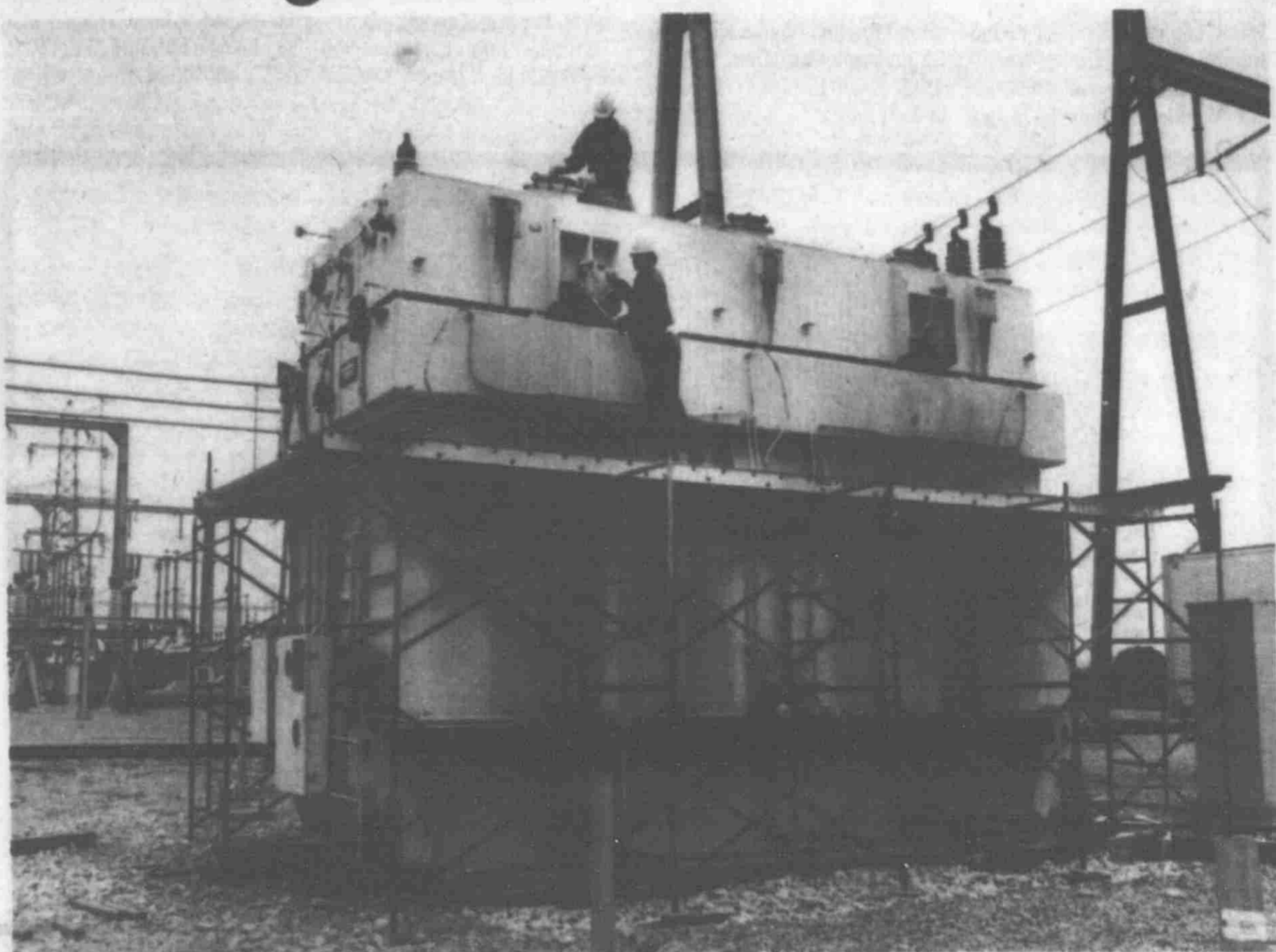
Consumers to move huge transformer here

Moving a two-story house from one place to another, even over a short distance, is a slow, tedious nerve-wracking job. But what if the house weighed 500,000 pounds and had to be moved 100 miles?

That's the challenge Consumers Power faces the week of Oc-

tober 28, when it begins the task of moving an electric transformer from its Tittabawassee substation near Midland, to the Vergennes substation near Lowell.

This massive undertaking is being done to provide the equipment necessary to meet the



Consumers Power employees prepare a 500,000 pound transformer for a 100 mile rail trip from a substation near Midland to a similar facility at Lowell. Five years of sustained economic growth in the western part of the state created the need for this equipment which will permit more high voltage power to be brought into the area. Consumers Power will pay \$100,000 for the move, well below the \$1.9 million cost of a new transformer.

growing demand for electricity in the western part of the state, especially the greater Grand Rapids area. Paul E. Roney, Grand Rapids district manager for Consumers Power says, "Demand for electricity in this area has gone up some 4.4 percent for each of the last five years. That's more than double the average

growth in demand for the total Consumers Power system."

Joe Powers, senior vice president for the Grand Rapids Area Chamber of Commerce says, "Many of the communities in this part of the state have experienced steady, diversified growth over the last ten years, but since 1980 economic activity has re-

ally mushroomed. This project shows Consumers Power shares that optimistic outlook for our future."

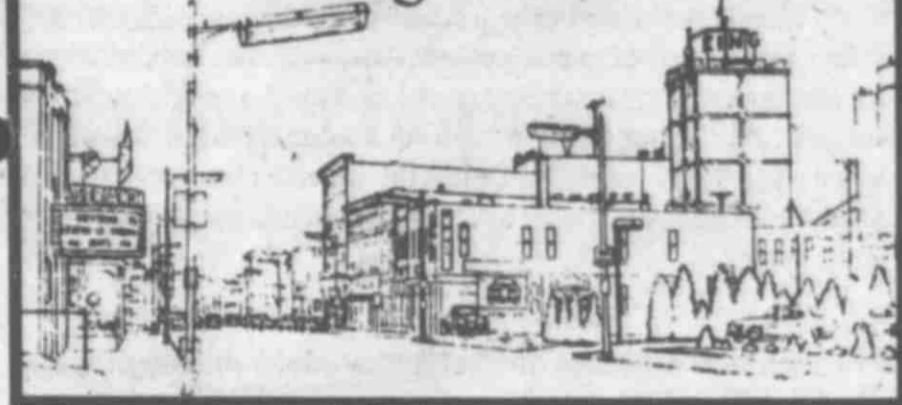
Meeting that demand with a stable supply of power will be easier, once the Vergennes project is completed. The high-capacity transformer will allow the Company to provide larger

supplies of electricity from its generating plants. The high-voltage electricity will then be reduced in voltage as it flows through the system on the way to Consumers Power customers.

After being partially dismantled and loaded on a flatbed rail-

The Bowling Corner

Lately I've been seeing more and more bowlers buying their bowling balls at yard sales and second hand stores. MERCY! You just won't be able to consistently reach your potential by using someone else's ball dear friend. Your hand is just like your fingerprints, no two are the same, and that's why I urge all of my bowlers to see a pro shop operator when they're ready for a new ball.

Here's a few rules-of-thumb to follow when you're buying a new ball. First and foremost is to go to a pro shop that has a good reputation, and then listen to what the operator has to tell you about your new ball. There are four shops in Grand Rapids that I highly recommend: McKinney's, Mike Marks, Ed Ladwig's, and Terry Ramey's. If you're in the northern part of Kent County I'd send you to Sparta Lanes. These people have been around for quite awhile, and know exactly what you, the bowler, needs.

There are three basic grips used today. One is the conventional grip, two is a semi-fingertip, and three is a full-fingertip. Unless you average well over 200, don't waste time with any of the new novelty grips like an offset thumb or reverse pitches. Stick with the basics and you'll bowl better for it. A good pro shop will take their time with you and not try to rush you into a ball. Same goes for the actual drilling of your ball. If it's drilled and done in five minutes or less, there's something very wrong. Now for the grip, whatever one you choose, make sure that it's COMFORTABLE! There's that word again, right? If your thumb hurts after a couple of frames, you won't bowl very well. A professionally drilled ball will fit you like a glove, and cause you no pain during the delivery. Roll a couple down the carpet right in the pro shop, or out on the lanes if they're available. And for heaven sakes, don't be afraid to tell your pro shop operator if it just doesn't feel right. You'll be further ahead in the long run.

Another hint when you go purchase a new ball. It's best to be fitted just prior to when your league starts. For instance, if you bowl in a 6:30 league, then that's the time to be fitted for your ball. Your hands either swell or shrink during the normal work day, depending on your body chemistry. Simple logic says to be fitted at the same time as you would normally bowl to get the best possible fit, right? And don't be afraid to ask the pro shop operator questions when you have them. I promise you that you'll learn a lot from these people, and most of them love to talk.

Next week in THE BOWLING CORNER, we'll take a look at open bowling as a source of practice for those big league nights. You just might be a little surprised at a few of the hints I'll roll your way. Until then, GO BOWLING and take along a friend.

Tips from Bill Nault on how to remove deer from woods

During Michigan's 16-day firearm deer hunting season in November, thousands of hunters will tag bucks across the state and nearly all of them will be faced with the same problem—how to get the deer out of the woods.

Veteran deer hunter Bill Nault of Ishpeming recommends several methods of carrying or hauling deer carcasses to make this task easier and safer.

Nault says the most important thing to remember when hauling a deer carcass out of the woods is to avoid over-exertion. A large number of injuries during hunting season are due to physical over-exertion causing heart attacks or hernias.

Nault warns against single-handedly hauling a deer back to camp or a vehicle. "Two or three hunters can pull a medium-sized deer through the woods by simply pulling on opposite sides of the antlers," he suggests.

A light snow will make it easier to pull a deer carcass, but brushy, swampy or hilly country will hinder movement, Nault says.

"If the deer is heavy and the forest not too dense, draw the animal's front legs forward and tie the feet between its ears and antlers," Nault advises. "This will prevent the legs from catching on obstacles along the trail."

Nault also recommends cutting a piece of sapling as thick as your wrist and three feet long to lash tightly across a buck's antlers, forming handles.

With the deer on its back, two people can pull while a third grasps the hind legs and steers the deer and lifts it over obstacles, Nault says.

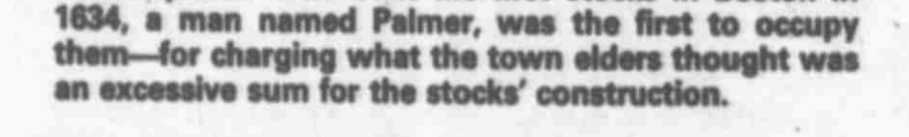
Fish Ladder to close Nov. 1 for improvements

The fish ladder at the Sixth Street dam in downtown Grand Rapids is scheduled to be closed on November 1 through December for construction say Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Fisheries Division biologists. Construction will include the addition of another pool and control gates at the upstream end of the ladder.

These improvements will permit better fish passage conditions over a much wider range of flows and offer significant improvement of steelhead passage during the Spring season and less stressful conditions for fish under all conditions.

Fishing success, upstream of the dam, will be somewhat reduced due to the construction, however, those fishing downstream of the dam will not be affected.

The Board of Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment.

Meeting called to order by Chairperson Richard Butz at 9:00 a.m.

Roll called:

Quorum present.

Commissioner Lorch gave the invocation.

Those present united in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Chairperson Butz requested Civil Counsel Jon DeWitt to introduce discussion of the Mass-Burn Incinerator Site Selection.

Civil Counsel DeWitt reviewed the history of the site selection process for the mass burn incinerator, beginning in 1981 with the Kent-Ottawa Resource Recovery Project. In February, 1982 five sites were recommended as possible locations for the incinerator. In 1984 financial and engineering consultants for the incinerator were hired. In February, 1985 Sites N and Y which are under consideration today were designated as the two best sites. The sites were subjected to further environmental analysis. In March, 1985 project representatives attended a special meeting with representatives of the Black Hills Neighborhood and Heartside Association, the areas where the two sites are located. In May, 1985 there was a tour of incinerator facilities in other cities, including representatives of the Black Hills and Heartside communities.

Mr. DeWitt presented the advantages and disadvantages of each site:

SITE "N" (Cherry, Grandville, Wealthy & Finney)

ADVANTAGES
1) Much closer to steam plant
2) Very little cost in terms of lost steam efficiency
3) More centrally located for Grand Rapids refuse haulers.

DISADVANTAGES
1) DNR more concerned about air quality permissibility
2) City traffic report states congestion more likely to negatively affect area
3) Cost of site much higher including acquisition, demolition, relocation
4) Would probably have 6 to 12 month delay in construction due to demolition which would increase construction costs
5) Possible zoning question - although Act 641 may preempt local zoning
6) Does not fit into area as well in terms of use
7) DNR will be looking for setbacks of approximately 1,200 feet per proposed regulations dated 9-27-85 because of location outside of heavy industrial zoned area
*Assumes Kent County ends up with a cogeneration system selling steam to steam plant and not 100% electric.

SITE "Y" (Market & Freeman)

ADVANTAGES
1) Only three parcels, easier to negotiate, purchase
2) Very little demolition needed
3) Zoning is appropriate
4) Traffic impact less severe than "N" per City report
5) DNR seems to favor in terms of air quality and location
6) More flexible in terms of plant operations
7) Potential market along steam line for sale of steam
8) Near Waste Water Treatment Plant, large, potential steam user

DISADVANTAGES
1) Costs of acquisition much higher than estimated
2) Will require costly installation of steam transmission line
3) Will experience energy revenue loss due to length of steam transmission
4) If Mutual Auto is acquired and moved, costs will go even higher
5) May require "trading" of sites
*Assumes Kent County ends up with a cogeneration system selling steam to steam plant and not 100% electric.

The meeting was opened for Public Comment on the site selection.

Ernest Slade, who has lived in the Black Hills for 70 years pointed out that there was a use in the center of Site Y. It was subsequently used as a toxic waste dump. He urged more boring, filling, and study of this site. He indicated he has no complaint with the location from the standpoint of odor and smell.

Bernice DeLong, former President of the Black Hills Neighborhood Association and Black Hills representative on the facilities tour, suggested that if Site Y is chosen that the residents be given a voice in how it is done. She further suggested that the County buy the entire hill if Site Y is selected.

Karen Wellman, Heritage Hill resident, stated they have been working hard to bring Heritage Hill back and would be disappointed if the trash facility were put so close to their neighborhood. She encouraged a closer look at industrial sites with less impact on the surrounding area.

Judy Rose, resident of the Black Hills, stated there is apathy in the Black Hills and an attitude of "they will do it anyway". Low income apartments were constructed that the neighborhood did not want, the bridge has not been fixed, the school was closed, and the water treatment plant with its odor problems was constructed. The Black Hills do not need another pollutant in the neighborhood.

Ann Dunham, member of the Heartside Neighborhood Association, stated that the Heartside Board took no formal action on the site location although most members of the board are in favor of it. They would like assurance that it is well done if it is placed on Site N. It could be an asset if it is well done. The concerns of aesthetics, air quality and other environmental issues must be addressed, whether it is placed in Heartside or the Black Hills.

Jim Kozak, Grand Rapids City Commissioner representing the First Ward where both sites are located, stated Site Y backs up to a hill and residential while Site N backs up to heavy commercial and the expressway. He disagrees with City staff with regard to congestion at Site N, 40 trucks per day going to the facility should not be a major problem. Site Y is 10 additional miles; Site N is in a central location 1,000 feet from the expressway. There is higher initial cost with Site N because of the number of parcels that must be acquired; Site Y construction cost is higher because of additional pipeline required, so that costs are about the same. Funds will be lost each year on Site Y because of steam loss in traveling the additional 1.5 miles. There is very little objection in the Heartside neighborhood while there is major objection in the Black Hills neighborhood.

G. Stevens Bernard, Grand Rapids City Manager, stated the City Commissioners were polled and instructed him to advise that they favor Site Y. They were

persuaded by the substantial advantages of Site Y including clearance and relocation of business and proximity to the waste water treatment plant. Vacant land along the pipeline route would have higher use if steam were available to it. There are transportation advantages and dispersing of truck traffic with Site Y. George Boelens, Grand Rapids City Commissioner representing the First Ward, indicated Commissioners were told there was easier access to Site Y, but that is not true. The distance from the 1-196 on-ramp to Site Y is 10 miles round trip. He urged the County Commission to take a close look at the Heartside location.

Evelyn Palumbo, Black Hills resident, stated she felt the decision had already been made. In the 23 years she has lived in the Black Hills property values have gone down. The residents of the Black Hills do not want the incinerator located there.

Nike Smigiel, Executive Director of the John Ball Park Community Association, presented a statement from the Association acknowledging the need and value of the project but expressing their strict objections to the site near the Black Hills.

Sabara VanWienan, who lives close to Site N, stated her objection to Site N.

At 9:54 a.m. Commissioner Thomas moved to go into Executive Session to discuss the site selection. Resolved by Commissioner Kuhn.

Motion carried.

At 10:45 a.m. Commissioner Kuhn moved to return to public session. Seconded by Commissioner DeVriendt. Motion carried.

Resolution No. 10-85-173 selecting Site Y for the mass burn incinerator was presented. (All have received copies.)

RESOLUTION BY COMMISSIONER LORCH

WHEREAS, Kent County, through its Act 641 Plan, and on other occasions has expressed and affirmed its intent and desire to establish alternatives to sanitary landfills for the disposal of solid waste, and

WHEREAS, a solid waste disposal system and project which maximizes reduction of volume of landfilled solid waste and encourages resource recovery, especially by the sale of energy in the form of steam and electricity, requires the use of a mass burn incinerator, and

WHEREAS, various alternatives for the implementation of a mass burn incinerator have been duly considered by the Kent County Board of Commissioners, with numerous steps in the implementation process having been previously approved, and

WHEREAS, the Kent County Board of Public Works and County staff have investigated potential sites for the location of a mass burn incinerator, and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that Kent County select the site for the mass burn incinerator.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Kent County Board of Commissioners hereby determines that the following described site shall be acquired by Kent County for the mass burn incinerator:

All of the necessary land located in Grand Rapids, Kent County, Michigan, bounded by Market Avenue SW on the North, Freeman Avenue SW on the West, the C & O Railroad tracks on the South and Southeast, and a Consumers Power Company powerline right-of-way on the East. The land includes approximately 730 feet of frontage on Market Avenue SW.

The three parcels of property located within this boundary have street addresses as follows:

910 Market Avenue SW
850 Freeman Avenue SW
900 Freeman Avenue SW

Commissioner Lorch moved the adoption of the resolution. Seconded by Commissioner Kuhn.

Bill Allen presented an overhead of the site. Soil borings were taken and a visual inspection was made. There is an area of fill which contained bricks, glass, coal and metal roofing. In March, 1985, the soil borings at Mutual Auto Parts Salvage Yard, but staff was advised that clean fill was placed there. The foundations will go down to the bedrock.

Commissioner Oppewal asked the height of the stack in comparison with the houses. Mr. Allen stated the ultimate height will depend upon what the Environmental Protection Agency requires, but he estimated it would be 250 to 300 feet. The houses are approximately 60 feet higher than the site.

Chairperson Butz opened the meeting for Public Comment.

Bernice DeLong expressed her displeasure with the decision. The people in the Black Hills have lost their school, bridge and bus service. They need more support. She asked that the County do something right for this neighborhood.

Commissioner Oppewal stated she is opposed to locating the incinerator so close to where people live. "We are not giving due consideration to the needs of people who have homes and families in the vicinity." She is concerned with the private operation and management of the plant and getting them to adhere to strict operation and environmental controls that need to be maintained. She hoped that every possible environmental control would be built into the process.

Commissioner Martin Butz asked if it was necessary to acquire the three parcels or if the project could proceed with the acquisition of two parcels. Mr. DeWitt stated it may be possible to proceed with the project without obtaining all three parcels.

Commissioner Martin Butz moved to amend resolution No. 10-85-173 in paragraph 7 to state "all of the necessary land". Resolved by Commissioner Kuipers. (Note: Resolution 10-85-173 is printed as amended.)

RESOLUTION BY COMMISSIONER DEKRAKER

WHEREAS, Kent County, through its Act 641 Plan, and on other occasions has expressed and affirmed its intent and desire to establish alternatives to sanitary landfills for the disposal of solid waste, and

WHEREAS, a solid waste disposal system and project which maximizes reduction of volume of landfilled solid waste and encourages resource recovery, especially by the sale of energy in the form of steam and electricity, requires the use of a mass burn incinerator, and

WHEREAS, various alternatives for the implementation of a mass burn incinerator have been duly considered by the Kent County Board of Commissioners, with numerous steps in the implementation process having been previously approved, and

WHEREAS, the Kent County Board of Public Works and County staff have conducted negotiations with Consumers Power Company concerning the sale to it of electricity and concerning the sale to it of steam for distribution through its existing electric and steam distribution facilities, including making an offer to acquire the latter facilities, and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that Kent County select the method of financing and operation of a mass burn incinerator.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Kent County Board of Commissioners hereby directs staff to proceed to implement the establishment of a mass burn incinerator under the following conditions:

1) The mass burn incinerator shall be designed and constructed by private industry based on appropriate qualifications and proposals.

2) The mass burn incinerator shall be operated and

maintained by private industry based on appropriate qualifications and proposals.

3) Construction of the mass burn incinerator shall be financed through the sale of appropriate bonds and the facility shall be owned by Kent County.

4) Kent County shall use or direct the use of the mass burn incinerator facility to sell electricity to Consumers Power Company and shall distribute steam to or through the Consumers Power Company presently owned steam loop facilities.

Commissioner DeKraaker moved the adoption of the resolution. Seconded by Commissioner Bandstra.

Civil Counsel DeWitt explained that the bond counsel asked that the County adopt this official action resolution. It is very similar to Resolution No. 10-85-163 adopted October 7, 1985.

Red Arrows lose 12-6 in final seconds of "classic"

Both teams in Friday's match-up between Lowell and East Grand Rapids were capable of mounting wide open offenses, but with so much at stake, both teams dug in for a grueling yard by yard struggle.

The Lowell Red Arrows came up just short in Friday night's match-up for a share in the OK White championship with the powerful East Grand Rapids gridders. After Lowell knocked off the previously number one ranked Wyoming Park the preceding week, area media was focused on the Lowell vs. East Grand Rapids clash. The Grand Rapids Press called it a "Classic". All the ingredients were there. Lowell, East Grand Rapids and Wyoming Park were all tied at 5-1 in the conference, and were rated in the state Class B rankings as 8, 9 and 10 respectively. Besides the conference crown, the winner in Friday's game would likely land a berth in the state play-offs.

With just 36 seconds left on the clock, East's junior fullback, Kent LaBaugh plowed into the end zone for the winning touchdown in the 12-6 showdown. LaBaugh's touchdown capped a seven minute, 70 yard drive. The scoring drive took sixteen plays, and overcame two Pioneer 5 yard penalties. An estimated 6,000 fans were in attendance for the thriller.

East marched to the Lowell 1 yard line early in the first quarter, but the Lowell defense held firm, and did not allow the score. East was not to be denied. Still in the first quarter, they marched into the endzone covering 53 yards in 13 plays. The game then became a hard fought defensive struggle, and the score remained at 6-0 until early in the fourth quarter. The Lowell defense smothered two East fumbles in the second half. One at the Lowell 9 and another at the East 41.

The Arrow's only score came on a 48 yard pass from quarterback Mike Barnes to end Kurt Quiggle. The Arrows took the ball to mid field on a subsequent possession, but an interception of a Mike Barnes pass stopped the drive.

Lowell finished second in the OK White with its 5-2 record and 6-2 overall. East Grand Rapids and Wyoming Park tied for first place honors with 6-1 league records and 7-1 overall on the season. Arrows coach Phil Christensen told a Press reporter after the game that he thought both teams played well, and neither coach could expect more from his players. Lowell can look forward to another great season in 1986. East's coach George Barcheski told the Press, "Every school in the league knows what kind of team Lowell is going to have next year." Barcheski was referring to the number of returning starters on the Lowell squad. Lowell travels to Spring Lake Friday for its final game of the season.

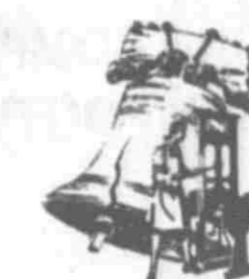

Community Fund has helped many

With the annual United Way campaign now in progress, members of the Lowell Community Fund asked that we present a brief history of the fund to include its conception, and how it is related to the United Way. Lowell is quite unique, in that many of those donating to the United Way can request that a portion of their contribution be sent back to the Lowell Community Fund, and in turn be put to use helping the community.

The Lowell Community Fund was organized Feb. 9, 1955 with three members selected from the Lowell Rotary Club and three from the Lowell Lions club. The six men were Elmer Schaefer, Ray Avery, Gerald Rollins, Sandy Watterson, Frank Battistella and Bill Jones. Dr. Robert Reagan was elected Sec.-Treas. in Oct. 1955, and still services in that capacity. The main purpose for setting up this fund was to share with the United Way a portion of the money collected in the Lowell area each year. The percentage was set at 25%. Only one other community in Kent County still has this arrangement.

In 1958 the Community Fund collected \$4,900.00 and \$1,237.00 was returned to Lowell. This was in turn divided between the Boy Scouts, and Lions Swimming Pool Fund (\$300.00 to Scouts and \$900.00 to the Lions). This practice continued until the early 1960's.

In 1964 various other groups began requesting funds. The Community Fund's by-laws were changed so that requests for operating expenses could be honored as well as those requests for capital expenditures.

Since 1955 the following organizations have shared over \$52,000.00: Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Campfire, Girl Scouts, Youth for Understanding, YMCA, various Lions and Rotary projects, Lowell Community Center, Senior Citizens Center,

Project DARE, Lowell Little League, Lowell Area Arts Council, New Dawn, Lowell Rescue

Service and others.

In 1978 the funds by-laws were changed to allow for five

members from the Rotary and Lions club, and five members from the community at large.

car the week of October 28, the transformer's two-day rail trip will begin November 4. The railroad will use a special train, including "dummy" cars to transport the unit. "Dummy" cars are regular flatbed railcars that are added to extend the length of the freight train so the locomotive and its heavy cargo don't end up crossing a railroad trestle to-

gether.

Once in Lowell, the transformer will be loaded onto a special trailer and trucked the final ten miles to the Vergennes substation.

This transformer is one of two originally installed at Titabawassee substation as part of a high-voltage transmission system in the early 1970s. Sub-

sequent expansion of that system, which included additional support equipment, allows this transformer to be put to better use, meeting the growing needs on the west side of the state. The move will cost an estimated \$100,000, well below the \$1.9 million price tag on a new transformer.
