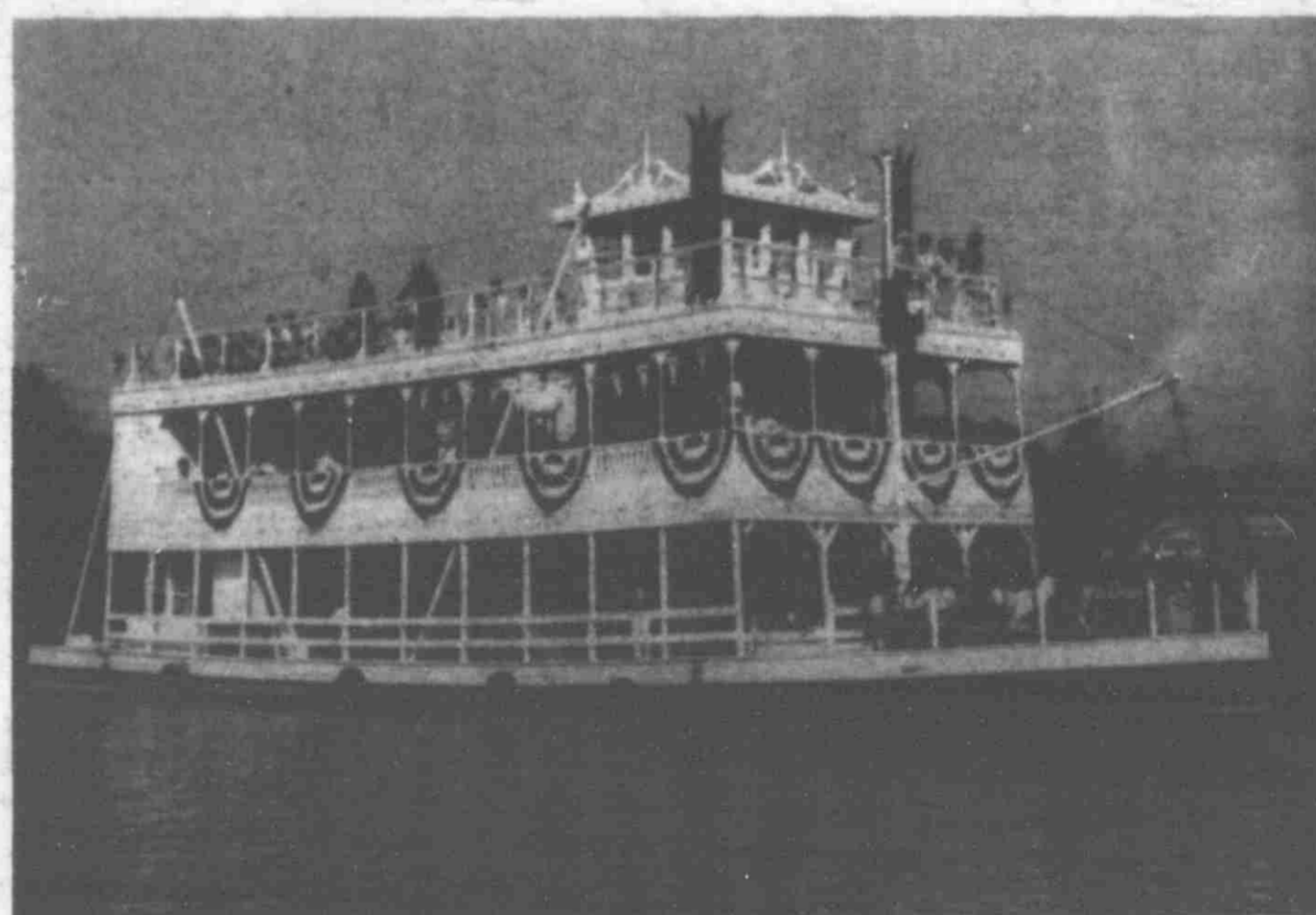

WCUZ/Budweiser benefit nets \$4,000

"Last weekend's WCUZ/Budweiser Showboat Benefit will net at least \$4,000 for the Showboat coffers," said WCUZ Public Relations Manager Kevin Reynolds. A steady crowd at the Friday night Riverboat Gambling netted about \$1,400. Softball tournament entry fees, Showboat rides, a Champagne Breakfast Cruise on the Showboat and other fundraisers all added to the pot. Moderate attendance at the Saturday night Steve Wariner concert prevented the weekend festivities from netting much more for the financially plagued Lowell Showboat. Reynolds added, "many concessions have yet to report their earnings, so the figures are not complete, but \$4,000 is the minimum that we will be turning over to Showboat."

Board considering double bus routes

Since passage of the last operational millage, the Board of Education has continued to search for additional ways to save district dollars. A proposal to return to "double bus runs" was presented at the May 13 Board of Education meeting. Approximately \$150,000 could be saved from the district's operating budget with the plan.

"Double bus runs" mean that each bus would run twice. First it would pick up secondary students in grades 6 through 12 and deliver them to school, then make a second run to pick up elementary students in grade K-5. While there are some minor reservations, the advantages appear to outweigh the disadvantages including the point that younger children would ride separately from older students. Also fewer students would be riding on each bus under the double run system.

The Lowell School District is one of only four in an eight county area that is using a single run system of busing. The only other Kent Intermediate school using single runs is Kent City.

The double run system means that Lowell would have a smaller fleet of buses and less drivers (11 would be laid off), running the necessary miles to pick up all the students. Maintenance surveys indicate that buses wear better, or run more miles with less maintenance when they are used heavily. In a double run system

Many of the buses date back to the early seventies and are in need of costly replacement if a single bus run system is kept.

the buses would operate twice as long and go as far each day. Also, the heavier use would see the buses wearing out more in step with the state reimburse-

ment formula. The Lowell School District is currently spending about \$900,000 on transportation annually. That amounts to about

12% of the district's annual budget of \$7.5 million. The district's 47 buses currently run

Churchill found guilty again

A Kent County Circuit jury deliberated less than an hour and a half before finding Larry Carl Churchill of Lowell guilty on a second charge of first degree criminal sexual conduct. Churchill is already serving a 7 to 20 year prison term for his February conviction of assaulting a 5-year-old neighbor girl. This second conviction stemmed from criminal sexual conduct charges involving a 4-year-old neighbor

boy and his 5-year-old sister. The verdict came in the second day of the trial. The children, now 5 and 6, testified that Churchill molested them last summer and fall.

Churchill, 45, was arrested last October and charged with molesting four neighborhood children who had come to his Valley Vista home to play with his 5-year-old daughter. Churchill was a private investigator at the time of the arrest, but his license was revoked pending the outcome of the trial.

Churchill did not take the stand, but his lawyer, Thomas

Parker, argued that the children's testimony was inconsistent and that there wasn't sufficient evidence to convict Churchill. Assistant Kent County Prosecutor Barbara Crozier argued that the children were too young to make up the incidents that they described.

Churchill faces yet another trial involving the alleged sexual assault of a fourth child. Churchill faces a maximum sentence of life imprisonment on last Wednesday's convictions. A sentencing date before Circuit Judge Stuart Hoffius has not been set.

Travelers' Diarrhea - Part II Prevention and Treatment

Last week we discussed travelers' diarrhea in terms of incidence, signs and symptoms and relative risk. We also listed for you the "risky" as well as the "safe" foods to consume while traveling, especially to places in the warmer climates such as Mexico. Today, we will touch on prevention and therapy.

Even though most cases of travelers' diarrhea are self limited, about 30% are severe enough to confine the traveler to bed for a brief period and another 40% will require the traveler to alter scheduled activities. This high rate of inconvenience and confinement accounts for the heightening interest in prevention of this ailment.

Rational precautions with food and water are the essentials of prevention. If one diligently attempts to avoid the "risky" foods listed in last week's column, the incidence of travelers diarrhea will decline accordingly. It is often difficult, however, to avoid foodstuffs, which appear appetizing while on vacation. In light of this, many authorities advocate medical prophylaxis (prevention via the use of medicine). Several oral medicines may be taken, usually beginning on the day before arrival and continued for the length of stay. These medicines (Septra DS[®], Bactrim DS[®], Vibramycin[®]) are known to prevent travelers' diarrhea, but only on a short term basis (up to 3 weeks). If one is to travel to a high risk country for a longer period of time, there is no guarantee that the medicine will continue to be effective. Also of use has been the regular ingestion of bismuth subsalicylate (Pepto Bismol[®]). While this preparation may be effective its drawback has been the amount necessary for prevention: four tablespoons four times a day!

If travelers' diarrhea develops in spite of prevention, patients are urged to seek medical attention. Therapy is directed at instituting proper diet, supplying adequate oral rehydration, prescribing anti-diarrheal medication and usage of oral antibiotics. Oral rehydration may be the most important initial mode of therapy. Obviously, water must come from a safe water source, with boiled or carbonated water recommended. Other fluids that can be beneficial in rehydration include green coconut milk and citrus fruit juices which are high in potassium. While traveler's diarrhea can be prevented in many instances, one must realize the importance of quick and rational medical therapy when and if it ultimately develops.

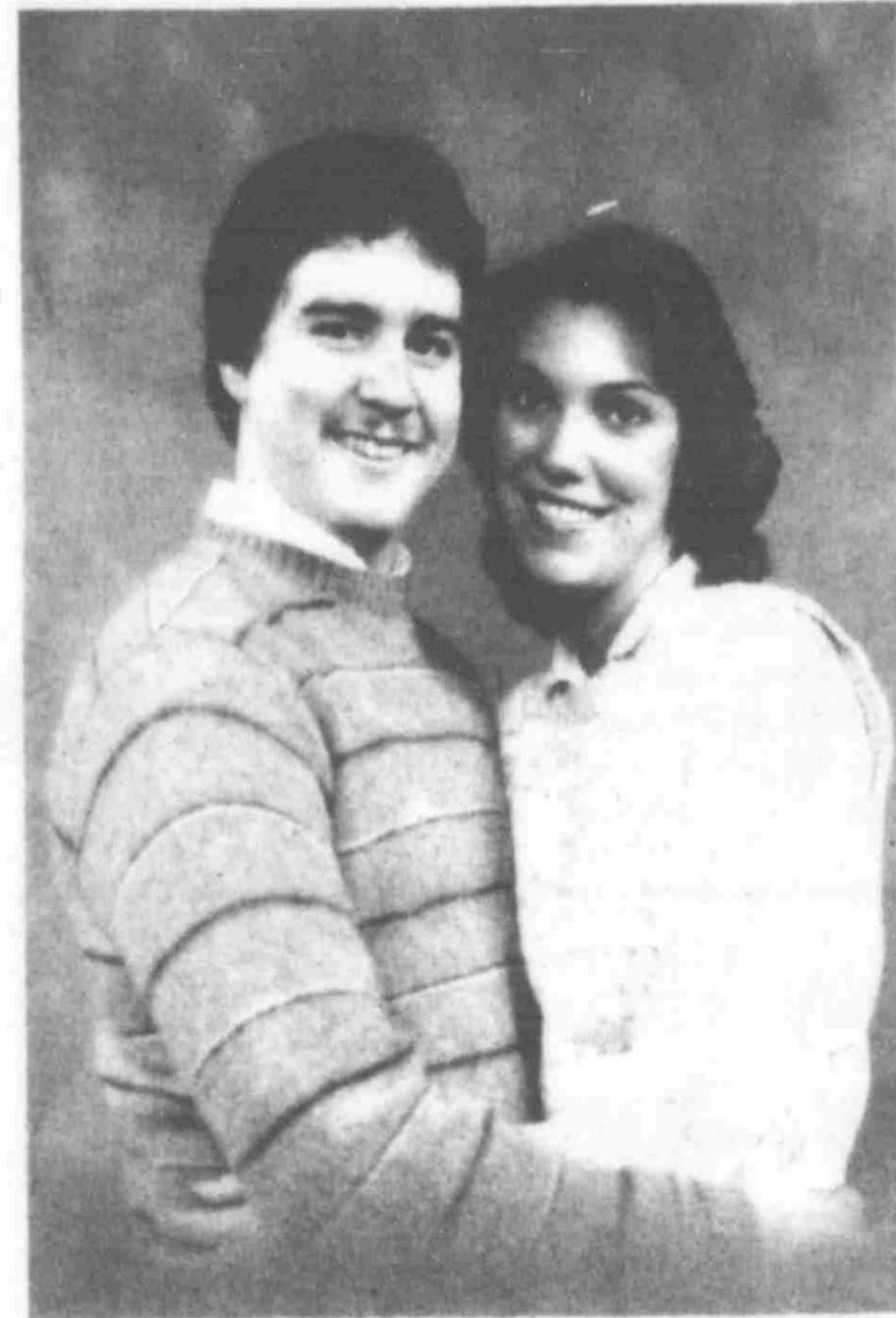

Marta will be seeking pledges from large corporations and local business to help make and transport this grain.

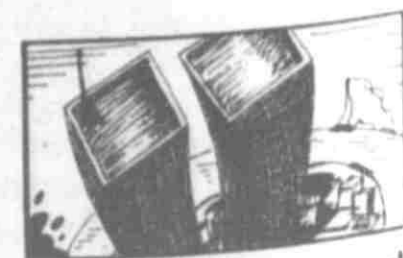

The Lowell Jay-Teens also got involved in the weekend festivities by sponsoring a fishing contest on the Grand River on Saturday and Sunday.

about 2,000 miles per school day.

Advantages to the single run system include the fact that children are picked up and delivered at the same time allowing for uniform school hours. If a double run system is instigated, the elementary grades (1-5) would start classes about one hour behind the junior and senior high schools. Also, the students can be returned home in a one hour time frame in emergency dismissals.

Disadvantages to the single run system are great. The district's buses are now very crowded, up to 80 students per bus. Problems arise with students from kindergarten through 12th grade all riding the same bus. Additional drivers are needed and the huge bus fleet is inefficient use of capital.

The district's again fleet of buses are falling out of state reimbursement formula with 20 of the district's 47 buses being eight years old or older. When the district returned to single runs in 1972, the district was able to purchase as many as 8 buses at one time. With one bus today costing over \$30,000, the district is financially unable to buy enough buses to maintain the demand required with the "single run" approach to transportation.

The Lowell Board of Education will again review this proposal at the June 10 Board meeting scheduled at 7:30 p.m. As always, the public is invited to attend and offer comment.
