## Many city walks need clearing

With several inches of hard packed snow and ice already on the ground and more in the forecast for Thursday, city officials and police are urging residents to clear their sidewalks of snow and ice. Lowell City Manager Ray Quada says the New Year's storm created particularly difficult snow removal problems because of the initial layer of freezing rain, then several inches of snow topped with more freezing rain. This combination coupled with temperatures too low to allow road salt from thawing the ice on the roads has created some especially treacherous driving conditions. "When residents don't shovel their walks they force pedestrians, especially school children, to walk in the already dangerous streets", Quada said.

Besides the obvious problems created by snow covered sidewalks, Quada noted the serious delays that they can cause in emergency situations. Quada cited a recent case in which Mercy Ambulance personnel had much difficulty to removing a heart attack victim from his home.

The issue came up at Monday evening's Lowell City Council meeting, and Mayor James Maatman suggested that the city may be forced to introduce a program of using Department of Public Works personnel to clear sidewalks then billing the homeowner or business. Quada said, "The problem with such enforcement of snow removal ordinances is that the city has to be just as tough on the little old lady on Social Security as it is on the businessman who doesn't clear his walk". Quada added, "A plea in the newspaper has generally been successful in the past, hopefully homeowners and businesses will take it upon themselves to get the job done".

As the snow accumulates at the end of driveways the piles begin to create hazards for motorists. Piling snow so high that it obstructs safe vision of motorists at driveways and along the shoulders of the road is a violation of state law (P.A. 82 of 1978).

The police Department recommends that residents keep the shoulder in front of their driveway clear and also clear snow for a short distance from the driveway in the direction of approaching traffic. That way the view of a motorist entering the roadway from a driveway is not obstructed.

Violators leave themselves open to fines and lawsuits for public liability and property damage. For a charge to be filed a police officer must witness the violation or a citizen may file a complaint. All property owners and persons hired to remove snow are responsible for maintaining safe traffic conditions.

## Clarksville's Steven Richardson helps monitor peace between Egypt and Israel

Army Sgt. Steven E. Richardson, 23, son of Elmer Richardson is helping to maintain peace in this historically troubled region of Egypt. He serves on a peninsular land soldier, and more than 1,000 other American troops are part of the 11-nation Multinational Force and Observers, an organization monitoring the peace between Egypt and Israel.

1979 Camp David Accords, through which a Treaty of Peace was drawn up by Egypt and Israel, and witnessed by the United States.

The MFO mission is to observe and report any infraction of the treaty simultaneously to each

of the party nations. This is accomplished through the use of road check points, observation posts, motor and walking patrols and air reconnaissance.

"I'm a team leader. I assist the squad leader and am responsible for the care and actions of three men," said Richardson, a member of the 4th Battalion, 187th Infantry, 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault). "I'm also required to take out four-man patrols to designated points and make sure Egypt or Israel is not breaking the treaty they both signed."

The MFO operates two camps on this barren peninsula: El Gorah in the north and Sharm el Sheikh in the south, where Richardson serve. In the south, the MFO camp is set between a jumble of jagged mountains and the shore of the Red Sea. Despite improving conditions and creature comforts at the camp, there's little that can offset the feelings of isolation, loneliness and monotony many of these soldiers must deal with for six months to a year at a time.

"We spend 30 days at time at an outpost," Richardson said. "Some of the outposts are so isolated we won't see anything for days and some outposts our vehicles can't get to. At those Op's helicopters are used to fly our water and supplies to us. It usually takes about 12 hours to resupply one of the really isolated outposts."

"I feel that I can trust my actions and responsibilities since I've been here. The MFO gives us a tremendous amount of responsibility, such as leading patrols. We have to be experts in map reading, because there are over 500,000 mines of all kinds located in the Sinai. And not all of the minefields are marked. I find the missions assigned to me very exciting and challenging. That's the main reason I volunteered for a second tour of duty here and will probably sign up for a third tour."

However, along with the hardships of serving with the MFO, many soldiers feel there's a payoff in this special duty, with

the opportunity to experience different cultures and see new places.

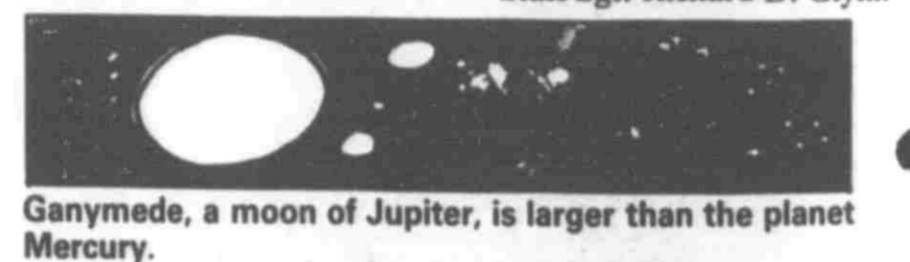
"The most fascinating thing about the Sinai is the nomades who live here," said Richardson, who attended Lakewood High School, Lake Odessa. "They're called Bedouins and they still live by the customs of their ancestors. Their main source of transportation is the camel. They live in very small villages that are very peaceful. Their houses are made up of anything that the desert provides, such as scraps of wood, and iron and steel from the wrecked tanks and vehicles from the wars they've fought in this land. They're a proud and peaceful people, but they can be dangerous if you do them wrong. They like the American soldier and the Israelis."

"Israel is beautiful," he added, "and very much like the States. Most of the other countries in the Middle East seem backwards, and still live by the customs and laws of a thousand years ago."

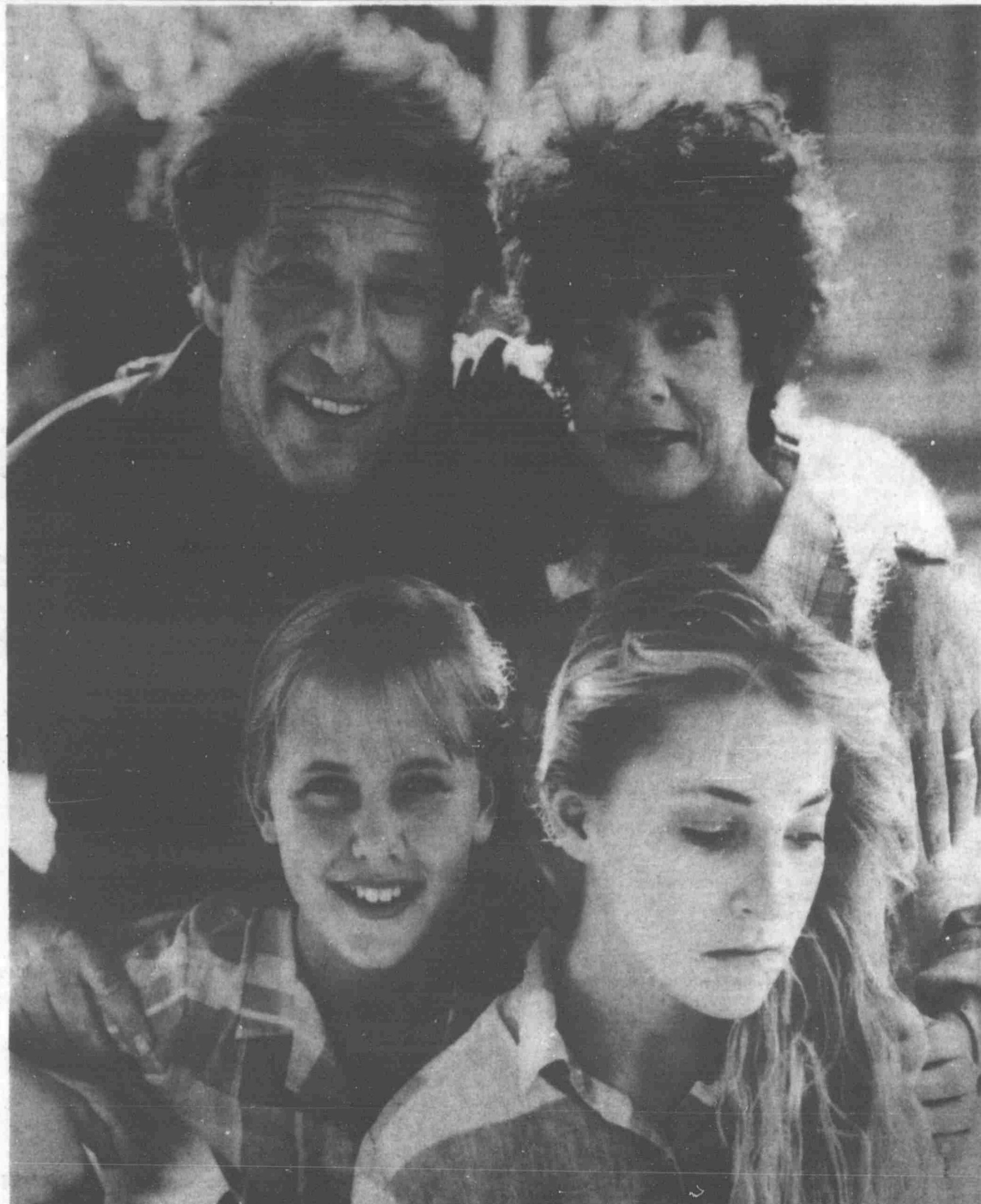

# Tips offered for trouble free winter driving

Taking the nightmares out of winter driving requires common sense approaches by all drivers -- proper planning and vehicle maintenance today to head off tomorrow's dangers.

A national authority who knows how true this is, is Douglas M. Fergusson, whose credentials are many: vice president for traffic, National Safety Council; former chairman of NSC's Committee on Winter Driving Hazards; a director of Chicago's Safe Winter Driving League; and full time director of safety for Nationwide Insurance Company.

Based on his many years of personal commitment to traffic accident prevention, Fergusson has compiled a series of guidelines for more trouble free winter highway travel.

"Knowing what to expect and

expecting the worst" is Fergusson's operative concept that includes trip planning, advance preparations and emergency precautions.

## TRIP PLANNING

Study your route in advance. Mentally, list road and highway conditions you're apt to encounter.

Set up a reasonable driving schedule -- with ample provisions to get off the road and wait if winter throws deadly tricks your way, such as poor traction and reduced visibility.

Plan for periodic rest stops -- don't try to cover too much territory in one sitting. Frequent driver changes also combat fatigue if the trip is long.

Check weather reports. The local weather bureau, motor club, highway patrol office and your car radio are good sources.

Think twice before starting out in the face of a threatening storm.

On the road, a CB radio can be especially helpful in getting reports from other drivers in the area.

## ADVANCE PREPARATIONS

For the driver -- start each day refreshed after a good night's sleep.

For your vehicle -- a tune-up and thorough mechanical check including the complete electrical system, exhaust, brakes, heater, defroster and hoses.

Make sure defrosters and windshield wiper blades can clean ice, slush and wet snow off your windshield. Replenish antifreeze fluid in windshield washers.

Make sure your tires have good treads.

## EMERGENCY PRECAUTIONS

Safety check your trunk. Emergency gear should include a glass scraper-brush; booster cables; flares or emergency lights; a shovel; sand, rock salt or traction mats; a tow chain or strap; extra windshield washer fluid; blankets; and tire chains.

Keep your gas tank reasonably full at all times.

Anticipate situations that call for reduced speeds -- intersections, bridges and overpasses, for example.

Increase following distance when surfaces are slick. Use extra care in signaling other drivers following too closely who may be unable to stop in time.

Sudden changes in speed or abrupt turns will throw your vehicle into a skid. If you do go into a kid, stay off the brakes, ease

off the accelerator and steer in the direction you want the front of the car to go. If you want it to go right, turn right. If you want it to go left, turn left.

To slow or stop on slippery pavements, squeeze your brakes with a slow, steady pressure until just before they lock. When you feel them start to lock, ease off until all wheels are rolling easily again; then squeeze again. Squeeze braking is the best technique for cars with either disc or drum brakes -- or a combination of both.

If your winter sport preference

-- such as snowmobiling -- requires towing a trailer, even greater emergency precautions are needed. Anticipate all movements even further in advance; then accelerate, brake and steer smoothly and gradually. Increase following distances.

Fergusson concluded with this reminder: "Before starting out on a trip this month, bear in mind that tire chains provide the ultimate stop and go traction for severe snow and ice conditions. Have them available for the worst that winter may have to offer."

## State traffic fatalities are up from 1983

Traffic fatalities on Michigan's highways increased nearly 13% from 1983 totals according to provisional figures released by the State Police.

One thousand five hundred and four people were killed in traffic accidents in 1984 as compared to 1,331 in 1983. This count will increase slightly due to delayed reporting. State

Police stressed the fact that of the victims with seats belts available, 93.2% did not use them.

The holiday weekend tolls were higher in 1984 as well. There were 13 fatal accidents claiming 15 victims over the Christmas holiday while 18 people involved in 18 accidents lost their lives over the New Year's four day holiday.

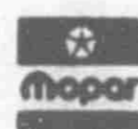
