City may adopt snow removal ordinance

It appears likely that the City of Lowell is preparing to adopt some sort of a snow removal ordinance. There has been pressure from various sources over the years to institute an ordinance that would require homeowners and merchants to keep their sidewalks clear of snow. Mayor James Maatman is a strong proponent of such an ordinance. The issue has been discussed

repeatedly over recent years, but has always gone unresolved because of concerns over how to enforce a snow removal ordinance, and a lack of manpower to clear sidewalks if homeowners don't. At the November 18 meeting City Manager Ray Quada was instructed to draft a suggested snow removal ordinance, and have it ready for the December 2 meeting.

The document prepared by Quada calls for removal of snow from all sidewalks within 24 hours of each accumulation. It also calls for a path to be cleared across properties without sidewalk, but adjoin existing sidewalk at the property line. The suggested ordinance calls for a fine of not less than \$50 and payment of costs to remove snow.

The need for a snow removal ordinance varies widely among the council members. Maatman represents one end of the spectrum, emphatically citing a need for clear sidewalks as a safety factor, especially for children. On the other end, Dean Collins calls work on a snow removal ordinance, "A gross waste of time". Collins feels that the city has neither the money or the manpower to enforce such an or-

dinance. The other councilmembers seem to fall somewhere in between. Maatman does have some help for his cause on the way. Newly elected councilman, Charlie Doyle, has enthusiastically voiced his support for a snow removal ordinance at a previous meeting. Doyle will begin his term after the first of the year.

Quada suggested that the issue could be brought up at a pub-

licized public hearing during the December 16 council meeting. "That wouldn't meet public hearing requirements so that an ordinance could be adopted at that time, but we could get some input from the public", Quada said. Councilman Bill Thompson and Maatman asked if the ordinance could be adopted if the public hearing were held during the first meeting in Janu-

ary. Quada informed them that there was sufficient time to advertise the public hearing so that the ordinance could be adopted at the January 6 meeting. By a consensus of the council, Quada was instructed to proceed with the necessary steps to place the issue before the council at that meeting. If adopted, the ordinance could go into effect immediately.

Park's name draws flak

How does "Creekside Park" sound to you? That's the new name given to what has been referred to as West End Park. The Lowell City Council asked the Lowell Parks and Recreation Committee to discuss a possible name for the new park, and Creekside was the final recommendation.

In their statement to the city council the parks committee said that they chose not to name the park after Cherry Creek, the Valley Vista Subdivision, adjacent streets or by geographic designations for various reasons. The committee members also declined to name the park after a person or persons because of the difficulty in selection.

In addition to naming the park, the committee members also feel it is important to name the individual softball and soccer fields. They suggested White Pine, Maple, Spruce and Oak for the softball fields and Locust and Elm for the soccer fields. The names are all those of native trees, and the parks committee members suggested plant representative trees around the perimeter of each field.

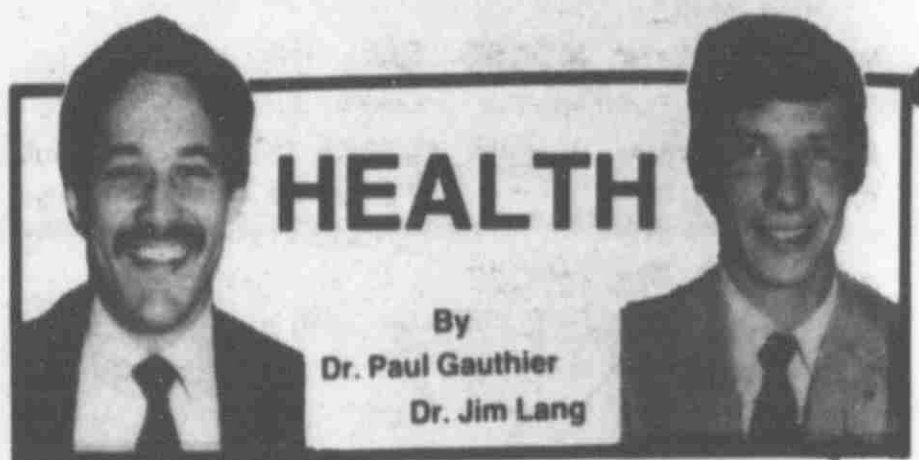

GALLBLADDER ATTACKS

We will frequently see patients in the office complaining of "gall bladder attacks", this is usually described as pain or cramping in the right upper abdomen which has been present for a variable length of time. Some of these patients will have acutely inflamed gallbladders which is the topic of our discussion today.

Cholecystitis is the medical term for an inflamed gallbladder. This usually occurs after a gall stone becomes impacted in the duct of the gall bladder resulting in obstruction and inflammation. Gallstones are much more common in women and seem to increase in frequency with aging. American Indians have a very high rate of gallstones and resulting cholecystitis. Patients with Crohn's disease or diabetes will also have a greater incidence of gallstones.

The "gallbladder attack" is usually preceded by a fatty meal and is characterized by severe cramping pain located in the upper abdomen, right lower rib cage or mid right back. Nausea and vomiting is usually present and fever is quite common. The attack generally subsides after 8-16 hours.

The diagnosis of cholecystitis can generally be made after checking the history and performing a physical examination. Certain lab tests may be ordered which will indicate inflammation of the biliary tract and liver.

Once the diagnosis of cholecystitis is made conservative treatment is begun to "put out the fire" until definitive therapy is available. Usually the patient is instructed not to eat anything for several hours. Antacids and analgesics are prescribed. In more severe cases antibiotics and some times hospitalization may be required. Once the acute inflammation subsides a gallbladder ultrasound (a sound wave picture of the gallbladder) will be ordered to assess the presence of stones. The patient will usually be scheduled for gallbladder removal (cholecystectomy) at a later date unless the acute symptoms fail to subside or complications occur.

Recently, medication has been approved for use in dissolving gallstones. This is an alternative to surgical treatment. The medication is expensive and there are frequent side effects and it must be taken for at least one year and possibly longer. After the medication is stopped there is a 25-50% chance of recurrence of stones within 5 years. In selected cases, medication may be a viable alternative but surgery is still the treatment of choice.

Child protection has become a major issue in recent years, but the foster care system has not been included in the question until now. Members of the Senate are moving toward reform of the current laws governing foster care in this state and from all the evidence, it's about time. Based on recommendations of the Coleman Commission, the Senate is taking a look at reforms needed in the foster care system. The Coleman Commission was formed in 1982 by former Michigan Chief Justice Mary Coleman, to study the system which even then had problems. Recent news stories of children in unlicensed foster homes, and children involved in trauma, have made this an issue that needs to be seriously addressed.

We plan to introduce a series of bills defining foster care criteria and bringing greater legislative and judicial oversight to the foster care program. The bills will set clear guidelines for removing children from their natural homes, and will clarify the role of the court. They will also set up frequent reviews by the court to determine the next step in an overall case plan. A legislative oversight committee would be formed to monitor the status of children in out-of-home situations.

Almost 10,000 children are currently under the state's foster care program, with another 1,800 under similar jurisdiction by the court. The cost is estimated at over \$75 million a year. And the millions spent on foster care don't begin to take in to account the cost to society. Studies show a surprising number of abused children end up either as abusive parents or in the hands

of the criminal justice system both as juveniles and adults. Current law does not provide the specific guidelines needed to make the system work to benefit the child and normalize conditions as quickly as possible. Under the new legislation, the child's welfare and need for a permanent home will take precedence, which has not always been the case. Foster care is an important protection available to the children of our state who need a shelter from abuse, but it's no shelter unless it works. These reforms will be a step toward making it work for the children, foster parents, the court system, and the state.

Early Adolescents' number 1 fear:

Will There be a job for me?

"What will I be when I grow up?" Young people ask this question of themselves at an earlier age than you may think. A recent study of early adolescents (10- to 14-year olds) done by the Michigan State University Department of Family and Child Ecology and the Michigan 4-H Youth Program asked young people and their parents to answer questions related to the developmental needs of young people. Ninety percent of girls and boys surveyed said they had thought about what kind of job they would have in the future.

Another national study done by 4-H and 12 other youth-serving organizations asked early adolescents to indicate the importance of each of 24 life values or goals. "To get a job when I am older" ranked, on the average, as the most important goal for boys and the second most important for girls.

HOW CAN PARENTS HELP THEIR CHILDREN? With strained economic conditions, growing market saturation in many career fields and intense competition for jobs, it's no wonder that the young people are concerned about their futures.

According to Leah Hoopfer, 4-H program leader, parents can help their children in several ways. "Early adolescence is a time of rapid growth, discovery and development," Hoopfer says. "Ten- to 14-year olds sometimes feel caught between being children and being adults, and the result can be feelings of intense confusion and of being out of control."

Hoopfer offers some suggestions for parents to help guide their children toward the career path that's right for them. -- Teach your children to be information seekers. If they are interested in stamp collecting, for example, you could suggest ways to get information -- visiting the library, locating a group or individuals who are interested in the same hobby, using the yellow pages of the phone book, etc. -- Help your children to select the most appropriate activities for them, to make a commitment to them and to set priorities. Children often want to join every activity they hear about. Parents can help them choose and concentrate on pursuits that will be of real value to them by discussing what specific benefits the child wishes to gain from each activity. Ask them questions about their activities -- what they like and don't like about them -- and help your children explore and understand what they are feeling.

-- Help your children to understand their failures. Discuss them and help put the experiences in larger perspective. Suggest ways for the children to use their strengths in other activities. We all enjoy doing things we're good at and suc-

cessful at, but failures are real and necessary throughout life to help us grow and learn more about ourselves and our world. -- Teach your children the importance of networking. Help them understand that having a warm, cooperative working relationship with people -- peers and adults -- will make it easier to acquire more friends and contacts as they begin to pursue career goals.

-- Help children understand that hobbies, sports and other leisure-time activities can provide skills that lead to full or part-time occupations. For example, innumerable 4-H members have turned gardening, animal or electronics 4-H projects into successful careers as adults. "4-H, in particular, is an excellent program through which young people can explore careers," Hoopfer says. "4-H volunteer leaders often volunteer in the areas of their careers, so young people gain direct experience in occupations that interest them."

In addition, a 4-H program called "Careers Unlimited" teaches members employability skills, resume writing, group building, community decision making and self-understanding and builds self-esteem.

"Helping your children understand themselves and build skills for the future can help them feel more confident and more in control of their lives," Hoopfer says. "These issues are vitally important during early adolescence."

"West End Park", "Gee Drive Park", "Valley Vista Park", are just a few of the temporary tags that have been applied to what is now officially called "Creekside Park". Over the past few years, during which time the city purchased and developed the 18 acre parcel near the corner of Foreman and Gee, there have been occasional rumblings at city council meetings regarding a name for the park. Some councilmen have felt that the park should be named after a benefactor to the city, such as Solomon Lee or Helen Look Daly. He went so far as to call the new name, "stupid", and stated that he felt the park should have been named after a benefactor to the city.

I'm afraid Fonger and Doyle aren't the only ones who are going to disapprove of "Creekside Park". I have to admit, it really doesn't do much for me either. Of course, I'm not sold on "Lee Park", "Cherry Creek Park", "Gee Drive Park" or any other name I've heard banttered about.

Doyle did qualify his comments when he was through by saying bluntly, "That's my opinion". That statement sums up the entire problem. My father has a quip about "opinions". He says, "Opinions are like -----, (an unprintable part of the anatomy) everybody has got one". When it comes to naming a city park, I'm afraid everybody is going to have their own opinion as to what the name should be.

This process would be akin to the new section of a college campus where they let the students and faculty wear paths across the lawns, and then used the paths as a guide for laying sidewalks.

Park's new name draws criticism, continued from page one

In their discussion of the Creekside name, only Councilman Jack Fonger voiced an objection to it. Fonger suggested that the park be named after one of the many benefactors to the city. The name of Solomon Lee would be a likely first choice, as about \$125,000 of Lee Fund monies were used to develop the park.

In response, Councilman Dean Collins suggested placing a permanent marker at the entrance to the park explaining the Lee Fund and noting the projects that it has funded over the years. "That would be more appropriate than simply naming the park

after him", Collins said. "Years from now everybody would wonder why it was called Lee Park, but if there is a permanent marker there, they would know what he did for the city", Collins explained.

After some further discussion, Collins made a motion to accept the parks committee's recommendation of Creekside Park. Councilman Bill Thompson seconded the motion. The name was approved four to one, with Fonger casting the "no vote".

Following that ballot, Thompson made a motion to erect a permanent marker at the park detailing Lee's contribution

to the city. The motion passed unanimously.

During the remarks from the audience portion of the meeting, Councilman-elect, Charlie Doyle voiced his strong disapproval of the Creekside name.

Doyle said, "Who is this Mr. Creekside?" "I think it's a stupid name! Why not name it after somebody who has done something for the community, and recognize them?", Doyle added. "There are lots of parks and buildings in town named after people. Why not do it in this case?", Doyle continued. He

cited the Foreman Building, Richards Park, Burch Field, The King Pool and others.

The Councilmen were unswayed by Doyle's remarks, and the name will stand.

In other council business, City Manager Ray Quada was instructed to invite representatives of the Gus Macker Tournament to a council meeting early next year. The council hopes to discuss the 1986 tournament, and clear up any possible problems well in advance of the event. Quada was also instructed to

conduct an informal survey of the tournament's neighbors, hoping to gain a clear picture of their feelings toward the annual event.

The Grand Rapids School of The Bible and Music, submitted a request to perform general maintenance and sell fuel to public aircraft at the Lowell Airport. G.R.S.B.M. operates its Missionary Aviation School out of the airport under the direction of Col. Clare McCombs. Staing that he could possibly foresee some long range liability problems regarding the request, Quada advised the council to send the matter before the Airport Board for a formal review. The council concurred with Quada's request.



Michigan 1985 regular gun deer season is now history and another excellent season was enjoyed by hunters. The total deer harvest will amount to nearly 200,000 animals. Since the average Michigan whitetail will produce about 70 lbs. of venison, 14 million pounds of excellent meat now grace the larders of successful hunters.

I would like to make one early prediction concerning the 1986 season. Remember, you read it here first. For several reasons, I predict next year to see the largest harvest of big bucks in Michigan's history. Wider dissemination of the herds are one reason. We now have excellent, established populations of whitetails throughout the state. This has resulted in less hunting pressure by spreading the hunters over a much larger area and consequently a better survival of big bucks statewide. Several relatively mild winters in a row have resulted in good survival and provided excellent fawn crops for the past four years. I have never seen as many triplet fawn births as we had this past spring.

In this area, at the end of the season we also have the best carry over buck population I also, have ever seen and from the reports I get, this same condition exists statewide. This past season should have seen a record number of bucks taken but I believe that, when the tally is in, it will amount to about the same as 1984. Our extremely wet weather throughout October and November was the primary factor. It curtailed access to many low lying areas and also discouraged many fair weather hunters from venturing afield. This same heavy rainfall has prevented timely harvest of the corn crop and this also aided the deer herds by increasing cover.

Deer herd populations in the Upper Peninsula are dramatically increasing, particularly in the Western Counties, where the hunting pressure has been light and the area traditionally produces huge bucks. Better deer herd management, particularly in Zone 2, is paying off with more deer and better bucks. The antlerless deer program has been much improved, in recent years, and the timber, pulp and cordwood cutting programs on State and Federal lands has improved the browse and habitat of the whitetail.

This high population carry over is going to result in increased crop damage and more deer/car accidents. However, barring an exceptional hard winter, we will have more deer in this state, including more trophy bucks, than at any time in history, come next fall.

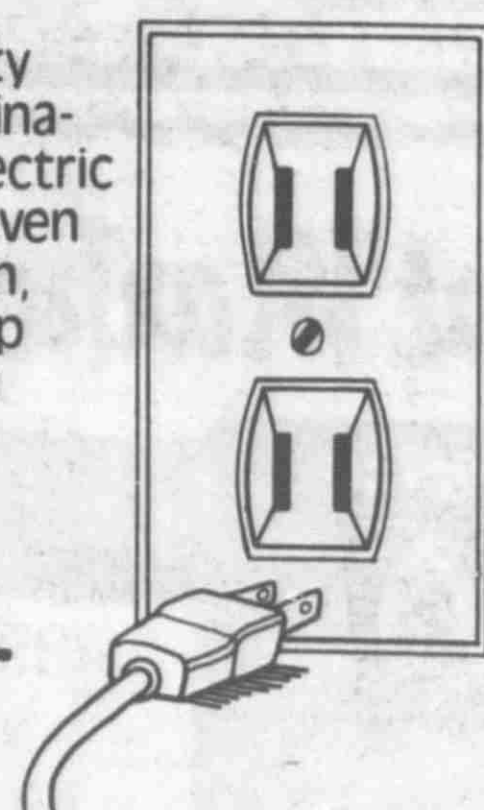

Janeland cow is reserve champion at big show



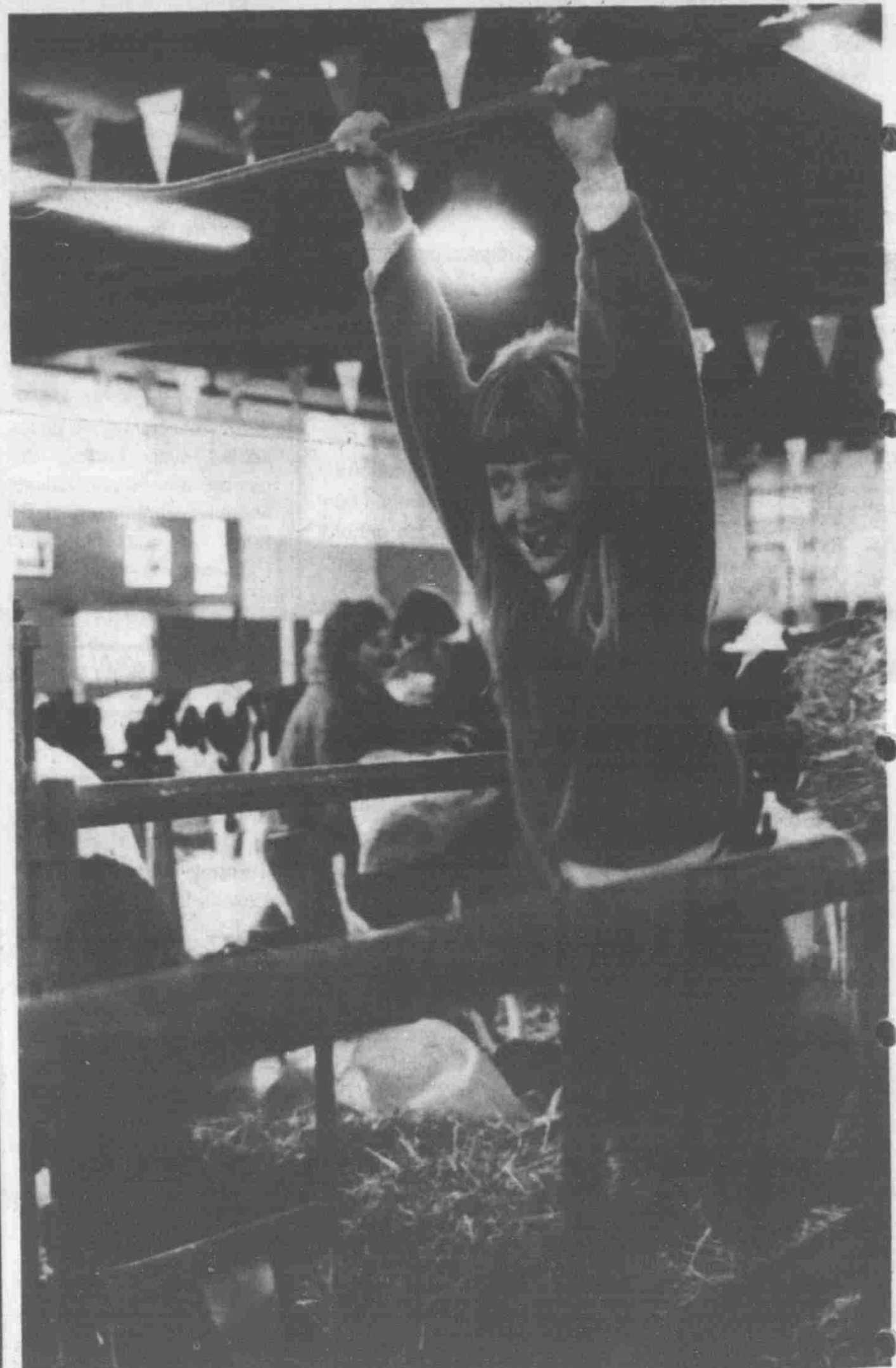

International Livestock Exposition, in Louisville, KY with a coveted prize.

A six-year-old Janeland Holstein cow named Faunadale Jana Christina walked away with Reserve Grand Champion honors, meaning the show judges picked her as the number two cow from about 300 prize Holsteins being

shown. "She's rubbing elbows with \$1 million cows when she takes a prize like that", Cook said. Cook described the award as, "something that may not happen again in my lifetime". The cow also won her division in the "aged cow class".
