Plans are set for Lowell's Fourth of July Celebration

The Fourth of July holiday will be celebrated in grand style here in Lowell next Wednesday, and you're all invited to join in the festivities. The day long celebration gets started at 9:00 A.M. with the now famous Puff, Peddle and Paddle competition and canoe races on the Grand River. The three person Puff, Peddle and Paddle teams are in three divisions, men's women's and co-ed. The competition includes three legs, one running, one bicycling and one canoeing with a short dash at the end carrying the bicycle in the canoe over the finish line. There is a \$5.00 per team entry fee for both the canoe races and the Puff, Peddle and Paddle. For further information

Next on the agenda is the 11:00 A.M. parade down Main Street. The parade which will feature three bands will form on Monroe near Riverside School, turn right onto Main Street, turn south at Broadway and proceed to the 4-H Fairgrounds in Recreation Park. Area youngsters are again invited to decorate their bikes, trikes and big wheels for entry in the parade. The Lowell Area Arts Council will judge the decorated bikes near the King Memorial Pool, and ribbons will be awarded to the winners. The Flat River V.F.W. Post 8303 will start BINGO at 10:00, Best Olympic costumes is also a cate-

gory this year.

At noon things really get underway with non-stop live music playing until 8:00 P.M. the ever popular "Outhouse Races" will follow the parade somewhere near the Foreman Building. The races consist of four person teams (3 pulling and 1 riding), for more information contact Fred Reuhs at Man's World Hairstyling 897-8102.

At 1:00 the Lowell and Alto Fire Departments will battle it out in a water ball contest. This competition features a beer keg suspended from a taut horizontal cable that is blasted back and forth by fire hoses. Also beginning at 1:00 are the water carnival events sponsored by the YMCA at the King Memorial Pool. The co-ed volleyball tournament gets underway at 2:00. Rules in this double-elimination tournament are; call your own fouls and at least 3 men and three women per court. There is a \$5.00 registration fee. Contact Jim Hodges at the Lowell YMCA for further information. Beginning at 3:00 is an open swim at the King Memorial Pool. Also at 3:00 will be the start of the YMCA Adult Softball "All Star" games organized by Bob Ford. The Co-ed teams play at 3:00, Men's first round at 4:10, Women's Team at 5:20 and Men's second round at 6:30.

Also a feature at this year's celebration is the Mid-Michigan Tractor and Truck Pull. There are five classes in the competition including modifieds, antiques, trucks and jeeps. Admission is \$2.00. 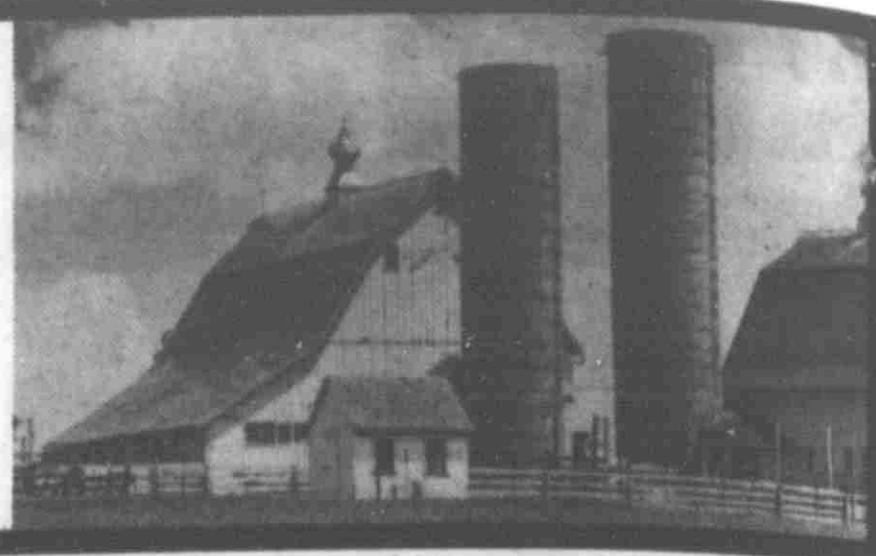

Kent County Farmers may be eligible for emergency loans

Farmers in Kent County who suffered 1983 crop losses because of natural disaster may now apply for Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) emergency loans, FmHA County Supervisor, Roger A. Post, said today.

The county became eligible under new legislation which provides that counties bordering on those which have been named eligible for disaster assistance are also eligible for such assistance.

The legislation also extends to eight months, up from six months, the time allowed to file loan application. For Kent County farmers, this means the deadline for application is October 2, 1984.

Post said farmers who suffered a qualifying loss from

drought or other weather-related disasters, and are unable to get credit elsewhere, may apply for reduced-interest loans to cover up to 80 percent of their losses up to \$500,000. The loans carry a 5 percent interest rate for the first \$100,000, and 8 percent interest on funds over \$100,000. For those able to get credit elsewhere but who choose to apply for FmHA loans, the interest rate is 13.75 percent.

Farmers who think they are eligible may apply for assistance at the FmHA County office, 10 North State Street, Sparta, Michigan 49345. The office hours are Monday - Friday, 8:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M.

Post urged farmers to file their applications as early as possible to speed processing and check delivery.

4-H'ers off to Washington

Ten Kent County 4-H members will attend the Citizenship-Washington Focus Program from June 30-July 7 at the National 4-H Center in Washington, D.C. These Participants will be among 4,600 4-H'ers from 44 states who will attend week-long sessions throughout the summer.

These youth will study individual citizenship responsibilities, our national heritage, and our system of government. Citizenship and leadership skills that relate to economics, government, and international interdependence will be emphasized. Participants will visit Capitol Hill to see government in action and meet with members of Congress. Field trips to historical sites and federal agencies are

also scheduled.

Each year outstanding 4-H members are selected by an interview process to represent Kent County and Michigan. The trip is partially sponsored by local businesses, organizations, and the Kent 4-H Leaders' Association. A miracle in our time

A lot of us may not realize that we have witnessed a miracle in our time. It's a miracle performed by the men and women who grow our food.

The abundant supply of food the farmer produces today is the basis upon which we have been able to build the world's highest standard of living. How?

FARMERS HAVE FREED MANPOWER. During the time of the American Revolution, ours was a nation of farmers. Even as recent as 50 years ago, more than 1/4 of all Americans were farmers. Today, less than 3% feed our nation. This productivity frees the remaining millions of Americans to produce other important goods and provide other vital services.

FARMERS HAVE FREED INCOME. A generation ago, the average American was spending almost 80% of his income on life's basic necessities -- food, clothing and shelter. That per-

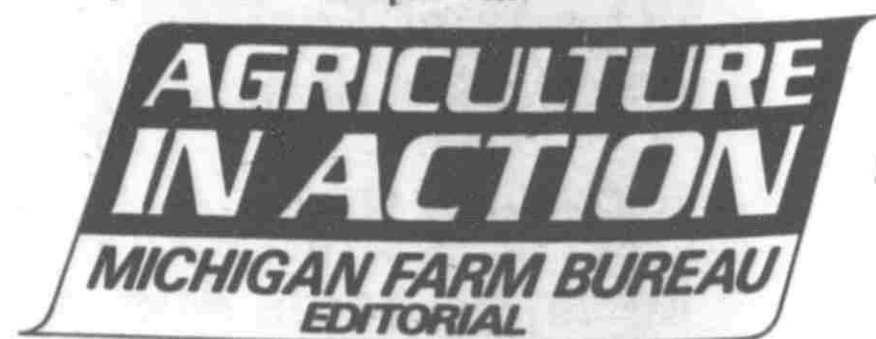
centage today has dipped to 60%.

FARMERS HAVE FREED TIME. The average work week 50 years ago was between 50-60 hours, compared to today's 35-40 hours. Certainly, many things have attributed to this reduction, but if food, fiber and shelter were still costing 80% of consumer spending, workers would not have been able to reduce their respective work weeks.

FARMERS HAVE FREED SPACE. Back when we were a nation of 107 million, it took 350 million acres to grow our food and fiber. In more recent years, we have harvested less than 300 million acres as our population has more than doubled.

These benefits -- income, time, space, better use of manpower -- have been vital to improving the overall quality of life for every member in every sector of society.

A salute to the miracle workers!



A DANGEROUS TREND

Two successive years of removing millions of acres from production should be cause for concern about a negative trend taking place in U.S. agriculture.

Anyone directly or indirectly connected to agriculture had better be proposing a reversal in this negative trend and an immediate switch to the concept of full production.

At stake is the survival of the infrastructure that supports our farmers. Full production helps machine dealers, truckers, fertilizer manufacturers, and on and on goes the list. U.S. farmers are expected to spend \$42 billion on machinery and equipment, ag chemicals and energy this year -- up 13% from last year. But what would the increase be with full production?

Over a million American farm families now depend on off-farm sources for a large portion of their annual income. Most of that off-farm income is derived from other rural enterprises. Thus, the very economic survival of the American farm families depends heavily on the vitality of the non-farm rural economy.

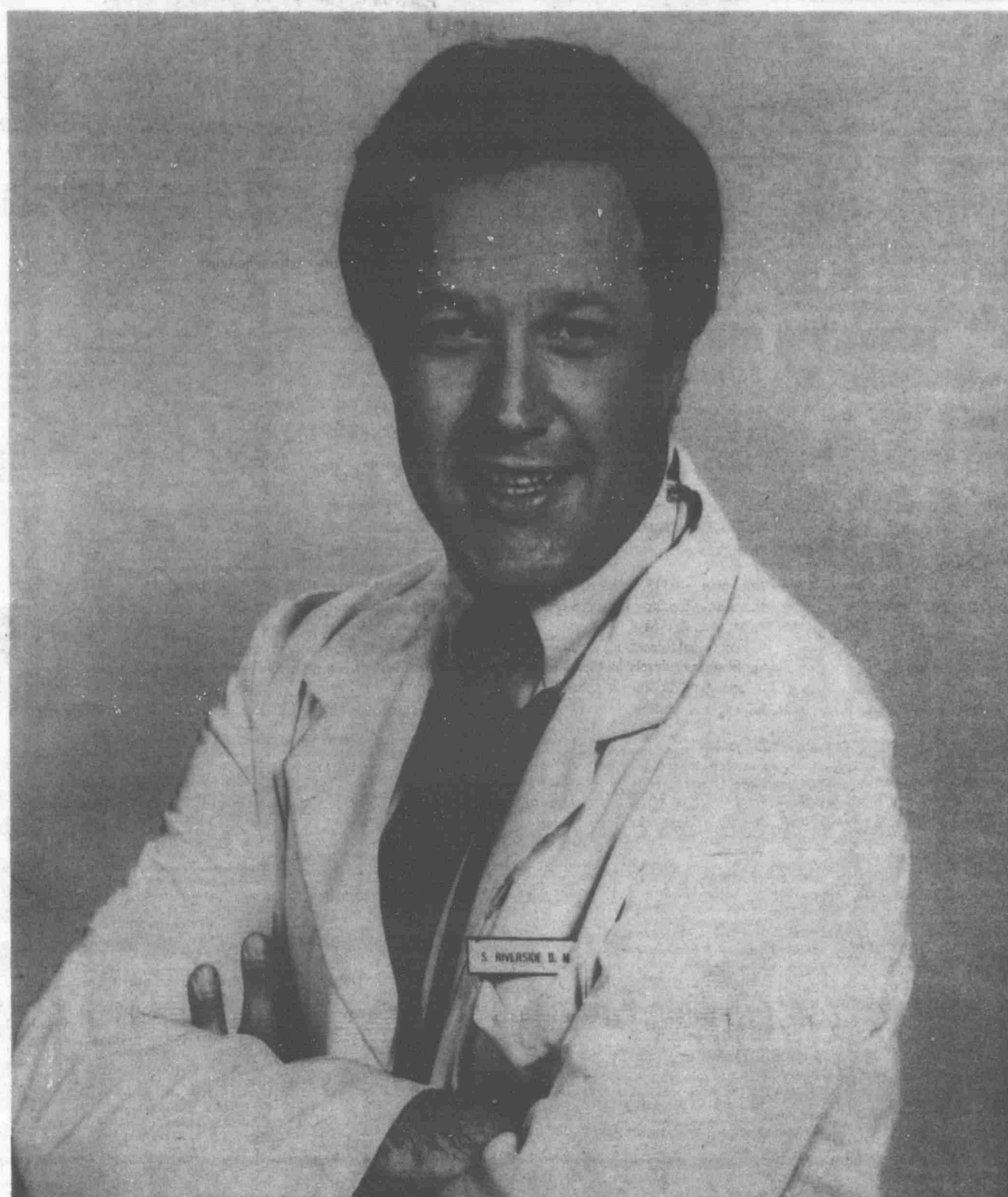
It's estimated that an additional billion dollars worth of exports creates 30,000 jobs to support agricultural production, which makes it clear that as we discuss the '85 farm bill, we must aim for a full production agriculture -- supported by strong exports -- and then design a program to make it work.

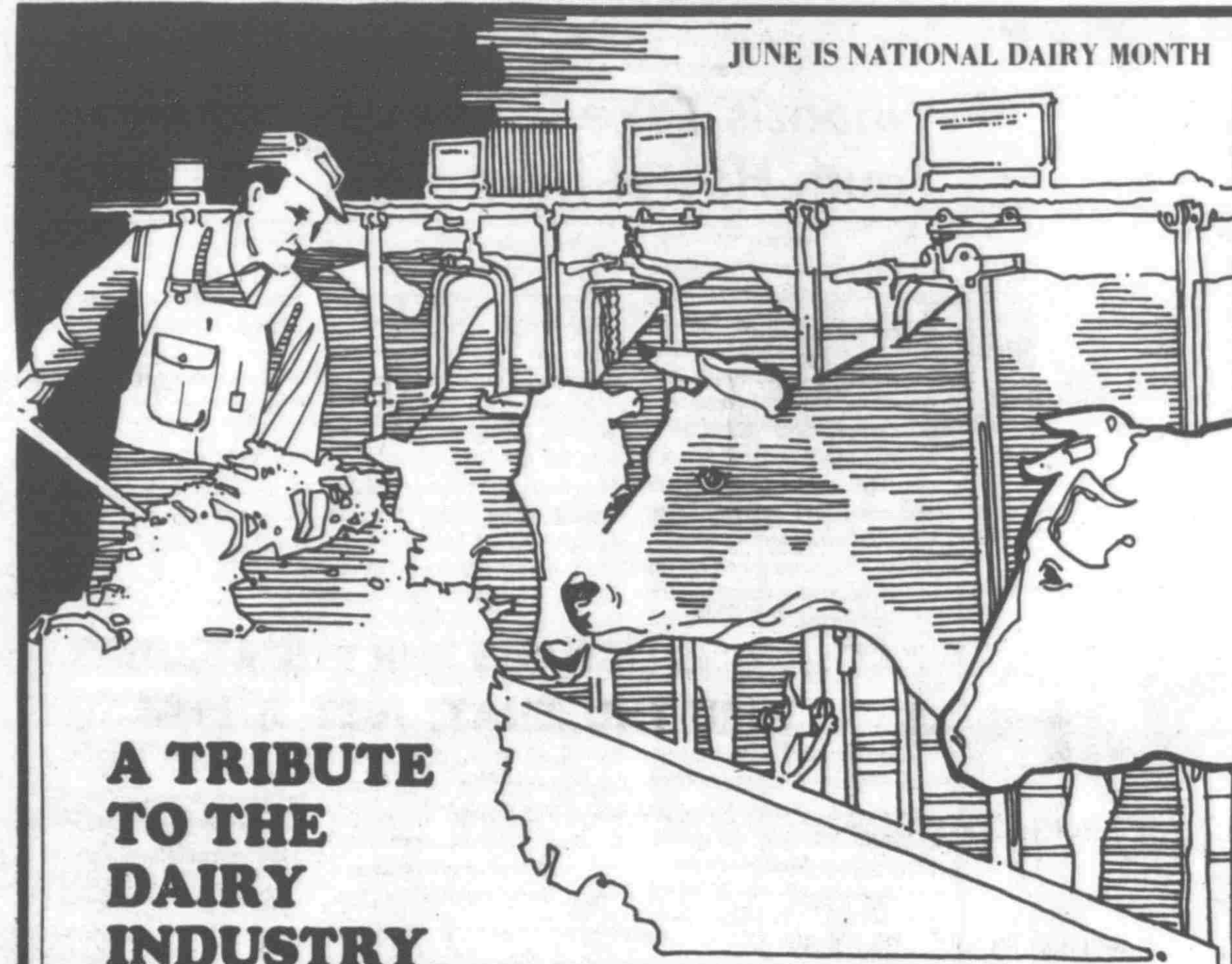

Capitol Column

by Senator Dick Posthumus

A favorite saying in Lansing is, "what goes around, comes around," and a perfect example is the case of the legislative reapportionment plan passed earlier this year. The Michigan Supreme Court has ruled the redistricting unconstitutional, and district boundaries now revert to those in effect prior to passage of the plan. The proposal was added to a bill dealing with obsolete election codes. Under Michigan Law, riders attached to legislation that have nothing to do with the content of the original bill are unconstitutional. However, House and Senate Democrats had threatened to redistrict if Republicans supported the recall effort, which would have given the GOP majority in the Senate. The 1983 plan, which made some swing districts more secure Democratic seats, was pushed through the Legislature during late-night session following the results of December's recall vote. At the time, being the minority party, Senate Republicans could do little more than try to make the best of a bad situation. The bill passed both chambers and was signed into the law by the Governor in time to be in effect for this fall's House elections. The problems generated by the new reapportionment plan were immediate. Not only did it confuse many Michigan residents who had been put in new districts just a few years ago and who now were unsure what area they were in, but also created havoc for election clerks who had just gotten the records squared away. Outraged Oakland County residents filed suit challenging the validity of the plan. Oakland County Circuit Judge George LaPlata ruled the plan unconstitutional, citing the closed cau-

Make sure fireworks are legal for a safe 4th of July

To help clear up the annual confusion over which fireworks are legal, the Michigan State Police offer some definitions and precautions to help Fourth of July celebrants have a safe and legal holiday. The only fireworks which may be sold at the retail level and used by the general public are restricted to: toy paper caps, snakes, toy smoke devices, toy trick noise makers, wire sparklers (size No. 14 or less), flitter sparklers, and both cone and cylinder fountains.

Carefully follow instructions for use; Provide adult supervision and don't allow very young children to handle fireworks; Light only one device at a time; Ignite fireworks outdoors only and away from buildings and combustible materials; Don't attempt to alter or use fireworks in a manner not intended.

Persons having any questions concerning the safety and legality of any fireworks are advised to contact any State Police post or their local police or fire department for assistance.

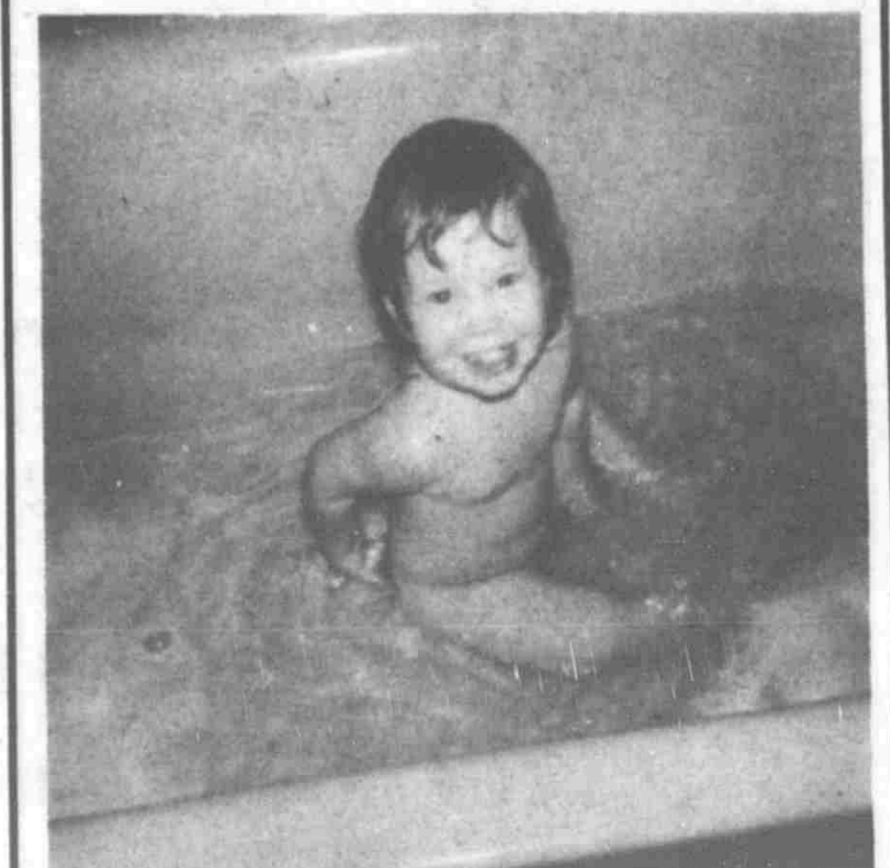
