After reviewing the offer made to him at their third meeting just a week ago, Lippert said that the timing and the offer was just too attractive to turn down .

Lippert will keep his office at 202 W. Main Street, Lowell which houses a new computerized billing system linked to all thirteen of the old Lippert stores. He has contracted with Rite-Aid to continue to perform the billing for the thirteen stores, and may well expand on this service. He has retained a small portion of his staff for this operation, but most main office personnel were released.

Lippert said that he is no way retiring, stating, "I have too many ideas, and too much energy to think about retiring now". He said he is looking forward to entering a new chapter in his life.

Lippert said that all employees in all thirteen stores will be retained by Rite-Aid, but many changes will take place in the stores themselves. Rite-Aid has a much simpler approach to the

teach me thy paths (Psalm 25:4). School bells are ringing. The sound of children's voices fills the air. Little girls in bright gingham dresses giggle excitedly as they walk arm in arm toward the schoolhouse. The boys, less enthusiastic, trudge along behind. kicking the toes out of their newly acquired shoes. After the summer rest period, the teachers are eager to begin helping their pupils develop intellectually once again.

There are many lessons to be learned to God's schoolroom, too. If we are eager to learn, we can profit from the experiences and advice of others, but htere are some things only god himself can teach us. However, we do not grasp all His precepts in a moment of time. We learn them as we sit in His classroom day after day, year after year. With only fifteen years left in the twentieth century, it's amazing to look back on all the wonderful inventions and discoveries that have come to pass in these eighty-five years. 



Manager Quada reported to Council on the permanent easement requested by King Milling Company. Bieri Bros. have quoted \$3,400 to build the retaining wall and fill a 20 foot strip on the south edge of the D.P.W. property, half way from Hudson Street to the east edge of the property on S. Broadway. King Milling has agreed to that cost. The City will then pay the cost of the additional fill needed on the east side of the property to level it even with the D.P.W. Garage. The City and King Milling both would then use the drive at the northeast corner of the D.P.W. property. He recommended approval.

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Schneider that the permanent easement across the City D.P.W. property be granted, contingent upon the final construction of the retaining wall and filling of the property on the south edge of the D.P.W. building, supported by Councilman Thompson.

Carried.

Mayor Maatman then turned the meeting over to Councilman Thompson, Chairman of the Zoning Board of Appeals who opened the Public Hearing on the request of King Milling Company for variances from two sideline setback and height reguirements in an Industrial Zone to allow construction of a second storage bin the same size as the existing one.

Manager quada stated that the front yard requirement for Industrial Zoned property is 50 feet, however, the bin would be on the same front line as the Sortex building, and should not obstruct traffic view. The height requirement is 45 feet, the bin would be 92 feet in height, with the tower at 105 feet.

There were no comments from the audience.

Chairman Thompson closed the hearing at 8:25 P.M.

IT WAS MOVED by Mayor Maatman that the variances of sideline setback and height requirements be granted to King Milling Company for construction of the storage bin on the corner of South Hudson and Ottawa Street, supported by Councilman Schneider.

Council Proceedings

Carried.

Chairman Thompson then turned the meeting back over to Mayor Maatman who opened the Public Hearing on the request of King Milling Company for a Certificate of Exemption under the regulations of Public Act 198 for the construction of the storage bin.

Mr. Brian Doyle was present and stated that since construct tion of the first bin on the property, they have added 10 parttime employees and 5 full-time employees, in anticipation of the second bin. Construction costs will be about \$550,000 to \$600.000.

Mr. Bob Pfaller, representing the Lowell Chamber of Commerce stated that the Chamber is behind the tax abatemen 100% to encourage existing businesses to expand, and to encourage new businesses to come to Lowell.

There were no other comments from the audience.

Mayor Maatman Closed the hearing at 8:30 P.M.

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Schneider that the Certificate of Exemption for the grain storage bin on the corner of S. Hudson and Ottawa Streets be granted for a period of 12 years supported by Councilman Thompson.

Carried.

Mayor Maatman then opened the Public Hearing for a Certificate of Exemption for Metric Mfg. Company also under P.A. 198 regulations for an addition onto their existing building at 1001 Foreman Street, to house a foundry.

Mr. Ron Wells of Metric was present and explained that the original plans to build a separate building had been changed because of a large increase in their business. At that time they had 17 employees, now 29. This 80 x 100 foot addition will increase employees again by 8 to 16 on completion. It will have a separate storm sewer system and sprinkling system, and will make five times as many castings as presently needed to allow for more expansion of their business.

There were no other comments from the audience.

Mayor Maatman closed the hearing at 8:40 P.M.

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Thompson that the Certificate of Exemption be granted to Metric Mfg. for a period of 12 years supported by Councilman Schneider.

Manager Quada stated that when the Certificate of Exemption was approved for Metric Mfg. on their original building in 1983. a resolution stating that there was no adverse affect on the City's financial operation was overlooked and must now be approved.

Manager Quada announced that he would be attending a meeting on Tuesday on the Community Development Block Grant Program at Kent County. He stated that the City of Lowell and other surrounding communities and townships have lay eggs for up to 50 years. Most insects live less than

Under the Manager's Report, Manager Quada stated that a dump truck used for Cemetery care is 12 years old and on its last legs. Specificiations for a new replacement will be ser



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

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

PINK EYE: COMMON AND CONTAGIOUS

Conjunctivitis or "pink eye" is the most common eye disease in the Western Hemisphere. Indeed, in the average family doctor's office pink eye is diagnosed several times each week. In today's column we'll discuss the causes and most appropriate therapies for this beef and pork dinner at the 60th Street, Alto. common ailment.

Conjunctivitis or pink eye is defined as an inflammatory or infectious condition of the conjunctiva (the outer lining of the eyeball), and is classified according to its cause. In general, it is characterized by normal vision, redness and irritation, absence of sensitivity to light, normal pupils, and a discharge that may range from watery to purulent (pus-filled). The three most common causes are bacterial. viral, and allergic.

Patients with bacterial pink eye usually are plagued with pus-like discharge from the eye, with the lids often matted together upon arising. Ususally notable improvement is acheived after the first 48 to 72 hours of treatment.

Viral pink eye characteristically produces tearing, generalized redness of the white of the eye, swelling of the outer layer of the veball and even enlargement of local lymph nodes. This disease oftern affects both eyes, and approximately 25% of these patients will experience fever, malaise, and generalized muscle and joint ache. Treatment is basically nonspecific and is limited to relief of Berlin Wesleyan Church at symptoms. It includes hot or cold compresses (whichever seems to the corner of Portland and afford more relief), artificial tears, and often an eye drop to constrict the local blood vessels. In many instances, your doctor will prescribe an antibiotic eye drop even in viral pink eye, to prevent the possibility of a superimposed bacterial infection.

Allergic conjunctivitis is often associated with the common symptons of seasonal allergy: both eyes are red, irritated, tearing, and may exhibit a white, ropy discharge. Itching is a significiant and almost invariable symptom. Allergic pink eye is most often associated with hay fever. Initial treatment consists of eye drops to welcome. Occasion- tion call (616) 642-6210. ally, if symptoms are presistent and severe, steroid eye drops may be necessary for a few days.

A final word of caution especially to parents of a child diagnosed as having either bacterial or viral pink eye: these infections are extremely contagious from one family member to another. Transmission of the infection is usually by direct contact, so remember a few simple rules:

1) Always wash your hands thoroughly after coming into contact with the affected individuals eyes.







'OUTDOORS' with Jack Friesner

The Annual, fall migration of salmon in the Grand and Tributary Streams is now underway. The recent cool weather and rains has spurred the movement and there are now large numbers at the Sixth Street dam, in Grand Rapids. They are coming over the fish ladder in large numbers and the upper Grand, above Grand Rapids, the Rogue and lower Flat Rivers will soon be full of fish. The run of Chinooks (King) Salmon should be heavy, with lesser numbers of Coho (Silvers), soon to follow. Large numbers of immature Salmon (Jacks) are accompanying this initial run and should provide excel-

The first Salmon, that I know of, was taken in the Flat River at the Lowell dam Saturday morning. This Chinook was taken on spawn, as will be quite a number during the initial run. by the time this is in print there will be large numbers in this area of the Grand.

The died in the wool snaggers seem to refuse to accept the fact that the Salmon will hit lures in the Rivers and persist with their now illegal snagging. Snagging laws are going to be more strictly enforced this season and those who are issued citations will most likely also have their tackle confiscated.

Salmon, especially the early run, hit quite readily on a variety of lures, spoons and spinners.

The Grand River is exceptionally low for this time in the season and the should much improve the fishing. Much of this section of the River is not deep enough to hide the activity of the fish which should enable the fisherman to pinpoint individual fish, thus providing much more accuracy for their casting. The fish are easily spooked and should be approached cautiously

In the past very few angelers have been noted fly fishing, however, this is an excellent means of taking them. Any large streamer pattern in fluorescent colors seems to work well, and believe me a thirty pound Chinook on a fly rod will provide all the thrill and arm wrenching power that any fishermen could ask for.

As of Noon Monday 2,300 Salmon have been counted crossing, the fish ladder at the Sixth Street Dam. I do not know, and cannot reason why the average fishermen

seem to go wild when confronted with large numbers of big fish. of many during the Salmon runs. These fish seem to generate and promote a certain frenzy among even the seasoned and well mannered fishermen. Profanity is exchanged, fights break out, lines are cut, people are hooked, and in many areas total chaos erupts. This is ridiculous, don't forget the golden rule. We must co-exist as humans long after the Salmon run is over. If you cannot act in good sportsmanship, please refrain from fishing. There is nothing more degrading to the fishermen than, ill mannered, profane, unsportsmanlike and littering, contemporaries.

Lowell Area Schools, "Board Notes"

The Lowell Board of Education held its regular Board meeting on Monday, September 10, 1984 in the Board offices. Following the payment of bills, Mr. Chuck Lippert requested permission to address the Board as representive of the committee of citizens interested in promoting soccer as an interscholastic high school sport.

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The Board received the annual 1983-84 Audit Report prepared by Helmholdt and Company as prepared and reported by Mr. Ed Timmer. Mr. Timmer explained that the Board had spent approximately \$141,000 more than it had received in its planned deficit budget as projected for the 1983-84 school year. He stated that the district is still in the position of having to approve expenditures slightly beyond the anticipated revenues but that the actual predictions of the yearend outcome based upon the proposed budget were within 1% of the entire budget.

Several personnel items were acted upon which included the Board's acceptance of resigna-

gradt teacher at Bushnell; Jim Veldheer, the middle school In-House Supervisor; Mr. Curt Aldridge, and Mrs. Ginny Weber as JV Girls Cheerleading Coach. The Board recalled Kim Lum and rescinded the earlier action which placed her on lay-off status. New teachers were hired to fill available positions which included Mrs. Lyn Snyder who accepted the 2nd grade position; Mr. Phil Walcott, as the middle school In-House Supervisor; and Cathy Stover, Pam Taormina, and Pam Heemstra as Special Education Teachers.

In other Board action the Board passed a resolution adopting the statement entitling the district to receive additional State Aid under this year's State Aid Act. The document indicates compliance with state guidelines offering students six class hours of instructional programs in academic areas. The Board also passed a public statement establishing a commitment to address excellence and energy conservation. The document identifies the

students and its commitment in seeking ways to reduce the consumption of energy so that needed operatonal dollars can be transferred to improving instructional programs. The Board adopted a resolution establishing two citizen advisory committees. The advisory committee on instructional improvement and the Technical Assistance Advisory Committee will be composed of 20 members each. A Board committee will meet to recommend a chairman for each committee with advisory committee members to be selected within the next two weeks. The Board also accepted a policy statement involving curriculum development at its first reading. Final consideration for the establishment of Board policies will be

considered at the next meeting. The Board also passed a resolution adopting a document entitled "Superintendent/Board Relations" which is annually reviewed by the Board and the Superintendent. Miss Laurie Kuna, spokesperson for the Project DARE Committee, sought approval from the Board to distribute a questionnaire to selected students in the high school and middle school levels.

The following wheat production steps are based on work Dr. Dave Reicosky and Dr. Larry Copeland, MSU Crop and Soil Science Specialists have done during the past three years. More research is still needed to fine tune these recommendations.

- 2. Variety Augusta or Frankenmuth are definitely the best two

- 4. P, K, and Micro According to soil test apply in fall
- 5. Nitrogen timing and rate (Key to intensive management)
- Planting 25 lbs. Actual N
- March Early April 25-50 lbs. Actual N (depending on tillering needed)
- May 1st/1st Joint 50 lbs. Actual N
- TOTAL 100-125 lbs. N
- 6. Growth Regulator To control lodging; Cerone 1/4 1/3 lb/acre (pending label and registration). Apply between "flag leaf 1st visible and "swollen boot" stages of growth.
- 7. Disease Control Not significant at this time.
- 8. Pest Control As needed (Army worms and grass hoppers)
