Historic Society wants to move the old St. Mary's Church to Fallasburg

Owner's of Johnson's Food Basket have made plans to build a retail shopping center next to the grocery store, but they must first either demolish or re-locate the old St. Mary's Church.

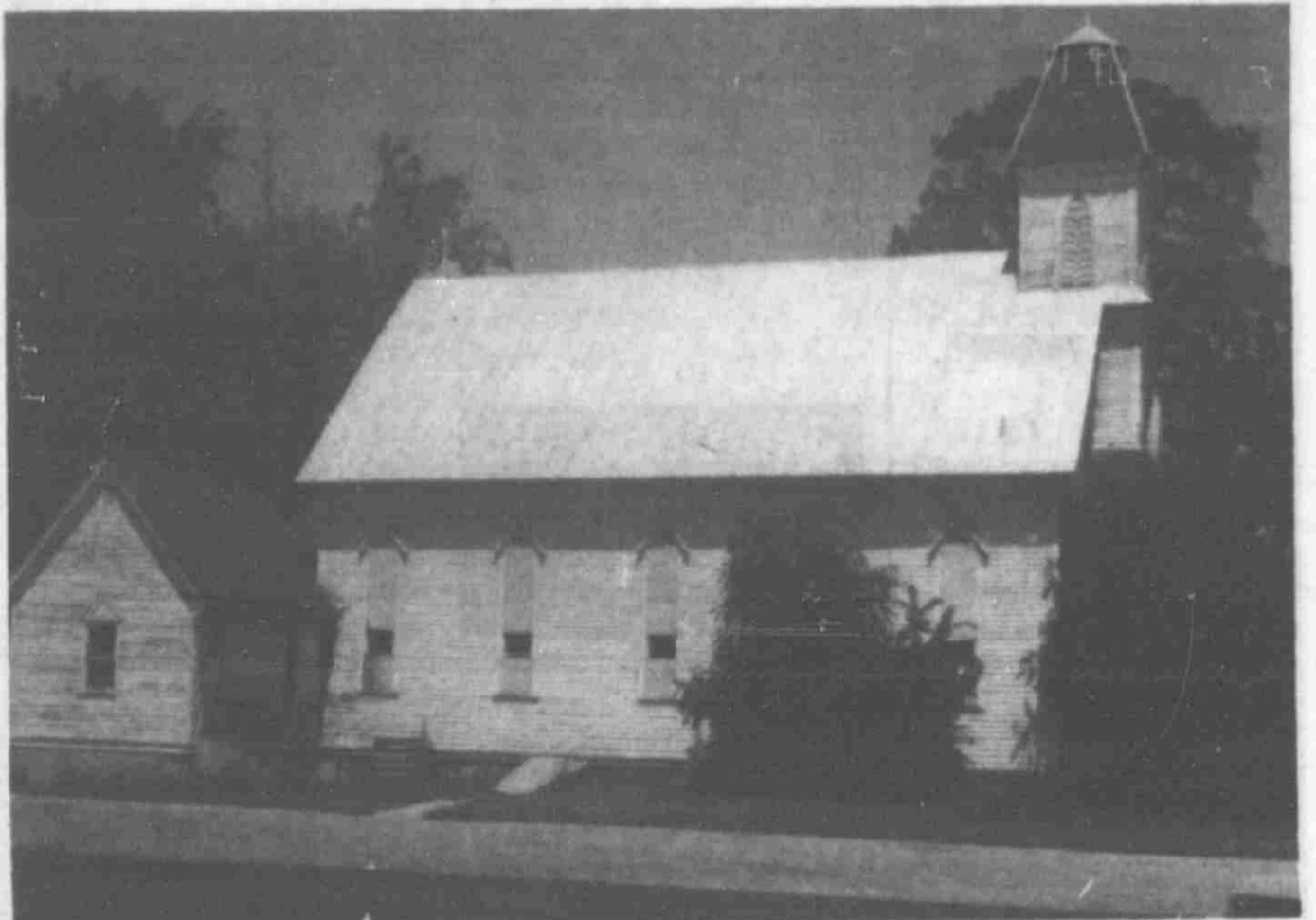
The location of the church, behind the grocery store, is where the future retail center would be. Phil Johnson, co-owner of Johnson's Food Basket and the Church, said that the church will be demolished unless the West Central Michigan Historic Society can conjure enough money to have it relocated to Fallasburg village.

The Society needs "somewhere between \$10,000 and 20,000," to re-locate the church, according to Judy Baird, an officer at the Society. The Society currently hasn't raised any money since Johnson offered the church to them last Saturday.

Johnson explained that he is giving the Society four to six weeks to announce if they will have enough money to move the church. He plans on starting construction at the future mall within four to five months.

"Downtown Lowell is growing very fast, and we want to catch on with it," Johnson said.

The Historic Society has been working for over 25 years to preserve Fallasburg Village. The Vil-

lage is a type of an outdoor Lowell history lesson as it contains buildings that date back to 1837.

Some buildings currently in the Village include the Old Fallasburg Schoolhouse, which was restored and made into a museum, a Stagecoach Inn, the old post office, a general store and blacksmith shoppe.

Also a part of the Village is the original house of John Fallas, built when his family settled here from New York in 1837.

Baird said that she is positive that the Society can raise the needed money, but it will take some help, she added.

"We're looking for contributions from individuals or

groups," Baird said. "We have a short time to raise the money, but I think we can do it. Most of the families who go to the new St. Mary's Church will hopefully donate some money."

Baird added that the Society is a non-profit organization, which means donations are tax-deductible.

Work progresses on Middle School

A 1.9 millage increase passed last October has enabled the Lowell School District to begin construction on two school roofs this summer.

Grand Rapids based Vanderbrook Roofing Inc. started replacing the middle school roof Wednesday, June 11, and they will begin working on Alto Elementary's roof in August. The entire middle school roof is being replaced, while Alto's roof is to be repaired above the boiler room and kitchen only.

Construction at the middle school is scheduled to be completed by August 15. Alto's roof will be done "a couple of days after we finish the middle school roof," said an official at Vanderbrook.

"The middle school was very much in need of a new roof," said Lowell Superintendent Fritz Esch. "Leaking was a big problem on the current roof. Water was entering the building, through the roof, at several locations."

The middle school's new roof will be a trocal roof, a polyvinyl chloride white roof which will be 60 mills thick. The current roof is a build-up of three layers of tar.

The advantages of the new roof will include being stronger

and lasting longer. The current roof is 14 years old, and the new roof will have a life expectancy of 25 years.

The insulation will be tapered at various heights on the new roof, enabling water to drain easier. According to Esch, 75% of the insulation between the de-

cking of the current roof and the first layer of the roof was wet, inhibiting heat retention.

Another plus of the new roof is that it will be reduced in weight. The future roof will be unballasted, containing no gravel or broken stone, which will lower the weight of the roof.

The millage proposal passed on its first attempt last October, and it included an assessment of 1.9 mills for 1986, and 1.4 mills for the following seven years. All revenues will be used strictly for roof repairs and making energy efficient improvements to the district's buildings.

PINWORMS

Pinworm infestation is a common disease seen frequently in the office. It is probably the most common parasitic infestation in humans in the USA. Current estimates are that 4 million American children may be infected.

Pinworm infection occurs only in humans and is usually seen in children between 5 and 10 years old. This intestinal parasite inhabits the large bowel of the affected individual. The fertilized female worm travels down the bowel to the perianal skin and deposits her eggs. The eggs are very small and can usually only be seen under magnification. These eggs become infective in a few hours and may re-infect many by contaminating food, water or from hand to mouth spread. Pinworms are highly contagious and infection rates can reach up to 50% in some groups of school children or day care centers.

Signs and symptoms of infestation can vary. The most common symptom is severe anal itching which usually occurs in the evening or night when the female worm emerges to lay her eggs. Symptoms may also include restlessness, fatigue, irritability, sleeplessness and vague gastrointestinal symptoms. Many children will have no symptoms at all!

Diagnosis is made through the use of a simple test - "The Scotch Tape Test." Scotch tape is placed, sticky side, to the perianal area and then removed and applied to a slide early in the morning before bathing. Examination under a microscope will reveal the presence of eggs in a positive test. The test is usually done on 3 consecutive mornings.

Treatment is also quite simple. Usually a one dose tablet is given which clears the infestation. Often the entire household will be treated. Prevention is also important. Frequent washing of the hands and good hygiene practices can help prevent the spread of this disease. Alertness to the symptoms of excessive perianal itching, irritability, and sleeplessness will help combat the spread of the infestation that may affect as many as one in five school children.

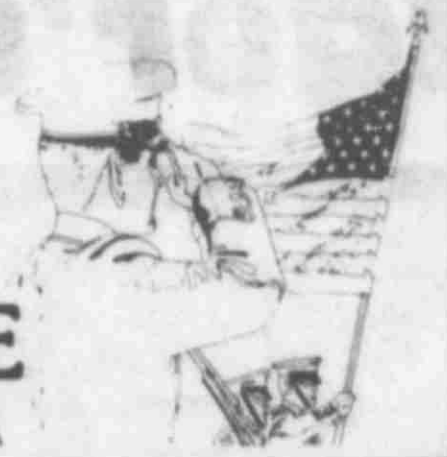

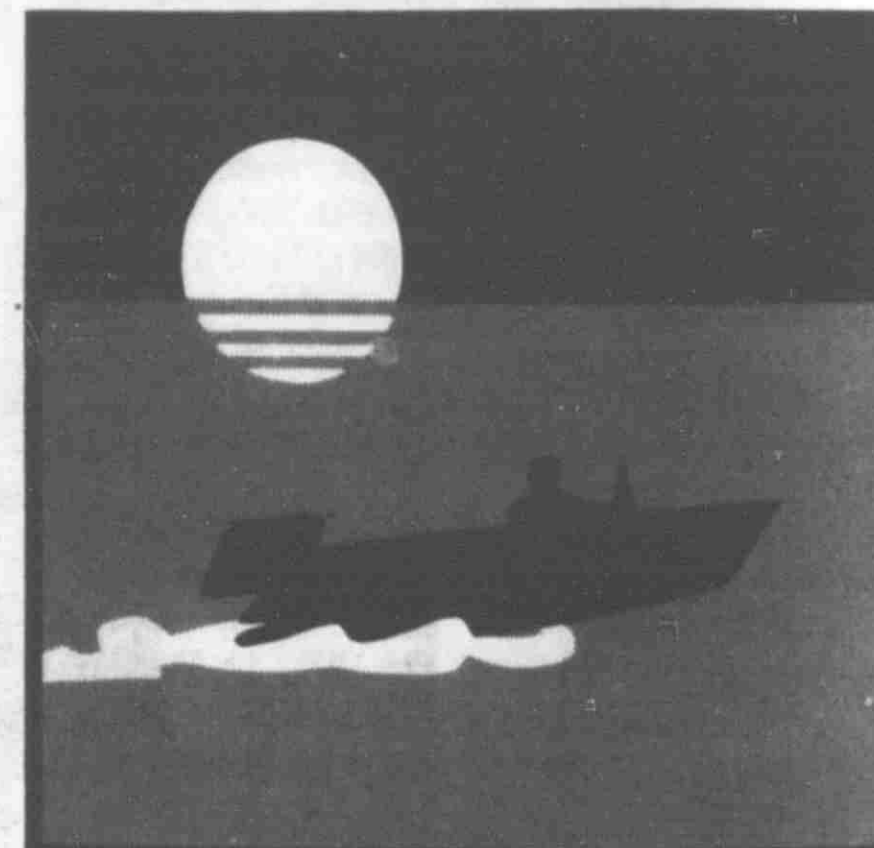
