## King Milling & City resolve one issue; another problem is left undecided

The King Milling Company and the city are having trouble seeing eye to eye on a couple of issues that have come before recent city council meetings and a planning commission meeting. At the July 16 Lowell City Council meeting the milling company asked the council to abandon parts of Lafayette and Kent Streets as they cross the milling company's property south of Main St. east of the Flat River. King wants to construct a truck lot on the site so that their trucks can be secured nights and weekends.

The council countered with a proposal to exchange the street right of ways (the portions of the streets in question are only designated streets and have never been developed) for the King Milling owned parking lot south of Main east of the Flat River. King Doyle, president of the King Milling Co. said that they did not want to relinquish ownership of the parking lot partly because they wanted to develop a small park there marking the site of their first mill, and partly because their lawyers had advised against it. The issue was not resolved at that meeting, and a motion was made by the councilmembers to send it over to the planning commission for their opinion.

The issue came up before the planners at their meeting of July 23. At that meeting the planners voted unanimously to not vacate the streets as requested by King Milling. In the interim Lowell City Manager Ray Quada and King Milling officials agreed to propose a lease to the city council; the streets would be leased to King in exchange for a lease on the parking lot. King agreed to the lease providing that the billboard at the rear of the parking lot be razed or improved and that a provision for some type of park be considered that would mark the property as an historical location. The council agreed to the compromise, and the issue was settled.

The other problem between the city and King Milling is still not resolved. King Milling has a huge 500,000 bushel wheat storage bin constructed at the southwest corner of Ottawa and Broadway Streets. To the west of the bin is a truck unloading ramp. Appointments not always needed at Vanity Hair Fashions, Open six days Lowell, 897-7506.

and scales. King Milling wants to construct a second bin west of there on the corner of Hudson and Ottawa Streets. A grain drying facility will also be constructed on the site.

The problem that King Milling has is that trucks can't maneuver onto the unloading ramp without swinging out onto city property to the south. This issue also came up at the July 16 meeting, and the council directed Brian Doyle, an officer with the King Milling Co. and Quada to conduct a study to determine how much of an easement was needed to accommodate the trucks. Doyle and Quada came back to the council at the August 6 meeting reporting that a 20' easement was needed.

Quada pointed out that such an easement creates a problem for a planned carport style vehicle storage facility on this city property to the rear of the Department of Public Works garage. Quada offered a proposal that had King Milling construct along the south boundary of the proposed ease-

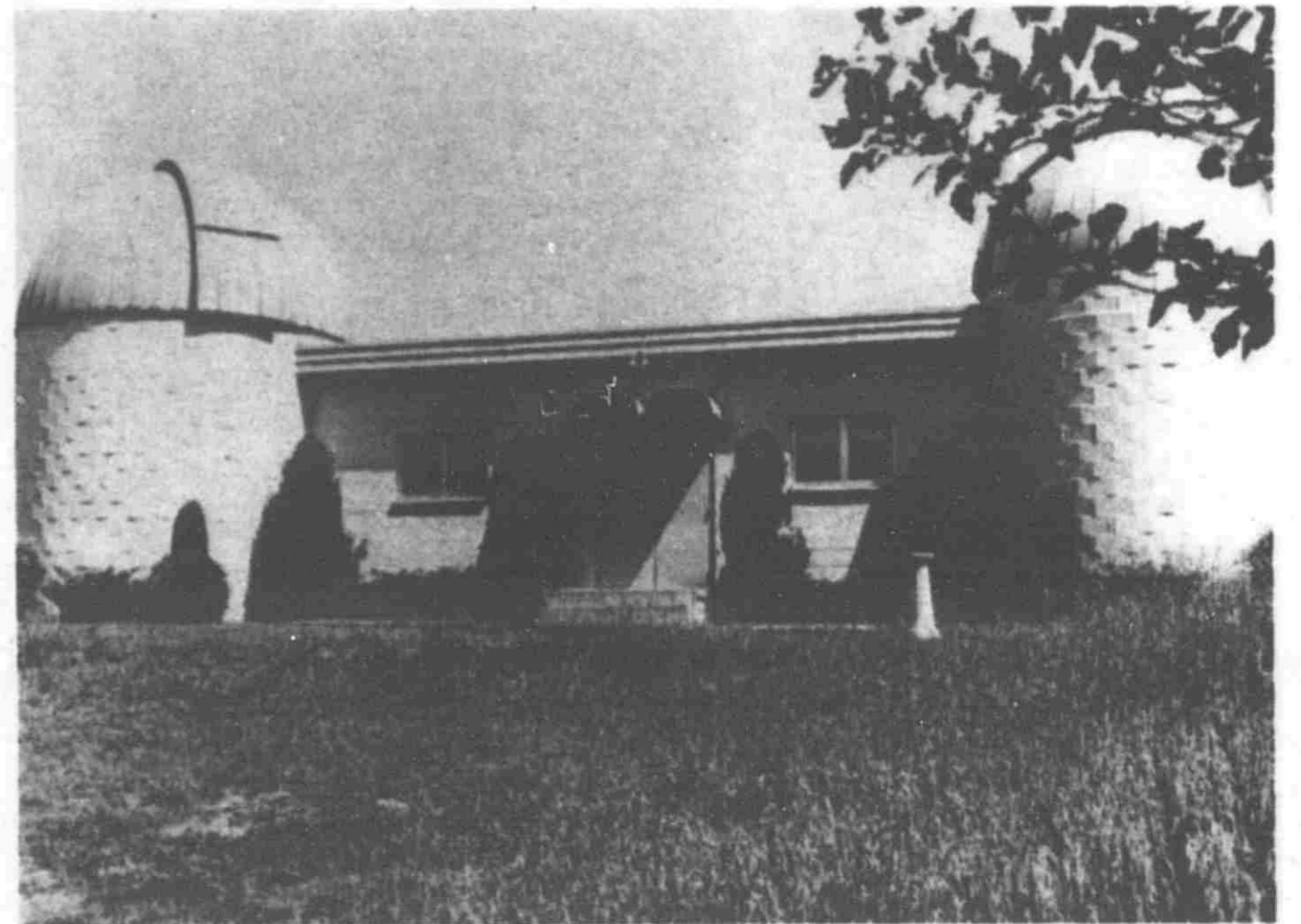
ment and along Broadway, and fill that area plus a 20' strip along the south boundary of the city property to a height equal to the parking lot around the D.P.W. garage.

King Doyle called the proposal an "excessive" price to pay for a 20' easement that would only be used for two weeks out of the year during the wheat harvest. Doyle estimated that such a project would cost \$10,000 or more. He then threw out an offer of \$2,000 for the assessment. Doyle said that his is the oldest company in Kent and Ottawa Counties, employs a lot of people here, and has invested heavily in the community over the years. He went on to say that the new bin and dryer would add more jobs and tax base to the community without creating a water, sewer, police or fire burden to the city. He said, "the council should ask itself what it can do to help a prospering business, not hinder it". Brian Doyle made note of the fact that the King Milling Co. pays some

\$85,000 in property taxes each year.

Quada said, "the community shouldn't have to pick up the tab for the mistake of the engineer that designed the facility with no room for trucks to approach". Councilman William Thompson asked Doyle if he would agree to paying the difference in what the city's project would cost if no easement were granted, and what it would cost if the plans are changed because of the easement. Doyle said that such an approach would be fair, but added that the problem has to be resolved at the next council meeting, or the project will have to be scrapped. A P.A. 198 Tax Abatement request for the project is on the agenda for the next council meeting, and Doyle says that the easement issue must be cleared up prior to the P.A. 198 hearing. The council directed Quada to research the added costs to the storage facility if the easement is granted, and have them at the next meeting.

to Kissing Rock Road. Go north on Kissing Rock about one third mile and look for the observatory sign.

David Stevens, 23, of Lowell was issued appearance tickets for contributing to the delinquency of a minor and for an open container of alcohol in a motor vehicle.

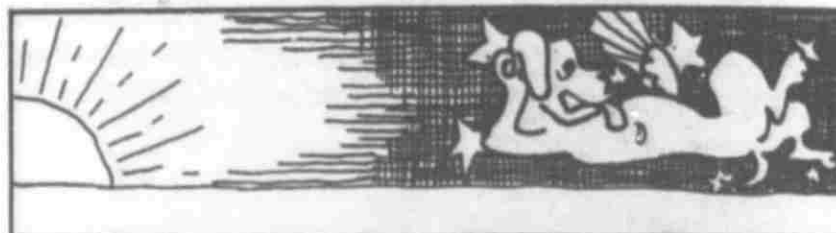

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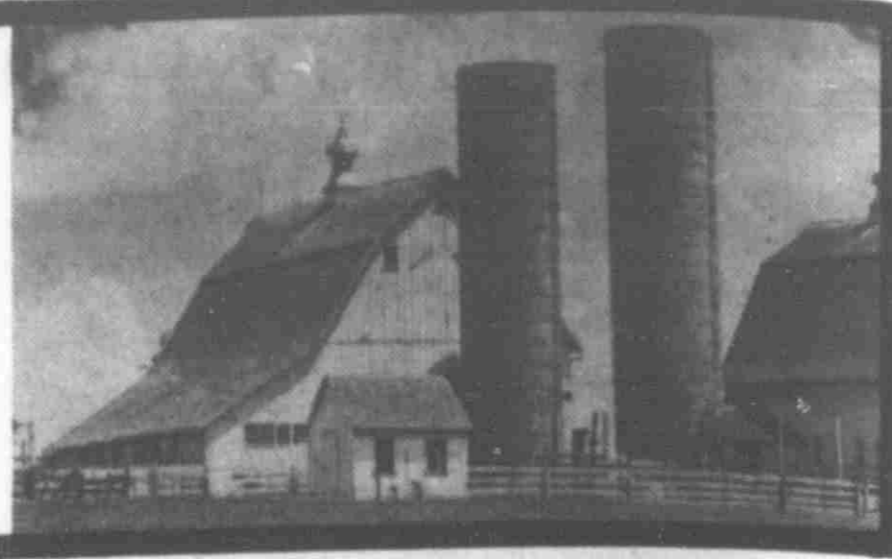

## Evaluate barn heat

During this hot weather, step into your free stall barn (or any other barn for that matter) and evaluate the environment. In many cases, animal comfort and performance can be improved by increased air exchange to reduce heat build-up.

According to MSU's Bill Bickert, Ag. Engineer, removing ridge cap and opening the ridge to recommended width (2 in. per ten ft. of barn width) allows heat trapped in the gable space to escape. Opening the ridge and eaves improves winter conditions by providing moisture control also.

Air exchange in summer depends mainly on winds. If

obstructions such as other buildings, trees and hills restrict winds, air circulation fans may provide some relief. But air circulation is no substitute for air exchange.

Sidewall opening recommendations for existing barns are the same as for new. Provide 3-4 ft. high sidewall doors the full length of both sides or equivalent. In effect, view the barn as a sunshade in summer. Options include: adjustable, tilt-type doors (purchased or constructed) - these provide a wide range of adjustments. Doors hinged at the top or bottom - but large doors become cumbersome to handle. Sliding doors hung from barn

track - only every other bay can be opened. Remove sections of barn siding - sounds drastic, but a low-cost solution. The siding is replaced in the fall.

Take the time to make the barn comfortable and you will reap the benefits of improved performance in more milk, beef, pork or lamb.

## You can adopt wild horses and burros

A little of the old wild west is coming to Michigan August 17-19 when the U.S. Department of the Interior's Bureau of Land Management offers approximately 90 wild horses from Oregon and Wyoming and 75 wild burros from Arizona for adoption to qualified individuals. The animals will be available at the Michigan Live Stock Exchange, 9534 M-52, Manchester, at adoption fees of \$205 per horse and \$130 per burro.

People who promise to give them good homes may adopt as many as four animals, providing they have suitable transportation, facilities and means of caring for the animals. Applications and information about the

Adopt-A-Horse Program are available from the Federal Information Center, 477 Michigan Ave., Room M, Detroit, Michigan 48226; Phone 313-226-7016. Individuals also may contact the Adopt-A-Horse Program, Bureau of Land Management, 350 S. Pickett St., Alexandria, Virginia 22304; phone 703-235-2866.

Persons who apply for adoption in advance will be assured a better selection of animals, but "walk up" applications also will

be accepted from people who stop by the Michigan Live Stock Exchange during the event.

Adoption fees help cover the federal government's cost of veterinary care, feed and handling, transportation and application processing. For at least 12 months following the adoption, the animal remains U.S. government property. After that, if the animal has received proper and humane care, the adopter may receive title from the Bureau of Land Management.

A ship model in a bottle is first constructed outside the bottle. The builder then folds the masts down, slides the ship down the bottle's neck and pulls up the masts with a thread.

## What's bugging your corn ???

"Now is the time for farmers to start checking their fields for second generation corn borer and corn rootworm adults", according to Jill O'Donnell, Extension Agriculture Agent. "we've had a lot of calls on corn borer damage and rootworm feeding on the silks and tassels".

If your corn looks like it's been shot with birdshot, the culprit is the European Corn Borer. Problems caused by the borer often don't show up until harvest time. Stalk and ear lodging and breakage result from the presence of borers which may result in sizeable harvest losses.

"The corn borer declares war on the entire plant. Normally, we have 2 generations to worry about", states O'Donnell. "The damage you see now is that from the larvae of the first generation." They feed on the leaves and leaf midrib before boring into the plant whorl. This feeding appears as white flecking on young leaves.

According to O'Donnell the first generation larvae are all out now and we should start seeing egg masses of the second generation.

Second generation larvae bore into and feed on stalks, tassels and ear shanks as well as leaf collars and developing kernels. This feeding reduces dry matter production and causes broken stalks and dropped ears. Control should be considered if there are egg masses on 1/2 of the plants and first early fleckings seen.

Timing is essential, if you wait too long larvae get deep into the whorl". Corn Rootworm Beetle comes in two varieties, the northern and western, both of which can be damaging to corn crops. Western corn rootworm beetles are a yellowish to greenish beetle with dark stripes on the back which may be reduced to spots or even an entire blackening of the wings. Northern corn rootworms are pale green to yellow with no markings on the back. Both are hard shelled beetles with long antennae. The larvae of both have slender, whitish bodies with a tan head and six small legs just behind the head.

Rootworm beetle eggs overwinter in the soil and hatch when the soil warms in the spring. Young larvae can feed only on

the roots of corn plants, and can significantly weaken root systems by their feeding. Feeding usually results in plant lodging from which the plant usually rights itself, leaving the typical "goose neck" pattern that can leave a field almost unharvestable in severe cases.

Michigan State University entomologists have estimated that over 70% of the state's corn fields do not have corn rootworm levels worth applying soil insecticide. A decision as to whether you need insecticide can be made by checking fields on a weekly basis for at least 35 days after the beetle's first appearance. These checks consist of counting the number of adult beetles on 60 plants in three different locations in the field. If the checks average less than 180 beetles for the 180 plants checked for each of weeks checked then no corn rootworm insecticide will be necessary the next year.

For Ionia County, the approximate dates to make corn rootworm adult count are August 10 through 20.

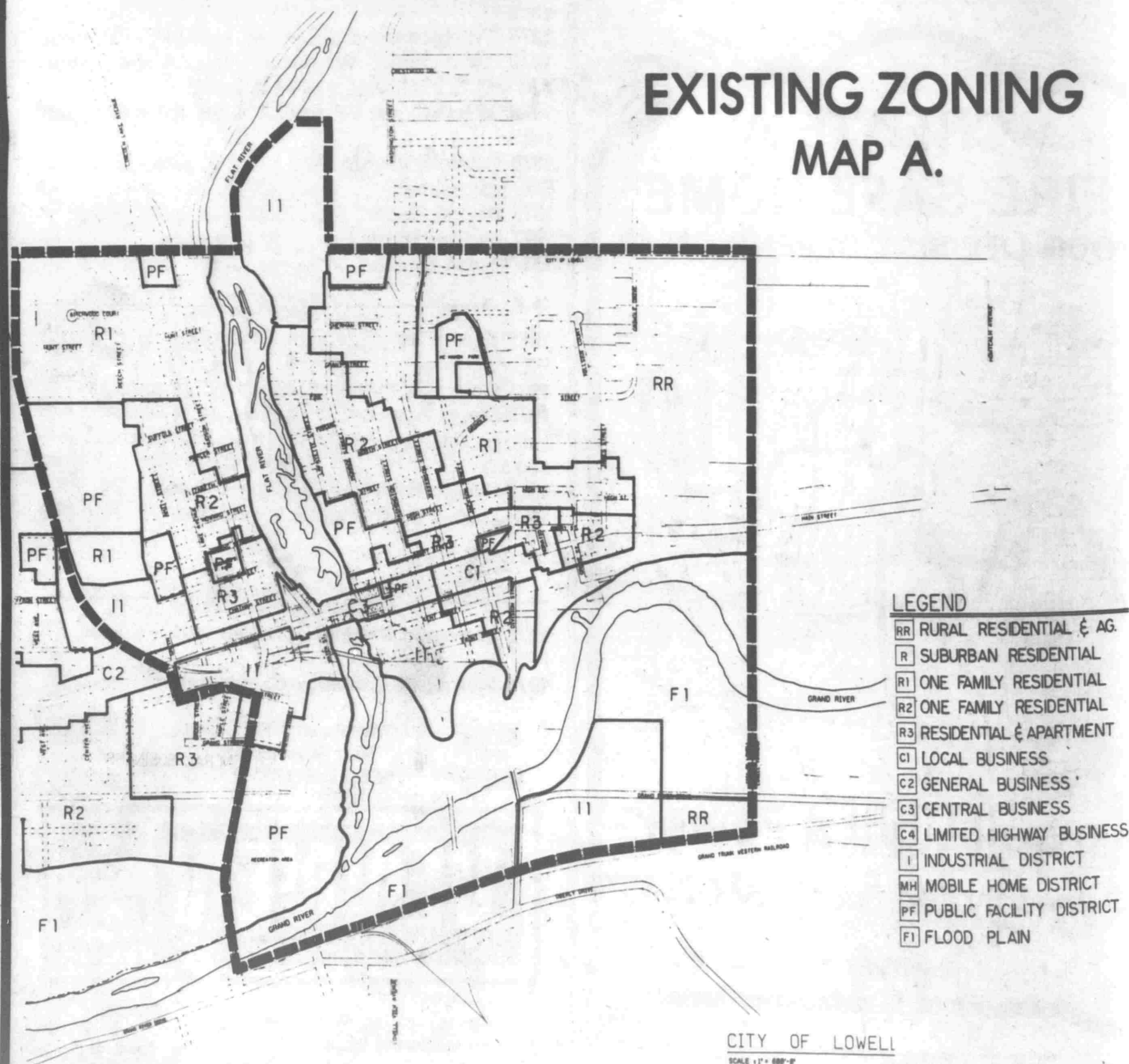

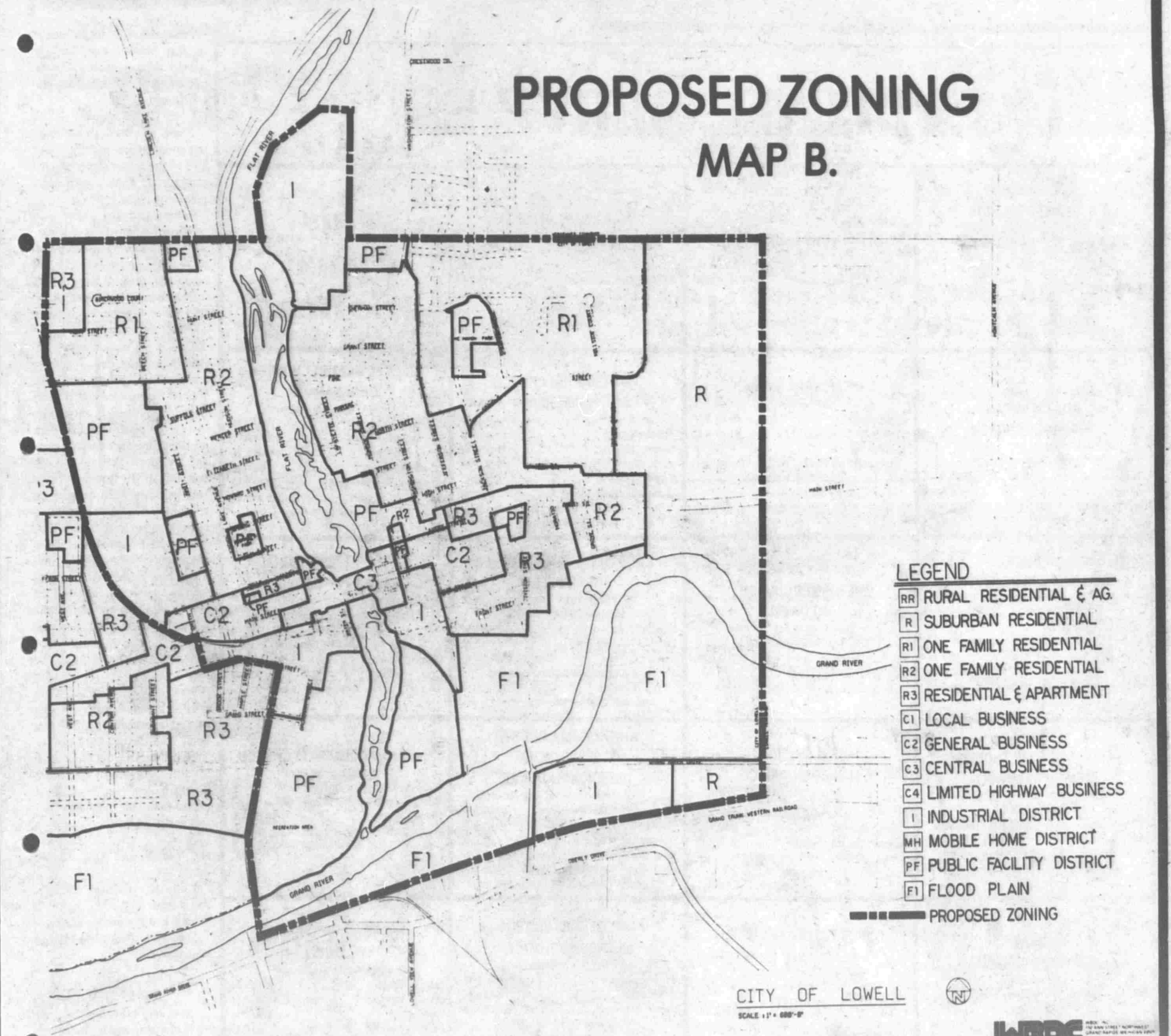
## EXISTING ZONING MAP A.

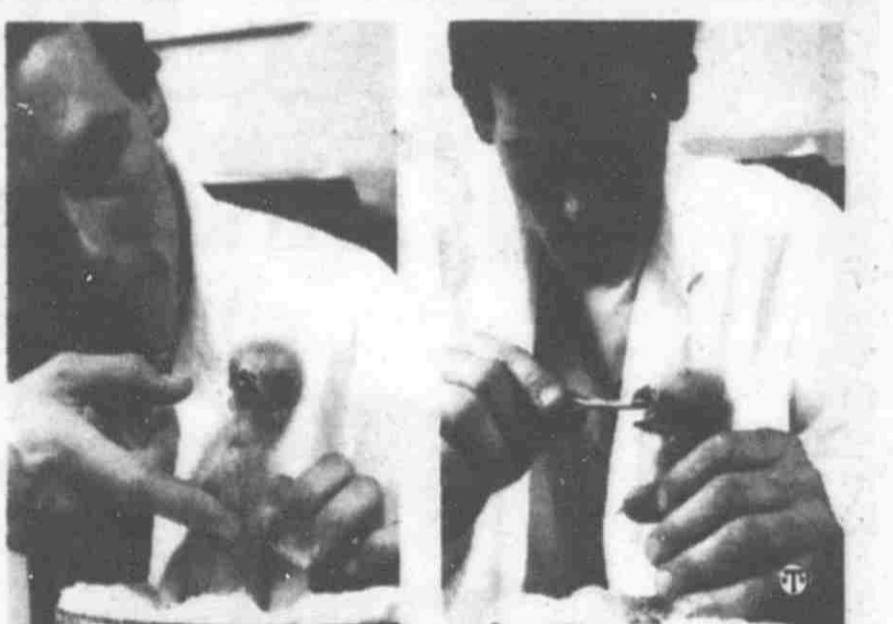
