## Showboat Board plans WCUZ Benefit weekend; scraps 1986 production

"Good news" and "bad news" resulted from two recent meetings of the Lowell Showboat Board of Directors. The good news came in the form of a financial statement presented by Treasurer, Virgil Biggs, which revealed that the Lowell Showboat Corporation is out of debt, with a small balance in the bank. The bad news is that the Showboat Directors decided to postpone the annual production again this year, and work toward raising some operating capital. The Board of Directors have not staged a Summertime production since Pearl Bailey was here in 1982 for the Showboat's 50th anniversary. The directors have cancelled all shows since, citing a need to concentrate on paying off \$45,000 in nagging long term debts. Biggs' announcement was welcome news to the board members, and a tribute to those who have worked hard to help pay off Showboat's debts.

More good news came from Board President Ray Quada when he announced that radio station WCUZ is very much interested in supporting a fourth annual WCUZ/Budweiser Showboat Benefit over the Memorial Day weekend. After making the decision to cancel the Showboat Production, the directors decided to get behind this year's WCUZ benefit 100% in attempt to raise money for next year, and to meet annual expenses such as insurance and maintenance.

The directors are investigating several new activities to add to the softball tournament, Saturday night stage show, Showboat Rides, Champagne Breakfast Cruise, etc. The Michigan Arttrain will be in Lowell over the Memorial Day weekend, and will be a welcome addition to the festivities. The Arttrain visited Lowell several years ago, and the interest it generated was integral to the formation of the Lowell Area Arts Council.

Quada told the board that he is working with the National Campers and Hikers Association, and hopes to have 150 to 200 trailers at Recreation Park over the weekend. Board member Roger Brown is pursuing a "Fortune Night" activity that has been a popular fund raiser with several groups in Ionia and Saranac. The event brings the participants together for an evening of dining, dancing and a chance at large door prizes. The event would replace the Las Vegas Night party held onboard the Showboat. Board member Gordon Gould is contacting local civic groups, asking them to sponsor other activities. Board members Bob Pfaller and Ivan

Blough are working with the merchants to sponsor events in the business district over the weekend. A meeting of the merchants has been scheduled for Thursday, February 27 at 6:30 in City Hall. Board members Tony Siciliano and Dan Reed are pursuing a possible carnival for the weekend, and are lining up food concessions. Quada placed

new board member Bonnie Grooters in charge of coordinating the weekend's activities.

The Showboat directors welcomed Grooters, Dr. James Reagan and Kelly Holst to the board. They join Quada, Brown, Blough, Reed, Siciliano, Gould, Biggs and Pfaller to bring the total number of board members to eleven. The Showboat Charter

calls for a 14 member board of directors. A nominating committee is currently working toward filling out the board, and is seeking a secretary.

The annual Summertime production may be postponed for another year, but it looks as though the WCUZ/Budweiser Showboat Benefit weekend will be bigger and better than ever.

## Grapplers take District

The O-K White Conference champs continued their winning streak last Saturday at the District Tournament held at East Grand Rapids. The Grapplers won the tournament with 164 points. In Second place was Catholic Central with 120-1/2 followed by Northview with 107 points. This was the First District Tournament won by the

Grapplers since the 1974-75 season.

The Red Arrows had three individual champions which included Jim Johnson at heavyweight, Tony Huver at 138 lbs., and Brett Kirby at 155 lbs. Taking seconds were Carl Pratt at 105 lbs. and Tom Nugent at 185 lbs. Taking third was Mike Nugent at 167 lbs. Taking

Congratulations go to Brett Kirby on winning his 100th career victory last Saturday, joining only three other wrestlers in Lowell history.

## Jenny Dine wins writing contest

Two Alma College students from Kent County received awards in the 1986 Alma College Writing Contest.

Jenny Dine, an Alma College freshman from Alto, received first place for her short story, "The Hunt", and second place for the poem, "Birth Rite."

"The purpose of the contest is to award students who produce excellent writing. It's a way to show the Alma College community that excellent writing is valued, and should be rewarded and published," said William Palmer, assistant professor of English and advisor of the college's liter-

ary magazine, *The Pine River Anthology*. Submissions to the annual writing contest also are considered for publication in the anthology.

Over 70 entries vied for one of the three places awarded in each of three categories: short story, essay, and poetry.

"We looked for writing which expresses truth in some new and fresh way. The insightful, artful entries tend to rise to the top. Basically, we are looking for writing we thought was excellent in idea, development, organization, word choice - even down to grammar and punctuation."

Palmer said.

Dine works as an intern for Alma College News Services and serves on the editorial staff of *The Pine River Anthology*. Her story is about "a young girl relating a terrifying experience in a chaotic and confused way, her mind unable to acknowledge reality or accept the shock of the situation," said Dine.

A 1985 graduate of Lowell High School, she is the daughter of Robert and Judith Dine, 12500 72nd S.E. Alto. She plans to major in English at Alma College.

### Pesticide test now available

Farmers needing Restricted Use Pesticide Certification will have an opportunity to take the Michigan Department of Agriculture test at Lowell High School, says David Guikema, Ionia County Extension Director. Available will be both the Private Application Test and the Commercial Application Test.

On February 17 in the Lowell High School Vo-Ag room at 7:30 p.m., an educational meeting will be held to prepare farmers for the test. On February 24 the test will be given by the Michigan Department of Agriculture at 7:30 p.m. in the Lowell High School.

Books are available from the Ionia Cooperative Extension Service Office. Those participating in these sessions need not pre-register. A fee of \$10.00 will be charged for the test by Michigan Department of Agriculture.

## Krause at the House



The Michigan House of Representatives has approved a plan that guarantees that the state income tax would return to 4.6 percent by March 31 and provides for a retroactive rollback to January 1 if sufficient revenues exist.

The plan that was passed on a 90 to 16 vote is a "good proposal" that could bring an end to the controversy that has surrounded the entire tax issue since the rate was raised to 6.35 percent in early 1983.

The current tax rate is 5.1 percent and the compromise bill would remove the remaining .5 percent of the increase by the March 31 target. Withholding tax

would be cut starting April 1. Under the details of the plan, the State Treasurer would have to reduce the tax rate for the 1986 returns based on budget surplus remaining after the budget year ends September 30. If the surplus reaches \$150 million, as the Senate Fiscal Agency expects it will, the rate for all of 1986 would be 4.6 percent. Taxpayers would file returns for 1986 seeking refunds if they overpaid withholding tax.

Negotiations have been stalled in recent weeks with various tax rollback plans being pushed in both the House and Senate. Republicans have kept applying pressure for an early rollback.



### PROBLEMS WITH THE PROSTATE II

In last week's column we discussed the function of the prostate and it's gradual enlargement which often requires treatment. We stated that over 50% of men age 70 and above will have benign prostatic hypertrophy (prostate enlargement). Several of these men will also have a cancerous growth in the gland. Fortunately, prostatic cancer grows and spreads slowly. Cancer of the prostate is rare below age 60 but it can occur. This is one reason why the American Cancer Society recommends yearly rectal exams after age 40.

Because prostatic cancer often presents along with prostatic hypertrophy the symptoms may be similar - frequency, weak stream, and difficulty starting the stream. Prostatic cancer may also be present without symptoms. This is why yearly examination is urged after age 40. Upon rectal examination the prostate may feel hard, or a small nodule may be felt.

Treatment of prostate cancer is usually surgical. The prostate may be removed through the resectoscope as in treatment for benign prostatic hypertrophy or an incision above the pelvic bone may be required. Further treatment may be required in the form of radiation, chemotherapy or additional surgery.

Another problem involving the prostate is prostatitis. Prostatitis is simply inflammation of the prostate gland. This is usually due to infection. Common symptoms are - perineal or rectal pain, burning and frequency of urination, a cloudy appearance of the urine, and low back pain.

Examination of the prostate during an episode of prostatitis reveals a tender, enlarged, soft prostate. Treatment consists of appropriate antibiotic therapy. Some men develop chronic prostatitis which is a low grade, smoldering infection of the prostate which may require several months of antibiotic therapy.

As we have seen over the last 2 weeks, the prostate is an often misunderstood gland that in youth functions admirably, but may cause problems in later life. When problems develop they can usually be treated so that sexual function remains intact.

## "Capitol Column"

By State Senator Dick Posthumus

For too long out-state and suburban Detroit drivers have been paying higher premiums as a result of high theft and damage incidents in Detroit and other urban areas. The Legislature has been working on reforms to put an end to the imbalance in insurance rates across the state, and has finally reached agreement on an Essential Insurance Reform bill.

The bi-partisan proposal provides a measure of predictability and fairness to what has become a major problem for insurers and car owners alike, and will likely result in lower rates for many drivers.

The bill eliminates sections of the original Essential Insurance Act which tied out-state insurance rates to Detroit rates. That allows out-state insurers to adjust their rates in Detroit to realistically reflect the market there. However, following the Market Adjustment Period which ends March 31, 1986, insurers could not raise premiums in Detroit more than an average of 4 percent plus the Consumer Price Index (the rate of inflation) a year.

Beginning February 1, 1988, insurers could remain under the 4 percent plus CPI formula or switch to a plan limiting rate increases to that insurer's average percentage increase in areas outside Detroit.

The new plan also changes the way the Michigan Automobile Insurance Placement Facility (MAIPF) sets its rates. MAIPF rates are currently set using a weighted average of the top ten insurers in the state, which is usually lower than typical urban rates. The new plan would use only five top insurers, to reflect more realistic rates.

The proposal also includes some innovative ideas such as requiring insurers to provide at least a 20 percent premium discount for drivers who use seat belts, and other discounts for those installing theft-prevention devices.

One of the most important aspects of the measure would be the creation of the Automobile Theft Prevention Authority. This panel would coordinate and intensify law enforcement efforts targeted against auto theft, and

Commissioner Oppewal introduced Reverend David Baak, Executive Director of the Grand Rapids Area Center for Ecumenism, who gave the invocation. Those present united in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Chairman Byington presented service awards in recognition of service to the following:

A. Richard Nicewander, Kent Community Hospital, 30 years of service.

James Neller, Bureau of Equalization, 20 years of service.

Chairman Byington presented to Ron Brady a proclamation recognizing the month of February, 1986 as Honor Awareness Month in Kent County. Mr. Brady thanked the Board of Commissioners for the proclamation and urged those interested in organ donation to make family and friends aware of their intent so that when the time comes the donation is made.

Commissioner Kempker moved approval of the minutes of the meeting of December 19, 1985 and January 2, 1986 as written and published. Seconded by Commissioner Laninga.

Motion carried.

A report of the Finance Committee of their meetings of December 31, 1985 through January 28, 1986 was presented. (All have received copies and copies are on file in the Office of the County Clerk.)

Commissioner DeKraaker moved that the report be received, concurred in and filed. Seconded by Commissioner Kuipers.

Under Public Comment, Don Bacon, 929 Grandville SW, President of the Kensington Library Board of Trustees, offered their support of the consolidation of library services as recommended by the project. He indicated that an authority with autonomy should govern the new library system and they should be elected officials. He urged the Board of Commissioners to permit the voters of Kent County to decide whether or not the library board should be elected and autonomous. He also indicated that the Kensington Library Board would prefer an August election.

Richard Westra, Station GRV, stated the public would be well served by an overview of the mass burn incinerator project. He offered the services of Cable Channel 37/21 as development project. He indicated they could interface a solid waste video and the cultural consolidation issue. Their station promotes access to cable for live call in and round table discussion.

Manuel Herrera, 1044 Pine, NW, volunteer with the Hispanic Organizing Center, stated he was not asking the Board of Commissioners to change or overrule the decision of the Department of Social Services on the allocation of discretionary funds, but rather, he was asking for a commitment to find a way to fund the needs that have not been met by discretionary fund grants. He was pleased with the grant awarded to the Family Outreach Center but was disappointed that the Hispanic Center Interpreter/Translator Assistance Project was not awarded at a higher level and that the Spanish-speaking Legal Assistance Project were not funded. These agencies must grow because the Hispanic community is growing. If the Hispanic community is not effectively served in human needs, poverty will increase. Hispanics want to be self-sufficient. Hispanics need and want training and education in developing productive skills.

Clarence Blakelaine, former County Commissioner and member of the Cultural Consolidation Committee, explained that the committee spent months studying cultural consolidation. The question should be voted upon at a special election in May. It is a complex issue deserving the full attention of the electorate.

Don Bacon of the Kensington Library Board felt the electorate is being discounted by people in public office. He had confidence in the ultimate wisdom of the electorate when they hear the facts. Mr. Blakelaine stated he respects the voters, but the committee spent 18 months coming to the conclusions reached and the question deserves the undivided attention of the voters.

Chairman Byington did not feel any elected official in the room would be presumptuous enough to discount any voter.

Nora Marble, speaking on behalf of the Hispanic Organizing Center of Western Michigan, stated they have followed the recommendations of the Board of Social Services in checking other sources of funding. The Hispanic Center is appreciative of the help it has received.
