Three wrestlers place at State Tournament

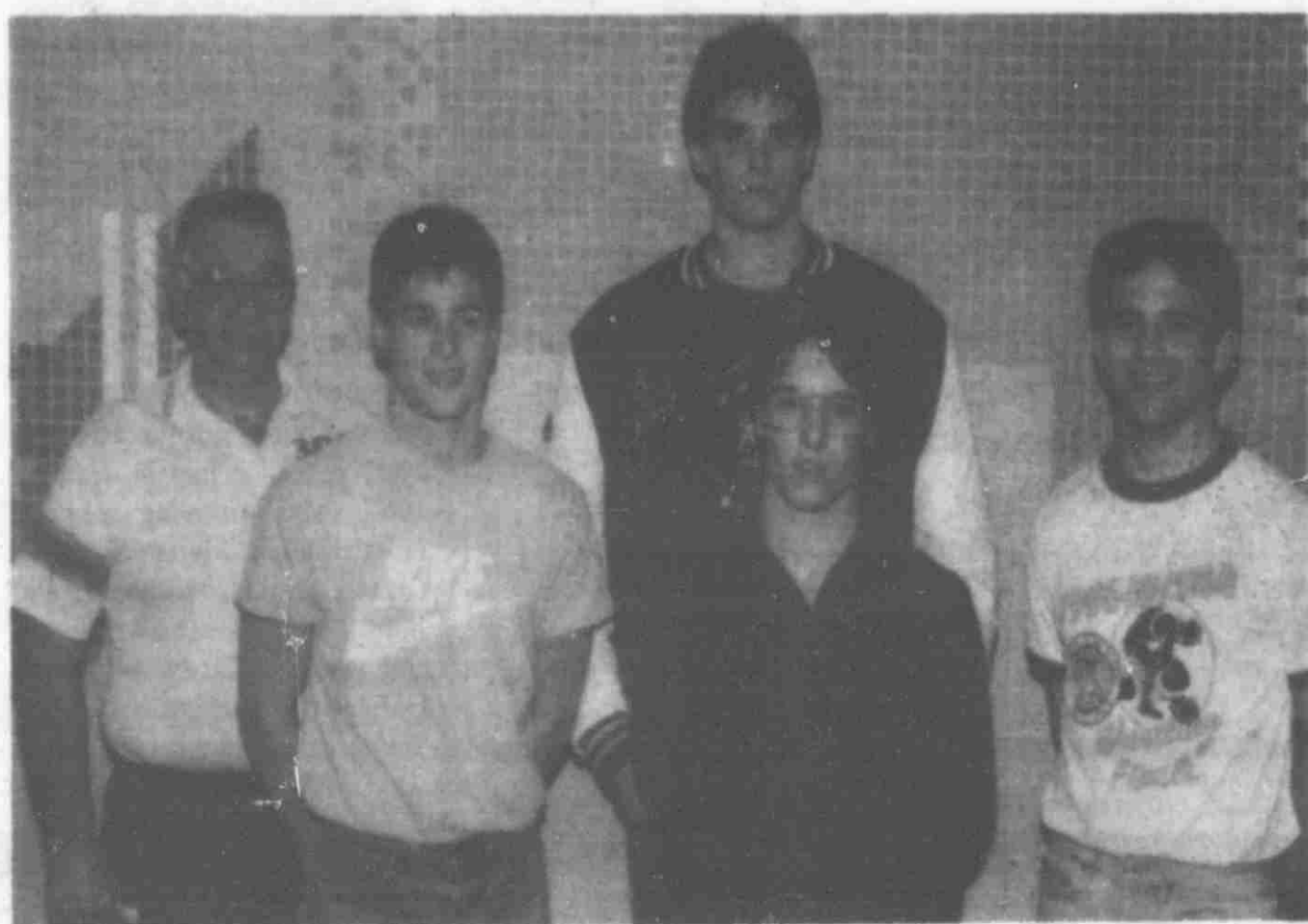
Last Friday and Saturday was the Class B State Wrestling invitational held at Charlotte High School with 208 wrestlers and 92 schools represented. Four wrestlers from Lowell qualified for the tournament and three out of the four placed, giving Lowell

a sixth place in the state. Taking first in the tourney were defending state champions Eaton Rapids followed by Stevensville-Lakeshore.

The three wrestlers that placed for the tournament were Jim Johnson (heavyweight), Carl

Pratt (105 lbs.) and Tony Huver (138 lbs.). Johnson took a second place after he lost to Mike Anderson of Mt. Morris in the finals by a score of 10-2. Carl Pratt placed sixth after losing to Jamie McClougham of South Haven by a score of 3-2. Tony Huver took home a third place medal after winning in the consolation finals over Eaton Rapids', Nick Lyon by a score of 7-4. The fourth wrestler to qualify for the state meet was Brett Kirby (155 lbs.).

Not only did the wrestlers do well, so did the coach. After being selected Regional Coach of the Year, Coach Gary Rivers was selected "Michigan Coach of the Year for Class B." Rivers was selected out of eight nominees from all over the state of Michigan. Congratulations Coach! And congratulations wrestlers on a great job this season!

City gets new rescue vehicle

The old adage says, "Every cloud has a silver lining," and that has proved to be the case with a 1971 fire truck owned by the city. About six months ago, Lowell City Manager Ray Quada told the City Council that the city's primary pumper truck had serious problems with its pumping system. A survey of the damage revealed that the truck was in need of more repair than it was worth. Some quick shopping uncovered a readily available 1985 FMC demo pumper. The city was due for a new pumper in the county's purchase rotation schedule in about two years. A deal was struck that allowed the city to buy the truck now, and be reimbursed when their turn for a new truck came up in the county's schedule. So, Lowell had a new pumper, and the chassis of a perfectly good truck with only 15,000 miles on the odometer.

What to do with the truck chassis became something of a problem, until someone had the idea of mounting a crew box on it. About two months and \$9,500 later, the city had a new rescue vehicle. The unit has cabinets around the outside of that will be filled with the fire department's emergency gear, such as breathing apparatus, hydraulic extraction equipment, etc. This equipment is now on the city's 1966 Ford rescue van, which will be sold once the new unit has been fitted out.

The new unit will be equipped with a generator and searchlights to aid in night emergencies. It will also be equipped with extra

"Capitol Column"

Most people think accounting is a precise, clear-cut process. In theory this may be the case, but the reality is much different. A perfect example of this is the recent discussion over whether or not the state should repay citizens some of their tax money under a provision of the Headlee amendment. The amendment to the state Constitution, approved in 1978, was intended to prevent "run-away" government. It said the state may not collect -- in income tax and single business taxes -- more than an amount referred to as the State Revenue Limit. That limit was set by comparing the ratio of Fiscal Year 1978-79 total state revenues to 1977 Michigan personal income. That ratio is then applied to personal income in future years to determine the maximum amount of revenue that may be collected in any fiscal year.

The State Revenue Limit was calculated by the Department of Management and Budget (DMB) in 1980 to be 10.01 percent of total Michigan personal income. Since the Headlee amendment passed in 1978, state revenues have never exceeded the limit. But according to some calculations 1984-85 revenues did go over the ceiling which has prompted a very heated debate over what does -- and more importantly, does not -- apply as revenue. The non-partisan Senate Fiscal Agency (SFA), using the same methodology they have used since the amendment was adopted, found that state revenues exceeded the limit by \$182.1 million during the last fiscal year. When DMB learned of this, they immediately made some "adjustments" and offered their own set of calculations. Their figures, of course, discounted a number of revenue sources the SFA had counted. The SFA gives two reasons in claiming the DMB adjustments are inappropriate. First, the items they say are not revenue in their adjusted calculations have historically been counted as revenue and are listed as revenues in the Governor's 1986-87 Budget Message. Second, drafter's notes on the amendment clearly show intent that the revenue definition be all-inclusive. It reads, "It was the drafter's intent for the definition of total state revenues to be all inclusive including revenues from licenses and permits and any and all other sources except those revenues explicitly excluded by language in the amendment itself."

Michigan's Auditor General was called in to clear up the situation, but he said an argument could be made for nearly any position. The amendment, he claimed, is unclear as to what should be included as revenues and he believes the question will only be cleared up in the courts, through legislation, or with an opinion handed down by the Attorney General. A request for an opinion has been forwarded to the Attorney General, and a lawsuit bringing the matter before the courts is likely to be filed. We can only wait to learn how the issue will be resolved.

The symposium is scheduled for Friday, March 7 at the Meijer Banquet Room, 4411 North Plainfield in Grand Rapids, from 8:30-11:30 a.m. To date, over eighty businesses throughout the Fifth District have registered for this event.

"This symposium will offer a unique opportunity to observe and learn from companies that

benefit greatly from employing the handicapped. My concern is that there are not more companies actively involved in this hiring process," Henry said.

Congressman Henry will deliver the keynote address for the symposium. Remarks will also be given by special guests, Rich DeVos, President of Amway Corporation, and Fred Meijer, President of Meijer, Inc. Registrants will also have the opportunity to participate in a panel discussion with area business people on the advantages of hiring persons with handicaps, as well as what actual liabilities exist in terms of workers' compensation and insurance.

Carless to work with Chrysler Corp.
