A Lowell landmark was leveled by the heavy equipment of O.E. Bieri & Sons Construction last Wednesday. The Rosie-Drive Inn was razed to make way for a new 7-11 convenience store. The property was recently sold to Garb-Ko, Inc., the area's franchise representative for 7-11. Construction is expected to begin soon.

The former car dealership was converted into a restaurant by Mac and Rosie Fonger in 1967. Rosie operated it for fourteen years until she sold it in 1981. The restaurant was then named J.R.'s Family Restaurant and later named the "In" Place when it was re-sold in 1983.

## Donate to program for 6th graders

Lowell Superintendent of Schools Fritz Esch describes it as, "an excellent example of service groups and the school district working together to provide a positive growth experience for our youngsters through the training of our teachers." What Esch is referring to is a "Skills for Adolescence" program for Lowell sixth graders that is being funded by donations from several civic groups. The project is being spearheaded locally by Dave Potter of the Lowell Lions Club and Jim Kyburz of the Alto Lions Club.

Skills for Adolescence helps young people learn how to deal with the challenges of our complex society by offering positive growth experiences and teaching specific coping skills. The program places a special emphasis on preventing drug and alcohol abuse and related problems and fosters skills in responsibility, decision-making, communication, self-confidence and goal setting.

It is based on the premise that the time to address these problems and keep them from hurting young people is before they start. The program targets the early adolescent years (ages ten to

fourteen), since this is a particularly vulnerable stage of development and the time when many forms of negative behavior are likely to begin.

The donations solicited by Potter and Kyburz will be used to fund a three day training workshop for participating Lowell 6th grade teachers. Cost for the first

year of training will total several thousand dollars. The project has been approved by both the Lowell School Curriculum Council and the School Board.

Phyllis Beachler was masterful as she allowed only 3 hits while striking out a season high 12 hitters. She walked only 4, in picking up her fifth win on the mound. Arrow Coach, Bob Rodenhouse, was very pleased with the team performance and especially happy with Beachler. "She has the potential to be a very good pitcher, but she must cut down on her walks. She was walking a lot of hitters, but was not allowing many hits. The last four games, the most hits off her has been 3, and that's just great. I told her before the ball game to really concentrate on the catcher's glove, throw hard and not to aim the ball. I guess the talk worked because it was her best performance of the year." Her hitting did not suffer either

as she went 3 for 4 with a double and a triple. The arrows started off the scoring as Trisha Stencil walked with the bases loaded, in the third. East came right back in the fourth as they scored 4 runs, 3 which were unearned. Two Lowell errors helped the Pioneers to a 4-1 lead. In the Arrow half of the fourth, Michelle McGee doubled, driving in Mimi Mitchell with two outs. Micki Denman then drove in McGee with a single to right. In the fifth, the Arrows went ahead on Mitchells bases loaded walk and McGee's ground out to second. In the sixth, the Arrows padded their lead with Beachlers lead off triple and Chris Crawford's sacrifice fly to center. The final Arrow run scored on Dianna Miller's RBI single to center to score Trisha Stencil from third. The Arrow's next home game is Friday, May 3 against Kenowa Hills.

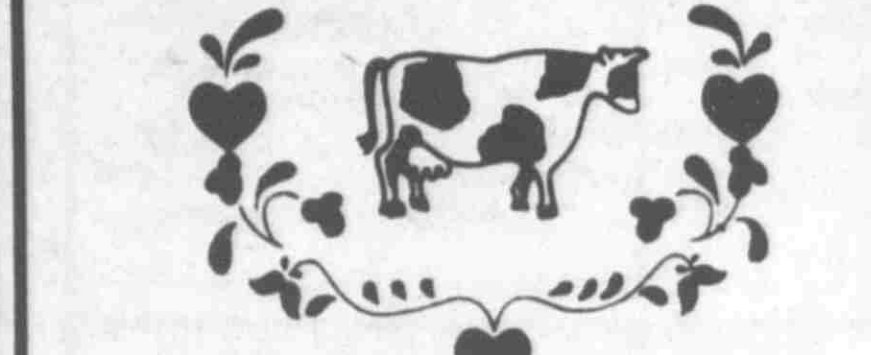

Allergies Part 1 - What is Allergy?

Many people suffer from allergies and when a patient states that he is "allergic" or has "sinus problems", he generally means that he is experiencing allergic rhinitis. Allergic rhinitis means that the mucous membranes of the nose become inflamed secondary to an offending agent such as pollen.

People suffering from allergic rhinitis experience many symptoms including stuffy nose, postnasal drip, sore throat, sneezing, watery, itchy, red eyes, dry cough, fullness or buzzing in the ears and headaches. The symptoms can sometimes be confused with those of a cold. However, a cold generally lasts 7-10 days whereas the symptoms of allergic rhinitis are much longer in duration.

The symptoms of allergic rhinitis are due to a release of a chemical (histamine) which causes swelling and increased watery secretions from the lining of the nose. Allergies, such as pollen, dust or mold lead to release of histamine from the cells in the nose in a sensitized individual.

Today, we have been discussing allergies as they affect the nose but allergies can cause problems in other areas of the body too. Some allergies lead to hives, asthma attacks or abdominal cramping.

Allergies and their symptoms are treated primarily with three different strategies - avoidance of the offending agent, medication and hyposensitization (allergy shots). Over the next two weeks we'll review these treatment strategies.

Most sources surveyed by AAA expect the mushrooms will appear by the first or second week of May and last through early June. This year's crop is expected to be better than the last and possibly at peak production.

Weather determines the quality of morel growth and this year's warm and rainy conditions in many areas have been near ideal.

Hunters should learn to distinguish edible morels from poisonous mushrooms which often grow nearby and not to pick them if uncertain. Morels are noted for deep, irregularly spaced pits on a hollow top attached at its base to a hollow stem.

A Michigan Department of Natural Resources guide describes and recommends three types of morels for eating among Michigan's 2,500 mushroom species. It is available free by calling (517) 373-1220.

Help in identifying edible morels is offered at mushroom festivals which have become part of the rites of spring in areas where the tasty species flourish.

Major events are the Mesick Mushroom Festival, May 4-11; Morel Mushroom Festival, May

11, Lewiston; National Mushroom Hunting Championship, May 11-12, Boyne City; Mushroom Festival and Art Fair, May 11-12, Harrison, and Mushroom Mania, May 11-12 and 18-19, Grayling.

# Morel season nears

One-half million persons are expected to tramp through aspen stands, forests of hardwoods and meadows this spring in search of Michigan's most delectable fungi—the morel mushroom, according to AAA Michigan.

More than six morel species flourish in the state during the May picking season, but two edible varieties primarily are sought in Michigan each spring. Black morels are most abundant in the northern half of the state while white morels are plentiful in many hardwood forests throughout Michigan.

Pier fishing is good for trout and Salmon. Open water fishing is also good when weather permits access to Lake Michigan.

Smelt runs in Lake Michigan are expected to occur at any time. Warm weather has produced some early fly hatches which will make trout fishing good.

Wildlife Information As promised by the Department of Natural Resources, a \$745.65 "Panda Gift Fund" donation collected from the people of Michigan was hand-delivered to the Sichuan Wildlife Conservation Association in China in March.
