50th Kent Co. 4-H Youth Fair starts Monday

The Kent County Youth Fair celebrates its 50th Anniversary in Lowell, July 30 - August 3, 1984. Since 1934, the fair has been showcasing the achievements of Kent County's youth. Exhibits range from foods, clothing, crafts, to small and large animals, for a total of 80 different project areas attracting over 900 youth exhibitors.

Special 50th Anniversary activities are being planned. For the first time, professional entertainment is being brought in. The Thrasher Brothers are featured at a County Western concert, Thursday, August 2, at 7:00 and 9:00 P.M. A special attraction prior to the concert will be Ronald McDonald, performing at 6:30 and 8:30 P.M. Tickets are available from any 4-H'er, community businesses, and Believe in Music stores.

Each day from 2:00 - 5:00 P.M., special attractions are planned for the Community Tent. Tuesday through Friday features "Family Day," "Agricultural Day," "VIP day," and "Old Timers Day."

Throughout the week a variety of youth exhibit activities will

entertain spectators: horse and livestock classes; dog obedience classes; a scarecrow contest; clowning performances; a tractor driving contest; and a pet parade; just to name a few. Old-fashion wagon rides will take visitors on a tour of the fairgrounds. Memorabilia will be on display taking visitors back 50 years.

A family-oriented carnival will have exciting rides for young people. Kids rides will be at special rates Tuesday and Friday until 5:00 P.M.

Evening programs will highlight each day. Monday-Scarecrow Contest Judging, 7:00 P.M. (Community Tent); Tuesday - 4-H Youth Rodeo, 7:00 P.M. (Grandstand Arena); Wednesday - Livestock Sale (Reath Show Barn); Thursday - Thrasher Brothers Concert at 7:00 and 9:00 P.M. Special appearance by Ronald McDonald at 6:30 and 8:30 P.M. (Athletic Field next to fairgrounds); Friday - Lightweight Draft Horse Pull (Grandstand Arena).

DONATE TO EMERGENCY UNIT

The Flat River Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars 8303 donated the proceeds from an afghan raffle to the Lowell Rescue Unit. Lowell Police Chief Barry Emmons thanked the V.F.W. members for their efforts on behalf of the Fire Department and Rescue Squad.

RENOVATION GRANT MAXIMUM RAISED

The Lowell Planning Commission approved raising the maximum grant allowed for downtown storefront beautification to 50% of the project up to a \$2,500 maximum. The Lowell State Savings Bank has also offered to loan money to qualified borrowers at 10% for storefront renovation in the central business district. The grants are part of a federal program and the city has \$57,000 available for the project. The boundaries for businesses that qualify include the central business district from Amity to Jackson Streets. The city's engineers developed sketches of color schemes, awnings and other improvements to beautify the downtown storefronts. These grants can be used only for facial improvements. Interior work, roofs, electrical, plumbing, heating etc. improvements do not qualify.

It was something akin to "Christmas in July" last Thursday at Honey Creek Christian Homes. Root Lowell Corporation located at 100 Foreman Road, Lowell donated a used company pick up truck loaded with their garden sprayer products to the home for underprivileged boys. The truck, a 1978 3/4 ton Ford pickup will be used as a maintenance vehicle on Honey Creek's sprawling campus at 11652 Grand River Avenue. The merchandise that came with it will be sold at auction during Honey Creek's annual Country Fair scheduled for Saturday, September 15.

Root Lowell President Dennis Cece said that he had become aware of Honey Creek and their very worthwhile program through his church, and other sources, and he is happy that Root Lowell was able to help their cause. Honey Creek houses about 45 boys in homes on their campus that provide strong family oriented environments that these boys don't have in their real homes. Honey Creek is also a licensed foster care facility that has about 60 more boys currently enrolled in homes other than those on campus.

Capitol Column

As always, a flurry of activity marked the end of an extra-long Spring legislative session. Senate Republicans, operating in the majority for the first time in over 10 years, attempted to bring about some much-needed policy changes. The result was a raft of hotly-debated topics.

Underlying the last six months has been the question of an income tax rollback -- not if, but when and how much. Following the recall of two Democratic senators who supported the tax increase, proposals were immediately presented. A compromise was reached in the final days of session which will roll the current 6.1 percent income tax rate back to 5.35 percent on September 1, 1984 and to 4.6 percent on October 1, 1987, which was the rate before last year's increase. Although the rollback is less than Senate Republicans wanted, House and Senate legislators were at a standstill and a compromise was needed to bring about some relief. A major victory is the fact that the rate will return to 4.6 percent. Governor Blanchard's plan never allowed for a return to the original tax rate, even though he had touted his increase as a temporary one when it was passed.

Primary and secondary schools, as well as institutions of higher learning, received a major boost in the 1984-85 budget, reflecting the renewed priority Senate Republicans placed on education this year. Aid to higher education increased 11.2 percent, \$86 million over last year's allocation. K-12 schools will get \$132 million more than last year, and \$43 million more than the governor recommended. In addition, grant and scholarship funding increased 7.6 percent and programs for gifted and talented students were allocated nearly \$4 million. If Michigan is ever to diversify and strengthen its economy, we must encourage growth and provide support at the most fundamental levels -- the educational institutions.

Other controversial legislation opens up a program that helps maintain facilities which service people from around the state, such as museums, zoos, and other attractions. For years, Detroit has received millions of dollars in special funds that required little accountability. They will continue to receive that money, but Senate Republicans insisted that they be required to account for how it is spent. In addition, a portion of the fund will be available to magnet outstate cities which also attract people from all over Michigan.

In an effort to avoid threatened federal sanctions which would have cost millions of dollars, \$1.5 million was allocated to begin an auto emissions testing program in Oakland, Macomb and Wayne Counties. The program is expected to get under way in the next 12 to 18 months. These are just some of the highlights that marked the end of the Spring session. Look for more controversial and innovative legislation when legislators return to Lansing in the fall.

Over 100 people enjoyed bratwurst and excellent music provided by the "Muscat Ramblers" of Grand Rapids. All I can say is, "What a great place for a summer party!"

In typical Showboat tradition, the party began at about six o'clock under threatening skies. And sure enough, it rained on us before the evening was over. But the rain proved to be very little problem for this type of party, as the band, refreshments and party goers were easily moved to the shelter of the boat's bottom two decks. Insects didn't appear to be a problem, and we were all treated to a gorgeous sunset over the river with the swans gliding over the water along the far shore. As I said before "What a great place for a summer party!"

Most of those in attendance were from out of town, and were captivated by the picturesque setting. Those of us from Lowell spent a good share of the evening conducting informal tours of the boat. The visitors were totally impressed, despite the damage done by vandals, and the need of a fresh coat of paint. I think Showboat may have gained about 100 new supporters from this single party.

I think any type of activity on the boat, or in the amphitheatre is good for Showboat, and I for one would like to see more of it. People come to a party like this, have a good time, go away impressed and tell their friends. When Showboat finally gets up and running again (hopefully next year) people who have been here and learned a little of what Showboat is all about are very apt to come again.

I would guess that the boat could pretty easily accommodate 100 to 150 people if rain forced you under cover, and if the weather is nice, go ahead and invite thousands. There is a nominal charge for renting the boat, and arrangements must be made with the school system for the use of the rest rooms in the Riverside School. Information about renting the Showboat can be obtained at City Hall. Applications for using the school can be obtained at the superintendent's office in the Middle School.

If you should host, or just attend a function at the Showboat this summer, I would be willing to bet that you'll come away feeling as I did about seeing Showboat revived. And that is exactly what Showboat needs... people who want to see it churning down the river again each summer, and are willing to pitch in and make it happen.

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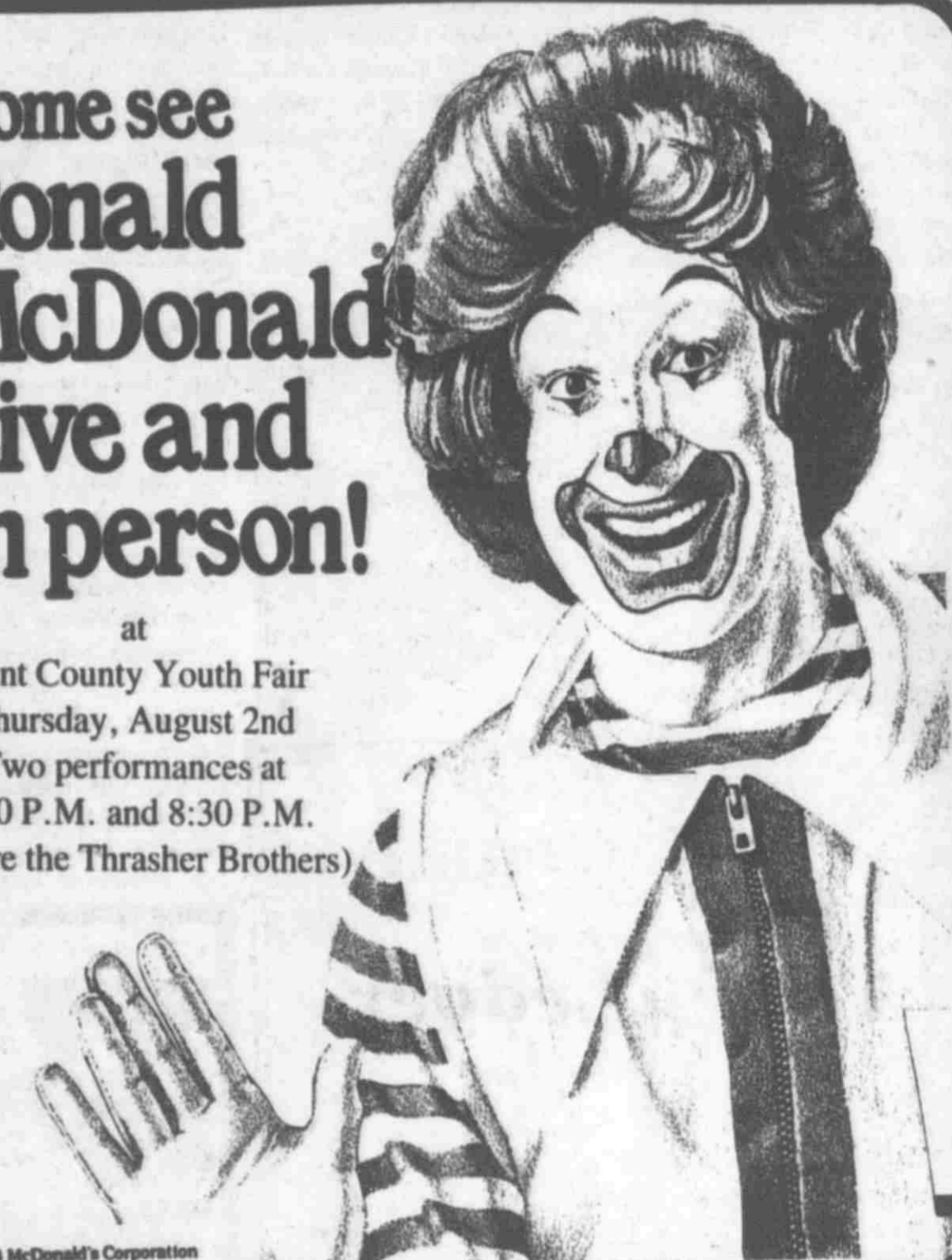

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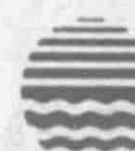

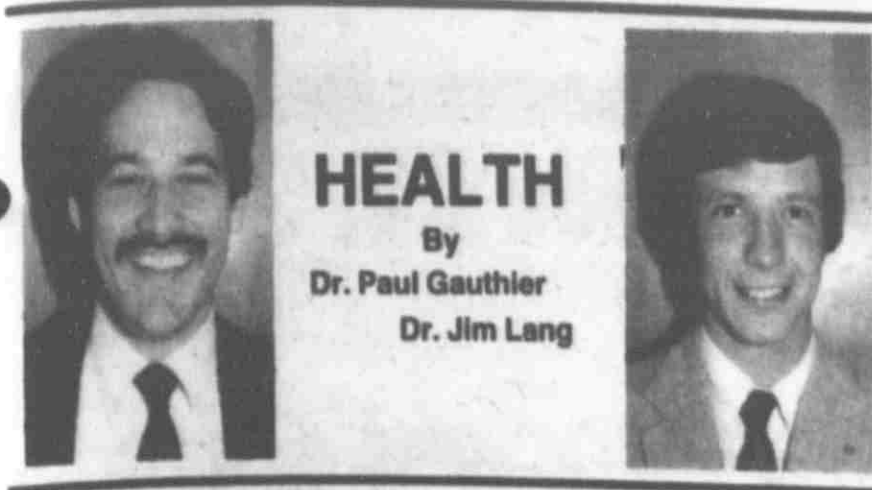

NEW THERAPY FOR HERNIATED DISCS

A relatively recent advance in the field of medicine has been the advent of chemonucleolysis, a technique whereby herniated discs in the back are treated via injection rather than surgery. In today's column we'll explain this new procedure to you, as well as highlight some of its advantages and disadvantages.

Low back pain and "sciatica" are very common complaints in the office of any family doctor. It is estimated that about 50% of adults are at some time during their life at least temporarily incapacitated by low back and leg pain. Many times, protrusion, prolapse or herniation of an intervertebral disc is the cause of such pain. The "disc" is a shock absorber of sorts which lies between the bodies of our spinal vertebrae. Its function is to maintain adequate space between the vertebrae, thereby preventing any impingement on the spinal nerve roots as they leave the spinal cord. If through injury, the disc herniates or "slips", very frequently it will protrude, causing pressure on a spinal nerve root. This pressure results in the characteristic low back and leg pain experienced by the patient with a herniated disc.

For the majority of patients, relief is offered by the simple conservative measures of bed rest, heat, tracin, and manipulation, usually accompanied by the use of muscle relaxants and pain medicine. About 30% of patients, however, receive no benefit from conservative therapy, and a more aggressive approach is necessary. Until recently, this meant surgery, either a discectomy, laminectomy or spinal fusion. Now, however, chemonucleolysis (the injection of an enzyme directly into the herniated disc) is coming into its own as a valuable alternative to open surgical procedures. The injectable enzyme in use is papain, which happens to be an extract of the papaya fruit plant. Interestingly, this substance has been used for centuries not only for wound healing, but also as a meat tenderizer! The enzyme works by chemically dissolving any protruding disc fragments, thereby alleviating any nerve root impingement and hopefully reversing the symptoms of low back and leg pain.

Once the diagnosis of herniated disc is definitely made and the patient has been deemed a good candidate for disc injection, the procedure is carried out in the hospital operating room. The injection is given directly through the skin of the back and down into the area of the herniated disc. No incision is necessary. Recovery time in the hospital is usually two to three days, after which time the patient is discharged to convalesce at home. If the patient has not had favorable results in four to six weeks time, the injection is considered to have failed, and surgery is then the only viable therapeutic alternative.

Chemonucleolysis offers several advantages to the patient:

- 1) Greater safety and ease when compared with surgery
- 2) There is generally a shorter recovery time
- 3) It reduces time lost from work

4) Economically speaking, the total cost of treatment for disc injection is well less than half of that for surgery.

The only distinct disadvantage to disc injection is the possibility of serious allergic reaction to the papain. Only 1.5% of all patients injected have had any serious reaction to the papain.

In summary, chemonucleolysis has become a valuable alternative to surgery in the management of herniated discs. It involves less risk, costs less, and reduces time lost from work. All this from a papaya fruit extract which up until several years ago was only used to soften our sirloin steaks!
