

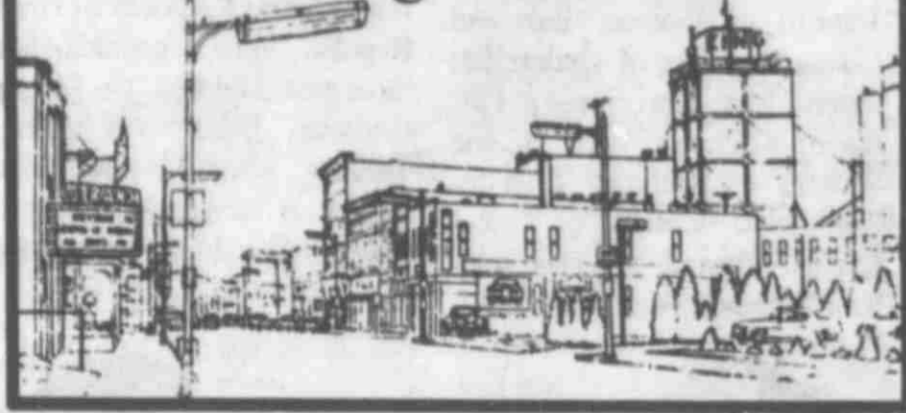

Lowell Senior High School offers 219 academic course selections. Twenty-seven (27) of these are advanced or honors and seventeen (17) remedial.

Statistics for Lowell Senior High show 882 students enrolled, 42 teachers, 3 counselors, 1 librarian, 2 administrators and 3 secretaries. Eight students at Lowell High have a perfect 4.0 grade average and 70 students have a 3.5 or better. There are 296 students on the Honor roll.

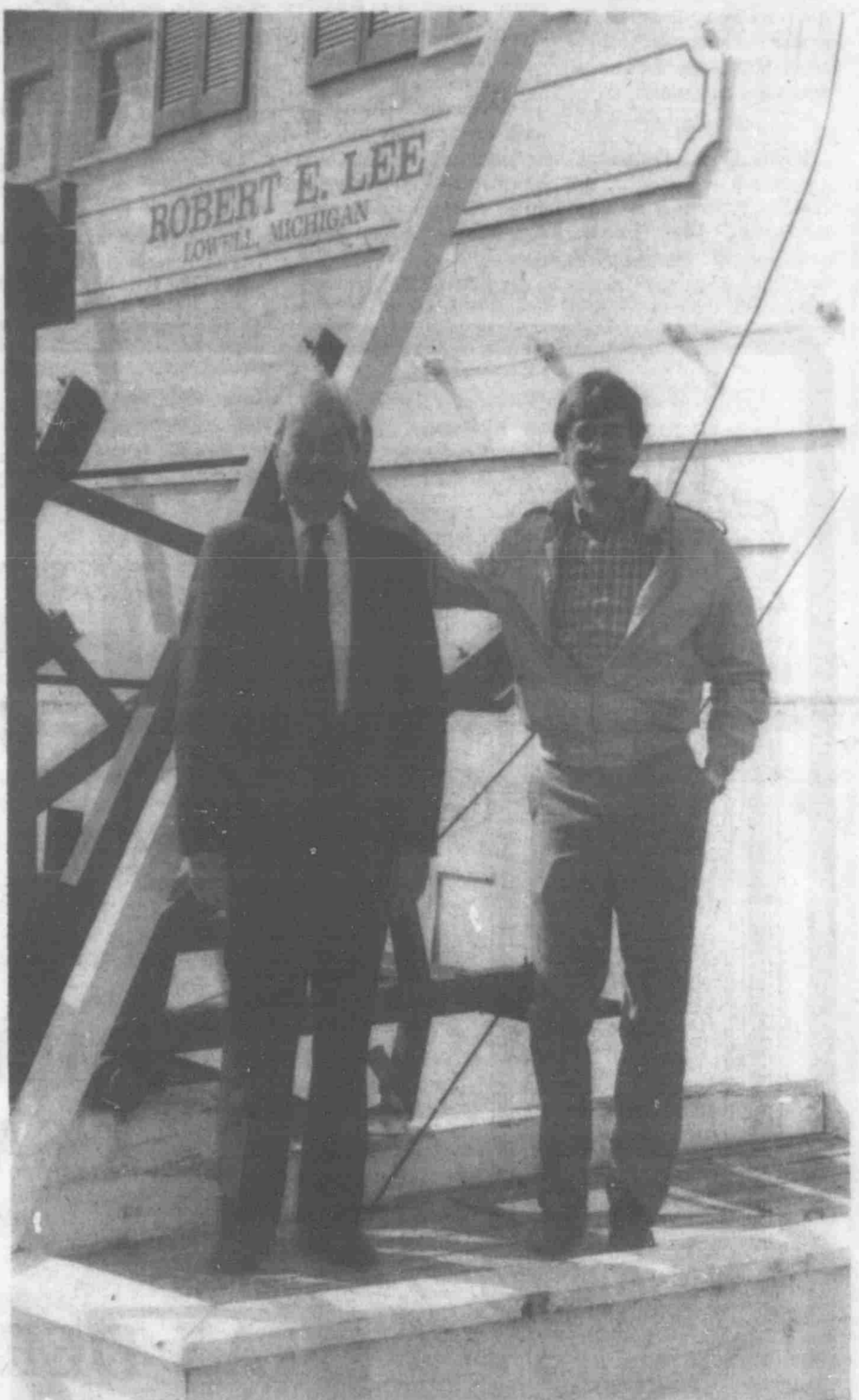

Lowell athletes do well in classroom. The Lowell High School Athletic Department recently released statistics regarding grades for participants in fall and winter sports. The results showed that Lowell High School athletes are doing very well in the classroom. The 207 participants in the fall sports programs combined for a 2.892 Grade Point Average (GPA). The 154 participants in winter sports were just a little better with a 2.899 GPA.

Five athletes attained perfect 4.0 GPAs during the first semes-

ter. They were Tom Nugent (JV Football and Wrestling), Pam Durkee (Varsity Football Cheerleading and Volleyball), Michele Shick (Varsity Football Cheerleading and JV Volleyball) and Amy Davis (Varsity Volleyball).

Also included in the report were Lowell's ratings for sportmanship in the OK White Conference. Of a perfect five points, Lowell finished with 4.34, second only to Wyoming Park with 4.40.

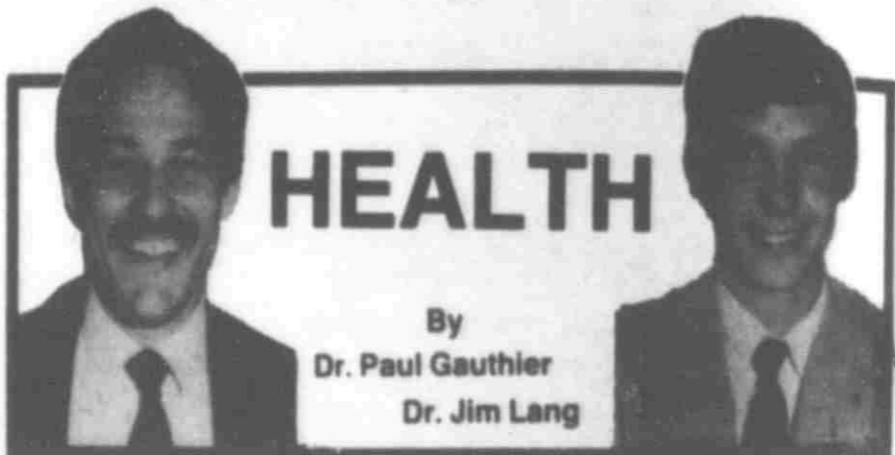

**IRRITABLE BOWEL SYNDROME**

One of the most common disorders of the gastrointestinal tract is irritable bowel syndrome, also known as "spastic colitis," "spastic bowel," or "nervous colitis." Irritable bowel syndrome is diagnosed after other diseases have been ruled out. This syndrome is due to a disordered motility of the bowel. This syndrome appears more commonly in women than men and is usually diagnosed in young adulthood. It is very rarely diagnosed in older adults unless there is concomitant laxative abuse.

The most common symptoms of irritable bowel syndrome are cramping, bloating, lower abdominal pain, intermittent constipation and diarrhea. Abdominal pain is usually located on the lower left side and is due to spasm of the muscles in the bowel. Occasionally mucus will appear in the stool. Irritable bowel syndrome never causes blood in the stool.

It is felt that irritable bowel syndrome is due to stress and/or dietary factors. Certain "stressful" situations may precipitate an attack of irritable bowel. Another theory is that certain foods trigger painful spasms.

Diagnosis of this syndrome is usually made after ruling out other diseases such as peptic ulcer, ulcerative colitis, lactase deficiency, or Crohn's disease. This is usually done by performing x-rays of the upper and lower GI tracts. Sometimes endoscopy (looking into the stomach or bowel with special endoscopes) will be performed.

Therapy of irritable bowel syndrome is directed at the underlying cause. If certain foods seem to bring on painful spasms, obviously, avoidance of those foods is indicated. If stress seems to be the cause, avoiding stressful situations or dealing effectively with stress can lead to relief. This is much easier said than done! Stress management workshops, or bio-feedback may be useful to help us deal with our daily stresses. Regular exercise also seems to combat the effect of stress. Increasing the amount of fiber in the diet will often help. Sometimes psyllium, (Metamucil®), a natural laxative which helps maintain water in the stool, will be prescribed. This will help control diarrhea and constipation. Occasionally, antispasmodic medication or antidepressants will be prescribed.

In conclusion, irritable bowel syndrome is a very common disorder which can be dealt with effectively. It is not cancer nor will it lead to cancer. Dealing with stress and avoiding foods which trigger "attacks" underlie an appropriate management program.

### Local youth participates in 4-H Capitol Experience in Lansing

A Kent County 4-H member, Natalie Wieland, of Lowell, was among 90 young people and adults to participate in the 1986 4-H Capitol Experience program March 16-19 in Lansing.

"The purposes of the activity were to acquaint Michigan 4-H'ers with legislative and governmental processes and to encourage them to get involved in public affairs on local, county, regional, state and national levels," explains Margo Smith, 4-H Capitol Experience coordinator.

The youths participated in discussions on state government, met with media representatives who cover the capital, visited the Capitol, including the governor's office and the Senate and House chambers, hosted legislators at a special legislative breakfast and talked with representatives of several state agencies.

The 4-H members spent one morning working on a community service project in the Lansing area, working with political reporters at the Capitol, visiting the State Police training academy in Lansing, distributing food at the Greater Lansing Food Bank or working in the governor's communication section sorting mail.

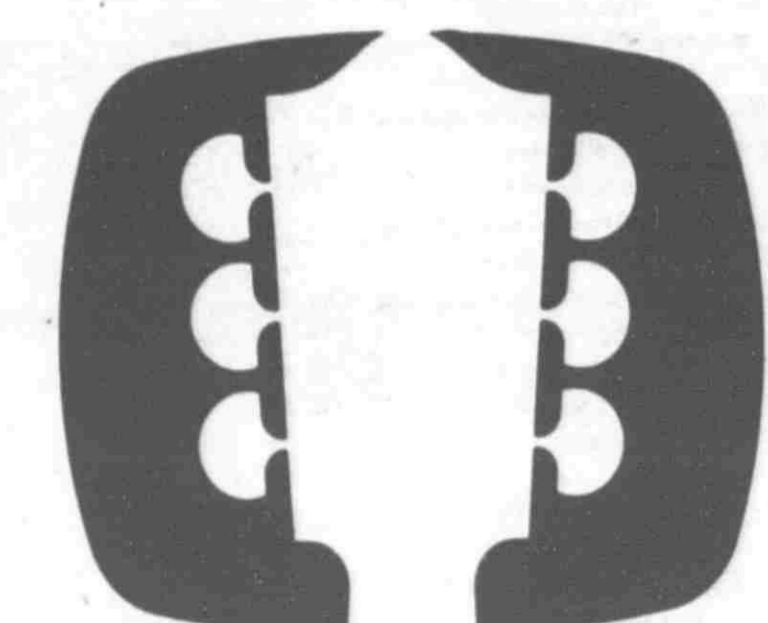

I guess it was about two years ago that Auto Owners canceled out my auto insurance. They cited an "adverse loss history" as the reason for cancellation. At first I protested about being canceled after only a couple of recent claims. But, when my agent pulled my file and began ticking off the myriad of little claims I had collected over my twelve years with the company, I was forced to agree with their decision. Just for good measure, I did get in one more \$600 claim between the notification and the actual cancellation. That made me feel a little better about being canceled out.

Well, I found a new insurer, and everything has been just hunky-dory since. My rate was even a little lower than with my old company. That is, everything was hunky-dory until about a week ago.

My local agent called me and said, "Roger, I got a notice of cancellation on your car insurance this morning." I said, "What the heck are they cancelling me for?" "Non payment," he said. "But, I paid that bill!" I said. "Not according to them" he said. "Hold on", I said.

I went to the paid receipts, and pulled out a bill for \$225.00 that had been paid in February. With a confident flair, I began

reading the information from the receipt to my agent. "That's the policy on the Ledger building" he said. "@%\*☆#&#" I said.

After considerable searching, I found the bill for my auto insurance. It was still stapled to the policy, and filed with the other policies, rather than with the accounts payable. They were right, I was wrong.

The whole misunderstanding went something like this. Back in February I got a notice from Frankenmuth Insurance telling me that my auto insurance would be canceled if not paid by the February 14 due date. My bookkeeper was off work throughout January and most of February. I had been trying to stay on top of such things, with limited success. I went to the accounts payable drawer, pulled out the only bill in there from Frankenmuth, and paid it. As fate would have it, that bill was within just a few dollars of the auto insurance, and the due dates were only two days apart. I simply assumed that I was paying the bill they were asking about, and thought no more of it. That was on a Friday. During the next week, I got a notice of cancellation. Still thinking I had paid the bill, I figured the check and the notice had crossed in the mail, especially since that Monday had been a postal holiday. That was the last I heard from anybody, until last week's call from my agent.

After I had discovered my error, I told my agent to get hold of Frankenmuth, explain the mistake and assure them that a check would be sent out post haste. My agent then quoted to me from some state law that basically says insurance companies cannot reinstate customers they have cancelled. "#%\*☆#&#" I said.

Now I am with my third auto insurance company in two years. And, to top everything else off, I have a claim for a parking lot mishap pending, that dates back to coverage by my old insurance, and a broken windshield that will be covered by my new company.

You are probably one of those people who have been with the same company for 20 years, never had a claim, and wonder why insurance rates are so high. Well, it's guys like me (with a little help from my wife) that keep those insurance rates up there. I can't wait 'til my kids start driving.

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# Consumers Power offers safety advice for kite flyers

"Go fly a kite," says John Alzubaydi, manager of Consumers Power Company's Alma/Greenville District. "But do it safely."

Spring is here and the weather is right for youngsters turning their thoughts toward the fun of kite flying. But young people

should be warned by parents and school officials to remember to do so in an open area well removed from trees and another po-

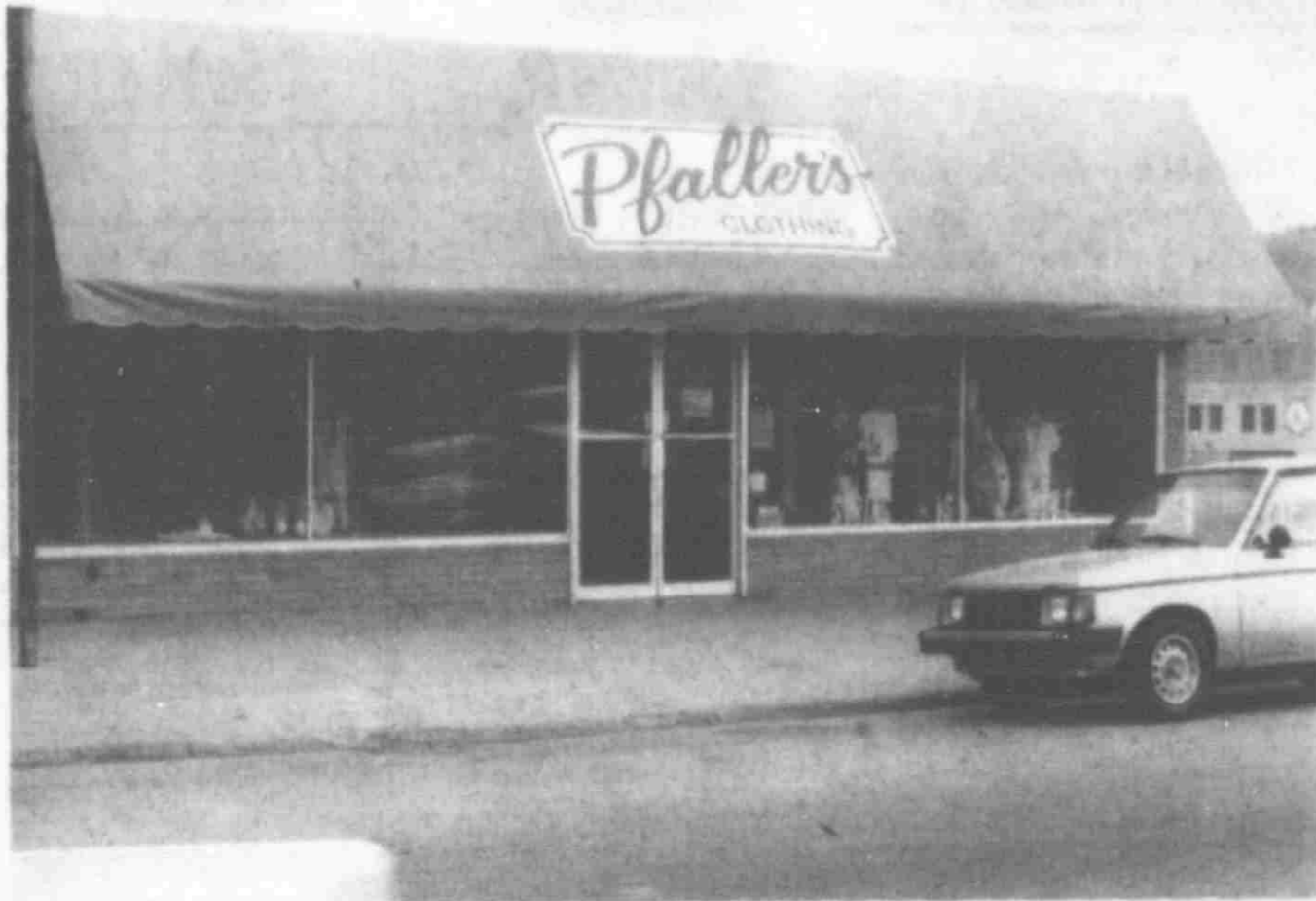
tential hazard -- overhead power lines.

"Successful kite flying is no accident," says Alzubaydi. "Each year the majority of kite flying accidents occur when a child tries to untangle a kite from a tree or power line. To avoid an accident and the serious injuries it could bring, children and parents should be aware of these basic safety rules," Alzubaydi says.

1. Fly your kite in an open area, away from electrical lines, trees and busy streets.
2. Never climb utility poles, trees or broadcasting towers in pursuit of a snagged kite. Electric current from power lines can travel through metallic materials or moisture and cause severe burns.
3. Use wood, paper or plastic in making your kite, not wire or metal. Avoid using any materials that could conduct electricity.
4. Don't try to repeat Benjamin Franklin's experiment by flying your kite in the rain. Lightning can cause injury much more severe than the minor shock Franklin experienced.
5. If a kite gets caught on an electric line, call the utility company for help. Never pull on an electric line.
6. If a power line falls, stand

clear. Never touch downed power lines. Instead call the utility.
