Lowell is gripped by weekend long warnings

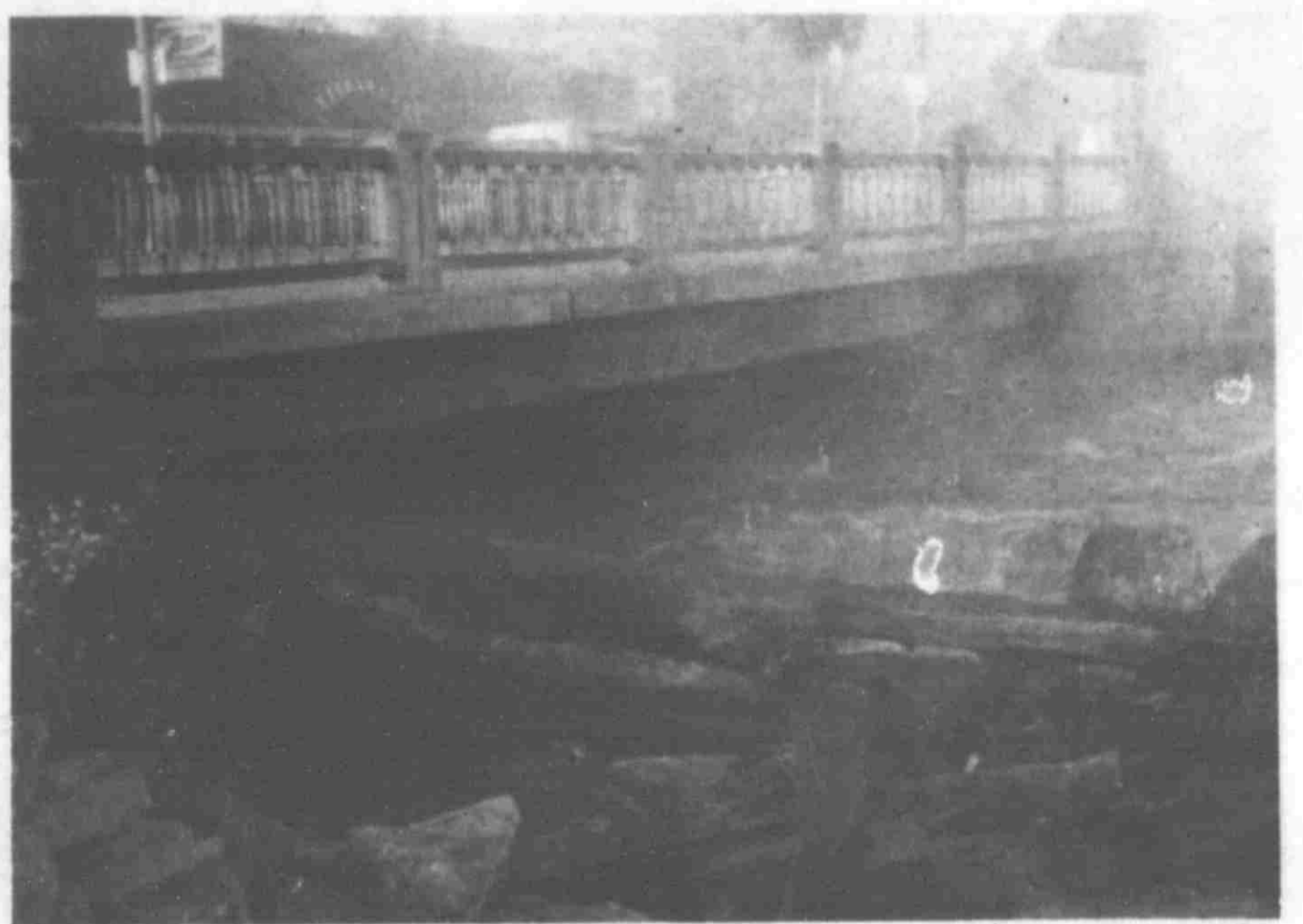
"Bee-dee-bee-bee-dee-beep, Bee-dee-bee-bee-dee-beep", alerted TV viewers to a scroll announcement on the tube Friday evening. The message came as a shock to viewers here in Lowell. It said the Belding Dam was in imminent danger of bursting and that the White's Bridge and Burroughs Dams would likely fail when a seven to eight foot wall of water roared down the Flat River. Residents along the Flat in Belding, Smyrna and Lowell were told to take measures to safeguard property and lives.

Rather than evacuating the curious flocked to Belding hoping to witness the dam burst. Hundreds gathered on bridges and other vantage points on the Flat between Belding and Lowell. In downtown Lowell, traffic was snarled as spectators gathered on the bridge and river banks. Record rains on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday dropped up to 13 inches of rain on the area. By Friday several dams had given out around the state, and the dams along the Flat were being tested.

Shopkeepers began moving their merchandise to high ground, or out of the store completely. Fearing the worst, G&G Reproductions and the Lowell Sport Shoppe hauled their merchandise away. Gary Timinkas, whose business, "The Gift Gallery" is perched precariously over the Flat River at 106 W. Main St., said "I had a truck parked right out front, and was ready to start loading as soon as word came down that the Belding Dam had broken."

Management personnel at Attwood Corporation rushed to the plant to begin emergency measures. Important records were moved to high ground, trucks were moved to the cemetery and the second shift was sent home. The King Milling Co. moved their fleet of trucks from their parking lot below the Lowell Dam to high ground at the Lowell High School parking lot

Involved in a three car accident on Wednesday afternoon, September 10 were Edward Irby, 71, of Lowell when he changed lanes suddenly on Main St. and was struck from behind by a car driven by Harold Barnes II, 26, of Ionia. The impact sent Irby's car into the side of a car driven by Jamie Smith, 28, of Lowell, who was stopped at the intersection of Center and Main. There were no injuries reported.

There were no injuries reported in an accident that occurred on Thursday, September 11 when Timothy Moore, 18, of Lowell struck the rear of a car driven by Jeffrey Childs, 18, also of Lowell. The accident occurred on Main St. near Lafayette.

David Bonn, 20, of Lowell was arrested and taken to the Kent County Jail on Saturday evening, September 13, on charges of fleeing and eluding police officers. Bonn was chased by Lowell officers for 13 miles before being apprehended.

Cited into 63rd District Court on charges of consumption of alcohol in a public place was Joseph Yurkinas, 26, of Lowell, by Lowell officers on September 9.

Cited into Court Monday evening, September 8 for minor in possession of alcohol was Brent Jousma, 20, of Ada.

A boat trailer owned by John Losinger of Lowell was slightly damaged when Douglas Wisner, 25, of Saranac backed into the trailer in the Eberhard's parking lot on September 5.

Seriously injured on Thursday evening September 11 was Wade Thompson, 19, of Ada when he drove the motorcycle he was riding off the West end of Hunt St. and over the railroad tracks. Thompson was attempting to flee police officers at the time of the accident. He was also driving on a suspended license.

Salad bars aren't the only bars Richard Spangler knows about. Spangler is currently serving several sentences at Riverside Correctional Facility in Ionia while operating MarLee's Village Inn and Pizza Express from behind the prison's walls. Spangler was incarcerated on May 26, 1983. Spangler, 33, was sentenced by a Livingston County Court for 15 to 22 years on an armed robbery conviction. On May 28, 1983 an Oakland County Court sentenced him to

10 to 15 years for criminal sexual conduct in the second degree, 60 to 200 years for criminal sexual conduct in the first degree, life imprisonment for criminal sexual conduct in the first degree and life imprisonment for armed robbery.

Prison officials were not at liberty to elaborate on the situation. We were told that the Department of Corrections can not prevent an inmate from owning a business outside the prison confines, but it is against department

policy to operate a business from within a prison. Wayne LaCross, an administrative assistant to the warden, said that prison officials have issued Spangler with a cease and desist order. LaCross said that if Spangler continues to operate the restaurant from within the prison, he will be subject to disciplinary action.

Spangler has two partners in the business; Irene Spangler, his grandmother, and Marian Selleck. They perform the duties of operating the restaurant at 2186

West Main St., Lowell, while Spangler does most of the decision making via collect phone calls from the prison. He orders supplies, talks to vendors, places advertising, hires employees and even does day-to-day menu planning by placing collect calls. Prison officials say that there are several phones available for the use of inmates during their free time, but only collect calls can be placed. Employees and vendors are always told that Spangler

Canoeist drowns near Burroughs Dam

Tragedy struck at about 1:30 Sunday afternoon at the base of the Burroughs Dam (sometimes referred to as the Fallsburg Dam). Brian Keith Scheltema, 22, of 6912 84th St., Caledonia, apparently drowned when he was pulled under by the raging water below the dam. Scheltema and a friend, Allen James Thompson, 21, of 4367 Montcalm, Lowell, had canoed down the Flat from White's Bridge. A Sheriff's Deputy said that he was told by witnesses the duo made the trip in just an hour and a half on the flood swollen river. The trip normally takes about four hours.

The pair portaged the dam and put their 17 foot canoe in on the eastern shore below the dam. The force from the open floodgates created huge whirlpools at the base of the dam. Deputies said the canoe capsized just 30 feet from shore. Thompson was able to swim to safety, but Scheltema was pulled under when he was swept toward the white water coming from the floodgates.

never attempt anything as treacherous as the area below the dam in such flood swollen circumstances. Neither canoeist was wearing a life vest, and had only seat cushions in case of an emergency.

Scheltema was termed as "missing and presumed drowned," by the Sheriff's Department on Tuesday. The Kent County Sheriff's Department Dive Unit could only search the river from a boat, as the raging

water was determined to be too dangerous for divers. Units from the Lowell Police Department, Lowell Fire Department, Mercy Ambulance and Sheriff's E-Units responded to the scene on Sunday. The Dive Unit continues its search.

City Council buys one parcel; sells another

The Lowell City Council did some buying and selling at their regular meeting of Monday, September 15. First the Councilmen approved the sale of a 5.65 acre parcel to the Lowell Area Schools for \$17,000. The city had it appraised at \$16,500. The school was the only bidder on the land locked parcel.

The property is the north half of a narrow strip once owned entirely by the city. It is bounded on the west by the Middle School, on the south by Foreman Rdoad, on the east by Metric Manufacturing and on the north by property in Lowell Township. The city leased the south half of the parcel to the school for use as a parking lot when the Middle School was built. That parcel was later traded to the school in exchange for some property in Recreation Park. The school was interested in the northern portion of the parcel to square off their holdings and allow for future development of the area.

The Councilmen also approved the purchase of a large parcel of land south of Bowes Road and west of the Water Treatment Plant. The parcel was purchased from Reith-Riley, and includes a twenty acre lake. Lowell City Manager Ray Quada explained that this parcel, along with an adjacent parcel recently purchased by the city, totals about 65 acres. The property is bounded on the north by Bowes Road and on the south by the Grand River.

The property will be purchased with Lee Fund money at a price of \$40,000. It will be designated parkland. The Councilmen did not elaborate on possible development of the park.

Richard Bryant, of 624 Hudson Street, Lowell and a realtor with Westdale's Better Homes and Gardens' office in Ada, questioned the Councilmen on their decision to purchase the land as a park. Bryant asked the Councilmen if they would be willing to sell the acreage not in the flood plane. The Councilmen were in general agreement that they would not. Councilman Collins noted that the property was being purchased with Lee Fund money as designated park land. "We can't sell it without a vote of the people," Collins said. Bryant questioned the wisdom of the city acquiring vast amounts of park land, for a community

of only 3,500 people. Bryant admitted that he had plans to develop the 16 acres that aren't in the flood plane, and noted that this development would have added to the tax base. "You're taking it off the tax rolls forever when you make it park land," Bryant argued.

Quada and the Councilmen retorted that they felt they were looking to the future of the community by developing a quality parks system. Mayor James Maatman said, "Good parks add to the quality of life in a commu-

nity like Lowell." Councilman Collins said, "Good parks, like good churches and schools, attract quality business and industry that add to the tax base." Quada said he could foresee the 65 acre tract as the hub of an all new parks system in Lowell.

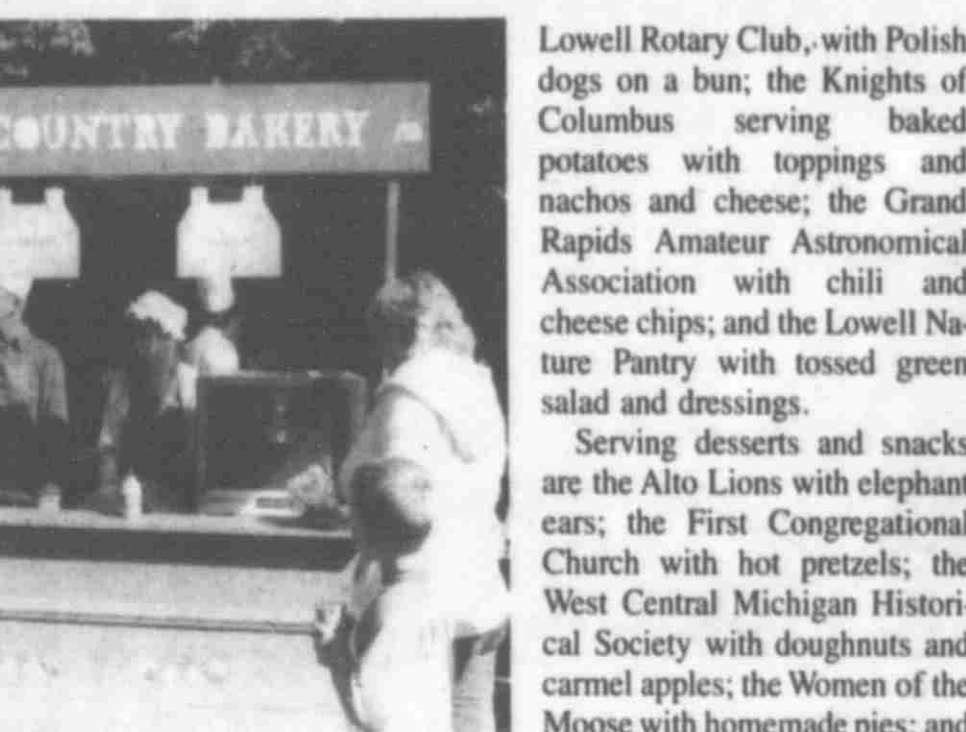
Bryant asked the Council if they would consider re-zoning another Reith-Riley parcel west of the Water Treatment Plant. The Councilmen agreed that it would be a matter to first be reviewed by the Planning Commission.

Red Arrows surprised by FHC Rangers in league opener

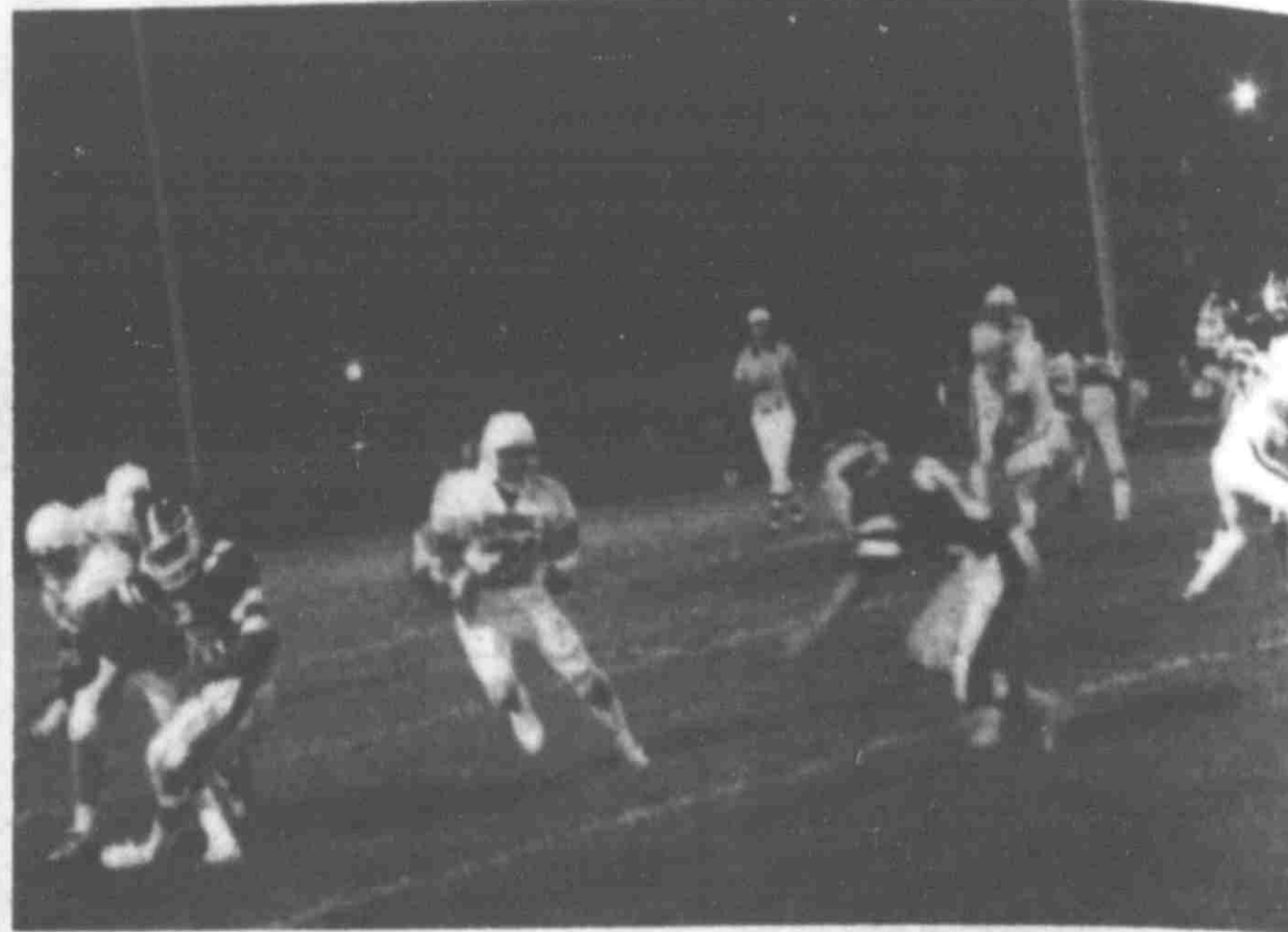

their openers. East Grand Rapids took Sparta 41-13 and Wyoming Park blanked Rogers 46-0. Lowell stopped the Rangers on their first drive of the game. The Arrows stalled on their first drive and fumbled a punt which the Rangers recovered on the Lowell 7 yard line and later converted into a score. Early in the second quarter E.H.C. struck again with a 35 yard run for a touchdown that made it 14-0 Forest Hills. The Arrows' Mike Dumas then made a seventy two yard run. Two plays later he scored on a run from the nine yard line. A missed extra point that hit the uprights made the score 14-6. The Rangers then marched the ball back down into Lowell's territory, but they were stopped by the Arrow defense and were forced to kick a 37 yard field goal. The kick counted and at half time the score was 17-6.

JV starts with 3-0 mark

"Krause at the house"

The Michigan House began its fall session last week with a number of important issues on its agenda, including extension of the bottle law to include deposits on wine coolers and approval of the Medicaid budget for fiscal year 1987. Legislators are expected to approve a proposal that would amend the 1976 referendum which placed a deposit on carbonated beverage containers with less than a one gallon capacity. Because wine coolers were not being marketed at the time of the law's passage, this legislation is designed to complete the intent of the law. The rising popularity of wine coolers has crystallized the need to include them in the deposit law. Wine cooler containers are appearing in places where beer and soft drink containers were littered before the bottle bill. Not everyone was convinced of the need for or effectiveness of the bottle bill 10 years ago. We all benefit from this policy. Our cleaner roadsides and recreation areas are constant proof of the soundness of the bottle bill. The Legislature must decide at this time whether or not to maintain the consistency of this law by including deposits on wine coolers. A second issue the Legislature must confront is the controversial budget for the Department of Social Services (DDS). While the Legislature has approved budgets for the state's other agencies and services, the DDS budget has been stalled over the issue of funding for Medicaid abortions. In early summer, House members approved a Medicaid budget that included language prohibiting the use of state funds for abortions. The Governor vetoed the entire budget, which forced it back to the Legislature where the House failed to override the veto. Later, the House approved a three-month extension on the DSS appropriation that would have carried the department to January at current funding levels. The Senate has yet to act on this extension, and the DSS budget runs out September 30. For now, it is difficult to determine how the Medicaid abortion issue will be resolved. Philosophical differences within the Legislature and the executive office keep the Medicaid budget steeped in controversy.

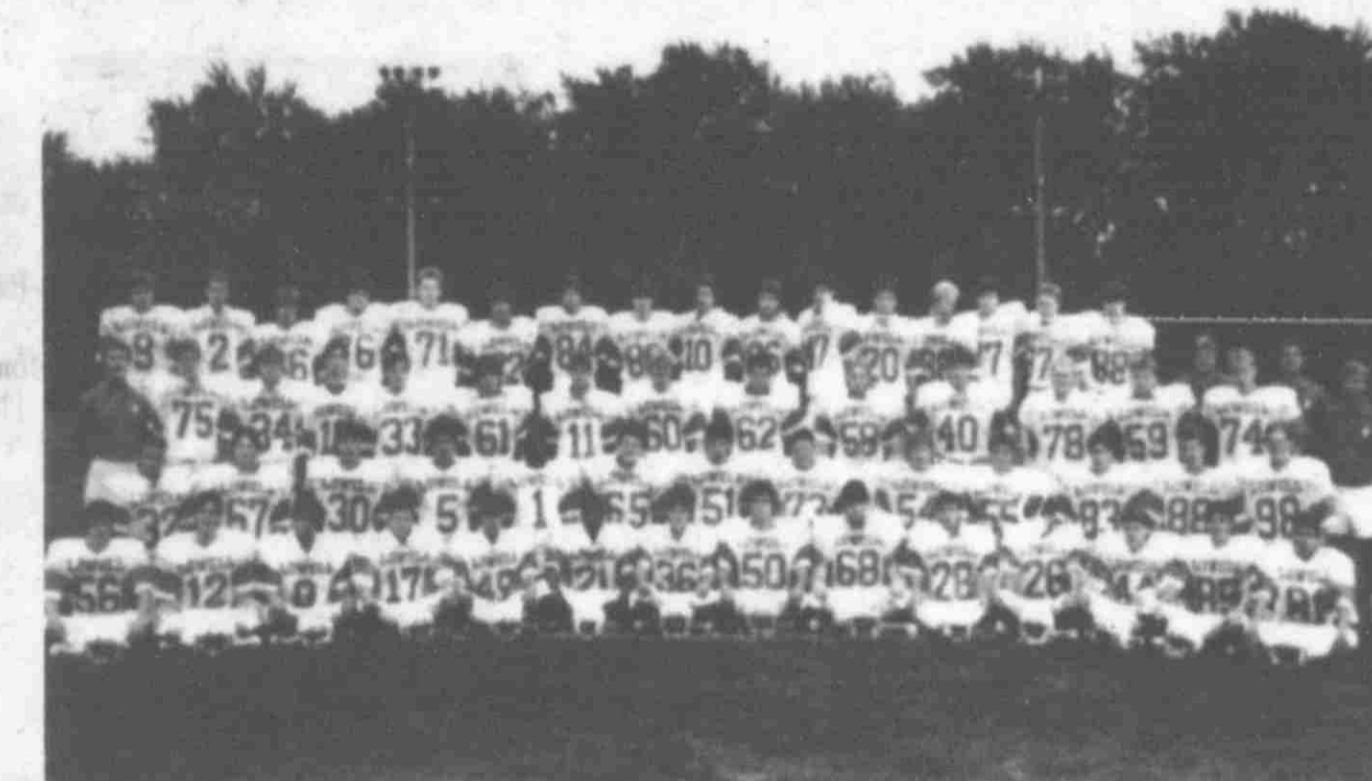

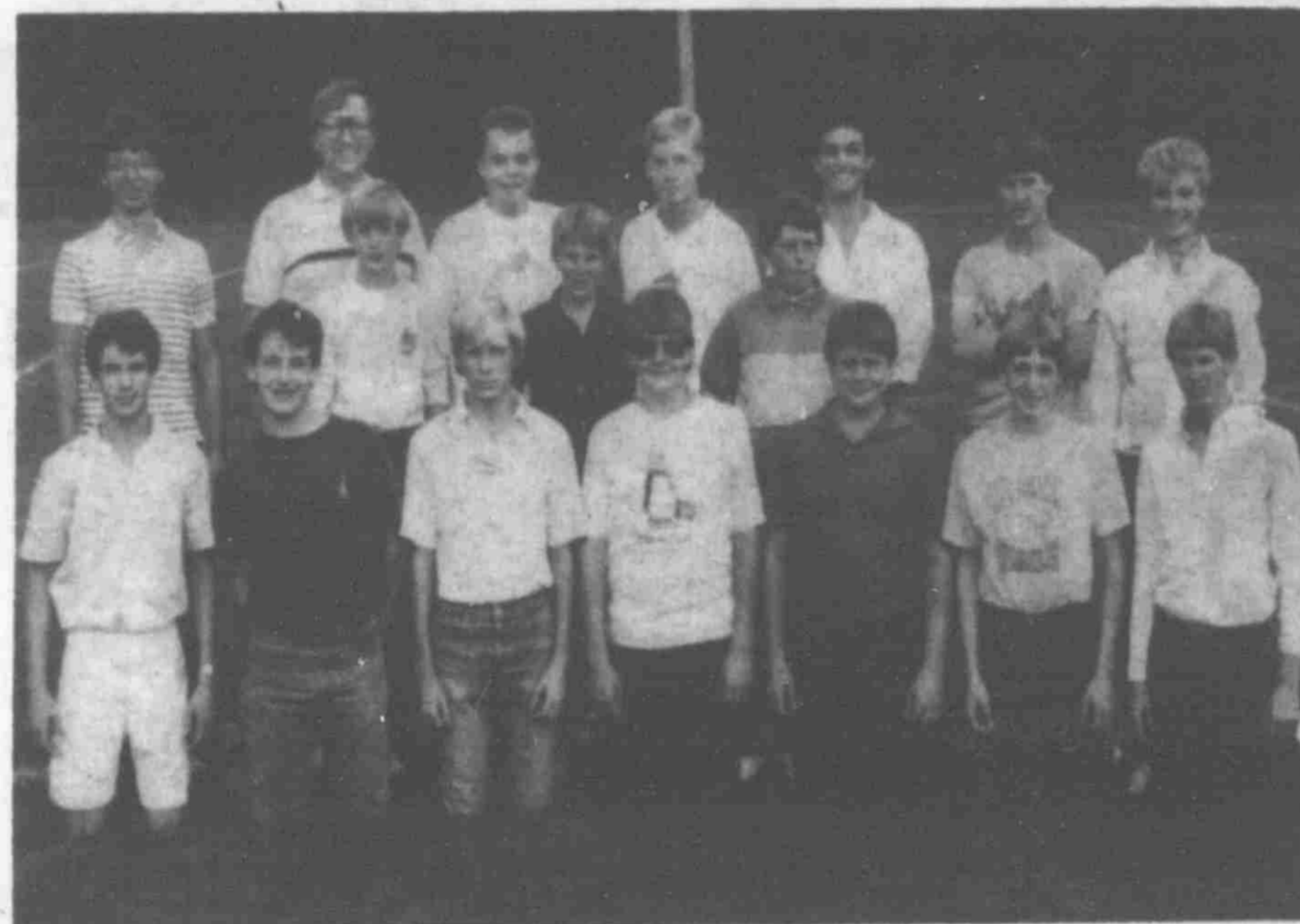

ifying test performance, and submitting information about their school and community activities, personal interests, and goals. About 90 percent (or 13,500) of the Semifinalists are expected to meet the rigorous standards required to become Finalists in the Merit Program and to compete for one of several types of Merit Scholarships to be offered in 1987. About 40 percent of the distinguished Finalists will receive an award and all Merit Scholars will be chosen from the Finalist group.

Every Finalist will be considered for one of 1,800 single-payment National Merit \$2,000 Scholarships, allocated on a state representation basis in proportion to each state's total of U.S. high school seniors. Winners in each state will be chosen by a selection committee of college admission professionals who will judge which Finalists have the strongest combination of academic and extracurricular accomplishments. The "National" awards are supported by grants to NMSC from companies and businesses and by undesignated

Merit Program funds.

Corporations, foundations, and other organizations also will underwrite some 1,400 Merit Scholarships for Finalists who meet preferential criteria the grantors specify. Only Finalists with particular qualifications -- such as children of employees, residents of areas a company serves, or Finalists with career goals a sponsor wishes to encourage -- will be considered for these awards. Most corporate-

sponsored Merit Scholarships are renewable annually and provide between \$500 and \$8,000 for each college undergraduate year; a few are one-time awards of \$2,000.

Approximately 2,800 four-year Merit Scholarships will be offered by colleges and universities and only Finalists who wish to attend a sponsor institution will compete for these awards. Winners will receive stipends ranging from \$250 to

\$2,000 for each of the four years of study at the sponsor college. The National Merit Scholarship Program, initiated in 1955, is financed independently by over 600 sponsor organizations. The 6,000 academic champions who will be named Merit Scholars next April and may will bring the program's 32-year total to more than 100,000 young Americans who have received Merit Scholarships worth \$308 million.

ler is in Ohio, and that is the reason for the collect calls. The issue of Spangler's ownership came to light recently when officials at Riverside Correctional Facility sent letters to several MarLee's employees. The letters stated that Spangler is incarcerated there, serving two life sentences, and that he possessed paperwork which included the name, address, telephone number and often a photo of the person to which the letters were sent. The letter asked whether the addressee wanted Spangler to possess this information. If a response was not received at the prison within 15 days, prison officials would assume that the addressee was granting permission for Spangler to possess the information. LaC-

ross says he has received many letters in response. He said all of them requested that the information be taken away from Spangler, and supported the steps taken by prison officials. A father of one of the employees furnished a copy of the letter to the Ledger, and told us of an employee meeting regarding the situation. Most employees did not know that Spangler was incarcerated. Some have quit in the interim. Loretta Miller, an employee at MarLee's since before it opened, said she did not know about Spangler's incarceration when she was hired, but did find out well before the bulk of the employees did. She said, "It doesn't make one bit of difference to me whether he is in jail, or not". Miller also told us that

Spangler owns another restaurant in Milford, Michigan, and was in the restaurant business well before he got into trouble. Spangler is buying the business and building from Tom Hazel, of Lake Odessa. Hazel opened the business originally as TJ's Restaurant. It has also been operated under other managements as The Steak Out and Brother's Inn. In a phone conversation with Spangler on Tuesday, he said that he was being harassed by prison officials, and intends to continue with his phone calls, despite the threat of disciplinary action. Spangler maintains he is innocent of the charges that put him behind bars. He says he has appealed his case, and expects a review soon.

Flood warnings, continued



Lowell's family of swans found the going rough on the flood swollen Flat River Saturday, so they took to the road. They are shown in this photo taken by Sue Bauer, crossing M-91 at the Flat River Bridge. Sue said the procession took awhile, and traffic backed up for a considerable distance. The swans re-entered the river on the upstream side of the river, only to be swept back downstream.

City officials were in constant contact with those monitoring the Belding and Greenville dams. Throughout the evening and the following day, all five dams along the Flat from Greenville to Lowell were kept in constant vigil. Later reports said that the Greenville Dam was in danger. Officials in Greenville had been releasing as little water as possible in an effort to relieve pressure on the Belding Dam. At one point the Belding Dam had two feet of water cascading over it and it was estimated that about

one million gallons per hour were rushing past. It was said in reports Saturday morning that the water being released from Greenville would surely burst the Belding dam, but still it held. Officials from Rockford, where floodwaters were subsiding, called Lowell personnel with an offer of 2,000 filled sandbags. Lowell and Rockford D.P.W. trucks hauled the sandbags here on Saturday, just in case. The longer the Belding dam held, the better the chances be-

came for the downstream dams. The White's Bridge, Bourroughs and Lowell floodgates were opened all the way throughout the ordeal. As time passed, their reservoirs became better able to withstand a sudden rush of water even if the Belding Dam did fail. The Belding Dam survived the ordeal. By Monday the danger had apparently passed, and life returned to normal around our usually quiet and picturesque city nestled along the banks of the Flat and Grand Rivers.
