Hot deals on wheels!!!

The west side of Lowell has been like a carnival since last week's announcements of ultra-low financing on 1986 automobiles. Lowell's four new car dealers have attracted more people than Lowell has seen since the Gus Macker Tournament. The car lots are swarming with customers in search of the car of their dreams at interest rates as low as 2.4 percent.

General Motors set the country on its ear last Wednesday when they announced 2.9 percent financing on most of their 1986 models. Lowell's two GM dealers, Thomet Chevrolet and Buick and Wittenbach Olds, Pontiac, GMC, immediately became busier than most employees can remember. GM's 2.9 percent financing is offered on loans with terms up to 36 months. A 4.8 percent rate is offered on loans up to 48 months. Also, rebates of \$500 to \$1,500 are offered to cash buyers. Denny Thomet, Sales Manager at Thomet Chevrolet and Buick, estimates that they have 60 units on hand, and expects his inventory to last for only ten days. Bob Kiel, General Manager at Wittenbach Olds, Pontiac, GMC, says he has about 175 units, and also stated that his inventory is going fast. The GM offer is good until October 8, or until supplies are depleted.

Kiel said, "This is a tremendous opportunity for the buyer. It is strictly a GM promotion, with no dealer participation, so we're discounting our cars just like a normal year end clearance, plus all the GM incentives."

Thomet said he attended a sales meeting last week at which a Vice President of GM emphatically told the group that GM would not introduce any new incentive plans after this program expires. Thomet predicted that this plan will likely cut into sales of the new 1987 models which are already arriving. He added that the year end should be propped up by the new federal tax plan which will not allow sales tax as a deduction and will cut back on the interest deduction. "The new tax plan goes into effect January 1, 1987, so many people may want to buy this year," Thomet said.

Ford and Chrysler couldn't sit by and watch GM steal all the thunder, so they both announced similar plans late last week. Henry VanderVennen, President of Vennen Chrysler, Dodge, Plymouth, Inc., said they got the word from Chrysler at 3:00 Friday afternoon, just in time to close for the long holiday weekend. "I'm sure we missed out on some business by being closed," Vennen said, "But my staff needs that time with their

families." Chrysler's program offers the lowest rate of all at 2.4 percent on 24 month loans. They also offer 3.6 percent on 36 months and 4.8 on 48 months. Rebates of up to \$1,500 are also offered to cash buyers. Vennen pointed out that buyers may want to take a long look at taking rebate and 9.9 percent financing on 60 months instead of the low interest rates. "This type of plan can get the monthly payments down to a more affordable level for many people," Vennen said. Vennen says he has about 100

units on hand that qualify for the program, but added that they may go fast. "I've never seen anything quite like this in my 35 years in the business," Vennen said.

Mark Powell, General Manager at Harold Zeigler Ford is offering a 175 unit inventory at Ford's low financing rates. Ford's plan offers 2.9 percent on loans up to 36 months, 5.9 on 48 months and 9.9 on 60 months. Rebates of up to \$1,000 are also offered instead of the low financing.

Powell says his program runs until October 9, but added, "I'm afraid the pickin's are going to get slim real fast". "I can't tell you how long my inventory will last, all I know is the place is packed right now," Powell said in a Tuesday morning phone conversation.

As of this writing there are over 400 cars and trucks with year end closeout prices and unbelievably low financing available in Lowell. If you are in need of a car, it would seem that now is the time to buy!

Lowell woman is injured



A Lowell woman was injured last Friday when the auto she was driving went out of control and into a deep ditch on M-21 near Cumberland. Ann Conrad, 18, of 328 N. Jefferson, lost control of her vehicle as she approached M-21 on Cumberland. She told Kent County Sheriff's Deputies that the power steering and brakes on her older model Lincoln failed as she came down the hill toward the intersection. Conrad careened across M-21 and into a ditch on the south side of the road.

Lowell Rescue personnel labored for several minutes to get Conrad on a backboard and loaded into a Life Ambulance. She was transported to St. Mary's Hospital where she was treated and released. No citation was issued. Lowell Police and Fire personnel also responded to the scene.

ORAL CONTRACEPTIVES: A FEW FACTS YOU SHOULD KNOW PART I

A big question asked by many women of child bearing age who desire contraception is: Should I take the birth control pill (BCP)? In our experience, if a woman wants to avoid becoming pregnant but may wish to conceive in the future, the pill is often a good choice. It is effective, convenient, and --for most women -- free of serious side effects.

There are a few women who should avoid BCPs. These include women who have ever had: blood clots in the lungs or legs; stroke, heart attack or angina; confirmed or suspected cancer of the breast or sex organs; undiagnosed vaginal bleeding; or a liver tumor that developed during BCP use or other estrogen therapy. In addition, women who suspect they might be pregnant should refrain from using BCPs to avoid exposing the child to the hormones in the pills.

Women who smoke -- especially if they are over 35 -- are also at higher risk for various side effects. We believe that all women who take BCPs should have an initial physical exam, including a pap smear and breast exam, and then be examined yearly thereafter, for as long as they take the pill.

Many women ask us if they will have trouble getting pregnant after they stop taking the pill. Studies have indicated that if a woman was fertile before taking the pill, oral contraceptive therapy should not affect her ability to have children later. While some women may experience a short period of readjustment after discontinuing the pill, even these women usually can become pregnant soon.

Following pregnancy and delivery, a woman can again begin taking the BCP. Many doctors recommend that the woman wait two weeks before resuming oral contraceptive use; however, since each person's body is different, a woman should consult with her doctor before going back on the pill. Similarly, nursing mothers should discuss with their doctors whether to refrain from taking oral contraceptives.

As far as the length of time a woman can safely remain on the pill, generally speaking, a healthy young woman can take BCPs continuously until age 35. We believe that after age 35 either the woman or her partner should consider alternate birth control methods or, if they desire, make arrangements for sterilization. 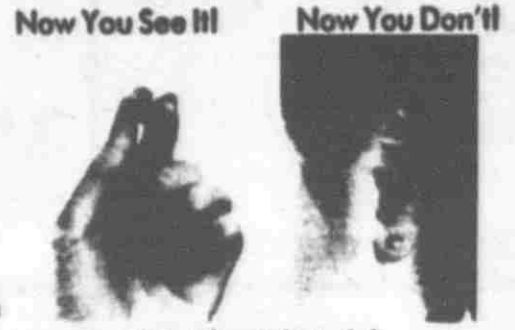

Babysitting class

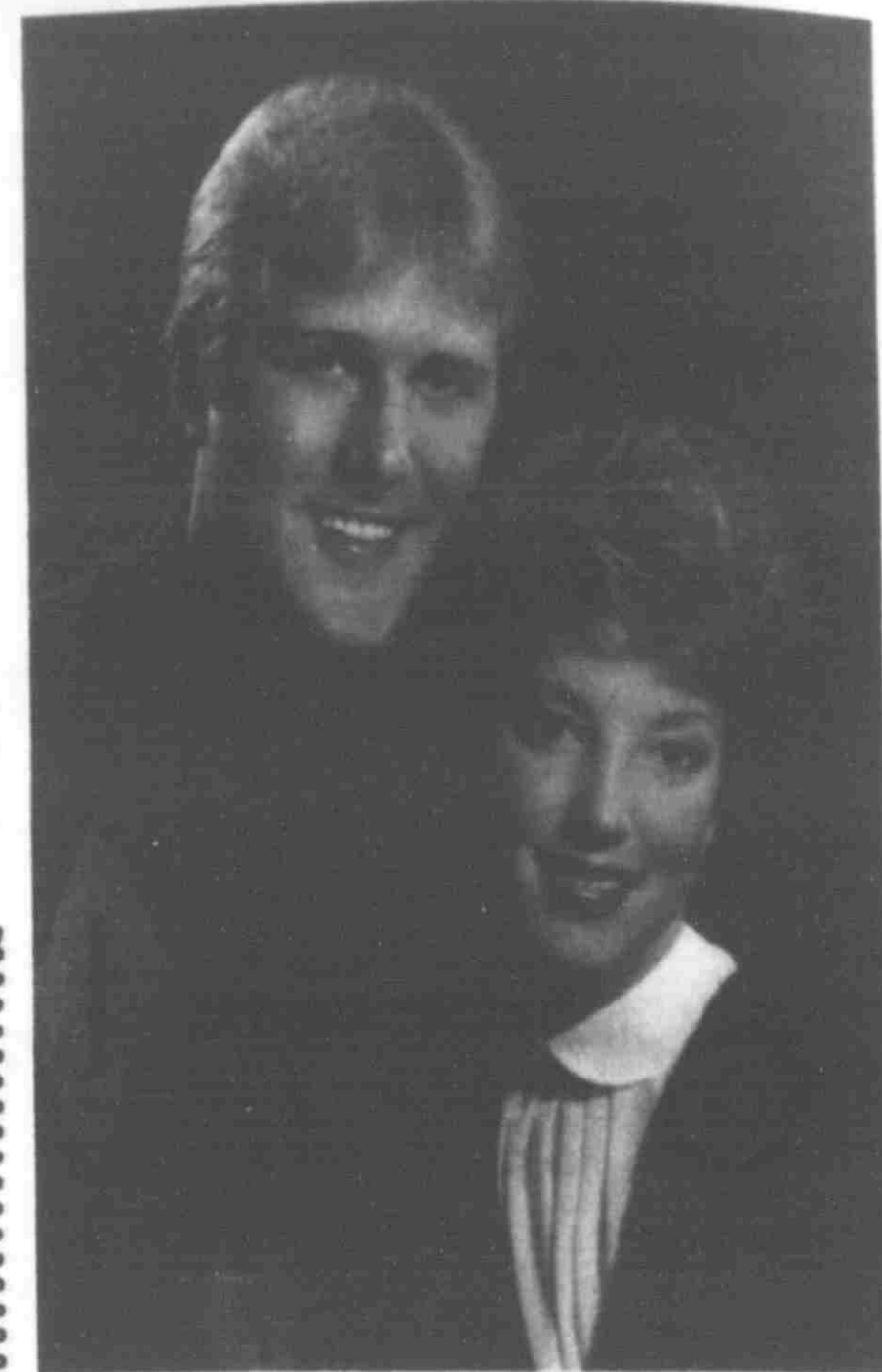

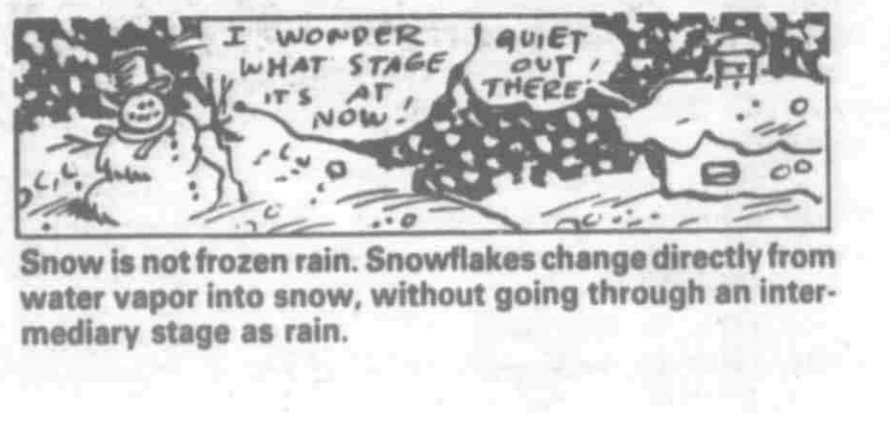

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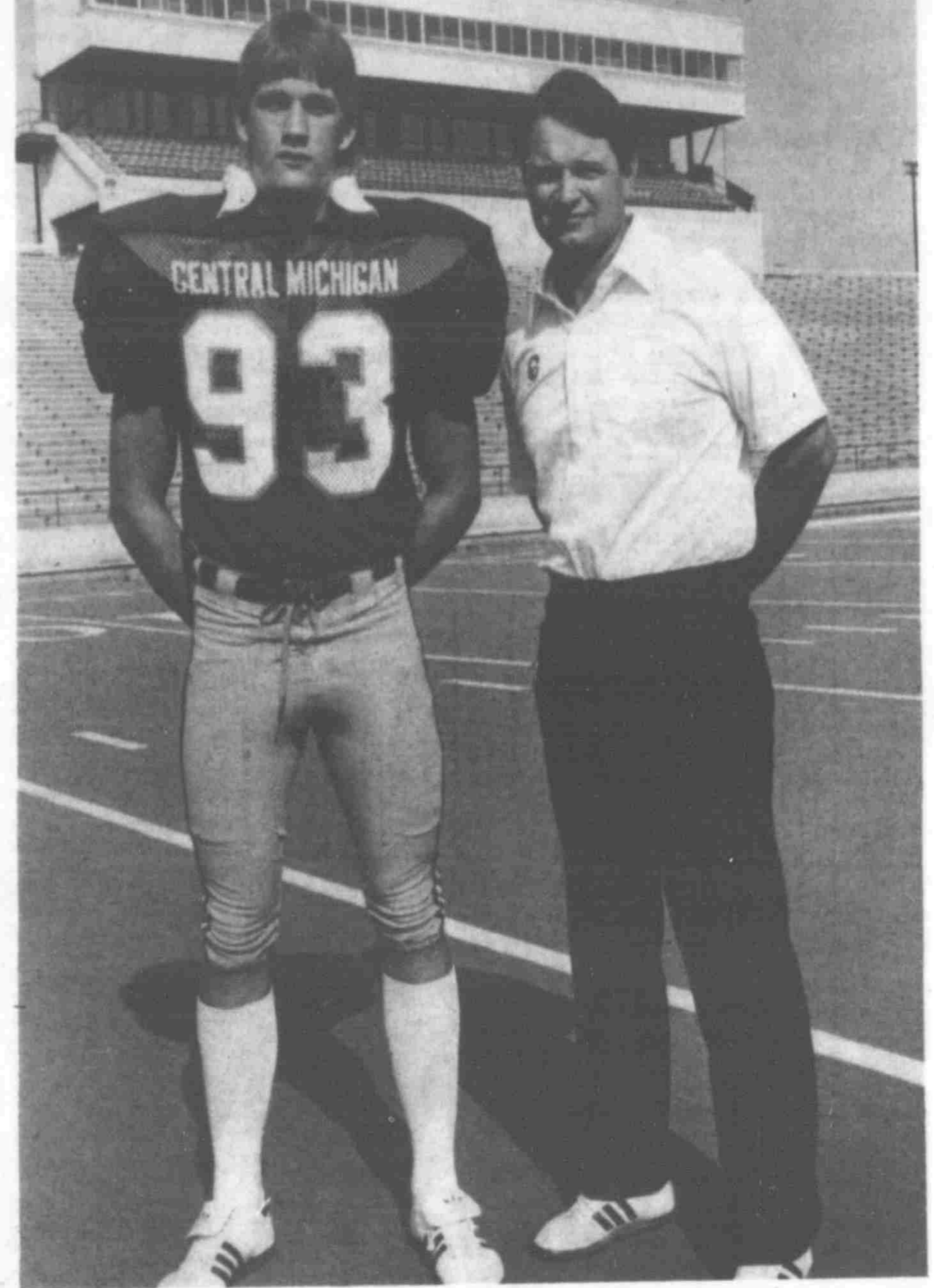

cozy corner by Roger Brown. I had a chance to go flying in a light plane the other day. I get a sneaking feeling that I might have been better off if I had turned down the offer. That old rascal "flying bug" bit me pretty good. I keep catching myself with my mind up in the air, instead of where it ought to be. But, maybe that's not all bad either. I might not have been bitten quite so hard under normal circumstances, but the plane was such a beauty that I just fell in love with flying again. At least this type of flying. The day was misty and overcast when my host and I wheeled his 1946 Aerocina Champ out of the hangar. I only wish I could look so good at forty. I had never flown in a Champ before, but had flown in an old Piper Cub. They are about the same type of aircraft... low and slow. The Champ seats two, fore and aft. It has a 65 horsepower Continental engine that pushes it along at a cruising speed of 65 to 75 miles per hour. It lands at 35 miles per hour and 1,000 to 2,000 feet is a real comfortable altitude for the old bird. Both seats are equipped with a full set of controls, which amount to a stick between your knees, rudder pedals and a throttle lever. The instruments include a compass, altimeter, air speed indicator, tachometer, oil pressure gauge and a fuel gauge. That's it. There are no fancy radios, Lorans, radar or other gadgets to befuddle the novice flyer. All you do is "fly" an old plane like this. I was really impressed with the starter. You turn on the magnetos, crack the throttle, check the wheels and pull the prop through. Hopefully she starts without too much effort. She did. I climbed into the front seat, and I could feel the juices begin to flow as we taxied down the runway. The pilot ran the engine up, and away we went. More than just the plane took off as the wheels left the ground. My imagination began to soar right along with it. I went on my first airplane ride when I was just six or seven years old. I took flying lessons when I was in high school and soloed when I was just sixteen. A lack of money, a need for passing grades, a desire to play sports, mandatory work in my dad's print shop and an interest in girls combined to ground me at about seventeen. I never did continue on to acquire my private pilot's license, and really haven't had a hankering to get back into flying. Not until my ride in that old Champ, that is. The pilot, who is also an instructor, let me take the controls after we were up to about 1,200 feet. I cruised over town, looked over my house, followed the river for awhile, buzzed my mother-in-law's place between here and Saranac, checked out the new roof on the middle school and just had a ball waddling about the sky. I'd rate my ride in that old Champ right up there with my first airplane ride and my first solo flight. All of which are experiences I'll never forget. My wife is not thrilled about the prospects of having an aviator as a husband, but I think she is resigned to the fact that she probably won't be able to stop me if I finally decide to start taking lessons again. The only thing stopping me, is me. I'm just a little bit afraid of creating another monster. I know what happened to me when I started sailing. You couldn't get me off the water for a couple of years. I probably shouldn't let myself get that wrapped up in something at this point in my life, but my mind keeps drifting back to that Champ ride. I'm not sure which will win out, "good sense" or the "flying bug," but if my habits to date are any indication, you'll probably be reading about a few flying experiences in future columns.

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Gubernatorial candidate wants wine cooler deposit

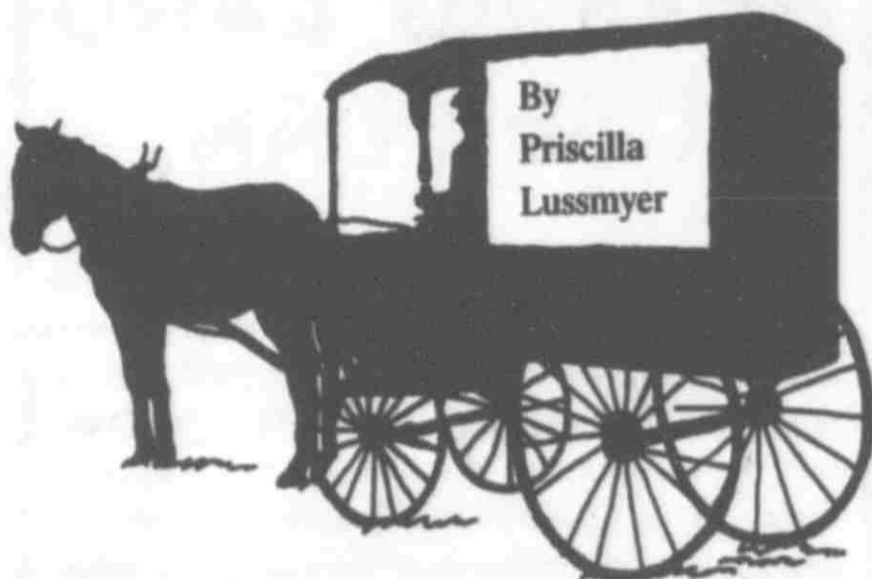
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Ledger Entries ... of 75, 50 and 25 Years Ago



75 YEARS AGO IN THE LEDGER - SEPTEMBER 7, 1911

It's back to school in the front page ads: school dresses, ribbon for sashes, long black ribbed hosiery, schoolbooks and an offer of a free sanitary drinking cup.

The first installment of "The Courtship of Miles Standish," Longfellow's epic poem, covers three columns, but no mention of the author's name.

Numerous advertisement offers to cure clogged liver (Carter's Little Liver Pills), women's complaints (Lydia Pinkham's Vegetable Compound), distemper (Spohn's Distemper Cure), catarrh (Hyomei, pronounced High-o-me), and heart ailments (Dr. Miles Heart Remedy).

The editorial column shows concern for the late-summer fly problem, urging readers to screen, cover and swat. Another opinion suggests that local option against saloons, as practiced successfully by Pottersville (they have closed the jail), might put an end to Lowell's Saturday night "carousels."

50 YEARS AGO IN THE LEDGER - SEPTEMBER 3, 1936

The Strand Calendar lists Bank Night, Screeno, and the personal appearance for one night only of the "Northwest Mounted Police Company" in "Arctic Varieties." This to go with the feature movie, "O'Malley of the Mounted."

School will begin September 14 with "21 efficient teachers," according to Supt. W.W. Gumser, an increase of two for the new Manual Arts and Domestic Science courses. Rural schools started on Monday; their Supt. is Lynn Clark. St. Patrick's enrolls a record 110 students in its twelve-grade school at Parnell.

Many candidates are advertising for the primaries on September 15; in addition, there is a "weekly newspaper straw vote" for president: Roosevelt (Dem.), Landon (Rep.), Lemke (Union), Thomas (Socialist), Colvin (Prohibition) and Browder (Communist).

Twelve local mortgage sale notices take up about 3/4 of page six.

25 YEARS AGO IN THE LEDGER - September 7, 1961

A five-alarm fire destroys a 380 foot turkey coop on Snow Avenue, farm of Rudy Wittenbach, also scorching two fire trucks. Fortunately the turkeys are out on the range. A Ledger reporter who happens to be in the office on this Saturday decides that a fire in a turkey coop isn't worth going to. Oops.

Contracts for the new Alto Elementary School, seven classrooms and an all-purpose room, are let. Supt. Steve Nisbet estimates the total cost of building at \$270,000.

Dr. Ruth Herrick moves to Lowell to practice medicine. Her collections and expertise in pattern glass, particularly Greentown Glass, lead her to dream about establishing a museum someday, perhaps in Lowell.

Eight miles of I-96 around Cascade opens. Praised as a particularly scenic section of the freeway, it replaces the last two-mile stretch of two-lane highway between Detroit and Grand Rapids.
