Lowell woman injured is in three car pile-up

Claudia Daverman, 79, of Lowell suffered minor facial lacerations in a three car accident at the corner of Avery and Washington Streets on Monday, July 22 at 4:40 P.M. Daverman was northbound on Washington Street attempting a left turn onto

Avery when her vehicle was struck by another driven by Lar-ridan Abel, 23, of Ada. Abel was southbound on Washington and was unable to stop for the Daverman vehicle. The impact of the crash sent the Daverman vehicle into a car driven by Jill Simon, 34, of Orleans. Simon was eastbound on Avery and was stopped at the Washington Street sign. Daverman said that she was watching the Simon vehicle, and didn't see Abel approaching the intersection. No citations were issued.

Lowell Area Rescue responded to the scene, and treated Daverman for her lacerations. She later sought treatment locally. Lowell Police investigated and Roth Wrecker towed the damaged vehicles.

MAIN STREET TREES ARE INCREASING IN NUMBER

The new trees being planted along Main Street are steadily increasing in number. Gross and Associates, the contractor for the planters and trees, is installing them as the exposed aggregate concrete containers are manufactured. In all there will be 40 trees and planters placed on both sides of Main Street in the central business district.

Several delays in the construction of the Riverside Drive parking project have pushed the schedule beyond the July 15 deadline. Materials are now being delivered, and the project should soon begin in earnest. The new parking area will transform Riverside from Main to Broadway into a one way (northbound) parking mall with angle parking on both sides of the street. Several plantings and burms will designate the flow of traffic up the street and through the city parking lot between Riverside and Broadway.

Current Questions and Answers on A.I.D.S.
Since the acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) epidemic has attracted national attention, some people have refused to donate or receive blood, to receive the new hepatitis vaccine, or to come in contact with AIDS victims for fear of acquiring the disease. In today's article we will present many common questions which arise regarding AIDS, and will supply answers based on research done by Dr. Arthur J. Ammann, Director of the Pediatric clinical research center at the University of California at San Francisco.

1) Can AIDS occur in an exclusively heterosexual individual?
There have been a few cases in which heterosexuals have developed AIDS, but careful examination shows that in almost every case, the victim has had other predisposing risk factors such as the use of intravenous drugs or a bisexual male partner.

2) If I get a blood transfusion will I get AIDS?
It is unlikely that most individuals with an intact immune system, who inadvertently might receive blood from an individual with AIDS, would get AIDS. However, because of the estimated long incubation period, this is not certain. Therefore, this is a major public health concern, and efforts are underway to determine whether or not effective screening procedures can be utilized. Currently, a short simple test is being performed on all potential blood donors in the Grand Rapids area prior to blood actually being donated.

3) Are hospital personnel such as doctors, nurses and lab technicians at risk for developing AIDS?
Since AIDS is probably a result of an infectious agent the answer is yes. However, in the two years that overall surveillance has been performed, there have been no known cases of hospital personnel acquiring AIDS as a result of taking care of patients who have the condition or handling their specimens.

4) Is AIDS new or is it just a newly recognized disorder?
Because of the primary symptoms of AIDS were never recognized in its peculiar pattern or in certain groups of patients before 1979, AIDS would appear to be a new disease.

5) Is the homosexual life-style of a patient with AIDS a factor in the development of the disease?
At this point, no reassurances or guarantees can be given to those who engage in one of the predisposing factors for AIDS, such as homosexuality or intravenous drug use.

6) Is AIDS reversible?
At this point, there is no indication that AIDS is reversible.
7) If the hepatitis vaccine is made from the blood of homosexual males, some of whom might have AIDS, should I receive it?
As yet, there have been no known cases of AIDS as a result of hepatitis immunization. But, until the agent that causes AIDS is isolated, there can be no guarantee that the vaccine is safe.

St. Mary's Hospital initiates sports medicine hot line

A growing number of health-conscious Americans are concerned about their physical fitness. But this increased concern with physical fitness has also led to more sports related injuries, as people jog, swim, or bicycle their way to better overall health. For this reason, the Saint Mary's Hospital Sports Medicine Center has implemented a new telephone hot line to allow people to call for free expert advice on athletic injuries.

The new service began on July 15. Dialing 774-6182 will place the caller in direct contact with a certified athletic trainer, specializing in sports medicine, who can answer many questions about first aid, acute care, or even prevention of sports-related injuries. The service does not provide injury diagnosis but rather medical consultation to high school, collegiate, and recreational athletes. The hot line will be in operation Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. An answering machine will receive the calls during weekend and an athletic trainer will return the call within 24 hours, if possible. 774-6182.

Return of Halley's Comet is offered at the Roger B. Chaffee Planetarium

The Chaffee Planetarium is offering a special audio/slide show to area youth groups, churches, schools, and social organizations. The program, called "The Return of Halley's Comet," explores the history of Halley's Comet and what to expect when it returns to the skies this winter.

"The Return of Halley's Comet" is offered free of charge by the Roger B. Chaffee Planetarium in cooperation with the Grand Rapids Amateur Astronomical Association. The program will premiere at noon on Wednesday, July 31st, at a South Kiwanis Club meeting held at the Olivet United Methodist Church, 1933 Buchanan SW. Colon Cancer Screening Offered At Metropolitan Hospital

Metropolitan Hospital and a group of its specialists will be offering free colon cancer screenings for the next ten weeks. It is a public service clinic to call attention to an often overlooked method of detecting the type of cancer that has been discovered in President Reagan.

The technique, which involves a visual inspection of the lower colon with a telescopic device, will be performed without charge by the following gastroenterologists: Drs. John Serini, Alan Coates, and Robert Curtiss.

The procedure, which is called flexible sigmoidoscopy, is different from other recent mass screening programs that have been offered in West Michigan. It involves an actual physical inspection of the lower colon by a specialty physician. The exam is one of the most effective screening techniques for colon cancer; it takes about ten minutes and involves little or no discomfort to the patient. Because colon cancer has few apparent

symptoms and often can go undetected, a flexible sigmoidoscopy is recommended for all individuals over 50 years of age.

Flexible sigmoidoscopy is the screening technique of choice for the lower colon, which is where 60% of all colon cancer occurs. The screening test of choice for the upper colon is the much more widely known process for occult blood, also known as hemoccult. This detects blood in the stool. Participants in the program at Metropolitan Hospital will also be offered this occult stool blood test. Taken together the two tests give a far more complete screening for colon cancer than either one alone; they provide participants with the type of review that will often discover this form of cancer in its early stages.

Explaining why this free service is being offered, Dr. John Serini, spokesman for the participating physicians, said, "Thanks to a variety of recent community promotions, the need for a test for hidden blood in the stool is well known. We are

just hoping to build upon this excellent momentum and educate the public about the need for a visual inspection of the colon as well as a test for blood in the stool."

Another reason for this free clinic is obviously the publicity surrounding the disclosure of President Reagan's cancer. The doctors and the hospital wish to do their part in contributing to public awareness of how to detect this silent killer while interest in detecting it is at an all time high.

If you wish to take advantage of the free clinic, call Metropolitan Hospital Monday through Friday at 247-7447. The three physicians and the hospital will screen as many patients as their schedules will permit during the next ten weeks.

All middle-aged adults are urged to participate; however, since this is a limited offer, priority will be given to average risk persons over 50. Those who have other risk factors which increase their need to take part in

this type of procedure will be advised to seek more intensive testing.

This offer is limited to screening only. If the doctors find any condition that requires follow-

up, the participants will be advised to make an appointment with the appropriate physician.

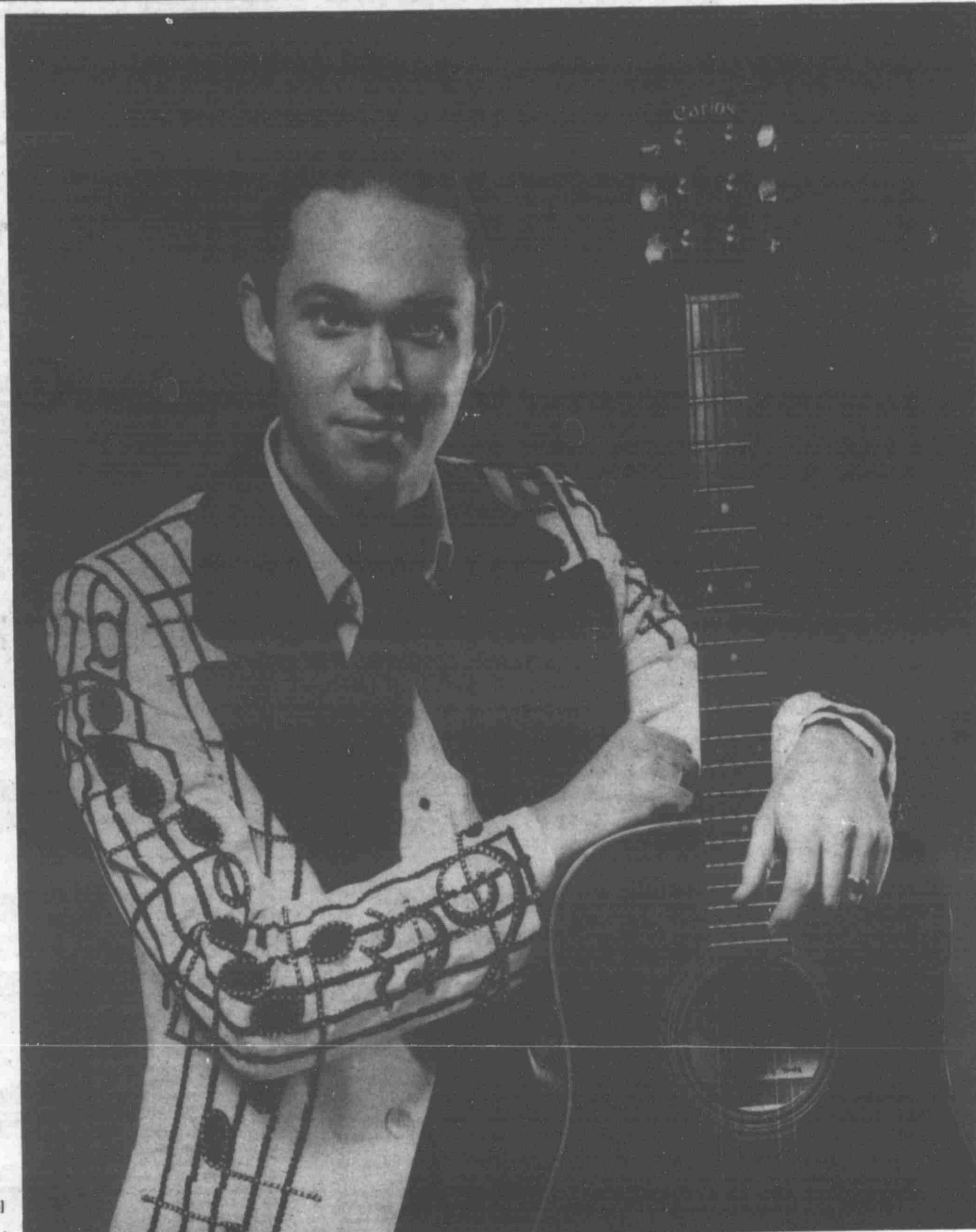

How women can make the most of a home business

Home-based businesses are becoming more popular, especially among women who have discovered that it enables them to balance both a family and a career. Women who work at home gain substantial tax advantages and boost their earnings, provided they meet certain conditions, points out the Michigan Association of CPAs.

To take business deductions on a home office, the IRS requires that you use it exclusively and regularly as your principal place of business. If, for example, your office is also a family room where your children gather at night to watch television, you can't deduct it as a home office. One drawback on the use of a home office is that you may lose certain tax advantages on that portion of your home, such as the tax-free rollover on the sale of your residence and purchase of a new residence, or the \$125,000 exclusion for taxpayers over 55 who sell their homes.

Although you needn't show a profit immediately from your business activities, the IRS expects that you go into business with the intention of making a profit. Unless the IRS can prove otherwise, an activity is presumed to be carried on for profit if it produces profit in at least two out of five consecutive years.

To increase your chances of turning a profit and maximizing tax advantages due you, it's a good idea to develop a business plan delineating both expenses to be incurred and income to be generated. Keep accurate records to compare to your plan and substantiate deductions on your tax return.

For tax purposes, the part of your home used for business is treated separately from the personal part of your home. According to the tax law, your home office can be located in your actual dwelling or in a nearby structure, such as a garage.

If your home office does qualify for a tax break, you may deduct a percentage of all your home operating costs as business expenses. For example, if you live in a four-room apartment and one of the four rooms qualifies as a home office, then one quarter of your rent, insurance, heating bill and other similar expenses are considered business costs.

It's important to keep track of all the equipment you purchase to set up or maintain your business. Costs for equipment, such as a telephone or computer, may be tax deductible, as are amounts spent on supplies such as business cards and stationery. If, however, you use a home computer for purpose other than business, the deduction for which you are eligible may be reduced.

Money spent on the advertising and promotion of your business is also deductible. The tax code even permits you to deduct the costs of reasonable outlays for publicity, such as hiring a public relations specialist to place articles for you in a magazine and newspapers.

When you start a home business, you should review your insurance policies. If you have clients or customers meeting in your office, you'll want to be sure you have adequate liability coverage. You should also insure any costly equipment you have in your home office against theft and casualty. The business use of your home is generally not covered by your homeowners policy. However, premiums paid on liability insurance and other insurance necessitated by your business are tax deductible.

Other deductible expenses that you may be eligible to claim include the following:

- *Business travel expenses.
- *Business gifts and entertainment.
- *Costs for certain education.
- *Subscriptions to professional publications.
- *Dues for professional membership organizations.

You may be able to deduct your home office costs even if you are self-employed only part-time, provided you use the office regularly and exclusively for your business activities.

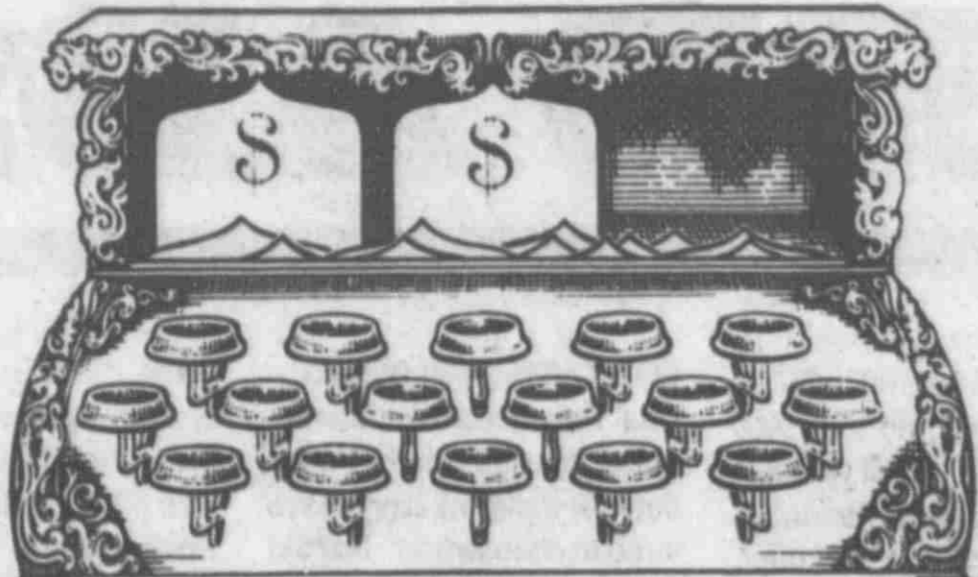

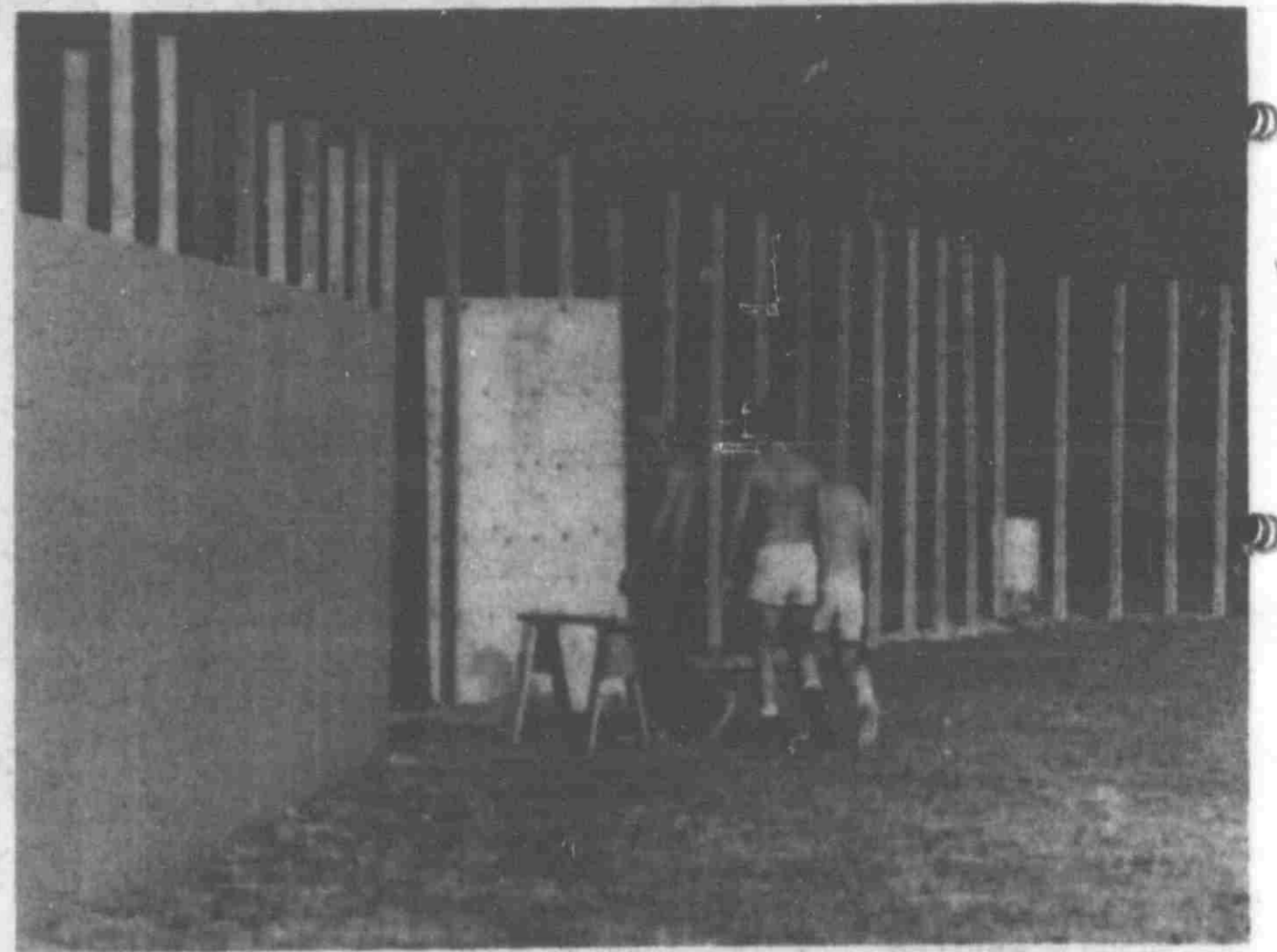

Capitol Column

In the state's legislative quest for Saturn and other companies of the future, the major proposal—in fact, to date, the only proposal on the table—is a two-bill package introduced by State Senator Dick Posthumus (R-Lowell).

The Senator explained the plan in a news conference preceding planned action on the proposal on the Senate floor today.

The proposal, which has strong bipartisan support will create an Automotive Research and Technology Enterprise Community (ARTEC), or "bubble" for automotive manufacturing plants that will employ at least 3,000 people. For businesses which meet the criteria and locate within the bubble, the following incentives would be offered:

Research and development

deductions against the Single Business Tax;

Reforms of the Single Business Tax which remove from the base items which do not add value to the product, like taxes on worker's compensation and unemployment insurance rates;

Credits for job training programs that would upgrade workers' skills toward high technology production.

So far, representatives of the following groups have provided Senator Posthumus with letters of support for the ARTEC concept: Chrysler, the state Chamber of Commerce and Michigan Manufacturers Association.
