## Millage election is Tuesday

On Tuesday, March 24, voters in the Lowell School District will go to the polls to act on two millage proposals. Proposition I on the ballot calls for the renewal of 22.2 mills of operational millage. This millage has expired and was last collected in December of 1985.

Proposition II is a bit more complicated. The second proposition asks voters to approve a .7 mill shift from debt retirement to operational millage. State law requires that the district get voter approval to make such a shift, even though it does not represent an increase in taxes. The .7 mills (\$0.70 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation) would normally be deducted from the dis-

trict's 3.3 mills of debt retirement millage as a result of rising State Equalized Valuations. State laws mandate that school districts not collect more taxes than necessary to pay debts. Lowell Superintendent of Schools Fritz Esch said this .7 mill reduction would go into effect either this year or next. "We're asking the voters to shift this millage over to our operational budget so that we can begin to institute some of the programs recommended by the Citizen's Advisory Committee for Educational Excellence," said Esch. "We estimated that it would cost the district about 12 mills to put all the programs recommended by Excellence

Committee into effect, we realize that's out of reach, but this .7 mills is a start," Esch added. He went on to say that the shift of this .7 mills is a way to begin this improvement process without increasing taxes.

Passage of the second proposal would generate about \$140,000 annually. This income would be used to begin a five year plan to improve curriculum and instruction throughout the grades and would include a coordinator for curriculum. The money would also be used for the replacement of textbooks and teaching materials, an elementary counselor, improve the high school career planning program, provide enrichment and remedial

after school programs and train staff for gifted and talented programs.

Both propositions are for a five year period. Polls open at 7:00 a.m. and close at 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday. Precinct one votes at the Runciman Elementary School at 300 High St, Lowell. Precinct two votes at the Bowne Township Hall, 6059 Linfield, Alto. Precinct three votes at the Vergennes Township Hall at the corner of Bailey Drive and Parnell Avenue in Vergennes Township. For a definition of precinct boundaries, see an election notice published on pages 16 and 17 of this issue.

## Two Board seats are open

Two four year terms on the Lowell Board of Education which are currently held by Chris VanAntwerp and John Haggai will be expiring on June 30, 1986. Persons interested in running for these positions must meet the following qualifications:

1. Be a citizen of the United States.
2. Have attained the age of eighteen (18) years of age or older.
3. Be a resident of the State of Michigan for at least 30 days.
4. Be a resident of the Lowell School District for at least 30 days before the election.

Nominating petitions may be obtained by any candidate from the Board of Education office. The petitions must contain at least 20 signatures of registered school electors of the district, and not less than 1% of the votes of the candidate who received the greatest number of votes in the last election in which Board members were elected.

Petition circulators must be registered voters, individual petitions must be taken for each township and city in which signatures are obtained, and ELECTORS CAN SIGN AS MANY PETITIONS AS THERE ARE PERSONS TO BE ELECTED.

In addition to filing nominating petitions, candidates are also required to file two identification affidavits. The affidavit of identity must contain:

1. The candidate's name.
2. The candidate's address.
3. The candidate's ward and precinct where he or she is registered as a voter.
4. The number of years the candidate has resided in the state and county.
5. Other information that may be required to identify the candidate.

belly-dance, or a ham-it-up "best legs" contest. The "don't smoke" skit by Ms. Kuna and Mr. McMahon was really great.

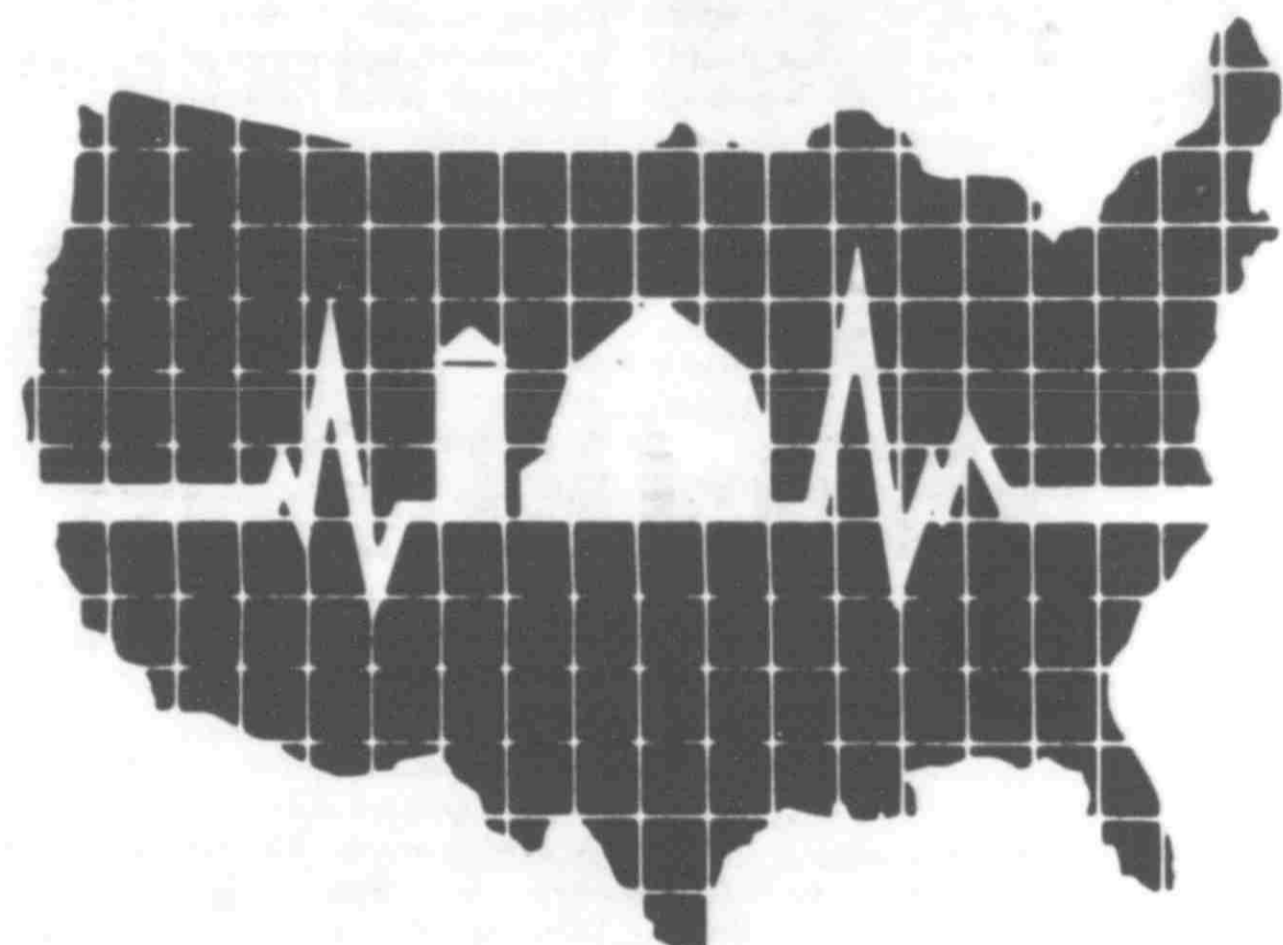

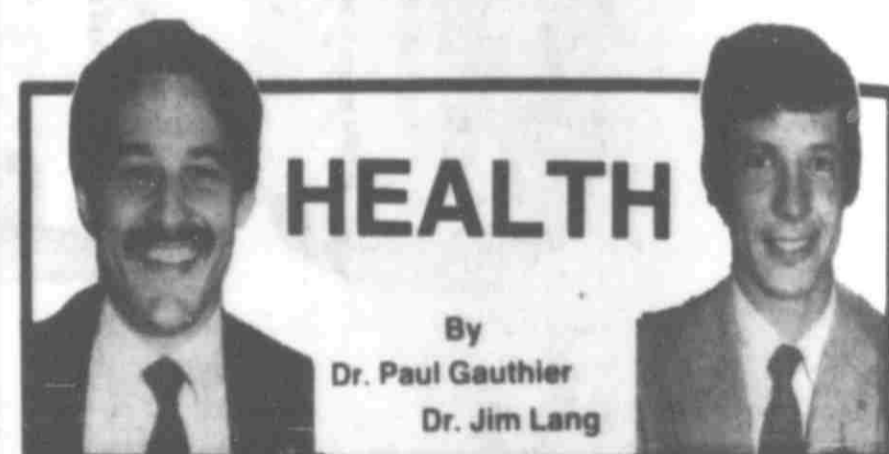

### FACTS ON INFERTILITY

With unwanted teenage pregnancies on a seemingly unstoppable course of increase, it may seem strange that infertility is also a common problem in the U.S. Yet more than 10 million people-one out of five married couples in this country-experience some degree of infertility. In the last 20 years, there has been an almost 50% increase in infertility. With more and more couples putting off childbearing until they are in their 30's or even 40's, the incidence of infertility is increasing.

The good news, however, is that infertility is a very treatable condition. Thorough evaluation of a couple reveals the cause of infertility in all but 4% of cases. When a cause is found, over half of the couples can be treated successfully and have a child. If the problem is hormonal imbalance, up to 75% of cases are treatable. In fact, treatment of hormonal problems has a success rate that matches reproductive capacity in the general population: 25% of normally fertile women conceive in the first month of unprotected relations, 60% within 6 months, and 80% within one year.

The causes of infertility are evenly divided between the sexes. Common causes of male infertility include low sperm count, slowly moving or defectively shaped sperm, or varicoceles (varicose veins) of the testicle. Frequent barriers to female fertility are structural problems such as scarring of the fallopian tubes, endometriosis (the presence of endometrial tissue, the normal uterine lining, in abnormal locations such as the fallopian tubes, ovaries, or abdominal cavity), and failure to ovulate from hormonal imbalance or deficiencies.

Infertility is treated in a number of different ways. Surgical options include repair of tubal damage or varicoceles, or the removal of inappropriate endometrial adhesions. In vitro fertilization (fertilization of the egg outside the woman's body) or artificial insemination are other options.

Next week: Medical therapies for infertility. Also, support groups for infertile couples.

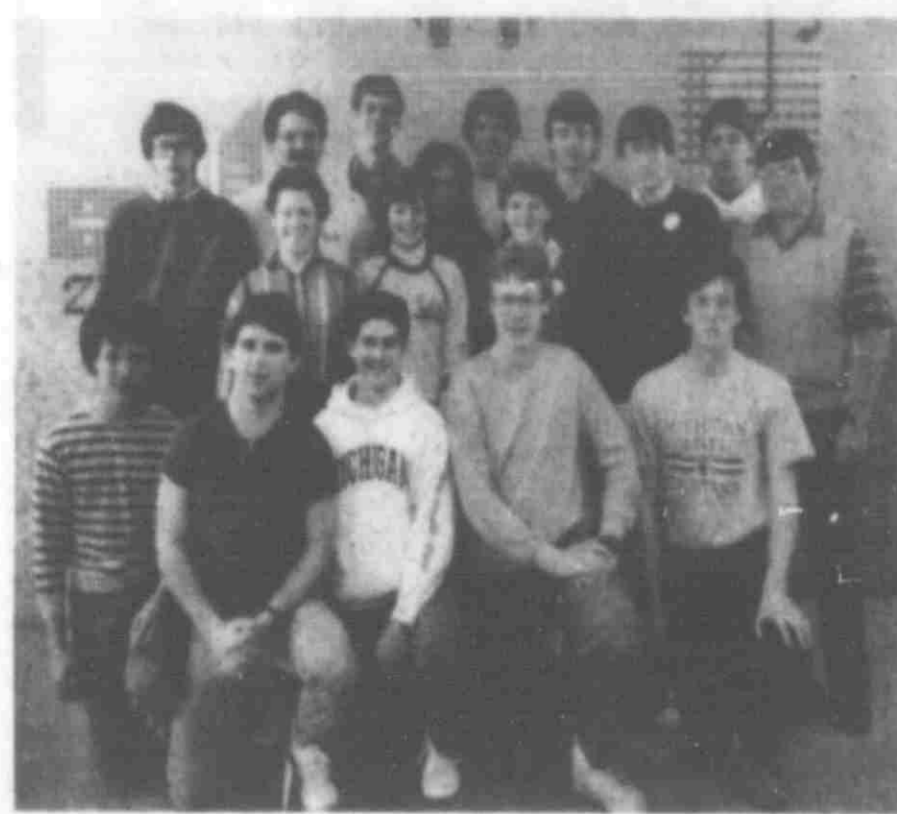

## "Capitol Column"

In today's high tech business world, hazardous chemicals are often the norm rather than the exception. Recent legislation passed by the Senate will ensure a new and greater level of protection for all those who must work with such products.

Legislation to protect workers from the hazards of volatile chemicals was first introduced in the Senate three years ago, but the issue was so sensitive that agreement could not be reached. The Legislature has continually attempted to strike a balance between worker safety and business practicality without success until the passage of House Bills

4111, 5250 and 5251. The result was state rule changes plus the adoption of new federal regulations which are some of the most extensive ever produced.

Under the measure, workers have a right to know the hazards and proper safety information for any material they handle. Information must be supplied through proper labels, access to filed material safety data sheets prepared by the manufacturer, and through company training programs.

There are slight changes in the procedures followed if a worker complains to the Michigan Occupational Safety and Health Administration (MIOSHA) inspectors about a particular hazard. In the past, companies had an extended period of time after notification by MIOSHA inspectors to meet state regulations for labeling or replacing dangerous materials or face "red-tagging" prohibiting their use. Under the new law, the lack of proper labels and manufacturing safety sheets can result in immediate "red-tagging."

The legislation also makes it easier for individual citizens to get information on hazardous materials used in their community through the Michigan Department of Public Health. Previously, anyone could obtain the information by requesting it through the federal agencies. The bill also gives fire departments the right to ask for information on hazardous materials so they can prepare proper procedures in advance.

Altogether, this legislation is good for everyone involved. Businesses and public safety organizations can meet the standards easily and cost-effectively while workers' health and safety is protected under tough regulations. The Senate is proud of our work on this bill and the people of Michigan can be proud of the safe and efficient way in which it protects everyone in our state.

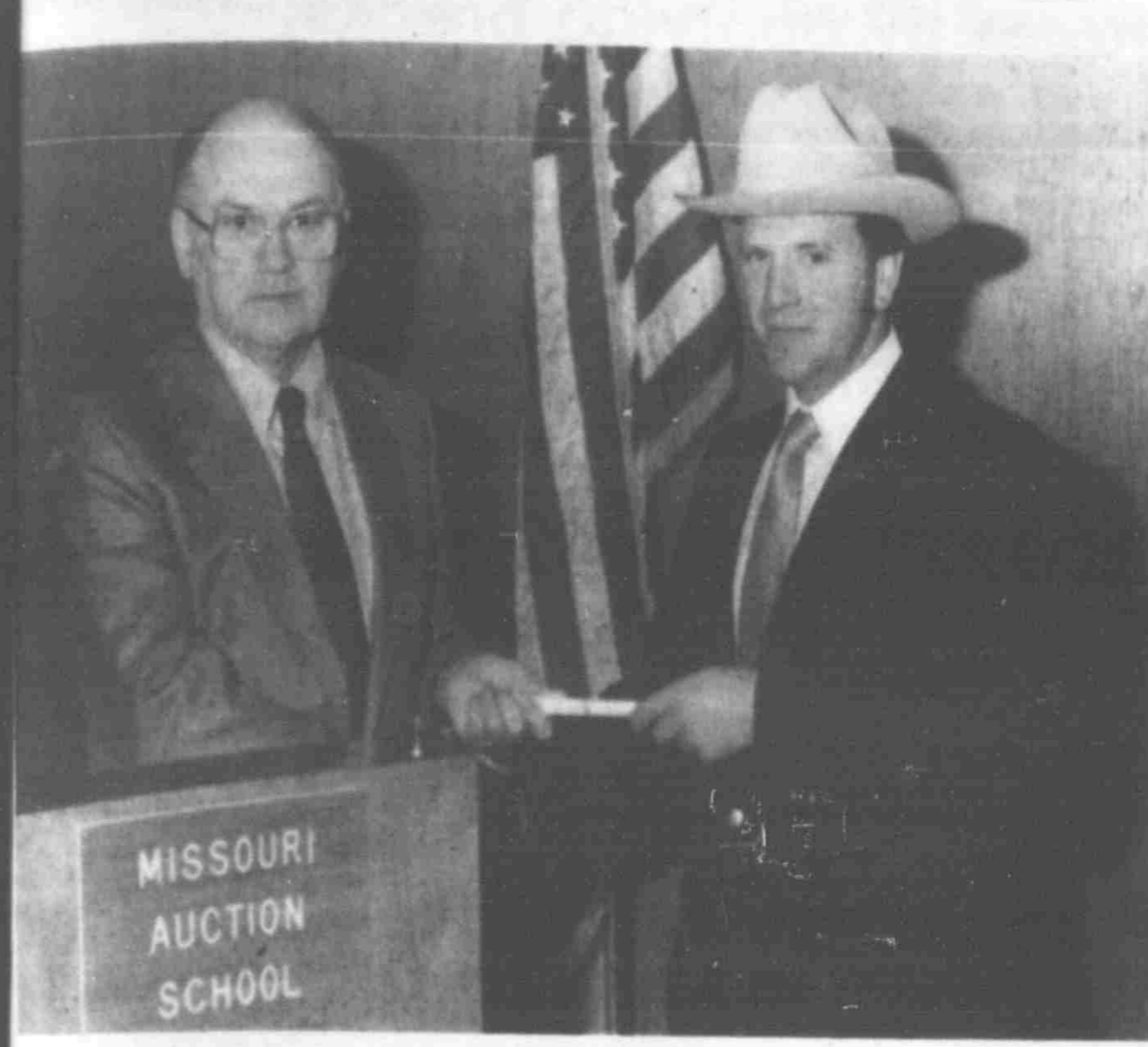

## Motorist can get extra mileage on taxes by applying breaks

With tax filing season upon us, motorists who use their cars for business or volunteer work should be looking for ways to apply tax breaks for driving.

Are you aware of the different ways to deduct auto-related expenses? Do you realize that you may be able to cut your 1985 tax bill by depreciating your car? Do you know if you are eligible for a tax credit on the purchase of a new car? According to the Michigan Association of CPAs, being familiar with these automobile deductions can drive down your 1985 tax bill.

Before you start work on your 1985 federal income tax return, try to recall those situations where driving may have been a deductible expense. For instance, if you drove the Cub Scouts on camping trips, deduct it. If you are a landscaper and had to lease or buy a trailer to take your tools to work, deduct it. If you moonlight, deduct the costs of driving from your primary job to the second one. If you traveled to the doctor twice a week for allergy shots, deduct those costs as part of your medical expenses. All sorts of travel-related expenses are deductible, but you must understand how the rules for drivers affect you.

You can deduct 21 cents a mile for the first 15,000 miles of business travel and 11 cents for each additional mile. Remember, even if your boss asks you to drive to the post office to pick up the company mail each morning, it's a deductible business expense if you use your own car. Business transportation expenses are claimed in the "adjustments to income" section of the 1040, which is the long form. Even if you do not itemize you MUST file the long form to claim

deductions for business auto expenses.

For medical-related travel, you can deduct nine cents a mile. But this must be included with your other medical expenses, and they must surpass five percent of your adjusted gross income to be deductible. For those who drive for charity-related purposes, 12 cents a mile can be deducted. This deduction must be included with other deductions for charitable giving. Those who wish to deduct costs for investment-related trips, can use the 21 cent a mile rate that also applies to business drivers. When using any of these "standard mileage rate" deductions, you can also deduct the cost of parking and tolls.

Using the standard mileage rate deductions saves you some of the trouble of detailed record keeping because all of the costs associated with running your car -- including depreciation -- are built in. But if you think it costs more than this to operate your car, you have an alternative. You can add up the actual costs and deduct those costs instead.

To decide between the standard mileage formula and the actual expense method, figure the deduction both ways. But remember, if you go the actual expense route, you'll need detailed records of gas, repairs and other expenses. You'll also need to be able to show how much you used your car for business versus personal reasons.

If you bought your car in 1985 and used it for business, you may qualify for the Investment Tax Credit (ITC). Basically, this is how it works: The ITC allows you to cut your final tax bill by six percent of the amount you paid for the car. So, if you paid \$10,000 for your car, you could cut up to \$600 from your tax bill. However, you must have used the car more than half the time

for business reasons in order to qualify for the credit. A \$675 cap is imposed on the credit for cars put into service before April 3, 1985.

If you use your car for business, you may also be able to write-off its cost over a three-year period (except for luxury cars). If you qualify, accelerated depreciation deductions can cut hundreds of dollars from your 1985 tax liability. To qualify for accelerated depreciation, you must use the car more than half the time for business purposes. The Deficit Reduction Act of 1984 placed a new limit on the amount of depreciation deductions that can be claimed in 1985. The limitation hinges on when you purchased the car. For cars purchased before April 3, 1985, you can get a 1985 depre-

ciation deduction no greater than \$4,000. For cars purchased after April 2, 1985, you can deduct no more than \$3,200 in 1985.

## Flood Guidelines . . .

Due to the recent heavy snow accumulation and warm weather, flooding conditions may result. In many cases, basements are flooded, damaging furnaces and water heaters, leaving customers without needed gas and electric service.

In the event your home is flooded, the following guidelines will help you determine what safeguards are necessary to operate appliances which may have been affected by the emergency:

-- Be cautious in entering an area where the electricity may not be disconnected. DO NOT

ATTEMPT TO ENTER A FLOODED AREA IF THE WATER HAS REACHED THE LEVEL OF ENERGIZED EQUIPMENT SUCH AS WALL OUTLETS, SWITCHES AND MOTORS.

-- If the electricity is off, customers should shut off the gas valve at each affected appliance and disconnect the electric source before water has reached burners, controls, air intake wiring or motor.

-- Motors which have been submerged will need drying out before use to prevent damage.

Any electric motor service organization and some appliance dealers have facilities for drying out motors.

-- In all cases where gas is smelled or bubbles are observed rising from an appliance, INITIATE AN EMERGENCY GAS LEAK CALL to Consumers Power Company.

-- If flooding conditions are anticipated, the customer should disconnect the electric source to any potentially-affected appliance. The customer may also pull the service at the fuse box.

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## Fish ladder repair is a problem for anglers

Anglers planning to fish the Grand River for steelhead this Spring, upstream of the 64th Street Dam fish ladder in Grand Rapids, will have to head downstream of the ladder instead, say Department of Natural Resources (DNR) fisheries biologists, while modifications to improve the ladder are completed.

Although modifications to improve fish passage conditions within the ladder were begun last Fall, high water conditions halfway through the reconstruction prevented the contractor from completing the job. Improvements on the dam are to be resumed in May and completed by July.

A substantial fishery can still be expected, say biologists, at the 6th Street Dam and downstream at tributaries such as Crockery Creek and Sand Creek. Steelhead runs, however, will be blocked upstream from the Dam, eliminating the Spring steelhead fishery in such tributaries as the Rogue, Prairie Creek, Flat River and Fish Creek.

The improvements on the fish ladder will enable fisheries biologists to better control water flowing through the fish ladder

during higher river stages. For the fish, this means they will have an easier time getting through the ladder and into the

river above, say biologists, especially during the Spring when water levels in the river are the highest.
