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School Board backs down from decision to bus students to Alto

Lowell Superintendent Fritz Esch said in a public meeting last Thursday night that students at Bushnell Elementary School will not be bused to Alto Elementary this fall to compensate for overcrowding at Bushnell.

Esch, along with President and Vice-President of Lowell's Board of Education Chris Van Antwerp and Roger Kropf added that, although children won't be bused this fall, it is more than likely they will be bused in the fall of '87. A committee was formed in January to assess the situation and attempt a solution before the fall of '87. The committee will present its first set of solutions in this September's Board of Education meeting.

The three officials projected that by the fall of '87 Runciman/Riverside and Bushnell Schools are all going to increase in enrollment, while Alto's enrollment should dip. Currently, Alto has 20 classes with 200 plus students and Bushnell has 23 classes with almost 550 students.

The meeting, consisting of Esch, Kropf, VanAntwerp and a full room of parents with children in Bushnell, began with an opening statement by Esch describing the problem, with the remainder of the meeting for discussion on the problem and any possible solutions.

Since there are students at Bushnell who live outside Bushnell's district, one of the first solutions suggested was to put the children in their proper schools. Esch replied by saying that such a move would cause several split-grade level classrooms because of the large imbalance in each district's population.

Esch sent a letter in May to Bushnell parents, mostly those from the Valley Vista area, telling of the problem and explaining that their children may have to be relocated in September. Esch was swamped with phone calls from the parents and he said Thursday that the magnitude of their concern is what caused the motion for a delay in the busing.

"The community has been very supportive," Esch said. "They've taken quite an interest and they first want to know if anything else can be done. Therefore, the busing will not take place this September."

Esch then explained that the problem will be getting worse at the three schools and a solution must be made by the committee by the fall of '87. When the 1985-86 Advisory Committee of Elementary School Organization presents its set of solutions, Esch will establish public hearings to review the committee's report.

Valley Vista, the area in Bushnell's district with the most students prone to the busing,

ironically has no representatives on the committee. Esch said that all parents can get involved in the decision-making by attending PTO meetings and Board of Education meetings. Valley Vista was the most popular busing area because it is located best for a shortest possible busing route to Alto.

Many of the parents at the meeting said that they do not entirely object to the busing but

they wanted to see what else could be done first. The parents were also shocked when they received the letter telling of the busing because there was no forewarning.

The population growth will be even more of a problem when the elementary students reach high school, as the students from all four schools will then be in one school. Parents wanted to discuss any possible solutions to

that problem but Kropf said that it would be impossible to set up any type of answers so soon. Kropf cited that Alto was built nearly 18 years ago because of population growth in the area but six years later the population swerved toward downtown Lowell. Kropf then said that because of the unsureness of any longterm decision the board is not acting on this future problem yet.

Attwood addition nearly complete

Lowell's largest employer, the Attwood Corporation, is currently expanding its facilities to the tune of \$1.3 million. The expansion will create 20-30 new jobs over the next few years.

The construction of Attwood, owned by Steelcase, Inc., is the result of a higher demand for its plastics products. The addition will give Attwood more room for its plastics production.

Construction began at the plant last fall, and the new room is scheduled to be completed by the end of June, according to Bruce Wolverton, Attwood's manufacturing engineer officer. When the addition is completed the corporation will begin re-arranging its warehouse, assembly-lines and plastics center to compensate for the growth of the plastics center.

The existing assembly area will be moved into the 32,000 sq. ft. addition. A large portion of the warehouse and shipping rooms will then be moved into the vacant assembly room and the plastics center will extend into the open space made available in the warehouse. When workers start moving storage from the warehouse Attwood will be adding two more shipping docks to the area, to boost their total to 10 shipping docks.

Once the new room is finished Attwood is predicting that it will be three months before all moving and re-arranging is done. Oct. 1 is the date Wolverton has said that everything will be fully operational.

Attwood, the world's leading manufacturer of marine hardware, has said that the expansion was necessitated by the fact that the company's current 26 plastic injection presses are operating at full capacity. Attwood plans to add three new machines, a 260, 700 and 1000 ton molding machine since Steelcase created a larger chair-line requiring larger molds. According to Attwood's Vice-President of Operations, Lew Haack, the appointments not always needed at Vanity Hair Fashions, Open six days Lowell, 897-7506.

project will benefit the production of both Attwood's marine products line and furniture parts for Steelcase.

Attwood's quality control division will also be expanding. That division will have 3,000 sq. ft. of laboratories to test products. The existing quality control room will become an environmental lab, in which monitoring processes will be done to insure there is no spillage of toxic wastes. The corporation will also be adding a 2,000 sq. ft. cafeteria. Both the cafeteria and quality control labs are expected to be completed in three to four weeks.

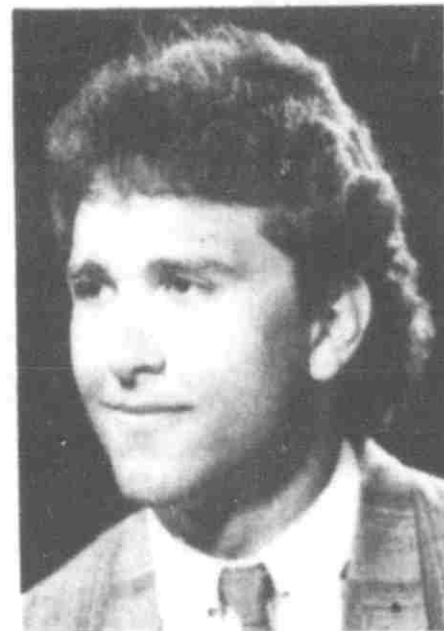
Attwood is making good progress on the addition according to Wolverton.

"We're about 75 percent finished and construction is moving along quite smoothly," Wolverton said. "We're still working on the electrical system, and some painting and floor finishing still has to be done, but the addition will be done in about two weeks."

Haack said that the city has been very cooperative and City Manager, Ray Quada, supported his claim.

"Obviously we're very pleased," Quada said. "Attwood is a real plus for Lowell."

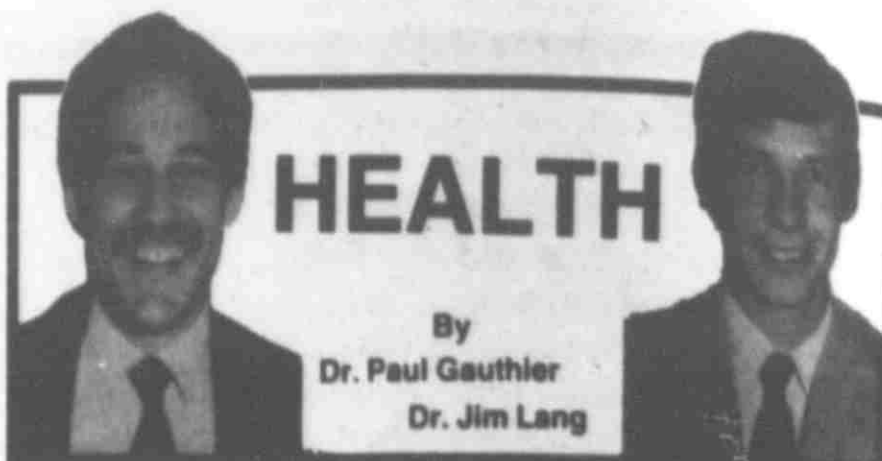

WHAT'S THE MATTER WITH CHEW?

Our children emulate their sports heroes in many ways, including their use of chewing tobacco. Is there any harm in using smokeless tobacco, or is it just a harmless fad? In today's column we hope to discourage the use of this potentially harmful product.

Smokeless tobacco has been associated with various forms of cancer including cancers of the gum, cheek and pharynx. As of this writing a very important court battle is under way to determine if a certain tobacco company can be held liable for oral cancer in a young chewing tobacco user! Smokeless tobacco use seems to be on the upswing. Current estimates are that seven to twenty-two million Americans use the product. Many users feel it is a safe alternative to cigarette smoking. A number of states including Michigan, are contemplating legislation requiring a warning label on smokeless tobacco similar to those on cigarette packages.

Besides an increased risk of cancer, smokeless tobacco use causes gums to recede from the teeth and encourages damage to the teeth. It can lead to bad breath, decreased taste sensation, an increased heart rate and has been implicated in higher blood pressures. Because smokeless tobacco contains nicotine, it is considered to be addictive. Nicotine levels in the blood stream have been shown to be as high as those in smokers.

In summary, smokeless tobacco can be harmful to your health. We encourage the avoidance of all tobacco products.

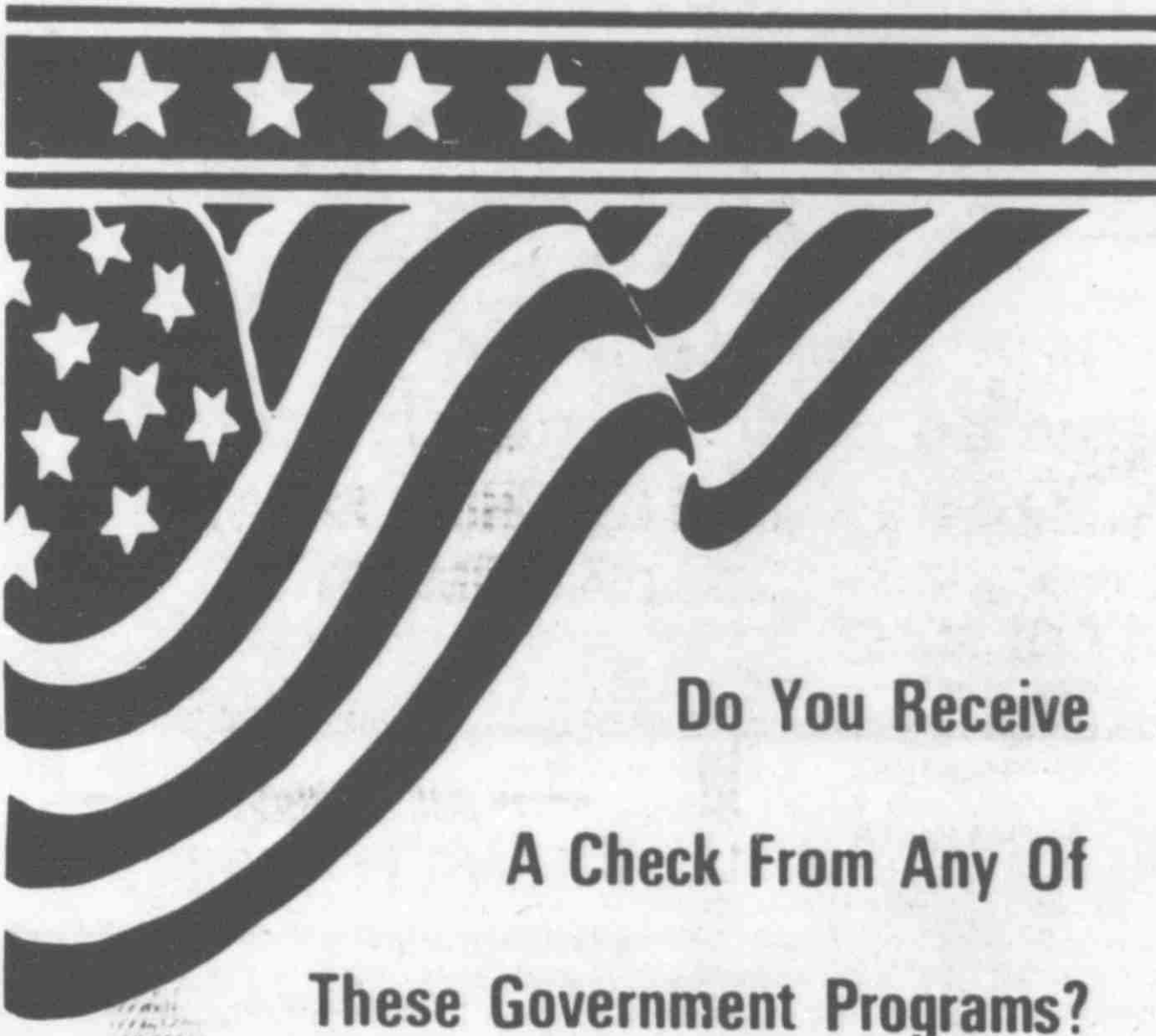

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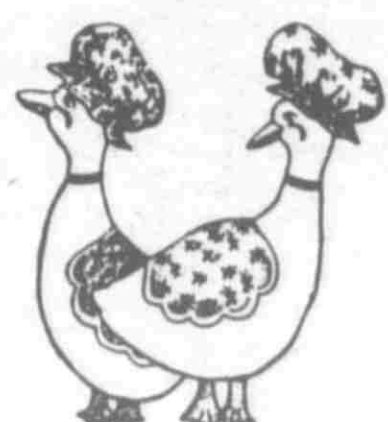

"Capitol Column"

The development of bed-and-breakfast homes (B&Bs) in Michigan has grown significantly during the past several years, and Senate Republicans are offering legislation designed to help promote even greater growth of the cottage industry.

The state now has about 120 B&Bs, compared to just 30 two years ago. And it isn't just a homey atmosphere and a good breakfast that draws the crowds. B&Bs are usually restored homes with tourist interest themselves and do not compete directly with hotels and motels.

Our proposal would create an atmosphere encouraging this fledgling industry even more. Our legislation would establish a procedure for adopting minimum public health and safety standards, inspection and enforcement, provide lien protection and limit liability to \$250; and require that an establishment attempting to call itself a bed-and-breakfast facility meet the

legal definition and standards, and register with the state Department of Public Health.

Our proposal will benefit everyone. First, it will promote the historical development and restoration of many of Michigan's large older homes. The vast majority of Michigan's B&Bs are older Victorian-style homes, averaging 88-years-old. About 75 percent have historical significance and 25 percent either were listed or have applied for membership in the National Register of Historic Places.

Second, this bill will help provide needed space and rooms for the influx of tourists we can expect as part of the State's Sesquicentennial celebration.

Most importantly, it encourages a small business industry in Michigan that has unlimited growth potential. Staying in a B&B is comfortable and a great way to see the state. This legislation will open that experience up to even more people.

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National Safe Boating week is now thru the 7th

The Grand Rapids Power Squadron announced today that June 1st through the 7th is National Safe Boating Week, and the GRPS is encouraging the more than 665,000 registered boaters in the state to take an active part in making the sport more safe by enrolling in boating courses. Michigan is one of the top five boating states in the nation. Unfortunately, only 5% of all registered boaters ever participate in safe boating courses. The GRPS is trying to better those odds by offering boating education all year.

The Grand Rapids Power Squadron is an organization devoted to boating safety. Classes available through the GRPS include: Junior Navigator,

Navigator, Seamanship, Piloting, Advanced Piloting, Weather, Sailing, Marine Electronics, and Engine Maintenance. D.I. "Jack" Doyle is Commander of the local Power Squadron, and is instructor for the Weather course. He is a strong supporter of women's taking an active part in boating.

Also targeted during Safe Boating Week is the problem of alcohol. To many, boating for the weekend includes alcohol, and the GRPS wants to stress that drinking boaters have the same effect as drinking drivers - alcohol and boating don't mix.

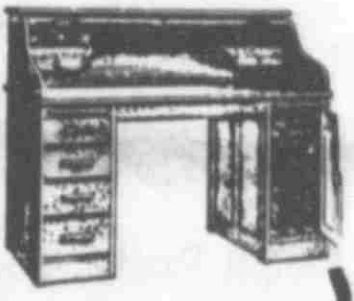

Post Office gets new steps and more

Downtown Lowell is experiencing a change for the better as two inner-city sites within 100 yards from each other are currently being renovated. Construction has been underway at the parking lot on the corner of W. Main and S. Broadway since two weeks ago, and workers

started construction at the post office three weeks ago.
One of the changes at the post office deemed necessary by Postmaster Charlie Doyle is the replacement of the front steps. During the time when contractors Doesa & Smith Associated from Kalamazoo will be working on the deteriorating steps, post office customers should use the back entrance for their postal needs, located off Chatham.
The renovation may be a temporary inconvenience to some, but according to Doyle, "it'll be worth it in the long-run."
"The change was definitely necessary," Doyle said. "I've been postmaster here for 10 years

and it's the biggest and best change I've seen here. Much renovation is underway at the building, but the most important change is the replacement of the front steps."
Some other improvements at the post office include: replacing the existing windows with energy efficient windows, adding a barrier-free handicapped ramp, replacing the front sidewalk, landscaping the entire front of the building, installing a parking area on the south side of the dock and repainting the building's interior.
Doyle also said that he had been trying to get a renovation underway at the 47 year old building for nearly five years and that Lowell residents should be pleased with the improvements. Work is scheduled to be completed sometime in August.

Manager Quada gave the Council and attending public a review of the airport insurance situation. He stated that the \$500,000 a year policy coverage is not sufficient and asked the Council for permission to close the airport to the public based on the liability danger to the municipality. He further stated that we have found a writer for a one million dollar policy, but have not as yet been notified of the premium costs. He further reported that bids for the new police cruiser had been received; noting that bid specifications have not changed in the last 3 to 4 years.

These bids include the trade-in allowance of the 1983 Ford LTD.

Manager Quada requested permission from the Council to notify Harold Zeigler Ford. Councilman Collins inquired about the possibility of the purchase of a front wheel drive vehicle. Manager Quada explained that at this time that vehicle was not offered in the police package.

On the matter of airport insurance, Manager Quada informed the Council that the City had received an insurance proposal from a firm that currently insures the Grand Rapids School of Bible Music. He indicated a proposed cost of \$1,650 for \$1 million coverage. He further noted that a request for a copy of the proposed policy has been made and would possibly be available by the June 3 meeting.

Manager Quada approached the Council on the possible use of a city owned parcel of land. He explained that since the

American Legion has sold their building to private business, they are in the process of acquiring a new location. The possibility of a Community Center, involving the American Legion, Senior Neighbors, and Y.M.C.A. has been developed. Existing monies from the American Legion and possible grant funds from Senior Neighbors could be used for construction with land contribution coming from the city.

He requested the Council, when able, review the land site (intersection of Jackson, Division, and Front) or make other recommendations.

Manager Quada requested an Executive Session of Council for discussion of property acquisition.

Councilman Fonger offered congratulations to Manager Quada for a fine job he had done on Mayor Exchange Day with the City of Algonac, which was held May 19, 1986.

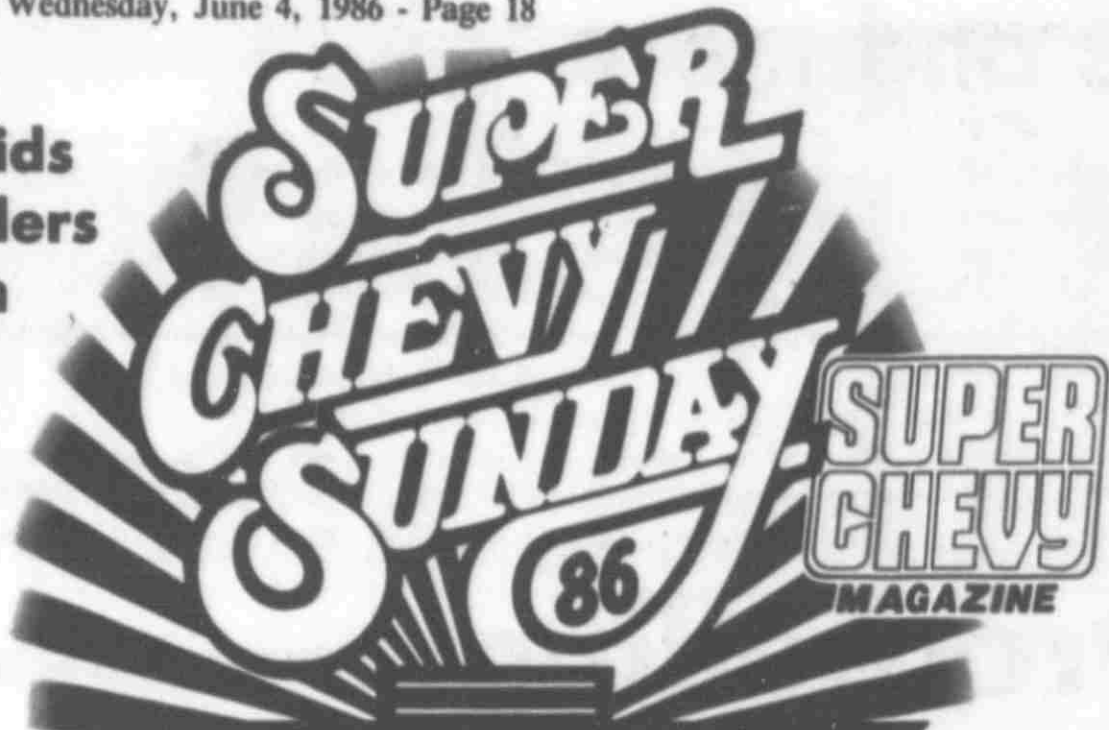
Mayor Maatman indicated that members of the City Council have been invited to participate in the Memorial Day Parade. Those present accepted.

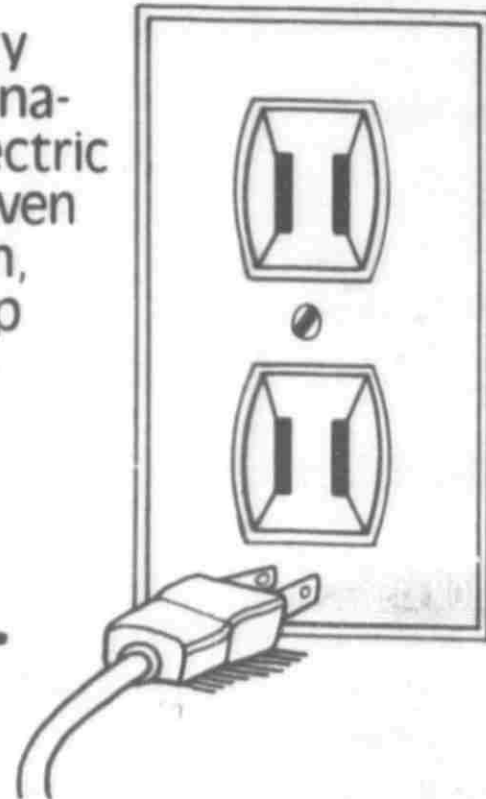

Precinct No. 3: Vergennes Township Hall, corner of Bailey Drive and Parnell Avenue in Vergennes Township. The third precinct consists of the Townships of Ada, Cannon, Grattan and Vergennes in Kent County and Keene Township in Ionia County.

Lowell City Council approves budget

The Lowell City Council dealt with the city's 1986-87 budget at their regular meeting of Monday, June 2. The budget calls for a tax levy of 12.383 mills, a 1.05 mill increase. Water rates are also rising by six cents per 1,000 gallons. The budget calls for total expenditures of \$2,334,976.00 over the coming year.

When Lowell City Manager Ray Quada unveiled his proposed budget in April, he cited higher insurance premiums as one of the principle reasons for an increase in taxes. Each mill assessed by the city generates about \$38,000 in revenue, and most of the extra mill assessed this year will indeed be gobbled up by higher insurance premiums.

Quada told the councilmembers that copies of the budget have been available to the public at city hall and the library, and he reported that he had received no written comments concerning the document. No one was present at Monday's public hearing to offer any statement regarding the budget. Councilman Jack Fonger made a motion for approval, Councilman Dean Collins seconded and the budget was unanimously approved.

Only \$212 separated the three local auto dealers bidding on a new police cruiser for the city. The three dealers varied by \$600 on the trade-in value of an old police cruiser. In the end, Zeigler Ford was awarded the bid as they had the lowest price at \$11,137 and the highest trade-in offer at \$1,700.

Quada asked the council to set a public hearing to approve changes the city's building inspection ordinances. Quada proposes to contract Joe Nowak to conduct electrical and mechanical inspections for the city. Nowak is a licensed inspector, and currently performs these types of inspections for Vergennes Township. The city is currently relying on the services of a state inspector who has four or five counties in his jurisdiction. "I think we can provide faster service and do an adequate job by using our own inspector," Quada told the council. The council agreed to place the issue before a public hearing on Monday, July 7. Quada said he'd get back to the council with a schedule of recommended rates for various inspections if the ordinance passes.

Quada informed the council he had received notification that Rite-Aid Pharmacy has applied for a S.D.M. license (take-out beer and wine) from the State Liquor Control Commission.

A public hearing was set for Monday, July 7 to hear a request for re-zoning from Markland Associates. Markland wants to re-zone a 135' X 276' parcel on West Main Street to C-2 commercial. They propose building a parking lot on the site.

Mayor James Maatman appointed Kevin Smith to a seat on the Lowell Planning Commission.
