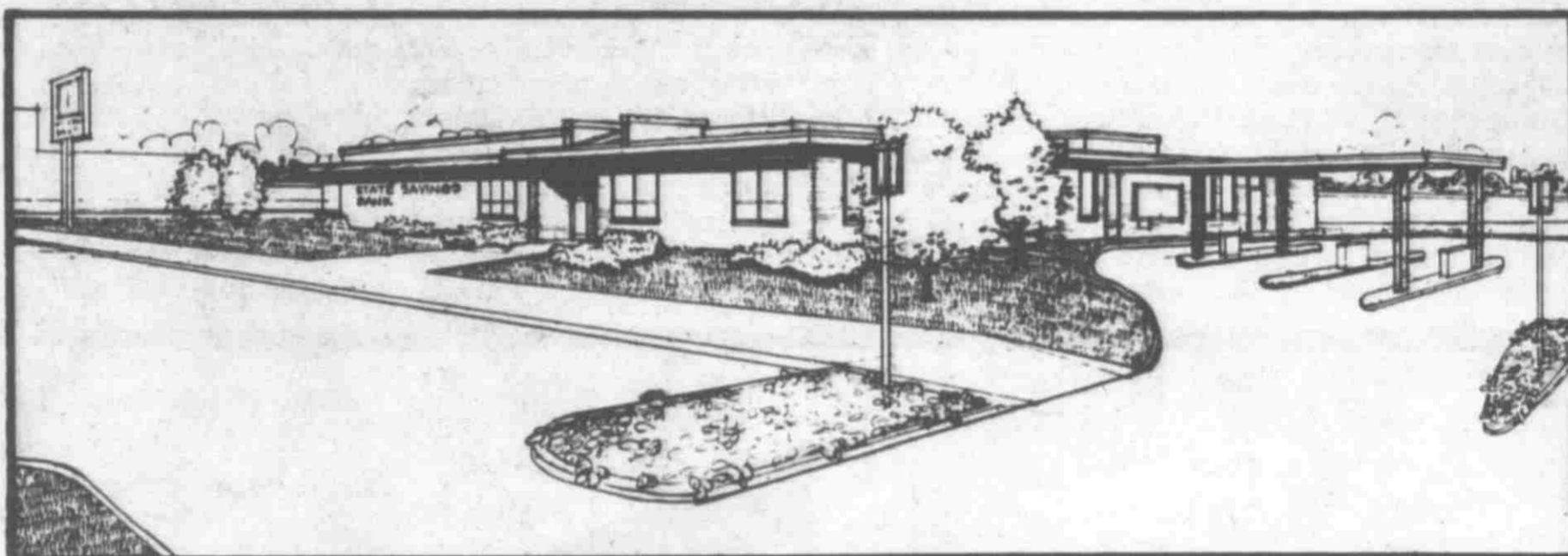

ness here the bank has found that they have just plain outgrown their facility, and have approved a \$450,000 expansion project to the south of the existing building, nearly doubling their floor space. The new addition will add two more teller's windows bringing the total to nine, double the drive-up banking lanes to four and accomodate several new offices and sorely needed room in the bank's computer and bookkeeping department.

"For nearly a year now two bank officials have been sharing space in the bank's boardroom", said the bank's President Keith Caldwell, adding, "we had to do something, and after much discussion it was decided that adding on to our present facility was more cost effective than constructing a complete new building". The bank's directors had discussed a new building on bank property near the Westown Branch, but after property purchases to the south and west of the main office were made, it became more economical go with an addition.

Dan Vos Construction of Ada will be the contractor on the project, and work should begin this week. The addition will be in much the same design as the original building, and will measure 114' x 47', about the same dimensions as the present building. The Main Street entrance will be left pretty much as is, but the main entrance to the bank will be built at the center of the west end where there will be a 13 space customer parking lot. Four new drive-up banking lanes will

be constructed to the south of the building. An employee parking lot will be constructed at the south of the bank's property fronting on Kent Street.

The drive-up windows will be closed during early phases of the construction, but bank officials hope to get the new drive-up equipment installed and working while construction is being completed on the building itself. "We will be closing our Main Office drive-in Monday, October 29 for a brief three to four week period

to allow the installation of our new drive-in lanes", said Caldwell. He added, "we regret the inconvenience to our customers and would like to remind them that the construction will in no way affect our Main Office lobby hours". Caldwell also said, "we will increase the staff at our four lane Westown branch during this phase of construction".

The nine teller's windows will be situated in an island in the center of the bank's new lobby.

A skylight will be installed over the main entrance at the west end of the structure which will provide natural lighting for the lobby. Office space will be constructed along the south side of the lobby. Construction is scheduled to be completed by early spring.

Concerning the new addition Caldwell said, "We feel our half million dollar investment in expanding our facility exemplifies our confidence in the continued growth and progress of Lowell."

Capitol Column by Senator Dick Posthumus

Although there are only three proposals appearing on the November's ballot, they have a great potential impact on our state. Before going to the polls, you may want to take a look at each question.

PROPOSAL "A" would amend the Michigan Constitution to allow the Legislature or a joint legislative committee to approve or disapprove rules made by an administrative agency. Although new rules are now currently approved by the committee, inserting language into the Constitution would ensure that the bipartisan, bicameral group will maintain its authority.

PROPOSAL "B" would provide constitutional protection for the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund, which was created to acquire and maintain recreational and environmentally-special acreage. There currently is nothing that stops the state from using it for other purposes. Because of that, the fund has been "raided" for various uses other than for what it was intended. In fact, the fund, which once stood at nearly \$150 million now consists of only around \$14 million. In addition to the protection

afforded by a constitutional amendment, a \$200 million cap will be placed on the fund with any remaining dollars going to the General Fund. However, the Legislature would retain the authority to raise that ceiling with a three-fifths vote.

The most controversial of the ballot issues, **PROPOSAL "C"**, would require all tax increases in the future and those enacted since December 1981 to be placed before the voters for approval. Proponents of the measure argue that it is the only way to bring government spending under control, and that it will make our legislative leaders more accountable. Opponents, however, point out that passage of the plan would, instead, allow only a small minority to control the state's tax structure, as well as cripple Michigan's schools and other institutions which depend on the current tax system.

The keystone of a democratic society is the freedom to vote in accord with your beliefs. Implicit in the privilege, however, is the responsibility of making an informed decision. Exercise your right to vote—after reviewing the questions thoroughly.

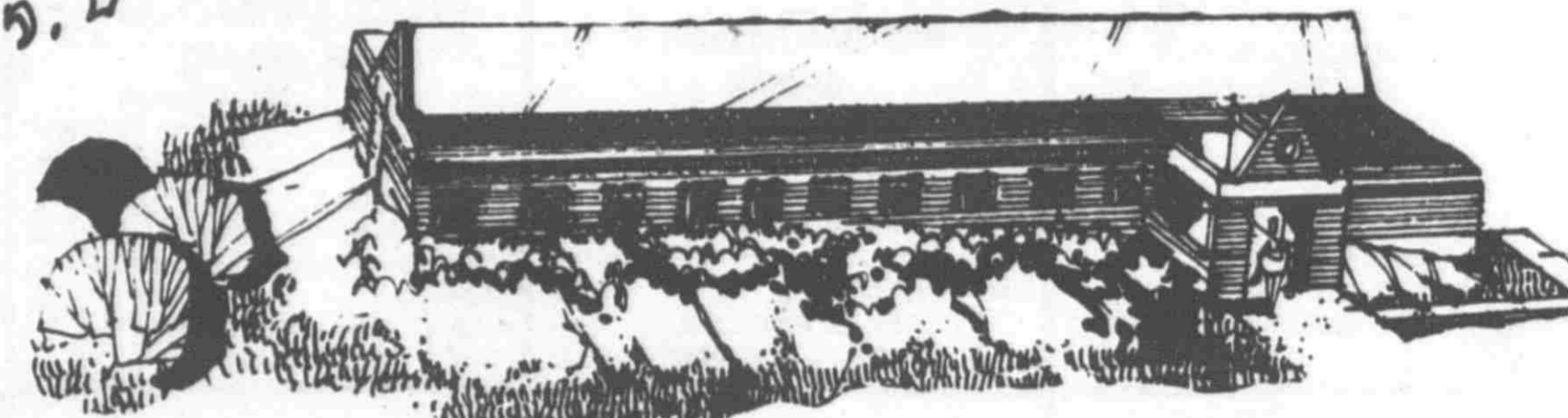

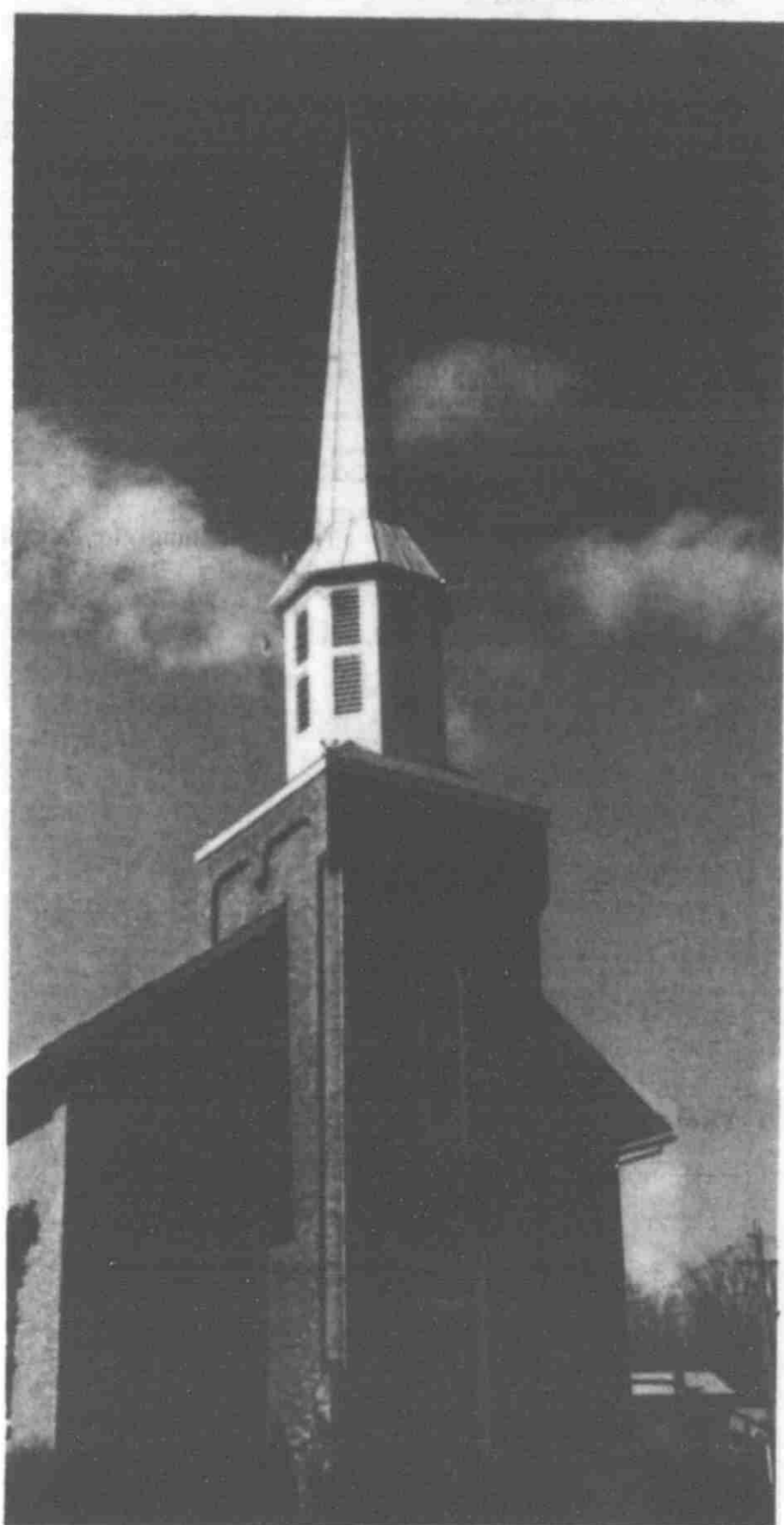

'OU DOORS' with Jack Friesner

Every Fall, for the past several years, I have made a prediction of the upcoming winter weather based upon the natural indicators, signs, and old wives fables, which I continuously heard as a child. Up until now my batting average has been about as good as the Padres, against Morris. This year is sure to be better because all the reliable signs strongly indicate a long hard winter, with more than average snowfall. Despite the very dry summer locally, we have a bumper wild mast crop. The wild grapes are extremely plentiful as are the thornapple, crabapple and wild apple crops. The open pollinated corn has very heavy husks and the acorn's and wild nuts are plentiful.

The black, end bands, on the wolly caterpillar are much heavier and more pronounced than is the center brown band. This is a sign which grandpa, swore by, of course, if you remember grandpa, you'll remember that he swore at most everything. I have not been out in the marshes, as yet, observing the muskrat houses. When the rats build massive houses you can count on a long hard winter.

A Hallmark Card and Gift Shop will occupy the old Riverside Fireplace building at the corner of Main and Broadway, and Hinkley Drug Stores will open in the old St. Mary's Catholic Church at the corner of Lincoln Lake and Chatham Streets.

City Helps pay for Fireworks

The Lowell City Council voted themselves into a good old fashioned split decision at their regular meeting Monday evening. The issue at stake was a request from the Lowell Area Chamber of Commerce for some financial help from the city to pay off a \$950.72 debt left over from this year's 4th of July fireworks display. Representing the Chamber was Board Member Bob Pfaller. Pfaller said that in the future the Chamber would raise money in advance for the fireworks display, and then only buy fireworks that could be paid for with that amount. Chamber president Jerry Patton added that the newly reorganized Chamber was left with this deficit, and needed some help in paying it.

Lowell City Manager Ray Quada said that in a sampling of area municipalities he found that other communities were pretty evenly split by those that totally funded fireworks displays, partially funded them or did not participate at all. Councilman Bill Thompson raised the quest of, "What happens next time an organization asks for funds after the fact?" Patton and Pfaller repeated that this was a "one-time" request, and that it would not happen again.

Finally, after much discussion, councilman Phil Schneider offered a motion to pay \$600.00 of the bill. Councilman Jack Fonger seconded the motion, and Mayor Jim Maatman called for a vote. Schneider and Fonger voted yes, but Thompson and Dean Collins cast no votes. It was left up to Mayor to break the tie, and Maatman voted yes.

In other council business it was decided to move the Helen Look Daly funds from the Dean, Witter & Reynolds account in Tucson, AZ to Buys, McGregor and MacNaughton in Grand Rapids. The move was made because the Daly's broker, Bob Crawford is leaving Dean, Witter and Reynolds, and Quada recommended that now might be a good time to make the move. Nearly all of the approximately \$3/4 million is invested in government Genny Mae bonds.

Ribbon Cutting Ceremony at Manor

A ribbon-cutting ceremony is planned at 6:00 P.M. on Thursday, October 18, 1984 at the just-completed 20-bed Extended Care Facility at Cumberland Retirement Village, 11535 East Fulton.

Local township and county officials have been invited to attend the ceremony and reception afterwards.

This building is the first building completed in a proposed several-year expansion plan. Scheduled to start next spring is another 20-bed extended care facility, identical in design to this first building.

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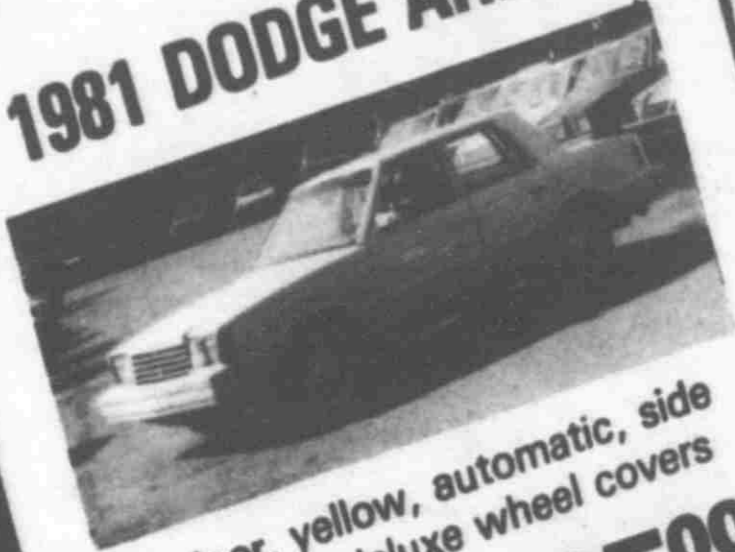
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
