School Board Notes:

Double Bus Runs, Budget, Millage all discussed by Board

The Lowell Board of Education held its regular Board meeting on Monday, June 10, 1985.

Following the approval of minutes, the Board recognized some very special employees with Lowell Area Schools who are retiring after many years of dedicated service. Those recognized were: Dirk Venema, principal at Bushnell Elementary; John Gabrion, assistant principal at the middle school; Luoile Kohloff, phys ed teacher at the

high school; Ruth Thurtell, kindergarten teacher at Runciman Elementary; Ona Ross, fourth grade teacher at Bushnell Elementary; and Paul Dintaman, custodian at Alto Elementary School. Also recognized was bus driver, Alice Mitchell. Alice is not retiring from her position but was recognized for her 25 years of service to Lowell Area Schools. Alice was the first woman bus driver hired by Lowell Schools and in that time has had no accidents. This year she received the "driver of the year" award by the Grand Rapids Traffic Squad.

Following the payment of bills, the Board accepted resignations from Ona Ross from her Bushnell Elementary position due to retirement purposes; Bill Ingraham from his high school Study Hall Supervisor position; and Ellen Jones as high school Debate Coach.

In other matters relating to personnel, the Board approved the appointment of Tom Stahr as the new one-half time Assistant Athletic Director for Lowell Area Schools. The Board granted an unpaid medical leave to Robyn Burradell, Alto teacher, for the first semester of the 1985-86 school year due to maternity. The Board then hired Marcia Myers as an elementary vocal music teacher, and Kirk Weller as a high school math teacher. Mrs. JoAnn Frey was hired as the new Bushnell Elementary Principal. Mrs. Frey is the chairman of the Lowell Citizen's Advisory Committee for Educational Excellence which has been active during the 1984-85 school year.

In the next item of business, the Board held a budget hearing on the 1985-86 general fund budget. Following the hearing, the Board adopted the general fund budget resolution for 1985-86. The tax levy was then established for 1985 as follows:

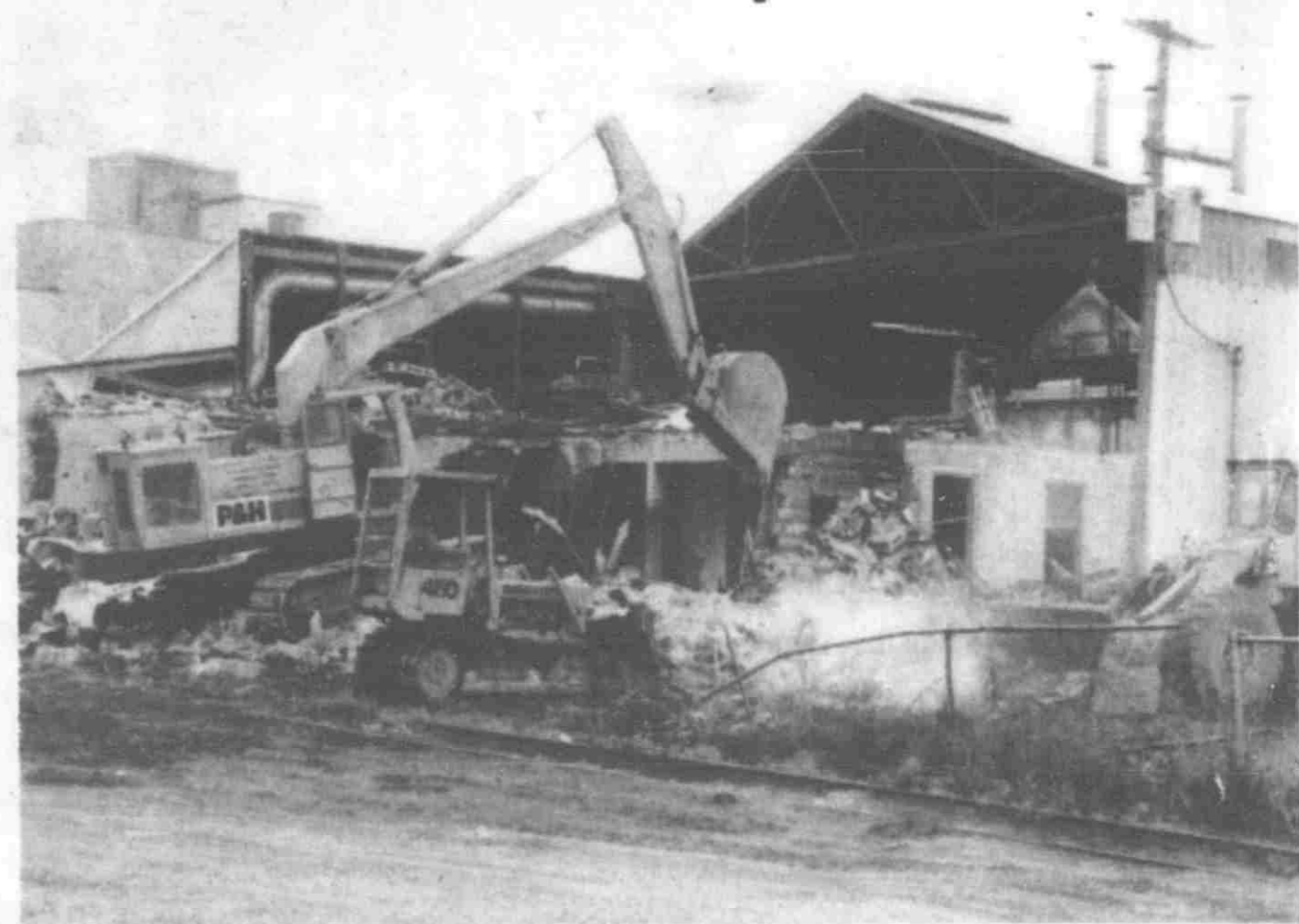
Wild driver lands in jail

A twenty-eight year-old Lansing woman picked the wrong person to play demolition derby with last Thursday evening. Diane Ouellette had allegedly been driving a friend's Chevrolet Blazer in a reckless manner in the area of Valley Vista Dr. and Main Street before entering the parking lot of the Heritage Meat Market. After driving into the parking lot, Ouellette slammed head-on into a parked car occupied by off duty Lowell Police Officer Calvin Kamphuis and his 10 year-old son. Both sustained minor injuries, and Kamphuis' Dodge Omni was totaled.

Not only did Ouellette pick the wrong person to slam into, she picked the wrong place as well. The entire incident was witnessed by another off duty Lowell Police Officer Mike Martin. Martin watched from a window in his nearby residence, then rushed to the scene to offer assistance. When Martin arrived at the site of the accident Ouellette attempted to flee the scene. She was immediately apprehended by both Martin and Kamphuis. The two off-duty officers called Officer Jim Valentine, who was on duty at the time, and Valentine arrested Ouellette.

It reportedly took all three officers to force Ouellette into the cruiser. While in the cruiser Ouellette allegedly kicked wildy at the interior causing about \$300 worth of damage. Ouellette was lodged in the Kent County Jail and charged with reckless driving, disorderly conduct and malicious destruction of police property.

One of my father's favorite clichés has always been, "Three moves are as good as a fire". Well, we just moved last week, and it was our third move in thirteen years of marriage. Though my father's words of wisdom aren't entirely correct, he wasn't far off. It wouldn't take too many fingers to count the items that were with us when we moved into our first apartment, and still with us for this move. Some of my old Army uniforms, a few of the more durable wedding gifts and a few small personal items would just about catch all of our original equipment.

Of course this doesn't mean that we didn't have anything to move! It's amazing how much JUNK a family of four can accumulate in thirteen years. We gave the garbage collectors a real workout every Wednesday for about three weeks running. We built mounds of junk out by the street that would rival the Calder stable in Grand Rapids. One trash heap was so large that I suggested we give it a name. "Garbage Giganticus", "Trash Can Titanic" and "Mounds of Memories" were a few that came to mind.

We had a key to our new house for about two weeks prior to moving day. Since it is only about three blocks from one house to the other, we made innumerable trips with carloads of miscellaneous items. Working until midnight nearly every night of the week we were successful in hauling most of the junk that would fit into a car. Clothes, basement junk, garage junk, TVs, stereo, pots and pans, dishes, food, linens, Christmas decorations... all that kind of stuff was already moved and squirreled away before "moving day". So, when moving day rolled around, I told my crew of volunteers, "this will be a piece of cake, all we have to move is the furniture and we're done". I had moving sounding so easy that I even started looking forward to it.

When the big day rolled around we went at it like killing snakes, (another one of my father's clichés). I guess I just never stopped to calculate how much moving is involved in four bedrooms, a family room, dinette set, living room, etc. I also hadn't prepared myself, or my volunteers, for a freezer, pool table, king size water bed and an upright player piano. We were all moving a lot quicker at 9:00 in the morning than we were at 5:00 that afternoon when we finished. We had planned on a big party that evening, but everybody was so tired that they just drifted off toward home when we were done. That's a heck of a way to treat a guy's brothers and friends, isn't it?

For weeks prior to the move I received letters from moving companies almost daily. My name must have popped up on their mailing lists when our house was listed. I opened the first two or three, then just started throwing them away, determined to move myself. But, if there ever is a "next time", I may just look at those letters a little more closely. I know that I have two brothers and two buddies with barked knuckles, wrenched backs and aching muscles who would say, "here, here" to that proposal.

CMU Announces Scholarship Winners

Central Michigan University has awarded a number of scholarships to entering freshmen with outstanding high school academic records.

Among those receiving CMU academic scholarships were Stephanie Adams, Gloria Wilkins, and Jill Harrison all of Ada; Steve Kropf and Carmen Parsons of Lowell; Beth Mutschler, Kathleen Seiler, and Kelly Weeks of Saranac.

CMU awards \$400 scholarships to valedictorians and salutatorians of Michigan high schools and \$300 to entering students with high school grade point averages of 3.50 (4.0 is A) or better. The scholarships are

renewable each year the student maintains a minimum CMU grade point average of 3.5 or 3.25 respectively.

The valedictorian/salutatorian awards and the academic honors scholarships are granted by the CMU Board of Trustees to students admitted to the University.

In all, CMU has received over 10,200 freshman applications and has begun closing its freshman class for Fall 1985. CMU expects to enroll 3,000 new freshmen. This marks the tenth consecutive year the University has been forced to close enrollment in the spring to new freshmen.

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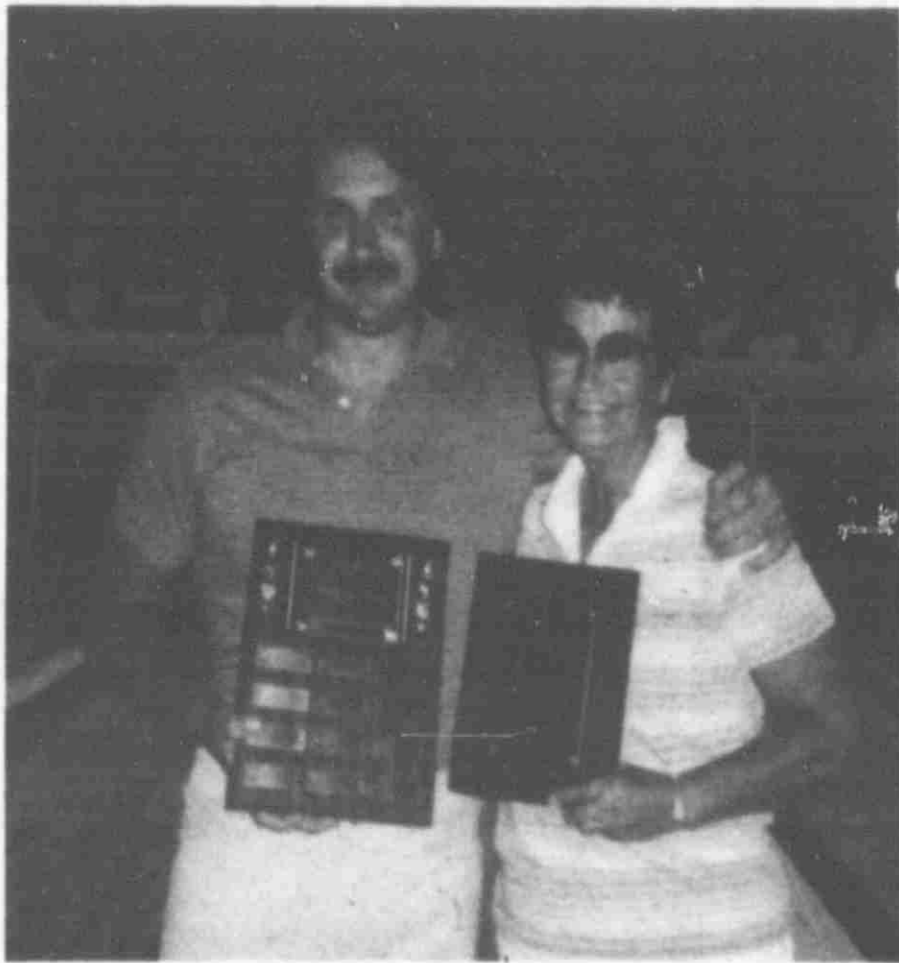
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Women's Bowling Club Holds First Tournament

But let's get back to Clarence Crane, who started it all with an idea that could have made him a millionaire many times over—if

he hadn't opted for a short-term gain. Crane hated summer. It was bad for business because that's when chocolate tends to melt in your hand instead of your mouth. So into the lab he went in search of a summer-proof confection. No, he did not emerge with an M & M. He emerged with the now-famous circular mint with the hole in the middle that looked

like a... well, life saver.

The design was no idle innovation. The mints of the day were all pillow-shaped, with nary a hole, and Crane wanted his new confection to be distinctive in the marketplace. Besides, he probably reasoned, if the makers of donuts and bagels could sell a hole, he could too.

The Life Saver factory in Holland also turns out a number of

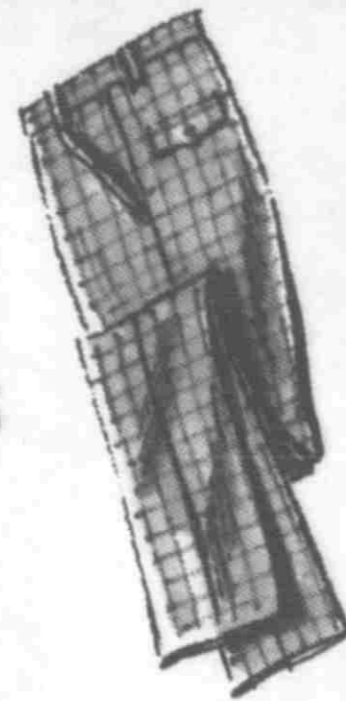
other Nabisco Brand products, including Bubble Yum, America's first "soft" bubble gum; Beechnut stick gum and roll candy; Fruit Stripe gum; and Life Saver lillipops. In all, the factory produces about 9,000,000,000 tablets of hard candy and mints each year. And that's the whole story!

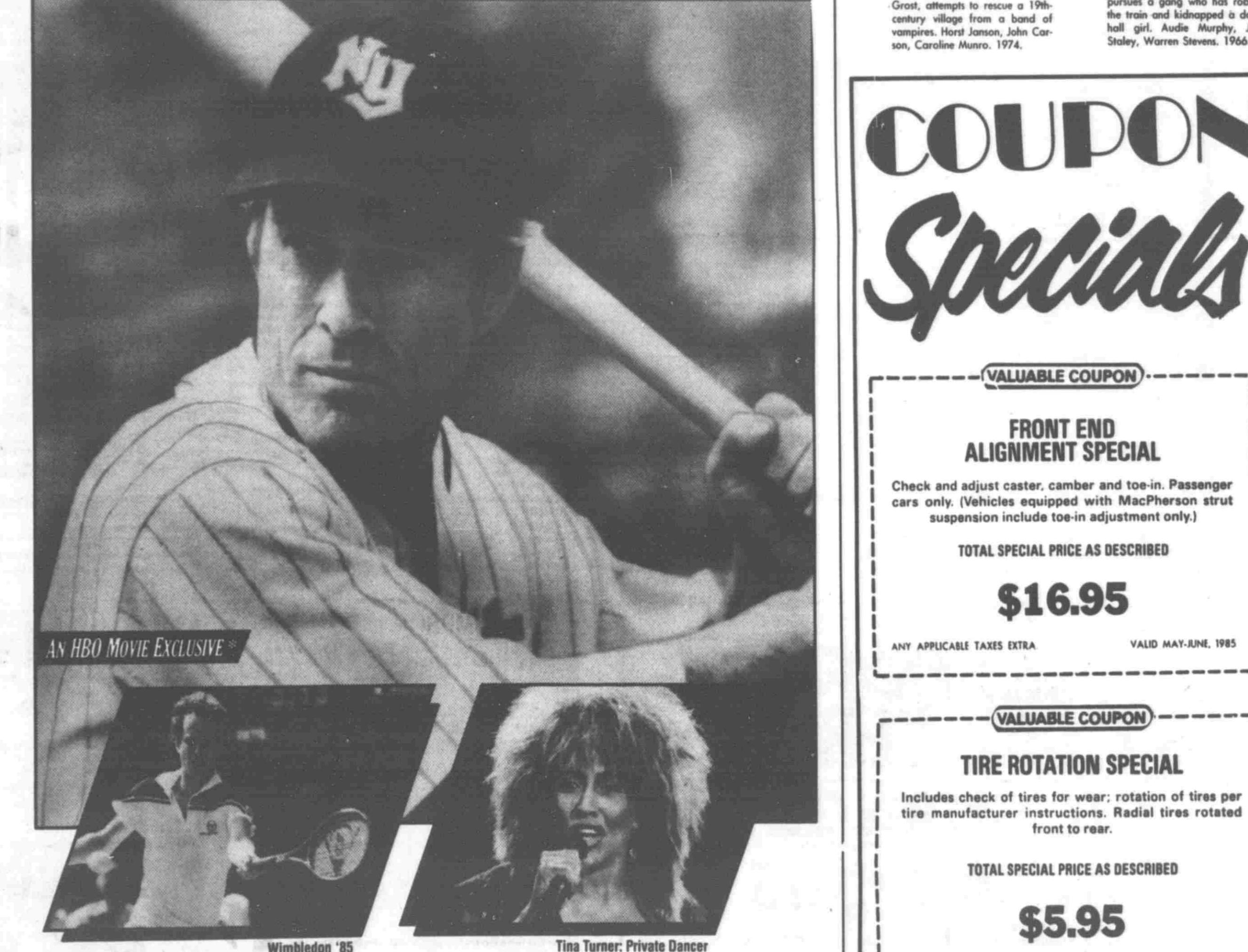

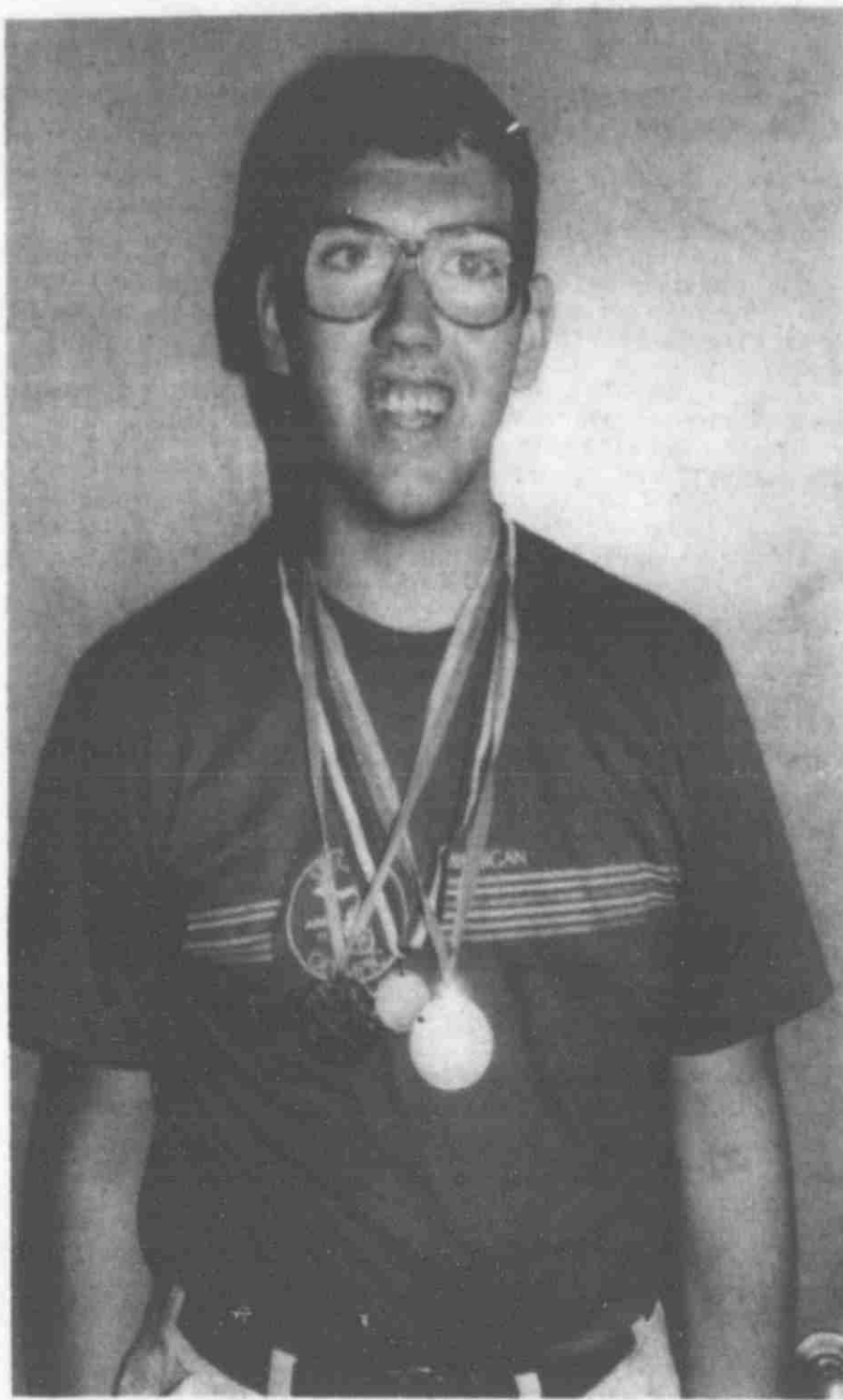

Mincemeat, cont'd.

Michigan Wire Processing, Inc. It has served as a canning plant and as a production facility for Lowell's once famous "Dining Car" Mincemeat. Michigan Wire President Don Fizer says that the block used to build the old structure are unique in that a father and son crew made the blocks on-site one day, and laid them in place the next.

Fizer says the building is being demolished to make way for a new structure that will be an extension of the present pole type building that houses the company's four annealing furnaces. The old building didn't have the needed height or free span space needed to install the two new furnaces that Fizer plans to put on line. Steadfast Construction will begin construction of the new building as soon as Bieri & Sons have cleared away the old structure.

Fizer says that his company has missed out on some work because of limited capacity. He says the two additional furnaces

will allow him to bid competitively on larger jobs. Michigan Wire custom processes rolled steel to different degrees of strength and brittleness. Fizer says the new addition and furnaces will add some new jobs at the plant, but he added that Michign Wire would make no attempt to ask for tax relief under Public Act 198.

Michigan Wire took possession of the former DeMull junkyard last year. All the junk cars were removed and the are used for storage of the hundreds of rolls of customer wire waiting to be processed. Fizer had previously asked to buy or trade for city owned property in Recreation Park. The request stirred up a hornet's nest of protest from several citizens, prompting Fizer to withdraw his offer.

Michigan Wire currently employs about forty people. It was established here in May of 1976, and is now one of Lowell's largest businesses.
