Red Arrows win their Homcoming 35-14

An October evening with near shirt sleeve temperatures and an almost full moon made a beautiful setting for last Friday's L.H.S. Homecoming festivities. Following a gala parade down Main Street the Red Arrows went to work and beat the Kenowa Hills Knights 35-14.

During the halftime festivities the Freshman Class won the float competition with their float that looked like a computer which was in step with Homecoming's "Wave of the Future" theme. Phyllis Beachler and Paul Rozich were crowned as the 1984 Homecoming's royalty.

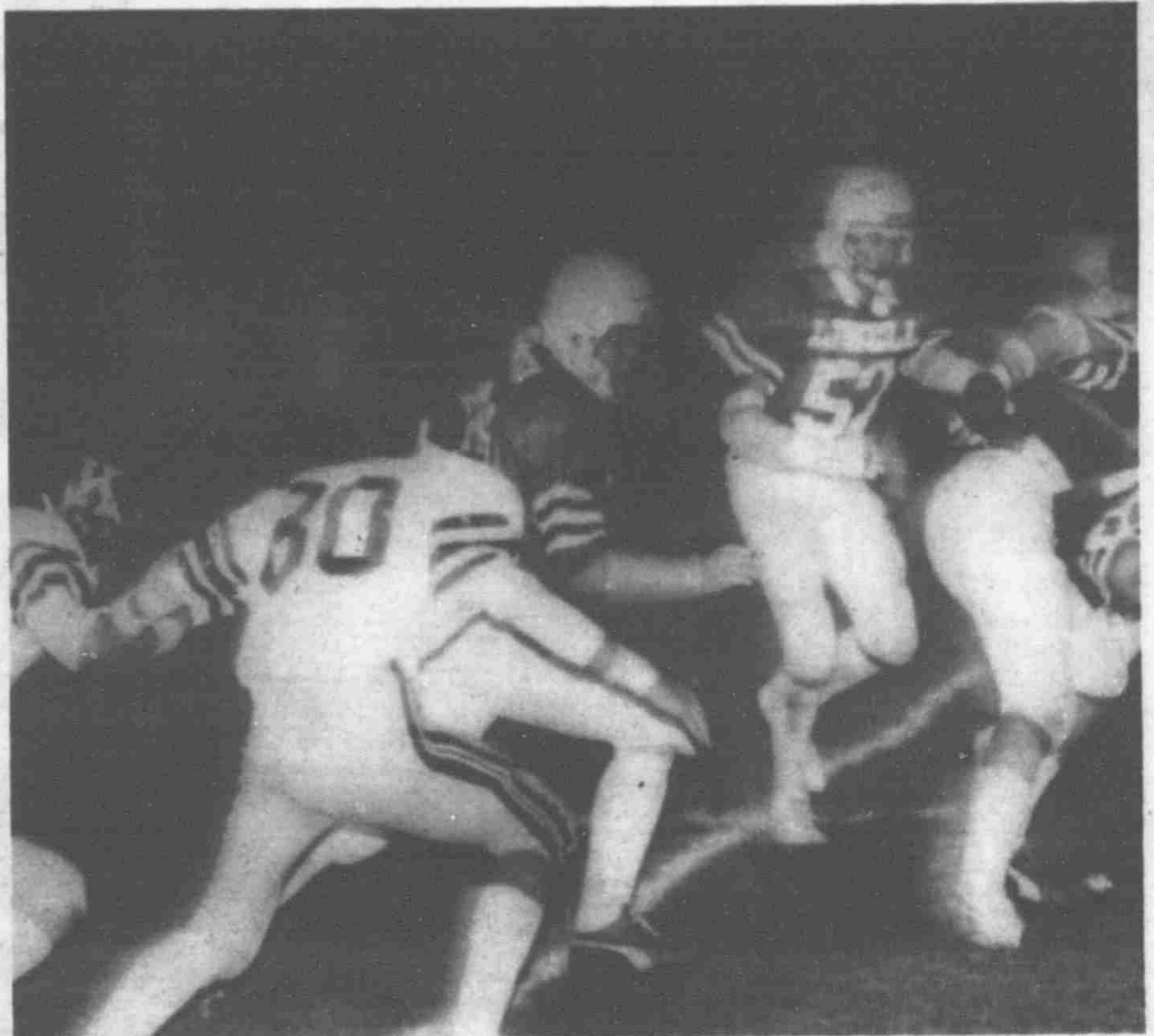
The L.H.S. Band entertained the halftime crowd as well as providing the music for the pre-game parade. The Middle School Band also performed in the parade.

In the game Brian Gessler rushed for 123 yards and three touchdowns, and Mike Dumas added 127 yards to lead the host Red Arrows.

Lowell chewed up 335 yards on the ground while limiting Kenowa to just 60 yards rushing. The Knights relied on the passing arm of Brian Lawrence, who hit 4 of 18 passes for 141 yards.

Dennis Jannenga, who added 72 yards to Lowell's ground game, put the Red Arrows on the board with a 25-yard run in the first period and Gessler sprinted 26 yards for another TD in the first period. A Red Arrow safety, when Kenowa's punter stepped out of the end zone, made it 16-0 after one quarter.

Gessler broke loose on a 55-yard TD dash in the second quarter and Dumas raced 29 yards for another score to give Lowell a 29-0 command in the second period. Kenowa got on the board before halftime when Derrick Marculis scored from the two.

School Board Notes:

Soccer rejected as High School sport

The Lowell Board of Education held its regular Board meeting on Monday, October 8, 1984 in the Board offices. Following the payment of bills, the Board took action on several personnel items. Pam Heemstra was appointed as the new JV Football and Basketball Cheerleading Advisor and Laurie Rehl as the new high school Debate Coach under extra-duty contracts. Mike Fillman was hired as a 5th grade teacher at Alto Elementary School for the 1984-85 school year due to heavy class sizes. The Board granted a ten day unpaid leave to Joan Allinder, a middle school teacher, in order for her to attend an Educational Opportunities Tour of the Middle East, and also granted an unpaid medical leave to Alto teacher, Kim Lum, beginning October 8, 1984 and terminating at the beginning of the day on January 3, 1985.

In other matters, Superintendent Fritz Esch reported on the discussions concerning the establishment of Soccer as a high

school sport. Esch stated, "Given the district's current financial status and the additional costs which the district would have to assume in an area which is of secondary consideration to the replacement and improvement of academic programs, I cannot recommend the Board include Soccer as a varsity sport at this time." Superintendent Esch also indicated to the Board that a complete review of the athletic programs in the district is being conducted along with the operational procedures as compared to other school districts in the league. A full report would be submitted at a later date. The board then acknowledged receipt of the Superintendent's Soccer Report as submitted.

In the next item of business, the Board was addressed by Gil Wise who expressed his concern over the board's policy relating to building and facility use and the charges that have been set. Jim Hodges, Director of the Lowell YMCA, submitted a letter to the Board expressing their

request that the Board review the Building Use Policy and that the YMCA should be treated the same as programs conducted for youth by the School District at no charge for building use. The Board acknowledged the need for the administration to take a look at revising the current policies.

The Board adopted a resolution to endorse Cherry Jacobus as a Board member of the Michigan State Board of Education. A resolution was also adopted by the Board expressing their opposition to Proposal C on the November ballot due to the harmful consequences it could have to the school district if it should pass.

In other Board action, the Board adopted Board policy No. 6131 entitled "Development of Education Program", Administrative policy No. 6131 entitled "Personnel, Instructional Personnel, and Curriculum Development", and Board Policy

No. 6132 entitled "Curriculum Guides and Profiles" on their second reading. The Board then discussed the possibility of installing an 18,000 gallon LP gas storage tank in an effort to save fuel dollars. No action was taken until further negotiations could be made.

In the last item of business the Board approved the schedule change for the Parent-Teacher Fall Conference since the original schedule on Tuesday, November 6, 1984 would not enable non-Lowell staff members adequate time to vote. The new schedule is as follows:

Capitol Column by Senator Dick Posthumus

It used to be that every election cycle brought renewed calls for more and more citizens to register to vote. As a result, Michigan now has the highest voter registration percentage in the nation among those eligible to vote.

Some questions have been raised, however, as to the accuracy of registered voter lists throughout the state. In some localities, the registered voter rolls allegedly exceed the U.S. Census figures of eligible voters.

Statistics like that tend to make public officials sit up and take notice. In addition, there is a trial currently under way involving conflict of interest charges against two city officials who were also election commissioners participating in the re-election campaign of the Mayor of Highland Park.

Obviously, it is time to review the voter registration procedure

and the elections process itself. A bipartisan effort is under way to begin a study of the system, incorporating both political parties and an outside legal firm. A high number of registered voters is fantastic, but only if that number truly reflects those who actively participate in the political process. Voter apathy is one problem which all of us must continually work against. However, voter distrust prompted by inaccurate voter polls cannot be tolerated.

William Tweed, the boss of Tammany Hall, once said, "As long as I count the votes, what are you going to be about it?"

In Michigan, it is our goal to guarantee to the voters of this state that when their votes are counted, they are counted properly and that the process under which those votes are cast is above reproach. Our political process will not tolerate anything less.

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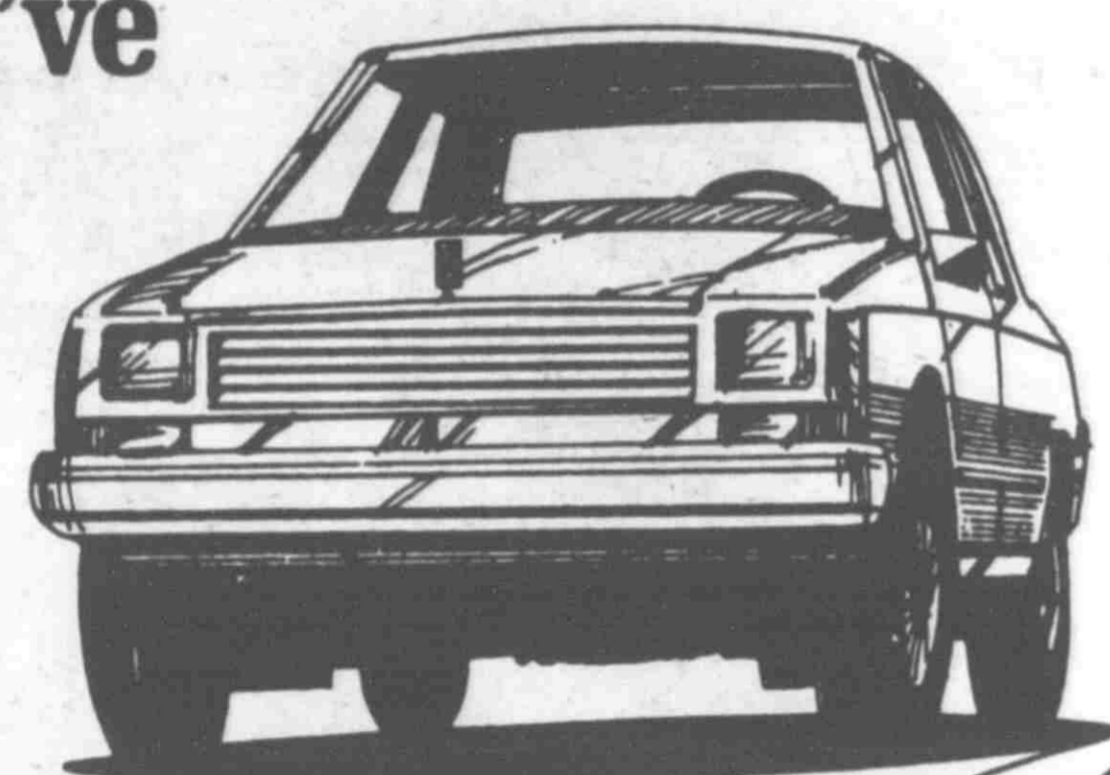
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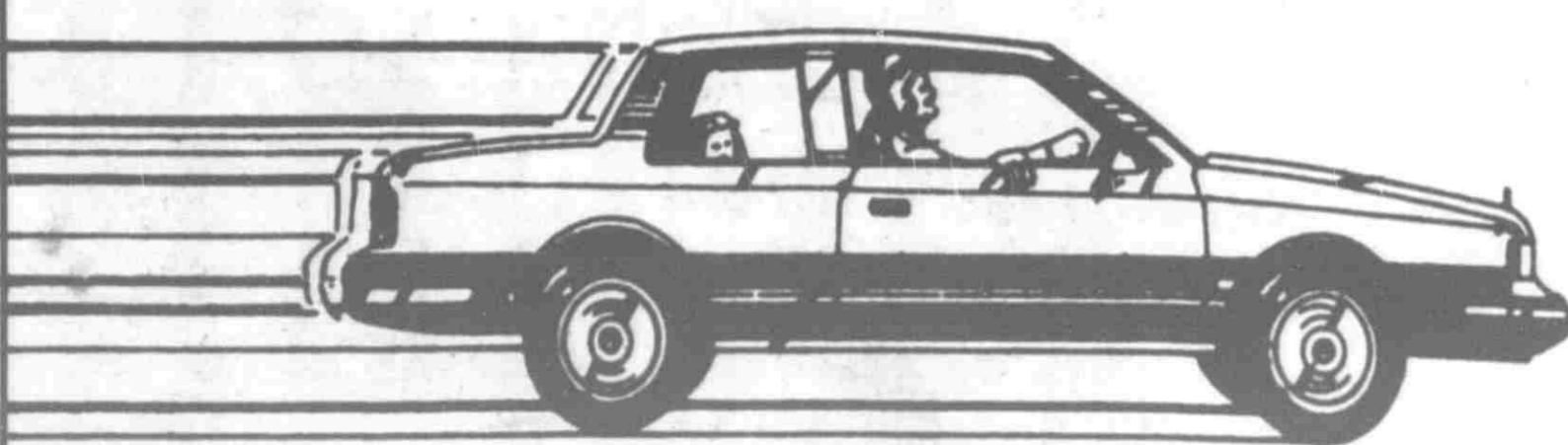

Beachler took charge in the second quarter scoring 9 of the teams 11 points and Lowell trailed by 4 at the half.

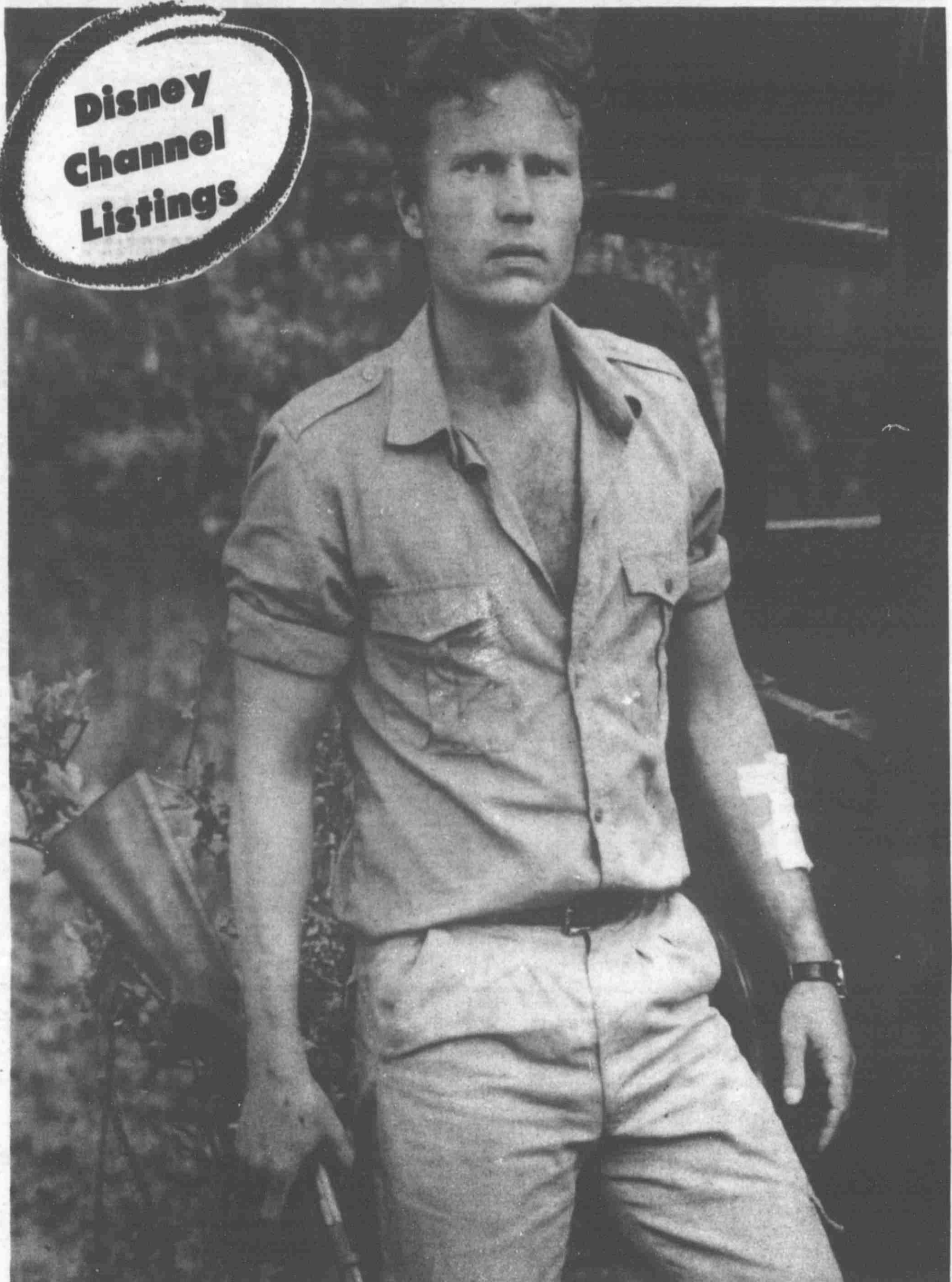
Each team traded baskets in the third quarter and Central led 29-24. In the fourth quarter Lowell came within 2 points but could not overtake Central.

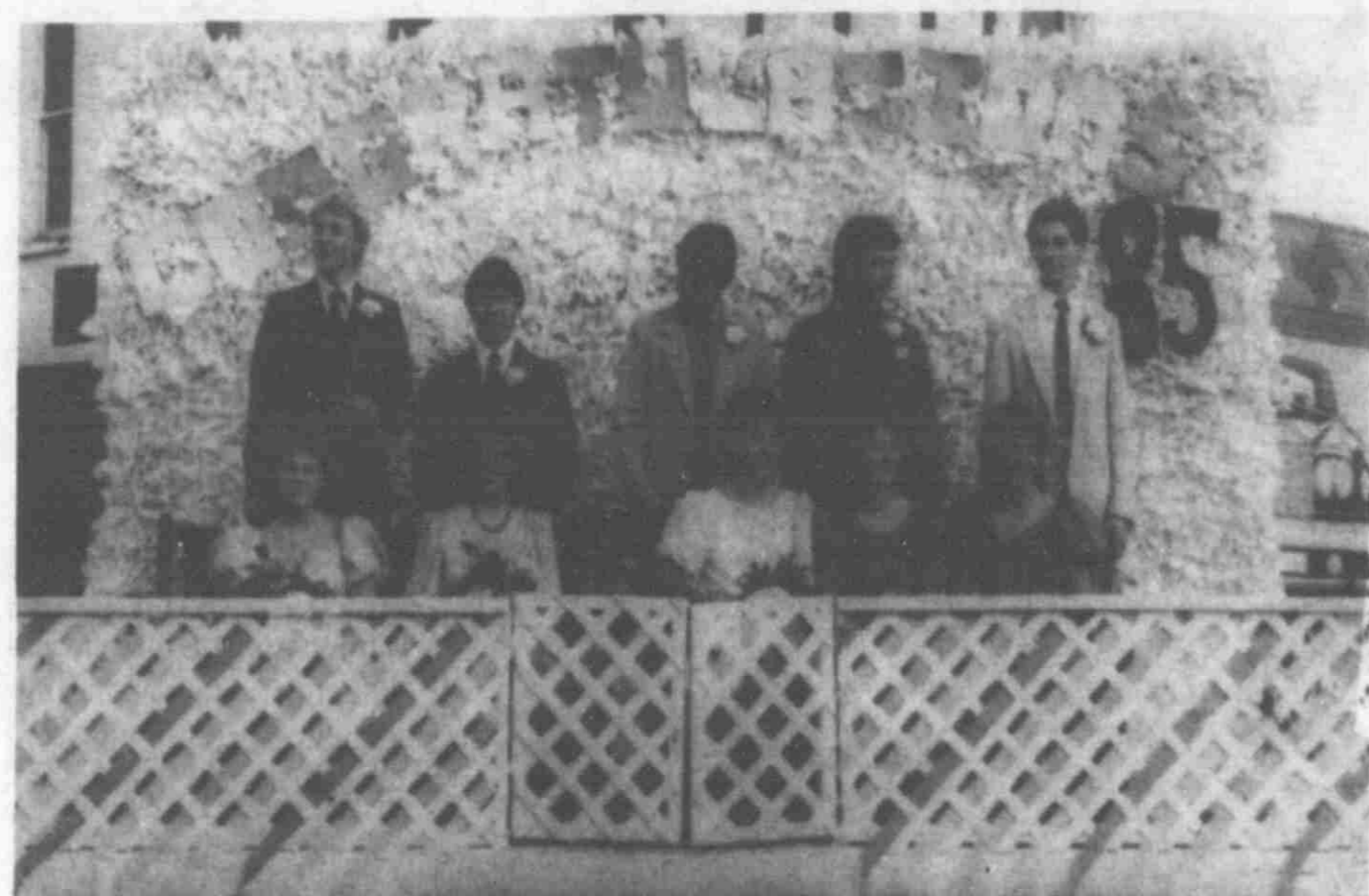

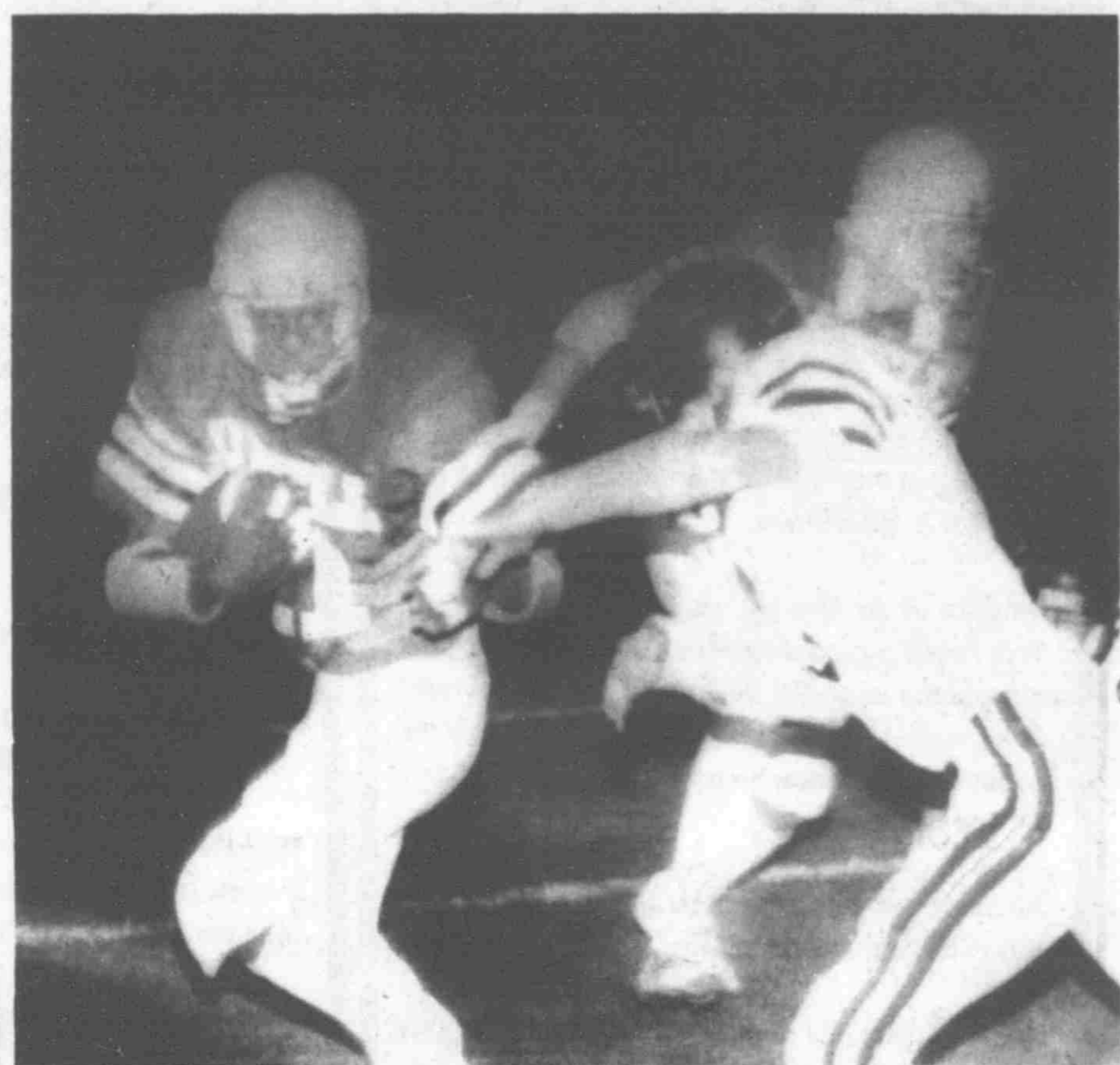

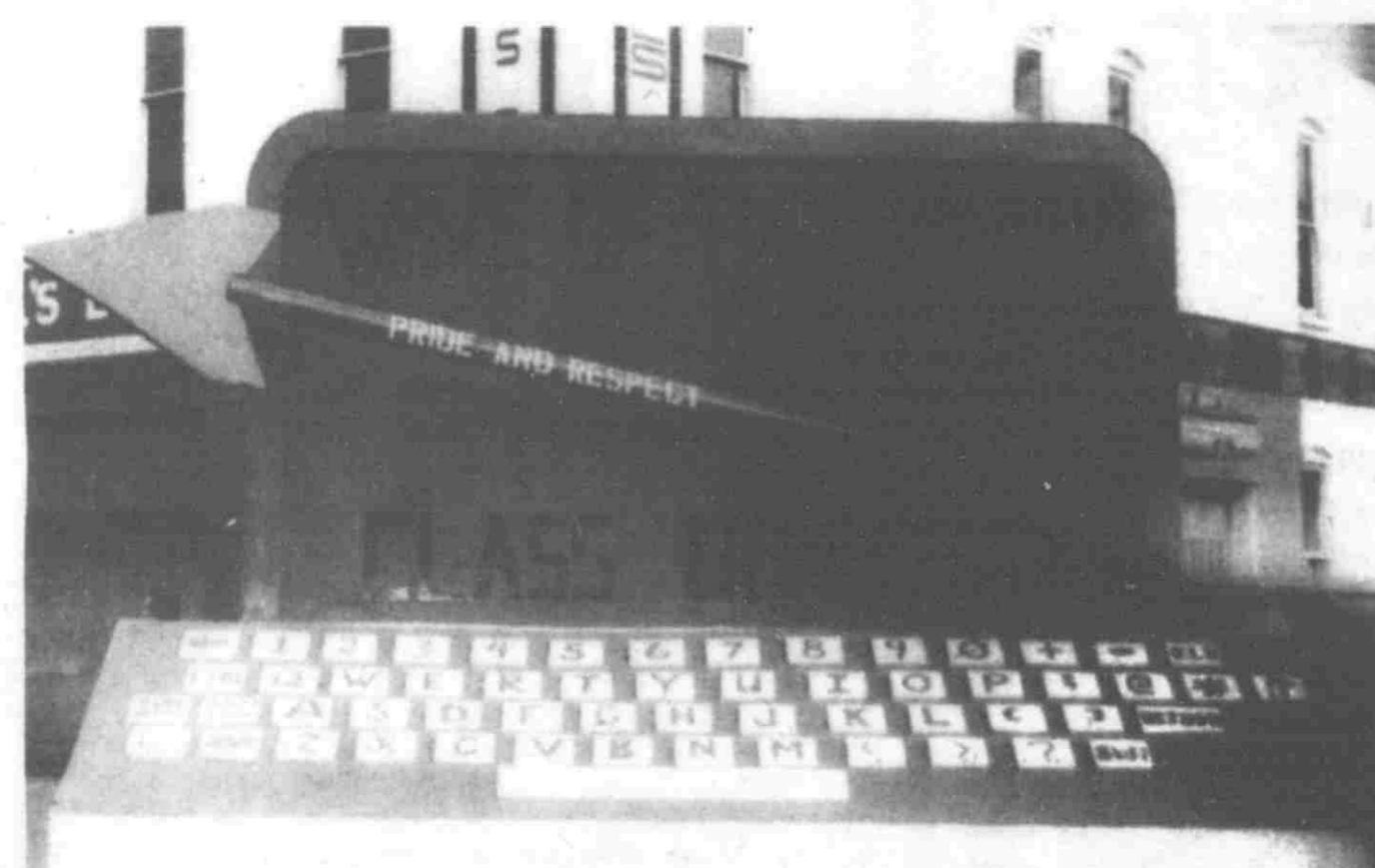
