## Chinese exchange counselor to work at YMCA

Chinese games, folk dances and paintings will be added to this summer's list of activities at the Helen Look Y-Day Camp as foreign exchange counselor Londy Chan from Hong Kong will share some life-styles of her native country.

Chan, 22, started Monday as the arts and crafts director at the weekly day-camp being held at the Lowell Boy Scout Cabin. She arrived in Lowell around 1:00 last Thursday morning after

a week's stay in Los Angeles, three days in San Francisco and over a week in Vancouver, B.C.

Lowell YMCA executive director Jim Hodges requested a foreign counselor from the International Camp Counselor Program (ICCP) and he was given three names. Chan was chosen, he said, because of China's extremely large population.

"The other two choices were from England and Spain, but I chose Londy because the campers will benefit most from her,

because she is from a very influential nation."

Chan was working with Hong Kong's YMCA before she applied to the ICCP. She will graduate at the end of next year from the Chinese University of Hong Kong with a degree in elementary education.

"She is very personable," Hodges said. "She is easy to talk with and she is adapting very well to America, Lowell in particular."

Chan, the first foreign counselor in Lowell's YMCA, will be staying at Hodges' home for two weeks, then she will live with

other Lowell families, including Jack and Gail Thomet, Chuck and Norene Myers, the Arno Driedger family and the David Douma family.

Chan has enjoyed her stay in America and she is looking forward to learning a lot from her visit.

"Lowell is very different from Hong Kong, but I like it here," Chan said. "I like America a lot, it's very fun here."

"In Los Angeles the people are cold," Chan said. "But they like to have a lot of good times. Lowell is very nice, everyone is friendly here."

## Lowell School Board Notes:

The Lowell Board of Education held its regular meeting on Monday, June 9, 1986.

During the recognition of the audience, members of the Soccer Club donated uniforms and equipment to the Board and expressed their thanks for establishing Soccer as a varsity sport. Tony Stencil from the Knights of Columbus, presented a \$500 check to the school board to be used for special education. Several Bushnell parents expressed their concern over the overcrowding at Bushnell and the need to solve teacher and administrator differences at Bushnell.

Cora Troy, Virginia Fonger, and Olive Courser, all long-time employees who are retiring this year, were publicly recognized for their many years of dedicated service to the students of Lowell Area Schools. The Board then appointed Norm Byrne to complete the third year of a four year term being vacated by Jo Murphy effective July 1, 1986.

Following the payment to bills, high school students, Tricia Frey and Jami Andrews, reported on the 1985-86 activities of Teens Involved, and the Board approved a donation of \$300 for next year's program.

In matters relating to personnel, the Board accepted the resignation of Julie Niemela from her coaching position of 7th grade Boys B Basketball and the 6th grade Girls Intramural Directorship. High School Spanish teacher, Virginia Weber, was appointed as the High School Library and Media Specialist, and high school resource room teacher, Richard Douglass, was appointed as the new teacher consultant for learning disabled.

Discussion was then held on the Bushnell overcrowding situation and the Board's plan to establish public hearings during the 1986-87 school year with a commitment made by the Board at the January or February 1987 meeting to take affect September of 1987.

In the next item of business, the Board held a budget hearing on the 1986-87 general fund budget. Following the hearing, the Board adopted the general fund budget resolution for 1986-87 in the amount of 9.5 million dollars. The tax levy was then established for 1986 as follows:

The Board then adopted the Michigan High School Athletic Association, Inc. membership resolution for the 1986-87 school year.

In other action, the Board awarded the bid for the supply and installation of a gas fired hot water booster heater and water supply system at the high school, middle school, and Alto Elementary School to Rite-way Plumbing and Heating, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$25,560.

The Board approved the energy and maintenance projects for the 1987-88 school year and identified Progressive Engineering as the Board's construction manager for these projects. Approval was given to purchase a 3/4 ton Ford pick-up truck for the Maintenance Department from Harold Zeigler Ford, and the bid for tile replacement in the high school art room was awarded to Dewey Prins Ceramic Tile in an amount not to exceed \$7,240.

In matters relating to curriculum, the Board adopted the social studies curriculum for grades 4-7, K-5 vocal music curriculum, and revisions to the high school and middle school home economics curriculum.

In the last item of business, the Board accepted an offer from Leonard H. Denhouer to purchase the school's 18 acres located at approximately the 2800 block of Alden Nash for \$24,000 on a land contract with \$3,500 down, \$205 per month payment, at 10% interest, with a 7-year pay-off after closing.

## Helen Look Y-Day Camp underway

The Helen Look Y-Day Camp started its first five-day session Monday and the weekly sessions will continue until Aug. 11.

Children entering grades 1-6 next fall may enroll for a session the Monday before the session begins. Campers are placed in groups of seven to eight based upon grade with a counselor and a counselor-in-training. The Y-

Day Camp Bus will provide transportation with five area pick-up/drop-off points.

There are 10 weekly Y-Camp sessions, with camp activity taking place at the Lowell Boy Scout Cabin Mondays thru Thursdays, and an away trip on Fridays going to a different location each week. The noon lunch and quiet time, with a sack lunch from home and drink provided

by the "Y," gives a mid-day break to the active schedule.

Y-Day campers will take part in hiking, songs, archery, crafts, swimming and other elements of camping.

Every year Lowell schools distribute the scholarships which are funded by the First Congregational Church in Lowell. The Look Scholarships are in honor of Helen Look Daley, who left over \$1.5 million in her will to the City of Lowell and the First Congregational Church of Lowell.

Five scholarships for \$750 each were awarded to First Congregational Church members who were high school seniors going to their first year of college. Another three awards for \$500 each were given to church members in their second year or more in college who will be continuing their education.

## Jean McKay donates stain glass window to library

A very special gift for the Graham Building, which houses the Lowell Library and YMCA, has been made. Literally, by Jean McKay. The exterior of this 1873 Italianate two-family structure, one of the earliest brick residences in the town, was recently refurbished under a grant from the Look Memorial Fund. It was then discovered that a small aperture above the second floor windows, under the central roof arch, was covered only by screening which had been

masked by spray painting. The shape of this opening is unusual, combining a triangle and trefoil. Surmising that the window had once been filled with a stained glass pattern, Mrs. McKay volunteered to design and make an appropriate replacement, working without recompense, in a medium which has been a hobby of hers for several years. Using the copper foil method to create the piece, she chose a creamy "ripple" glass for the background, with teal green for the

edging and the "G" which centers it, colors which match the painted wood trim on the building. A plexiglass sheet has been placed in front to the stained glass for protection. Residents of Lowell may well be proud of this handsome anti-

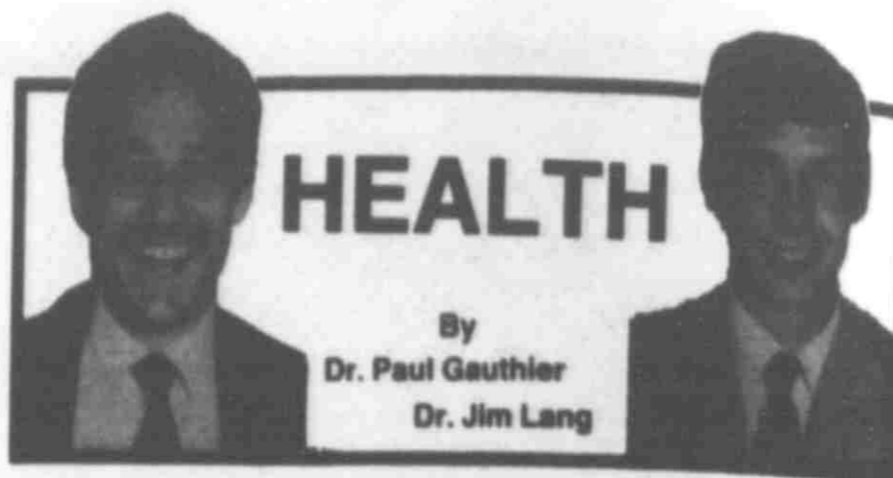
## In the Service

### THE INGROWN TOENAIL

Anyone that has experienced an ingrown toenail knows just how painful it can be. Today we will be discussing some preventative measures as well as treatment of this annoying problem.

An ingrown toenail may occur on any toe but is most commonly seen on the great toe. Generally it is caused by a rolling of the toenail edge under the surface of the rest of the nail. This edge tends to grow into the tissue below the nail irritating the tissue and causing swelling. Occasionally, during trimming of the nail, a small piece of nail at the edge will be missed and this too can grow into the fleshy part of the toe.

In the early stages, ingrown toenails can be treated conservatively with a few simple techniques. Prevention is important. Wear shoes with adequate space for the feet. High heels, and shoes with pointed toes cause pressure leading to further problems. The nail should be trimmed straight across. If the nail is thickened, an emery board can be used to file the middle portion thinner than the outer edges which prevents rolling under of the nail edges. If a tendency for ingrowing is noted despite the above preventative measures, you should soak the foot in warm water twice daily for 20-30 minutes and place small pieces of cotton under the nail corners.

Once the fleshy tissue beside the nail becomes swollen, red and painful, further treatment may be required. Occasionally antibiotics and warm soaks will be enough to treat the problem but sometimes surgery will be needed. Surgery on an ingrown toenail is quite simple and is usually performed in your doctor's office under local anesthesia. The simplest form of surgery requires removal of the toenail edge causing the problem. After several months the toenail edge grows back and by using the preventative measures described above, the problem should not recur. In some cases, a wedge of tissue is removed along with the nail plate and root to prevent recurrent ingrown nails. Post-operatively, the patient will experience some discomfort, but this is managed by elevating the foot, soaking daily and oral pain medication.

In summary the best treatment for the ingrown nails is prevention -- use common sense in selection of shoes and nail trimming.

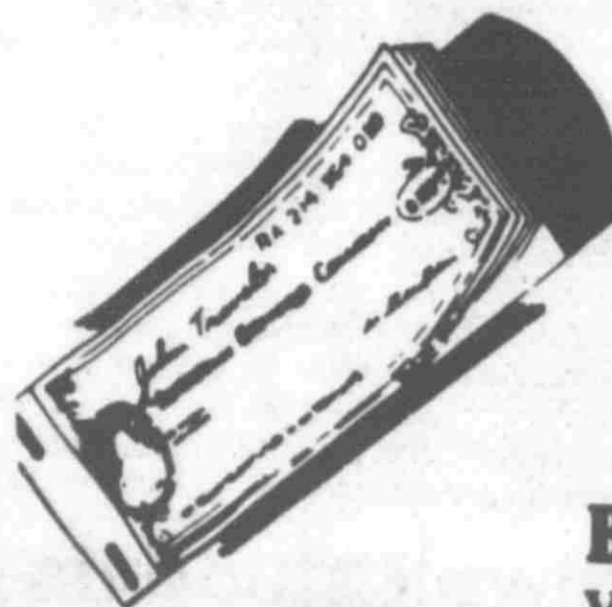

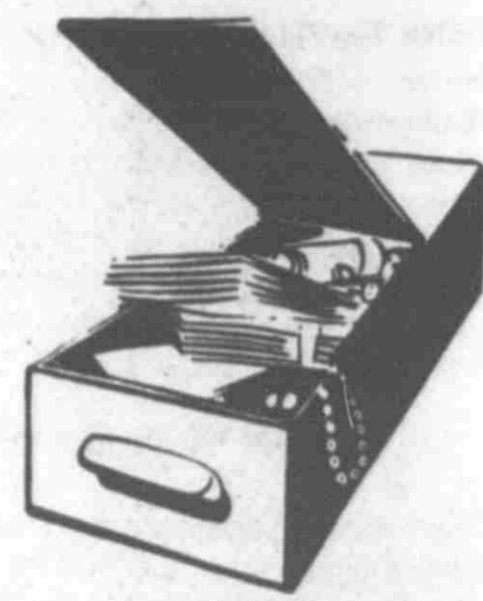

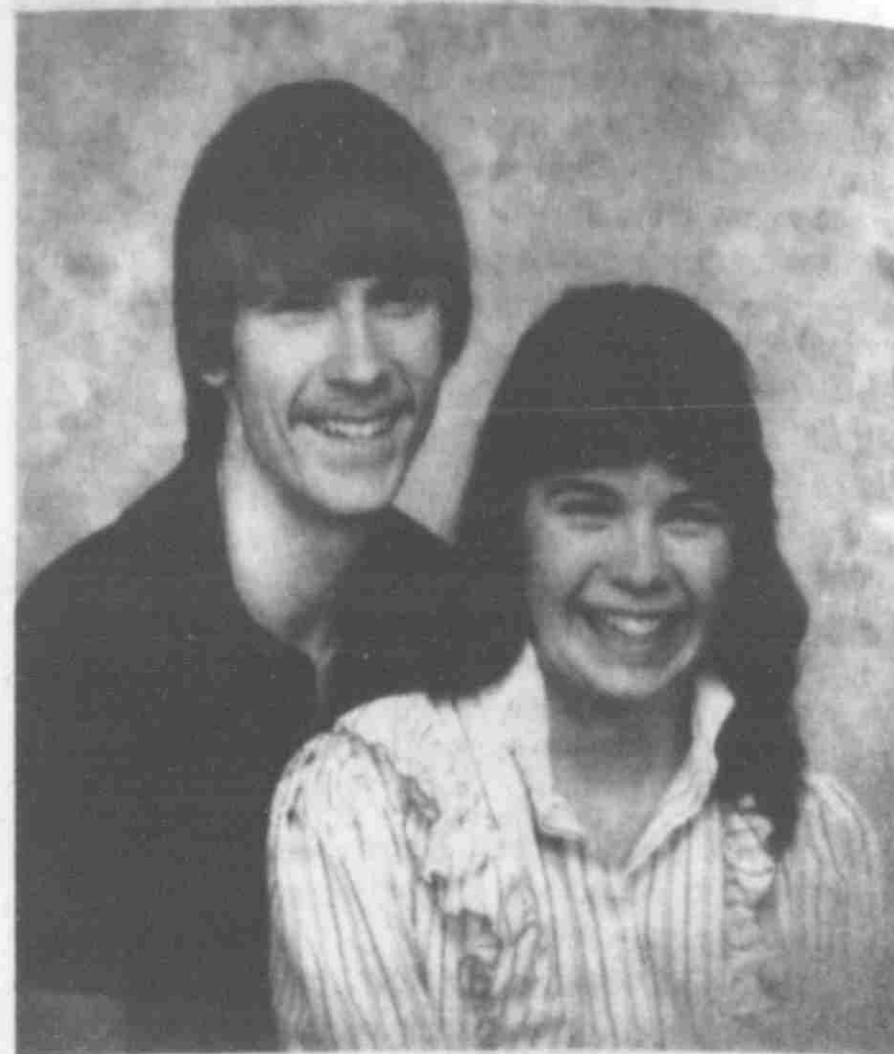

### Moore receives Louise Harper Memorial Scholarship

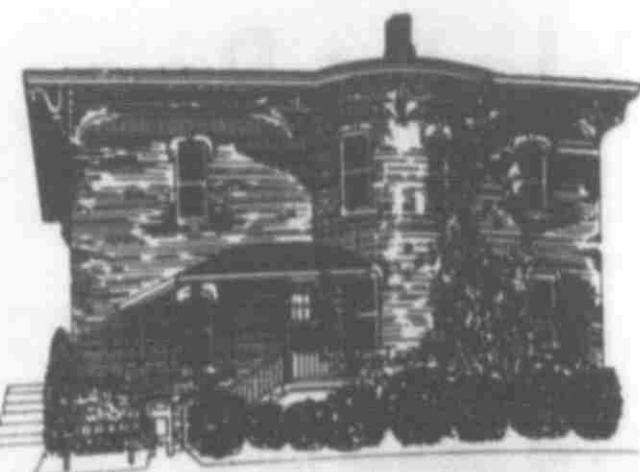

### Library system holds reading club

The Kent County Library System will be holding reading clubs this summer for children aged 3-15 at all 17 Kent County branches.

Sign-ups for the free admission clubs will begin June 9 at all 17 branches and continue throughout the summer. Children are encouraged to sign-up early so they can complete more books and earn more prizes.

According to Mary Frydrych, co-ordinator of children's services at the Kent County Library System, the annual program has been very successful.

"It's very traditional," Frydrych said. "It's a great chance for the children to read at their own speed and get rewarded for what they read."

There are three different clubs for the program. The clubs are designated by age group.

The "Up, Up and Away Book Club" is designed for non-readers in the 3-6 age group. The children's parents get involved by "sharing" or reading to their children. For every 10 books read the child will receive a special prize.

Six to 12 year olds have available for them the "Books or Bust Reading Club." According to Frydrych, this is the most popular club amongst the children. Participants select library books at their own reading level, and earn prizes from Putt-Putt Golf, Showcase Cinema and more.

Children in the 10-15 age group who seek a challenge can join the "Hot Stuff Book Club." Participants will be expected to read materials from a "challenge" list prepared by the children's service librarians to qualify for prizes from Showcase Cinema and Putt-Putt Golf. Some of the authors on the list are Mark Twain, Robert Louis Stevenson and Arthur Conan Doyle. Readers in this club will also be allowed to rank books that they've read.

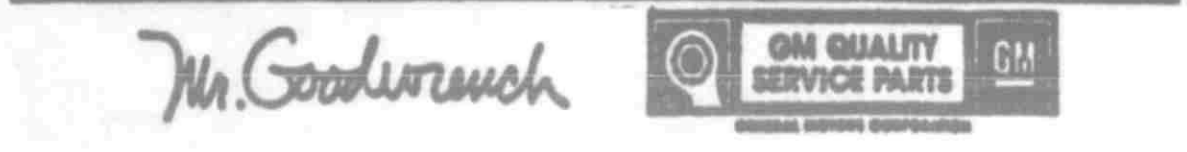

# Lowell YMCA offers a variety of fitness activities for the summer

America is getting into shape and Lowell is no exception. Lowell has witnessed a total participation of 9,240 in its 24 year-round athletic programs last year.

This summer the Lowell "Y" is offering seven activities to Lowell and neighboring communities. Open swimming, swimming lessons, youth softball, the Helen Look Y-Day Camp and adult swimnastics, fitness classes and softball leagues are all attracting local fun and

fitness lovers.

Open swim at the King Memorial Pool was the largest single activity last year with 4,650 participants. This year the pool is a refreshing area for over 200 children everyday with an additional 100 taking swimming lessons each day.

Other big turn-outs by the "Y" are the day-camp, softball leagues and the fitness classes. According to executive director at the Lowell YMCA, Jim Hodges, the fitness classes have

doubled in size since he joined the Lowell "Y" 4 1/2 years ago.

The fitness classes are aerobic in nature as they center on bettering the heart and lungs. Ironically, the classes decreased in participation during the warmer weather according to Hodges.

"It's kind of surprising that fewer people sign-up during the summer months," Hodges said. "That's when people are outside more and they want to look better."

Hodges said that the open

swimming is by far the most popular event but the softball leagues also attract a large number of athletes. There are currently 56 adult softball teams and 16 youth squads, including tee-ball, cadet and junior-ball crews. All softball games take place at the recreation park and Creekside Park.

The adult swimnastics water fitness class incorporates the use of water to provide natural resistance as participants exercise to music in the swimming pool. No

swimming ability is necessary.

The YMCA also offers a youth tennis program, an instructional series for children aged eight to 14. Kim McFall, a member of Lowell's tennis team and an instructor for youth tennis at Alto Baptist Church, will be teaching the two groups, pee-wees, for ages eight to 10, and the junior development league, for 11 to 14 year olds.

Hodges is expecting another successful summer for both the

YMCA and the people of Lowell.

"Most of Lowell will be involved in at least one 'Y' program this summer," Hodges said. "88 teams will be playing some type of ball this summer and we're expecting our other summer programs to produce good turn-outs."
