City's park program is progressing nicely

At the November 19 City Council meeting, Lowell City Manager, Ray Quada, outlined the status of the city's efforts to improve and expand the parks system. Beginning with Richard's Park, Quada described how the park has been transformed from an active park with much baseball, and football activity to a more passive park where walking, sitting and small children playing on the berms are the primary uses. Quada said the ball playing at the park caused

serious safety concerns because of the moderate to heavy traffic on adjacent Hudson Street. The new playground was purposely located at the southwest corner of the park near a traffic diverter to keep children away from Hudson Street and the high berms make ball playing nearly impossible.

Future plans for the park include the planting of more trees, especially evergreens, along the tops of the berms. Quada also said that a plastic liner would be

used to line the bottom of the skating rink making it easier to maintain. Some sidewalk work and a berm slide are also scheduled additions to the nearly completed park.

Next Quada went on to discuss the so-called West Side Park. The park is located on Gee Dr. near Foreman Rd. and will be the site of a four diamond softball complex. Quada said all the grade work has been done to the large site, and described how the work involved in getting the project this far has been more extensive than most people might imagine. Quada said that over a thousand scrub bushes and trees were pulled by their roots so that they wouldn't pop up again in the spring. Several dozen huge rocks had to be dug out and hauled away. Several trees that were worth keeping were relocated and using a rock picker the area was cleared of most stones.

In the spring Quada will call on the manpower of the YMCA to conduct a hand-pick job of gathering all the smaller stones on the site. The entire area will be hydro-mulched this fall. Other progress expected to be completed next year includes the cutting in the of the remaining three infields, and surfacing them with stone dust, construction of the remaining three backstops and expansion of the parking area. City crews will be working constantly to nurture the grass outfields along. Other projects that will require revenues, likely from the Lee Fund, include fencing the entire area, a sprinkling system, picnic tables, possibly a bridge over the small creek on the site and construction of a rest room, concession and maintenance building. At their last meeting the City Council authorized Quada to instruct the city engineers to design the rest room and concession building. The field that was chiefly constructed last spring will definitely be ready for play during the 1985 softball season, but Quada could not commit to the other three fields. "They will likely be ready late in the summer and will almost certainly be ready for playing during the fall league," he said.

Regarding the proposed soccer fields on the property purchased from William Rogers last year, Quada said that a feasibility

study in progress concerning the railroad crossing that will be required to access the site. The property is located at the south end of Monroe St. across the C & O Railroad tracks. Grade work and a crossing, or a tunnel of some type would be necessary before the park can be developed. The City Parks Commission has recommended that the site be developed into three soccer fields and parking for spectators. The property floods every spring limiting its possible

uses, but Quada said that the flooding shouldn't present a problem for soccer fields.

Recreation park is the Parks Commission's most ambitious effort. Plans for the park include renovation of the Foreman Building so that it could serve as an exhibition hall, a 300 car paved parking lot to service the park, paved streets that could serve as the 4-H Fair Midway, a farm market, flea market, trailer rally site for the annual Gus Macker Tournament. Other

plans for the park include better rest rooms, improved camping facilities and bridges to connect the park with the soccer fields across the Flat River. The boat launch on the Grand River was recently improved, but the other plans put forth by the Parks Commission will require substantial funding if they are implemented. If the City Council puts this major plan into motion a bonding issue would likely be put before the people to fund the project.

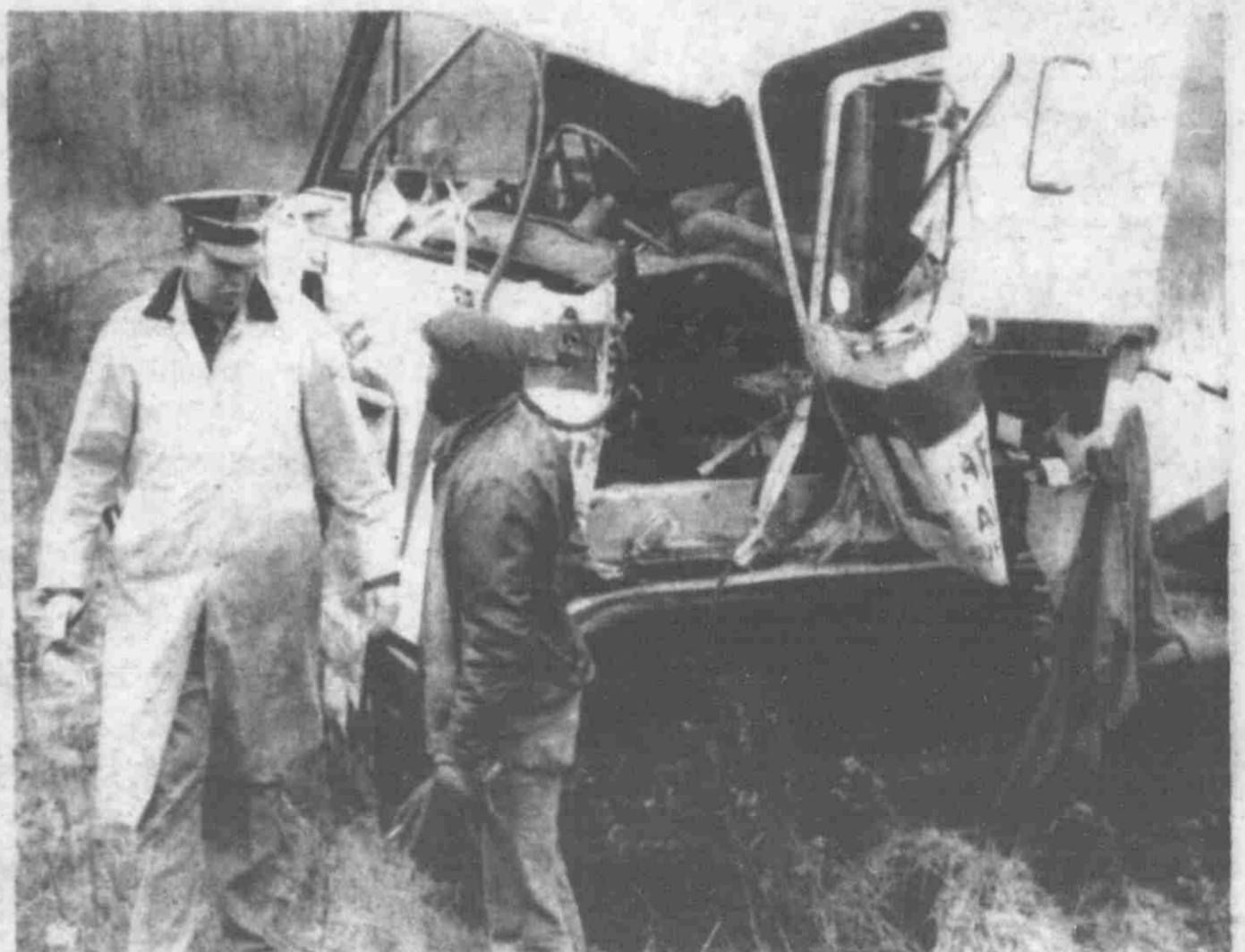

State park motor vehicle permits on sale Dec. 1

A great Christmas gift idea that's delighted many an outdoor enthusiast with year round enjoyment is the Annual State Park Motor Vehicle Permit. The 1985 permits will go on sale December 1 and will cost the same as last year, \$10.00.

"This permit not only makes an excellent gift the whole family can enjoy," says Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Director Ronald O. Skoog, "the revenue supports Michigan's recreational heritage by providing funding to maintain State Park facilities and manage natural, historic and scenic areas within our State Park system."

The permit offers an all season pass to recreation fun in Michigan State Parks from January 1 through December 31. People can enjoy winter skiing, snowmobiling, ice fishing, sledding, snowshoeing and camping, as well as unlimited spring, summer and fall recreational activities.

Permits will be available at all State Parks and Recreation Areas and at the DNR Office of Information Services, 7th floor, Mason Building in Lansing. Written requests for a permit plus a \$10 check/money order payable to "State of Michigan" should be sent to: DNR, Office of Information Services, Box 30028, Lansing, MI 48909.

Capitol Column by Senator Dick Posthumus

Many alumni make tax deductible contributions to their alma mater not only to get a break on their income tax, but to support their favorite public institution. Under SB 87, that same tax credit would be allowed for contributions to public and intermediate school districts.

This legislation, which has passed the Senate and is now before a House committee, would increase the 50 percent tax credit for a contribution to colleges, schools and libraries to \$200 for an individual return and to \$400 for a joint return. Besides applying to public and intermediate school districts, this credit would also apply to contributions to non-profit associations or foundations operated exclusively for the benefit of these school districts.

Studies have shown that tax credits for higher education can encourage donations. Faced with

yearly revenue shortages, this bill is a good way for local school districts, as well as colleges and universities, to help provide not only the basic necessities, but innovative, progressive new programs that will challenge students to reach for the best that is within them.

In addition, donating money directly to schools can help avoid the expenses usually involved in channeling these funds through the state bureaucracy. Nothing has a more lasting, permanent impact on our children than our school systems. Public and intermediate schools from the basis on which they build future careers and livelihoods. If we expect our children to become educated, enlightened people, we must give our educational system the support it needs. SB 87 can help individual donations become an important part of that support.

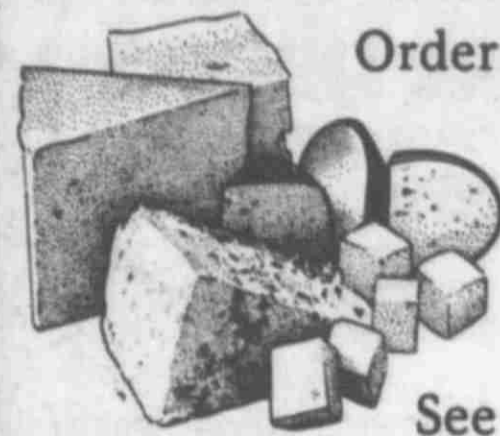

WHAT IS ROOT CANAL?

Years ago, a badly infected tooth was doomed to be pulled. Today, that's a last resort. Root canal treatment consists of: 1) the removal of the infected pulp that lies within the root canals of the tooth, and 2) the sealing of the root ends to prohibit any further infection.

The pulp is the tooth's center core of soft tissue (nerves, blood vessels and fibers). When the dentists removes a "nerve" from a tooth, he really removes pulpal tissue that contains the nerve.

Removing the pulp from the tooth does not produce a "dead" tooth. It will be very much alive and functioning

because it has a source of blood and nerve supply from the surrounding tissues that hold it in place. The tooth will have no sense of feeling because the nerve has been removed, but the tooth itself will be fine: it should last as long as your other teeth and could even be eventually used as an anchor tooth for a denture bridge.

Delicious venison recipes for the successful hunter

Successful Michigan deer hunters have probably packed their freezers full of fresh venison, but often their cupboards are bare when it comes to innovative ways of cooking their bounty.

For someone who doesn't know the first thing about preparing succulent venison meats, the experts at the Michigan United Conservation Clubs (MUCC) offer some suggestions to help ensure cooking success:

A deer's loin provides porterhouse steaks, sirloin and choice roasts. Delicious, tender steaks also can be made from the venison round, especially when it is cut in one-inch thick slices.

The deer's rump makes a good roast - each rump roast usually will produce two roasts, each large enough to feed a family of four.

The shoulder, or chuck, makes good pot roast or ground meat. With its tendons removed, the neck is tender meat for a stew or ground meat. It also will make a good roast. The flank and breast contain considerable meat, excellent for use in a soup or stew.

It is important to remember that venison's natural flavor is sweeter than other meat - so when cooking venison, reduce the sugar in any recipes by one-fourth.

Be careful not to overcook venison because it has short fibers that toughen quickly if it is cooked too long at a high temperature. Venison is best when it is medium to well-done; never serve it rare or overdone.

When served, the venison should be hot because deer fat tends to congeal while it is still warm.

In an effort to satisfy the hunger pangs of venison gourmands, the MUCC, in its "Wildlife Chef" cookbook, recommends the following mouth-watering recipes:

JAPANESE RIBS
4 pounds venison ribs
1/2 cup soy sauce, Japanese style
1/2 cup cooking sherry (optional)
1/2 cup water
4 tablespoons brown sugar
2 cloves garlic, crushed

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Arrange racks of ribs in a large roasting pan. Combine all ingredients. Stir well and pour over ribs. Cover pan. Bake 45 minutes, turning ribs once or twice. Remove cover and continue cooking until golden brown and well done. Baste with sauce or turn ribs occasionally. For crispy brown ribs, try to arrange in roaster in single layer.

TORTILLA CASSEROLE
1 pound ground venison
7 pound Monterey Jack cheese
1/2 cup Cheddar cheese
2 eggs
1 10 oz. bottle enchilada sauce
1 large container small curd cottage cheese
1 onion
1 tablespoon parsley
1 package tostadas (more if you wish)

Brown together the ground venison and onion. Drain excess grease and add enchilada sauce. Simmer 20 minutes.

Mix together cottage cheese, eggs and parsley. Shred 1/2 pound Monterey Jack cheese and 1/2 cup Cheddar cheese. Layer tostadas (these are prepackaged and cooked like taco shells), meat mixture, cottage cheese and Monterey Jack cheese. Keep layering as you would lasagne. Put the cheddar cheese on top. Sprinkle crushed tortilla chips around edge of casserole. Bake

at 350 degrees until bubbly, about 1 1/2 hour.
BURGUNDY VENISON STEAK TIPS
2 pounds venison steak, cut in small cubes
3 tablespoons oil
2 tablespoons dry onion soup mix (more if you want)
3 beef bullion cubes

2 cups water
1 cup burgundy wine
1 cup fresh mushrooms or 4 oz. canned
Brown meat in hot oil. Add remaining ingredients and simmer for about one hour. Add mushrooms the last five minutes. Serve over fluffy rice.

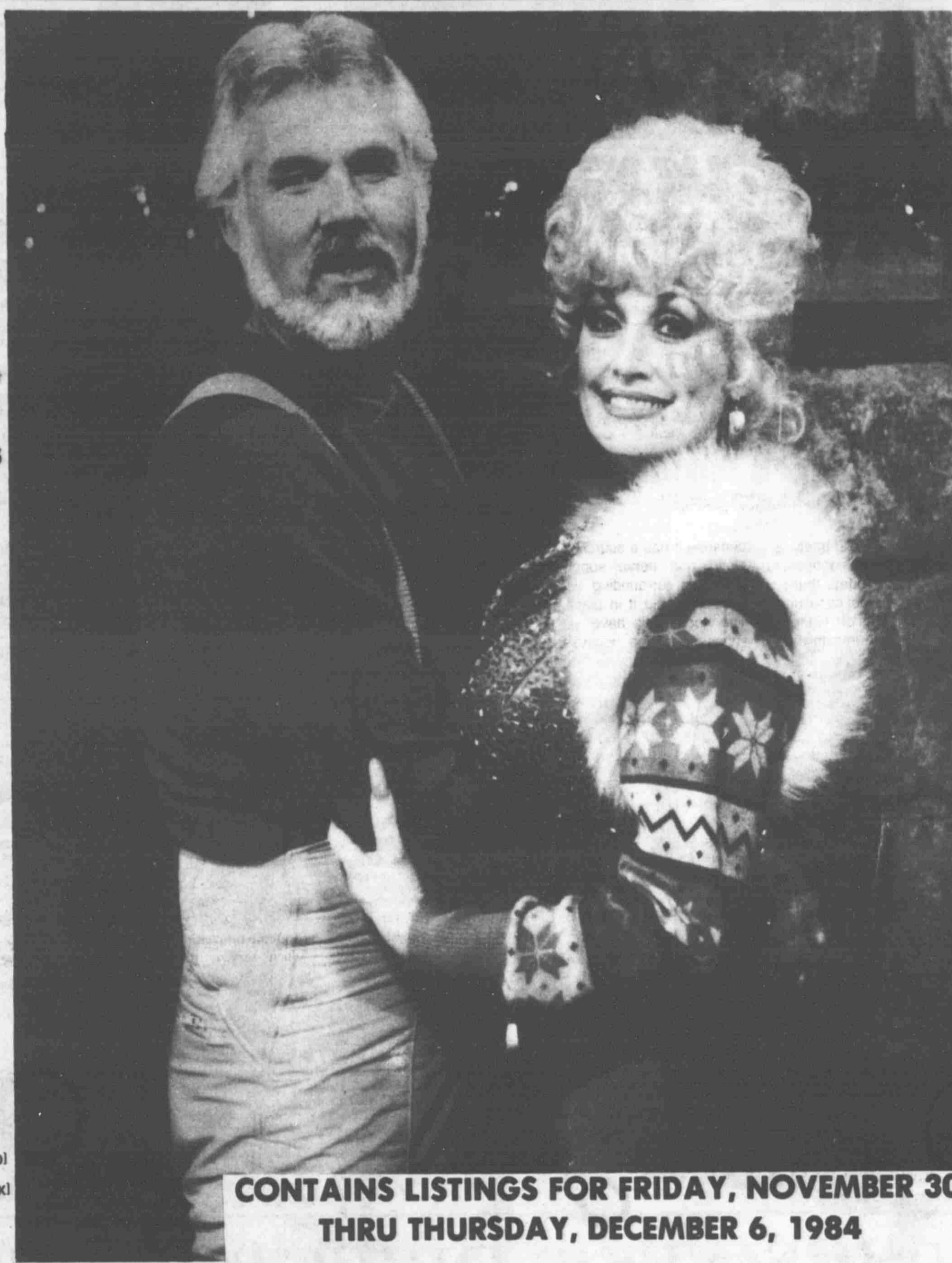

Mr. William Doyle, a neighbor of the property in question, asked for a clarification on receiving three letters regarding the hearing. The first stated that the request was to reduce the square footage from 1,800 down to 1,000, then cancelling and rescheduling the hearing, then, a different request, from 1,500 square feet down to 1,000.

Manager Quada explained that the original request had been made before the rezoning of the East side of the City was approved. It would have been discussed at the first meeting in October, however, that meeting was cancelled, due to lack of a quorum. At the October 15 meeting the Public Hearing on the Rezoning was held, and approved, which changed the zoning of the area in which this property is located from RR-Agricultural-Residential, with a square footage requirement of 1,800, to R-1 Single Family Residential, with a square footage requirement of 1,500. The third letter was prepared under the 1,500 square footage requirements of the new R-1 Single Family Zone.

Mr. Doyle continued that he had spent approximately sixteen years on the Planning Commission, most of them as Chairman. When the Valley Vista Housing Development was being planned, the Planning Commission decided that that was where the smaller lots and smaller houses should be located, and approved the plan. There are only two areas left, one on the northeast corner, and one on the northwest corner of the City which are designated for larger, nicer homes, and to allow a smaller one would detract from the larger homes that are already there.

Mr. James Blodgett, also a neighbor to the property, stated that they had originally planned to build outside the City in a country setting to have the larger land area for privacy. When they found the property on Hillside Ct. they were thrilled to find that they could have the privacy they desired, and still be inside the City, because of the restrictions in that area. He asked that the Zoning Board stick with the rules and regulations as adopted.

Dr. Clark Vredenburg stated that he was also against the further reduction, that the restrictions should be maintained.

Mr. Thomas Reedy, the owner of the property was present, and stated that the property was not in Hall's addition, as are the other parcels, but faces on Grindle Dr., and that the houses in the Valley Vista area are from 720 to 960 square feet, and that is not the type of home he intends to build. He explained that his house would be constructed of all first quality materials, such as aluminum or vinyl siding on three sides, cedar siding and brick on the front, and with an attached garage, the home would appear larger. The interior would be all Oak trim, it would not be a "plain Jane" house.

Mr. Doyle countered that if one house is allowed under the 1,500 square footage requirement, others will want to build smaller ones also, which might not be as nice a quality as the one proposed by Mr. Reedy.

Mr. Reedy explained that the house would sit 315 feet back from Grindle Dr., 120 feet from Hillside Court and 80 feet from the Englehardt property, and would barely be visible from any side.

Mrs. Cheryl Blodgett stated that it was not the appearance of the home that anyone was objecting to, rather, because everyone had chosen the area for the same reasons, larger homes on larger lots for privacy, and would think Mr. Reedy would want the same things. He would not want someone to build something smaller near his home in the future.

Mr. Donald Reedy, father of Tom Reedy, stated that when Tom and his fiancé first talked about building on the property, both sets of parents said no to a larger home, suggesting instead that they stick to something smaller that they could afford. Someone else could conceivably build a 1,200 to 1,500 square foot home there and not have it be as nice as the one proposed, by using inferior materials.

Mrs. Blodgett reiterated that it is not the quality, it is the precedent that will be set for that zone.

Mr. Doyle stated that a 1-3/4 acre lot is a nice sized lot and he would hate to see such a small house on a larger lot.

Mr. Don Reedy disagreed, stated that the type and size plus the cost of the home, plus labor can make for a very nice home on a large lot.

Tom Reedy's fiancé's mother stated that their children were planning on being married the following spring, and wished to build something nice for their first home, but wished to build something smaller that they could afford, and still be in a nicer area.

Mrs. E. J. Doyle asked why Council would consider all this talk from his (Tom Reedy's) family when there is a rule.

Chairman Thompson called for order, stating that the subject in question was the variance from square footage requirements.

Mrs. Blodgett stated that they rented a home for ten years before they were able to afford to build a home according to the specifications in the area which they built, and suggested that perhaps Mr. Reedy should wait until he can afford a larger home.

Chairman Thompson then turned the hearing over to Councilmembers for comment.

Manager Quada explained for everyone's benefit, that the proposed rezonings for the various areas of the City have been discussed by the Planning Commission for over a year. The discussions and approvals were all covered in the local paper. Public Hearings were advertised and held on all of them, really looking to the needs and wants of the community. He continued that there are more people here at this meeting than came all year to the hearings. It was not something that was dropped on the citizens, but no one came forward to say yes or no at any of the hearings. He then stated that it was the recommendation of the Planning Commission that the variance not be granted, due to the reduction already granted to the area by the recent rezoning. Commissioners felt that the 1,500 square footage requirements should be maintained for the time being. However, a valid point by today's costs, i.e. building materials,

heat, etc., may prompt the Planning Commission to take another look at size requirements in the future, for all zones, and perhaps make adjustments to those needs.

IT WAS THEN MOVED by Councilman Collins that the recommendation of the Planning Commission to uphold the 1,500 square footage of living space requirement be maintained and the request for variance denied, supported by Councilman Schneider.

Carried.

Chairman Thompson closed the Public Hearing at 8:40 P.M. and turned the meeting back over to Mayor Maatman.

Manager Quada then distributed copies of the 1984 Lowell Light and Power Audit Report, and Cable T.V. Audit Report, stating that a joint meeting will be scheduled after Councilmembers have a chance to review them.

IT WAS MOVED BY Councilman Fonger that it be noted in the record that the 1984 Audit Report for Lowell Light and Power was received, supported by Councilman Collins.

Carried.

IT WAS THEN MOVED by Councilman Thompson that it also be noted for the record that the 1984 Audit Report for Lowell Cable T.V. was received, supported by Councilman Fonger.

Carried.

Manager Quada then headed a discussion on the possible lease of the City's Airport to the Grand Rapids School of Bible and Music, as a full time operation. Tax problems, tie-down fees, gas sales, etc. would all have to be worked out, because of their non-profit status. They would have to become a full corporation to take it over, but they are in favor of such a move, and would separate the school from the running of the Airport.

Councilman Thompson asked about the City's liability if the Airport were to be run by School of Bible and Music.

Manager Quada replied that it would be completely spelled out, the City's liability, and the School's liability, before the change would take place.

Manager Quada then reported on the possible privatization of the City's Wastewater Treatment Plant, stating that several other types of operations, such as fire departments, are being owned and operated by private corporations very successfully. The corporation must deal with the E.P.A. and D.N.R. just as municipalities do.

A lengthy discussion followed on the subject.

Manager Quada then stated that paperwork is being completed on the gift to the City of a parcel of property adjacent to the Boy Scout Cabin at the north end of Washington Street, by Mr. and Mrs. Charles Houseman.

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Collins that the gift of the property be accepted, supported by Councilman Thompson.

Carried.

Under Remarks from the Audience, Mr. Bruce Walter was present representing the "Showboat Garden Club", and stated that the family of Mrs. Hulda Finis has given a \$500 legacy to the Club to be used as a memorial in her honor. She was a long-time resident of Lowell, and was over 100 years old at the time of her death. He asked permission to build a new brick planter in the side yard of the Library to replace the one that is there. He presented a plan for such a planter.

Council concurred on the idea, asking that when they were ready to begin in the spring, that they submit the plan for review, and that it be kept in the same decorating vein as the Library building.

Mr. Walter also asked the Council to consider some type of sprinkling system to water the planter.

Manager Quada stated that a sprinkling system was already

BASIC BUILDING CODE ORDINANCE

the order or ruling being appealed. The appellant must file the form with the City Clerk and the City Clerk will send a notice to the appellant regarding the date the appeal will be heard by the Construction Board of Appeals. Notice of the hearing date and time and place will be sent by regular mail to the address stated on the claim of appeal.

124.2 MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD. The Construction Board of Appeals shall consist of three (3) members appointed by the Mayor for two (2) year terms. Each member shall be qualified by experience or training to perform the duties of members of the Construction Board of Appeals. During the absence of a member, the Mayor shall designate a qualified substitute. The Mayor may appoint alternate members who may sit on the Construction Board of Appeals in the absence of any regular members. Such alternates shall meet the same qualification as required for regular members of the Construction Board of Appeals and, while sitting on the Board, shall have the full power and authority of the regular member. The Board shall elect one of its members to serve as chairperson and the building official shall act as or designate a clerk to serve as secretary to the Construction Board of Appeals, who shall keep a detailed record of all proceedings on file in the building official's office. No member of the Construction Board of Appeals shall speak to or vote on any appeal in which that member has any direct personal or financial interest nor shall any member participate in any matter where participation is prohibited by City Charter, City ordinance or State law.

124.3 PROCEDURES PRIOR TO HEARING. Prior to a hearing on an appeal, the following procedures shall take place:

(1) The City shall forward the claim of appeal and a copy of the notice or order being appealed to each member of the Construction Board of Appeals.

(2) The chairperson of the Construction Board of Appeals, shall arrange for two or more of the members of the Construction Board of Appeals to make an investigation of the premises which are the subject of the appeal.

(3) The City shall notify the owner and all occupants of the premises subject to appeal as well as all owners and taxpayers of record of property which is within three hundred feet of the subject property according to the records of the City Assessor of the date and time and place of the appeal. Notice will be given by regular mail or by placing of the notice in the entry way of the buildings, structures or dwelling units. Failure of any person to receive notice will not cause the hearing or decision of the Construction Board of Appeals to be defective.

(4) Public notice of the Construction Board of Appeals meeting and the meetings of all its committees shall be made in accordance with state law.

124.4 MEETINGS. Meetings of the Construction Board of Appeals shall be scheduled within twenty (20) days of the filing of any claim of appeal.

124.5 HEARINGS ON APPEALS. All hearings on appeals shall take place at the scheduled meeting of the Construction Board of Appeals. However, when a quorum is not present, the chairperson of the Construction Board of Appeals shall reschedule the meeting and an appeal shall be heard at the rescheduled meeting. At any hearing of the Construction Board of Appeals, the following procedure shall be followed:

(1) Testimony of the appellant, the City and any witnesses may be given.

(2) A tape recording or stenographic record may be made of the hearing at the request of any party. Unless otherwise agreed upon prior to the hearing, the costs shall be borne by the party requesting such a record.

(3) The appellant or authorized agent of the appellant and the building official or his/her designee shall be present.

(4) The minutes prepared shall identify all parties present, accurately summarize all pertinent statements made, including all evidence and records submitted, show all motions and actions and records of the votes of each member.

124.6 ACTION OF THE BOARD. After all evidence and testimony has been presented, the Construction Board of Appeals shall, by resolution, affirm, modify or reverse the order or ruling being appealed. Any decision of the Construction Board of Appeals modifying or reversing an order or ruling by the City shall require the concurring vote of all three members or alternates sitting on the appeal.

124.7 STANDARDS FOR CONSTRUCTION BOARD OF APPEAL DECISIONS. A decision by the Construction Board of Appeals shall include the reasons for the decision and the language of the decision. Any decision of the Construction Board of Appeals not complying with this requirement shall be void. Any decision that reverses or modifies any order or ruling of the City shall:

(1) Include any necessary special conditions to carry out the intent of the provisions being appealed, and

(2) Determine that the decision is necessary to avoid causing undue hardship to the appellant which is not caused to others to whom the same provision is applied, or

(3) Determine that the order or ruling was an incorrect interpretation of a standard or requirement of the Basic Building Code, or

(4) Determine that an alternative proposed by the appellant meets the minimum standards of the Basic Building Code, or

(5) Determine that the factual determinations of the conditions of the building or structure for which an order was issued pursuant to Section 120.0 of the Basic Building Code are not as represented by the City.

124.8 ENFORCEMENT OF DECISION. A certified copy of the resolution of the action of the Construction Board of Appeals shall be furnished to the appellant and to the building official. The building official and other City officials shall take immediate action in accordance with the decision of the Construction Board of Appeals.

124.9 COURT REVIEW. Any person aggrieved by any action of the Construction Board of Appeals, whether or not a previous party to the decision, or any officer of the City may apply to the appropriate court to correct errors in such decisions. Application for review shall be made to the appropriate court within twenty (20) days after the filing of the Construction Board of Appeals' decision in the office of the building official.

SECTION 2. The City Clerk of the City of Lowell shall file a certified copy of this ordinance with the State Construction Code Commission within ten (10) days of its adoption by the City Council.

SECTION 3. This Ordinance shall take effect ninety (90) days after a certified copy of this ordinance has been delivered to the State Construction Code Commission unless the State Construction Code Commission determines, after a public hearing that the amendments to the Basic Building Code do not adequately protect the health, safety, or welfare of the people of the City of Lowell, or that the amendments tend to unnecessarily increase construction costs or restrict the use of new materials, products, or methods of construction or provides preferential treatment to types or classes of materials, products or methods of construction, or that the amendments obstruct the substantive uniformity of building codes within a region or locality in the State of Michigan.

A PUBLIC HEARING WILL BE HELD BEFORE THE LOWELL CITY COUNCIL

TO CONSIDER THE FOLLOWING ORDINANCE:

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 7-4 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF LOWELL BY AMENDING THE BASIC BUILDING CODE

THE CITY OF LOWELL ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. That Section 7-4 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Lowell is hereby amended to read as follows:

SEC. 7-4 AMENDMENTS TO THE BASIC BUILDING CODE.

Sections 120.0 and 124.0 of The Basic Building Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

SECTION 120.0 UNSAFE, DAMAGED OR DETERIORATED STRUCTURES.

120.0 UNSAFE STRUCTURES. All buildings or structures that are or hereafter shall become damaged, unsafe, unsanitary, or deficient in adequate exit facilities, or which constitutes a fire hazard, or are otherwise dangerous to human life or the public health, safety or welfare, or which involve illegal or improper use, occupancy or maintenance, or which are damaged by wear and tear, deterioration, depreciation, fire, collapse, or act of God, to such an extent that the cost of repair and rehabilitation to place it in a safe, sound and sanitary condition exceeds the assessed value of the building or structure at the time when the repairs or rehabilitation are to be made, shall be deemed unsafe buildings or structures. All unsafe structures shall be taken down or removed or made safe and secure, as the building official may deem necessary and as provided in this Section 120.0. A vacant building, unguarded or open at door or window, shall be deemed a fire hazard and unsafe within the meaning of this Code.

120.2 EXAMINATION AND RECORD OF UNSAFE STRUCTURE. The building official shall examine every building or structure reported as or appearing as dangerous, unsafe structurally, constituting a fire hazard, unsanitary, deficient in adequate exit facilities, or otherwise dangerous to human life or the public health, safety or welfare, and shall cause a report to be filed in a docket of unsafe structures and premises, stat-

ing the use of the building or structure, and the nature and estimated amount of damages, if any, caused by the collapse, failure, or other deficiency in the building or structure.

120.3 If a building or structure is found to be unsafe, damaged, deteriorated, or dangerous, the building official shall serve by personal service upon the owner, manager or other responsible person of the building or structure and/or by certified mail, return receipt requested, addressed to the owner of the building or structure whose name appears upon the current tax rolls, a written notice which shall:

(1) Include a description of the real estate sufficient for identification.

(2) Include a description of the repairs and improvements required to bring the structure into compliance with the basic building code and/or a description of the damage, deficiencies or other conditions making the building unsafe, unsanitary or dangerous to human life or the public health, safety or welfare. Additionally said description shall include a listing of zoning violations.

(3) Set a reasonable time limit within which the owner is required to make the repairs and improvements or make the building or structure adequate and safe or to demolish and remove the building or structure, which time limit shall not be less than ten (10) days nor more than ninety (90) days from the date of the service of the order.

(4) Include an explanation of the owner's right to seek modification or withdrawal of the notice by petition to the Construction Board of Appeals.

(5) Require the person thus notified to immediately declare to the building official acceptance or rejection of the terms of the offer.

If the person addressed with an unsafe notice cannot be found within the City after diligent search, then such notice shall be sent by registered or certified mail to the last known address of such person and a copy of such notice shall be posted in a conspicuous place on the premises and such procedure shall be deemed adequate.

120.4 RESTORATION OF UNSAFE STRUCTURE. A building or structure condemned by the building official may be restored to a safe condition provided change of use or occupancy is not contemplated nor compelled by reason of such reconstruction or restoration except that if the damage or cost of reconstruction or restoration is in excess of its assessed

value, at the time when the repairs or rehabilitation are to be made, such structure shall be made to comply in all respects with the requirements for materials and methods of construction or structures as provided in the Basic Building Code.

120.5 APPEALS. The Construction Board of Appeals is hereby empowered to authorize modification of any order of the building official in accordance with Section 124.0 of the Basic Building Code.

120.6 ORDER TO DEMOLISH. If the owner fails to comply with the order to repair or demolish, the building official shall order removal of the structure and the City Manager shall take steps to secure removal of the structure either by City personnel or by an outside contractor. In the event of the expense being incurred by the City in the demolition or removal of any structure, the City Manager shall file a certified statement of the expense thereof with the City Treasurer and the City Assessor, setting forth the legal description of the land against which the expense was incurred. The City Treasurer shall collect the account, which shall be a personal debt of the property owner which may be assessed as a lien against the property until paid in full.

SECTION 124.0 CONSTRUCTION BOARD OF APPEALS.

124.1 APPLICATION FOR APPEALS. The owner of a building or structure or any other person may appeal to the Construction Board of Appeals from a decision of the building official refusing to grant a modification to the provisions of the Basic Building Code covering the manner of construction or materials to be used in the erection, alteration or repair of the building or structure or from an order of the building official issued pursuant to Section 120.0 of the Basic Building Code. Application for appeal may be made when it is claimed that the true intent of the basic building code has been incorrectly interpreted, the provisions of the basic building code do not fully apply, an equally good or better form of construction can be used, or the order issued pursuant to Section 120.0 is based on incorrect information or is otherwise defective. An appeal must be filed within twenty (20) days of the date of any order or ruling being appeal. However, if an order requires the correction of a cited violation within a shorter period of time, the appeal must be made within such shorter period. The Construction Board of Appeals shall not have the power to extend the time limits provided for herein. A responsible person who has been ordered to correct a violation within a specified period of time shall not be held accountable for any time which elapses between the time of filing an appeal and the time that decision is made by the Construction Board of Appeals. Any person wishing to make an appeal must file a claim of appeal setting forth

Relief for Farmers

State Senator Dick Posthumus (R-Kent County) today announced the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) has approved Kent County as a contiguous U.S.D.A. Secretary's Disaster Designation Area following heavy crop losses this past summer due to drought conditions. The designation allows farmers to qualify for low-interest government loans.

"As a result of this designation, farmers can begin applying immediately for drought relief funds through the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) offices," Posthumus said.

"Applicants must be able to show at least a 30 percent crop loss in any major crop," Posthumus continued. "The U.S.D.A. informed me that the interest rates on these loans, while not yet fixed, will probably be in the area of five percent."

"I am glad the federal government has designated these areas as disaster areas," Posthumus said. "It was a tough summer for the farmers in Michigan. These low interest loans will help them financially until the next growing season which we all hope will produce better crops."

Under the authority of Section 1 of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, being Section 300.1 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, the Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on August 10, 1984, ordered that the walleye and sauger size limit shall be 15 inches on all waters, included the Great Lakes and connecting waters, except Lake Gogebic, Big Manistique Lake, Lake Erie, Lake St. Clair and the Detroit and St. Clair rivers for a period of five years beginning January 1, 1985, through March 31, 1990. This order supersedes the previous order entitled "Walleye and Sauger Size Limit", CFI-115.82. C3,4,5

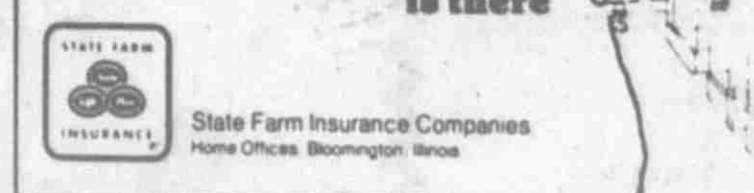

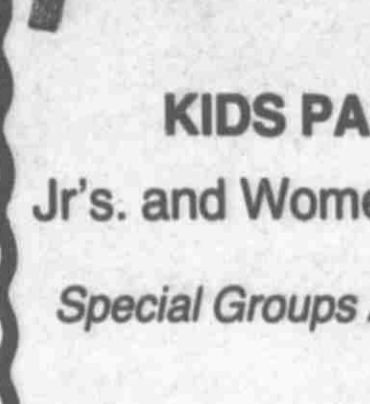
