Lowell man, 19, dies in crash

High speed and alcohol were factors in a fatal car crash west of Lowell on Grand River Avenue at about 10:55 Friday evening. Kurt Dunning, of 8751 Cascade Road, Lowell, a 1985 graduate of Lowell High School was pronounced dead at the scene by Kent County Medical Examiner Dr. Bernard Kool. Kool listed severe head trauma as the cause of death. Dunning was a front seat passenger in the Oldsmobile

Cutlass driven by Joseph Merklinger, 18, of 10862 Cascade Road, Lowell. Merklinger was listed in critical condition at Blodgett Memorial Hospital Tuesday morning with internal head and chest injuries.

Sheriff's Deputies say that Merklinger was traveling west on Grand River Ave. about 1-1/2 miles west of Alden Nash when he lost control, left the roadway and skidded a long distance down an embankment. The car crashed into a tree impacting at the passenger door where Dunning was seated. Deputies say that none of the passengers were wearing a seat belt. Brian Marentette, 16 of 10862 Cascade Road, Lowell was riding in the back seat and was treated and released at Butterworth Hospital. Another rear seat passenger, Dan Seymour, 18, of 8244 Cascade Road was thrown from the vehicle and suffered only minor injuries.

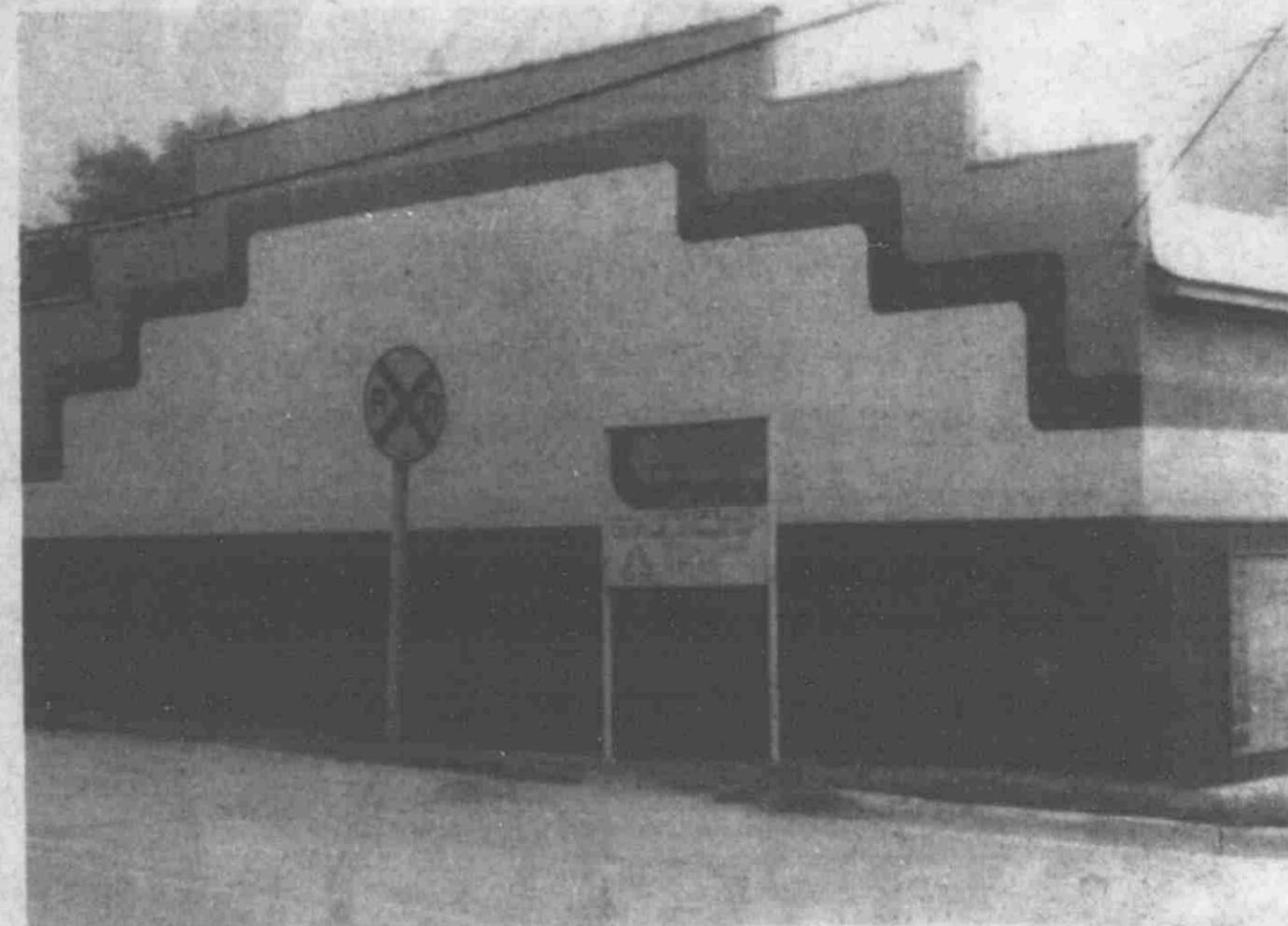
A blood alcohol sample was taken from Merklinger by the Blodgett Hospital test lab. Results of the test will not be released for several days. The accident remains under investigation. No charges have been filed or citations issued.

Marentette reportedly walked to a nearby home where he asked the residents to summon police and rescue units. Officer Mike Martin of the Lowell Police Department was the first unit at the scene with Lowell Rescue, Lowell Fire Department, Kent

County Sheriff's units and Life EMS Ambulance also responding. Fire Department rescue personnel used hydraulic cutting and prying equipment to free some of the victims.

Capitol Column by Senator Dick Posthumus.

One of the oldest perceptions in politics; Republicans get more campaign funds than Democrats, has just been shattered.

A report on where Political Action Committees spend their money has just been released, and it clearly shows who gets the largest share of special interest campaign funds. Between January 1, 1983 and November 26, 1984 contributions to Democratic candidates totaled nearly \$3.76 million. Republican candidates received PAC contributions of only \$1.9 million.

Labor has long been perceived as a Democratic stronghold, and the report certainly shows where they spend their money. Labor unions were the biggest spenders, giving \$1.4 million to Democrats and \$26,647 to Republicans. The UAW was the single largest donor. Three local UAW PACs and the state UAW

PAC gave \$536,018 to Democrats and nothing to Republicans.

Business has often been associated with support of Republican candidates. A person would never know that from looking at the report. In business and insurance donations, Democrats fared as well as or better than the GOP. Democrats received nearly \$1.27 million from business PACs compared to about \$1.23 million for Republicans. Insurance PACs donated \$113,120 to Democrat candidates, while they contributed \$91,246 to Republicans.

Nearly two-thirds of all the PAC money contributed in 1983 and 1984 went to Democrats.

Democrats claim the report is a smokescreen to draw attention away from other issues. Instead, it looks like the report has cleared the air as to who is benefiting from special interest donations.

As Lowell residents know, part of our tax dollars are used to provide trash pick-up to residents and businesses in the city. Restaurants and businesses generating large amounts of trash are required to rent a dumpster. Being the tightwad that I am, I have avoided the dumpster rental option. 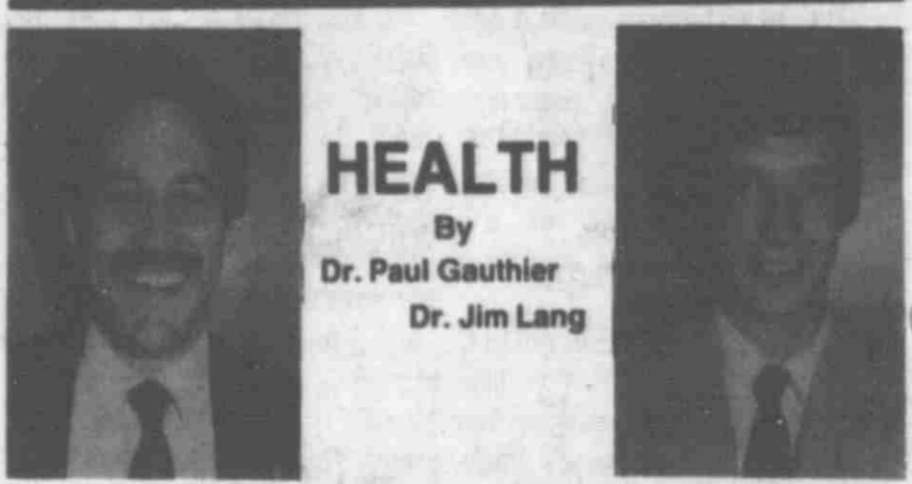

HEALTH

VITAMINS

A recent review of vitamin supplementation was presented in "The Medical Letter" which stated that about 40% of adults take some form of vitamins on a daily basis. Most of the medical community feels that in a normal adult with a balanced diet, no vitamin supplementation is indicated and that this is a waste of money. For the past several years there has been a great deal of controversy in the press regarding megadoses of vitamins. Certain respected medical researchers have claimed that large doses of these vitamins will cure everything from the common cold to prevention of cancer! We have no argument with taking one multivitamin a day but taking large doses of certain vitamins such as vitamin A and C can cause severe toxicity.

In certain clinical situations, vitamin supplements are indicated. Although not all-inclusive, some of the more common situations are presented below.

INFANTS: Most pediatricians and family practitioners recommend an iron supplement in breast-fed babies to prevent anemia. This is commonly prescribed as a multiple vitamin with iron. In the Lowell area, we also recommend flouride supplements to prevent cavities in children who do NOT have city water which already has been flouridated.

PREGNANCY: A prenatal vitamin is usually prescribed because of the mother's increased need for folic acid and iron.

MENSTRUATING WOMEN: Sometimes iron supplements or multiple vitamins with iron are recommended for women who have a heavy monthly flow to prevent iron deficiency anemia.

POST-MENOPAUSAL WOMEN: Because of the potential for osteoporosis (thinning of the bones) in women whose periods have stopped, either naturally or after hysterectomy with removal of the ovaries, calcium supplementation is indicated. The amount recommended is usually 1500 mgs. per day.

SPECIAL DIETS: Vegetarians who do not eat dairy products should probably take vitamin B12 to prevent a certain form of anemia. Individuals on a low caloric diet less than 1200 calories per day may require a once-a-day multivitamin supplement, especially if this diet is maintained for any length of time.

There are a multitude of other medical situations such as anemia, certain bone abnormalities, and gastro-intestinal diseases that will require specific vitamin therapy but these should be discussed with your doctor. The list above is only a recommendation for the general public and most healthy adults would be wise to follow the recommendation of an unknown philosopher -- "Everything in Moderation."

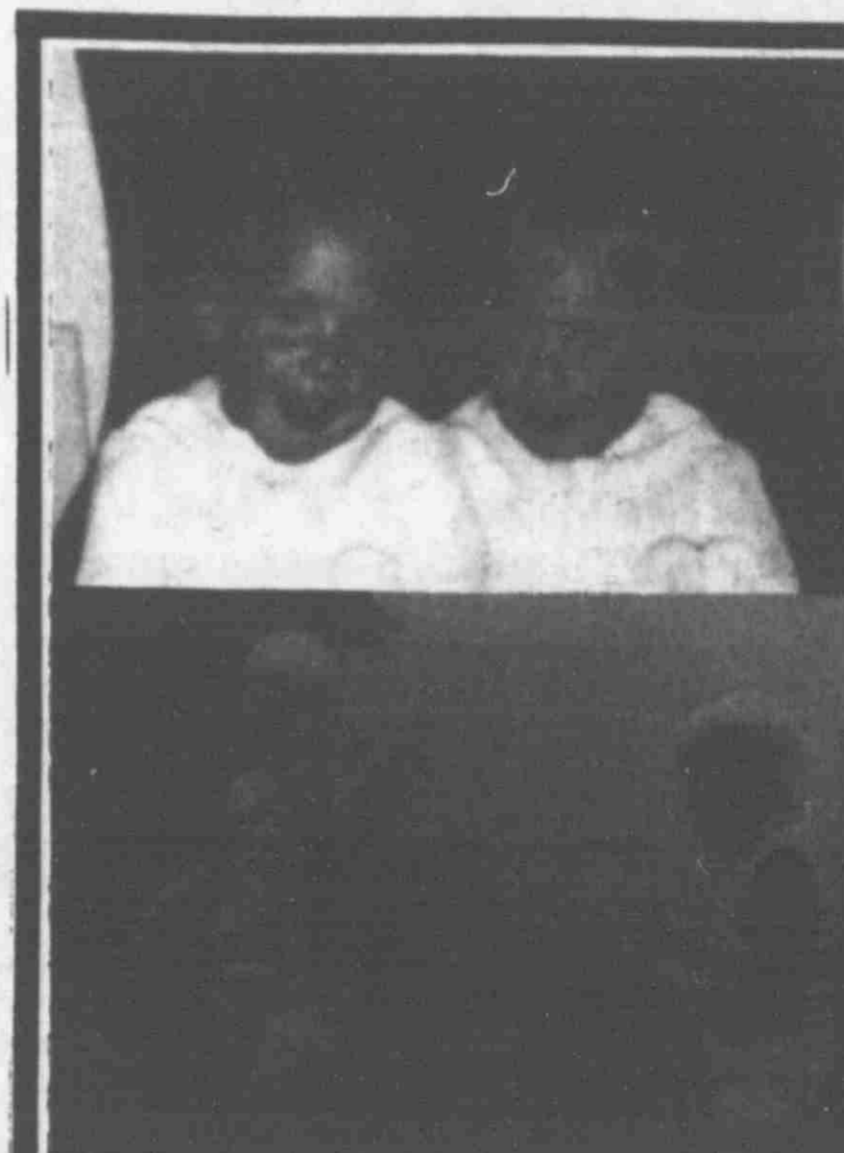

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Board approves millage for Oct. ballot

At a special meeting of the Lowell Board of Education on August 28, the Board approved a millage proposal to place before the voters on an October 7 ballot. The proposal seeks approval to levy 1.9 mills beginning in 1986 and 1.4 mills beginning 1987 through 1993. The ballot language clearly states that funds raised could only be spent to repair and maintain existing school facilities. None of the additional funds requested can be used to finance raises for employees or pay other school expenses. Dollars generated can be spent for maintenance and major repairs of buildings and grounds now owned by the school district.

A 1.9 mill increase is requested beginning in 1986 to generate nearly \$400,000 for the sole purpose of replacing most of the middle school roof. Continued attempts to patch and repair portions of the roof have failed to stop interior damage from water. Beginning in 1987 the millage levied for repair and maintenance projects directly related to energy conservation would drop to 1.4 mills and continue at that level through 1993.

Projects planned between 1987 and 1991 are solely related to maintenance and repair projects which will help the district reduce its consumption of electrical power and natural gas. Projects planned between 1991 and 1993 include maintenance and repair of parking lots, building floors, entranceways, bleacher repair and grounds improvement.

A conservative estimate from the district's engineering firm show that when all energy measures are installed as planned and scheduled, the district will save

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SPECIAL WATERFOWL MANAGEMENT AREA HUNTING REGULATIONS FOR 1985-86

The Natural Resources Commission at its meeting on August 9, 1985, under authority of Secs. 2 and 3 of Act 17, P.A. 1921, as amended; Secs. 9 and 252 of Act 380, P.A. 1965, as amended; Sec. 10(4) Chapter II of Act 286, PA 1929, as amended, and Secs. 1, 2, and 3, Act 230, P.A. 1925, being Secs. 299.2, 299.3, 16.109, 16.352, 312.10(4), 300.1, 300.2, and 300.3 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, approved the following special waterfowl management area regulations. (All shooting hours indicated shall refer to "prevailing local time.")

- I. GOOSE MANAGEMENT AREAS - OPEN TO HUNTING
- B. Allegan County Goose Management Area - In that area of Allegan County within the following described boundaries:

Beginning at the junction of Highway US-131 and 102nd Avenue in Otsego Township, Allegan County; then westerly on 102nd Avenue, 101st Street and again 102nd Avenue to the junction with 42nd Street in Cheshire Township, Allegan County; then south on 42nd Street to the junction of 10th Avenue in the Village of Bloomingdale, Van Buren County; west on 10th Avenue to 46th Street; north on 46th Street to Phoenix Road; west on Phoenix Road; north on 150th Street and west again on Phoenix Road to 57th Street in Columbia Township, Van Buren County; south on 57th Street to Phoenix Road and west on Phoenix Road to its junction with US-31 at South Haven; north on US-31 through Van Buren and Allegan counties to the junction with US-196; then northeast through Allegan County to the junction with Adams Street in Holland Township, Ottawa County; then east on Adams Street, Ottawa County; then east on 100th Street to US-131 in Byron Township, Kent County; then south on US-131 to the point of beginning; named the "Allegan County Goose Management Area," in addition to other rules established by the Natural Resources Commission, the hunting and taking of geese shall be regulated as follows:

1. The Director of Natural Resources shall have the authority to terminate the season for the hunting and taking of geese within the Allegan County Goose Management Area whenever the Department of Natural Resources, by its best estimate, determines that 3,000 Canada geese have been harvested within the Allegan State Game Area.
2. The daily goose hunting hours shall be 8:30 A.M. to 1:00 P.M.
