## Winter storm drops record snowfall; closes schools

A good old fashioned winter snow storm dumped 9.1 inches of the white stuff on the area between midnight February 10 and midnight February 11. The snowfall marked a new record

for any 24 hour period in a February in Grand Rapids said Weather Service Specialist Mike Kalemekiewicz at the National Weather Service office at the Grand Rapids Airport. From the time the snow started at about 9:00 A.M. on Monday until our conversation with Kalemekiewicz at 10:00 A.M. Tuesday, the weather service had recorded just over 10 inches of total snowfall. Lowell Area Schools Superintendent, Fritz Esch decided at 10:45 P.M. on Monday to cancel classes for Tuesday. Esch said that he surveyed rural roads south of Lowell while Bus Garage Manager John Schneider checked out conditions north of town. Esch said that it was obvious that the county roads wouldn't be cleared in time for the buses to run Tuesday morning.



Even with the aid of a snowblower, keeping a driveway cleared has become a considerable chore with over fifty inches of snowfall already this season, nine of which fell in a 24 hour period Monday. Roger Rainer of 950 N. Hudson none the less continues to push the white stuff back.

### OFF THE BLOTTER

Richard Jenkins of Grand Rapids, reported to Lowell Officers his car had been struck by a vehicle that left the scene of the accident in a private lot near Main and Pleasant Streets, Thursday, February 7.

City street crews worked continuously from Monday morning with at least two-plows on the streets at all times keeping the city streets passable. Tuesday morning the crews were using small trucks with plows and the big front end loader to clear parking lots and sidewalks.

Kalemekiewicz said that our average season snowfall is 73 inches, and we are well on our way to matching that with 50.3 inches to date. Tuesday's forecast class for another 1 to 3 inches of snowfall for the area during the day and early evening on Tuesday. The big threat of worsening road conditions lies in forecasted high winds of 15 to 25 miles per hour with gusts to 30 m.p.h. and more. "The driving north winds expected throughout the day and evening could cause near blizzard conditions", said Kalemekiewicz. A winter storm warning posted Monday remained in effect Tuesday, and would probably not be lifted until Tuesday evening.

Darwin Nellist of the Kent County Road Commission said Tuesday morning that county roads are, "snow covered and slippery, some east-west roads are plugged". When asked whether he had any idea of what we could expect for road conditions on Wednesday he said, "Your guess is as good as mine. . . we just received word from the weather service in Chicago telling us to expect high winds all day and night and into tomorrow". "There's a lot of loose snow out there, and we could have some real problems", he added. County crews were operating their plows around the clock during the storm with the day and night crews each working twelve hour shifts.

Just so we wouldn't lead you to believe that we are the only ones experiencing bad weather, we put in a call to the National Weather Service in Key West, Florida. Tuesday's forecast there called for clearing skies and "cold" temperatures ranging only in the mid to upper 60's, and dropping all the way down to 58 degrees at night. Doesn't it make you feel better to know that it's "cold" there too?

# Capitol Column

Car theft is a big business -- and getting bigger. In 1983, 67,235 cars were stolen in Michigan, an increase of 40 percent from five years before. State officials expect 1984 figures to show more than 75,000 car thefts.

Police say that car theft is on the rise because it is a low-risk, high-profit business. To make a dent in rising car thefts, then, the risk will have to increase and the profit decrease.

That's what is behind legislation introduced in the Senate making it harder to sell stolen-car parts. It is aimed at more than 100 "chop shops," where stolen cars are dismantled and the individual parts sold to used parts stores.

Under the proposed bill, a person selling parts to a used parts dealer would have to identify himself by name, birth date, driver's license number, address and fingerprint.

Also, the seller couldn't be paid in cash, but in a more traceable form of payment such as check, money order or bank draft. A copy of the transaction would also have to be signed by both parties and filled out in triplicate, with one copy sent to the local police department.

The bill was prompted by debate last year after hearings on the state's Essential Insurance Act. The Essential Insurance Act, enacted in 1981, forces insurance companies to distribute

the cost of insuring high-risk clients, such as those in Detroit, over all their clients.

So, when car thefts cause insurance rates to go up for those in a high-theft area, we all pay the consequences.

Until the incidence of theft is reduced, we will continue to pay a higher price on insurance premiums whether we happen to live in a high-risk area or not. If car theft becomes a high-risk, low-profit venture, we are well on our way to a reduction in an escalating trend. Making it harder to sell "hot" car parts is one step in that direction.

## Jilisa Grooters receives Western Michigan Scholarship

Jilisa L. Grooters, 3530 Snow Ave., has been named the recipient of a Waldo Sangren Scholarship at Western Michigan University. A senior communication arts and sciences and political science major, her project is a television videotape titled "Documentation of Guatemalan culture."

Named in honor of Western's first two presidents, Dwight B. Waldo (1903-36) and Paul V. Sangren (1936-60), the scholar-

ship was established in 1965 to cite student achievement. Students apply for the \$500 and \$1,000 awards by submitting proposals for meritable projects in a particular field. Once the award is made, the scholars carry a full academic load of classes and spend a minimum of 10 to 15 hours a week on their project.

Faculty sponsors oversee the projects, which usually are related to a student's degree program. The Waldo Sangren selection committee has funded projects in such varied disciplines as art, chemistry, music, physical education, oral tradition, history, archaeology, nutrition, sociology and computer science.

### Job-Related Studies May Be Deductible If Required by Job

Expenses for education relevant to a taxpayer's current employment may be deductible, the Internal Revenue Service says. To qualify, the expenses must meet at least one of two specific guidelines. Taking the course of study must be mandatory for continuance in one's current employment status—for example, a teacher required to take a course to retain a teaching position. If not, the course must be helpful in maintaining or improving skills which are required in one's present employment—for instance, a television repairman taking a course to keep up with the latest changes.

### How to Avoid Most Common Errors On Form 1040

- 1. Medical Deductions. This item is not entered on Form 1040, but on a related schedule. Because Schedule A was redesigned last year, this item will probably lead the list of last year's most common errors. Due to rule changes on medical deductions, IRS expects problems again this year. Be sure to check the limitation on medical expenses.
2. Figure from Tax Table. Because of the number of pages and figures involved, this item is always high on the list of most common errors for all tax forms. Double check the figure from the tax table for your filing status and enter on line 38. Check the box for Tax Table.
3. Unemployment Compensation. Due to changes in the tax law last year, this item moved into the list of most common errors. Double-check your figures on the worksheet in the tax instruction booklet (page, 10), and make appropriate entries on lines 20a and 20b.
4. Child Care Credit. Read instructions carefully and double-check your computations on Form 2441, Credit for Child and Disabled Dependent Care Expenses. Enter the figure on line 41 and attach Form 2441 to your return.

present employment. Similarly, the expense for study to help meet the minimum educational requirements for a current position is not an allowable deduction—for example, a full-time engineering student who has a part-time job in a minor engineering capacity. Educational expenses include amounts spent on tuition, books, supplies, laboratory fees, similar items, and certain travel and transportation costs. Educational expenses other than travel and transportation are itemized deductions and should be listed on Schedule A (Form 1040) as miscellaneous deductions. Travel and transportation are deducted as adjustments to income using Form 2106. Additional information on educational expenses appears in the free IRS Publication 508, Educational Expenses, available by using the mail order form in the tax package or calling the IRS.

### Balance Due/Refund. This important item usually makes the list of most common errors. If your total tax (line 56) is larger than your total payments made (line 64), enter the difference on line 68, Amount You Owe. Follow the instructions for remitting payment. If the reverse is true, enter the difference on line 65, Overpaid. Enter on line 66, Refunded to You, the portion of the line 65 overpayment that you want refunded to you.

### Earned Income Credit (EIC) Not Claimed. If you are a working parent and have at least one child living with you, and if your adjusted gross income (line 32) is less than \$10,000, you probably qualify. See page 16 of the instructions.

### EIC Error or Not Qualified. Make sure you are qualified. Certain limitations must be met and you must have a dependent child living with you and you must have worked during the year. Follow the instructions carefully and enter on line 59.

### Dividends. You must complete and attach Schedule B if you have \$400 or more in dividend income. Enter your total dividends on line 9a; your exclusion (up to \$100 for individual filers, up to \$200 for married filing jointly) on line 9b; and enter the difference (subtract line 9b from 9a) on line 9c.

### Income Computation. This is an outgrowth of item 8, since the taxpayers who miscalculate their dividend income will have an error on line 23, total income. Double-check these figures.

### Income Averaging. Schedule G, Income Averaging, is one of the most complicated and intimidating forms for individual filers, due to the number of tax years covered on the form. You should have copies of your returns for the preceding three years in order to accurately complete this form. Read and follow instructions carefully and double-check all figures.

Following the payment of bills, the Board approved a child care leave for Karen Burd for the remainder of the 1984-85 school year. The Board then accepted the resignation of Middle School Assistant Principal John Gabrion effective June 30, 1985 due to retirement purposes. Mr. Gabrion has served in the field of educa-

trict. Denise Dommer, President of the Lowell Booster's Club, presented \$2000 as the second donation of their \$6000 commitment to the Board in support of the extra curricular program for the middle school.

In the last item of business the Board discussed future committee meeting dates for the purposes of personnel matters, transportation, policies, and goals.

## Lots of "D" Stamps at Lowell P.O.

An adequate supply of "D" stamps and other nondenominated items is available at the Lowell Post Office to help customers make a smooth transition after the February 17 postal rate change.

Postmaster Charlie Doyle says that the nondenominated "D" stamps in sheet, coil and booklet formats represent the new 22-cent first-class rate. There are also nondenominated postal cards and plenty of two-cent stamps that, when added to 20-cent stamps, make up the new first-class letter rate.

"Nobody likes to see higher postal rates. But this increase is moderate and justified," Postmaster Doyle said. "Since the last increase in November 1981, the cost of living in the United States, as measured by the consumer price index, has gone up almost 13 percent, the 22-cent stamp is only a 10 percent rise."

"The nondenominated items are available because we estimate that stamp inventories in

post offices at present will fall short of public demand and, we want to avoid customer inconvenience" he said.

Commemorative stamps, be-

ginning with the Jerome Kern stamp, and other 22-cent stamps, are expected to replace the "D" stamp by the end of March, the Postmaster said.

Electrafer is now at the MBC-MVBA junior sire housing facility in Stewartville, Mn. He is one of about 100 high genetic potential young sires enrolled each year in the cooperative's sampling program.

Electrafer and the other young sires will have to wait over four years from sampling before their first Predicted Differences (PD's) are calculated.
