Kent County 4-H Youth Fair Gets underway next Monday

The 51st Kent County Youth Fair, which will run from July 29 through August 2 at the Lowell Fairgrounds, will feature lots of fun for the whole family. There's always free admission to the grounds.

On Monday, July 29, all exhibits will be entered and many will be judged, including all displays in the Foreman Building, Horses and Dog Obedience. Monday evening the 1985 King, Queen and Court will be presented at opening ceremonies, which will also include free live music by OASIS and a hot air balloon launch. (Raffle tickets for a balloon ride will be sold during the day.)

McDonaugh Amusements will be set up and running all week with rides and games -- special prices for carnival tickets on Tuesday and Thursday.

Tuesday's judging schedule includes Swines, Rabbits, Dairy Goats, Beef Steers and Beef Showmanship. Several Horse classes will also be judged. Clowning performances will be evaluated beginning at 4:00 p.m. in the Community Tent.

Poultry, Sheep and more Beef classes will be judged on Wednesday, with the Annual Auction of 4-H and F.F.A. livestock scheduled to begin at 6:00 p.m. Activities in the Community Tent will include features for

"Old Timers Day" at 2:00 p.m. The Ice Cream Social in the Quonset Building will run from 5:30 to 10:30.

Traditional events for Thursday include Dairy and Dairy Showmanship judging and the Pet Parade scheduled for 3:00 p.m. when any youngster (age 3-13) may show their pet. Community Tent features will salute "Michigan Products." The Youth Rodeo, which invites any Michigan 4-H Rodeo Project member to participate will begin at 7:00 p.m. Ice Cream Social also on Thursday evening -- 5:30 - 10:30 p.m.

Friday's specials include the Showmanship Sweepstakes and

Goat Cart classes. The fair closes out with the Lightweight Horse Pulling Contest beginning at 7:00 p.m.

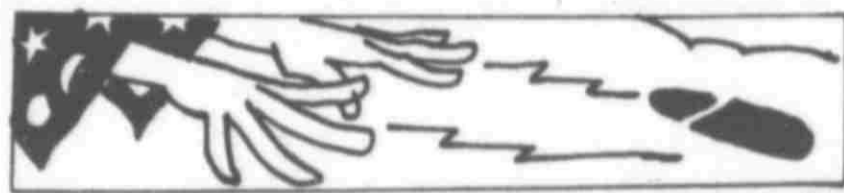

Alzheimer's Disease

Much has been written of late about the syndrome known as Alzheimer's disease. It is a progressive, debilitating, neurological disease that effects an estimated 2.5 million American adults. It can strike in early and mid-life; however, most victims are over the age of 65. It is the most common form of dementing illness and ranks as the fourth leading cause of death in adults after heart disease, cancer, and stroke.

Symptoms of Alzheimer's disease include progressive memory loss, decline in ability to perform routine tasks, impairment of judgment, confusion and disorientation, personality change, difficulty in learning and inappropriate or diminished response to outside stimulation. There tends to be a great variation in the process and in the rate of change from person to person. In the most severe cases, the disease will eventually render its victims incapable of caring for themselves.

The cause of Alzheimer's disease is not known and currently is receiving intensive scientific investigation. We do know that it is not caused by hardening of the arteries, and there is no evidence that it is contagious. Emotional upsets and stress temporarily may affect the person's mood and behavior, but they do not cause the disease.

Before a diagnosis of Alzheimer's disease is made, other illnesses that may cause memory loss must be excluded. In the elderly population these may include depression, adverse drug reactions, poor nutrition and minor head injuries.

Proper medical care and sound guidance can help the patient and his or her family. Appropriate medicine can lessen agitation, anxiety, and unpredictable behavior. Proper nourishment and fluid intake are important, as are physical exercise and social activity in accordance with the individual's capabilities.

The Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Association was founded in 1980. It is a privately funded volunteer national health organization comprised of more than 100 chapters in 39 states. It is headquartered at 360 N. Michigan Avenue, Chicago, IL 60601. In addition, an information hotline has been established on a nationwide 24-hour basis to link families who need assistance with nearby chapters. The hotline number is 1-800-621-0379.

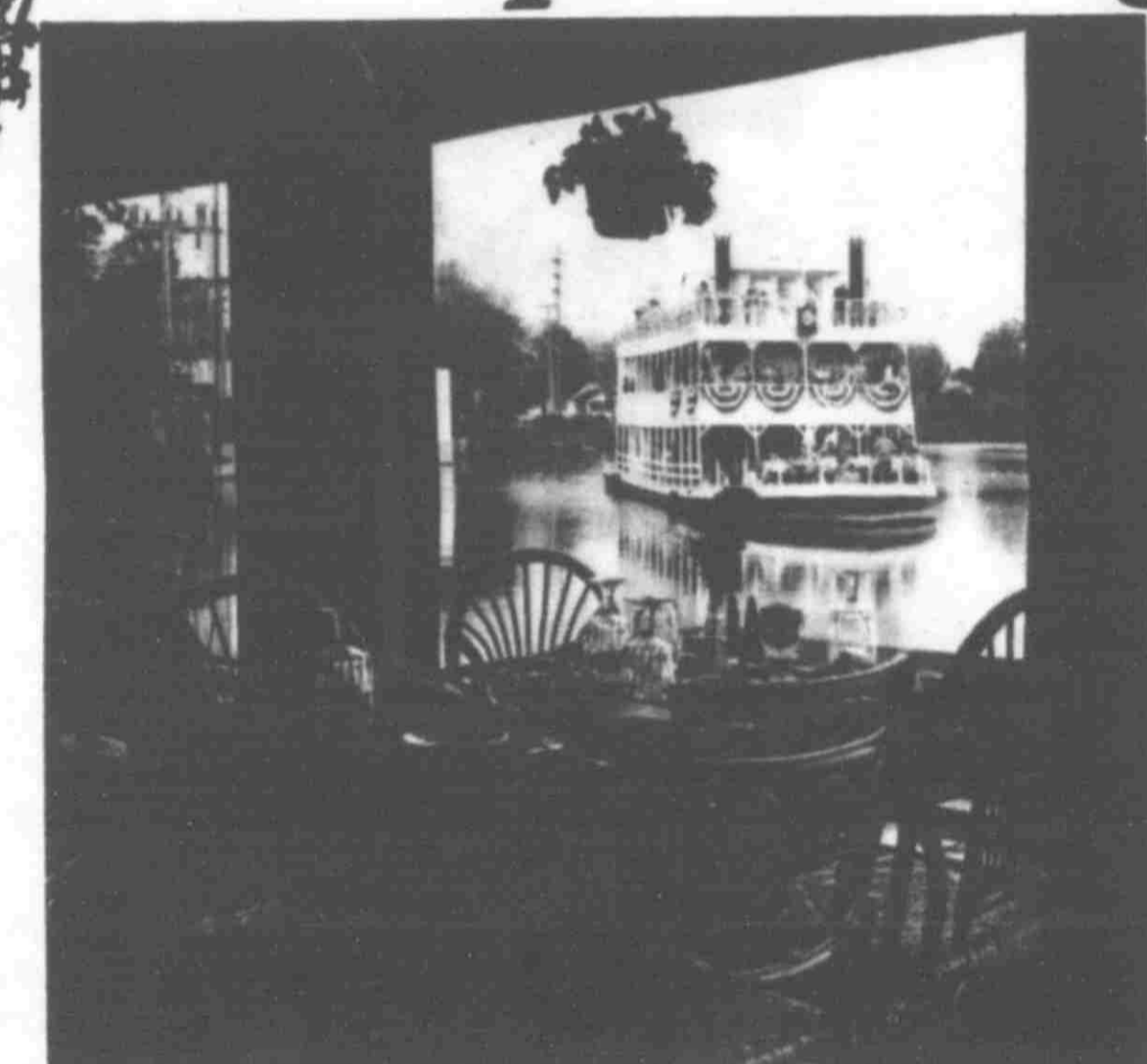

July 11, 1985

The Board of Commissioners met in Special Session, pursuant to adjournment.

Called to order by Chairperson Richard Buth.

Roll Called:

Present: Schwab, Martin Buth, Lorch, Laninga, Boelena, Lamoreaux, DeVriendt, Doyle, Marsh, Kuhn, Kempker, Byington, Vaughn, TerHorst, Oppewal, Bandstra, Chairperson Richard Buth - 18.

Absent: Wahlfield, DeKraeker, Thomas - 3 (all explained).

Quorum present.

Commissioner Boelena gave the invocation.

Those present united in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

There was no Public Comment.

Chairperson Buth stated this special meeting is for the purpose of discussing the Mass Burn Incinerator Project.

Civil Counsel DeWitt introduced Bill Allen, Project Director for the Department of Public Works; Charles Moon of Dickenson, McKean, Wright & Kudlip, Bond Counsel; Robert Hurdle of Camp, Dresser & McKee, Engineering Consultant; and Nancy Winkler-Bryant of Public Financial Management, Inc.

Mr. DeWitt stated the basic question of whether or not Kent County wants to construct an incinerator to burn waste rather than burying it in landfills is yet to be decided by this Board. Staff is not asking for that decision today. The presentation will deal with current economics of the mass burn incinerator project, estimated cost of the plant, projected tipping fees, financing, flow control, and a report on the meeting with Consumers Power Company officials.

Robert Hurdle indicated that the proposed facility will burn as much as 625 tons per day, but that figure is reduced to 530 tons per day due to scheduled down time. Cost of the facility is estimated at \$61 million:

Resource Recovery Plant	\$42,966,000
Site and Steam Line	4,188,000
Electrical Generating Facility	8,345,000
Contingencies	5,510,000
	\$61,009,000

Construction cost per ton of daily capacity based on 625 tons is \$97,614. Costs include architectural fees for design and construction of the facility but not the supervision of construction. It was suggested that the cost for supervision of construction should be included.

Two sites are under consideration. Cost of acquiring the near site is costly because of demolition costs; the Market site acquisition cost is less but requires a longer steam line, so that the two sites are comparable in cost.

The Department of Natural Resources staff recommends that all facilities that State comply with acid gas control which would add approximately \$3 million to the above cost figures.

Bill Allen pointed out that revenue estimates are conservative. Steam sales projections are based on the number of businesses in the downtown system in 1981.

Nancy Winkler-Bryant explained that the bond issue size will be \$84.4 million, based on a projected cost of \$64 million, with variable rate financing. This project would be classified as industrial development bond financing. The new tax law being proposed would eliminate tax exempt financing on industrial development bonds, making interest costs over the life of the facility significantly higher. Under the proposed tax law bond size would be \$93.7 million.

Escrow financing is a possibility but would be affected by the loss of tax exemption. If the County chose escrow financing and then did not proceed with the project, the County would lose an estimated \$2.53 million.

The tipping fee is determined by using best estimates on construction costs, financing costs, energy revenue the facility will generate, and fees to pay the operator. Current tipping fee estimates range from \$15-22 per ton but would increase another \$10-13 per ton without tax exempt bonding.

Commissioner Lamoreaux asked if ownership of the steam loop had been considered. Mr. Winkler-Bryant stated that was not considered in her analysis.

Mr. DeWitt indicated that flow control remains to be achieved whereby a method is established guaranteeing flow to the incinerator of at least 530 tons per day. This could be done through ordinances within a municipality, contracts providing waste to a designated site, or licenses for the local hauler. It has not been decided which method or combination thereof would be used. Contacts will be made immediately with key communities to determine their willingness to enter an agreement for supplying waste to the incinerator.

Mr. DeWitt reported on the meetings with Consumers Power Company officials. Separate meetings were held dealing with a contract to sell steam to Consumers Power and a contract to sell electricity. A key issue is the assignability of the contract due to the pending sale of the steam plant. Consumers Power Company raised the question of whether or not the County had an interest in acquiring the steam plant. He recommended that the Board go into Executive Session for the purpose of considering the possible purchase of the steam plant.

Mr. DeWitt stated that Consumers Power must buy electricity but they can negotiate the rate. They have a number of electricity purchase contracts in negotiation. Kent County is number seven on the list. A meeting will be held next week to discuss the electrical rate.

Mr. DeWitt further indicated that Consumers Power has continuing negotiations for the sale of the steam plant.

Commissioner DeVriendt moved to go into Executive Session to discuss potential purchase of property. Seconded by Commissioner Lorch.

Motion carried unanimously.

At 12:24 p.m. Commissioner Byington moved to return to Regular Session. Seconded by Commissioner Lorch.

Motion carried unanimously.

Commissioner DeVriendt moved to authorize staff to investigate acquisition of the Consumers Power steam plant and to retain an appraiser to assist staff in that investigation. Seconded by Commissioner Doyle.

Motion carried by the following vote:

The sixth annual Babe Zaharias Golf Tournament covering Kent County is slated to be held at Saskatoon Golf Club in Alto, Michigan August 5. This special fund raising event is held each year on behalf of the American Cancer Society to raise extra dollars for research, education and services for cancer patients. "OUTDOORS" with Jack Fiesner

The Michigan DNR's recent decision to open the Mourning Dove Season has spurred quite a controversy throughout the state. I can assure you that this was not a spur of the moment decision and has been under study and in the planning stages for several seasons. Our DNR has thoroughly studied harvest reports and management practices from several other states with open seasons and determined that hunting of the Mourning Dove has very little, if any, appreciable impact on number of birds, habits or propagation. The season is in fact experimental and if any appreciable decline in populations or change of habits result after a few seasons, you can rest assured that the season will be terminated.

Unlike our mammal game specie populations, most of the birds do not actually require harvesting to control their numbers, commiserate with available habitat. However, if they can be harvested and utilized with no decline in numbers or habit, why not do so? From the economic standpoint, the Mourning Dove is potentially a multi-million dollar gamebird to this state if properly managed and utilized.

A letter to the editor in the Grand Rapids Press and Grand Valley Ledger last week, by a local resident, was very well written, but not very factual. I respect that persons opinion, however, the letter was written from the heart, rather than from the mind. It was stated that the passenger pigeons demise was due to over hunting. This is not true, since no one actually knows the reason. It is commonly accepted that bad storms over Lake Michigan during their fall migration flights were primarily responsible for their extinction. The letter also stated that the Mourning Dove is an easy target for the hunter. I don't believe the author has shot many, since with even very light hunting pressure, the dove becomes a very elusive target at best. The letter also stated that the decline in Pheasant and Quail numbers was also caused by hunting pressure. This is not true. Pesticides and Herbicides, particularly the now outlawed DDT, coupled with several severe winters, was the reason for their rapid decline.

Let's not forget that if not for the hunter, trapper and fishermen, we would never have any pheasants and very few quail in the first place. We are now importing pheasants and fertile eggs from china in an attempt to re-establish our flocks. Myself and most other hunters agree that the pheasant and quail seasons statewide should be temporarily terminated in an attempt to re-propagate and re-establish their populations.

I too, love the Mourning Dove, as I do all of Gods creatures, but I also believe in utilization of our resources. I love to see and hear them and I also love to eat them. This statement may sound cruel and inhumane but their is no place for emotionalism in wildlife management. If you are truly concerned with preserving wildlife species for posterity, I would recommend that you buy a hunting, fishing and trapping license since it is only these funds and the sale of sporting goods which provide for wildlife management. The Friends of Animals, Animal Rights Societies, Humane Society, etc., use all their funds to fight those of us who provide sound management practices while their intentions are admirable and their emotions commendable, they are sadly lacking in the common sense required to properly manage wildlife resources commiserate with sound management practices. In their attempts to outlaw hunting, trapping, and fishing they in fact unknowingly advocate cruel and inhumane treatment of the species which they profess to protect.
