work, and the Daily News publisher made the painful decision to shut them down.

Word of the closing of The Times-Enterprise came only about a month after the Lade Odessa Wave folded. Like the Times-Enterprise, the Wave had been purchased by a daily, The Ionia Sentinel-Standard, some time ago. Even with the backing of a larger owner, it just wasn't profitable.

With these closings it dawned on me that there have been a lot of little weeklies go by the wayside in the past few years. I started counting on my trusty fingers, and in the eight years that I've owned the Ledger I've seen eight other small town weeklies fold. I came up with The Lakeview Enterprise, the Edmore Times, The Lake Odessa Wave, The Howard City Record, The Rockford Register, The Cedar Springs Clipper, The Belding Banner News, and the Wyoming News Advocate. These were all good old weekly newspapers, many of which were established over 100 years ago.

The Ledger exchanged papers with most of those listed above, and every Friday I'd have a big stack of papers that I could go through looking for ideas for ads, features and formats. Now we get two; the Wayland Globe and the Carson City Gazette. That doesn't mean that we're all that are left, I can think of other weeklies in Hastings, Middleville and I think Caledonia still has a paper. Even the tiny communities of Clarksville and Freeport have weekly papers. No, we're not extinct, but it's probably safe to say that small town weeklies are on the endangered species list.

No, the Ledger isn't in danger of collapse. In fact, we're doing quite well . . . which unfortunately means that I have to continue to come up with something to fill this space each week. Next week I'll try to get things back into a humorous vein, but I felt that I should at least acknowledge some of the Ledger's departed comrades. Pass the cognac please.

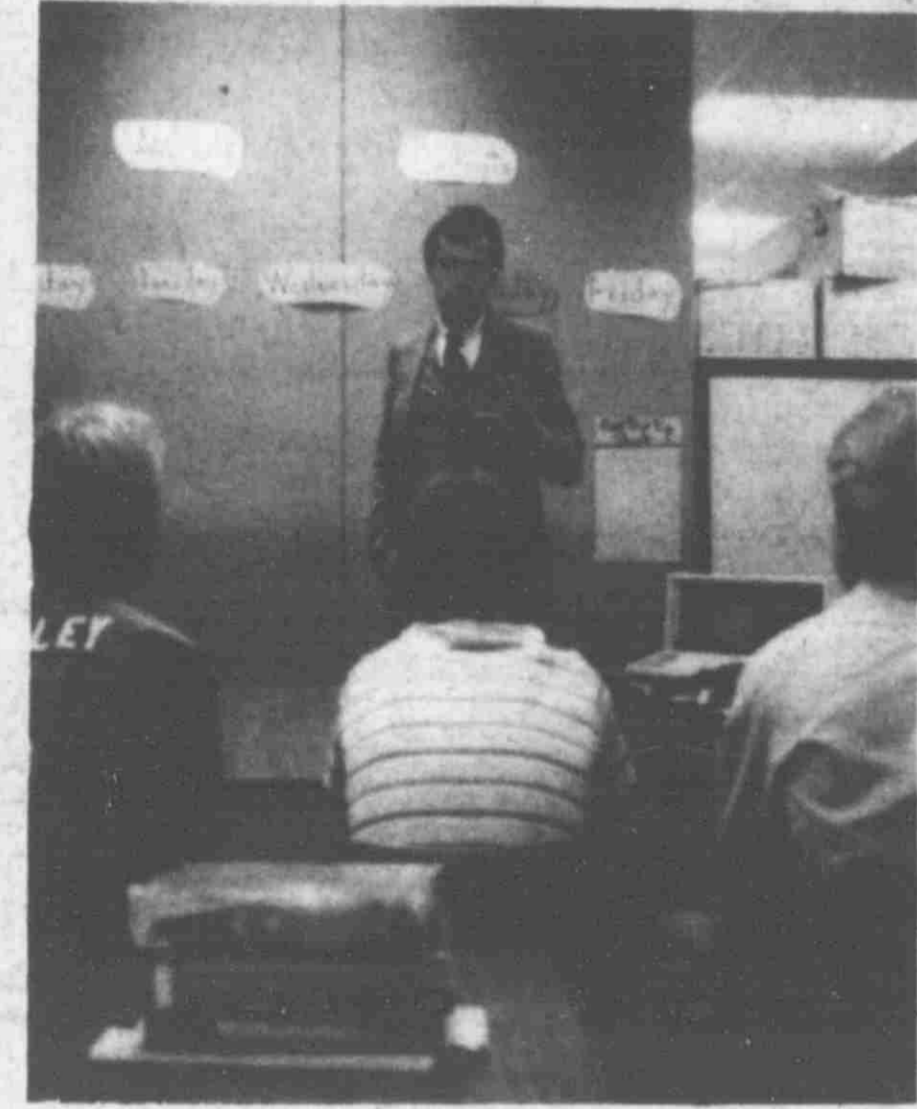
L.M.S. hosts seventh annual Eight Grade Career Days

Being a fiscally conservative legislator who thinks taxes are too high and government too big, I've found myself in an interesting position lately objecting to the Michigan Department of Transportation's hasty decision to discontinue subsidizing Michigan Northern's rail service from Comstock Park to Reed City.

MDOT's decision on March 28th was a total surprise to me and many area businessmen. As recently as August 22, 1983 rail shippers and users were informed by MDOT that "the state will take all necessary steps to ensure that services over the leased lines are not interrupted". It's customary for a state department to conduct public hearings when considering a policy change that would affect Michigan citizens, and MDOT did not do that in this case. Their decisions were arbitrarily based on analysis of declining traffic and high maintenance costs.

Senator Robert Welborn (R-Kalamazoo) and I have supported rail shippers and users attempts to have MDOT postpone abandonment until September 30th, but so far we've been unsuccessful. Many questions regarding MDOT's decision remain unanswered. Why wasn't the loss of rail excursion tourist dollars considered? Why didn't MDOT ask shippers to enter into long contracts guaranteeing usage? Why buy a railroad then abandon it? What is the projected loss of local and state tax revenues? How will MDOT use the \$250,000 subsidy? To finance people movers in Detroit?

I don't like subsidies, but in this case they may be economically feasible. I don't know if they are or not, and I don't think anyone else, MDOT, users, and shippers and taxpayers will know either, until we have some answers.

Arrows/Broncos split in league play

Lowell continued to play 500 ball in league play as the Red Arrows spit a double header with Coopersville on Friday. Lowell won the opener 18-7, but lost the nightcap 19-11. The league record is 5-5.

In game one every starter scored as two big innings gave the Arrows the victory. A six run fourth inning gave the Arrows a 10-3 lead only to find the Broncos cut the lead to 10-6 with three runs of their own. Coopersville cut the lead to 10-7 in the fifth. In the Lowell seventh, 13 batters went to the plate in scoring 8 runs, to blow the game wide open. The big blast was Phyllis Beachler's grand slam home run. The Arrows collected 12 hits in the game. VERGENNES TOWNSHIP NOTICE

An Ordinance pursuant to the Township Rural Zoning Act, being Act 184 of the Public Acts of Michigan of 1943, as amended, to amend and supplement the Vergennes Township Zoning Ordinance.

The Township Board of Vergennes Township, Kent County, Michigan hereby ordains that the Vergennes Township Zoning Ordinance is amended by adding a new Section 4.09(a) which shall be entitled SEPTIC TANK WASTE DISPOSAL.

Sec. A. DISPOSAL OF WASTES

The disposal of commercial and industrial wastes from septic tanks, cesspools or seepage pits is prohibited. The disposal of wastes accumulated in residential septic tanks, cesspools or seepage pits (hereinafter referred to simply as "wastes") is not permitted in this township unless all of the following requirements are met.

Sec. B. BOND

The Township Board shall require a commercial surety performance bond in a minimum amount not to exceed \$10,000 to insure compliance with the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. C. LICENSES.

Only persons properly licensed pursuant to law may dispose of wastes in Vergennes Township.

Sec. D. SITES.

1. No disposal of wastes shall be permitted within two hundred (200) yards of any residence, well, public building, place of business, public gathering spot, state, county or township road, road or highway, lake, stream, river, pond or drainage ditch.

2. All sites shall be approved by the County Health Department or the Department of Natural Resources and the Township Board. The grounds and reasons for approvals of sites shall be obtained from such agencies.

3. No disposal shall be permitted which may reasonably be expected to pollute or contaminate surface or underground water supplies, cause such pollution or contamination, or which constitutes a health hazard, an impending health hazard or nuisance.

4. No disposal shall be permitted where the water table is within 4 feet of the surface of the ground.

5. No site shall be used for disposal of wastes if there is a significant potential that runoff of wastes will occur because of elevation, slope of the land, absence of suitable vegetation on the site, soil percolation characteristics, proximity of wells, rivers, streams, lakes, ponds or other bodies of water.

6. The Township Board may require each site to be entirely fenced to prevent the entry of domestic animals and humans. Legible signs, at least 12 x 8 inches in area, shall be affixed to all gates or access points and shall bear the following legend, together with the licensee's name:

WARNING!
DO NOT ENTER
SEPTIC TANK WASTE DISPOSAL SITE

Sec. E. APPLICATION METHODS.

1. All wastes shall be disposed of by use of a liquid manure injection system during months of the year when the ground is not frozen. All wastes shall be disposed of under the surface of the soil and all ground openings shall be closed immediately after injection of wastes.

2. During the periods of the year when the ground is frozen, wastes shall be disposed of in trenches or within diked areas which shall be designed to prevent surface runoff of wastes. All wastes shall be covered with soil within 24 hours after disposal. In any event, no surface deposit or accumulation of wastes is allowed.

3. All openings made in the ground shall follow

the contours of the land so; as to minimize the possibility of runoff of wastes or erosion of soil.

4. Crops shall be planted in accordance with sound farming practices on the soil in which wastes are deposited. Crops selected shall be of types and varieties which will

- utilize the nutrients contained in the wastes,
- Absorb wastes, and
- Minimize the possibility of runoff or pollution of surface or underground water supplies.

Sec. F. ENTRY UPON LAND/TESTING

Members of the Township Board acting as a Board of Health, their agents and other Health Officials may enter upon the land to be used for disposal of wastes or which is being used for disposal of wastes at reasonable times and without prior notification for the purposes of observing compliance with the provisions of this ordinance. Samples of soil, water, and wastes may be removed for chemical, bacteriological or viral analyses, and the Township at its expense may conduct tests or take samples of ground or surface waters on the site.

Sec. G. ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS

a. Disposal shall not take place other than during weekdays between 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. and no disposal shall be permitted on weekends or holidays.

b. In the interests of protecting the public health, safety and general welfare, the Township Board may impose additional requirements in addition to those set forth in this ordinance including, but not limited to, such measures as may be appropriate to minimize objectionable odor.

Sec. H. CESSATION OF USE.

1. All disposal of wastes shall immediately cease upon the occurrence of one or more of the following events:

ORDINANCE NO. 84-1

a. Acceptance of residential septic tank cesspool and seepage pit wastes for treatment by the City of Grand Rapids or any other political subdivision located within 15 road miles of Vergennes Township.

b. violation of one or more of the above provisions of this ordinance.

2. Disposal of commercial and industrial wastes, liquid or solid, is prohibited.

Sec. I. PENALTIES.

Every person who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance or who fails to comply with or who permits a violation of any of the requirements thereof shall upon conviction, be subject to a fine of not more than \$100.00 or to imprisonment not to exceed more than 90 days, or both such fine and imprisonment. Each and every day such violation continues shall be deemed a separate and distinct violation of this ordinance. The imposition of any sentence shall not exempt an offender from compliance with the provisions of this Ordinance, nor prohibit the Township from seeking injunctive relief against a violator or such other appropriate relief as may be provided by law.

Sec. J. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This ordinance shall be effective 30 days after publication in a newspaper of general circulation in Vergennes Township.

ORDINANCE NO. 84-2

AN ORDINANCE pursuant to the Township Rural Zoning Act, being Act 184 of the Public Acts of Michigan of 1943, as amended, to amend and supplement the Vergennes Township Zoning Ordinance.

The Township Board of Vergennes Township, Kent

County, Michigan hereby ordains that the Vergennes Township Zoning Ordinance is amended as follows:

1. Section 4.03 D., "Advertising Signs and Billboards" is hereby amended to read as follows:

D. Billboards may be erected in a "C" or "I" District provided they do not exceed 32 square feet in area; are set back not less than 75 feet from any abutting street right-of-way line; do not constitute a traffic hazard; are maintained in an attractive manner, do not create a nuisance or annoyance by reason of lighting, electrical disturbance, or otherwise; and are not installed or constructed until a permit therefor has been received from the Township Zoning Inspector.

ORDINANCE NO. 84-3

An Ordinance pursuant to the Township Rural Zoning Act, being Act 184 of the Public Acts of Michigan of 1943, as amended, to amend and supplement the Vergennes Township Zoning Ordinance.

The Township Board of Vergennes Township, Kent County, Michigan hereby ordains that the Vergennes Township Zoning Ordinance is amended by adding a new Section 4.14(a) which shall be entitled PRIVATE ROADS AND STREETS.

A. The layout of private streets in respect to their location, intersections, cul-de-sacs, vertical street alignment, street grades, horizontal curves, curb openings at intersecting streets, etc., shall conform to the Kent County Road Commission standards for platted streets.

B. The construction of the roadway shall conform to the Kent County Road Commission standard for a local road -- 22' wide with 6" gravel base (MDSH 22A), 6' wide grass shoulders, side ditches with 1 on 3 front slope and 1 on 2 back slope at 0.5% grade minimum. Ditches shall outlet into a cross culvert or drainage course. In impervious soils (clay or other unsuitable materials), a 12" sand sub-base, graded

parallel to the road surface (extending into the front ditch slope), shall be constructed. Bituminous surfacing and storm sewer will not be required.

C. Culverts shall be placed at all natural drainage courses or other waterways. Culvert sizes and grades shall be determined using the Kent County Road Commission storm runoff calculations formula. Materials for culverts shall also conform to their requirements.

D. Maintenance and repair of private streets shall not be the responsibility of the township.

ORDINANCE NO. 84-4

An Ordinance pursuant to the Township Rural Zoning Act, being Act 184 of the Public Acts of Michigan of 1943, as amended, to amend and supplement the Vergennes Township Zoning Ordinance.

The Township Board of Vergennes Township, Kent County, Michigan hereby ordains that the Vergennes Township Zoning Ordinance is amended as follows:

Section 2.02Z., entitled LOT, FRONT LINE, Shall be amended to read as follows:

That side of the lot abutting upon a public or private street right-of-way or abutting upon a river or lake; in the case of a corner lot, either street right-of-way line may be considered the front line of the lot. The lot frontage requirement shall be measured at the building setback in the R-1 and R-2 districts and as set forth in the bulk tables for the C and I districts.

The foregoing amendments to the Vergennes Township Zoning Ordinance Shall take immediate effect.

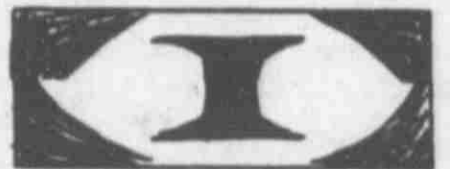

Views On Dental Health

WHY A "TEMPORARY" FILLING?

Have you ever had your dentist tell you he was using a "temporary filling" and wondered why? No, my friend, it is not a ploy so he can get a second crack at you. This is a perfectly proper dental procedure.

It is referred to as "indirect capping", and is used in cases where the nerve (or pulp) would be exposed if all the decay were removed from the cavity. Regarded as a conservative treatment, the application of medicated cement in the temporary filling helps the pulp of the tooth to repair itself by containing the decay and allowing the buildup of a wall of tooth structure between the pulp and the decayed material.

This is a "holding action". When your dentist removes the temporary filling, he may take an X-ray to determine if the pulp has healed. If so, the balance of the decay is removed, and a permanent restoration, or filling, can be placed in the tooth.

In summary, your dentist is trying to keep your tooth alive, avoiding the need for a root-canal filling, pulp capping, or extraction of the tooth.

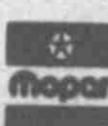
