Zoning Board of Appeals says no to square footage variance request

A request for a zoning variance drew a sizeable crowd at Monday's meeting of the Lowell City Council. The Council adjourned to meet as the Zoning Board of Appeals and hold a public hearing concerning a request from Tom Reedy of 10085 60th St., Alto. Reedy is getting married in May of 1985 and his father, Don Reedy, is giving him a lot at 779 Grindle as a wedding gift. The 1 and 3/4 acre lot is located near the northwest corner of Grindle and Hillside Court, and is zoned R-1 or Single Family Housing. Reedy, a licensed builder, would like to build a 1,000 sq. ft. home with a 2 stall attached garage on the site, but the zoning calls for dwellings no smaller than 1,500 sq. ft.

Reedy had already presented his case before the Lowell Planning Commission. Citing the recent change in zoning in that area from R.R. which requires 1,800 sq. ft. housing to the less restrictive R-1, the planners unanimously recommended that the request be denied. The planning commission spent more than two years in the recent re-zoning of the city, and they decided that a 500 sq. ft. or 1/3 total footage variance was just too much to grant. Variances have been granted in the past, but never for more than 100 sq. ft. or so.

Not to be discouraged, Reedy requested a public hearing before the Zoning Board of Appeals. Neighboring property owners were notified of the hearing and several turned out to voice their disapproval. William Doyle of 800 Hillside Ct. spoke first, stating that he is not only opposed to the variance, but is also opposed to the reduction of the property in the area from R.R. to R-1. Doyle said that in his opinion, "this area is one of only two left in the city suitable for larger homes". Doyle added, "the construction of smaller homes would detract from property values in the area". Other neighbors; Jim and Cheryl Blodgett of 721 Hillside Court and Clark Vredenburg of 850 Hillside Court also voiced their opposition to granting a variance. Cheryl Blodgett said that she and her husband "saved for ten years before building a home in an area where they thought they were protected from construction that would decrease their property value". Blodgett added, "We initially wanted to build in the country until we found this area in town

where the lot size and zoning offered what we wanted."

Reedy defended his plans saying that he and his fiance don't need a large home at this point in their lives. Reedy stressed the fact that the home would be high quality construction with tasteful lines and the appearance of being larger because of the attached garage. Reedy also noted that the house would be located on the parcel well back from Grindle, and would be barely visible dur-

ing the months that the trees are leaved out. Don Reedy, a local realtor, defended his son's proposal by noting that the trend in modern construction is toward smaller, energy efficient housing, and his son and young people like him simply can't afford larger homes early in their adult lives.

City Manager Ray Quada pointed out that the crowd that turned out for this issue was probably larger than the total of

people that attended all the public hearings in connection with the re-zoning of the entire city over the past two years. Quada defended the Planning Commission's work on the re-zoning, and said that there were solid reasons behind their decisions.

Chairman of the Zoning Board of Appeals William Thompson called for a motion on the variance request, and the board unanimously denied it.

Capitol Column

Once again, the Department of Social Services is under fire—and justifiably so. A recent audit has found that millions of dollars have been expended in Medicaid overpayments.

The 31-page audit, covering more than three years, shows a waste of between \$75 and \$100 million dollars annually. Unrecovered third party liabilities, where Medicaid bears the expenses that should have been paid by Blue Cross-Blue Shield or a private insurer, account for a loss of \$25 million.

The Medicaid program involves \$1.4 billion, one million people annually, and interacts with more than 20,000 different health-care providers. There are bound to be some discrepancies

in such an immense program, but how many discrepancies are acceptable?

Other findings of the audit include: DSS failed to collect \$2.9 million from 15 nursing homes that charged the state for services they never provided or which received inflated depreciation allowances; DSS inaccurately computed inflation rates, resulting in overpayments of \$1.5 million; DSS did not follow state laws limiting the amount of money paid to nursing homes on a per-patient basis, which resulted in excess payments of \$5 million.

The reasons for these types of problems are numerous. The Department blames it on inadequate staffing, while legislators investigating the issue blame it on fraud, mismanagement, collusion between health care providers and Medicaid officials, and a lack of efficient technological computerization that could help organize and speed operations. Whatever the causes, we must devise solutions to reduce the excess payments.

There is a more extensive audit underway to more clearly identify the problem areas, and a House committee investigating the issue will seek the authority to subpoena DSS workers in getting to the heart of the matter. When session resumes, one of the first items on the agenda of the Senate Commerce Committee, of which I am chairman, is legislation dealing with Medicaid fraud. It is time we did more than just talk. There must be legislative action to provide solutions. Michigan's voters have clearly indicated that waste in government must be decreased—and this is a great place to start.

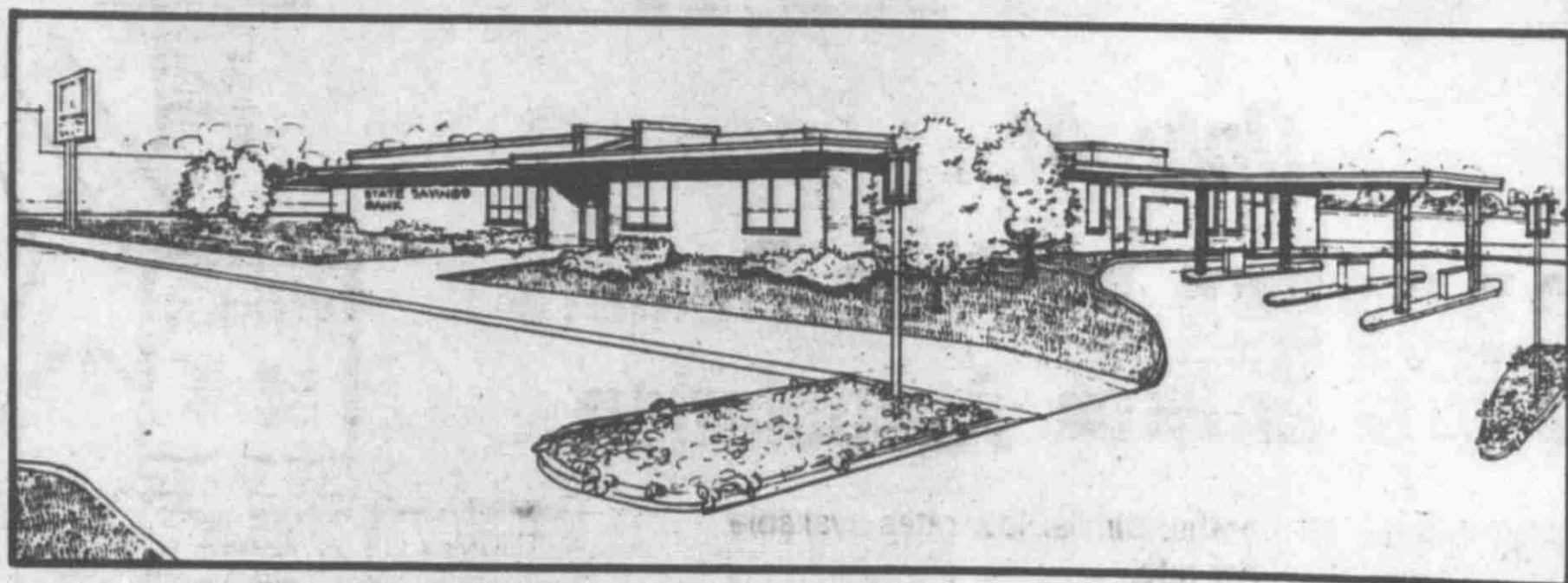

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People have a Responsibility to Report

People who get Social Security retirement, survivors, or disability checks have an important responsibility to report any happening that could have an effect on their continue eligibility or the amount of their check Robert Fleminger, Social Security manager in Grand Rapids, said recently.

Reports can be made by telephone, be mail, or in person. A report should include the name of the person about whom the report is being made, what is being reported, the date it happened, the person's address, the correct

claim number under which benefits are being paid (a nine-digit number followed by a letter), and the person's signature if the report is by mail.

Everyone getting benefits should report:

- Change of mailing address
- Earnings of more than the annual limit
- If the person goes outside the US
- If the person works outside the US
- Imprisonment of a felony

Dependents and survivors should report:

- Spouse or surviving spouse gets a Government pension
- Divorce or annulment of marriage
- Marriage
- Adoption of a child
- Child leaves care of a parent
- Child nearing 18 is disabled or full-time high school student
- Change in a school attendance for child 18-19

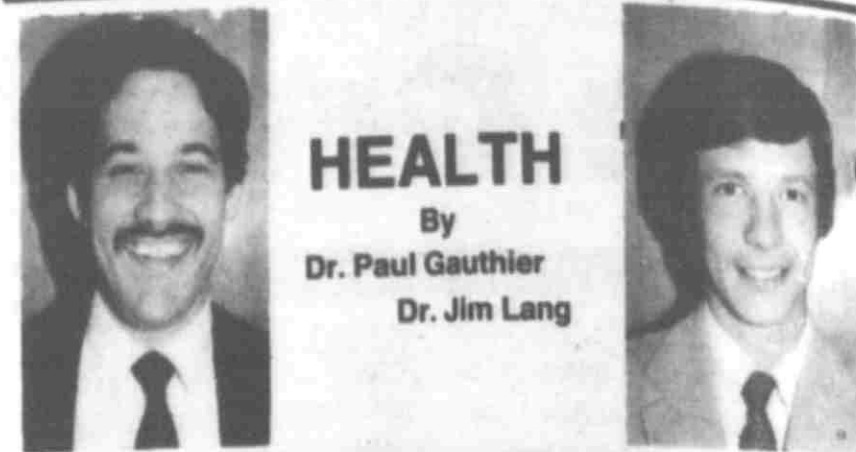
A person getting benefits because of disability should report:

- Any change in condition
- Any return to work
- The person gets any other disability check

Someone should report on behalf of a person who:

- Becomes unable to manage his or her own funds
- Dies

PHYSICAL FITNESS FOR THE ELDERLY

For the past three weeks we've been discussing two degenerative diseases which affect primarily the elderly, namely, osteoarthritis and osteoporosis. Today, on a more upbeat note, let's discuss the beneficial effects of physical fitness in the elderly and how this is best achieved.

It is interesting to note that less than two decades have passed since prevailing opinions in physiology and medicine "wrote off" physical conditioning programs for the elderly. It was then widely believed that our older citizens were untrainable. Even more startling was the definition of elderly, which typically included all individuals past the age of 40! Many myths about conditioning have fortunately gone by the wayside, but not without controversy. Several medical "dogmas" which have been proven false include: heavy muscle exercise, especially weight training, results in the "muscle bound" condition (whatever that is); and, heavy exercise in general will make us old before our time. The positive changes in attitude regarding fitness and conditioning over the last 20 years have been both interesting and rewarding.

Most experts in medicine today hold the belief that physical fitness is of great benefit, regardless of age. The healthy elderly individual is just as "trainable" as the young person. Although there are some differences in the exact nature of the physiological responses of the elderly to the challenge of exercise conditioning, there is no longer any doubt that the health benefits elderly individuals derive from exercise are quite similar to the benefits derived by the young and middle aged.

The active life is good for all of us, not just the young. Indeed, there is now strong evidence that suggest that rather than considering vigorous exercise as a threat to good health, we should recognize physical inactivity as one of the more important "risk factors" for senility.

There seems little doubt that many aspects of elderly person's life can be influenced positively by regular exercise. The actual physical working capacity and stamina of the older individual can be improved by a significant amount. There is also evidence to support the improvement of strength in older women and men when exercising at regular intervals. The improvement of physical working capacity and muscular strength is tantamount to increasing the vigor of the older individuals, and this can make a very important contribution to the later years of life, certainly in terms of life-style and possibly even in terms of health.

Recent research has suggested another benefit of exercise in the elderly, that of a "tranquilizing effect". Several well controlled studies have shown that with regular physical conditioning, may elderly individuals have experienced a notable tranquilizing effect, one which has in many instances precluded the use of medical tranquilization when it would have otherwise been indicated.

We may draw a cautious conclusion from all of this, that appropriate types, intensities, and durations of exercise can bring about a significant tranquilizing effect. This has been demonstrated in young, middle-aged, and in elderly subjects and has been shown to have a chronic as well as an immediate effect. Most data indicate that rhythmic exercises such as walking, jogging, cycling and swimming, with durations of from 5 to 30 minutes and intensities of 30% to 60% of maximum, have been found effective. It is also possible, though not proven, that very high levels of work may be counterproductive. It is our sincere belief that, with all things considered, exercise may not add years to our lives, but it can add life to our years.

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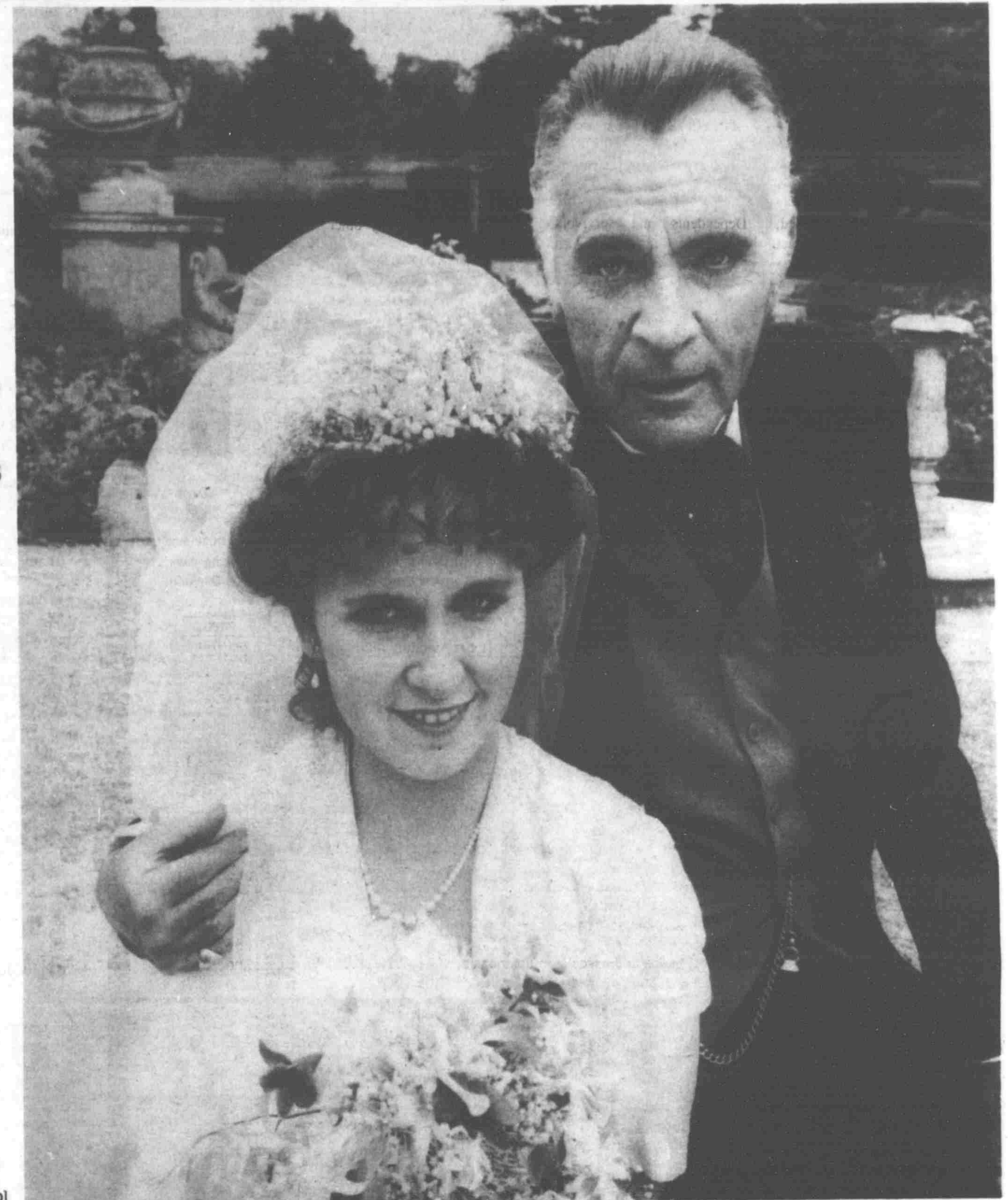

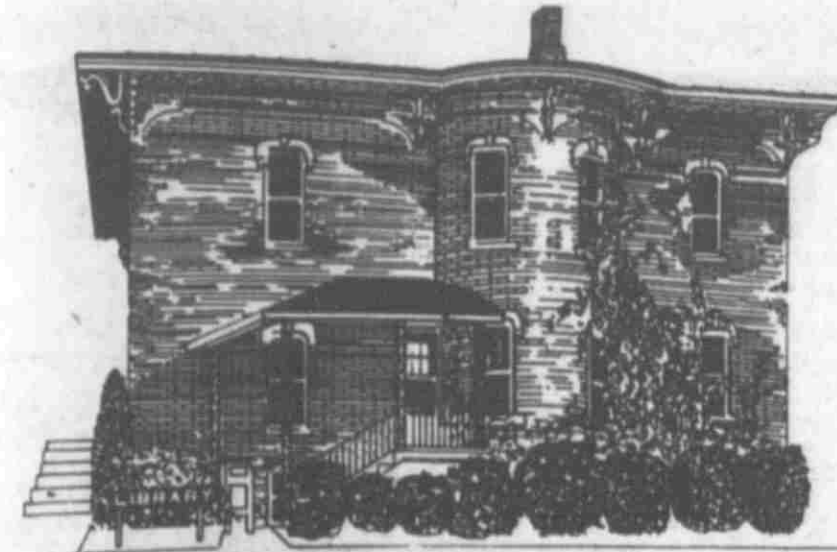

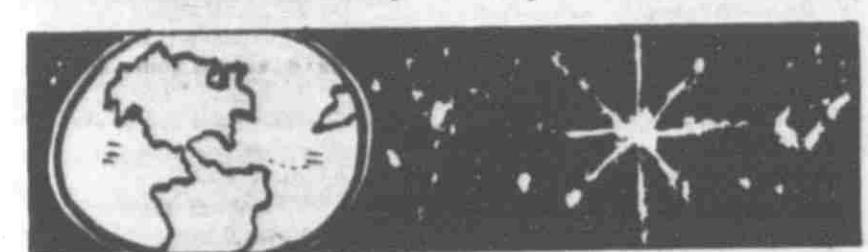

Veterans Day observed November 11, 1984

Veterans Day 1984 marks the seventh anniversary of the return of the observance to November 11 and the tradition of honoring the unknown soldier at Arlington on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. From 1971 to 1977, Veterans Day was observed on the fourth Monday in October in compliance with a 1968 law that changed most national holidays to Mondays.

Believing, however, that the November 11 date held great significance for this country, Congress passed a law in 1977 which returned the holiday to November 11. The law became effective in 1978, the sixtieth anniversary of the World War I armistice.

With the return of the observance to the armistice date of the "war to end all wars," this year's observance is an occasion to pay tribute to the 1,081,000 Americans who have died in the defense of their country in all American wars since 1776, and to more than 28 million living former servicemen who served during both war and peace.

Of a total of 38,924,000 war participants -- going back to the earliest days of the nation -- more than half of the men and women who have worn their country's uniform in wartime are still alive. Another 4.4 million living veterans saw only peacetime service. By far the most costly of America's wars was its Civil War in which 5 million persons participated. That conflict resulted in 364,000 Union deaths and more than 133,000 Confederate casualties.

In contrast, 290,000 Americans fought in the Revolution, and 4,000 died in service. Out of 287,000 American participants in the War of 1812, 2,000 lost their lives in service. During the Mexican War only 79,000 Americans were in uniform, yet 13,000 died in service. In the Spanish-American War, 11,000 of the 392,000 U.S. participants died in service. A total of 9,834,000 Americans were in service during the Vietnam Era. Of that number 47,000 deaths were due to action of hostile forces.

Today's population of living veterans -- including those who served in more than one period -- is made up as follows: World War II (39%), Vietnam (29%), Korea (19%), Peacetime (18%), and World War I (less than 1%). Only 22 veterans -- America's oldest -- remain from the Spanish American War.
