Four candidates vie for two board seats

Three new candidates and one incumbent seeking re-election make up the slate for the June 11 school board elections. The two vacancies result from the expired terms of trustees Wayne Dowling and James Dumas. Dr. Dumas has decided not to run for a new term. Mr. Dowling will run again along with newcomers Jo Murphy, Diana Fulkerson, and R. Stanley Williams (See profiles). The top two vote-getters in the election will serve four

year terms. Registered voters wishing to vote by absentee ballot may obtain information and ballots by calling the Superintendent's office (897-8415). Absentee ballots are available each day (Monday thru Friday) from 8:00 A.M. until 4:30 P.M. The office will also be open on Saturday June 9 from 8:00 A.M. to 2:00 P.M. All absentee ballots need to be received by June 11.

R. Stanley Williams, his wife Cheryl and children Carrie, Kenny and Shelly have made Lowell their home for four and a half years.

A native of Marquette, Williams earned his Bachelor of Science degree from Ferris State College where he majored in Human Services. He is presently an employee of the Michigan Employment Security Commission and supervises the on-the-job training unit. His past community involvement has been with Lowell Area Jaycees (past president), Big Rapids City Commission membership and a community development board.

Of seeking election to the Board, Williams says, "As a parent with three children in Lowell Schools, I take a personal interest in the education they are receiving. As a taxpayer, I am concerned about the fiscal responsibility of our board. I think my past experience in government can be useful as a school board member".

Council denies foster home

Mrs. Robet Strouse approached The Lowell City Council Monday evening with a request allowing her to establish an adult foster care facility in her home at 318 Riverside Dr. The State Social Services Department grants such licenses, but there are some criteria that must be met. One criteria is that adult foster care facilities should not be closer than 1,500 feet to each other. Strouse's home is only 1,380 from Nell's Rest Home at 150 S. Hudson Street.

Candidate Diana Fulkerson, her husband Paul and sons Erik and Matt have resided in the Lowell area for the past five and a half years.

A native of West Michigan, Fulkerson graduated from Creston High School and Western Michigan University. There she received her Bachelor of Science degree and teacher training. Following graduation, she taught school for nine years. Fulkerson is currently an active member of the Lowell Area Arts Council.

Of her election bid, Fulkerson states, "I see several problems in our schools which need to be addressed, for example, curriculum up-grading, continuity of programs throughout the grade levels, budget concerns and quality teaching time. A school board member should be well-informed on all important issues affecting our school system. I feel I am a qualified candidate because of my educational background and nine years of teaching experience. I have been an active member of my community and schools and look forward to serving in this new capacity".

Jo Murphy is a life-long resident of the Lowell area. She and her husband George have one son Scott Flynn, a high school sophomore.

A graduate of Lowell, Murphy attended Grand Rapids J.C. and received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Michigan State University. She is currently self-employed as a Social Work Consultant.

As a member of the Lowell Area Schools Committee for Excellence, Murphy assisted in the development of the 1984 phone survey. She has also been involved with Project Plant Hope, the National Association of Social Workers, the Baxter Community Center, Trinity Lutheran Church and Kent County Juvenile Court volunteer probation and adoption work.

Of her candidacy Murphy says, "Preparing our children for the future is a critical task. I believe schools as well as parents share in this responsibility. I would welcome the opportunity to assist children in the Lowell Area Schools by providing them with an education which would enable them to meet their dreams for the future".



Wayne Dowling

Incumbent board member, Wayne Dowling, is seeking re-election this year to the Lowell Board of Education. He has served on the Lowell Board for a number of years, most recently as treasurer.

Dowling resides in the Lowell area with his wife Marian. They have three children, Nancy, Lynn, and Michelle.

Born in Cleveland, Ohio, Wayne moved to Michigan 35 years ago where he attended school in Lowell and graduated from Lowell Senior High School. Wayne has previous military experience in the army as a SP4 where he was stationed in the states.

Currently Wayne is employed as a salesman for Lowell Auto Parts, a business he has owned for 20 years. He is also a past president of the Chamber of Commerce in Lowell.

Asked why he was running for another term, Wayne answered, "To get the best return of tax dollars invested and to make sure the children of this district have the best of what those tax dollars can afford."

Tax relief for Superior addition

Representing Superior Furniture Company's planned \$390,000 expansion, Bill Lee approached the Lowell City Council Monday evening for 50% property tax relief on the project under public act 198. The act allows local units of government to grant such relief for any period up to 12 years in an effort to attract business to Michigan communities, to help keep existing business and to promote industrial growth. The state automatically reimburses lost revenues to the local school district in its equalization formula. City governments carry the load of granting the 50% reductions from their tax revenues

for the period granted. A term often used in defense of public act 198 is, "half of something is better than all of nothing".

In years past several Lowell Companies have taken advantage of public act 198 including King Milling Co., Attwood Corp. C.J. Christoff & Sons, Metric Manufacturing and Optec, Inc. Curtis Cleaners took advantage of public act 255 when their new facility was built two years ago. Public act 255 is similar to P.A. 198 but is aimed at commercial rather than industrial development. Of Lowell's total State Equalized Evaluation of \$34,445,300 only \$1,830,400 is currently benefiting under 198

and 255. This amounts to less than \$11,000 per year in lost tax revenues to the city. Some of the early grants will be coming back on the tax rolls at 100% within the next few years.

Capitol Column by Senator Dick Posthumus

If it is true that "God helps those who help themselves," the Republican education plan, now before the Legislature, would certainly have heavenly support.

It is the spirit of self-help that is behind the GOP plan. The key arm of the Republican plan is improving student performance and producing employable graduates.

Permitting students who don't even have a minimum level of competence to graduate is unconscionable. Yet that is exactly what often happens because there are currently no state-set minimum graduation requirements. The plan before the Senate would require high school graduates to pass the Michigan Education Assessment Program tenth-grade equivalency test, which would assure at least a minimum level of knowledge. In addition, other proposals would mandate four years of English, math and laboratory science, three years of social studies, two years of a foreign language, and one year of computer science.

Michigan teachers are also an integral part of the Republican education Action Plan (REAP). If there is to be any improvement in the performance of our students, that effort must include teacher participation. Educators cannot be blamed for the entire problem in the education system, but they can certainly be a part of the solution. Some of the proposals currently before the Senate include: certification of new teachers only in areas of expertise; new teacher certification

procedures in addition to present requirements; requiring a 75 percent or higher score on national teachers' exams; and allowing local school districts to hire-non-certified specialists who meet stringent standards to teach on a limited basis.

Recognizing that any successful plan must include all parties in the educational system, another part of the plan would increase the scholarship fund for high achievers, as well as increase state funding for higher education.

Michigan legislators continue to grapple with the question of funding for welfare versus education. Senate Democrats are still trying to cure the problem of bloated welfare rolls by throwing more money at it. Senate Republicans have taken a different tack, opting instead to concentrate on constructive programs that will permanently remove persons from welfare programs.

Senate Republicans are not heartless; we are realists. Unemployment in Michigan is still high, and the only way that situation is going to change is to make people more employable. The best way to do that is to ensure that those who want a quality education receive one. For that reason, our priorities should lie with increased support for educational programs. Given a choice, I would rather support education proposals designed to help people help themselves, than a program that pays unlimited welfare benefits to the able-bodied.

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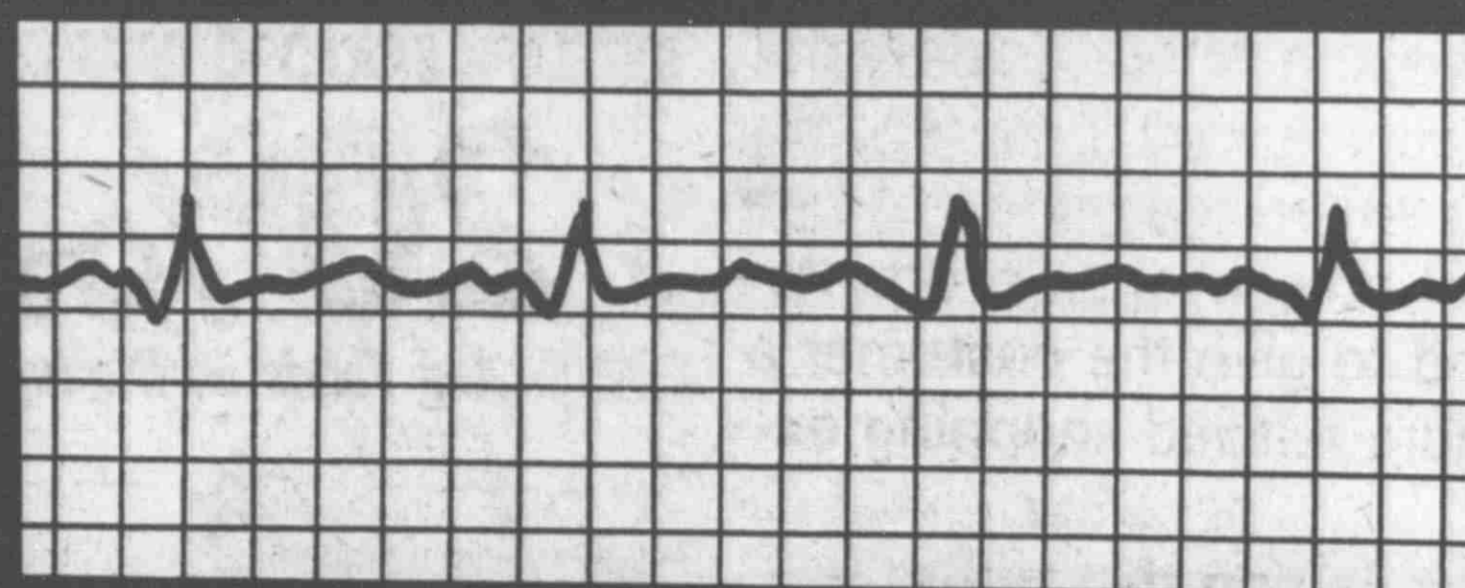
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Wood and Dr. Durkee united in marriage

Arrows loose Beachler's, Ellison honored in District

Northview's Kelly Drake fired a no hitter against the Red Arrows softball team in a semi-final game of the District Tournament. Northview defeated Lowell 10-0 and went on to win the District crown by defeating FHC 3-0. The game was closer than the score indicated as the Wildcats scored 3 runs in the first, but were shut out until the 5th. In the 5th Northview scored on Chris Ellison's only walk of the game and a throw that rolled to the outfield when nobody covered first on a sacrifice bunt. The sixth inning allowed Northview to score two more runs, and the seventh was high-lighted by Kristi Wilson's 3 run homer over Phyllis Beachler's head in center field.

The Arrow bats were silent as Drake faced only 24 hitters. Lowell could only put three runners on base, two occurred in the sixth. Angie Hyzer walked, and Phyllis Beachler was safe on an error but Drake got the next hitter to strike out and end the mild threat.

Lowell ends the season with a 15-12 mark. This marks the 5th time in 6 years that the Arrows end above the 500 mark. The Arrow graduates four seniors, pitcher Chris Ellison, catcher Kathleen Beachler, First baseman Beth Stuart, and shortstop Doreen Rickert. A big thank you to these players for all their hard work and effort this year.

Junior Phyllis Beachler and seniors Kathleen Beachler and Chris Ellison were named to the 1984 Tri-River All-conference team last week. Phyllis was named for the second time, while Kathleen and Chris were named for the first time.

Phyllis had a league batting Avg. of .421 with an over-all Avg. .432. She had 11 RBI's and scored 19 runs in league, she knocked 2 home-runs "Phyllis is an outstanding outfielder with great range and an outstanding arm," stated Coach Bob Rodenhouse.

Kathleen had a league batting Avg. of .432 with an over-all Avg. of .382. She scored 25 runs in league play and 51 runs overall, which is one run short of a team record. Kathleen was a unanimous selection by league coaches. "She was the best receiver in the league and all the coaches respected her arm and receiving talents, commented Rodenhouse.

Chris had a 6-4 win-loss record in league play. She pitched in 11 of the twelve league games. She pitched 68-1/3 league innings and set a new team record by throwing 133-1/3 innings. "Chris was the work horse for us this year" stated Rodenhouse. "She pitched in 22 of the 27

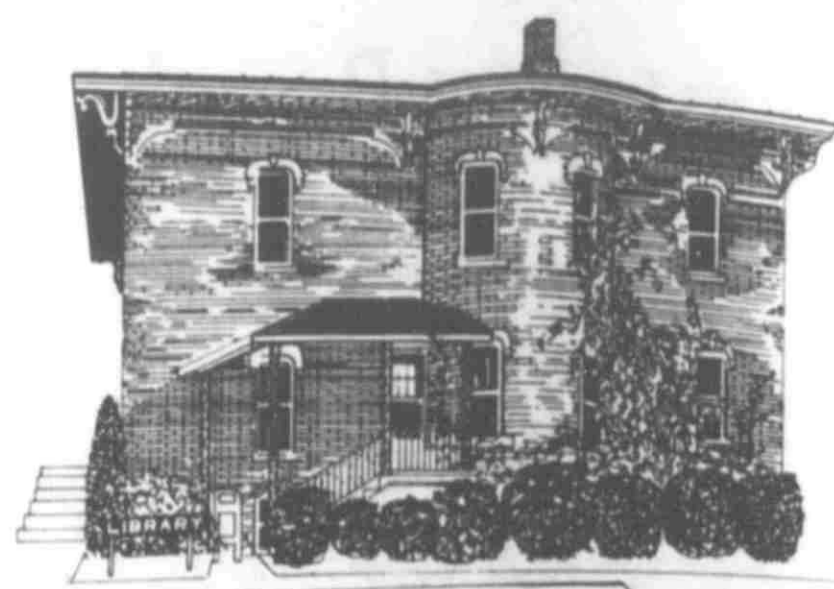

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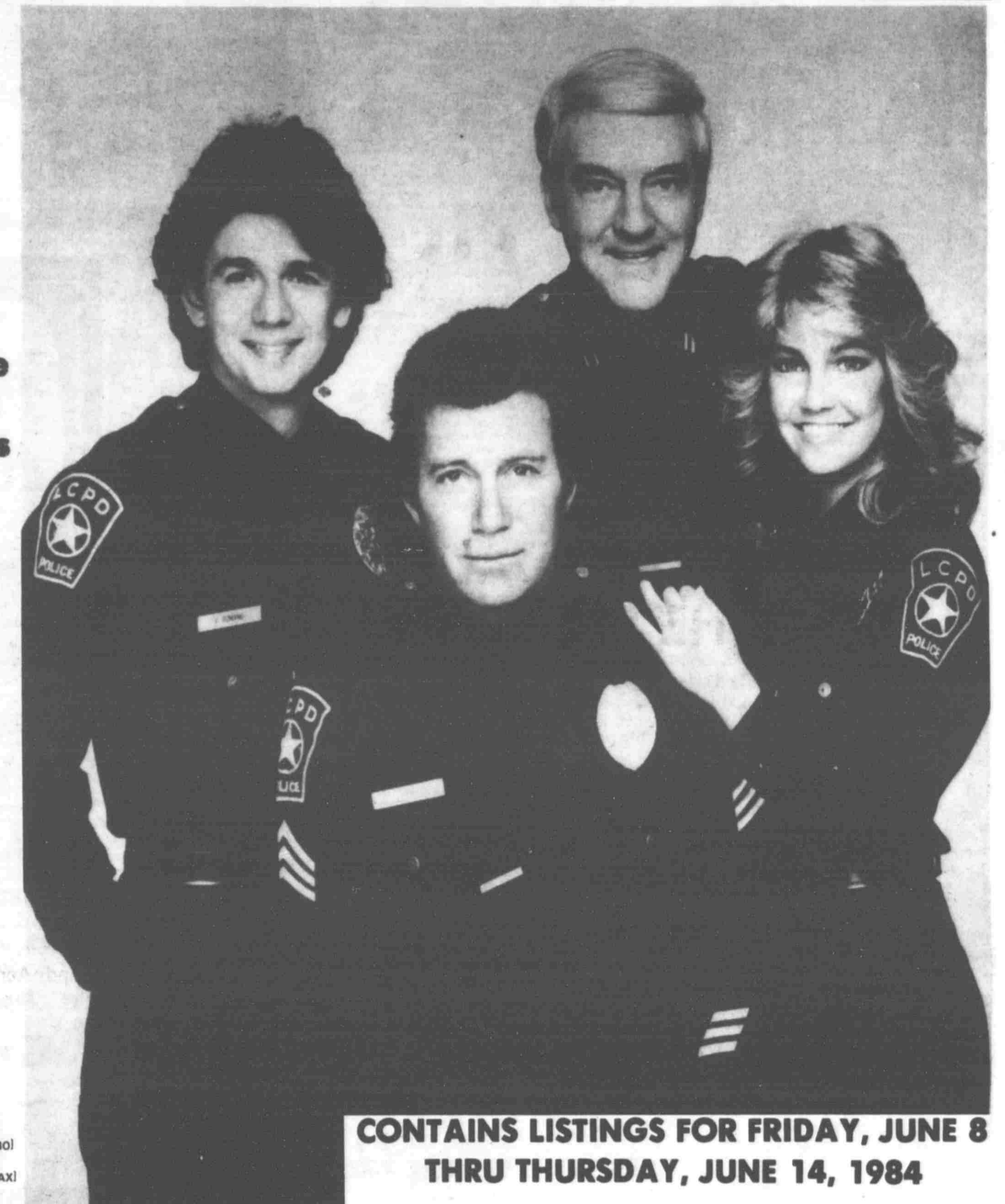

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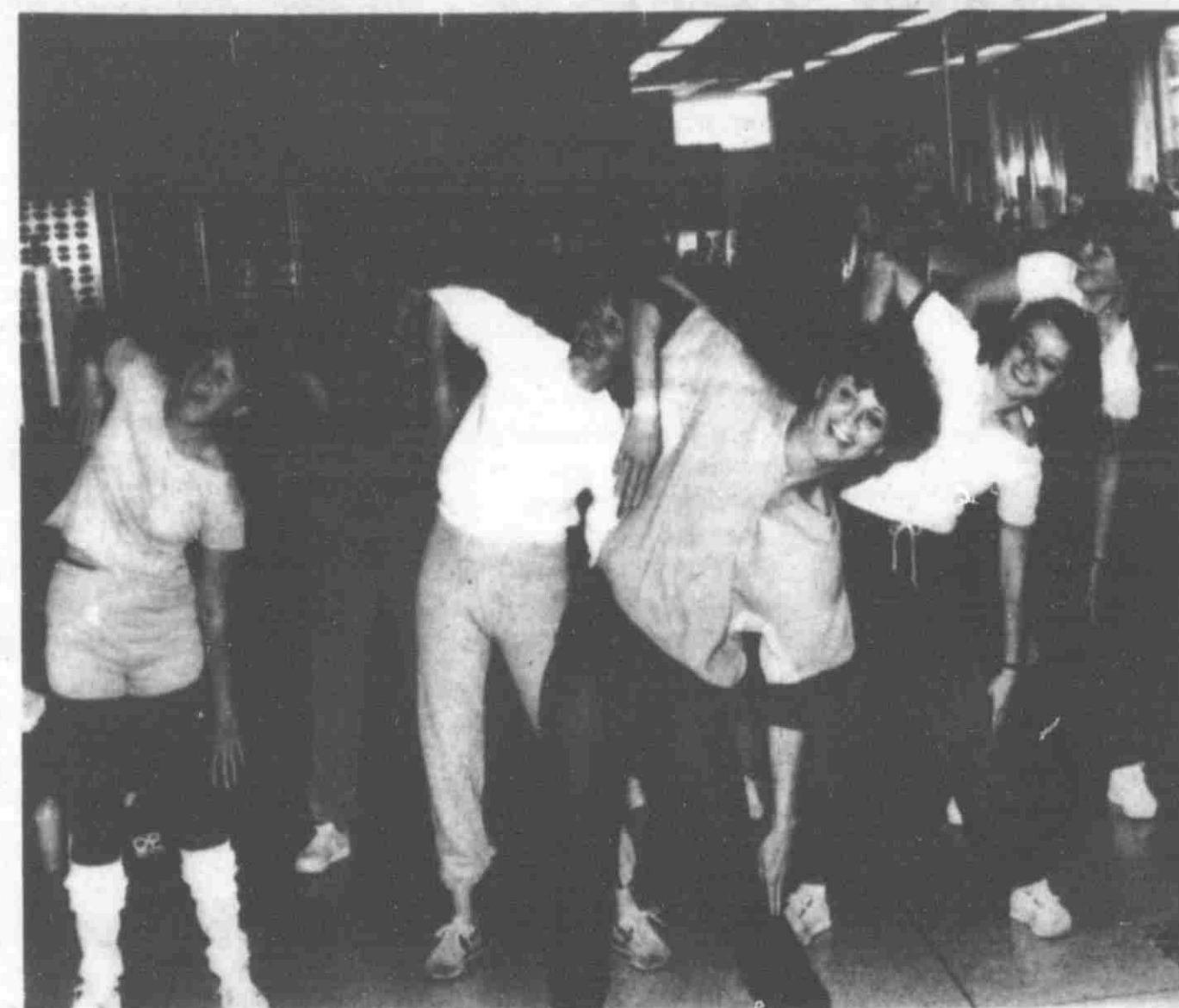

Muskegon woman wins bean soup contest

Muskegon resident Roseleen Gable has won the Michigan Bean Soup Contest, sponsored by the Michigan Bean Commission and the Automobile Club of Michigan.

Gable was among five persons whose creations were taste tested in a final competition May 17 at the Detroit Press Club. More than 1,100 persons entered the contest.

Gable's creation, "Grandma's Navy Bean Soup," includes Michigan navy beans, smoked ham hocks, water, ketchup, vinegar, sugar, salt, pepper, onions,

carrots and potatoes. The contest was sparked by a French food critics description of the Michigan navy bean soup on the menus in the U.S. Senate and House dining rooms. He rated it "friendly, but bland."

Michigan is the only state that has a product printed on the Senate menu. The menu includes a history of the soup and a recipe that calls for "small Michigan navy beans."

Gable will be flown to Washington, D.C., to prepare her soup for Michigan's Congressional delegation and mem-

bers of the Senate. The top prize includes a roundtrip flight via Northwest Airlines and two nights accommodations at the Vista International Hotel.

The runners-up are Patricia Anderson of Big Rapids, Diana Beiler of Flat Rock, Reid A. Cook of Dearborn and Mary Vecellio of Norway.

Each finalist will receive a Rival Crockpot Slo-cooker, a 20-pound bag of Pillsbury navy beans, an AAA flight bag and family season tickets to Boblo Island.

GRANDMA'S NAVY BEAN SOUP

- 1 pound MICHIGAN NAVY BEANS
- 1-1/2 to 2 pounds smoked ham hocks
- 2 quarts water
- 1/3 cup ketchup
- 1/4 cup vinegar
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 1 cup diced onions
- 1 cup carrots, cut in chunks
- 1-1/2 cups potatoes, cut in chunks

Soak beans in water to cover (2 inches above beans), and soak overnight. Drain, add water listed, ham hocks, ketchup, vinegar, sugar, salt, pepper and onions. Bring to boil. Lower heat, cover and simmer for about three hours.

After soup has simmered for about one hour, add the potatoes and carrots. When they are tender, scoop out and save, to be added to soup before serving.

After simmering for about two hours, the meat starts to loosen from the bones. Remove ham hocks and cut meat from bones

into chunks and return to soup to continue cooking.

Continue cooking soup until beans are done and soup starts to thicken, add potatoes and carrots to soup shortly before serving. Serves four to six persons.

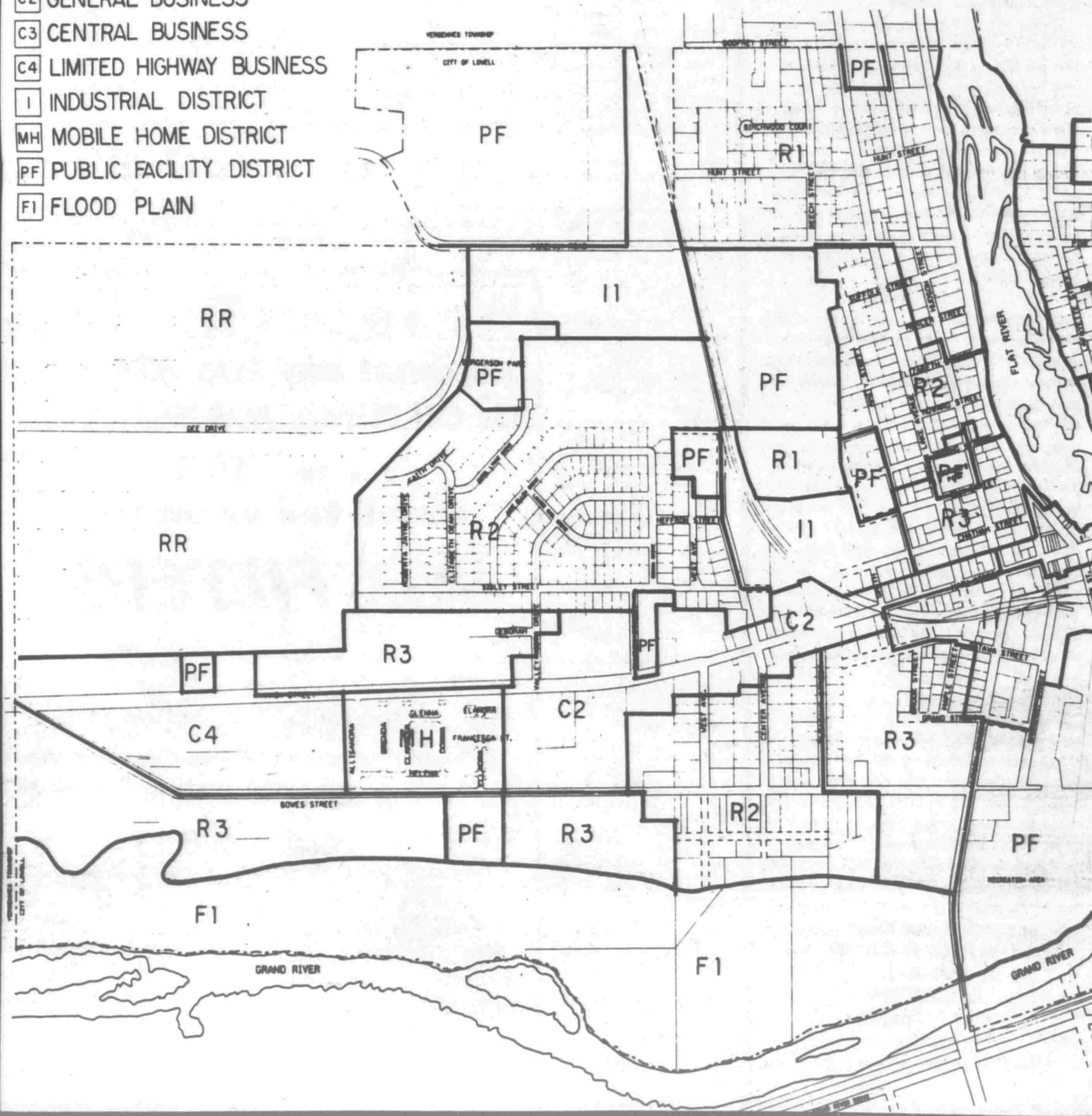

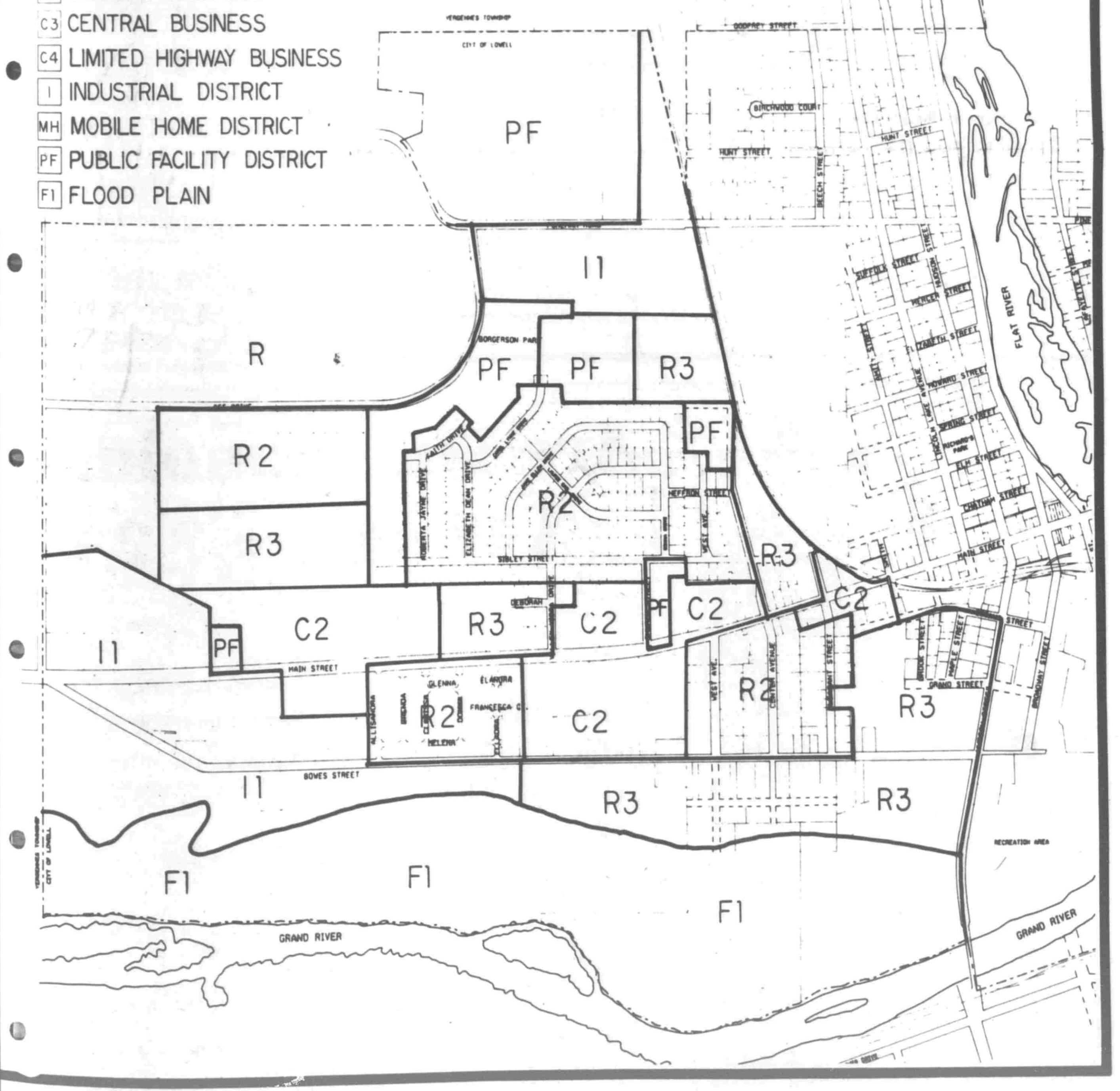

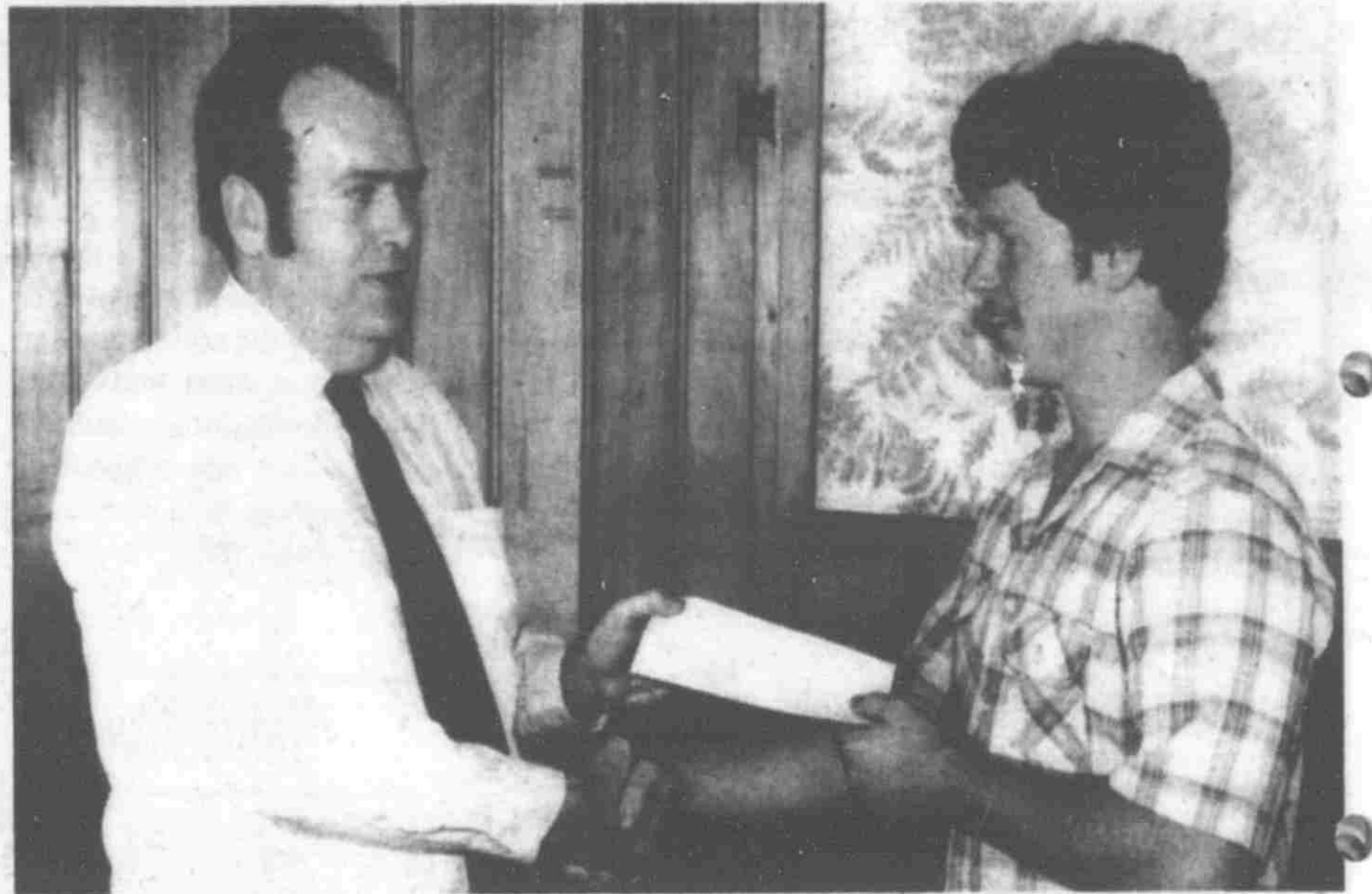

Superior Furniture addition, continued

hand at the meeting in support of Superior Furniture's request. Christoff said that he felt the City Council had been unfair in several cases during previous requests for 198 tax relief. Christoff cited varied lengths of tax relief of 6, 9 and 12 years in different cases and an outright denial of one of their requests. Christoff said that he feels the maximum 12 years should always be granted and that the council definitely needs to adopt a uniform policy for 198 and 255 requests.

Rocheleau echoed some of Christoffs feelings and added that in his opinion the City Council has been sending a negative message to the Lowell business community in past years when dealing with 198 requests. Rocheleau cited the last request from Attwood which was only granted for 6 years, and compared it with Kentwood's open arms approach to Steelcase's recent expansion. Attwood Corp. is a subsidiary of Steelcase and Rocheleau pointed out that Steelcase owns over 200 acres in

Kentwood and Attwood has over 300 in Lowell suggesting that future expansion might well depend on the community's attitude toward business growth.

Following the discussion the council voted unanimously to award tax relief under P.A. 198 for a full twelve years to the proposed Superior Furniture expansion. Following the approval Lee said, We'll sign the construction contract tomorrow and start digging as soon as the D.N.R. approves our site plan". The expansion is subject to Department of Natural Resources' approval since it lies in the 100 year flood plane.

The proposed Superior Furniture Addition will be an 80' x

120' two story structure to the east of the present structure. With an interior mezzanine level it will add 13,880 sq. ft. of sorely needed production and warehouse space to the firm's present 50,000 sq. ft. The new addition will immediately mean the addition of 2 to 4 employees to the Superior's current 33. Lee said that there is a good demand for their solid cherry hand crafted furniture, and some of their patterns are running 5 to months behind. He said the added production and warehouse space will be a great help in speeding their delivery time.

Rocheleau, Christoff and Lee commended the council for their action.

Foster home continued

Strouse appealed to the city council to waive the requirement stating that she had already been approved by the state, and has spent \$700 on new locks, handrails, etc. in preparation. Councilman Dean Collins said that the city already has too little to say about when and where adult foster care facilities are established, and he would not be in favor of relinquishing any authority that they do have.

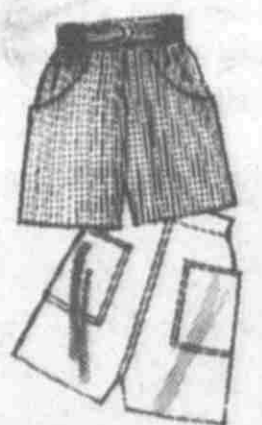
The Council seemed to concur with Collins and did not act on Strouse's request for a variance.
